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STANTON (SC)-Eleven empty cotton trailers were ripped apart at the Guitar Gin, a mile west of here on US 80 Tuesday night. Severe winds were accompanied by about two inches of rain in this same area, but the city area received only about an inch. There were no other damage reports.

Showers Moving South

Showers and cooler weather moved southward over Texas today and should push into the floodravaged southern part of the state before decreasing Thursday

Rainfall amounts generally were light and should have no effect on the tremendous volume of floodwater rolling across South Texas.

A cold front that entered the northwest part of the state and triggered a tornado in West Texas was responsible for the shower activity.

Reaches A Line

Early today the front had reached a line from Texarkana to Waco, Junction and the Big Bend country

Skies were cloudy behind the front and generally clear south of it.

Northwest and North Central Texas were dampened during the night with Mineral Wells recording .95 inch of rain.

High winds scattered cotton trailers across Interstate 20 at Stanton Tuesday evening. A tornado was seen to roam harmlessly over open ground in the Midland-Odessa area.

The cooler air dropped temperatures into the 50s in Northwest Texas and southward into the Pecos Valley early today.

Rain In Flood Area

The Weather Bureau reported light to moderate showers from Houston and Galveston and extending north and west to near Austin, College Station and Lufkin

Other light rain fell in the Panhandle-Plains and in East Texas.

It will be cooler across the state tonight with low readings mostly in the 50s and 60s.

Poor Peace Prospects

Mass Tijuana To Pesticide TIJUANA, Mexico (AP)-Au-

thorities placed the death toll in Tijuana's mass poisoning at 14 or 15 today as scientists reported that a pesticide found in bread and victims' stomachs may be the killer.

Hector Valdivia, deputy federal district attorney here, said the number of dead, almost all children, was 15. He discounted an earlier report that 34 had died.

NO EXPLANATION

The funeral home in charge of handling the bodies of victims placed the number at 14.

There was no immediate explanation of the discrepancy of one.

About 250 persons were being treated at crowded hospitals and clinics.

Seven U.S. chemists at Sacramento, Calif., said tests showed a pesticide, parathion, was present in the victims in an amount sufficient to kill a child but not an adult.

GRIEVING CITY

In the grieving border city, stricken since Sunday, crying parents carried their young dead to clinics in their arms.

"The people, they keep coming. We do all we can, but there are too many," said Dr. Jorge Salas of the Red Cross clinic.

The disclosure that parathion had been discovered in bread brought release of 19 dairy officials and street milk vendors held for questioning since Monday. A ban on milk was lifted, residents of Tijuana and stopped boiling their drinking water.

Boosting Toll HARLINGEN, Tex. (AP) -Flood miseries piled up on both sides of the Texas-Mexico border today as the raging Rio Grande put more thousands of people to flight and threatened

even worse depredations. Torrents gushing downstream sent water creeping higher in Harlingen, already hard hit, and the swollen river spread across ever widening areas in Northern Mexico.

54 DEATHS

Reports of 10 more deaths in Mexico meanwhile boosted the toll from Hurricane Beulah, which battered through this area more than a week ago, to 54 fatalities. That figure included 11 deaths in Texas.

Flooding drove 8,000 to 10,000 Harlingen residents from their homes. The Red Cross already was operating two shelters and it said a fresh influx of evacuees forced the opening of two additional shelters. Many of the occupants had returned only the past day or two after taking refuge from Beulah's 160-mile winds in other cities.

Unofficial reports reaching Mexico City placed the number of homeless at one million across the Rio Grande, now five miles wide in places, in an area stretching from Reynosa downstream to Matamoros near the

river's mouth. DAM FOLDS In Harlingen the flood waters gushed down the Arroyo Colorado parallel to the river after a dam to prevent such a disaster broke two days ago. Since then, the waters continue to thwart man's devices against them. Where dikes held, the water pressure reversed the intended flow of storm sewers, washing into business district streets. Makeshift sandbag baffles gave way in great sections. Only two hastily constructed dikes thrown together by big bulldozers which pushed back earth across two streets kept the brown water from washing over the entire city. The level kept on edging higher through the night after covering the south side of this city of 41,000 and spreading over big sections of the north side, but the peak appeared near.

An International Boundary and Water Commission spokesman reported at 7 a.m. that a slight drop already was noticeable in the Rio Grande at Mercedes, 13 miles upstream. He said water in the Arroyo Colorado seemed to be slowly levelling off.

Officials said the Harlingen water supply had been polluted. Warnings were broadcast for users to boil the water before drinking it.

Red Cross shelters drew on 150,000 gallons of bottled water sent by a San Antonio brewery. Stores sold out of distilled water. Taverns did a booming business

NO LET UP

There was water on three sides of six-story Valley Baptist Hospital in Harlingen, separating it from the main part of town. Helicopters stood by to ferry patients from the Harlingen airport to the hospital, which made use of its own heliport long before the current crisis.

An employe said the hospital was left without water or sewer service, however, after city mains broke early today.

Police worked through the night to evacuate householders in amphibious vehicles, high wheeled Army trucks, swamp and outboard boats. There was no other traf-Police Lt. H. Gutierrez said "Three operators are taking calls for help. It hasn't let up." The highway from Mexico City to Acapulco, the Pacific Coast resort, was cut in two places by flood waters as heavy rains continued. Seven children were reported drowned in the neighborng village of Embarcadero, a man drowned at Coyuca and another was killed in a collapsing house at Ometepec. Before striking the Texas Coast near Brownsville, Beulah also killed 34 persons in the Caribbean and on Southern Mexico's Yucatan Peninsula. Back on the Texas side of the Rio Grande, the first word came out late Tuesday from flooded Falfurrias, 70 miles north of Harlingen after being isolated

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y. (AP) - Canada declared today that a halt in the U.S. bombing of North Vietnam must be given top priority in efforts to de-escalate the Vietnam war and open the door to peace talks.

In a policy address before the 122-nation General Assembly, Canadian Foreign Secretary Paul Martin said: "It seems clear that all attempts to bring about talks between the two sides are doomed to failure unless the bombing is stopped."

He added, however, that a bombing halt is "only one side of a military equation" and said, if there is to be success, peace efforts cannot proceed "as if the other side did not exist." The proposed bombing halt, he said, is only a starting point in the process of ending the conflict.

Big Power Problem

"There is no hope for progress toward a peaceful settlement," he said, "in appeals or proposals which place the total burden of responsibility of making essential concessions on only one side. That sort of approach is relevant only in circumstances of military victory and defeat."

Martin pledged that Canada would continue its efforts as a member of the International Control Commission to act along with the other members -India and Poland-to lead the parties to the Vietnam conflict to the conference table.

He agreed with others, who had preceeded him in the assembly's general debate, that the prospects for Vietnam peace were poor. He also held out little hope that the United Nations would be able to play a useful role in finding a solution. The main reason, he said, was a lack of big power unity on the problem.

Wolcott Bound Over

GEORGETOWN, TEX. (AP) - The Williamson County grand jury, whose next regular meeting is scheduled Oct. 18, is expected to act on the case of James Wolcott, 16, in the shooting deaths of Wolcott's parents and sister.

Dist. Judge Kirby Vance bound over the youth to the grand jury Tuesday after a closed-door examining trial.

Purpose of the trial was to determine if there was sufficient evidence against Wolcott in the Aug. 5 slayings to send the case to the grand jury. The grand jury could convene earlier than Oct. 18, if the prosecution asks it to.

County Atty. Sam Stone, the Williamson County juvenile judge, certified Wolcott as an adult and bound him over to district court.

If indicted by the grand jury, Wolcott would be tried as an adult.

The bodies of his father, Dr. Gordon Wolcott, a Southwestern University biology professer; his mother, and his sister, Elizabeth, 17, were found shot to death Aug. 5 in the Wolcott home.

Spending Cut **Plan Fizzles**


WASHINGTON (AP) - The House Appropriations Committee defeated today a Republican proposal seeking to force President Johnson to cut federal spending by \$5 billion or more this year.

The proposal would have limited spending during t h e current fiscal year of \$131.5 billion, exclusive of any additional military expenses. The GOP leadership tried to

tie the proposal to a routine temporary money measure financing government agencies for the month of October. It was rejected by a vote of 28 to 21. Rep. Frank T. Bow of Ohio, top Republican on the committee, said he would try to have the spending-cut plan considered

later as a separate measure or have it tied to any tax bill that may come before the House.

Ways and Means Committee members have balked at the President's request for a 10 per cent income tax surcharge unless there is a deep cut in spending. The Bow proposal, which would not have affected defense spending, would have forced budget reductions and eased the

In Cairo, the Egyptians claimed the Israelis opened up a heavy artillery attack on the city midway on the 103-mile canal

But in Tel Aviv an Israeli army spokesman said fighting was raging along 65 miles of the canal between El Qantara and Port Suez to the south. He charged the Egyptians had shattered five U.N. cease-fire bids. He said the fighting continued well into the afternoon.

The spokesman said six Is-raelis had been wounded.

Red Gunners Bombard South Vietnam Troops

SAIGON (AP) - The Communists slackened their month-long artillery battle of attrition along the demilitarized zone Tuesday and the focus of the war shifted to North Vietnam with American warplanes stepping up their raids despite swarms of Red jets and missiles.

North Vietnamese gunners fired 50 rounds to harass U.S. Marines at Con Thien, the key to American defenses blocking a possible Communist invasion of South Vietnam's northern provinces. But the heaviest shellings-850 rounds-fell on two South Vietnamese airborne battalions a few miles away.

JETS LOST

planes mounted a U.S. near-maximum effort over North Vietnam after a week of bad weather and encountered blistering defenses over the port of Haiphong and the vital northeast rail line that links Hanoi and Red China.

The North Vietnamese put up nearly every fighter they could muster from the unbombed MIG airfield at Phuc Yen. The Reds claimed downing five American jets but only one loss was acknowledged by the U.S. Command, and that was far to the south over the DMZ.

Air Force pilots reported many sightings of MIG17s and MIG21s, with three brief air battles and more attempts by Red fliers to sneak behind American planes on bombing runs.

MISSILES WHIZ Of the 35 jets North Vietnam is believed to have operational on fields below the Chinese frontier, at least half and probably

more were in the air. Once MIG21s attempted to drive a flight of Phantom jets into the path of a defensive net

RANKED HIGH

NONE HAULED AWAY, NO FINES ARE LEVIED **City Moves Slow On Junk Cars**

By REBECCA NUGENT Time will soon tell if caution and patience were the best ways to get the job done — as far as enforcement of the city's junk car ordinance is concerned. Since its passage by city com-missioners four months ago, the city has neither hauled away any cars nor imposed the \$200 fine outlined in the ordinance. Friday a complete status re-port on each complaint filed in connection with the ordinance was made to Tom Huckaby,

city attorney. According to the report, eight notices covering 17 cars were included in the orig-inal group. Five cars have been removed by the owner, two owners have promised to move other cars and the city has been unable to contact the owner of another.

"We've had success with eight of the 17 cars included in this first group," said Huckaby. In a second group, he felt the city was successful in each case.

Five of eight cars have been moved and owners plan to move or recondition the remaining

The procedure followed by the city in enforcing the ordinance is time-consuming, based principally on treating each case individually. Complaints are di-rected to the police department where an initial investigation is conducted. When an officer feels it is a possible ordinance violation the building inspector's office takes over and tries to contact the owner before any formal action is taken, said Huckaby.

"A 30-day notice is sent merely as a courtesy to give people an opportunity to correct the situation before any formal action is taken," he said. If no improvement is made, a 10-day notice is sent, signifying the first official contact called for in the ordinance.

The 10-day notices were mailed for the first two groups

Aug. 1 and Aug. 3. Almost two months have passed since the so-called warning period ended. The decision of the inspecting officer can be appealed to the city commission within 10 days after a citizen receives a 10day notice. None have been filed

"Because each car is treated as an individual problem, it makes enforcement of the ordinance go very slowly, but at the same time we are more likely to make everybody a lot happier with the ordinance," said Huckaby.

Within the next few days, violators of the ordinance will be contacted once again by city inspectors. If they fail to coop-erate, Huckaby plans to file or-dinance violations in corporation court.

The city will move the cars at the owner's request or the owner can make arrangements with a junk dealer to have them moved, said Huckaby.

### **Cuts For Tax**

President Johnson's 10 per cent in-come tax surcharge bill is temporar-ily stalled in Chairman Wilbur D. Mills' House Ways and Means Committee. That was not unexpected. The decisive question is whether the strong-minded Arkansas Democrat is more concerned over proof of a se-rious inflation threat requiring the tax hike or with extracting from the administration the maximum in spending cuts to help reduce an estimated huge election-year deficit.

The reality of the inflation threat; almost unanimously predicted by econo-mists in and out of government, should soon be obvious. The Mills committee can hardly stall more than a few more weeks on that point.

The spending cuts, which Mills has asserted must be specific and sub-stantial as the price for a tax bill, are a far more complicated matter. So far the administration has offered, so far the administration has offered, in generalities, spending cutbacks around \$2 billion. Some members of Mills' committee are demanding re-ductions equalling the tax cut, that is, about \$7½ billion.

The higher figure is probably a bar-gaining point. Considering irreducible war costs, fixed governmental costs

(debt interest, administration, etc.), and politically untouchables such as public works, such a huge spending slash would have to starve foreign aid programs, shelve much of the space program, and cut vital social programs to levels that might disrupt related state and local programs. The result would be more waste than sav-

It is apparent, however, that the Johnson administration will have to do some serious horse-trading with Mills, and the rest of Congress, to get an anti-inflationary tax hike effective in a presidential and congressional election year. Painful specific cuts may have to be conceded; but a blanket slash must be avoided, and probably can be after Congress has put on a good economy show for the voters.

The nation's temper is not such, as the past summer's shocking experiences indicate, that it would support congressional scrapping of urgent domes-tic programs to offset the Vietnam war's cost. Nor will it tolerate runaway inflation. The obvious compromise, then, would seem to be to grant the tax increase, or most of it, in re-turn for a reasonable amount of cutbacks in spending on some of the less essential domestic programs.

### **Remarkable Record**

There doubtless will be numerous stories of individual heroism come out of the historic and destructive storm and floods in the lower Rio Grande Valley.

Yet there is a corporate heroism to match it on the part of law enforcement agencies, firemen, local offi-cials, utility directors, Civil Defense representatives, etc. Warnings were handled with such

effectiveness that virtually everyone was alerted without being panicked;

thare was an absolute minimum of deaths; and in general the evacuation was well - disciplined and thorough.

The cost in disrupted activities and in property is almost incalcuable, but had not those officials charged with responsibility functioned so admirably, a grim toll of death and suffer-ing would be added to this great catastrophe. These people are entitled to great commendation.



### Around The Rim Those Amazing Water Thieves those used for ornamental purposes.

Right now, the flood-stricken lower Rio Grande Valley is about the only spot in Texas not interested in more water. Eventually this will flow out to sea, with its trail of havoc, and within a year that area will be as con-scious as the remainder of the state concerning water resources.

THE STATE HAS a master water plan for building a series of dams and impounding lakes to help meet water needs over the next half century. This will cost upwards of two billion dollars. How would it seem, then, if by magic process the state were pre-sented with 10,000,000 acre-feet of water-enough to fill 50 Lake J. B. Thomases-each year?

Conservationists believe that this could be accomplished by one simple but massive attack on a major enemy-brush.

"WORTHLESS brush and weeds waste nearly as much water as is used for all other purposes in Texas," said H. N. Smith, state conservationist for the Soil Conservation Service. "One of our greatest potentials for saving water is reducing this waste by non-economic plants.

The SCS made a survey in 1964 and found that 88 million acres, or 82 per cent of Texas' 107 million acres of grassland, are infested with brush. You can be sure that the percentage is up substantially today. Brush takes away moisture and plant food which could go to useful plants, so that range experts estimate that four of every five acres are producing less than half of their potential.

SOME OF THIS brush falls into the category known as phreatophytes moisture-loving plants growing adja-cent to streams, lakes and ponds, and on soils with high water tables-and these have avoracious appetites for water. Salt cedar, most familiar in this section, may consume as much as three acre-feet a year from rivers, ponds or from edges of lakes. When I was a lad-and I like to think

that wasn't so long ago-there were scarcely any salt cedars except for serious study.

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

On a typical-warm summer day, a young mesquite plant may pump more than its own weight in water and expend it into the atmosphere as vapor. One study showed that a mesquite stand that has a canopy shading 50 per cent of the soil can use up to nine inches of water per month during the growing season.

Not only do these plants gobble up water, but they are notoriously inefficient in producing dry matter (which is virtually worthless). For instance, the same amount of water that produces 740 pounds of mesquite will produce a ton of good blue gramma grass.

SOMETHING CAN be done about it; success stories are innumerable. Fifteen years ago, George Skeete began a campaign to get rid of brush and restore grasslands on his ranch near Water Valley, Not only did his range come back, but so did a forgotten spring which has continued to run with the exception of two extremely dry years. Many similar experiences can be told.

IT IS A SHOCKING, sober thought that these "insidious thieves steal more water every year in Texas than is used by all the towns, all the factories, all the farms, and all the people. They annually use almost five times as much water as is stored in all the reservoirs of the state. About 10,000,000 acre-feet of water could be saved annually by controlling a ma-jor portion of these brushy water thieves . . ." according to C. A. Re-chenthin and H. N. UNDER THE arrangement, the Digest will sell shares of Loomis-Sayles Mutual Fund, a relatively small Boston organization, on an experimental basis in the state of Hesse, where one-tenth of the German edition's 1.28 million circulation is sold. This seems like a very tentative arrangement, but its potential is huge. The Digest claims a worldwide readership of 90 million in more than 100 nations on every continent. It has a primary circulation of 28 million copies in 29 separate editions and 13 languages.

"WE'RE OPEN to all possibilities and the United States is not excluded as a possibility," a Digest man said. This could mean that the Digest, which also sells books and records, might also become a worldwide seller of mutual fund shares.

The Digest is not, however, the first to realize the potential of selling shares in American industry to foreigners, whose incomes have grown strongly in recent years.
