No. 1—A proposal to allow counties to put all county taxes into one general fund.

No. 2—A proposal to permit municipalities and other political subdivisions and state supported entities located within hospital districts to participate in the establishment, maintenance, support or operation of mental health services, mental retardation services, or public health services.

No. 3—A proposal to extend the Veterans Land Program.

No. 4—A proposal to permit counties to pay medical, doctor and hospital bills of all sheriff's deputies, constables and other county and precinct law enforcement officials who are injured in the course of their official duties and providing that their salaries shall be continued at the maximum rate while they are incapacitated.

No. 5—A proposal to issue \$75,000,000 in bonds to finance creation of a Texas Park Development Program.

No. 6—A proposal dealing with the right of non-elective officials and employees to serve in other non-elective positions until Sept. 1, 1969, and thereafter only if authorized by the legislature.

Virtues Of Hell Praised By Justice

HELL, Mich. (AP)— Nobody spends more time or energy boasting the virtues of Hell than does Justice of Peace Mel Reinhard.

But when Hell freezes over, Reinhard will go to Florida. About half the unincorporated village's population of 45 also seeks warmer climates, most in Florida and Arizona.

This winter, Reinhard and his wife are planning on taking their respite from Hell in Ft. Lauderdale, Fla.

"The Den of Antiquity—that's my store—just doesn't do too well in the winter," says Reinhard, adding that during the summer months hundreds of tourists from neighboring urban areas drift through the store to pick up souvenirs of Hell.

"My business is mostly summer people," says Reinhard, who also heads the Chamber of Commerce. "Of course, I don't know how the others make out in the winter."

Reinhard says he's heading for Florida in early November, and has set a Nov. 1 deadline for couples who want to be married in Hell. So far this year, the justice of peace adds, the marrying business has been pretty brisk—102 couples have gone to Hell and got married.

The other businessman in town is Dewey Steffen, who runs the grocery store. He stays, and says he makes money.

"We have about 400 winter people in Hi-Land Lake, right behind us," Steffen says. "They don't like to admit it but they're as good as in Hell."

Most of those who stay in the rural tourist spot cradled between Lansing and Detroit commute to jobs in the urban centers. Others are connected with the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, 15 miles to the southeast.

Justice Not Blind, Just Slow

LESS WORK

Cases and population are spread unevenly among the state's district judges, overburdening some, giving others less work than they can handle, they declare.

SUGGESTS

A subcommittee of the American Bar Association suggests one district court per 30,000 people as a standard. In Texas, 119 district courts serve fewer than this, 85 serve more and 6 districts overlap others to such an extent it is hard to determine their average population.

Dallas County's district-level courts, including domestic relations and juvenile tribunals, serve an average of 65,000 people each, Harris County's 48,500 and Tarrant County's (Fort Worth) 63,325.

DOCKET

As of Jan. 1, the Eastland County 91st District Court had the smallest docket with 363 pending cases. The 4th District Court of Rusk County had the heaviest load, 3,255 cases.

How serious is the problem? "I think there is considerable denial of justice if you consider that denial of a speedy or efficient judicial system is denial of justice," said Knapp.

FEW SEEN

UP TO 240 PER CENT INTEREST

Those Who Need Loans Most, Pay The Highest

with retail installment and motor vehicle installment sales, which go into effect Jan. 1.

Voters amended the Texas constitution in 1961 to permit the legislature to set interest rates above the constitutional 10 per cent.

The 1963 legislature did. All the way up to 320 per cent. This year's legislature decided to do something about it, and about other aspects of borrowing and buying on credit. It reduced the 320 per cent maximum to 240 per cent.

This rate applies only in limited cases: Loans under \$30 and for a period on one month. But rates are nearly as high apply to loans between \$30 and \$100.

VOTED DOWN

The legislature voted down efforts to make the maximum interest rate 100 per cent.

For loans between \$100 and \$300, the maximum interest rate is 18 per cent a year per \$100. This is almost 36 per cent simple interest, but simple interest is something few lenders use any more—not even banks, except for relatives.

The 18 per cent is called "add-on" interest. You pay that on the full amount of the loan for the full term. This does not take into consideration the fact that you do not owe the full amount over the full period if you are paying it back in installments. You owe an average of only half the full loan over the loan period. For loans over \$300, the top

legal interest rate is 8 per cent "add-on" interest, or nearly 16 per cent simple interest.

LIMIT

The new law sets a limit of \$2,500 on loans regulated by the office of consumer credit, and it regulates for the first time these lenders: Pawnbrokers, casualty insurance premium finance companies and state time warrant companies.

Also regulated for the first time will be secondary mortgage credit insurance must bear "a reasonable relationship" to the loan, under the new law. "Deceptive practices in the conduct of any trade or commerce" are prohibited, and regulatory loan Commissioner Francis A. Miskell can ask the attorney general to bring suit in the name of the state against anyone who violates this provision. The suit would be for an injunction against the "deceptive" practice. For violations of \$1,000 for each violation is provided.

FORFEIT

Lenders and sellers on credit who charge more interest than allowed, except through accident or bona fide error, will forfeit twice the interest or time price differential and pay attorney fees.

If they charge twice or more what the law allows, they forfeit all principal and interest,

WHEN NEW LAW IS EFFECTIVE

Home Improvement Loans Control To Be Watched

Texas' loan shark cops have the ticklish task of keeping up with a widespread business activity that probably is legal now but will be highly illegal after Jan. 1, unless some changes are made.

WAITING

"If some of these guys making home improvement loans don't see the light before Jan. 1, I promise I'll be waiting in the district attorney's office as soon as the New Year's holidays are over," says Francis A. Miskell.

Miskell has the title currently of state regulatory loan commissioner but Oct. 1 changed hats to become "consumer credit commissioner," with all his present duties plus others.

The new consumer credit code that will regulate almost all forms of consumer lending under \$2,500 is fully effective Jan. 1, 1968. The code is the second phase in a loan regulation reform program that is vastly changing Texas' once unenviable reputation as one of the worst loan shark states in the nation.

The first phase passed by the 1963 Legislature put tight restrictions on cash loans—but it left big loopholes for consumer credit loans, the little bit down and a little bit a month buying

method used to some extent by almost all Texans.

MAKERS

Some makers of consumer credit loans, particularly the "fast buck" home improvement operator, literally thumbed their nose at Miskell and his examiners while they did things that would have resulted in a jail sentence for the maker of a cash loan.

"We knew it was going on and that's the reason we tried to cover all these things when the consumer credit code was presented the legislature this spring," Miskell said. But it was a three-day court of inquiry by Dallas officials that attracted most attention to the current situation.

IMMORAL

"Almost 100 per cent of that testimony showed most of these home improvement loans are unethical and immoral although not illegal at the present time," Miskell says. "The testimony showed that 95 per cent of those loans were based on misrepresentation, deceit and outright fraud. Yet, maybe only one to five per cent of the practices cited in Dallas may have violated present law, and those would be very difficult to prosecute. However, almost 100 per cent of the practices will be illegal after Jan. 1."

The Dallas attorney told of customers not being given a

plus any other charges, and must pay attorney fees.

After Jan. 1, retail dealers like department stores will not be allowed to charge 18 per cent on an unpaid balance over \$500. Only 12 per cent will be allowed. But the 18 per cent still will be allowed on unpaid balances under \$500.

Also after Jan. 1, loans for purchase of motor vehicles will be regulated. Again, if you are poorer than your neighbor and cannot buy a new car but must get a used one instead, the lender can charge you a higher interest rate.

For new cars, the top rate will be \$7.50 a year per \$100, or nearly 15 per cent simple interest; for used cars up to two years old, nearly 20 per cent interest will be allowed; for cars two to four years old, almost 25 per cent interest, and for cars older than four years, almost 36 per cent interest.

LENDERS

Home improvement lenders will have to get a certificate of completion from the borrower 30 days afterward saying the borrower is satisfied with performance on the contract. This will prevent unscrupulous companies from selling the note and skipping out, leaving the borrower with no one to sue if the contract is not properly fulfilled.

Shakespeare wrote: "Neither a borrower nor a lender be." But if you have a choice, be the latter. Especially in Texas.

copy of home improvement contracts, of borrowers being enticed into signing blank contracts, of not being told all the actual labor and material charges, of liens being taken on real property, of borrowers signing a certificate of completion before a job is ever started, and false and misleading advertising.

All of these will be illegal after Jan. 1 but are not now, Miskell said. Most recent complaints about home improvement loans concern aluminum siding contracts and roofing repairs and most complaints come from Dallas or Houston. Those two cities are headquarters for all state small loan regulation in the state, one for the north and the other for the south.

In the past, and infrequently now, there have been many complaints if installment loans for wall to wall carpeting, termite extermination, fencing, house leveling and remodeling.

COMPLAINTS

"We've had complaints from other cities such as Lubbock, San Angelo, Abilene, Bryan, Waco, Wichita Falls, and others but we usually find that such deals flow right back to Dallas or Houston," Miskell said. "Since the Dallas hearing the district attorney has received 100 additional complaints and we have received about 18 more here. We'll have plenty of work to do."

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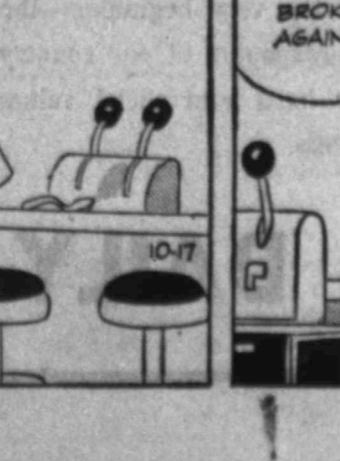

Science And You

Suits For Ocean Workers

In one of those typical but still surprising twists of science, NASA's most advanced space-suit may turn out to be a key to the ocean depths.

One of the gravest problems divers working in deep water must deal with is the enormous pressure. The pressure increases about one-half a pound per square inch for every foot a man descends. This means that man in a diving suit at a depth of 600 feet is subjected to a pressure of 300 pounds per square inch, or over 20 tons per square foot! The air he breathes has to be at correspondingly high pressure; otherwise he'd be crushed like an egg. Breathing high pressure air carries with it the well-known danger

of getting the "bends". A man could avoid this danger and yet be able to work at great depths in the ocean for a long time if we could figure out a way to let a deep diver breathe air at the pressure found on the Earth's surface. But how can we avoid the crushing pressure?

One possible answer seems to be just over the horizon because of developments in the space program. Out in space, the situation is quite different than it is in the ocean. There is essentially no pressure and a man in a spacesuit is inside a balloon of air which is blown up to give him enough oxygen to breathe. But working against a still blown-up balloon in space is a hard job. The ballooning spacesuit must be bent against its internal pressure and this makes things kind of tough.

For this reason, NASA's most advanced spacesuit concept involves what is known as a hard suit—a rigid suit with ball and socket joints at the elbows, hips and other critical spots.

Inside such a unit, a man can be immersed in one atmosphere of pressure and the suit moves just as easily at one atmosphere as it might at a third of an atmosphere, which is the pressure characteristic of our less advanced spacesuits.

Now let's take that hard suit out of space and apply it in the oceans. Of course, it would have to be a good deal thicker because it would have to stand higher pressures and the pressure would be in the opposite direction (the water being at higher pressure than the air inside). Nevertheless, all the mechanical movements, joints and other things that have been worked out for space can be applied to the ocean, too.

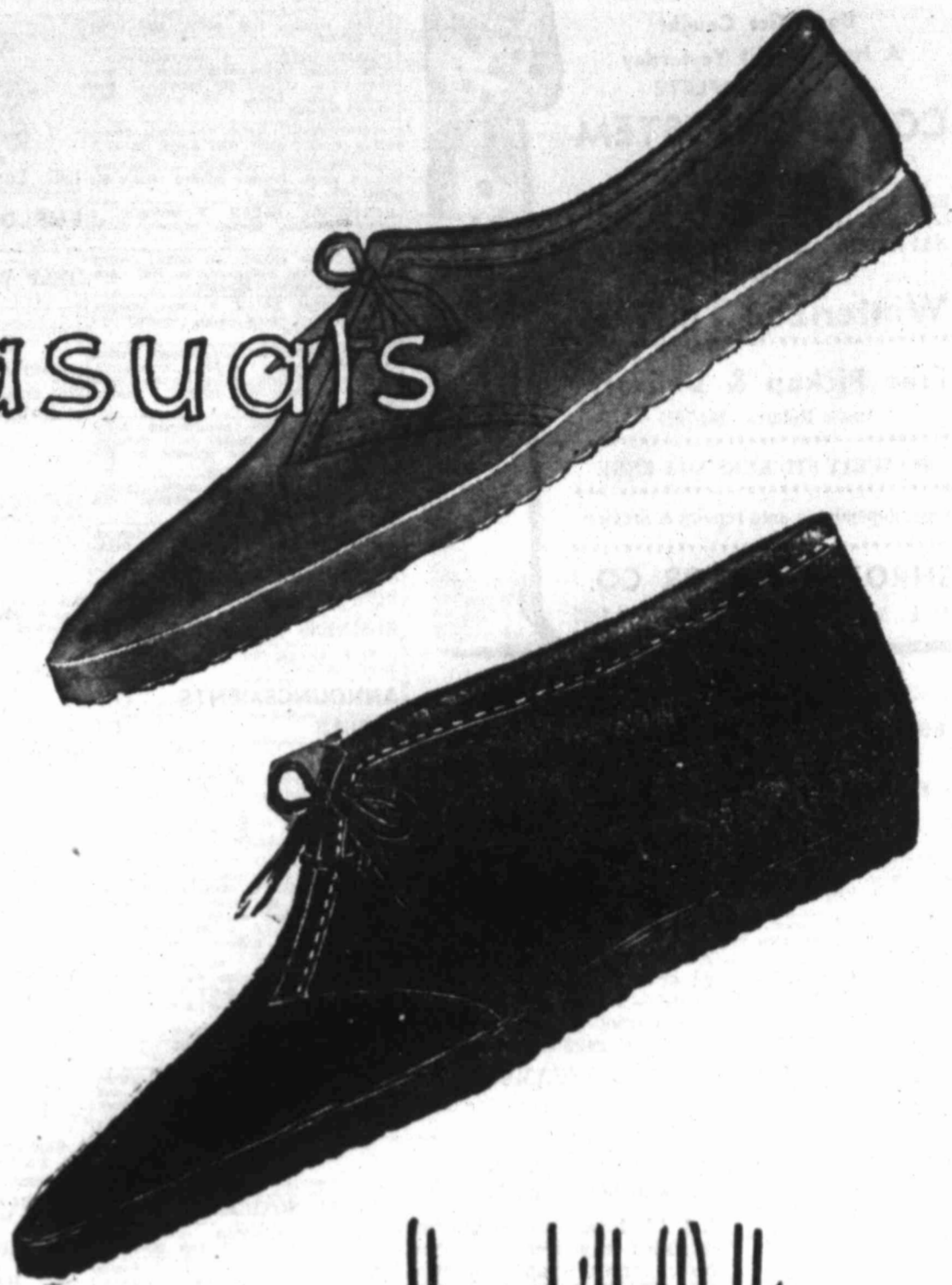
With such a suit, rather than being forced to breathe high pressure oxygen in a scuba suit or in a "hard-hat" diving rig, a space age diver would be encased in an array of ball and sockets and cylinders made of very strong material. Inside he would be breathing air at normal pressure and temperature. For most purposes his body would be at the surface of the Earth. There would be no possibility of bends or chemical poisoning such as now confront deep divers.

At the moment, designs for the space hard suit are being converted into designs for a deep-diving suit that ought to make it possible for a man to work routinely 600 feet under the surface. If we can achieve this goal, it could be of considerable economic importance because some day we'll want to be mining and farming at the bottom of the ocean. Hard diving suits could speed the arrival of a new age.

The jack of spades was permitted to remain outstanding and South switched his attentions to diamonds. The ace was cashed and then a small diamond was led and North's jack was finessed. East was in with the queen and after cashing the king of hearts, he shifted to the king

of clubs to lock declarer in dummy while his partner still retained the trump control.

South cashed North's king of diamonds in the hope that West would have to follow suit, which would give him an opportunity to lead a fourth round of diamonds and discard his losing club. West ruffed the king, however, and led back a club for his partner to cash the setting trick.

South could have salvaged his contract by refusing to take the diamond finesse. Inasmuch as he has one loser in each of the major suits, his inventory allows for the loss of one more trick. In other words he can afford to lose a diamond provided that he makes adequate provision for the small club in his hand.

It is suggested that after cashing out his high spades, South lead a diamond to the king and then a small one back to the ace. If West happens to have four diamonds to the queen, declarer retains an opportunity to lead up to the jack.

When both opponents follow to two rounds of the suit, a third diamond is led conceding a trick to the queen. East is in and will presumably shift to the king of clubs. South is now in command; he leads a fourth diamond from dummy and discards his remaining club as West ruffs with the master trump.

By cashing the ace and king of diamonds, South assures himself of a parking place for his club loser, provided the diamonds divide three-two, or if West has four diamonds.

Autopilot Flies Plane To Goal

WASHINGTON (AP) — An autopilot linked to a computer flew the first F111A jet fighter aircraft geared for combat use from Fort Worth, Tex., to Nellis Air Force Base, Nev., Monday.

The Pentagon said the plane's terrain-following radar kept the craft 1,000 feet above ground during the 1,047-mile flight. A pilot and copilot were aboard the plane, formerly called TFX, whose design and development has spurred a dispute among military men, Congress and Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara since 1962.
