# **Heat Wave** Hits 102

Monday will go down in the record books as the hottest day of the current year thus far. The temperature reached 102 degrees at the U.S. Experiment Station.

Thermometers downtown showed 103 and one was reported to have climbed to 106.

Hottest Night, Too

Very likely Monday night will be charged as the hottest night of the year, too. It never cooled down below 78 the entire period and even a rumbling, lightning punctuated thunderstorm, which moved in after midnight, failed to break the heat Only a few sprinkles of rain fell from the menac-

Tuesday dawned with overcast skies and sultry temperatures. A few drops of rain fell about 9 a.m.

#### Highway Work Planned

Contract for a million dollars worth of highway repairs on IS 20, from two miles west of Big Spring to the Martin County line, is slated for consideration by the State Highway Department in September.

The commissioners Tuesday approved the project which calls for four inches of additional hot mix surfacing on the road and reconstruction of shoul-

#### **Under Consideration**

Joe Smoot, resident engineer for the Texas Highway Department, said that the job had been under consideration for sometime. Actually 10.3 miles of the Interstate highway is involved in the project. The department, Smoot said, will arrange the

work in such a manner as to keep the highway open while the improvements are under way. The project will not necessitate closing one lane and transfering all traffic to the other at any time,

Another segment of IS 20 to be given the same treatment is 9.3 miles beginning at the Howard County line and extending eastward to Westbrook. The cost of this project is estimated at \$895,000. Presumably the contract for this job will be sought at the same time the Howard County project is up

#### Gunmen Grab Gold Bars

NEW YORK (AP)-Two gunmen forced their way into the KLM Royal Dutch Airlines cargo office at John F. Kennedy International Airport early today, and firing a shot into the ceiling, stole two gold bars valued at \$23,376.30, police said.

The theft was the second to hit KLM this year. In April, a 40-pound gold bar worth \$40,000 vanished after it was said to have been placed on board a flight from Kennedy to the West Indies island of Aruba

NEW YORK (AP)- The demand for arms, particularly handguns, has increased in some of the cities struck by violence this summer. A few dealers say they've temporarily

halted further sales. In an Associated Press survey, many of the dealers said their new customers were predominantly white. In the words of one store owner: "I think they're the type who get them for home protection.

Two nationwide retail firms-Sears Roebuck and Co. and Montgomery Ward & Co.-said they had halted over-the-counter arms sales in a number of cities where violence is occurring.

NO GUNS?

Many sporting goods stores in New York City reported what one owner described as "a great increase" in the number of rifles and rounds of ammunition sold since the Newark, N.J.,

"We are not in the hunting business at present," said a spokesman for one firm. "We have stopped selling rifles entirely and we won't open again until September. There are no guns in the windows. We don't want to contribute to the mess." Abercrombie & Fitch Co., the nationwide chain of high-priced sporting goods stores, said

# Police, Rain Rout Negroes

White House. A police charge and a heavy rainfall broke up the groups who had surged north and northwest of White House, Capitol and other landmarks, breaking windows and in at least one

case looting a liquor store. A brick heaved through the windshield of a car seven blocks from the White House caused minor injuries to a fireman There were reports of gunfire, but police later attributed the blasts to firecrackers exploding in garbage cans.

CURFEW CANCELLED

In Detroit, the government continued a phased withdrawal of paratroopers. Four battaliens of the 101st Airborne Division were being flown from Selfridge Air Force Base, 30 miles from the city, to, their home station in Ft. Campbell, Ky., and three battalions of the 82nd Airborne Division were being moved from the city to the air base.

Gov. George Romney called off the curfew in effect since July 23, and lifted restrictions on the sale of liquor and gasoline, The restrictions on public semblies also were removed, although a state of emergency re-

#### Guardsmen For Riot Control

President Johnson's call for new training of National Guard units in riot control is a most constructive proposal.

The National Guard has traditionally been trained in conventional warfare. Few of its members have had any real training in the techniques of riot control, a highly specialized art demanding the exercise of coolness and judgment backed up, as circumstances dictate, with the cold steel of bayonets or firearms.

The performance of National Guardsmen in Newark and Detroit gave eloquent testimony to their lack of training in riots. There was too much indiscriminate firing of rifles and automatic weapons. No adequate response nor procedures for the elimination of snipers had been developed.

Brute force and landscape shooting was the only response.

The Army does have special forces highly trained in the art of preventing, containing or suppressing civil disturbances. Members of those units could be used to act as teachers to the National Guard units in all states.

Those within the Guard chosen for riot-control study should be screened carefully. Stable temperaments, initiative and resourcefulness are the key factors that should be used in choosing men for this work.

Training National Guard units in riot control would remove the necessity for the dispatch of regular Army units to put down disorders, as was found necessary in Detroit. The regular Army has enough duties of its own to perform. A prompt training program in this field for National Guardsmen is clearly needed.

### Remember, Red Is WRONG

Red means WRONG.

That is, red means wrong on Texas freeways. The Texas Highway Department has installed red reflectors on many Interstate and other controlled access highways to warn drivers that they are going the wrong way.

A broken red line of reflectors indicates to the driver that he is traveling the wrong way on the freeway. A red arrow pointing at the driver from the pavement as he begins to enter a freeway ramp indicates that he is entering the wrong way.

These reflectors, in extensive use

for about a year, are made of acrylic plastic-red on one side and white on the other. A driver going in the right direction sees the white side. A wrongway driver sees the red. So red means wrong way."

Thousands of these markers have been installed on such high-volume traffic highways as Interstate Highway 10 through Houston and Interstate Highway 35 through Austin, as well as on many others in the state.

Installation of the markers is the Highway Department's second major nnovation within the year to minim-

Earlier the department began supplementing its "Do Not Enter" signs along freeways with "Do Not Enter Ramp" signs and "One Way" signs. The reflective pavement markers are an effort to cut wrong-way acci-

dents even more. The lane lines in most cases are limited to metropolitan areas where there are high volumes of traffic. The reflective markers are placed at 40-foot intervals with 15-foot lines of white non-reflective button markers centered in between.

#### How To Make A Leader

WASHINGTON - Negro "leaders" aren't born these days, but made and in, most instances by the news media.

Take the case of Robert Runneymeade as an example. Robert Runneymeade has been standing on the corner of Spring and Maple for the past three years (except when he's been in jail) saying to three or four hangers-on, "We ought to shake someone up." Nobody ever paid much attention to Robert Runneymeade until a few months ago when a reporter for a local newspaper, doing a story on violence in the ghettos, happened to overhear Runneymeade say to his friends: "Man, we ought to burn down

THE NEXT DAY a story appeared in the paper that "Robert Runneymovement, told a militant crowd at Spring and Maple that it was time to burn down the town."

A television crew was dispatched the next evening to Spring and Maple where his pals were congratulating Runneymeade on making the front pages of the newspaper. The TV commentator stuck a microphone in front of Robert Runneymeade's face, lights were turned on and for the next 20 minutes, Runneymeade said, "The mayor, the city council, the 'honkies' and President Johnson have to talk

THE OPPOSITION television station sent out its camera crews to get the views of Runneymeade, and with all the lights and trucks a large crowd gathered, as they will when they see TV cameras.

The news media claimed that the crowd who had gathered were all Runneymeade's followers, when in fact most of them had never heard

of Runneymeade, and those who knew him thought he was a joke. But the press was not too interested

as to how many followers Runneymeade really had. He was now talking about burning down the Yosemite National Park and this certainly had news value

IN THE MEANTIME the networks had plugged into Runneymeade and he started holding press conferences telling everyone, "I'm not going to take any stuff from anyone, and if I have to wipe out the U.S. Marine Corps I'm going to do it."

The Negro people still considered Runneymeade a joke, but the white people were scared out of their wits by his television appearances and his statements in the press. Things got so bad that when the President of the United States went on television to talk about the riots his statements was played on the bottom of the page, and a statement made by Runneymeade threatening to use tanks against the public library was given a six column headline.

UNFORTUNATELY, the publicity had gone to Runneymeade's head, and one day he announced he was banning all white newspapermen from his press conferences.

Since they couldn't cover him any more, the news media sought out another "Negro leader" on the corner of Marble and Sycamore streets. His name was Huggins Haplap and he was overheard by a reporter the other day saying to a girl he was trying to impress, "I'm going to burn down the Grand Coulee Dam." It shouldn't be long before Haplap becomes a feared American household

## The Northern Migration Of Negroes

WASHINGTON - Against the lurid backdrop of Detroit, the political figures struggling to end the Negro uprising across the nation have a dwarfed and shrunken look. The search for blame seems irrelevant, since no one has come forward with a remedy for the most radical mass violence in more than a century.

What happened in Michigan may be another and more serious blow to Gov. George Romney's presidential candidacy. He had no knowledge that anything as catastrophic as the De-troit explosion was imminent.

DISCUSSING THE Negro violence in the cities-Newark had just slacked off-Romney made no secret of his belief that the Johnson administration made two big mistakes. One was to overpromise, leading to the illusion that there could be a quick solution to a situation that grew through years of neglect. The governor noted that revo-lutions have historically begun when rising expectations are frustrated.

THE SECOND ERROR was in asruming that the job could be done through programs imposed by the federal government. This is a favorite Romney theme-that Washington has the answers and can do the job with a federal bureaucracy. He talked about the state's endeavors, the Human Resources Council and other means for breaking down barriers to jobs and housing, as alternatives to the massive federal approach. In the light of what has happened, this was obvious-ly far too little as well as disas-

IN ALL THE casting about for causes of the uprising, almost no one has pointed to a root reason generally nored. For two decades or more the Negroes of the Deep South have swarmed to the cities of the North, most of them poor, uneducated, semi-literate. They had become "surplus" as cotton and other crops were mech-

Hoping to better their lot-anything was better than squalor of near-star-

vation on the slim handouts of reliefthey quickly found themselves trapped in the slums of the North. Under the most favorable circumstances, they were ill-equipped for city life. Now, their children have grown up in ratinfested tenements, a prey to every kind of corruption. HERE WAS the fuel for the fires

ple are among the looters and arsonists seizing pieces of the affluence they see all around them. Neither the Kennedy nor the Johnson administrations took any serious cog-

1,597,000 Negroes. Of this total, 632,000 went to the North Central states, mostly to Chicago and the surrounding industrial area; 489,000 to the Northeast, mostly in the New York area; and the balance to the West and elsewhere.

BETWEEN 1958 AND 1960, 1.457,-000 Negroes went from the South to the North, 541,000 to the Northeast, 558,000 to the North Central states.

The figures for the cities are even more startling for the decade between 1950 and 1960. Newark got 54,000 Negroes from the South, Detroit 85,000, Philadelphia 69,000, Buffalo 23,000, New York City 222,000, Los Angeles 215,000, Washington 59,000, Chicago 176,000, San Francisco 64,000.

HERE IS A POINT of great political vulnerability for the Johnson administration. Whether the Republicans with their "Southern strategy" will take advantage of it is question able.
