Dear Sir: Enclosed please find 50 c for which send me the Baird Star for six monthe, unless I leave here before that time is up.
I am having a great time in this army driving a three ton truck White Motur truck from five to eightneen and thirty six hours a day, sometim eating bardtack and corn willie and sometimes I don't eat as it is bad
form to get in the habit of eating in form to
the army
There are three Baird boys in this truck company who bave signed up for one year each: Perry Gilliland, Luke Terry and myself. I haven't but nine months and twenty-six more days to do
We will probably leave tomorrow for a fifteen days trip hauling supplies for the 20,000 troops now on the march thru New Mexico
I have made one trip out to them and carried six thousand pounds of beans. There were eleven trucks in all loaded with beans, bacon, coffee, sugar, onions and potatoes. Twelve more of us went yesterday and car ried 18000 pounds of bread and 85 quarters of beef. There are about nine Motor Truck Companies and all of them are hauling supplies. There of them are hauling supplies, There
are thirty-three trucks and one tanker to the company with a Dodge touring car for the Captain and
a Dodge roadster for the Truck Masa Dodge roadster for the Truck Mas-
ter. We have a commissioned arms officer at the head of each company and a Major for the regiment. We have a camp in El Paso and are all right when there, but when away we do not live so well, especially the do not live so well, especially the
Northern drivers who are not used to camping out. We are given plenty of good, wholesome food, but we pay our board.
The government forced us to outfit ourselves with field uniforms and now we have orders not to wear them any more. They issued us blankets and then told us to buy them or give them up. Most of us gave them up.
There are several boys in the com. pany, including Lake and myself, who are going to have our present Who are going to have our present contract cancelled and sign one to
go to the Phillipine Islands and drive for the government for one year at $\$ 125$. per month as soon as they need us. Some of the men to France to drive for the allies at 8190. per month and expenses, and some more are going soon.
Well, I am a bit sleepy so will do some bunk fatigue. With best wish- in luck.
