Friona Youth Cops 1978 Barrow Title

Joe Reeve, 13-year-old 4-H Club member from Friona, became the first Friona youngster in 18 years to claim the Grand Champion title in the barrow division of the Parmer

County Jr. Livestock Show last weekend.

It was also the first major championship in the show for a Friona youngster in 12 years.

Reeve captured honors with his 242-pound Duroc entry, which had earlier been named champion of its breed, in one of the most competitive breed divisions, and then nailed down the overall title, from a record entry total of 232 barrows.

"That's the best red hog I've seen in a long time," said Dr. Jerry Stockton of Texas Tech University in tapping Reeve's Duroc for champion of the show.

It was the second year in a row for a Duroc to win championship honors in the barrow show and was the seventh time in the 31-year history of the show for a Duroc to claim the title, tying it with Hampshires for the most titles for a breed.

Joan Carson of Bovina won grand champion honors in the steer show, only the second steer title ever for a Bovina exhibitor, both by Miss Carson, who had won her first title two years earlier.

The winning steer was an

1191-pound Charolais cross that had been winner of the show's jumbo class.

Bovina also claimed grand champion honors in the sheep show, making it the first time exhibitors from that community had claimed two of the show's three championship trophies.

Tim Garner had the prize sheep, a 109-pound medium wool entry that had been named breed champion from among some 80 entries in that division, which required six classifications.

Other class winners from Friona included Gary Wright, with a lightweight Chester White winner in the barrow show; Mitch Massey, lightweight Duroc; and Doug Massey, lightweight cross bred barrow.

In the sheep division, class winners included Milton Dixon, lightweight fine wool; Phillip Veazey, lightweight fine wool cross; Diana Gustin, lightweight medium wool.

Glen Schueler had the first place lightweight steer, and Ricky Taylor of Friona had the first place mediumweight steer.

Brent Green of Farwell, who won the 1977 barrow show with a Duroc to snap a 16-year winning streak for Lazbuddie showmen in the barrow division, entered the reserve champion barrow this year, a 228-pound animal which was judged champion of the cross breeds.

Mike Windham of Lazbuddie had the reserve champion sheep, from the medium wool division. Keith Hicks of Lazbuddie won reserve champion honors in the steer show with an 1121-pound Angus that had placed second to Miss Carson's entry in the show's jumbo division.

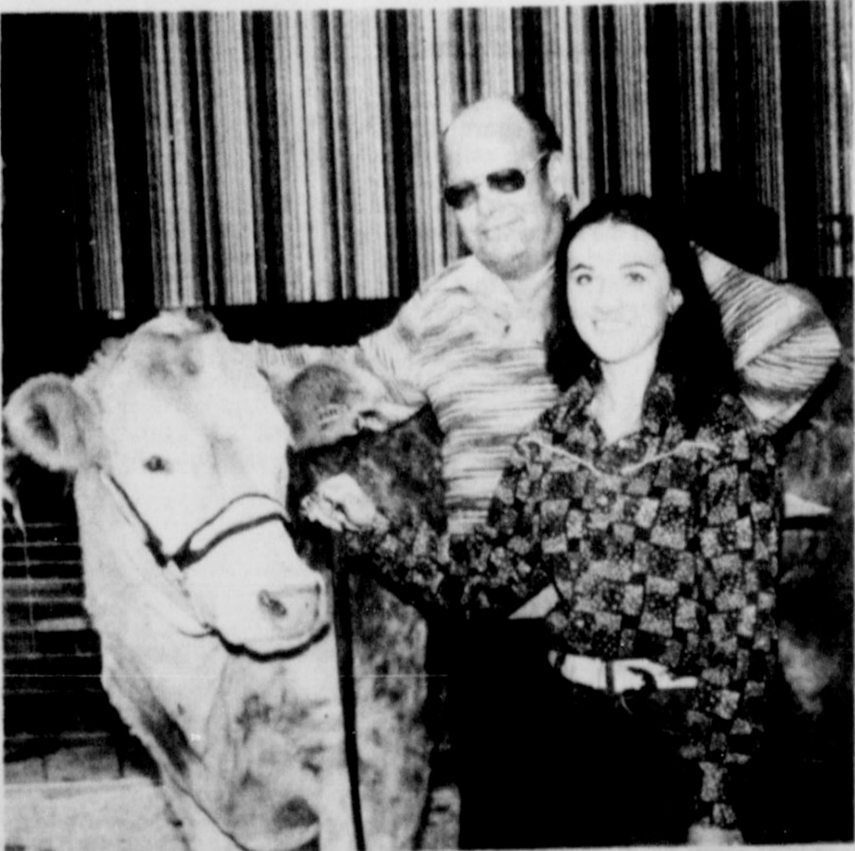
Reeve's win in the barrow division was the first grand championship of any kind for Friona, which serves as host for the annual show, since 1966, when Gary Phipps won the steer title. It was the sixth barrow title for Friona, which also has 14 steer titles to its credit.

Friona exhibitors had won barrow titles the first four years of the show's history, 1948 through 1951. They next won the championship in 1960, but then had been blanked for the past 17 years, 16 of which were won by Lazbuddie showmen.

Bidders paid better than average prices in most instances for the prize animals at Saturday's auction sale.

The champion barrow was purchased by Cattle Town Feed Yard on a bid of \$3.40 per pound. The champion steer went for \$1.10 per pound to Big Country Ford of Clovis. Agri-Sprayers of Bovina paid an

Country Club Sets Membership Drive

Friona Country Club will kick off a special membership drive on March 1, with a goal of securing 60 additional members, it was announced this week.

Members of the organization's board of directors, plus all active members plan to canvass the community and seek new members.

"By adding 60 new members we plan to be able to add tennis courts for our membership, plus a winter recreation, to be determined by the membership. This is in addition to golf and swimming, which is already available," said a spokesman for the board of directors.

Those new members joining during March can do so for a \$50 initiation fee, and their dues will not start until April. All new members must be approved by the board following the membership drive.

"We have set ourselves a goal. If we reach it, I believe we will have a

country club of which we can all be proud, one which will offer a variety of activities to all of our members," the spokesman concluded.

Little League Meeting Slated

All persons interested in Little League baseball are urged to attend a meeting Tuesday, February 28 at 7 p.m. at the Community Room of Friona State Bank.

"It is time to begin planning for the 1978 season," said a spokesman for the program.

"There were some 200 youngsters involved in the program during the summer of 1977 in Friona, and they appreciate the efforts of the people of the community in providing such a program," the information source said.

Showmen To Receive \$66,343 For Stock

Young showmen from Parmer County will receive a total of \$66,343.42 for their efforts at the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show, a tabulation this week by show officials revealed.

The total includes \$44,329.91 paid in premiums by the bidders at the auction sale, and \$22,013.51 paid by the buyers of the animals at "floor prices."

Although the total sale amount was somewhat less than that for the 1977 show, which came to over

\$74,000, it was considered good, since there were less steers in the sale this year.

The animals brought an average of \$451 each figuring straight across the board—sheep, barrows and steers all lumped together.

"We appreciate the cooperation of the merchants and individuals in the area who once again came through, in order that the youngsters might realize a profit on their projects," said a spokesman for the junior livestock show.

REA OFFICIAL

David Hamil Tabbed As Meeting Speaker

David A. Hamil, Administrator of the Rural Electrification Administration, will make a public address at the 40th Annual Membership Meeting of Deaf Smith Rural Electric Cooperative.

Administrator Hamil has served under the Eisenhower, Nixon, Ford and Carter administrations, and is responsible for loans of over 26 billion dollars in forty-six states. In a recent visit, Mr. Hamil commended cooperatives on the high plains for an efficient job. "Texas has more loans and more miles of line than any other state," he pointed out.

James Hull, manager of Deaf Smith REC, said he believes the retention of Hamil "indicates the fine job he has performed as REA administrator."

This year, Capital Credit checks totaling about \$400,000.00 will be paid back to members of Deaf Smith REC who purchased electricity during 1965 and 1966.

The Annual Meeting, scheduled for Saturday, March 4, will be full of eating, fun and business and will commence at 5 p.m., at the Bull Barn in Hereford. Starting at 5 p.m., there will be a barbecue dinner, served by the Catholic Daughter Society of Nazareth. Following the

meal, the business meeting will convene.

Stoan Osborn, President of the Board, will call the meeting to order. Noel Gollehon, secretary-treasurer will report on the number of members present, read the minutes of the meeting and present the minutes of the last Annual Meeting for approval.

The Nominating Committee which met January 5, will submit the following names for election: Deaf Smith County, Eldred Brown and Raymond Cassels; Castro County, Dwayne Annen and Floyd Schulte.

Also highlighting the evening will be drawings for door prizes, totaling over \$700.00, including a microwave oven. All members attending will be awarded attendance prizes.

Candidates Lacking As Cutoff Nears

At press time this week, only four candidates had announced for five positions which are expiring on two local boards.

Wesley Barnett declared that he would be a candidate for re-election on the Friona school board. Ron Smiley had earlier indicated he would seek re-election, so both incumbents will have their names on the school ballot. Also on the school ballot, will be Beverly Mars.

However, in the city council race, where a mayor and two councilmen will be elected, only one candidate has announced.

Acting Mayor B.K. Buske has filed for a spot on the ballot for the mayor's position.

However, as of press time, no one had filed for the council spots. March 1 is the deadline for filing in either of the races.

Friona Flashbacks

..... from the files of The Friona Star

50 YEARS AGO—FEB. 17, 1928

An entire train of Holt tractors passed through Friona Monday morning, heading east, supposedly for distribution in the Panhandle country. This was a sight rather unusual in a way, since most all shipments of any kind of farm machinery passing through Friona are headed west. But the Holt factory being in Oakland, Calif., this train was being shipped toward eastern farms.

40 YEARS AGO—FEB. 18, 1938

O.G. Turner of this locality has just completed his invention of a pump and windmill, which will be, perhaps, the most successful invention of its kind yet devised. The people of the Congregational Church here are expecting the arrival of their new pastor, Rev. Carl C. Dollar, during this week. Rev. Dollar is expected to preach his first sermon locally on Sunday.

35 YEARS AGO—FEB. 12, 1943

Approximately 300 people attended a memorial service in the Methodist Church here in honor of Private Arthur Thomas Parker, U.S. Marines, who was reported killed in action somewhere in the Pacific area Feb. 4, according to a telegram to his father, Willis Parker of Friona. So far as is known, he was the first Parmer County serviceman

to give his life in defense of his country during World War II.

30 YEARS AGO—FEB. 13, 1948

The Lions athletic club tied for first place honors in the Dimmitt Invitational Tournament in which eight teams were entered. Those who played for the Friona team were Ben Allen, Joe Brummett, John Renner, Junior Renner, James White, Rex Dennison, DeWayne Cleveland, Leslie Ford and Douglas Gosner.

25 YEARS AGO—FEB. 21, 1953

Friona faculty members held a social Wednesday night with hostesses being Mrs. Wayne Stark, Mrs. John Benger and Miss Evelyn Carey.

20 YEARS AGO—FEB. 13, 1958

Floyd Crume, work unit conservationist with the Friona office of the Soil Conservation Service, has announced his resignation to enter private business, effective February 23. The soil conservationist will become a sales engineer for Tellyer Pipe Company of Friona. Six men were nominated to fill three upcoming vacancies on the

Board of Directors of the Friona Chamber of Commerce. Names of the six nominees, Billy Nichols, Robert Ginsburg, Kenneth Williams, Gaylord Maurer, Joe Ferrell and Hollis Horton, were placed on ballots which were mailed out earlier this week.

15 YEARS AGO—FEB. 14, 1963

Some three inches of snow fell Sunday, Monday and Tuesday of this week, bringing some relief to the dry conditions locally. The Friona area had received officially only .02 inch of moisture since last December 1, prior to the snow of this week, which added .20 inch of moisture. Some of the snow drifted considerably, however.

10 YEARS AGO—FEB. 8, 1968

After a packed city council meeting room expressed interest in additional safety factors for the school crossing at highways around the school system, the Friona City Council voted Monday to employ two crossing attendants. Voter registration topped the all-time record in Parmer County by over 1,000, it was revealed this week by Parmer County Tax Assessor-Collector Hugh Moseley. The county will have a total of 3,873 qualified voters in 1968 elections.

5 YEARS AGO—FEB. 15, 1973

Two excellent girls basketball teams will square off at 11:30 a.m. Saturday in Lubbock Coliseum in the Region I tournament. Friona (23-6), and Spearman (30-3) will be the opponents. The two teams met in the finals of Friona's invitational tournament last December 2, with Spearman making off with a one-point win, 36-35.

Noted Musician To Bring Group Here

"Mr. Gospel Music" will appear here Friday, March 3 for a free two-hour concert in the Junior High School Auditorium. Appearing with Wally will be the Jack Fowler Family and Band from Florida.

A free will offering will be taken, with proceeds going to the Community Christian Youth Center. Show time is 7:30 to 9:30 p.m.

Among the dozens of singers, songwriters and recording executives in this music-mad city, Wally Fowler emerges as Nashville's consummate "music man."

A gregarious, revered raconteur with twinkling eyes and cheerful nature, Fowler has been a singer, songwriter, gospel music pioneer, radio and television personality, Grand Ole Opry star and record company and publishing company executive.

And he's helped more people than the Red Cross.

A sample of his achievements:

- He helped launch the "Nashville sound" by forming the first record company here 30 years ago.

- He recommended Tennessee Ernie Ford for a network television show after turning down the job himself.

- He gave Chet Atkins one of his first jobs—and a guitar.

- He wrote Eddy Arnold's first million-seller, "That's How I Much I Love You."

- He helped get Hank Williams on the Grand Ole Opry.

- He started all-night gospel singing concerts which swept the Southeast in the 1950s and pioneered gospel television programming on Sunday mornings, earning the name "Mr. Gospel Music."

- He gave country music singer Roy Drusky a ride here

"He asked me if he could be as great as Les Paul. I told him to practice eight hours a day." He also gave Atkins a guitar that someone else had given Fowler as repayment for a loan.

Williams, a country music legend, approached Fowler at a restaurant 30 years ago in Troy, Ala., and asked Fowler if he could arrange a backstage pass to the Grand Ole Opry.

"I felt his sincerity," Fowler recalled, and Williams showed up at the Opry six weeks later.

"Someone loaned him a guitar and in a little while a crowd gathered around him and they couldn't get the talent back on the stage."

Fowler said he could spend hours reminiscing about his career and not be boring for even a second. "I've had two or three lives in this one already," he said.

Randa Allen is an 18-year-old young lady with a goal in her future. She wants to become a professional dog handler and trainer.

Randa has always loved animals and expressed an early interest in dog training. Her father gave her the money to take a course of instruction in this field last year for her 17th birthday.

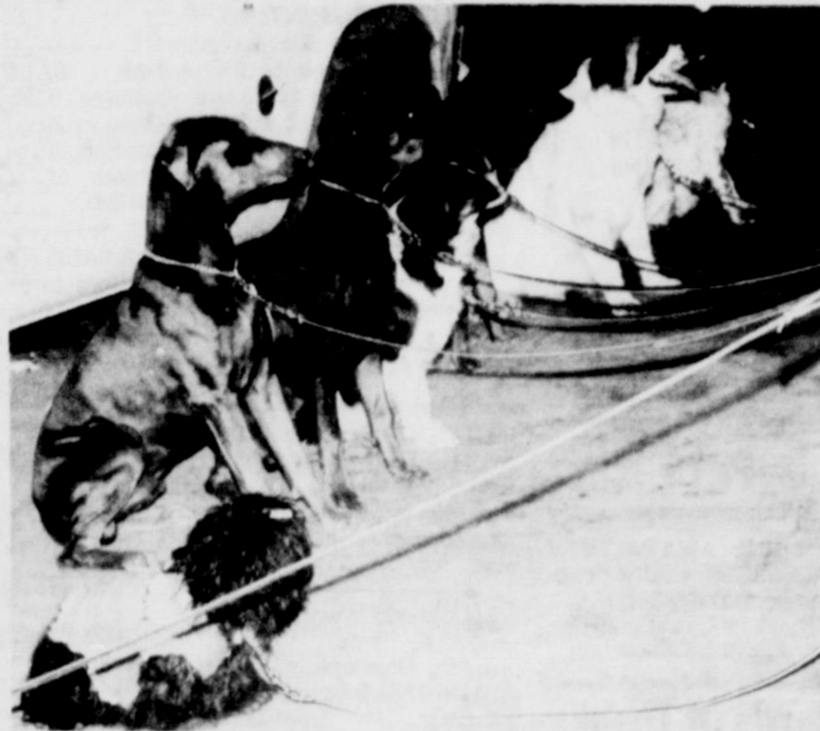
She enrolled in the course at the Clovis YMCA under the tutelage of Lonnie Leslie. Now, little over a year later, Randa is teaching a "dog obedience" class in Friona.

In her class, Randa passes along her know-how to other dog lovers as they teach their dogs to "sit,"

"stay," "heel," etc. The class meets one night each week for 10 weeks and is going into its third session this Tuesday.

Randa is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Randol Allen and she is a senior this year at Friona High School. Her interests, other than working with animals, include playing the flute in the high school band, Future Teachers organization, Future Nurses, and she also participates in the youth activities of the Congregational Church.

Kathy Smith, a friend of the Allen family, helped Randa obtain her first dog, a Doberman Pincher. The blue Doberman was a two-ounce sickly runt-of-the-litter when Randa

first got him. The vet thought he'd never make it. With Randa's tender loving care, this dog is now an 80-pound healthy, husky beauty. Randa was offered \$800 for the dog last year and turned it down because she couldn't bear to part with him.

She currently owns two Dobermans and with the help of Miss Smith, Randa raised 22 dogs for sale last year.

Mr. and Mrs. Ted Osborn had acquired one of Randa's dogs and were interested in learning how to train their pet. So Ted encouraged Randa to start the obedience class and is even furnishing the Osborn barn as a site for the classes.

To become a professional Randa must "finish out" at least six dogs. To "finish out" means the dog must obtain the highest number of points in dog show obedience trials. This differs from the conformation trials, where a dog must win points on his

look, build, coat, beauty, etc.

After graduating from Friona High School this spring, Randa plans to attend TSTI in Waco where she will take a two year course of study in Animal Technology.

Randa is one youngster who has turned something she enjoys into a possibly profitable vocation. The first prerequisite is that you enjoy your work. She definitely has a passing grade in that respect.

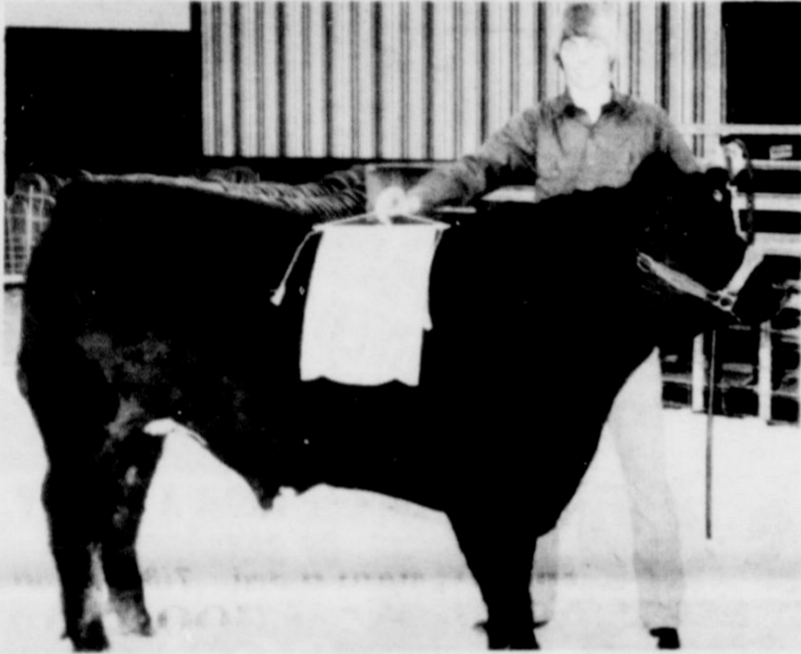

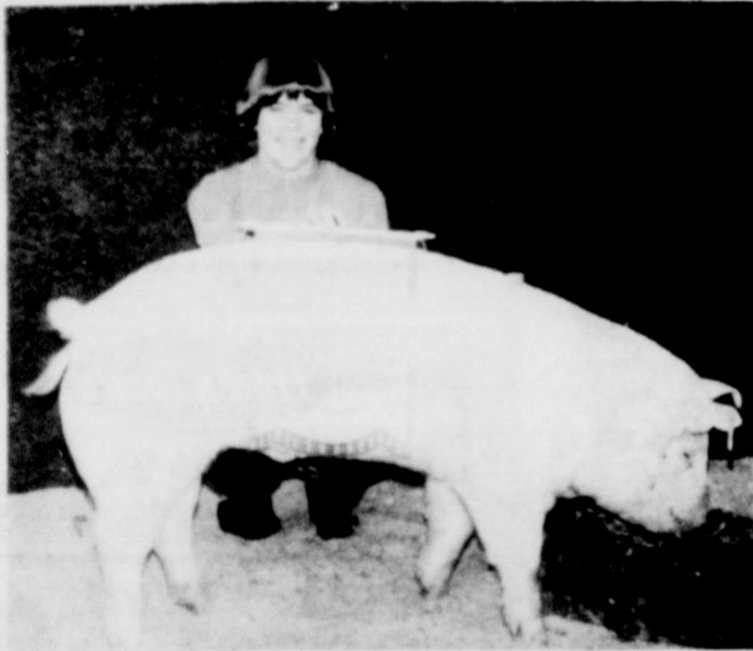

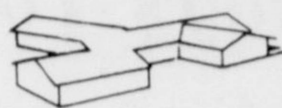
The two-hour show will be from 7:30 to 9:30 p.m., with a 15-minute intermission. There is no admission charge, although a love offering will be taken.
