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## ROCKY BOOM?

### Gov. Romney Is Expected To Withdraw

DETROIT (AP) — WJR-Detroit and the Columbia Broadcasting System today said Michigan Gov. George Romney will announce at a late afternoon news conference in Washington his withdrawal from the Republican presidential race.

Romney was not immediately available for comment. He was en route from Boston to Washington.

The report follows by four days a statement by New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller that he — Rockefeller — would accept a draft for the nomination, although he didn't believe there would be one.

Rockefeller made the comment in Detroit last Saturday. He was here to help raise funds for Romney.

## Mahon Questions

WASHINGTON (AP)—The question of how new programs to combat rioting in the cities would be paid for was raised Tuesday by Rep. George Mahon, D-Tex.

In a House speech, Mahon, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, said if expensive programs are recommended, he hopes they will spell out "how we are going to get the money."

"Is it morally right for a country to initiate programs which it is not willing to pay for?" Mahon asked in his speech. "If a program is worth having, it is worth paying for, especially at a time when there is a relatively high level of national prosperity."

## C-C Has \$4,302 In

## A Big Haul

NEW YORK (AP)—Two men with forged documents—one wearing a guard's uniform and carrying a revolver in a holster—conned employees at a cargo building at Kennedy airport out of two crates of the rare metal palladium valued at \$508,351.

The slick theft—latest in a series of major cargo hauls at the airport—was staged Tuesday at the KLM Royal Dutch Airlines cargo building.

A panel truck pulled up at the cargo building, and two men stepped out. One identified himself to the staff as a representative of a metals firm in Newark, N. J.

The 11 square blocks of palladium—which is similar to platinum—were loaded into the panel truck. The men signed receipts for the crates and drove away.

## Finally Gives Up

BONHAM (AP)—Sheriff's officers in this North-east Texas town are questioning a Dallas man who says he killed a Bonham resident more than 30 years ago and was never arrested.

Records in the courthouse here show that the beaten body of Adolphus Jones was discovered two miles southwest of here on Oct. 10, 1936.

The man returned to Bonham voluntarily to talk. Officers said, and will be given a polygraph test later in the week.

## Extortionist Fails

AMARILLO, Tex. (AP) — Police Tuesday retrieved \$7,500 that had been placed under a rock on a country road by an Amarillo oilman after an extortionist failed to pick up the money.

The oilman, Tom Marsh, told officers he put the money at the designated spot on the road Monday night after a telephone caller threatened to kill his three-year-old daughter. He said the extortionist called him twice Friday and again on Monday when he gave instructions as to where to leave the money.

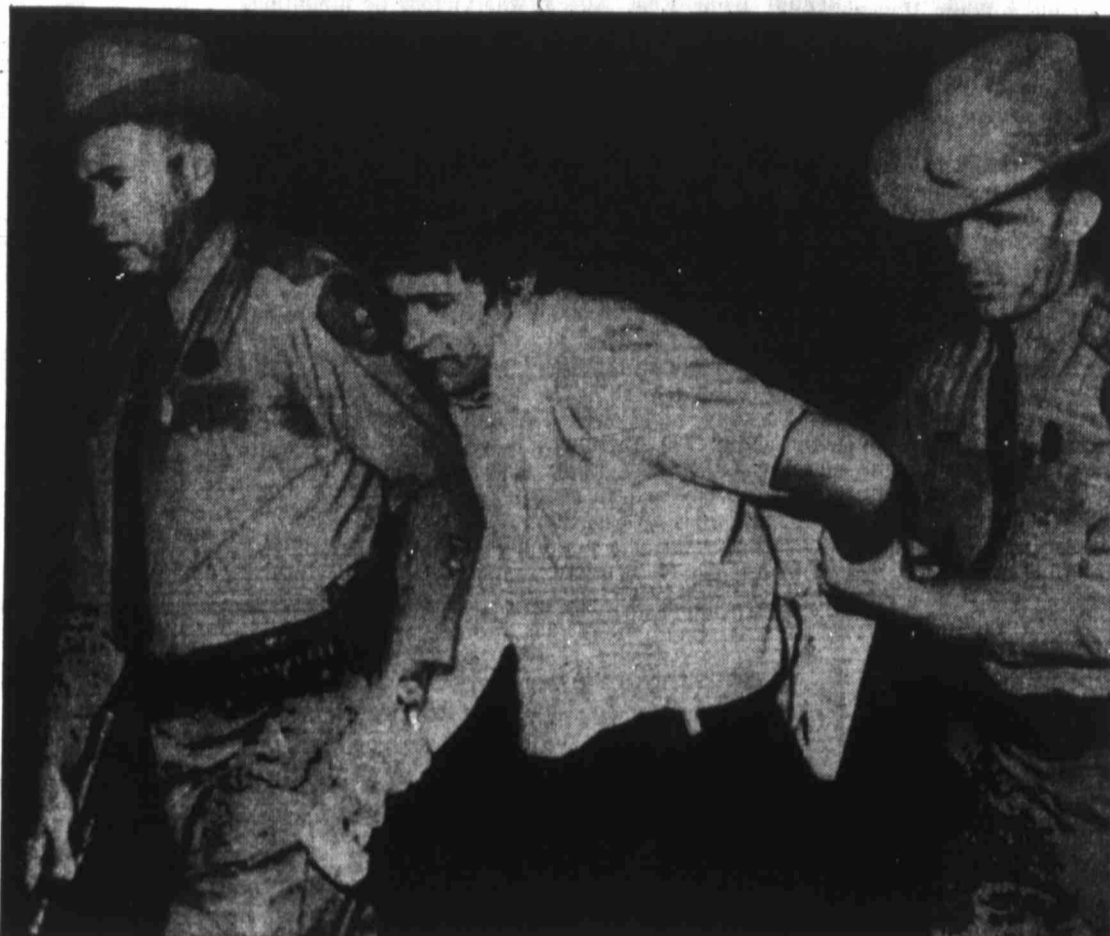

## LBJ Attends Party, Demonstrators Held

AUSTIN (AP) — A scuffle occurred and someone tossed a soft drink bottle as peace demonstrators tangled with state police Tuesday night while President Johnson attended Gov. John Connally's birthday party.

Officers arrested two University of Texas students, Randall Boykin, and Thomas Joseph Hannibal, both 20.

The pop bottle did not hit the President or his automobile, but did set off a brief scuffle between officers and the peace pickets.

The Department of Public Safety said Boykin, a junior from Corpus Christi, was charged before Justice of the Peace Frank McBee on charges of aggravated assault on an officer and use of abusive language. McBee set a total of \$500 in bonds on the two charges.

A spokesman at the Travis County Jail said Boykin had not made bond at 9 a.m. today.

The DPS said Hannibal, also a junior, who told reporters his

father is an officer at Randolph Air Force Base, was charged with aggravated assault. Hannibal said he "bumped" a highway patrolman with a picket sign.

The county jail said Hannibal was released on \$300 bond after spending about two hours in jail.

Johnson's brief speech at the gala birthday party for Connally set off considerable speculation about the governor. In his written speech the President said Connally is a man "whose greatest gifts to democratic government are still to come."

He did not elaborate about the "still to come."

Recently there was speculation in Austin and Washington that Connally would get a cabinet job. The speculation first involved the secretary of defense job or it had been offered to him but said that a cabinet job would be hard to turn down if offered.

Johnson made brief impromptu remarks about the peace pickets outside the gymnasium

saying jokingly, "When I saw the well dressed demonstrators outside I knew I was at the right place . . . I couldn't read the signs but I assume they read: 'Happy Birthday John.'"

Frank Erwin, chairman of the university board of regents, commented in his speech that "when it requires 300 policemen to assure the safety of the President of the United States on a university campus we should re-examine and determine what this is all about."

Johnson referred to Connally, a friend for years, as "almost a brother to me for 30 years."

SEIZURE

In congratulating the governor on his 51st birthday, the President said, "there is no man on this earth that I would rather have by my side than John Connally."

It was after Johnson spoke and aides were escorting the President to his car behind Gregory Gymnasium on the university campus that a flurry of shoving and pushing took place.

## Compromise Rights Bill Struggle May Be Over

WASHINGTON (AP) — A civil rights bill born of compromise appears destined for Senate passage after a six-week struggle.

The new bill could be presented today if proponents of civil rights legislation agree on the details before the Senate opens for business.

CHOKE OFF

The next move would be a renewed attempt to choke off a debate carried on by Southern and conservative Republican opponents since Congress reconvened Jan. 15.

No final vote on the bill itself is expected before next week at the earliest.

Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen, who twice has voted against ending the debate, told newsmen Tuesday "a very substantial measure of agreement" had been reached on the bill.

Dirksen said the compromise measure's open-housing provision "will be stronger than the one I helped kill two years ago."

The compromise open-housing

proposal would take effect in three stages, applying immediately to housing financed with federal aid and by the end of the year to big apartments and housing developments.

The third stage, applying in a limited degree to sale or rental of single-family dwellings, reportedly would take effect next year.

It would exempt single-family dwellings if the owners sell or rent the property themselves but would not permit them to instruct real-estate brokers to discriminate.

The House passed an open-

housing bill in 1966 which would have applied to about 40 per cent of the nation's housing. It was this measure which Dirksen helped defeat in the Senate. As currently written, the measure's open-housing provisions would apply to about 97 per cent of the nation's housing.

OUTLINED

Dirksen outlined for newsmen some of the proposed compromises involving the other part of the new bill—providing criminal penalties for use of violence to interfere with voting, jury service, use of public accommodations and other federally guaranteed rights.

## Gusty Thunderstorms Stage March Across State

Brisk showers and occasionally gusty thunderstorms marched from New Mexico across the Panhandle-Plains sector during the night and spread over most of the north half of Texas today.

FANNED

Cold north winds kept the rainy weather moving as they fanned a new breath of winter toward the southeast.

For a time Tuesday night the Weather Bureau placed a 100-mile wide belt centering on a line from west of Plainview to northeast of Abilene under a severe thunderstorm watch. The alert expired without word of severe damage.

At Lubbock, meanwhile, rain poured down so violently that the roof of the Texas Tech field-house sprung a leak and Tech's basketball game with Texas A&M was suspended for 45 minutes. Parts of Lubbock were peppered by pea-sized hail.

Winds gusting up to 60 miles

per hour raked Fort Worth during a thunderstorm before dawn.

And behind the new cold front snow fell in parts of Northern New Mexico while a mixture of rain and snow chilled the Eastern New Mexico area around Clovis, not far from the West Texas line.

Although some of the downpours were briefly torrential, early reports indicated rainfall amounts generally amounted to less than one-half inch.

By early morning the shower activity had progressed all the way across the state to around Texarkana and Marshall, also extending southward past Jasper in Southeast Texas.

FORECASTS

Forecasts indicated most of the moisture probably would clear out of Texas by tonight or early Thursday as cooler air comes mushrooming back to rout the balmy weather of the past few days.

## Viet Force Boosted By 4,000 Men

SAIGON (AP) — A 4,000-man brigade from the U.S. 2nd Airborne Division has arrived in Vietnam to bolster allied forces in a war now marked by renewed jungle fighting along with continued Communist pressure around Saigon.

### AIRLIFT

The U.S. Command announced today completion of the airlift of the reinforcements, including many veterans of Vietnam. They are assigned to the Americal Division, elements of which reported killing 148 of the enemy in a coastal engagement Tuesday at a cost of two dead and 14 wounded.

Viet Cong maintained pressure on Saigon overnight by bombardment of six military installations within a 25-mile arc of the capital, including a Saigon port facility.

North Vietnamese gunners fired more than 100 rounds of artillery, rocket and mortar fire at the base in the 24 hours up to dawn. Briefing officers said casualties and damage were light.

U.S. B52 Stratofortresses staged two saturation raids on suspected enemy troop concentrations and weapons positions six miles west of Khe Sanh.

A U.S. spokesman said air strikes and artillery bombardment of Communist positions around the base Tuesday killed 31 enemy troops, destroyed a .50-caliber machine-gun emplacement and touched off 36 secondary explosions among ammunition dumps and fuel stores.

The new arrivals, the 82nd Division's 3rd Brigade, are part of the 10,500 men President Johnson ordered from the United States two weeks ago in response to Gen. William C. Westmoreland's urgent request because of the Khe Sanh situation and the prospect of new Communist attacks on South Vietnam's cities and towns.

An additional 4,000 Marines are en route to Vietnam. An announcement is expected at any time of the deployment here of Marines of the 27th Regimental Landing Team, some of whose members were seen off Feb. 17 by Johnson at the El Toro Air Station in California.

The brigade of paratroopers raised U.S. troop strength in Vietnam to an estimated

504,000, still 21,000 short of the 525,000-man ceiling now planned. But Gen. Earle G. Wheeler, the chairman of the U.S. Joint Chiefs of Staff, left Saigon Sunday with a request from Westmoreland that Johnson raise that ceiling.

Along with the constant threat to Khe Sanh and the other U.S. Marine posts along the northern frontier, fear of another big Viet Cong drive into Saigon grew today as Communist gunners shelled the nearby Bien Hoa air base and other military targets around the South Vietnamese capital.

Planes and helicopters crisscrossed the night sky over Saigon and flares lighted the outskirts.

### 12 KILLED

Forty rounds of 122mm rockets streaked into the big allied base at Bien Hoa, 15 miles north of Saigon, before dawn. More Communist shells hit the headquarters of a U.S. Special Forces unit, and 25 rounds of 82mm mortars hit a South Vietnamese army unit.

The U.S. Command said casualties and damages were light.

## Cubans Lose Wild Gamble When Escape Boat Rammed

VIRGINIA BEACH, Va. (AP) — Three Cubans lost a wild gamble to win asylum in the United States when a 292-foot Cuban ship from which they fled in a lifeboat rammed their small craft in international waters off Virginia.

The captain of the Cuban ship messaged U.S. Coast Guardsmen on the scene that the three were his crewmen and were picked up from the water.

### SEIZED

Earlier the Cubans seized the ship, the 26 de Julio, but failed in an attempt to bring her into Norfolk when they could not get the anchor up, Coast Guardsmen said.

A Coast Guard vessel stood by but did not interfere because the incident occurred well beyond the three-mile limit.

The episode, covering 15 hours, reached its climax off the coast of Virginia Tuesday afternoon.

At 2 a.m. Tuesday the Cuban ship radioed that the crew sought political asylum. She was instructed to head for Hampton Roads and the cutter Point Brown was dispatched to meet her with Master Boat-sweeper's Mate P. W. Caviness, 43, of Silver City, N.C., in command.

### ANCHOR

Caviness said he watched the ship anchor 10 miles east-northeast of Cape Henry Tuesday morning. He said he had instructions not to board the vessel but to try to get it into inland waters—inside the U.S. territorial limit.

"But they were having trouble getting their anchor up," he related, and about 1:30 p.m. he saw three men lower a lifeboat, climb into it and start rowing away.

Soon, he said, a number of men appeared on the deck, the ship got under way, dragging its anchor, and rammed the lifeboat twice.

On a third pass, Caviness said, the ship stopped between the cutter and the lifeboat and "I didn't see them (the three men) anymore."

He didn't interfere, Caviness said, because he was awaiting orders and "I wasn't prepared to go out there and take action that might involve the whole nation and might be over my head."

### TAKE STEPS

He said that by the time of the third pass he had received orders to "take all necessary steps to see that this Cuban vessel did not run over this boat a third time. . . my guns were uncocked."

Lt. Cmdr. R. H. Elkins, 43, of North Cape May, N.J., was aboard the Coast Guard tug

aboard, including the master, in the brig.

Puri said the four took \$3,500 in Canadian currency, drugs and other goods, and planned to "escape to the United States."

BACK ABOARD

Elkins said Puri told him the three defectors were back aboard the 26 de Julio, wet and cold but otherwise in good shape. However, Elkins said he did not see them.

## Reds Want Unconditional Bombing Halt, Then Talk

PARIS (AP) — The French government has received explicit information that an unconditional halt in American bombing of North Vietnam would be a "necessary and sufficient condition for an opening of negotiations," a government spokesman said today.

RISK

Information Minister Georges Gorse said the French government believes that failure to open negotiations increases each day the risk of seeing the war spread to other parts of the world.

He read a prepared statement after the regular weekly Cabinet meeting with President Charles de Gaulle.

The statement said: "The declaration of U Thant according to which the unconditional cessation of American bombardments of North Vietnam would be a necessary and sufficient condition for the opening of peace negotiations corre-

sponds to information explicitly received by the French government.

"The Cabinet considers, as does the secretary-general of the United Nations, unless such negotiations are opened, the war of destruction now being conducted in Southeast Asia will continue to spread and take on a character which threatens more every day to endanger the peace of the world."

In a statement issued in New York Saturday, Thant said "it could be reasonably assumed" that an unconditional halt in U.S. bombing of North Vietnam would be followed by "meaningful talks . . . perhaps within a matter of a few days."

FIRST

Thant's statement was his first public declaration after a trip to New Delhi, Moscow, London and Paris where he discussed the Vietnam war. In both New Delhi and Paris Thant met North Vietnamese diplomats.

## Price Tag Put On Integration

WASHINGTON (AP) — Pentagon sources say a secret report estimates it would cost \$77 million to meet a presidential riot commission's recommendation that Negro membership in National Guard units be substantially increased.

Top military and administration officials are debating whether to ask Congress for funds to initiate "what the sources described as a three-year nationwide recruiting effort."

A congressional expert on military programs said the \$77 million estimate may be low. "Soldiers are an expensive commodity," he said.

Last Aug. 10, less than two

weeks after it was appointed by President Johnson to investigate riots in Newark, Detroit and elsewhere, the Advisory Commission on Civil Disorders reported that only 5,000 Negroes were among the nation's 500,000 guardsmen.

This deficiency, it declared, "must be corrected as soon as possible." The commission did not set a specific goal or a deadline.

Johnson immediately sent the recommendation to Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara with the notation: "This is a matter of highest urgency and I know you will give it your immediate attention."



# Col. George Franks Retires At Webb AFB

When the flag is lowered at Webb Air Force Base at 5 p.m. Thursday, brief ceremonies will mark the retirement from the Air Force of Col. George E. Franks, whose military career has spanned 28 years.

More than five of these years have been at the local base, giving him one of the longest tenures of a senior officer.

Since May, 1966, Col. Franks has been base commander. He came to Webb in July, 1962, to be commander of the Maintenance and Supply Group. About a year later, when command designations were changed, Col. Franks became deputy commander for materiel, a post he assumed until he became base commander.

**ACTIVE IN CIVILTY**

The popular officer has been extremely active in community activities. A continuing member of the Base - Community Council, he has had an important role in almost every joint community-base function. He has had interests as well in strictly civilian activities, lending counsel and a helping hand in myriad areas.

His civic activities have been matched by those of Mrs. Franks, the former Virginia Hall of San Antonio. She has been a long-time director and active worker for the Big Spring Concert Association, is serving this year as president of the Howard County unit of the American Cancer Society, has worked with the Heart Association, and has had membership in the 1930 Hyperion Club. In addition to being a member of the executive board of the Officers Wives Club, she is an honorary president of the NCO Wives Club, whose activities she has assisted.

**HONORS**

The Franks have two children, Mrs. Anne Fobair, and a son, Larry. They will make their home in Austin.

Many honors came to materiel units during Col. Franks' tenure. As early as March, 1963, materiel and supply group received high praise for outstanding performance in command inspections.

In 1964, Webb's maintenance division was selected as outstanding in the Training Command and was named as the Command Daedalian nominee. Both the 3560th Organizational Maintenance and Field Maintenance Squadrons received the Presidential Unit Citation for outstanding service. Cost reduction goal savings were consistently met or oversubscribed.

**IN FAR EAST**

From June, 1950, to March, 1952, Col. Franks served with the Far East Air Force and participated in the Korean conflict. He arrived in Korea the day following the Communist invasion of South Korea.

He wears the Bronze Star along with battle stars for action in the United Nations Defensive and Offensive actions, the Chinese Communist Forces Intervention, the First U.N. Counteroffensive, and the Second Korean Winter.

He served in Korea as chief of the Technical Inspection Division of the Inspector General's office, Fifth Air Force Advance Headquarters at Taegu, Seoul and Pyongyang.

**BACK TO PACAF**

Col. Franks returned to Korea in September, 1959, to assume command duties as Assistant to the Group Commander in the 6146th Advisory Group at Seoul, Korea. He remained with the Pacific Air Force and returned to Teague AB, Korea, to command the Southern Sector of the Advisory Group.

In August, 1960, Col. Franks was assigned as Inspector General of the 41st Air Division at Johnson Air Station, Japan — his last assignment before coming to Webb.

Col. Franks is a native of Winslow, Wash., although he now considers Austin his home. He has been on continuous active duty since August, 1940. The colonel obtained his commission through the Air Force's aviation cadet program in that same year.

A command pilot since 1955, Col. Franks has more than 6,000 flying hours. His decorations include the Bronze Star with oak leaf cluster, the Air Defense Service Medal, and the Air Campaign Medal.

**INSTRUCTOR**

In March, 1952, Col. Franks was reassigned to the Air University at Maxwell AFB, Ala., where he remained until August, 1956. The colonel was an academic instructor as well as the maintenance staff member in the Air Command and Staff College, one of the university's principal components.

Col. Franks taught in the logistics division and academic instructor's course, as well as the technical, professional, operational and maintenance branches of the Materiel Division.

The heaters were sold between September, 1962 and December, 1966. A few may have been sold through retail outlets in 1967. The models bear the tag "Gas Fired Baseboard Thermostat Wall Heater," and have the Homart numbers 133 72561 or 133 72561; 133 72562 or 133 72561; 133 72563; 133 72564 or 133 72566 or 133 72566.

The company's decision to recall the heaters was based on field investigation which showed some of the units had developed defects. In some cases, they had passed all lab tests but officials said the design, while sound, did not allow sufficient latitude for human error.

## Gen. Wheeler Due To Seek More Troops

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Johnson returned to Washington today for a White House meeting at which Chairman Earle G. Wheeler of the Joint Chiefs of Staff was expected to seek more U.S. troops for Vietnam.

Gen. Wheeler, who just visited the battle zone, was to meet at breakfast with Johnson and the President's top-level military, diplomatic and intelligence advisers. A full-scale Cabinet meeting, described as a regular session, was set for later in the day.

There was no indication the Wheeler-Johnson conference would produce any immediate announcement that more fighting men will be sent to Vietnam. Johnson aides continued to insist, as recently as Tuesday night, that no formal request for reinforcements had been presented to the President.

However, Johnson said last week more men will be dispatched if needed. And Gen. William C. Westmoreland, the U.S. commander in Vietnam, told The Associated Press that "with additional troops, we could more effectively deny the enemy his objective, capitalize on his recent defeats to a greater degree in both time and place, and clearly demonstrate to Hanoi our firm determination to prevent him from taking over any part of South Vietnam."

Those scheduled to join Johnson and Wheeler included Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara, Secretary of State Dean Rusk, Director Richard Helms of the Central Intelligence Agency, Secretary of Defense-designate Clark Clifford, special assistant Walt W. Rostow and Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor, who will succeed Clifford as chairman of the Foreign Intelligence Advisory Board.

Johnson returned to the capital after a six-day stay at his Texas ranch, where he got a good bit of sun and considerable relaxation. He seemed in an energetic, buoyant mood on his return.

## British Bill To Restrict Colored Immigration OK'd

LONDON (AP) — The Labor government's emergency bill to restrict colored immigration to Britain from East Africa was headed today for speedy passage into law after receiving overwhelming approval in the House of Commons.

Despite loud censure of the immigration bill from liberals, both Laborite and Conservative legislators paid heed to the urban masses who fear the competition for housing and jobs from colored immigrants from Commonwealth countries.

**SILENCE**

The vote in Commons on the crucial second reading of the bill Tuesday night was 372-62, with about 180 members abstaining or staying away. The opposing votes came from 35 Laborites, 15 Conservatives, 10 Liberals and the two nationalist members from Scotland and Wales.

The House heard the result in silence, with no expression of victory or jubilation.

After speedy approval in Commons on third reading and in the House of Lords, the bill was expected to get the royal assent of Queen Elizabeth II and become law by Thursday evening.

The bill is the result of a flood of immigrants of Indian and Pakistani origin who are being driven out of Kenya by new laws discriminating against non-Africans. Some 100,000 Indians and Pakistanis in Kenya chose to retain British citizenship when the East African territory became independent at the end of 1963. Almost half of them were born in Kenya.

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and have never been Britain, India or Pakistan.

**ASIANS ARRIVE**

The bill allows the government to set an immigration quota of 1,500 a year plus dependents on British citizens born outside of Britain whose parents also were not native-born. Critics charged the bill was racist and a breach of Britain's obligations to her overseas citizens. Home Secretary James Callaghan told Commons it "must face the fact" that a million members of minority groups in former colonies had British passports and might descend on Britain.

Callaghan made one concession to the critics. Reversing himself, he said citizens refused admission would have the right of legal appeal.

About 700 Asians arrived from Kenya Tuesday.

"If this bill were allowed to become law," he said, "we might just as well pass a bill allowing people to go out... and shoot milk cows."

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## Panel Supports 4-Year Terms

AUSTIN (AP)—The qualifications for governor set out in the state constitution need no change, says a committee studying the constitution.

Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Canyon at first said the minimum age for governor perhaps should be raised from 30 to 35.

But Rep. Randy Pendleton, Andrews, one of Speaker Ben Barnes' top aides, said he thought it should remain at 30. Barnes is 29.

Barnes is running for lieutenant governor. If he runs for governor in 1970, he would be 31. If he runs in 1972, he would be 33.

The executive branch committee of the Constitutional Revision Commission agreed Tuesday to leave the qualifications as they are.

The committee generally favored four-year terms for governor with some kind of limitation. Thirty-six states have four-year terms. In 15 of these the incumbent cannot succeed himself. In seven, there is a limit of two successive terms. Fourteen have two-year terms for their governors.

The committee also favored increasing the governor's powers, which are tightly controlled by the present constitution.

Hazlewood said the governor should have enough power to make modern programs work effectively but no more.

## Predicts Passage Of LSD Measure

WASHINGTON (AP)—The acting chairman of a House Commerce subcommittee predicts the House will overwhelmingly pass the bill to impose penalties for possession of the hallucinatory drug LSD.

Rep. Paul G. Rogers, D-Fla., told a reporter Tuesday the subcommittee probably will send the administration bill to the floor before Easter.

Subcommittee hearings ended Tuesday with assurances by Commissioner of Narcotics Henry L. Giordano that proposed penalties for possession of the mind-bending drug would be aimed at pushers, rather than experimenting students.

**STRONGER PENALTIES**  
"As far as I am concerned,"

Giordano told a questioner, "these penalties are not aimed at putting young people in jail. They are aimed at the trafficker."

Rep. Tim Lee Carter, R-Ky., who had called the possession portion of the bill "absolutely unenforceable," said he would support it, provided it is not used to imprison high school and college students who experiment with dangerous drugs.

The bill provides a maximum one-year penalty for possession of hallucinogens, depressants and stimulants, and five years and \$10,000 for manufacturers, sellers and distributors of the drugs. Even stronger penalties are provided for adults who sell them to minors.

## Albuquerque Teachers Will Return Thursday

ALBUQUERQUE, N.M. (AP)—More than 80,000 pupils in Albuquerque and nearby Belen will return to their classrooms Thursday for the first time in a week. Schools there and in many other New Mexico communities remained closed today due to sanctions by protesting teachers.

Schools at Albuquerque and Belen were in the final day of teachers' strike that began last Thursday. More than 15,000 students at Las Cruces also remained at home as their teachers held the second of two professional study days for discussion of school financing problems.

## Texan Might Make Groundhog Shiver

PARIS, Tex. (AP)—Ralph Bolyard of Powderly doesn't believe in all that groundhog and shadows and bad weather stuff.

But he threatened that if Paris has bad weather after the little fellow saw his shadow Feb. 2 he will act.

Bolyard owns a pet groundhog. Captured him in New Lexington, Ohio, and keeps him in a backyard cage.

And he declared that if the bad weather persisted, he would forcibly extract his pet from his burrow and make him shiver outside like people.

South was reluctant to permit the fate of his six heart contract to rest solely on a finesse and, in attempting to improve his odds, he uncovered a method that assured him of success.

When South received a positive response to his opening demand bid of two hearts, he was determined to reach a slam. Inasmuch as a prolonged investigation was not apt to produce much additional information he decided not to dally and, after East overcalled with three spades, South proceeded directly to six hearts.

West opened the ten of spades which was covered in

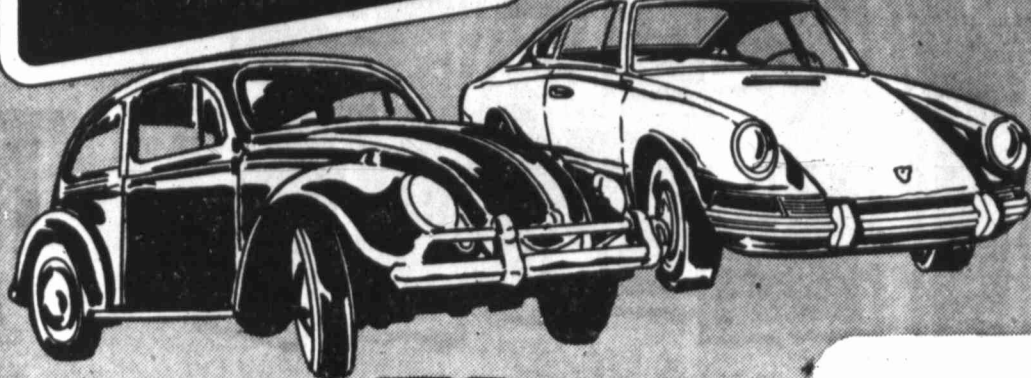
turn by dummy's jack, East's queen and declarer's ace.

An examination of the dummy revealed that South must lose a spade trick. The fate of the slam, then, depended on bringing in the diamond suit without declarer's help. Inasmuch as declarer has a two way finesse for the queen, it appears that he must determine which opponent has the missing honor.

South resolved to postpone his decision until the last possible moment, in favor of a plan that might eliminate guesswork altogether. He first cashed the ace of clubs, followed by the ace of hearts, and then a small heart to North's nine—which drew the adverse trump.

The nine of clubs was led, covered by East's jack and ruffed by South. Another heart to the ten permitted declarer to lead dummy's remaining club—the ten. When East covered with the queen, South did not ruff, however; instead, he discarded the three of spades, placing his opponent on lead.

East was hopelessly employed. If he returned a club, declarer could ruff in dummy while he discarded a diamond from his hand. If East led back a spade, it would establish North's jack. And finally, the return of a diamond removes the guess from that suit.

## Keep In Full Control By Mastering Your Mind

"Inner-Balance" Big Spring enjoys the reputation of being a progressive city. The progress that has taken place here didn't just happen. Big Springers, who were turned on, made it happen. To these progress-minded Big Springers, whom we admire, we dedicate this series.

The gap between on and off is often the difference between lightness and darkness. When we learn how to turn ourselves on, we acquire an inner-balance — the type that lets us know who we are, what we stand for, and how we should behave. In short, inner-balance means we select and control the thoughts in our mind, and command our conduct.

None of us are given inner-balance. Each of us acquires this balance with a systematic investment of our time, effort and judgment.

Not long ago, two individuals were rude to an acquaintance of mine, named Doug. When I asked Doug how he was able to maintain his poise and not react in a similar manner, he asked me, "Why should I do that? Why should I let rude people decide how I'm going to act? Why should I catch a mood I don't want?"

refreshing. By mastering his mood and emotional temperature, Doug let us know he was in full control of himself—like a thermostat controlling the climate, instead of a thermometer at the mercy of a wide range of emotions.

Nearly all of us can achieve the same degree of skillful control of our actions and attitudes. Our first step is to turn ourselves on in the area of acting on our own feeling and impulses — and discover the hidden inner-balance we now possess, but do not apply.

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# Gov. Reagan Raps Land Assessment

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP) — Gov. Ronald Reagan says the Los Angeles County Assessment Appeals Board placed a "very unrealistic" property tax value on his Malibu Hills property.

The board on Tuesday boosted the assessed value of the property from \$7,500 to \$54,000, triggering about a \$5,000 annual increase in property taxes Reagan will have to pay on the 54 acres. Asked about this later at a news conference, Reagan said "no one in his right mind" would put such a high assessment on the land.

Reagan declined to say if he thought the action was motivated by politics.

Reagan added: "... This must mean then that some 200,000 acres of property in Malibu Hills is under-assessed. It is going to be a great hardship for a great many homeowners if it is to be reassessed on this present basis because this is a very unrealistic value placed on the land."

The appeals board also increased the assessment on 236 acres of Malibu land Reagan sold to Fox Realty Co. from \$229,200 to \$364,800.

Bryan Stevens, a Valinda teacher, complained about Reagan's original assessment. County Assessor Philip E. Watson, who set the original valuation, said the board "opened the door to anyone who has a beef with his neighbor to come in here and harass him."

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# No Further Tonkin Gulf Hearings Are Scheduled

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Senate Foreign Relations Committee reportedly plans no further hearings on the disputed Gulf of Tonkin incidents.

It will push instead, a committee source says, for asserting a congressional iron hand over U. S. military commitments.

In questioning Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara last week the committee chairman, Sen. J. W. Fulbright, D-Ark., indicated he might want to call more witnesses.

But the source said the senator had changed his mind.

**POINT MADE**  
"Unless the administration trots out more celebrities to be interviewed, the committee won't go any further," the source said, referring to interviews granted recently by Capt. John J. Herrick, who commanded the two destroyers involved in the Tonkin incidents.

"Sen. Fulbright is quite satisfied that the committee has made its point. That was to make clear that the Gulf of Tonkin incident lifted from Congress and the public the right to debate the issues in Vietnam."

Congress, with Fulbright leading the way, passed a resolution empowering the President "to take all necessary measures" to prevent further aggression after the two destroyers reported they were attacked in the gulf by North Vietnamese boats.

President Johnson and top aides have frequently cited the 1964 resolution as authority for subsequently increasing U. S. involvement in Vietnam.

**PAINED**  
Pained at this interpretation, the Foreign Relations Committee last November passed a national commitments resolution. Fulbright will take it to the Senate floor next month.

Joint resolutions such as those pertaining to Formosa, the Middle East and the Gulf of Tonkin are a proper method of granting authority, provided that they are precise as to what is to be done and for what period of time, and provided that they do in fact grant authority and not merely express approval of undefined action to be taken by the President, "the resolution says.

Webb, seeking \$4.37 billion next fiscal year for his National Aeronautics and Space Administration, also told the Senate Space Committee the Soviets "are ahead and will remain ahead" in development of heavy-payload space rockets.

Webb said NASA is developing a nuclear engine to increase its payloads and added "We'll be beating the Russians — but developing enough technical ability to catch up with them as we did on missiles."

A large crowd at the First Presbyterian Church family night supper meeting Tuesday heard the Hon. Levy Tavares, Brazilian congressman, tell how he sought to infuse the spirit of Christianity into public service.

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# Kremlin's Confab Plans Giggled By Romania Reds

BUDAPEST, Hungary (AP) — The Soviet Union and Romania have clashed head-on at the Budapest meeting of 66 Communist parties but a chorus of other parties supports the Kremlin's plan for a world Communist conference next November or December.

Its official aim of the world conference is to restore unity to the fractured Communist movement, but the Chinese Communist party and others oppose the Soviet aims. Most of these parties stayed away from the Budapest meeting, which was called to organize the world conference.

A communique issued today

Union hesitated to force a conference that some parties would boycott. But now the Soviets are clearly determined to press ahead with a rump conference with only about half the world's Communist parties represented.

The communique said Mikhail A. Suslov the Soviet party ideologist who long steered the world Communist movement, told the approximately 150 delegates that the Kremlin favored a conference of Communist parties in November or December.

Several of the 66 parties in Budapest, including those of Romania and Norway, can be expected to stay away. Fifteen parties skipped the Budapest meeting.

For several years the Soviet

South Africa, Ecuador, Ceylon, Chile, West Germany and the United States echoed Suslov's position. Several added, apparently with Soviet guidance, that the conference should be in Moscow.

But Romania's Paul Niculescu-Mizil, a relative newcomer to world Communist meetings, stood up against Suslov and called for "creation of conditions for the participation of all Communist parties" in a conference, the communique said.

That would mean waiting for the Chinese and Russians to solve their differences, something that is not in sight.

Representatives of the small, Moscow-line parties of Spain,

## North Vietnamese Units Clash With Royal Army

VIENTIANE, Laos (AP) — North Vietnamese elements clashed with the royal army forces five miles north of Attapeu in southeastern Laos today. No report of casualties reached Vientiane but military sources termed the action as minor. North Vietnamese troops reinforced by Communist units from the Saravane front also clashed with government forces two miles southwest of the town of Lao Ngam, northwest of Attapeu. Reinforcements were reported trucked down Highway 23 through a bypass around the provincial capital town of Saravane. In Saravane, the situation was static with Communist probing actions six miles northwest of the town. Pathet Lao elements attacked a police station north of the royal capital of Luang Prabang. Two policemen were reported killed and the chief of the district of Paksou 25 miles north of Luang Prabang was reported wounded during the action.

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## South Korean Government Plans To Arm Million Men

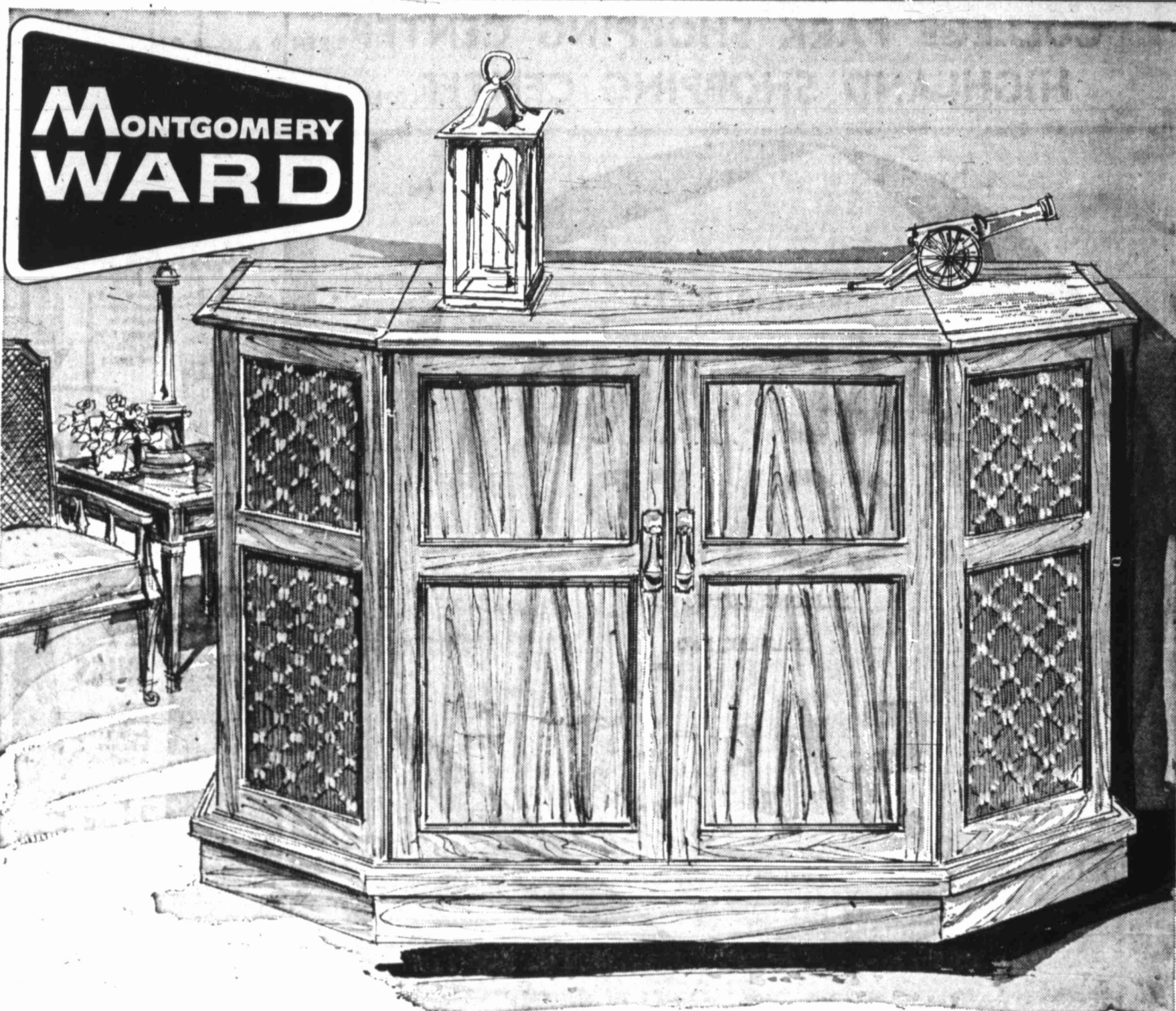
SEOUL (AP) — The South Korean government plans to organize a reserve corps of two million men to crush North Korean military provocations, President Chung Hee Park said today. One million reservists will be armed by the end of this year, said Park, who predicted a further increase in North Korean intrusions across the border. "If the reserve corps is well organized and mobilized effectively, we don't have to worry about an attack on South Korea by (North Korean Premier) Kim Il-sung's army," he told a meeting of the National Veterans Association. **WEAPONS PLEA** South Korea, which has a 560,000-man army, became increasingly concerned about its defense after North Korean commandos tried to assassinate Park in Seoul and the North Koreans seized the U.S. intelligence ship Pueblo last month. North Korea has an army estimated at 400,000 men and a militia of one million men and women. Outgoing Defense Minister Kim Sung-eun said today he had outlined the need for more modern weapons for South Korea's regular armed forces in a letter to Johnson and 117 other U.S. leaders asking for an increase in American aid. While not officially disclosed, that aid is believed to run \$200 million to \$300 million a year. Kim resigned Tuesday because of the North Korean attempt to assassinate Park and the President named former Lt. Gen. Choi Young-hi to succeed him.

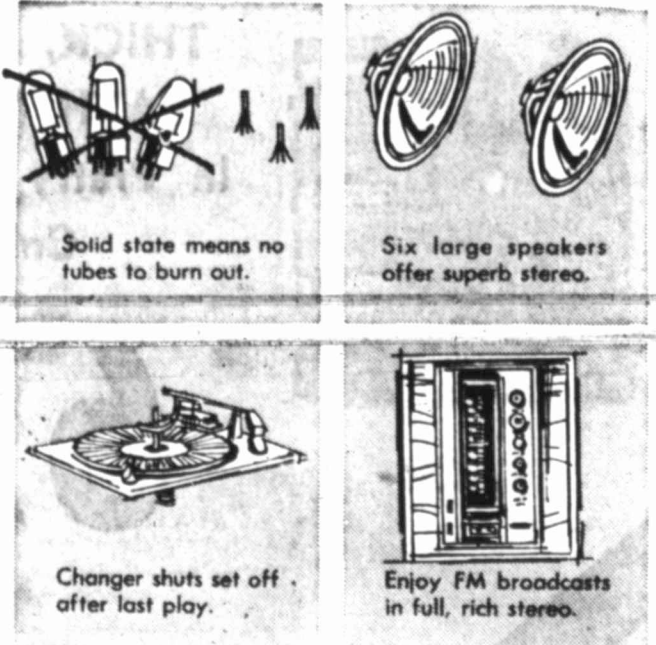

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — The solemnity of Ash Wednesday ushered in the 40 days of Lent and officially ended New Orleans' Mardi Gras. There was a gigantic block party on every block of downtown New Orleans as a warm day—the temperature reached 60—drew visitors and townspeople to watch innumerable parades by carnival krewes, marching societies and strangely costumed maskers. 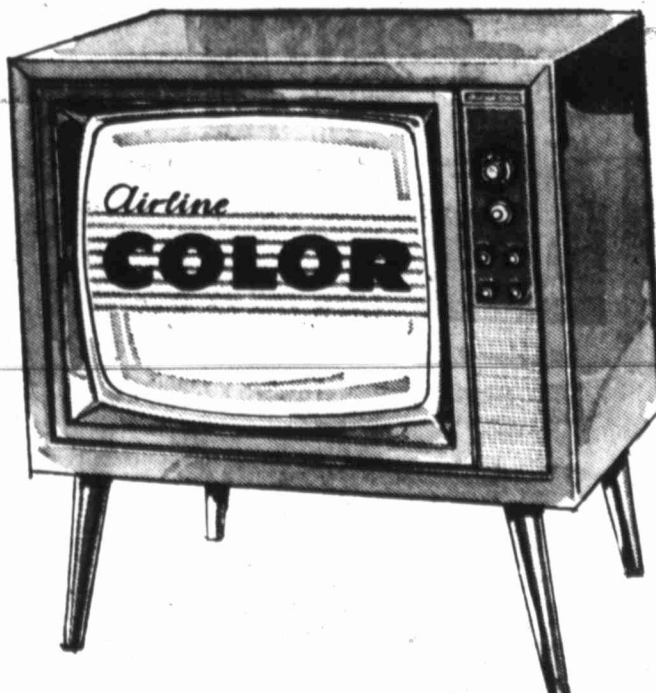

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## LANDMARK OF MITCHELL COUNTY LEGENDS

### Lone Wolf Mountain To Get Marker

COLORADO CITY (SC) — Lone Wolf Mountain, a saddle-shaped hill about four miles north of Loraine, is to be honored with an official Mitchell County Historical Society Friday, at 2:30 p.m. The marker has been placed in a corner of the Loraine Cemetery south of US 80, and the ceremony and dedication will be held there with Dr. Bruce Johnson, Loraine mayor, as the speaker.

Charley Thompson, Colorado City banker and civic leader who grew up in Loraine, will act as master of ceremonies. The "mountain" is one by name only, but it looms large on the flat plains of Mitchell County and larger in county folklore. Myth and legend has it that the mountain was named for Chief Lone Wolf, supposedly a Comanche chieftain buried on its flat top, or for Kiowa Chief Lone Wolf, who led his raiding parties through the Mitchell and Howard County areas. Old timers in the area preferred the first story; later day historians, in attempting to identify with a known historical figure, lean toward the latter.

But a 100 years ago, there were probably as many Indian Lone Wolfs as there are Smiths in the telephone directory, and it is likely that some Indian is immortalized by name. At any rate, the Indians were there. There is evidence they attempted to shape the native quartzite along the mountain-top into tools and weapons, and it is said that quartzite arrow-points have been found near the mountain.

In October, 1956, this newspaper carried a picture of Frank Stevenson of Abilene with a copper pot found on the western half of the mountain in the mid-1920's. A sandstorm had uncovered the top edge of a jar or pot of hammered copper, weighing about 3 1/4 pounds. Stevenson said bones were found under the pot, and it was full of black stones and beads. The jar was kicked around the yard for a number of years and the stones and beads were lost, but Stevenson still had the pot in 1956.

Bruce Frazier, of Howard County Junior College, looked at a picture of the object at the time and said that the jug might be Spanish or Indian. "The thing is of typical Indian design." And he pointed out that Indians made copper-ware. Lone Wolf, whoever he might have been, was a name supplier, since his name is woven into the fabric of Mitchell County nomenclature. Lone Wolf Creek, which rises near the mountain and flows through downtown Colorado City and into the Colorado River, is mentioned in deeds as early as 1884, and the mountain might have been named for the creek, instead of the other way around.

Colorado City has a drive-in movie named Lone Wolf, the Colorado High School annual is the Lone Wolf, the Colorado High School Wolves play in Wolf Stadium, and host the Lone Wolf basketball tournament. There is a Lone Wolf Cemetery near Loraine, and there was once a Lone Wolf Post Office, a rural school and a church near there.

### Commission Sets Hearings, Calls For Bids Tuesday

The Big Spring City Commission meeting Tuesday was largely an evening of setting public hearings and calling for bids. Public hearings were set on the annual budget, an appeal from the planning and zoning commission, and an annexation ordinance for the original "big spring" site. Bids were requested for water and sewer improvements in the Allendale Road area, a street sweeper, and for a bank depository of city funds. Ike Robb asked the commission to set a hearing on a zoning change in the Highland South area, off Goliad, which has been denied by the Planning and Zoning Commission. An apartment center is planned for the site and it is currently zoned for single family residence. The public hearing was called for March 14 at 5:15 p.m. in the City Hall.

Public hearing on the annual budget was set for March 25, at the suggestion of Larry Crow, city manager, the last regular meeting of the commission for the fiscal year, and the annexation hearing will be held March 12. Commissioners decided to receive bids March 21 from private contractors on installing water and sewer lines in the newly annexed areas along Allendale Road, Roberts Drive, and Cindy Lane. Ernest Lillard, director of public works, estimated this work will cost \$25,300, which will be financed out of the current budget and balance of the capital improvement fund. He said the streets would be rebuilt, if excessively damaged by the construction. Bids will be opened March 26 from banks desiring to serve as the city depository of funds during the new fiscal year, 1968-69. A replacement street sweeper, included in the forthcoming new budget, was discussed at length by the commission. Although a new type of sweeper which has proven 70 per cent more efficient at El Paso is certain to be given a thorough study, Lillard said the specifications will be left open for all types of sweepers. Bids will be received until March 22, and commissioners will consider making an award at the March 26 meeting. The city's present sweepers are 1962 and 1963 models. west, was given first reading approval, at the request of Allan Risetter. The application was approved by the building inspector, health inspector, and police chief. Third and final readings for two zone changes were approved, including retail zoning for the tract in Coronado Hills area on FM 700, and Central Area zoning for the lots on the east side of Main, between Sixth and Seventh Streets. Lillard advised the commission that the engineering department had received a preliminary plat and plumbing plans for the new Clark's Department Store, at FM 700 and US 87.

# Shriver May Be Named Ambassador To France

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sargent Shriver's absence from the Illinois Democratic slate for this fall's elections is spurring speculation here the antipoverty chief may be appointed ambassador to France.

Shriver, 52, the former Peace Corps director who is the brother-in-law of Sens. Robert F. and Edward M. Kennedy, once appeared a likely choice for the Illinois Democratic party's nomination for either governor or U.S. senator.

**RUMORS FLY**  
But shortly after Illinois Democratic leaders announced their choice Tuesday of a Shriver-less slate, the rumor spread quickly in Washington that President Johnson would nominate the director of the Office of Economic Opportunity for the Paris post.

In Austin, Tex., White House press secretary George Christian said he had no information on moves involving Shriver. An OEO spokesman said there was no truth to the rumors. It was understood, however, that President Johnson offered

Shriver the Paris post several weeks ago but Shriver said he did not want to make up his mind at the time. The President is said to have told Shriver he would not fill the post immediately.

In an Associated Press interview a little more than a year ago, Shriver indicated he would not be adverse to being named to an ambassadorship. Illinois Democratic party leaders chose state Atty. Gen. William G. Clark to be the party's nominee for U.S. senator and Lt. Gov. Sanfuiel H. Shapiro for the governorship race.

Through a spokesman in the Office of Economic Opportunity, Shriver said he was not offered either nomination. He did not go to Chicago during the weekend to ask the party's backing for either post. Clark will oppose Republican incumbent Sen. Everett M. Dirksen, who has announced he'll seek re-election and who has been friendlier to Johnson than many others in the Senate, including Democrats.

Some Capitol Hill sources said they felt that if Johnson had backed Shriver for either the governor or Senate nominations Illinois party leaders would have named him to the slate.

## Silent Art Master Scores In One-Hour Performance

NEW YORK (AP) — Once a year Red Skelton treats the television audience to a one-man show in which the performer does what he does best—pantomime. His Tuesday night CBS hour for this season was a taped program of a pantomime performance he recently gave on a New York stage for an audience drawn from the United Nations.

Skelton, a master of the silent art, was by turns funny and sad, gay and wistful, staggeringly drunk and shaking with old age. He moved from one character to another with ease, used few props in most of his sketches and delighted his audience.

Although there were announcers on hand to give the names of Skelton's numbers—"A Girl Dressing in the Morning," "Man at a Drive-in Movie"—in English and French—the veteran clown had no problems of communication with anybody.

**SLAPSTICK**  
One of the most moving of his sketches was an old man watching a parade. And he apparently can not resist slapstick. Perhaps the least effective number in the show was the one in which he had some help, playing a raffish old man conducting a courtship with the agile little old lady next door.

## Adlai E. Stevenson III Left Off Illinois Ticket

CHICAGO (AP) — Illinois Democrats have launched their 1968 campaign without Adlai E. Stevenson III, and some party leaders denied implications that Stevenson was finished politically.

Stevenson, 37, had been mentioned as a possible candidate for governor or the U.S. Senate, but was left off the ticket by party leaders after he refused to pledge complete support of President Johnson's Vietnam policy.

"Whatever he may have lost with the professional politicians," State Rep. Anthony Scariano said of Stevenson, "he gained with the people who go to the voting booths."

**NOT DEAD**  
Mayor Richard J. Daley of Chicago, who headed the subcommittee that drew up the Illinois Democrats' 1968 election lineup Tuesday, was asked if he thought Stevenson was dead politically because he had been passed over. "He's got two more years to serve as state treasurer," Daley replied. "He told the committee members he would enthusiastically support the party ticket and I know he will."

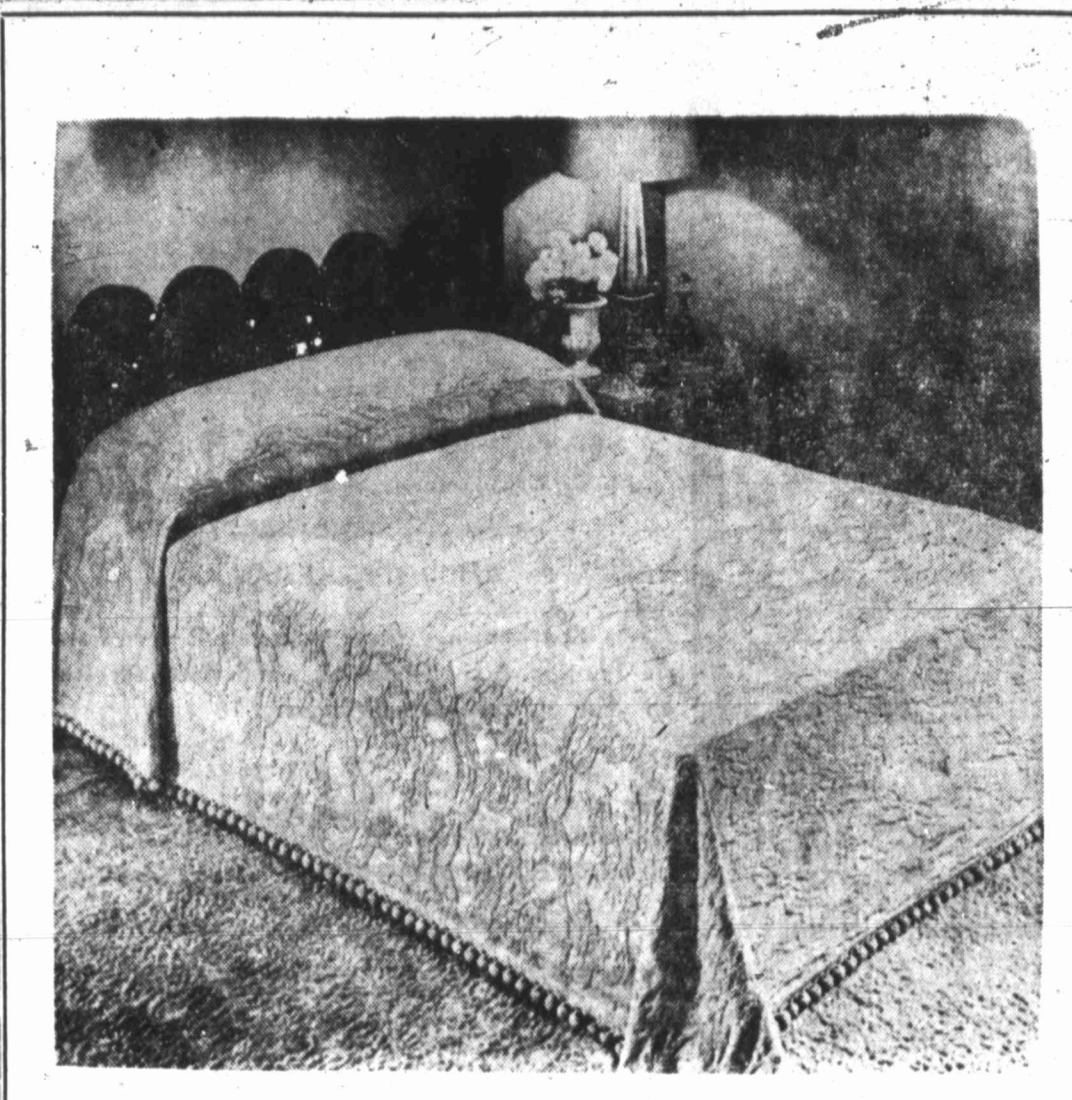
