## Bloody Hauler Strike Ends

PITTSBURGH (AP) - Steel haulers ended one of the bloodiest strikes in recent years today and wheeled their rigs up to the loading docks so choking mills could clear out their

crammed warehouses. A settlement, accepted Monday by the majority of 10,000 to 20,000 haulers, leaves the steel industry with the chore of moving out an estimated half a million tons of steel piled up in warehouses, a task that could take a month.

FEEL EFFECTS But the powerful Teamsters Union, which represents 60 per cent of the steel haulers, may feel the effects of the bitter strike for some time.

"This isn't the end, it's just the beginning," said William Kusley, of Gary, Ind., organizer of the rebellion. "We're an organization now with recognition that the Teamsters are going to have to deal with.

"We showed them that the forgotten little men in their union can get together and win their demands if the union won't

fight for them." He said 67 per cent of the strikers accepted a plan granting them \$10 an hour for every hour after four hours they wait in mills to be loaded, a five per cent increase in shipping rates and a special committee to represent them before the Teamsters. The actual hauling fees

NOT SATISFIED Kusley says he's not satisfied with the agreement. He said his rebel group plans to continue organizing with an eye on the

1970 contract negotiations. That's when the national contract between the Teamsters and trucking companies expires. The steel haulers, independent owner operators, protested the contract signed last spring. They wanted a separate contract, but claimed they were stymied by their small number and lack of organization in the world's biggest union.

# Voting Today Hanoi's Biggest Base Now Among Targets

## Halt To Bombing Being Considered

SAIGON (AP) - The United States is considering a major pause in the bombing of North Vietnam this winter to test Hanoi's willingness to start peace talks, an American diplomat said today

SCANT HOPE

There is scant hope among diplomats here that even a prolonged halt in the bombing will induce North Vietnam to sit down and work out any peace settlement that Saigon and Washington would accept.

But because of heavy foreign pressure for a pause, Washington might order one in an attempt to show that the United States is eager for peace but that Hanoi is unwilling to settle for anything less than American capitulation

The prolonged bombing pause, if one is decided upon, probably would begin in December with the traditional Christmas truce. Another stand down is ordered for New Year's and a third in January for Tet, the Buddhist new year celebration.

The United States in 1965 waited for more than a month before resuming bombing of the North after the Tet cease-fire. Hanoi gave no sign that it wanted to bargain and the raids were resumed

The U.S. military is strongly u to a majo halt because during it Hanoi can move men and war materials into the South with relative impunity. But the weather over



North Vietnam at the turn of the year is usually so bad that bombing of major targets is sharply curtailed anyway. A bombing pause also would

not necessarily cover the air war in Laos where American planes hammer the Ho Chi Minh infiltration trail daily. The United States has never acknowledged this campaign and would be under little pressure to halt it. The weather in Laos is excellent for bombing during the winter months.

NOT EXPECTED

Plans for the bombing pause are not expected to be worked out until after the inauguration at the end of October of President-elect Nguyen Van Thieu, who said during his campaign and after his election he would propose a truce in the air war.

PICKED UP

While fighting picked up in an arc around Saigon, U.S. Air Cavalrymen in the northern provinces mopped up in a fortified village near the South China Sea where they reported they killed 48 North Vietnamese reg-

ulars in seven hours of fighting Monday. Over North Vietnam, American warplanes bombed five railroad yards in scattered areas Monday, including a raid for the second time in as many days on the Haiphong yards 1.7 miles from the center of the port city.

U.S. Navy jets also attacked a highway bridge three-quarters of a mile from Haiphong's heart and the Hoa Lac airfield 20 miles west of Hanol, which until recent raids was a base for MIG

In a delayed report, the U.S. Command disclosed that U.S. gunship helicopters killed 17 Vietnamese civilians by mistake and wounded 23 more in the Mekong Delta last Thursday.

The helicopters attacked a treeline along a canal from where they reported receiving gunfire. A spokesman said the gunships fired at the request of a South Vietnamese regimental commander who said his troops were receiving enemy fire. The spokesman said the incident occurred at dusk and the helicopters were unaware of two small hamlets in the area.

In the fighting around Saigon, several battalions of South Vietnamese infantrymen jumped off at dawn on a search and destroy sweep 18 miles west-southwest of the capital.

In three clashes with guerrilla units in the next five hours, a government spokesman reported 11 guerrillas were killed, seven prisoners were taken, and 24 weapons were seized. The weapons included a Soviet antiaircraft gun with six barrels, the first such weapon reported captured by Vietnamese troops.

Vietnamese infantrymen suffered light casualties in one mortar shelling 12 miles north-northwest of Saigon, while eight civilians were wounded in the other, 25 miles northnorthwest of the capital.

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

#### **Budget Deadlines Needs Reform**

The current clash between President Johnson and Congress over antiinflationary fiscal policy is again un-derlining an old problem that connues to confound national economic ent. It is the repeated failure of Congress to approve budget appropriations by the June 30 fiscal year deadline.

Much of the confusion now attending the tax hike-vs.-spending cuts debate is generated by the fact that Congress has not yet finally acted on 9 of the 14 major appropriation bills making up the \$136 billion budget. Appropriating on that scope is a big, complex job.

But Congress did not act on appropriations during the half year it had to complete that job by the June 30 deadline. And now, 3½ months after the deadline and nine months in session, it is still not close to completing

In consequence, most departments and agencies of the federal government have been operating since June 30 on emergency resolution funds. This type of resolution allows the

executive agencies to continue spending at the monthly rate of the previous fiscal year's budget until new appropriations are finally approved. The latest such resolution expires this week; if all appropriations have not been approved by then, another resolution must be hastily passed, and even this is in trouble

Consequently federal agencies are now operating in the financial dark. They must try to continue their operations and programs as best they can without knowing how much money they will eventually have for the current fiscal year. Once that is known, they will have to cut back or speed up, depending on Congress' favor toward each.

A primary self-reform that Congress should undertake is to revise its budget-handling system so that it can complete appropriations by the beginning of the fiscal year of their use. If that were done a great benefit would be that Congress then could handle tax policy - particularly as a factor in national-economy regulation - in a much more sensible manner than it is doing right now.

#### **Bloc Registration Needs Debate**

State Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin's ruling against mass or bulk voter registration has raised a fiery dispute that probably can be resolved

only by clarifying legislation.

Meanwhile, the issue should be calmly debated as a matter of legal or legislative - intent interpretation and of free - suffrage principle — and not as factional or partisan favoritism. The charge by former Bexar County State Sen. Franklin Spears, defeated 1966 candidate for attorney general, that the Martin ruling is a "Connally team plot" to hold down the Democratic primary turnout next spring seems a little too pat to bear substance.

As attornel general last year, Waggoner Carr held that voter registration organizations could distribute registration forms and then collect and deliver them in bulk to the county tax-assessors office? Now Mar-tin has ruled that registration campaigners can distribute the forms, but that each voter or a member of a family must mail or deliver the filled - out form or forms to the county registration office or official

Those who criticize the Martin ruling argue that it will severely and unfairly hamper the voter registration drives of minority groups, spe-cial - interest groups, labor unions and the like. It is an unnecessary inconvenience to the underprivileged, they say, and will undemocratically reduce voter turnout.

Those who agree with the Martin ruling counter that it will discourage managed bloc voting and encourage personal participation in the voterqualification process. They counter that it is no appreciable inconvenience for individuals and families to mail in their own forms or register at various substations. And what is to prevent registration organizations from providing stamps and envelopes? So the issue should be kept in perspective.

We doubt that it will have much impact on voting volume or patterns one way or the other. But the effect of the ruling should be closely observed and then, if thought necessary, clarification or revision should be sought in the next session of the Leg-

### Holmes Alexander Diplomacy Without Fanfare

ISRAELI EMBASSY, TEHRAN, Iran - It is worth emphasizing, by the dateline, that there is Israeli territory in the Middle East which exists by diplomatic courtesy and mutual self-interest. Even a religious war has tolerance. Economic convenience can bring to pass an accommo-

Meir Ezri, who came to his office to receive me on the Jewish Sab-bath, calls himself Minister of Israel. There is no exchange of ambassadors, but the walled embassy behind a decorative pond and rose garden, houses some 30 workers who supervise a lively program between the two countries. The exchange of personnel slowed to a near-standstill with the war last June, but has resumed in October. Although Arab-oriented Iran and Israel remain on working and speaking terms - like sophisti cated partners in a marital divorce who have their children, and good memories, in common.

IRAN HAS made land-owners out of millions of peasants, but the native agriculture is backward by several centuries. The visiting Israeli agronomists in the past five years have implanted a cotton culture which hardly existed before, have increased the yield in sugar beets by several fold, and have taught the natives how to winterize in sheep-herding. Iranian groups in the size of 40 to 50 persons travel to the University of Haifa where they study up-to-date methods in their own language. The fields are being increasingly irrigated, and are being worked by tractors from the United States, the United Kingdom

ISRAEL'S return - benefits for this foreign aid are less provable than ours have been in many years of assistance to developing nations. Iran is not such an exporter in anything but oil, most of which goes to Europe and is not in a political position to express public gratitude to Israel. The Shah has visited the areas where Israeli know-how has been transplanted, and his approval and appreciation are well known

But he has refrained from using his good offices on the side of the Israeli in the Palestine War. His policy is one of consistent disapproval of the gains made by Israeli conquest. He recently granted an interview to the New York Times, the gist of which could be considered neutralistic and thus of diplomatic encouragement to Tel Aviv. But the Iranian press, which takes "directives" from government, did not publish the interview, and it had no internal effect.

BUT THE far-reaching results of the unpublished rapport are likely to bless both giver and getter. Israel has much to gain by showing that its advanced technology can improve the harsh living conditions of the Middle East. One was a report on a speech by a noted criminal lawyer delivered to the Associated Press Managing Edi-

THE LAWYER - Jake Ehrlich told the editors to fight against the efforts of the American Bar Association to muzzle the American press in its reports on criminal trials.

Being a lawyer with a long and highly publicized career defending criminals, Ehrlich is certainly a man capable of judging the merits of the bar association howl that press reports of criminal offenses and the trials of defendants damage the ac-

I HAVE BEEN slowly simmering ever since the bar began to meddle with reporting of crime and criminal trials and I am most happy to have a little support from a spokesman on the other side.

Ehrlich said, in his discussion of pretrial coverage, that he had "tried hundreds of jury cases during my career and during these years, I have never found that newspaper, radio or television pretrial publicity has done harm to my clients or to me."

The attorneys may read Ehrlich out of the profession but we newspapermen will certainly hail him as broth-

### Marquis Childs Watchwoman Of The Poverty Program

WASHINGTON - If you saw her behind the desk of the principal of the junior high school you would find her entirely in character. It is hard to believe that this prim, rather severe-looking woman is the scourge of the poverty program and the tireless haunt of the executive branch of government.

That is the role Rep. Edith Green is cast in as she hacks away at the Office of Economic Opportunity in its marathon ordeal before the House. Should the poverty program be rejected in the showdown, and no one can be sure of the outcome, Mrs. Green as much as any single individual will have been responsible,

IN A MAN'S WORLD she has come to a position of great influence. There are only 12 women among the 535 members of Congress - Sen. Margaret Chase Smith in the Senate and It in the House. While at least two women in the House outrank Mrs. Green, serving her seventh term, by reason of her strategic place is the No. 2 Democrat on the Committee on Education and Labor she is probably No. 1 in the power she exercises.

BUT IT IS NOT merely seniority that has sent the lady from Oregon into orbit. Friend and foe alike agree that she works indefatigably. With the zeal of a Puritan avenger she has followed every step of the OEO bill through the committee, often engag-ing in sharp skirmishes for her own amendments that would correct one or the other of what she considers the many gross errors or worse on the part of the poverty administrators.

AGAINST THE poverty program? Why, of course, she isn't against the program. It is here, to the puzzlement of fellow Democrats who often find her as trying as do the administrators. that she parts company with the Re-publicans who fight OEO. She says, in fact, that unless the program is greatly expanded the riots of next year will be far worse than those of the past summer.

Waste, waste, waste, that is the villain she pursues with the zeal of a schoolmistress calling on her pupils to use the smallest pieces of chalk when they go to the blackboard. No one can doubt the earnestness. IN HER HANDSOME suite in the

Rayburn Office Building Mrs. Green talks of the small details of economy in the manner of a careful housekeeper looking over the grocery list. She has been shown a table of organization for a new poverty office in New York calling for eight water coolers. And why, she asks, can't they drink water out of the tap? Wastebaskets were shown as distributed in the same generous profusion.

RECENTLY MRS. GREEN visited a Job Corps center training women to be nurses aides - she has steadily pushed to increase the ratio of women to men in this program, fostering one amendment that would have put the corps eventually on a 50-50 basis. She says she found 39 trainees and 39 personnel at a cost she insists is far in excess of similar training in the public school system in the District of

SUCH EXAMPLES come in profusion when Mrs. Green rises on the floor of the House to excoriate that bureaucracy. She does not deny that OEO itself, as a proliferating, costly, wasteful agency in her view, is her real target. Along with a Re bloc she has recommended turning major segments of the poverty program over to Health, Education and Welfare, Labor and other established departments. 

Mrs. Susan Epperson, 26, claimed she could not teach biology properly in Little Rock's Central High School without explaining the Darwinian concept of evolution. She is now a researcher at Columbia, Mo.

The parent, H. H. Blanchard, who is assistant executive secretary of the Arkansas Education Association, claimed the 1928 Arkansas law prevents his school-aged children from being exposed to all scientific theory. Together they said the U.S.

Constitution prohibits making freedom of inquiry subordinate to "the religious belief of the majority.'

And both of them, the appeal says, do not "construe the Darwinian theory as attacking and being inconsistent with the story of the creation of the earth, as set forth in the Christian

The Arkansas law forbids the teaching in any tax-supported school in the state of "the theory or doctrine that mankind ascended or descended from a lower order of animals.'

Textbooks advancing the concept of evolution are banned.
