## Treasury Beginning To Melt Down Silver Coins

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Treasury Department expects to begin melting silver coins after Christmas to help accumulate enough silver for domestic use into the 1970s.

Robert A. Wallace, assistant secretary of the treasury, said the department expects to have between 350 million to 425 million ounces of silver in bars and coins by next June 24—enough to supply industry for three to four years.

June 24 is the deadline for Americans to turn in their silver certificates—one type of paper money issued between 1923 and the early 1960s—for silver.

But Wallace said there's plenty of silver to go around. Earlier this year, the government quietly began withdrawing from circulation some of the old dimes and quarters containing

## Judge Changes His Mind Too

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Gridley Wright, a Yale graduate and former stockbroker and probation officer convicted of possessing marijuana, changed his mind and said he wants out of jail.

Wright, 33, fought his conviction last week on the grounds he uses the drug as a religious sacrament.

Superior Court Judge Mark Brandler told Wright after his conviction he might be released on \$1,000 bail if he agreed not to smoke marijuana pending a hearing, Wright refused.

Wright told Brandler on Monday he has speaking engagements to fulfill and his wife and two children to support, and he doesn't like it in jail. He said he would leave marijuana alone in exchange for his freedom.

Brandler thought it over and denied bail.

# Budget Battle Closes In, Some Agencies Broke

WASHINGTON (AP) — The battle of the budget closes in on the Senate today after an array of federal departments and agencies technically ran out of money at midnight.

A stopgap resolution that would continue their spending authority until Nov. 15 is up for Senate action, opening the way for amendments to force cutbacks in government expenditures.

Sen. Karl E. Mundt, R-S.D., said he would propose a five per cent cut in nondefense appropriations for the fiscal year ending next June 30.

The House directed President Johnson to cut government spending by \$6 billion to \$5 billion this year.

# Beulah Left Legacy Of New Screwworm Outbreak

DALLAS (AP) — New and costly infestations of screwworms in Southwestern livestock are feared as a consequence of Hurricane Beulah.

Reports of 151 cases were received by the Southwest Animal Health Research Foundation last week in 24 counties—the greatest number so far this year. They occurred during a season of cooler weather, when the incidence ordinarily drops.

C. G. Scruggs of Dallas, a vice president of the foundation, said, "There is no doubt that this explosion of cases over a

wide area is from Beulah. This is no normal thing. The screwworm fly is windblown."

Directors of the foundation, headed by Dolph Briscoe Jr. of Uvalde as chairman, declared at a special meeting in San Antonio last week that "an emergency situation exists in the screwworm eradication program as a result of disastrous floods spawned by the two hurricanes"—Beulah and Fern.

Widespread flooding occurred in South Texas and across the Rio Grande in Northern Mexico after those storms struck this fall.

Leaders of the foundation have asked the Agriculture Department in Washington for funds to expand their program of sterilizing male screwworm flies which has come close to eradicating the livestock pest in recent years.

## Bridge Test

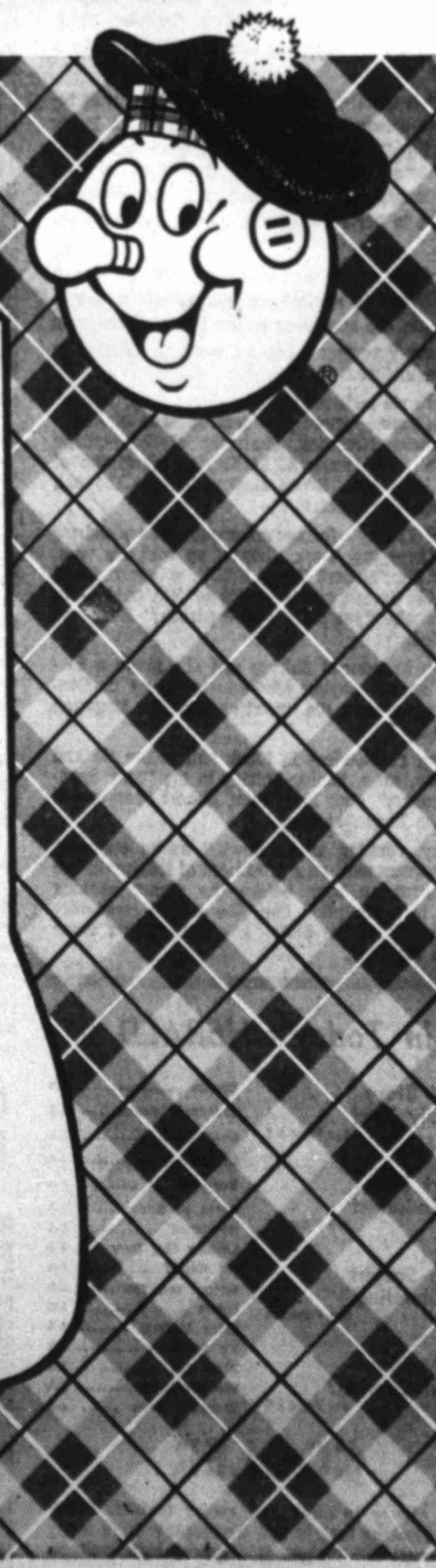

The bidding:

Opening lead: Deuce of ♣  
Altho North has only seven high card points, possession of a runnable six card suit provides ample justification for raising partner's one no trump bid. South holds 17 points, sufficient to accept the invitation, and the there was a temptation to show his five card major suit, he chose instead to carry on to three no trump.  
West opened the deuce of hearts, East put up the ace and South followed with the nine. East returned the five of hearts, his fourth best, and declarer was in with the king.  
Prospects appeared to be extremely dim for, even if the spade suit divided favorably, South could run at most seven tricks. In order to bring the total to nine he must develop diamonds, and as soon as the opposition got in with the ace, they would surely score enough hearts to send him down to defeat.  
Declarer did not falter, however. At trick three he led a small diamond in the manner of one who had

matters well in hand. West chose to play the deuce and dummy's queen held the trick, as East followed with the eight.  
At this point, South was tempted to abandon diamonds and try the club finesse for his ninth trick. However, inasmuch as West had ducked once with the setting tricks apparently in sight, declarer decided that the psychology of the moment favored a repeat performance.  
The king of diamonds was led from dummy, East discarded the three of clubs and South unblocked with the jack in an apparent attempt to maintain communication with the dummy in the suit. West pondered briefly and then ducked again. With two diamond tricks in, declarer switched to spades and when the jack fell on the second round, he was home. After cashing out his spades and the ace of clubs for nine tricks, he cheerfully conceded the balance to the opposition.  
West should not have fallen for his opponent's transparent maneuvers, for the entire holding was an open book after the second trick. East won the first lead with the ace of hearts on which South dropped the nine. East's return of the five was obviously fourth best and when declarer put up the king it should have been clear to West that he had no more hearts, and that East had started with a five card suit.  
It was pointless to hold up even once with the ace of diamonds inasmuch as the setting tricks were there for the taking. South was marked with possession of every missing high card to warrant his carrying on to game, and West should, therefore, have not tempted fate.

# Motive Sought In Mass Murders

LOCK HAVEN, Pa. (AP) — Two workers entering the sprawling Hammerville Paper Co. plant almost collided with 39-year-old Leo Held as he strode out with an emptied pistol in each hand.

"What's going on," they later said they asked him.

"The lights just went out," was his reply.

**SIX SLAIN**

Six persons were slain in the laboratory technician's 90-minute reign of terror Monday. Six others were wounded, three critically.

The words were the last known to be uttered by Held before he was struck and critically wounded by four police bullets in his backyard in Loganton, about 17 miles from here.

Clinton County Dist. Atty. Alan Lugg said Held, who underwent three hours of surgery for wounds of both wrists, a leg, an arm and a shoulder, had not uttered a word since his capture.

Lacking an explanation from Held, the district attorney, family, friends and relatives of the

victims were unable to explain what caused "a quiet peaceful man, devoted to his family" to embark on a bloody rampage.

**NO SENSE**

"It doesn't make any sense to us," said Mrs. Alice Davenport of Woolrich, whose husband Richard, 32, was shot dead in the paper mill where he was a quality control supervisor.

She said she assumed her husband was killed only because he "was in the way" of a bullet.

The statement contradicted remarks of eyewitnesses at the plant who watched, frozen by shock, as Held fatally shot Davenport and four others and wounded four more employees.

They said Held, a known gun fancier and avid hunter, moved with an icy coldness and apparently took aim at his targets. He then walked from the building firing random shots into offices as about 50 fellow employees watched from hiding places behind machinery and desks.

**HAPPENED FAST**

"Everything happened so fast, nobody knew what hap-

pened," said Leo F. Stahl, a plant supervisor.

Held then drove to Piper Aircraft Corp. at Lock Haven airport where he shot and wounded Mrs. Geraldine Ramm, a member of a car pool which had dropped him about three

months ago because of his alleged reckless driving.

The paper mill technician's next stop was the home of his Loganton neighbors, Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Quiggle, where, upon she received word of the pair while they slept, Quiggle was killed instantly and his wife critically wounded.

By that time, police caught up with him and the chase ended in a field behind Held's home.

**DREAM**

"I told myself it wasn't happening, but it was. It was like a dream that wouldn't go away. A bad dream—a real bad dream," said Stahl, who had hopped in a police car for the ride through this Central Pennsylvania mountain region to Loganton.

He said he found the Quiggle's six-year-old daughter in a downstairs room.

"She had taken the phone off the hook and maybe she was talking to the operator. Anyhow, I heard her say, just as clear as though she was reciting a lesson in the classroom: 'Help me, Mommy and Daddy have been shot.'"

During the rampage, Held's

four children were in school and his wife, Aida, 36, was working in a plastics plant in Jersey Shore, Pa., about 20 miles away. Police said she collapsed when she received word of the shootings.

**REFUSED**

Monday night, her brother, Harold M. Brungard, a Loganton banker, refused to let newsmen talk to her, but reported: "She said there was no indication of any problem this morning before they went to work."

Held's 18-year-old son Larry, a tall, strapping freshman at Pennsylvania State University, agreed, saying nothing seemed to be troubling his father when he drove him back to school Sunday.

"He was a normal, if not better than normal father," said Larry, referring to his father's six years of service on the local school board and leadership in Boy Scout activities. Held also is head of the local volunteer fire company.

Police said they had no motives for the shootings.

"Some of those he shot were supervisors, maybe he had something against supervisors," said the district attorney.

**NO MOTIVES**

Police had considered that animosity towards members of the car pool might have triggered the shootings, but only two of those shot were in the pool—Mrs. Ramm and David Overdorf, 27, who was wounded in the plant.

The dead included Davenport and Quiggle, Donald V. Walden, 31, of Lock Haven, paper manufacturing superintendent; Carmen H. Edwards, 62, of Mill Fall, superintendent of wastes and bacteriological control; Elmer Weaver, 37, and Allen Barrett Jr., 45, both lab employees from Lock Haven.

The other wounded were James Allen of Lock Haven; Richard Carter of Beech Creek and Woodrow Stultz, 46, of Lock Haven.

**CONFISCATED**

State police said there were quite a number of rifles and shotguns found in the Held household after the shooting. They said they confiscated the weapons.

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP) — A 12-year-old Albuquerque boy was killed Monday after a carbon dioxide cylinder he was playing with exploded, police said.

Officers said Michael Andrew Evanko had cut a hole in the cylinder, put several matches in the cartridge and lighted them.

Albuquerque Police Capt. Robert Bales said that instead of shooting across the youth's backyard as the boy had planned, the cartridge exploded and sent a piece of shrapnel through Evanko's jugular vein.

Bales said the cartridge was a device used to create pressure in a fire extinguisher.

## Rehab Financial Report Reflects A Good Year

The Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center concluded its fiscal year Sept. 30 in the best financial condition in several years. This was due largely to an unexpected increase in treatment fees of those able to pay for services and a sizable cash donation.

Total assets of the center at this end of the year were \$50,232, an increase of \$26,979 over the previous year. Current assets were up by \$5,308, thanks largely to a \$3,000 gift from Mrs. Tom Good; fixed assets up by \$7,614 due to purchases and donations of equipment and furniture; and restricted funds up \$14,057 due to a \$15,000 grant by the Dora Roberts Foundation for the salary of a second physical therapist for two years. (The center has not been able to fill this post, hence the funds carried over.)

During the year receipts amounted to \$31,460, which was \$7,143 more than anticipated (as explained previously by gifts and fees). The center does vastly more work where it receives no fees than it does where patrons are able to pay.

Expenses amounted to \$26,152, which is \$1,665 less than the budgeted amount. This is mostly due because the therapist assistant set up in the budget was available only part of the year and there was a \$1,200 under-run on this one item alone.

## Science And You Autos Changing Our Climate?

On top of all the obvious problems that our automobiles are giving us, it has recently been suggested that automobile exhaust fumes may be affecting the climate. Experiments have shown that tetraethyl lead—the anti-knock additive used in many gasolines—can cause tiny lead oxide crystals to be formed in the exhaust gases. The lead comes from the additive and the oxygen, of course, comes from the air.

Of course, there are millions upon millions of cars in operation, and so the total national production of lead oxide crystals is enormous. This may not seem particularly significant until you are reminded of the fact that tiny crystals of another type—silver iodide crystals—can be used to seed clouds to produce rain. The question arises whether lead oxide crystals from autos could also stimulate rain and, as a result, inadvertently alter the climate.

The answer is a qualified "yes."

The "yes" is qualified because there is a trick: The lead oxide crystals must be coated with a little iodine before they are effective as rainmakers. But iodine is available in the atmosphere from a number of sources. It doesn't stretch the imagination to figure that the effects might be significant even if only a small percentage of crystals coming out of automobiles was involved.

Just to give an idea of the possibilities, consider that the natural concentration of invis-

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# Dist. Income, Expenses Up

Revenues and expenses were both up for the Colorado River Municipal Water District through September, and net revenues were virtually the same as for the first nine months of the previous years, the September report of the district shows.

Receipts for sale of 1,391,386, 000 gallons of water during the month amounted to \$249,354. This brought to \$2,076,612 the receipts for the first three quarters of the year, compared to \$2,020,012 for the same period last year.

Water sales for the nine months amounted to 8,950,920, 000 gallons, compared with 9, 045,070,000 through September 1966. But operating expenses of \$662,315 compared with \$603,437 the same time last year. Part of the increase (\$38,000) is in power costs for producing the 900 million gallons additional water.

Through September, member cities used 6,507,000,000 gallons of water compared with 5,966,000,000 for the same period in 1966, and while oil companies were up, the increase was less pronounced. They used 343,000, 000 gallons for the nine months; a year ago it was 307,700,000.

WASHINGTON (AP) — Echoes of Tennessee's famed "Monkey Trial" may ring this term in the Supreme Court if a parent of two teenagers and a red-haired former biology teacher have their way.

1925 Arkansas law prevents his school-aged children from being exposed to all scientific theory. Together they said the U.S. Constitution prohibits making freedom of inquiry subordinate to "the religious belief of the majority."

Teachers or textbook commissioners who violate the law may be fined up to \$500 and fired. Arkansas and Mississippi are the only two states with laws prohibiting the teaching of the evolution theory.

Frisco Voters To Ballot On Vietnam Involvement

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — San Francisco's 317,240 voters get a chance to air an opinion on U.S. involvement in the Vietnam war in the Nov. 7 election.

Even without Vietnam on the ballot, the election may be one of the hottest in the city's history. Standing for election in the race for mayor are 18 candidates, and another 44 are running for supervisor.

Supervisors run the city-county. It took a ruling of the California Supreme Court to force the Vietnam question onto the San Francisco ballot.

The court ruled that Healey, who had said foreign policy was not concern of municipal voters, exceeded his authority in his new refusal to accept the issue for the ballot.

Attacks Rusk's Crusade, Questions Asian Threat

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Vance Hartke said today Secretary of State Dean Rusk has committed the United States to a crusade in Asia "we had better not embark upon... until a consensus has developed which is much larger than now exists in the country."

Rusk's comments at an Oct. 12 news conference. He said Rusk contended "Asian Communist imperialism, represented by one billion Chinese, will be able within the next few years, and with nuclear weapons, to threaten to impose communism on one billion free Asians."

Missing Hagler Named In Coin Shop Robbery

FORT WORTH (AP) — Authorities lodged an armed robbery complaint Monday against an ex-convict who disappeared nearly two years ago while fighting extradition from Honolulu. He is David Fred Hagler, 49, of Fort Worth, who was tried and acquitted in a "torch murder" case at Sulphur, Okla., in 1964.

Hagler was accused of killing a man, still unidentified, in a plot to collect his own life insurance. A corpse was found in Hagler's car, which had been wrecked and burned near Davis, Okla., in 1964. The case remains unsolved.

The new complaint accuses Hagler of robbing a rare coin shop Oct. 14 in Haltom City, a Fort Worth suburb, of about \$14,100.

Police said Fred E. Causey identified Hagler from a photograph as one of two bandits who handcuffed and gagged Causey and his wife while robbing their coin shop.

Investigators had found no trace of Hagler since he posted \$100 bond at Honolulu and vanished Dec. 21 1965. He disappeared previously after a rented airplane crashed into Matagorda Bay near Corpus Christi on March 11, 1964, soon after a Dallas judge forfeited his bond because Hagler failed to appear on a swindling charge.

A companion with him in the plane, Mrs. Loretta Anderson of Euless, Tex., told officers she and Hagler managed to wade ashore after clinging for a time to the sinking plane. She accused Hagler of kicking her in the face and trying to drown her.

Hagler next turned up in Canberra, Australia, in the fall of 1965 and denied Mrs. Anderson's accusation. Australian policemen took him to Honolulu and handed him over to the FBI on a charge of fleeing to escape prosecution. His lawyer won dismissal of the flight charge but Hagler was rearrested on Texas charges of forgery in using a credit card to obtain about \$115. An appeal against his extradition was pending when he disappeared again.

In addition to his other brush with the law, Hagler was convicted in 1957 and served a prison term for trying to defraud the Federal Housing Administration.

Inquiry About Stray Message Is Expected

ABOARD SS INDEPENDENCE (AP) — The captain of the liner Independence says he expects a federal inquiry into the case of the White House radiogram that strayed into the hands of Republican Gov. Ronald Reagan of California. Capt. Charles Reilly said his officers have already drafted a report on their investigation of the affair, assuming that men from the Coast Guard and the Federal Communications Commission will want one as soon as the Independence docks in New York late today.

"I assume with all the publicity, they'll be looking for us when we arrive," Reilly said. Earlier, George F. Dunigan, vice president of American Export Isbrandtsen Lines, which owns the Independence, said irregularities had been uncovered and that he did not see how anyone could have obtained a copy of the message without help from a ship's crewman.

The radiogram was sent by White House assistant Marvin Watson to former Gov. Price Daniel of Texas, the administration's liaison man with the 59th National Governors' Conference aboard the ship.

AUSTIN (AP) — Texans will decide Nov. 11 if non-elective state officers should be allowed to hold more than one job, if community mental retardation clinics may be built, and if counties should be allowed to do two things: Put all their tax money in one basket and pay the medical bills of officers hurt on duty.

These are four of the six constitutional amendments on the ballot. The ballot also will carry special elections in certain areas. There are 72 candidates running for one state Senate seat and six House seats.

Twenty-one candidates are running in Dallas for the Senate seat of the late George Parkhouse. The House seats were vacated by Rep. Ira Kohler of Houston, who died; Lee Duggan Jr., of Houston, who resigned to become a judge; Otha Birkner of Bay City, who resigned to become a county commissioner; Maurice Pipkin of Brownsville, who moved to Austin to become director for the new Judicial

Qualifications Commission; Jesse George of Levelland, who moved to Washington to join the staff of the Small Business Administration; and Pat Cain of Austin, who resigned.

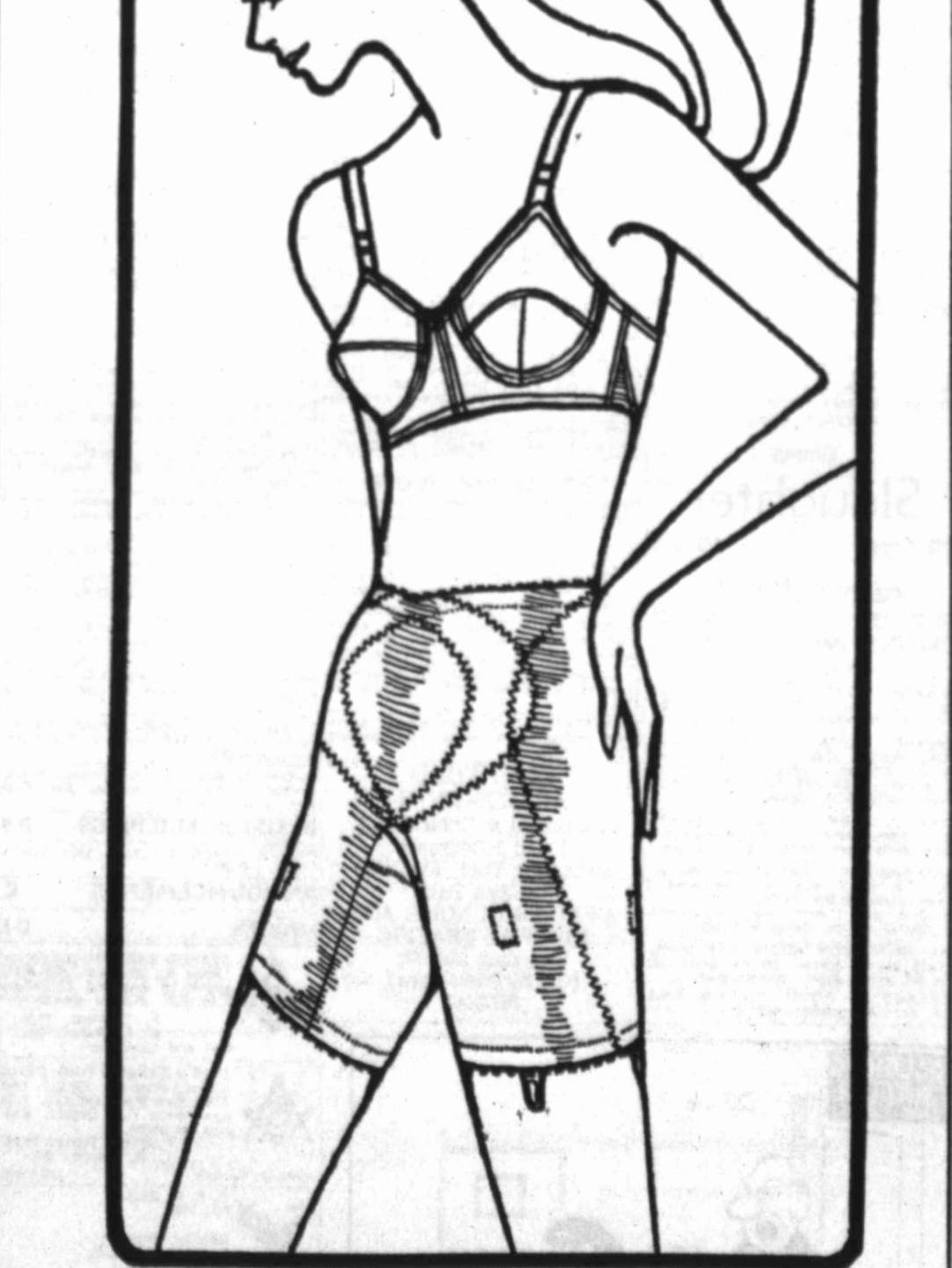
