Bank's Discount Rates Are Increased

Federal Reserve Board's discount rate moved up a notch today in what officials described as an effort to protect the dollar in the wake of the British pound devaluation.

IDENTICAL The rise from 4 to 41/2 per cent is identical to one put into effect on Dec. 5, 1965, but that was for a different reason-to stem inflation. It triggered a year of tight money.

This time, however, the move is designed to prevent a heavy flow of dollars overseas in search of higher interest rates. It's expected to have little

Paratroopers Take Heavy **Red Assaults**

SAIGON (AP) — North Viet-namese regulars surrounded a U.S. paratrooper battalion on a hill near the Cambodian border in South Vietnam's central highlands today and with heavy ground assaults and mortar attacks apparently inflicted heavy casualties. An American relief force reached the scene at dusk.

CUT OFF

The battalion of the U.S. 173rd Airborne Brigade was cut off for 24 hours before the reinforcements arrived to break the Communist attack and bring out dead and wounded." Heavy enemy ground fire kept rescue helicopters away.

Britain's Move May Revive Tax Increase

Dirksen Takes Opposite View

WASHINGTON (AP)—Senate Majority Leader Mike Mansfield said today Congress may have to drop its mid-December adjournment goal and remain in session to act on a tax increase because of Britain's devaluation of the pound.

"Much as I hate to say so, much as I abhor the possibility, I think the welfare of the country and the stability of the dollar comes before any adjournment plans," the Montana

Rate Primer

NEW YORK (AP) - The devaluation of the pound Saturday night-a 143 per cent reduction from \$2.80 to \$2.40—is a complex international financial move.

Devaluation will do two things: It will lower the cost of British goods on world markets which the British government hopes will cause people to buy more British goods and bring more money into England. It will also make it more expensive for British citizens to buy imported goods. This will have the effect of keeping England's money at home.

The government increased the Bank of England's discount rate from 6½ per cent to 8 per cent. The U.S. Federal Reserve Board increased its discount rate a half perseent to 41/2 per cent to keep U.S. money from flowing into England at too fast a pace. The action of the Federal Reserve Board gives those in the United States with money to invest a chance to earn a higher

interest rate. The action of the board will cause an increase in the interest many people pay to borrow money. Just how much of an increase can not be determined at this time. One effect that is certain-it will cost more to borrow money to buy a home.

The Russians, confronted with their own dilemmas in Southeast Asia, probably would settle for a long, drawn-out stalemate in the Vietnam war, so long as the standoff continued to drain U.S. resources without raising the danger of a Soviet-American showdown. RED HERRING

Even if what Soviet propagandists say is intended only to introduce a red herring into the Southeast Asia situation, there is an ominous sound to it. The propaganda, notably that portion of it directed to Southeast Asia, insists that the United States has a new "escalation plan," based upon the invasion of North Vietnam and extension of the war into the rest of Indo-

Radio Peace and Progress, Moscow's propaganda voice for Asia, makes the claim that Gen. William C. Westmoreland, the American commander, visited Washington specifically to talk with President Johnson about a new plan to invade the North.

CRIMINAL PLAN

"It appears Gen. Westmoreland wants to prove that it is indispensable to outflank the positions of the Vietnamese patriots for a U.S. victory," Moscow said. "The new criminal plan also provides for the extension also provides for the extension of the war to Cambodia and Laos. With this aim in mind, Green Beret units are being transferred to the frontiers of Laos and Cambodia.'

This suggests that should American fortunes in Southeast Asia improve dramatically, there exists an already huilt-in pretext for heavier Soviet involvement in the situation. There seems more than a veiled hint in the Soviet words that a U.S. attempt to achieve an appearance of victory would inevitably lead to wider war in Asia and perhaps to World War III.

The question of widened war in Asia may depend upon the definition of "victory," If victory for the American side means capitulation and withdrawal of North Vietnam's troops from the South, the Soviet Union will face the necessity of considering what response it should make to uphold its claim to the leader ship of international commu

We informed Prime Minister Son Sann of the camp site before the stories were published. His initial reaction was cautious and he said he would make an official investigation. Evidence of Viet Cong occupancy found in the camp included military records written in Vietnamese, North Vietnamese medical supplies and similar items. Dated scraps of paper indicated the camp had been used for several months dating back to last February.

There were unmistakable signs that several hundred men, probably from a major headquarters command group, had used the camp. Occupants had left only a few days before. From the camp a heavily traveled road went through the dense jungle to the frontier, crossing it nine miles from Loc Ninh. Logs had been put down to counteract the monsoon mud. Tracks indicated many heavy trucks had used it.

American authorities in Vietnam have pinpointed at least 20 permanent camp sites, many of them are in a five-mile area ad-joining the border where the Cambodian army does not patrol and has no significant posts. Frontier security is left almost entirely to village militiamen, a questionable force open to Viet ong pressure and infiltration.

Competent authorities say the Viet Cong operate just as clandestinely in Cambodia as they do in Vietnam. They select areas where they are unlikely to meet Cambodian soldiers, particularly the virtually uninhabited northeast where Cambodia, Laos and Vietnam come together. Here the Ho Chi Minh trail from Laos joins the Sihanouk trail in Cambodia. In this desolate jungle area the border is not marked, and Cambodian roops stay away.

Army Bills Soldier For Long Absence

LAKEWOOD, CAlif. (AP) A former soldier who sat at home waiting for U.S. Army orders for 223 days in 1966 says the Army has billed him for \$1,238 paid him during his extended absence.

John Brown, 24, said he went to the Army at least once a month during the period, trying to get the Army to solve the problem. He said everyone laughed at the mixup until he told them his hitch was up and

he wanted out. Then the post commander at nearby Ft. MacArthur found out about Brown's predicament.

"He thought I had done a real bad thing," Brown said. That weekend "I tried to tell himand the record showed it-that I had been honest with the Army. I wanted to do what was rightbut they couldn't seem to figure out what 'right' was."

Brown's dispute followed by a week the complaint of Pfc. Jo-seph A. Smith, who says he spent 18 months of his two-year Army hitch at home at Marysville, Calif., and now wants out

of the Army. Both Brown and Smith were home on leave, with orders to go to Vietnam, Both received instructions canceling previous orders and telling them to wait

for further instructions. Both said they waited and no further word came. Smith, a draftee, says he will go to court to get his discharge if the Army doesn't let him out.

The Army is testing Smith at San Francisco to determine

what action it will take. Brown said the Army finally gave him his discharge July 31, 1966, with the notation that he had taken 223 days excessive leave. He said he is credited for three years of service for GI benefits, though he actually served over five years. He also says the Army owes him \$1,300 in back pay and allowances.

The bones "are undoubtedly those of Brenda White," police

Brenda disappeared Aug. 3. Less than a month earlier, on July 6, Judith Ann Elwell, 5, vanished from near her home across Oklahoma City.

Two quail hunters stumbled across the skull and bones Saturday afternoon, police said, and notified officers Sunday. State medical examiner James Luke said the bones are those of a small child about Brenda's


"We'll make a detailed examination of the remains and try to establish the cause of death,'

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

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

New Park For Our Area

The 33rd National Park is on its way in far Western Texas. Transfer of 46,000 acres of minerals by the State of Texas to the federal government Thursday cleared the last obstacle for development of the 77,000-acre park in the rugged Guadalupe Mountains.

Most people agree, even those with strong conservative leanings, that obtaining wilderness areas for park purposes is a prudent step. They have only to point to the 200 million figure which the United States is said to cross this month, and to the population projections of the year 1975 and 2000. The rapid growth of urban centers means that the opportunity for legions of people to get into the unspoiled out-of-doors will be tied large-

ly to the nation's parks. The Guadalupe park will be more than just a rugged wilderness preserve. Although its great peaks (Guadalupe, El. 8,751, and El Capitan 8,078) rise in spectacular grandeur from a desert setting, the park is far from arid, bleak craigs. McKittrick Canyon is well watered, and the stream contains mountain trout. Timber of many varieties, including Ponderosa, is found in the park, and it abounds in wild life, including large game animals. Its altitude means it will have a brisk, invigorating climate. The scenery will be breath-taking.

Finally, this park will be accessible to the thousands upon thousands who visit the Carlsbad Caverns. Not only is it within comfortable driving distance of here, but we are on one of the beaten paths to it.

Short-Sighted

Small satisfaction can be derived from the prospect that various Latin American governments will soon be acquiring U.S.-built supersonic military aircraft. From a strictly military viewpoint it may be desirable for friendly governments in the hemisphere to have such weapons at their command. But other than military considerations are far more important. Latin America's paramount need for economic and social progress is

not going to be served by the acqui-

sition of supersonic jets. It is arguable, in terms of the balance of payments, that we are better off having Latin Americans buy U.S. rather than French aircraft. But that consideration is outweighed by the importance of encouraging these countries to focus all possible resources on economic and social development. Selling them fast jets will have quite a different effect.

> THE REAL ISSUE, however, is not freedom of speech, but the incitement to violence. These last few years, the Supreme Court has overturned convictions by State Courts which have attempted to punish "demonstrators."

> In some cases, the high court has ruled that the state laws forbidding trespass on private property or disorderly conduct are too vague. In still other cases, the high court has said there was not enough evidence of "violence" to justify conviction in the lower courts.

> Recently, however, under the leadership of Justice Hugo Black, the Supreme Court has taken a tougher attitude toward the "demonstrators." and in some instances has upheld

UNDERLYING ALL these legal proceedings is the conflict between "freedom of speech" and the right of a state to protect its citizens and to maintain law and order. There are plenty of state and federal statutes which prohibit disorderly conduct, breach of the peace, malicious mischief, obstructing streets, parading without permit, assault, inciting to riot and trespassing on public or private property. But, unfortunately, the Supreme Court by some of its rulings has given the impression to many of the militant "demonstrators" that they can escape punishment or get

The Democrats And The Bloc Votes

off-year elections of 1967 took the Democratic party to the brink of a devilish temptation where it has teetered for years. If this political party goes over the precipice, great will be the fall thereof.

THE CLIFFSIDE temptation is to rush pell-mell into the abyss of demagogy and socialism. The Democrats barely were saved from defeat in several large cities by the bloc-voting of race-minded Negroes and by the income - guarantee hucksters of the Labor Movement.

It is one thing for a political party to offer attractions to hard-luck minorities, and something else for it to rely in the extreme on an all-but-solid turnout of the tribes. It is sensible for a political party to woo the working-man, but it is ominous when a party relies in extreme upon powerful ideologues whose professed goal is the guaranteed annual wage, regardless of performance.

IN CLEVELAND, the mayor - elect Carl Stokes got 95 per cent of the Negro vote, which is close to being totalitarian. In Gary, Richard Hatcher carried every Negro precinct and lost every white precinct, which is electoral segregation. Each of these colored candidates, acknowledged to be excellent men, managed to win by majorities so thin that only racial bloc-voting can account for it. Their victories were nothing at all like that of Sen. Edward Brooke (R., Mass.) who manifestly won last year on merit

THE DEMOCRATIC successes in Cleveland and Gary, and to a lesser extent in Philadelphia, puts a poisoned chalice to the Democratic lips, and it intoxicates that party to the dare. Nearly every large city, in nearly every large state, has a Negro bloc that provedly can tip the municipal electoral balance, and the municipal

WASHINGTON - In retrospect, the vote can tip the balance of the state vote. If the party promises the Negro masses all that they want, it won't any longer be advocating equal rights, but special rights, not color blindness but color preference, not majority rule but minority immunity.

> ALREADY, the central cities are ghost towns because the original settlers, the whites, are "voting with their feet" by taking off to the suburbs. The movement could be turned into a stampede by the kind of campaign which a desperate Democratic party might be driven to attempt.

IN CLEVELAND and Gary where racism predominated, it was Laborite leadership which provided the Democrats with a smidgen of the white role that saved the day. Post-election analysis reveals that most of the whiteskinned working families voted Republican, but there was just enough authority in the Labor leadership and organization to snatch a majority. For the Democratic party to become beholden in this era to the Labor bosses is not merely to adhere to the cause of collective bargaining rights. Should a Lyndon Johnson re-election wagon get hitched to Laborism as it exists today, the national Democrats would be more than ever in the Socialist orbit. Nowhere has the union leadership of late hesitated to break through the anti-inflation breakwaters. The new automotive contracts virtually insure year-round paychecks whether or not the workers earn them. This kind of security may give off visions of a workers' paradise, but if we get to the point where industries are working for the workers, the next step is nationalization, either by subsidy or take-over.

TRUE, THE Democrats can turn away from a temptation to exploit the Negro revolution and to succumb to socializing influence, but that takes willpower, doesn't it?

Book Business Keeps Growing

dustry is counting on a vigorous Christmas trade to help record its 15th straight year of higher sales. The total by Dec. 31 should be close to \$2.5 billion.

To achieve that goal, a good Christmas season is essential, and so all the "coffee table nonbooks," the big. arty editions with artlessly big prices, have been laid on display counters with care.

NO MATTER that next spring these oversize volumes, shopworn and tattered, will be drastically marked down or remaindered, that is, sold to wholesalers. Their very presence now'sig-nals the start of the big Christmas book buying season.

Even to this point it has been a good year for publishing. It has its problems, perhaps, but they certainly aren't in the sales department. They are mostly about prices, some sleazy works, and with college students pirating volumes on office copiers.

NOTHING, HOWEVER, seems to interfere with sales growth. Charts show an almost uninterrupted upward slant for the past 20 years, supported by growing population, federal aid, and a rising demand for knowledge. Few, if any, industries have had such a big, steady growth over so

long a time. A survey by Publishers' Weekly indicates the trend will continue this year. Of more than 100 key bookstores checked, 67 per cent reported sales increases for the third quarter, lending support to forecasts of a big final three months.

ONE LARGE bookseller reported in the survey that prices were artificially high "to take advantage of the library funds or to give discount houses the advantage of saving their customers even more money

The term "library" refers here to federal aid to schools and libraries to assist them in stocking their shelves. For the first time ever, in fact, some librarians are free of oppressive budg-

et problems. There is confidence in the industry, however, that the pricing problem is not likely to extinguish the powerful demand that has thrust sales so high, nor that high prices will stop the almost inevitable increase in the num-

NEW YORK (AP) - The book in- ber of works that appear each year.

LAST YEAR, for the first time in history, the industry published more than 30,000 titles. This year, through September, the figures are even higher, with 20,192 titles added, 4,900 of them new editions of old works.

Although these figures seem huge, they still do not include a great number of works that seldom get into the usual commercial channels, such as 2,901 U.S. Government publications and 14,813 university theses.

WHAT OTHERS SAY

Venus 4's landing on our sister planet is a feat of which both the Russians and all mankind can be proud. To say this takes nothing from the glory of America's Mariner 5 in its successful fly-by of Venus. This spacecraft's performance, too, is a tribute to the skill of the space engineer. But we realize that Venus 4 has carried planetary probing a giant step beyond the fly-by stage.

We also recognize its challenge. At time when the American planetary program is all but throttled by budget cuts, the Soviets again show the strength of their planetward thrust.

Our Moscow correspondent reports that the Russians are spending between \$5 and \$7 billion a year on space. This compares with less than \$5 billion for the United States. Also, it is believed that the Russians devote a larger portion of their space budget to planetary work than do the Americans.

This suggests that the Soviets could pull steadily ahead of the United States in deep-space exploration during the coming decade. We share the concern of Dr. William H. Pickering, director of the Jet Propulsion Laboratory is "running out of lead time for the interplanetary programs planned for the 1970's."

It is time to rethink the entire American space program, to tailor it to slimmer budgets.

If this means letting the Russlans lead in exploring the planets, then so be it. But merely to leave this important field to them, with no considered alternative space program, is






