Corn Harvest Begins; Prices Are Depressed

WE'RE SURE GLAD that the old time "good neighbor" policy still prevails in this section of the country. Otherwise, you might not be reading your Friona Star—at least not at the time you expected it.

Wednesday afternoon, one of our computerized typesetters quit computing, quit setting type and finally just quit completely.

The serviceman for the machine, although based in Lubbock, has about half of Texas for his territory, plus a part of Oklahoma, a corner of Colorado and New Mexico.

Most times he can make it up on a given day, but this was one of those times he could not.

Hearing about our plight, the good folks at Dimmitt's Castro County News offered the use of their machine, and office space for our ad-maker, in order that we could meet our deadline.

Fortunately for us, Dimmitt uses the same CompuGraphic machine as we do at the Star. All we had to do was take a couple of type "fonts" along with us, so as to keep our style consistent.

Most of the major advertisements in this week's edition of the Star, as well as all of our headlines, were set and made up at Dimmitt on Thursday, and barring a press breakdown or other calamity, you should be reading your Star on schedule.

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THE FALL SEASON is upon us, and traditionally it is one of the finest periods of the year in this area, from a weather standpoint.

Finished with the scorching heat of summer, we can now look forward to cool nights and mornings, but still for a time enjoy warm weather in the afternoon.

Whereas the springtime is the favorite season in some sections of the country, this area's spring most often is ruined by a more than occasional wind and-or dust storm.

But in the fall we are spared the dusts, and most years at least, we can look forward to a number of days of mild weather, excellent for outdoor activity, a boon to our area's most popular occupation, especially since the farmers face one of the most important aspects of their crop year—the harvest time.

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WE WENT DOWN to check out the Texas Tech Red Raiders this past Saturday, and just like we had been hearing, the Raiders are "rougher than a stucco bathtub," to borrow a line from Dirk West.

Tech's quarterback, Rodney Allison, is a real magician with the football. It's worth the trip to Lubbock just to see him operate.

The Raiders face their first big hurdle on Saturday, when they host the Texas Aggies. This game has become a pivotal contest as far as the Southwest Conference is concerned. This year is no different, plus the fact that both teams are ranked in the top ten teams nationwide.

One poll has the Aggies rated fifth and Tech sixth. Another has them sixth and seventh.

Everything points to another of those storybook finishes that this series has produced. Some of the wildest games we have ever been privileged to see, and others we have followed by radio, have been between the Raiders and Aggies.

It's a shame the two teams had to meet so early in the season. The Southwest Conference had the distinction of having three of its teams in the national top ten this week. Naturally, the loser of the Tech-A&M contest will have to fall from their lofty ranking.

Whether it's Tech, or whether it turns out to be the Aggies, they would undoubtedly have gone a spell longer without a loss, except for this early-season showdown.

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The college graduate returned home from his 35th class reunion in a very chastened mood.

"My classmates," he informed his wife, "have all gotten so fat and bald they didn't even recognize me."

Several hundred area farmers fired up their combines last week and pulled into their corn fields, a time they had waited for all year. But many are worried about how they will stand after the harvest.

Corn yields are low—down to 2,000 to 3,000 pounds per acre, and with low prices, and cost of production so high, the reason for concern is apparent.

Other problems are plowing into the farmers' life styles. Some planted early maturing corn which produced an ear only half the size of regular corn ears. The corn crops required so much water that some farmers say they won't be able to pay even the cost of irrigating.

Others say their corn is falling faster than they can cut it.

"We have about 600 acres of corn," Jim Taylor, cutting corn on the Ross Miller farm north of Friona, said. "We started Monday and it doesn't look good. It is falling every day." By Wednesday, Taylor and Miller had covered 70 acres. They also have cotton, soybeans and sugarbeet crops to fall back on.

"Farmers will be in trouble if the price and yields don't come up," Ron Smiley of Friona Wheat Growers Elevator said. "The yields are not running too good but the moisture is coming down pretty good."

Smiley received his first load on August 27 but didn't start getting a lot of corn until Monday. He is not

optimistic, but sober about the Parmer County agriculture situation.

Farmers realize that looking back doesn't do much good, but knowing that a farmer in the Bovina area produced 13,715 pounds per acre last year gives them a little hope.

Highway Project Accepted

Rhea Bradley, Littlefield, resident engineer for the Department of Highways and Transportation, reports that the construction project on State Highway 214 has been officially completed, and has been accepted by the state.

The project, which included reconstructing the highway for a period of nine miles between the Hub intersection south to Clay's Corner, also included rebuilding the bridge at Running Water Draw and reshaping the approach at this site.

The contract as completed on September 9 was for a total cost of approximately \$1.5 million. The job was begun on November 18, 1976.

The completion of the "middle portion" of the road now gives motorists a new and modern road from Friona south to the Bailey County line and on into Muleshoe. It is the first time in a number of years that those who use Highway 214 have a first-quality highway.

"We were shooting to get it completed ahead of the harvest season, and we just made it," Bradley commented. "I can't think of a road in our entire district that was more in need of improvements," he continued.

The entire project, which began with a bridge-overpass at the northern end of the road leading into the city of Friona, cost approximately \$5.5 million. The first portion of the project was begun on June 24, 1974, and was completed on the same date two years later.

Bradley indicated that the project would probably cost twice what it did if it were just beginning, and with requirements having changed, would be hard to get approved.

Two Arrested On Marijuana Charge

Two Parmer County residents were arraigned last week on charges of possession of marijuana over four ounces, after county and state lawmen found about 250 pounds of the illegal weed on a farm seven miles northwest of Bovina.

Houston Bartlett, 41, was arraigned on a \$5,000 bond and Barty Bartlett, 20, was held in lieu of \$7,500 bond. Both men are from the Bovina area.

Although Bovina City Marshall Gary Gillespie suspected the men of having the marijuana, the real break didn't come until Texico City Marshall Mickey Fenn received a tip on Wednesday, September 14, that the weed was being grown locally. Fenn and state officers searched in New Mexico, and later learned the location was in Texas.

Parmer County Sheriff Charlie

Lovelace was notified of the case and the next day, Thursday, county lawmen and a state drug officer from Amarillo went to the Bartlett farm with a search warrant and warrant for the arrest of the younger Bartlett.

"We found two lids of marijuana in the house," Lovelace said. "We found some more marijuana in the attic of the garage where it was being cured out. Across the road from where Barty lives we found two rows of marijuana about three-quarters of a mile long growing with corn. They must have been out there plenty because there was a well beaten path out into the field."

Lovelace said some of the weed had already been harvested and piled up. Some of it was ruined because it had been rained on, he said.

Barty told officers that his father knew all about the operation, and when Houston Bartlett went to Farwell to "bail his son out" charges were also filed against him. Houston insisted that hired hands were responsible for the dope. "It was in all shapes," Lovelace said. "There were plants, stalks, stacks, and some of it was processed."

Both men have been bound over for grand jury action, scheduled to meet in December. Both men have made bond.

Donita Martin Is Contest Winner

Stolen Items Recovered

Thousands of dollars of radio equipment missing in the county recently was recovered last week with the arrest of two 17-year-old Muleshoe men.

Bruce Duncan and Paul Davis, both Bailey County residents, admitted taking the equipment, ranging from CBs, stereos, tape decks, players and CB base sets.

The merchandise recovered included a \$600 radio taken from the Longhorn Spraying Service at Clay's Corner, and \$1500 of equipment taken from the C.W. Dale farm at Lazbuddie.

"We've been missing radios out of tractors, combines and cars," Sheriff Charlie Lovelace said. "We had suspected the two boys for some time, and now believe we have recovered most of the stolen equipment."

The two are in custody awaiting further action, and will be bound over for the grand jury which meets in December.

45 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 30, 1932
T.J. Crawford has been designated by Wilbur C. Hawk, president of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce, to serve as Governor R.S. Sterling's representative in the preparation and submission of Parmer County's application for funds out of the \$300,000,000 provided by the Federal Emergency Relief and Construction Act of 1932.

The district school tax assessor-collector has been instructed by the board of trustees that another cut of ten per cent in the valuation of property within the district has been made, which will make quite an appreciable reduction in the current taxes.

35 YEARS AGO—OCTOBER 2, 1942
Full mobilization of manpower on the small farms of Parmer County for increased food production is needed to win the war, Earl L. Fine, rural rehabilitation supervisor for the Farm Security Administration, believes. "Unless our small farm operators can produce greater quantities of food," said Mr. Fine, "our country will be compelled to ration almost all foods and there is no assurance that we can maintain nutrition needs of our civilians."

Looking ahead to agricultural wartime production for 1943, the Texas USDA War Board already is conducting a survey on transportation facilities for farm labor.

Exes Band Planned

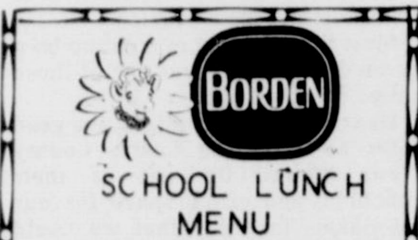
Friona band exes will have an exes band again this year for Homecoming, and will perform at halftime of the homecoming game against Hart on September 30.

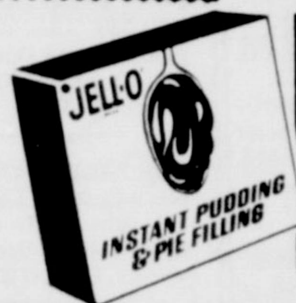

Loans Available Through FmHA

A more liberal formula for determining the amount of grant funds, supplementing loans available for improvement of rural community water systems affected by drought, has been put into effect in Texas by the Farmers Home Administration (FmHA), the agency's State Director, W.H. Pieratt, announced recently.

Parmer County has been made eligible for FmHA emergency loans and grants under President Carter's drought assistance program to help

communities having diminished water supplies, resulting from drought conditions, in designated drought areas. Applications for projects approved must be made in time for funds to be obligated by Sept. 30.

Pieratt said the revised regulations will enable FmHA to apply a formula on grants similar to that used by other federal agencies that help to finance drought emergency water system projects.

In calculating a community's

ability to repay an emergency loan for water system improvement, FmHA previously has taken into account existing indebtedness only for water facilities. The new formula lets FmHA take into account the applicant's existing indebtedness for all purposes. This is expected to increase the grant portion of FmHA funding of many projects.

The new regulation also provides that some projects, previously not eligible for grant assistance, may receive FmHA grants of up to 20 per cent of total eligible project development costs, if they are needed to safeguard public health and safety. A larger proportion of grant funds, up to 50 per cent, may be provided if justified through the formula for determining the community's ability to repay a loan.

Application of the revised formula has been made retroactive to May 6, 1977, except where loan and grant funds have been delivered to the borrower. Financing of projects previously approved but not yet funded will be adjusted to the new formula, Pieratt said.

In addition to the Sept. 30 deadline for obligation of funds, the drought emergency program imposes an April 30, 1978 deadline for completion of projects. Communities of up to 10,000 population may be included in the service areas of water systems receiving FmHA loans and grants. Loans are made for terms of up to 40 years, at an interest rate of 5 per cent.

Pieratt said information on project assistance can be obtained from FmHA's Parmer County office at 208 Avenue D., Farwell, Texas.

U.S.O. Assists Men In Country's Service

(Editor's note: Following is another in a series of articles describing the agencies which benefit from Friona's United Way campaign, which will be held here next month.)

The United Service Organization is known as U.S.O. Its purpose is to provide a place for military personnel to find a home-like atmosphere.

U.S.O. chapters are located in towns near military bases and have been in existence since World War II. Operating primarily with volunteer workers, it provides social functions for people in the armed services to meet and enjoy fellowship and recreation with civilians and other military personnel.

A member of the armed forces can go to a U.S.O. for just a Coke or cup of coffee and cookies. They can



find a quiet place to read, write a letter, or find someone to visit with if they like.

People in the U.S.O. can be helpful to military people in times of emergencies, helping with arranging leaves, phone calls and securing travel reservations if necessary.

Most all who have served in any branch of the armed forces has sometime or other been to one or more U.S.O. centers.

More than likely these people will tell you the U.S.O. centers serve a good need and are deserving of the \$125.00 amount set in Friona's United Way campaign budget this fall.

Although the U.S.O. contribution leaves Friona, any serviceman from Friona will receive benefits from the United Fund donations, it was pointed out.

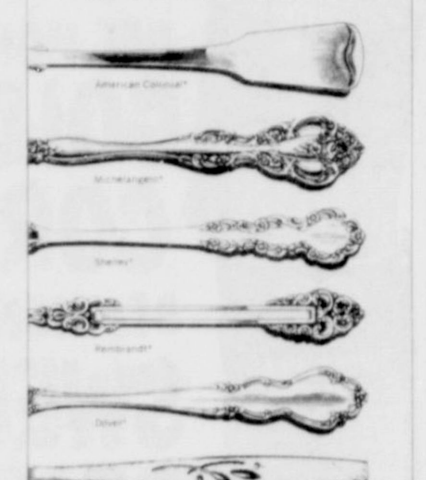
