## AN EDITORIAL

### Star Urges Fireworks Continue

The Star was disturbed to learn that the Chamber of Commerce board of directors had voted to discontinue the July 4 fireworks display.

Granted the display is an expense. We are as aware as anyone of inflation, and how it has affected the price of virtually everything.

But we wonder if the members who voted to drop the display have not lost sight of the reason for staging the event in the first place?

It was started originally to help keep people at home and off the highways on a busy holiday. And the event had more than accomplished its purpose as seen by the huge throng estimated at 5,000 people who watched last year's display.

We feel that this has been one of the most successful projects ever undertaken by the Friona Chamber of Commerce, and that to drop the fireworks would lead eventually to the death of our entire July 4th celebration.

We realize that last year's Bicentennial program attained a peak that may not be equalled again in terms of participation and program. But we hate to see such an important facet eliminated just a year from our most successful July 4th event.

We have heard various businessmen say they would be glad to contribute \$50 or \$100 to keep the fireworks in the program.

We urge the Chamber directors to allow a fund drive to be made for the fireworks. We predict that the needed \$1500 can be made up in less than a day's time.

### Chamber To Sponsor Tournament

The Friona Chamber of Commerce announced this week that it will sponsor a mixed doubles tennis tournament this year in conjunction with the city's July 4th celebration.

"Depending on the number of entries, preliminaries may be played prior to July 4," said Ron Smiley, one of the tournament organizers.

Matches will begin at 8 a.m. on July 4th. There will be no entry fee charged.

### Mercury Zooms Past 100° Mark

The temperature hit the century mark in Friona for the first time this season on Thursday when the official high in the city climbed to 102 degrees. Some thermometers registered as high as 105 degrees that day.

High temperatures were in the 90s all week otherwise, as the mercury averaged ten degrees above average for the week which brought little relief in the form of moisture.

A daytime shower last Friday afternoon left an official .19 inch locally, and this is virtually all of the

moisture recorded for the month of June, after a wetter than average month in May.

Blessed by the hot dry weather, wheat harvest in the area has stepped up considerably by the end of the week. Wheat is expected to make a good yield this year, with a better than average yield for dryland.

However, the price for wheat is down considerably, which takes some of the edge off of the harvest season.

Fishing with the earthworm is a discovery of modern-day man, and the worm growing business is about to boom as demand for bait increases.

Gladys Wilson and her son Donald are "early birds" who got into the business and Mrs. Wilson says she is not planning to make "big" money but wants to supplement her retirement income.

On September 1, 1976, the Wilsons bought 38,000 Red Wigglers and put them in a three foot by 42 foot pit. Later they purchased 110,000 more worms.

"We should have ten times those figures now," Mrs. Wilson explained. "So far we have been selling only to local fishermen but we plan to market all the stock back to North American Bait Company."

Not all the worms are used for bait. The bait companies sell worms to the forest service who use them to fertilize soil where new trees are set out. The Chinese are monitoring laboratory worms as a means of predicting earthquakes. Men are studying worms as an answer to the delicate ecological balance. Worms may also be a source of food.

As the uses for worms increase, so will the demand. Medicines may soon contain worms. Some dog foods are now being made "high protein" by adding worms to the mix. They are becoming more popular as a food for human consumption due to their high protein content.

A worm raised in cornmeal becomes, essentially, a corn worm. A worm is what he eats, and raising a worm in corn lessens the psychological impact of eating one.

### Fireworks Get Ax In Board Action

This year's July 4th events in Friona will not include fireworks of any kind, if the decision reached by the Chamber of Commerce's board of directors on Tuesday is carried out.

The board voted not to have the fireworks display at the regular monthly breakfast meeting due to lack of funds.

The Chamber voted unanimously at their monthly breakfast and meeting not to have the fireworks display this year due to the lack of supporting funds needed to buy the fireworks.

Friona Fire Chief Ralph Shirley had told the Chamber that about \$1700 worth of fireworks were burned last year, and that much would be needed again in order to have a display of any length.

Six hundred dollars of last year's expense came from donations from civic clubs and the Chamber carried about \$800 of the expense.

This year only two clubs had donated to the cause. The Noon Lions Club gave \$200 and the Progressive Study Club gave \$35. Other clubs contacted had failed to donate any money as of Tuesday.

At least three of the board members, contacted individually, expressed their interest in maintaining the fireworks display. Board

member B.K. Buske did some telephone legwork this week, and said that the July 4th committee would meet the first thing Monday, and see if the fireworks can be salvaged.

"I have talked to one or two other board members, and have also visited with the Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce concerning their display. I really hate to see the fireworks dropped, and I think we can get it re-instated, if the other board members want it," he told the Friona Star late in the week.

Due to some earlier projects which had drained their general fund, the Chamber is unable to carry as big a load of the fireworks expense as it has in the past.

Other holiday events may change this year. The yearly catfish fry may be changed to a barbecue because of the difficulty in finding fish. Some of the civic clubs are planning events such as baseball games and a tennis tournament which they hope will hold the local crowds.

The Chamber also decided to have a membership drive to better their financial situation. A revision of membership dues was also discussed, which if passed, will go into effect January 1, 1978. This will increase some member's dues.

### City Okays Trash System

The Friona City Council voted in a called session Friday to purchase an all-new containerized trash system for the city.

A bid by the Pak-Mor company of San Antonio in the amount of \$80,834 was accepted by the council in a brief meeting. Other companies submitting bids were Emco of Plainview and Porsch Bros. of Hereford, although the latter bid did not include the entire system sought by the city.

The system is expected to not be operational until December of this year, at which time the city's system of barrel trash cans will be done away with.

### Diversified Farming: Worms Grow Well

However, some worms are raised in horse and cattle manure.

The Wilsons feed their worms pulverized grapes along with chicken feed, made up of finely ground grains, wheat corn, etc., but they don't have any immediate plans to eat them.

"Organic gardeners are some of the biggest users of worms and worm castings," Mrs. Wilson said. "The worms help aerate the soil to make watering more efficient and the castings are pure organic fertilizer."

Mrs. Wilson said the worms are very interesting. They have five hearts, and are bi-sexual. After mating both lay eggs, from which two to sixteen worms hatch.

"The red wigglers are a hybrid worm which are much better for fishing bait than the common field worm or the native nightcrawler. The field worm is not a good reproducer nor particularly adaptable to commercial production. It takes about six months for a red wiggler to grow to full size—an average of four or five inches—which is important to fishermen."

She said the red worms have been

known to live up to 70 hours underwater but the average nightcrawler found in Parmer County will drown quickly."

Among the food used for the protein-packed red wigglers are horse pellets, chicken feed, bird seed, and dog food. Mrs. Wilson said the food had to be supplemented but care must be taken to maintain acid and gases in balance.

"The worms are surface feeders," Mrs. Wilson said. "They come to the top of the ground to eat, thus are prey to birds, ants and other enemies."

They keep several inches of straw over the worm bins in order to keep out birds and occasionally put down lime which helps keep out other bugs and also helps stabilize the soil and is not harmful to the worms.

The worm harvest is also interesting. A harvest is conducted by "baiting" the top of the bins with worm delectables, like newspaper. After the worms climb into the bait, it is removed from the bin and the worms are driven from it by light. When a light is put over the container the worms seek darkness

## 45 YEARS AGO—JUNE 17, 1932

The city commission held a called meeting Monday night in the office of the secretary, with the mayor and both commissioners present, and discussed ways and means of collecting funds with which to meet payment for the water meters, which the city has been installing during the past few weeks. ## 25 YEARS AGO—JUNE 5, 1952

city's newest eating establishment will feature drive-up speakers, the first in Friona, and will also cater to those who wish to eat inside.

A.W. Anthony, Sr. and Ralph G. Wilson were re-elected to terms as directors for the Friona Wheat Growers, Inc., at the 28th annual meeting Tuesday night at Friona High School. A total of \$370,059.33 is to be distributed to members this year as dividends. With 1,654 checks to be issued, this is an average of \$223.70.

## 10 YEARS AGO—JUNE 8, 1967

A feed manufacturing plant will be built in Friona, it was announced this week by a group of Friona businessmen. Construction is slated to begin as soon as possible. The plant, which will manufacture primarily feedlot supplements and range pellets, will be located just east of the Friona city limits on the south side of Highway 60. The plant will employ seven or eight men. Ron Davenport has been hired as manager of the new plant, which is scheduled to open this fall.

## Interest Low In Referendum

Registration for the cattle marketing referendum to be conducted next month had failed to generate a large turnout of producers, according to a check this week with the Parmer County ASCS office.

Through Thursday, a total of 110 producers had registered to vote in the special election. Friday, June 17 was the deadline to register.

Only those producers who registered will be able to participate in the election. Although apparently a small number, Parmer County's total may compare favorably. Early in the week, neighboring Castro County reported only 56 registrants.

## MEETING SET

The annual organizational meeting of the United Community Services, (United Fund) is set for 10 a.m. Tuesday, June 21, at the Community Room of the Friona State Bank.

The purpose of the meeting is to select a chairman and vice chairman for the 1977 United Fund Drive; and other routine business.

## Bond Sales Given

May sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Parmer County were reported today by County Bond Chairman Frank A. Spring.

Sales for the five-month period totaled \$55,321 for 55 per cent of the 1977 sales goal of \$100,000.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$21,965,508, while sales for the first five months of 1977 totaled \$116,891,825 with 42 per cent of the yearly sales goal of \$276.9 million achieved.

# Ice Cream Suppers

With warm weather came ice cream suppers. Big affairs were usually held at the church but three or four families would often have get-togethers in various homes.

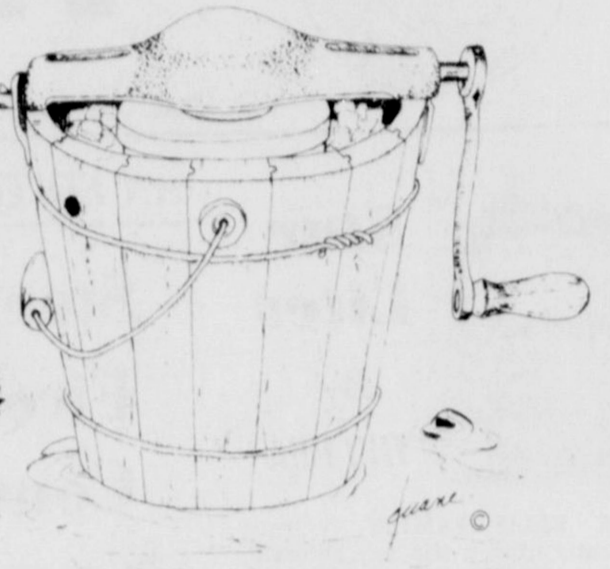
Every family would bring a gallon or better hand-crank freezer and a 25 pound block of ice along with all the makings for their favorite recipe of ice cream. Folks would go as early as possible in the afternoon after the chores at home were laid by.

The ladies would ready the freezers in the kitchen, putting in all the ingredients then the men would take them out on the back porch or in the yard where the crankin' was to be done. Ice picks were used to "chunk up" the ice into pieces small enough to go around the freezer can. The pieces of ice had to be just the right size, not too small, they would melt to fast, not too large they would not go into the freezer. With the ice packed firmly, rock salt was poured on it, a towel placed over it and the turning started.

The young boys got to crank the freezers most of the time, eagerly taking turns, each hoping he would be the one turning a freezer when it "made". They would have races to see

which could get his to freeze quicker. There was a knack to freezing ice cream. It didn't seem to make much difference how fast you turned it or how slow. Some said it was how you packed the ice, some said it depended on your recipe, some said one brand of freezer was better than the others so on. I know the one I turned always seemed to be the slowest.

As the cream froze it became harder and harder to turn the crank. First one and then another would say,



"Mine's done!" But the men would come over and say, "Are you sure it's ready?" "This handle seems easy to turn", and they would go several more rounds.

The excitement would build as first one then another would be taken into the house for "dishin' out". There was a different flavor in each freezer and everyone just had to try them all—didn't want to hurt anyone's feelings you know. The ones who did the turning usually got to clean off the dashers.

The cream left on the dasher seemed to be the best of all to me.

Few people stopped till it was all gone even though the last helpings were about as runny as milk on the way home late that night you could hear comments like, "Wadn't that fresh peach of Flora's good?" "Yea, but Vernell's didn't have no taste to it, course her's never does; she don't seem to put 'nuff flavorin' in it, course she's not one to cook no how".

Dear Editor:  
I had a heart attack May 5, was sent to the Veterans Hospital in Amarillo May 6. We have no income since that time, and my wife can't work. My son and his four children stay with us. He now has to do all the work, but doesn't make enough to pay rent, his bills and buy groceries for the seven of us, let alone the doctor bills and medicine--yet, we are not eligible for welfare.

So far we are still waiting to see if we will even get food stamps. It has to be run through a computer and will be around eight more days. We have signed up for SSI and VA pension, but this still takes a lot of red tape.

It seems that if we had a child every nine months, we could get all the money we needed. I think that is wrong. Seems like they just pay women to have babies. If this were stopped, maybe other people could get help. I am 54 years old and my wife 51.

We appreciate the help we have received from the American Legion, the Salvation Army, Judge Fortenberry, Ernest Anthony and Jerry and Erma Brown (I have been working for Jerry).

It seems our lives are run by a computer. But ask the computer how it feels to have a heart attack. Ask the computer how it feels to have no funds for a doctor or money to buy medicine for your wife. Ask the computer how it feels not to have soap to keep clean. Ask the computer how to get food stamps or welfare, since we haven't been able to do so yet.

Ask the computer if it can bring back the mother of four children when she is dead. I let the computer figure my income tax in 1974. It sent me back around \$280, but then said it made a mistake and I had to pay \$509.00.

I thank the Lord that computers haven't completely taken over, but they are getting closer all the time.

I just wanted the folks of Friona to know how hard it is to get any welfare money when a person really and truly needs it. And I appreciate those who have helped us. We are not used to begging.

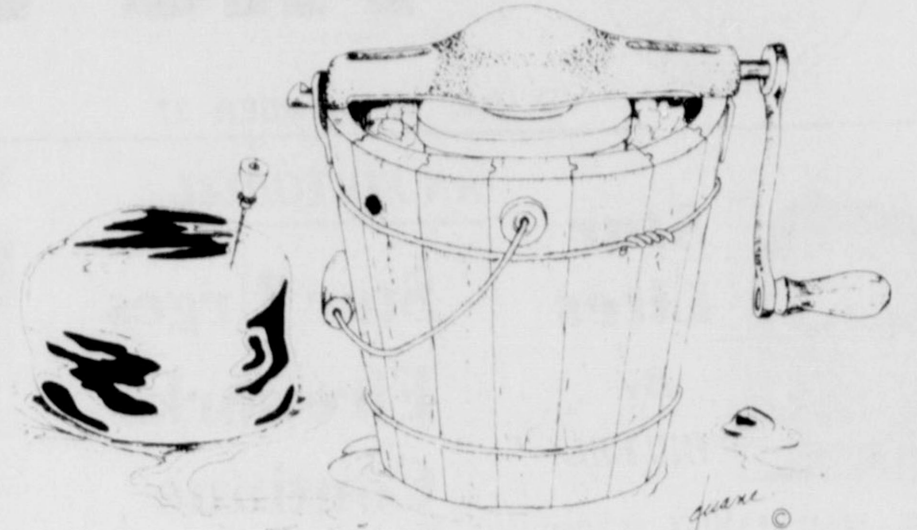

# Ice Cream Suppers



With warm weather came ice cream suppers. Big affairs were usually held at the church but three or four families would often have get-togethers in various homes.

Every family would bring a gallon or better hand-crank freezer and a 25 pound block of ice along with all the makings for their favorite recipe of ice cream. Folks would go as early as possible in the afternoon after the chores at home were laid by.

The ladies would ready the freezers in the kitchen, putting in all the ingredients then the men would take them out on the back porch or in the yard where the crankin' was to be done. Ice picks were used to "chunk up" the ice into pieces small enough to go around the freezer can. The pieces of ice had to be just the right size, not too small, they would melt too fast, not too large they would not go into the freezer. With the ice packed firmly, rock salt was poured on it, a towel placed over it and the turning started.

The young boys got to crank the freezers most of the time, eagerly taking turns, each hoping he would be the one turning a freezer when it "made". They would have races to see

which could get his to freeze quicker. There was a knack to freezing ice cream. It didn't seem to make much difference how fast you turned it or how slow. Some said it was how you packed the ice, some said it depended on your recipe, some said one brand of freezer was better than the others so on. I know the one I turned always seemed to be the slowest.

As the cream froze it became harder and harder to turn the crank. First one and then another would say,

"Mine's done!" But the men would come over and say, "Are you sure it's ready?" "This handle seems easy to turn", and they would go several more rounds.

The excitement would build as first one then another would be taken into the house for "dishin' out". There was a different flavor in each freezer and everyone just had to try them all—didn't want to hurt anyone's feelings you know. The ones who did the turning usually got to clean off the dashers.

The cream left on the dasher seemed to be the best of all to me.

Few people stopped till it was all gone even though the last helpings were about as runny as milk. On the way home late that night you could hear comments like, "Wadn't that fresh peach of Flora's good?" "Yea, but Vernell's didn't have no taste to it, course her's never does; she don't seem to put 'nuff flavorin' in it, course she's not one to cook no how".

I had a heart attack May 5, was sent to the Veterans Hospital in Amarillo May 6. We have no income since that time, and my wife can't work. My son and his four children stay with us. He now has to do all the work, but doesn't make enough to pay rent, his bills and buy groceries for the seven of us, let alone the doctor bills and medicine—yet, we are not eligible for welfare.  
So far we are still waiting to see if we will even get food stamps. It has to be run through a computer and will be around eight more days. We have signed up for SSI and VA pension, but this still takes a lot of red tape.  
It seems that if we had a child every nine months, we could get all the money we needed. I think that is wrong. Seems like they just pay women to have babies. If this were stopped, maybe other people could get help. I am 54 years old and my wife 51.

We appreciate the help we have received from the American Legion, the Salvation Army, Judge Fortenberry, Ernest Anthony and Jerry and Erma Brown (I have been working for Jerry).

It seems our lives are run by a computer. But ask the computer how it feels to have a heart attack. Ask the computer how it feels to have no funds for a doctor or money to buy medicine for your wife. Ask the computer how it feels not to have soap to keep clean. Ask the computer how to get food stamps or welfare, since we haven't been able to do so yet.

Ask the computer if it can bring back the mother of four children when she is dead. I let the computer figure my income tax in 1974. It sent me back around \$280, but then said it made a mistake and I had to pay \$509.00.

I thank the Lord that computers haven't completely taken over, but they are getting closer all the time.

I just wanted the folks of Friona to know how hard it is to get any welfare money when a person really and truly needs it. And I appreciate those who have helped us. We are not used to begging.

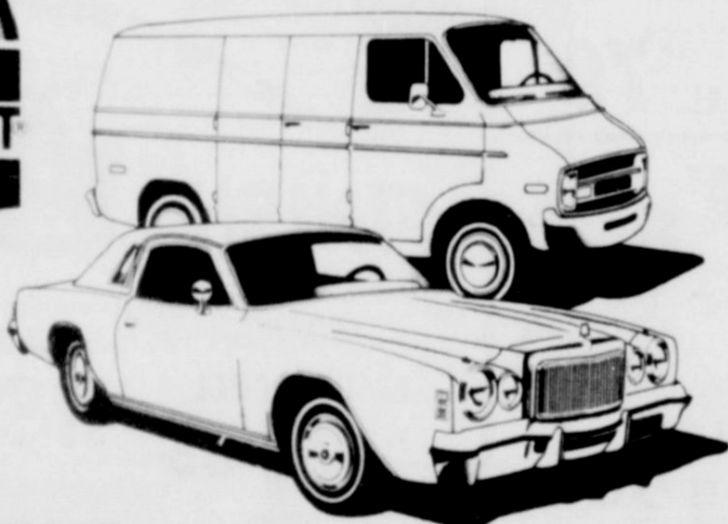

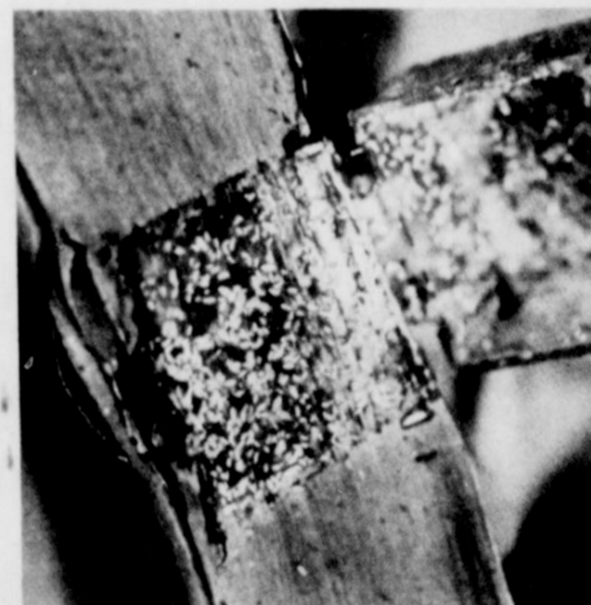

The ambulance driver, Rex Williams, received commendation for his actions and ability during the emergency trip for patient handling and calling ahead for clearance. Williams, full-time paid employee who has several assistants, is especially trained in emergency medical procedures.

The city assumed the ambulance service April 1 of this year after Parsons-Ellis relinquished all ambulance calls.

Sue Smith, head nurse at Parmer County Community Hospital, said Thursday that both the baby girl and her mother were reported in good condition.

### County Gets Pay For Registration

Comptroller Bob Bullock mailed checks totaling \$826,667 to 251 Texas counties last week as payments for issuing and processing voter registration certificates from February 1, 1976 through January 31, 1977.

Parmer County's check was for \$572.00. Amounts for neighboring counties included Castro, \$322; Deaf Smith, \$1,120; Lamb, \$1,184; Swisher, \$493; and Hale, \$2,002.

The payments ranged from a low of \$6.80 which went to Donley County to \$117,141 to Dallas County, Bullock said.

The counties are paid 40 cents by the state for each voter registration certificate issued or cancelled, he explained.

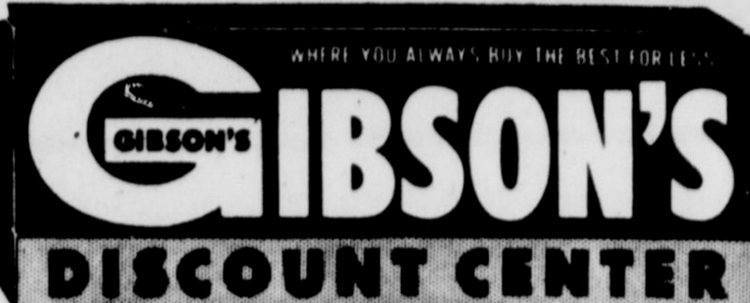

and crawl downward. When the bait is removed all the worms will be in wads at the bottom.

Not only will the earthworm serve as an automatic garbage disposal and help eliminate the ecological problem of burning or otherwise disposing of garbage—it will turn waste into one of the best fertilizers available.

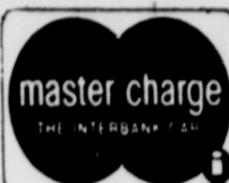

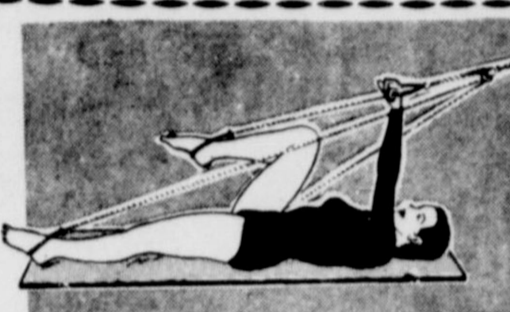

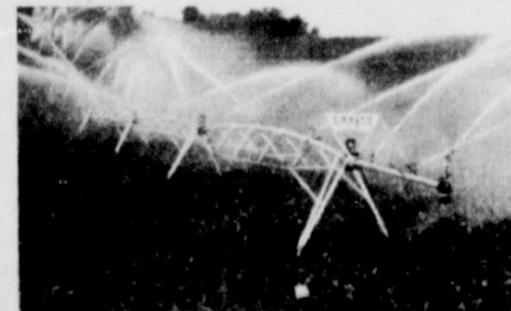

A Green Stamp drive continues for

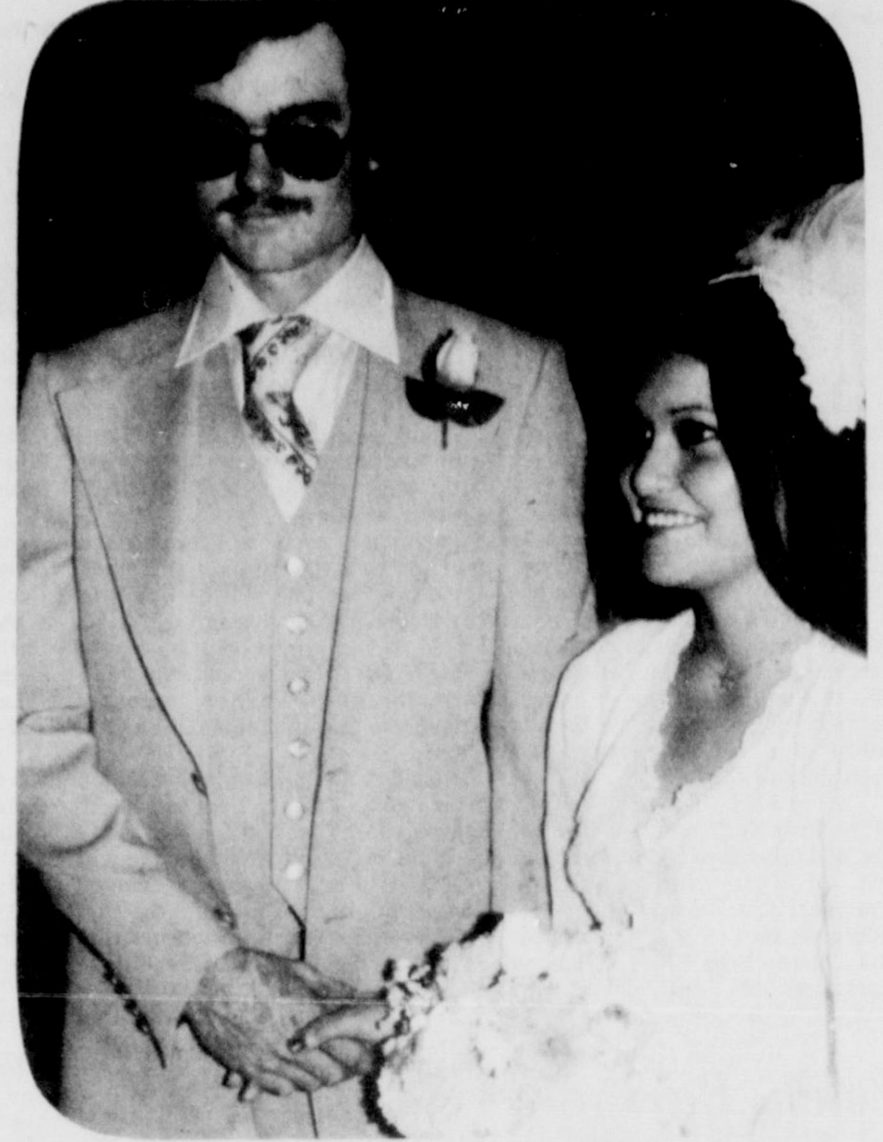
