Marshall Gets Nod

Johnson Picks First Negro **For High Court**

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Johnson announced today he is nominating the first Negro ever chosen to serve on the Supreme Court-Solicitor General Thurgood Marshall.

Marshall, 58 and a one-time chief legal officer of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, would succeed Associate Justice Tom C. Clark who resigned Monday at the conclusion of the high court's 1966-67 session.

Clark's Successor

Clark stepped down because his son, Ramsey Clark, had been selected by Johnson earlier in the year to be attorney general.

Accompanied by Marshall, Johnson went before newsmen and photographers in the White House rose garden to announce his choice for Clark's

The chief executive said Marshall has earned and deserves a place on the Supreme Court and is the man best qualified for the job by training and experience.

Earns Place In History

"I believe he has already earned his place in history," Johnson said. But he predicted Marshall's stature will be great-

ly enhanced by service on the Supreme Court. Marshall has been the nation's solicitor general-No. 3 official of the Justice Department-since July, 1965. In that post he directed all federal litigation before the Supreme Court and other ap-

NATO Issues Plea

LUXEMBOURG (AP) - The president of the north Atlantic Alliance Council issued a pressing appeal today for permanent solutions to political problems left in the sake of last week's war in

the Middle East. Jens Otto Krag of Denmark, opening the twoday annual spring review by the foreign ministers of the 15 NATO nations, said the "dramatic events in the Middle East Demonstrated the risk that such situations may explode in military conflicts with unforeseeable international consequences."

Political Problems

Krag, who is prime minister and foreign minister of his nation, appeared to find comfort in the restraint of the United States and the Soviet Union during the crisis.

"The policies pursued by the major powers during the military phase of the conflict," he said. "showed a clear realization of their common interest in preventing the situation from getting out "Lasting solutions by way of negotiation must now be found to the political problems in the Mid-

dle East," Krag said. Alliance Dissension

Turning briefly to Vietnam, Krag called for "efforts to scale down the military activities and bring

the conflict to a final halt." An expression of support for Israel by NATO Secretary-General Manlio Brosio in a news conference Monday night brought new dissension to the

Brosio hailed Israel for having "bravely broken the encircling pressure" of the Arab states. Leading delegates felt this seriously compromised key NATO members who have sought a middle role in the conflict.

Adventurous Policy

Brosio, an Italian, said the swiftness of Israel's victory had staved off the danger that the local war could engulf the world. He chided the Russians for following "an adventurous and risky policy" by siding with the Arabs. He listed some key Israeli political demands which he said were essential to the vital interests of Allied nations.

Big Spring businessmen - 37 strong-were being given an eyeopening tour of Borden County today, in a chartered bus arranged by the local chamber of commerce. Jimmy Taylor, chairman of the chamber's agriculture committee, and George Weeks, chairman of the retail committee, were heading up the tour.

NOON STOP At the noon stop, they were dining on barbecue as hosts to Borden County residents and ranchers. Gerald Miller, with the Soil Conservation Service, is spokesman for the tour, which was devoted to ranching practices and accounts for most of Borden County's economic ac-

This morning, stops were made at the Vernon and Jack Wolf ranch, to study a system of parallel terraces; and at the Bill Wilson ranch, where areas sprayed to control mesquite were visited. Refreshments were served at the Wilson

At Gail, where the tour stopped for lunch, the visitors were taken through the 90-year-old county jail, one of the state's historic structures and described as the oldest Texas jail still in service. The Borden County Historical Society Museum proved popular with the tourists, and the leaders had difficulty getting the group out for lunch. The new post office and the renovated courthouse were also inspected.

NEW LAKE

The afternoon schedule called for a visit to the new Gail city lake, on the Dewey Everett ranch. Built last year, it filled within three months of completion and provides the community with its water sup-

By mid-afternoon, the tour was to visit the Rich Anderson ranch, north of Vealmoor, and observe his wildlife development and quarter horses.

SAME PATTERN This good will tour followed the same pattern as last year, when the chamber sponsored a similar tour to Glasscock County. The success of that event inspired today's effort.

The number of participants steadily increased this morning as the tour progressed, with ranchers and others joining the group along the road.

LBJ Stays With Stand On Mideast

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Johnson reaffirmed today his May 23 statement on U.S. support of the territorial integurity of nations in the Middle

How it can be effecuated will be determined by events in the

days ahead, Johnson said. It depends a great deal on the nations themselves, their views and proposals, he said.

Johnson discussed the Middle East, Vietnam, domestic policies and civil rights troubles at a news conference announced only a few minutes before reporters were summoned into

On a question of working with Russia to secure peace in the Middle East, Johnson said this country "likes for all nations to do everything they can to promote an honorable and acceptable peace."

He added that he hoped that peace can be achieved and that it would require the best efforts "of all of us."

Switching to Vietnam, Johnson was asked if an apparent lull there meant a change in the situation. He replied he would not say that, that "the fighting goes up and down depending on a good many factors."

As to racial violence in American cities, Johnson said that "we are trying to do everything we can" in cooperation with cities, countries, states and private employers "to minimize the tensions that exist."

But he said the government will have to rely primarily on the good judgment of the people themselves, the local authorities, to try to work out solutions to the problem.

-In his May 23 statement on the Middle East Johnson said: "To the leaders of all the nations of the Near East, I wish to say what three presidents have said before - that the United States is firmly committed to the support of the political independence and territorial integrity of all the nations of the

Senate Begins Debating Dodd's Financial Deals

John Stennis accused Sen. Thomas J. Dodd today of collecting money "under all the banners and trappings of campaign contributions" and then spending it indiscriminately for his own purposes.

Dodd listened tensely as Stennis, the Mississippi Democrat who heads the Senate Ethics Committee, opened the debate on its recommendation that Dodd be censured.

Stennis said his panel was not condemning testimonial dinners, and was not accusing Dodd of violating the law or evading income taxes

But he said Dodd's use of testimonial funds was "wrong on its face" and therefore tended to bring dishonor upon the Sen-

ate itself. Stennis said testimonial receipts were improperly used time and again by the Connecticut senator, who stands accused of using more than \$116,-000 for his own purposes.

Stennis began what amounted to the prosecution case by saying that sadness pervaded the

the Dodd case. Then he turned to the heart

of the Ethics Committee case. Dodd's personal use of political money FAIR "This was money collected under all the banners and trap-

pings of campaign contributions past or future," Stennis said. Also today, Sen. Wallace F. Bennett, R-Utah, vice chairman of the Ethics Committee, said it 'literally bent over backwards' to be fair to Dodd.

His statement came as the Senate put aside its legislative affairs to start debate on a resolution to censure Dodd for a course of conduct the panel said was "contrary to accepted morals, derogates from the public trust expected of a senator, and tends to bring the Senate into dishonor and disrepute."

TRAVEL EXPENSES The, bipartisan committee found, after a 14-month investigation, that Dodd had used political funds for his personal benefit and had double-billed for travel expenses.

Bennett, in remarks prepared to follow the opening statement March.

The committee found that of \$450,273 in campaign and testimonial funds he received. Dodd authorized payment of at least \$116,083 for presonal expenses.

PERSONAL PURPOSES "In the allocation of expenses between political and personal purposes," Bennett said, "our estimates were on the conservative side and wherever there

was a doubt, we gave the benefit to Sen. Dodd. Dodd has said that even counting the proceeds of the testimonial affairs for him as political funds; the maximum amount of personal expenses the way he figures it was \$7.746.

ADMISSIONS

However, Bennett said, "The record of the use of \$450,000 of political funds was based on Sen. Dodd's own admissions" in a stipulation entered into with the ethics committee at the time of its public hearings last

10 Ships Block Vital Waterway

The Suez Canal remained closed to shipping today, the economies of Arab nations beaten in war by Israel were tottering and the Soviet Union was seeking a special session of the U.N. General Assembly to try to force Israel from the territory it gained by conquest.

Diplomats in Cairo said the canal, a vital international waterway and a mainstay of Egypt's economy, is blocked by about 10 ships. Shipping experts estimated it would take two to six months to clear them out. IMPOSSIBLE

Egypt had said Saturday that ships sunk by Israeli planes were blocking the 104-mile passage between the Mediterranean and Asia. Diplomats and shipping sources in Cairo said it was virtually impossible for at least some of the sinkings to have resulted from air attack.

Egyptian President Gamal Abdel Nasser ordered the canal closed when the Arab-Israel war broke out June 5. Foreign newsmen have not been permitted to inspect the damage.

Egypt had hoped to obtain \$230 million in badly needed foreign exchange from canal tolls this year. For a country already deep in debt, loss of even a part of this revenue could be a strong push toward bankruptcy. Egypt owes money to every

nation it traded with before the war began. With a \$456-million foreign trade deficit, it has been forced to dip into its gold reserves to meet international obligations.

OUTLOOK BLEAK

Much of its indebtedness is with the Communist world for weapons and military equipment now lying wrecked or use less in the Sinai Desert. It also owes the United States \$170 mil-

The outlook is bleaker for Jordan. Its major source of income was from tourists to the Holy Land. With the Israelis now in possession of the Old City of Jerusalem and Bethlehem, Jordanian revenue from tourism will largely evaporate.

Syria, the third principal Arab belligerent, did not suffer so severely. But its Socialist economy was feeble before the war, and sharp cuts in oil revenues are likely to result in political unrest.

U.S. STUDY In Washington, the Johnson

administration took note of the disturbed economic outlook and embarked on a study of what it could do to ease the long and short-range problems. Presidential adviser Walt W. Rostow raised the possibility of a regional approach to long-range U.S. aid, aimed at "dignity and stability for all" in the area.

The Soviet Union, embarrassed by the Arab debacle aft-

er strong Communist arms and moral support, was reported campaigning for a special session of the U.N. General Assembly to try to force Israel to give up the territory it captured

from Egypt, Jordan and Syria.
TO ASSEMBLY? The Soviet Union has been stymied in its efforts to get the 15-nation Security Council to demand that Israeli forces withdraw from the conquered territory. The Soviets apparently believe they will find greater sympathy for the Arab cause in the Assembly, where all 122 U.N. members are represented. Assembly action, however, is unlikely to have any more effect on Israel than the Security

Israeli Premier Levi Eshkol informed the world Monday that "the situation that existed until now shall not be allowed to re-

He told his Parliament, "We alone are entitled to determine the nature of the vital interests of our country and how our interest must be secured."

REDS CAPTURED? Another possible embarrassment to the Soviet Union was a report, denied by Israel, that five Soviet officers had been captured on the Syrian front where they had been advising a Syrian artillery unit.

The initial report came from said the presence of the Russians was discovered when Israel radio monitors overheard Russian-language radio transmissions.

Later an Israeli army spokesman denied that any Russian prisoners had been taken and said he had no knowledge of any Soviet officers aiding Syrian artillery units.

The Israeli army reported that it had captured intact an Egyptian antiaircraft missile base equipped with Soviet SA2 missiles on the Sinai Peninsula on the last day of the war. ISRAELI LOSSES

The commander of Israel's southern forces, Brig. Yeshayahu Gavish, told newsmen that between 7,000 and 10,000 Egyptian soldiers were killed during the Sinai campaign, and 700 Egyptian tanks were destroyed or captured.

He said Israeli losses in the Sinai were 275 soldiers killed, 800 wounded and 61 tanks destroyed. The number of Israelis killed on all three fronts has been put at 679 men.

In the Old City of Jerusalem, mopping up operations continued. Eighty armed Arab Legionnaires surrendered Monday. Mines and snipers were reported to have caused a number of casualties in the last few days.

Israeli determination to hold on to the Jordanian half of the formerly divided city was emphasized by demolition of the protective "fire walls" between the Old City and the Israeli sec-

fied themselves as James Lee Orr. 27. Michael Lee Gorman, 24 and James Gerald Tartaglio, 29, all of Santa Ana, Calif.

In addition to the arsenal, sheriff's deputies said they found a letter bearing a La Crescenta, Calif., return address in the car.

They quoted the letter as stating: "It is the plan of the California Knights to hold a meeting soon with the members of the Minutemen and the American Nazi Party so we can prepare

for the struggles ahead. Compaints were filed charging Orr with speeding, Gorman with carrying a pistol illegally and Tartaglio with vagrancy.

Negroes Terrorizing 'Whitey'

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) - Rampaging Negroes burned and looted Tampa's sprawling slums Monday for the second night, battling with about 1,000 heavily armed police and National Guardsmen and terrorizing "Whitev."

Roving bands tossed Molotov cocktails into buildings and at passing autos, snipers harassed police cruisers and chanting mobs sang "Get Whitey! Get Whitey!" the Negro term for a white man.

SMOKING RUINS The rioting began early Monday evening and continued until after 2 a.m. But the littered streets were deserted by the time the hot, summer sun arose on windowless store fronts and more than a dozen smoking

ruins this morning. The outbreaks were numerous and widespread as opposed to Sunday's trouble which was confined mainly to the Central Village area, a huge, festering ghetto only blocks from the heart of the city LOOTING

500 National Guardsmen, 350

police and 150 armed deputies. They sealed off the main slum area but were generally unable. to keep up with the guerrillalike squads of rioters who spread to outlying slum areas, burning and pillaging as they

MINOR INJURIES In all, five Negroes were hospitalized and many other persons, mostly Negroes, were treated for various minor injuries and released.

down by snipers. A cruiser reported at 2 a.m. that it was receiving sniper fire from two Kirk, riding with Hillsborough Sheriff Malcolm Beard in a patrol car, raced from one hotspot

West opened the king of diamonds on which East followed with the ten and the five. With the appearance of dummy, West observed that only one remaining card in the suit was still outstanding-the eight. If that card was held by his partner, then the declarer would be able to ruff the next. round of the suit. If South, on

the other hand, had the eight of diamonds, West could put his partner in via the ruff in order to obtain the club return which he so much de-

The only problem confronting West-assuming that East was the player who had no more diamonds-was to induce his partner to trump the continuation. If, for example, West continued with the ace of diamonds or even the queen, East might choose to take a harmless discard, not realizing that West urgently desired to transfer the

West solved his problem by leading the nine of diamonds at trick two. East made the natural play of ruffing with the six of spades. The obvious return, of course, was a club, In shifting to that suit, East was careful to lead the jack. South covered with the queen and West ruffed with the

deuce of spades. The diamond return was trumped by the declarer; however, there was no way for him to avoid losing a club trick subsequently, and he

went down to defeat. Observe that, if East leads back a small club when he is in, declarer can duck the trick around to North's ten. West ruffs in, however, South can finesse the queen of clubs subsequently after West's trumps are drawn and thereby avoid losing a second club

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



Help To Enforcement Officers

"Mere evidence" is not merely evidence; it is evidence of a particular kind whose use in bringing criminals to justice has been denied to the police since 1921. That was the year the Supreme Court established a distinction between kinds of evidence that could or could not be seized at a suspect's home following "hot pursuit" from the scene of a crime

It is good news that the high court has now wiped out this distinction, thus giving law enforcement authorities a wider range of evidence that can be used in the courts. For one thing, this decision may help to calm fears that the court is bent on unduly restricting the police. Many found such a trend in recent rulings, notably the one curbing the use of confessions. Now it is commonly said that the pendulum has taken a marked swing in the other direction.

This is only superficially true. It is a mistake to view the matter solely in this light - as a sort of tug of war between those who want to strengthen police powers and those who seek greater protection for the

rights of the accused. All of us benefit, in the long run, by concern for procedural safeguarding of individual rights as well as by careful delinea tion of police powers and responsibili-

In any case, the effect of the new ruling is to strengthen the hand of the police in a way that does not encroach on the rights of the accused. Until now, the police in hot pursuit from the crime scene to a suspect's home could seize as evidence only objects in certain categories — the spoils of the crime (stolen goods, for example), weapons or other instruments used in commission of the crime, or various items of contraband such as counterfeit money. Henceforth, the police may also seize articles known as 'mere evidence" - items such as clothing, for instance, that might link the suspect to the crime. As Associate Justice Brennan said, a search for such items disturbs privacy no more than a search for hitherto permissible evidence. The ruling is a step toward more certain apprehension of crim-

Shortage Of Trained People

Governing a society simultaneously marked by an expanding economy, social progress and a scientific-technological revolution requires a big increase in highly skilled public-employe manpower. The scope of this challenge to the nation's educational system, and of its competition with private enterprise for competent personnel, may not yet be generally grasped.

A recent report from the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics should help put the prospect in perspective. It has warned federal agencies that they had better begin improving their recruiting procedures now to meet this fore-

By 1975 there will be an 11 per cent increase in federal governmental employment to more than three million, but the increase in professional, administrative and technical positions will be 30 per cent to 985,000. And about 900,000 of those specialists will have to be recruited in the next eight years, 225,000 for new jobs and 675,000 replacements to cover the turnover in the present 760,000 such jobs.

The demand for public employe with higher skills and advanced or specialized education will also go up similarly, if perhaps not so sharply in state and local governments. And contrary to the impression many may have, there are three times more public employes at the state and local level than in the federal government.

The outlook then is for severe shortages of, and costly competition .for, specialized quality personnel. And that is why it is in the interest of government and private enterprise alike to invest heavily now to expand and improve vocational, professional and higher education. The big outlays now being made for that in Texas are coming none too soon and are if anything not large enough.

The Israeli answer to the Arab demand is that since Jews have been forced out of the Arab countries, where in many instances they lived for generations, the ever - increasing burden on Israel makes it impossible to take back the refugees. The U.N. has been forced to try under the most painful circumstances to carry the burden. It has been a thankless task, with a succession of administrators of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees taking abuse from every side and forced to pass the cup among the solvent nations of the West just to keep the evergrowing population of the camps alive.

IN FACT, of course, it has been the United States that has picked up most of this bill as part of the cost of maintaining an unstable balance in the area. Through 1966 this country has contributed nearly \$390,000,000 to keep the refugee camps going. The contribution to the U.N. agency for refugees in the Near East last year

Obviously, this dole system cannot go on. Half the refugees are children under 18. And despite the best efforts of the U.N. education and technical training are minimal.

WHAT IS CALLED for, in the view of observers who know the problem well, is an over-all resettlement and relocation project taking in the whole Mideast. That can be done only with big-power support and with the full cooperation of all countries involved. But short of this the open wound will not be closed.

An evening never failed to go by that one Arab embassy or another didn't have a sumptuous dinner or cocktail party, and since the same people were always in attendance, many of them have been cut off from their only decont meal of the day.

ONE SOCIETY reporter in Washington, who never missed an Arab party, was found wandering in the streets, dazed and starving because she didn't have any place to go. The Red Cross has promised to take care of her until diplomatic relations with the Arab countries are resumed.

MANY PEOPLE are blaming the Israeli embassy for the dinner crisis in Washington. "The Israelis knew when they attacked Sinai that the Arab embassies wouldn't be able to serve dinners very long. They were obviously helped by British and American waiters."

The United States, of course, is remaining mum during the dinnershortage crisis. A spokesman for the State Department said, "All we want is peace on embassy row. We will remain neutral in word, deed and thought." Later the White House said it wasn't exactly neutral and that although it would not get involved directly it was still pledged to help anyone who ran out of plates.

PRESSURE IS being brought to bear on the Israeli embassy to fill the vacuum left by the departure of the Arab ambassadors and their wives. But an Israeli spokesman said, "We are a small embassy and even if we wanted to take over the task of feeding all the people in Washington who were formerly fed by the Arabs, we wouldn't have enough tablecloths." This throws the problem into the

United Nations. One diplomatic observer said, "The United Nations cannot stand idly by and see so many people left hungry and thirsty and without good dance -music. If we can't save the social scene in Washington, who can?"
