# **Lower Rates** On LD Calls

DALLAS (AP) - Texas telephone users will share in a nationwide \$110 million interstate long distance rate reduction effective Nov. 1. Telephone users will benefit three ways under

the new rates:

 Lower charges on many calls. - Longer "time periods" and added days Saturdays and certain holidays when low rates apply. - A new "midnight to 7" special dial rate with

a 75-cent maximum charge for a three-minute call within the continental U.S. The total package features major reductions, through it has small increases for some interstate calls under 24 miles.

Under the new charges, the 8½-hour span of the present night rate will be extended to 12 hours. To be designated "after 7 and weekends," the span will extend from 7 p.m. to 7 a.m. each weekday and include all day Saturday and Sunday.

# Call 'Em Sexy

WASHINGTON (AP) - You don't like the unsolicited seed catalogs you've been getting through the mail? Just say they're sexually provocative and the postman couldn't bring them anymore.

And the same would go for "soap advertisements, bills from creditors, income tax forms, even a letter from a congressman" if a House - approved amendment to a postal rate bill passes, says a federal official.

General counsel Timothy May of the Post Office Department told a Senate committee Monday, the House amendment is ostensibly aimed at sexually offensive mail, but actually "empowers an addressee to prevent any mailer from sending him any kind of matter.'


Rep. Jerome Waldie, D-Calif., who sponsored the amendment, cheerfully agreed with May's assess-

The other unmanned Sputnik, Cosmos 188, continued to orbit earth, it added.

Earlier in the day, Russia disclosed it had sent up still another satellite-Cosmos 189. It also continued in orbit.

Soviet scientists disclosed that the unmanned spaceship was sent into space Monday while another Sputnik rocketed up to dock automatically with another unmanned vehicle

Soviet newspapers hailed the docking as a space first and Moscow newspapers proclaimed "Russians ahead again." But Dr. Edward C. Welsh, the White House's principal space adviser, said the United States has long had the capacity for an unmanned docking but did not bother to use it because of Gemini successes with astronauts at the controls.

Cosmos 189 raised to six the number of unmanned Sputniks put into orbit in six days, an unusual flurry of Soviet space activity on the eve of celebrations of the Bolshevik revolution. There has been speculation the Russians would send up a new manned spaceship for the anni-

Tass, the official Soviet news agency, said Cosmos 189 was functioning normally, circling the earth every 95.7 minutes with 332 miles the maximum height of its orbit. No specific mission was announced for the craft, but the Soviets said it was "designed to continue space research.'

Cosmos 186 and 188, which joined and then separated on command from computers 31/2 hours later, apparently continue to circle the earth, but there was no indication if they would carry out further joint maneuvers. The docking Monday was a test for systems used in building stations in space, the Soviet announcement said.

CAUTIOUS It also seemed like an obvious preparation for what the Soviet space program wants to do next-form a space platform by joining together manned craft in orbit. But the new unmanned testing suggested a cautious attitude before cosmonauts are risked in space again. Spaceman Vladimir M. Komarov's death last April is believed by some observers to have occurred in connection with an attempted linkup.

# **Troops Beat** Off Heavy **Commie Move**

SAIGON (AP) - U.S. and South Vietnamese troops beat back another Communist attempt today to seize the town of Loc Ninh a U.S. Special Forces camp 72 miles north of Saigon in what U.S. officers said was an obvious try for a propaganda victory to counter South Vietnam's presidential inauguration.

U.S. spokesmen said the Communists left 110 bodies on the battlefield after their renewed attempt to overrun the headquarters compound of the district town and the Special Forces camp. This raised the Communist toll to 365 dead in the three-day battle with South Vietnamese troops and two battalions of the U.S. 1st Infantry

Meanwhile, U.S. fighterbombers returned to North Vietnam's Hanoi-Haiphong heartland for the seventh straight day Monday, attacking four air fields, a key power plant and a big railroad yard. A U.S. Navy F4 Phantom shot down a MIG17 in an aerial duel between Navy iets and four of the Communist interceptors northeast of Hanoi, the U.S. Command said.

There were no Communist attacks in heavily guarded Saigon as Lt. Gen. Nguyen Van Thieu took the oath of office as South Vietnam's elected president in an outdoor ceremony watched U.S. Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and representatives of 21 other foreign nations.

# No Inaugural **Guests Are Hurt**

SAIGON (AP) - The Viet Cong lobbed four shells on grounds of the gaily lighted Independence Palace tonight as President Nguyen Van Thieu entertained Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey and 2,000 in-augural guests, but hit none of

palace. The shells landed in quick succession. The explosions shook the windows, but it was all over in a few seconds and the party went on. A dinner party for a smaller group later was carried out as scheduled.

The shelling was carried out despite the biggest security prearound Saigon.

# Missed Monday, **But Repeats It**

The weatherman missed his frost prediction for Monday night but he boldly repeated his warning for tonight and backed it up with a biting cold wind, a lot of red dust, and partially cloudy skies.

The temperature missed the freezing mark by a wide margin on Monday night, but winds made it seem a lot colder than the mercury showed.

The forecast for today is cold: tonight colder. Scattered frost is promised. Wednesday, the weatherman said, should be a little warmer.



# Crucial Test In Chile

Fundamental to enlightened United States foreign policy in Latin America is the objective of helping the region in all ways possible to find a "middle way" to progressive political

That does not mean that the United States should strive to mold Latin American governments into the forms of its own democratic image, though most constitutions there are modeled on ours. It does mean that Washington should use all facets of its influence, short of resented intervention in internal affairs, to help Latin American countries avoid or emerge from either of two extremes: (1) Rightist military rule more concerned with status-quo stability than progress, and (2) Communist takeovers that destroy freedom with the false prom-

ise of progress.

Most objective and well-informed observers of the Latin American scene now generally agree that Latin America's best political hope lies in that amorphous and groping group-ing loosely defined as the "demo-cratic left." The democratic left in Latin America borrows heavily both from Western European democratic

socialism and those aspects of the United States politico - economic system called welfare-statism.

Among the more promising ele-ments of the Latin American demo-cratic left is the Christian Democratic movement, spawned in Peru and now undergoing its most crucial testing in Chile. Chilean President Eduardo Frei Montalva, elected by a broad popular base and now at the midpoint of his six-year term, says, "It is too early to tell if we will win, but we are clearly making progress." Christian Democrat leader Frei has

undertaken a compromise partner-ship (rather than nationalization) of Chile's U.S. copper companies, industrialization and raising of real wages, housing programs and land reform. He is resisted by the privileged and reactionary right and is still battling the Marxists in his struggle for a true social revolution without violence or loss of individual freedom. His twin opposition still outweighs him in the

Consequently, the next three years in Chile will be critical not only for the future of that country but, as an example, for all Latin America,

There apparently is no possibility of agreement on estimates which vary so greatly as 30 million and 80 million. But it is useful to remember that poverty, however defined, is not confined alone to the Negro. Myrdal, in fact, estimates that no more than one third of the "underclass" in the United States is Negro. The rest are Puerto Ricans, Indians, Americans of

Easter alone still clings to some of its old-time lustre, but it appears that it, too, may be slowly losing ground. Certainly the place it once held religiously is diminished sharply. There were days when joint religious services on Easter drew everyone in the community who could make it to the church. Now novelty features are used in an effort to attract the people.

BACK TO HALLOWEEN. Formerly families in most towns looked to the approach of the day with dread and alarm. On the day itself, the head of

the household carried all moveable items from the yard into the barn and nailed up the doors.

# The New Segregation

WASHINGTON - "Whatever happened to segregation in America?" asked the Returning Traveler who had been away for a while. "Did the Supreme Court decisions and Congressional civil rights acts rub out separation-of-the-races forever?"

ON THE contrary, the Traveler was told, segregation reappeared in America, only this time it was Communistdone. The white and black races were driven into political apartheid. They were pitched into one of those battles where history is formed. The outcome would determine whether America continued as a democratic republic, or whether it collapsed into the Communist model of a socialist state. "To set race against race, to stain

the streets with blood, to break down respect for the civil and moral laws, and to disrupt society - these are known objectives of the Comm enemy," said the Traveler, "But, certainly, the American people and government did not sit still and let it

THE AMERICAN people, he was told, hardly knew what was taking place. For instance, the National Conference for New Politics, meeting over the Labor Day weekend of 1967, looked like just another get-together of goof-balls. The agenda called for the usual agitation against people who worked for a living, and fought for their country, and sometimes went to church on Sundays. But, according to intelligence sources, the action at the Conference turned out to be a power grab by the Communists in the name of black nationalism.

"THAT IS segregation with a ven-geance," said the Returning Travel-"If the Negroes are being led or duped by Communists to go-it-alone,

and to turn social reform into a black revolution, then America is in a fight for its life. But the Conference for New Politics must be an isolated body. and the Chicago rally only a small in-

Most Americans preferred to believe that, the Traveler was told. They see the Negro as fighting his way up the ladder of opportunity. They believe in giving every man, even fools and anarchists, the freedoms of speech, protest and assembly.

FOR THAT reason, there was an embarrassed silence in most metropolitan newspapers when Sen. Jim Eastland, chairman of the Judiciary Committee, told the Senate in October that the Labor Day Conference in Chicago was not just another radical whing-ding. "The drive for Negro revolution in this country is moving toward a climax," Eastland said. "It is hoped to swing a substantial majority of the Negro population into line as servants of the Communist consptracy.'

THE TRAVELER was thinking that Eastland of Mississippi, a segregationist of another kind entirely, might not have been the best senator to make that speech. Maybe if a Northern senator, like Dodd, or a Western senator, like the late McCarthy, had made it, the American press and public would have paid better attention But remembering what happened to Dodd, McCarthy and other anti-Communists, the Traveler could understand why there aren't more volun-

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# Hours Of Terror Have Ended

CLEVELAND, Ohio (AP) -"I was in heaven-on my honeymoon, then all hell broke loose with this nut," aid Charles Caldwell after 44 hours of terror ended with the shooting of his bride and her rejected suitor's

SHOT Lida Caldwell, 19, was taken at gunpoint from the young couple's apartment a few hours after the wedding Saturday. Robert Batch, 23, a former mental patient she dated until about a month ago, shot and wounded her 18-year-old husband as the couple arrived home from Detroit where they were married.

Batch then took the darkhaired, brown-eyed girl to his third - floor attic apartment in suburban University Heights,

holding the bride and police at bay until Monday afternoon. Batch, quoted by his mother as saying, "There was no reason to go on living," shot Mrs. Caldwell in the chest and turned

the gun on himself.
"My darling, My darling,"
moaned the dying Batch as police stormed into the apartment to find him draped across his

young captive.
"Get me out of here," begged Mrs. Caldwell as she was carried to an ambulance.

The bullet pierced her chest and came out her back. After surgery at Doctor's Hospital, she remained in satisfactory condition today.

Batch was pronounced dead at the same hospital from a bullet wound in his heart.

Four miles away in St. Vincent Charity Hospital, her husband, a short order cook, also in satisfactory condition, is recovering from face wounds.

"I hope I can see her soon," Caldwell said from his hospital bed, adding that "this past couple of days has been hell . . . but now I'm in heaven again." The dramatic siege at Batch's apartment began when detec-

WASHINGTON (AP) - The farm harvest season moved into its final weeks with prices of crops and livestock combined running six per cent below a

An Agriculture Department report showed Monday that prices marked their third consecutive month of decline under the impact of record production. The decrease between mid-September and mid-October was onethird of one per cent. Lower prices for cattle, hogs

and eggs were primarily responsible for the decrease. Partly offsetting were price increases for cotton, milk, wheat, rice, dry beans and some fruits. The department said farm prices in mid-October reflected 73 per cent of the old parity goal of federal farm programs, the same as a month earlier but

considerably below the year-earlier level of 79 per cent. But taking government payments into account, the department said returns reflected 78 per cent of what it calls an adjusted parity ratio.

This compared with 79 per cent a month earlier and 85 per


