HIPPIE DEATH

Identifies Man Pushed From Auto

GREENVILLE, Tex. (AP)-The FBI identified the body of a long-haired youth pushed from an automobile and then killed as Joseph Elsworth Montcalm, 25, lately of San Francisco and a native of Michigan.

The identification was reported by Hunt County Asst. Atty. Smith Gilley.

'Fat Slob Named Joe'

Previously he was identified by hippie acquaintances only as a "fat slob named Joe."

The body, battered and slashed, was found Jan. 31 near Greenville on a dead-end rural road. Four long-haired acquaintances were already in custody in Baton Rouge when the body was found. Murder charges were filed against them before

Justice of Peace Homer Wacasey of Greenville. At Baton Rouge, Detectives Bobby Gill and Ronnie Alford said three of the four described the slaying shortly after the body was found. They were held at the time on vagrancy charges.

Pills, Glue, Wine

The detectives said they were told that "Joe" had been beaten, slashed, then run through with a four-foot iron rod before being dumped into a

They said the slaving followed a hopped-up evening of pill popping, glue sniffing and wine drinking through Texas.

The hippies were en route from California to Mardi Gras in New Orleans.

Still Confused

SAIGON (AP) - Allied troops battled a Communist detachment six miles northeast of Saigon early Sunday in the widespread efforts to blot out the five-day-old Red offensive that authorities regard as the prelude to invasion from the North.

Elements of the U.S. 11th Armored Cavalry Regiment and South Vietnamese marines took on an enemy force of undetermined size near Thu Duc, on one of the routes by which bloodied Communist outfits were withdrawing from the capital and the area of Tan Son Nhut Airbase. The U.S. Command said fighting was heavy.

BITTER BATTLE

Jet fighters and helicopter gunships worked over the enemy positions by the light of parachute flares before the ground forces established contact.

The heaviest bombardment in weeks of U.S. Marines at Khe Sanh, Con Thien and other sandbagged posts below the demilitarized zone had suggested approach of the anticipated key phase, a drive by four Hanoi divisions—up to 50,000 men—into South Vietnam's upper prov-

> Hospital insurance hereafter cover the full amount of reasonable charges for pathologists or radiologists services when a patient is in the hospital. Formerly some of this cost had to be charged against optional "doctor bill" insurance, if the patient has it.

It used to be necessary for a physician to certify that a person's entry into a hospital was "medically necessary." Now the fact of admission is considered sufficient. But in long-stay cases, the doctor still must recertify the need for continued hospital care at intervals specified by the government.

Durable medical equipment

to pay a hospital bill because he was treated in a hospital not part of the medicare program. But the hospital in question must be licensed as a hospital, must have a full-time nursing service, and provide medical care under doctor's supervi-

If you attain 65 in 1968, you can get hospital insurance if you are entitled to monthly benefits under Social Security or railroad retirement, or have just three quarters (nine months) of Social Security work credits. The old requirement was six quarters. 1968, the requirement will rise again on a steady scale,

Hospital insurance also covers some extended-care and home health benefits, but these are largely unchanged under the new law. Social Security offices and various guide publications offer the details.

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

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

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Sulfur Pilot Plant In West Texas

Sinclair Oil & Gas Company has begun initial production of sulfur at its West Texas pilot plant using the French process. This is Sinclair's first venture in the sulfur mining business. The plant, located 15 miles northeast of Fort Stockton in Pecos County, has an initial capacity for heating and treating 500,000 gallons of water per day to 360 degrees. The plant stream is injected under pressure into the reservoir causing

the sulfur to melt. The sulfur is produced in the molten state, stored as a liquid, and shipped to market by highway tank trucks and railroad tank cars. Capacity of the plant may be increased by the installation of additional units after economical operations are established. The plant now employes 20

CONNIE EDWARDS HELPING MAKE MOVIE

Confederates Flying Nazi Planes

The Confederate Air Force has wandered far from its own battlegrounds. In fact, five of its members are in distant Spain, flying, of all things, German Messerschmitt ME 109's, the famous planes of Nazi Germany in World War II.

One of the CAF members spearheading this unusual experience is W. C. (Connie) Edwards, Big Spring ranchman and oil operator who, a mong many interests, joins other CAF members in their program to acquire, rebuild and maintain World War II type aircraft.

"BATTLE OF BRITAIN"

Edwards and his associates are principal figures in flying sequences for a super film production just getting under way. It has been tabbed "The Battle of Britain" and will dramatize those World War II days when British Spitfires and Hurricanes rose to meet the attacking German Heinkel bombers which had the Messerschmitts for cov-

The CAF men have been at a Spanish Air Force Base a Seville, Spain, for the past week, making familiarization flights in the German-type craft. Actual shooting sequences were due to start this week.

Why are these CAF colonels in such a picture?

It dates back to 1966 when Edwards was in England bent upon, acquiring some of the World War II planes other than American. One thing led to another until Connie arranged that he and his buddies would get into a picture which was being planned. After it's over with, the CAF is due to acquire title to four ME 109's and a Spitfire, and have them ferried back to Texas to join the U.S. World War II vintage planes the CAF owns.

With Edwards on location are Col. Gerald Martin, Col. Lefty Gardner and Col. L. P. Nolen (father of the CAF), all from Texas, and Col. Milt Harradence from Canada.

Administering the school program within the policy directives of the board is a major task, when one considers that next to Webb AFB and Cosden Oil & Chemical Company, the schools constitute the biggest business (in dollars and personnel) in town.

plishment of the school's Master plan and the development of an area vocational school within the sphere of the comprehensive high school.

David Lawrence Does This Call For Equal Time?

WASHINGTON — Something significant happened on television last Sunday which could affect juries in the future. But it wasn't even noticedat least it has not brought any comthe bar and press which have been raising a fuss about pre-trial publicity

Dr. Benjamin Spock and the Rev. William Sloane Coffin Jr., who were recently indicted by a federal grand jury on charges of conspiring to encourage other persons to violate the draft law, argued their own case over NBC's nationwide program known as "Meet the Press." Dr. Spock was asked:

"WHY DID you openly violate a federal law?"

The answer was that he did so because the Vietnam War is escalating and he believes this is a wrong policv. He added:

"I would emphasize first that I think I am innocent and I think the young men who are resisting the draft are innocent and patriotic and courageous. But if the courts decide otherwise, then I am willing to go to jail; but I believe I am innocent.

DR. COFFIN SAID:

"It has always been the American tradition not to surrender your conscience to the state. And if you have a choice of violating your conscience or going to jail, you then do not violate your conscience . . . the law that we violated has yet to be tested for its constitutionality.

THE SUPREME COURT of the United States, in the famous case dement from some of those groups of cided in June, 1966, which overruled the verdict of murder against Dr. Samuel H. Sheppard of Cleveland, declared that he did not get a fair trial because of the publicity in the press and over television before and during the period of the proceedings. Dr. Sheppard was then tried again and

Ever since that decision, members of the bar and the press have debated what restrictions should be placed on publicity before and during trials. It had always been assumed heretofore that, if publicity in the local area is damaging to a defendant, his counsel could seek a transfer to some other county or area. Television, however, can cover not only one state but all of them at the same time.

THIS RAISES the question of why persons indicted for violating a lawsuch as Dr. Spock and Dr. Coffinare able to present one side of the case to the public. Should not the federal district attorneys, who represent the prosecutors, be entitled to "equal time" to give their side?

The defendant now enjoys a privilege which the prosecution is not likely to get unless authorized by law. Congress could pass a statute requiring that "equal time" be given and also stipulate that whatever is said about the case on television or radio would be just as privileged as if it were uttered in a courtroom.

THERE IS nothing wrong with pretrial publicity if the persons who are chosen for the jury can disassociate themselves from what they have heard and can listen to the testimony in the courtroom and judge it impartially and objectively. This means intelligent jurors — those who can erase from their minds any preconceptions and consider only the evidence offered in the courtroom. Most jurors have read something about cases prior to being chosen for jury duty, and they usually pledge themselves when selected to deal fairly with the facts as presented, irrespective of what they might have heard before the trial

THE WHOLE episode raises a question as to whether any restrictions on the press or television or radio should really be imposed. One answer would seem to be to let the prosecution and defense have "equal time" and give all the participants immunity from libel suits.

Marquis Childs The New Secretary Of Defense

WASHINGTON - Politics, as defined by John F. Kennedy, is the art of the possible. The new Secretary of Defense, Clark Clifford, might well have had this framed above his desk in his law office where the rich and the powerful sought his intercession in the labyrinth of government.

A PRACTICAL, pragmatic temperament is the hallmark of his initial success as adviser to President and then in accumulating a large fortune in a relatively short time. In this same pragmatic approach is reason to hope that he can help find a way out of the quagmire of Vietnam, not to mention the new trap of North Korea

As a realist Clifford knows that short of a reasonable compromise the Vietnam war is almost certain to expand, with Cambodia as the next theater. A greatly enlarged war threatens the disaster of direct bigpower confrontation. And, incidentally, it spells more political trouble for his friend. Lyndon Johnson, whom he has so long been counselling as a private citizen.

NO ONE COULD have expected the newly designated Defense Secretary in his first appearance before the Senate Armed Services Committee to expound any radical shift in policy. His irst task was to re-establish a working relationship with Congress where harassment of Robert S. McNamara had become a year-round sport, Clifford excels in easing real and imagined grievances

A SHOPPING list of the corporate have said in the past is patently ungiants Clifford has represented in private practice implies that he will take into his office ties with these giants conditioning his judgment in matters involving defense contracts. Beyond dispute he has served his clients well.

He can stand as Mr. Military-Industrial Complex himself.

To say that Clifford contrived Harry Truman's re-election in 1948 against all the odds is a slight exaggeration. Undoubtedly by his sage and steady counselling he contributed greatly to that result. Once Truman put his trust in a man he could take advice and act on it:

WHETHER THE polls are for the moment up or down Johnson is in a political bind much like that which brought Truman to the brink of rejection, first by his party and then by the voters. He confronts a far greater menace at home and in Asia than did Truman, who had a lucky target in the Eighty-worst Congress. For John son as for the country the stakes could hardly be higher.

In bringing Clifford from the back room into the fierce white light of a Cabinet post of incredible complexity the President put a high estimate on his value. For Clifford the opportunity is unparalleled. It dwarfs his experience with the peppery man from Missouri who fought an underdog fight to confound all the prophets and the pundits

IN THIS instance Clifford has a more complex principal to deal with The President does not always take kindly to advice that runs contrary to the Johnson view and this, as his close associates would be the first to say, is the understatement of a very long time. To prejudge the new Secretary of Defense by what he may fair, and that goes with double force for his debut before Congress. 

Rules On **Short Form**

This column of questions and answers on federal tax marters is previded by the local office of the U.S. Internal Revenue Service.

Q—Who can file the shor form, 1040A?

A-This form can be used in the following circumstances: 1-income is under \$10,000;

2-income consists entirely of wages subject to withholding and not more than \$200 from other wages, dividends and in-

The Form 1040A cannot be used by taxpayers who either itemize their deductions or who claim special tax credits or deductions such as the retirement income credit, sick pay exclusion, or moving expense deduc-

Further details on filing requirements are given in the instructions that accompany both the 1040 and 1040A tax forms. Q-How do you handle medical insurance premiums under

the new law? A-One-half of the premiums paid for medical insurance up to a maximum of \$150 may be deducted when you itemize your deductions. These premiums are not subject to the three per cent of income limitation that applies to other medical expenses. The balance of your premiums should be included with any other medical expenses.

The \$3 a month paid for supplementary benefits under medicare qualifies for this tax treatment.

Q-Too much was taken out for Social Security tax last year because I held two jobs. What should I do? A-You can take a credit for the excess Social Security tax

withheld by entering it on line 18 of Form 1040.
