

Huge Crossover In Indiana Due

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) — Crossover voting may play an important role in Indiana's presidential primary which dictates that write-in votes cannot be counted.

Party crossover voting may prove a big asset to Indiana Gov. Roger D. Branigan, running as a favorite son candidate against Sens. Robert F. Kennedy and Eugene J. McCarthy on the Democratic ballot Tuesday.

Richard M. Nixon is unopposed on the Republican ballot.

EASY DEAL

Crossing over is not difficult in Indiana, and because Nixon has no opposition and Branigan is personally popular with many Republicans, the governor could get substantial GOP support.

A voter requests the ballot of the party of his choice, and is subject to challenge only by a poll watcher of that party.

If challenged, the voter must sign an affidavit that he voted for a majority of that party's candidates in the preceding general election and intends to vote for do so again in the next general election.

Since the general election ballot is secret, there's no way to prove or disprove his affidavit.

In the case of a person who did not vote in the preceding election, for any reason included in the affidavit, the state is only that he intends to vote in the coming general election for health plan insurance to cover.

Israeli Units Kill Arab Infiltrators

TEL AVIV (AP) — Israeli troops patrolling the Negev Desert while most of their countrymen celebrated the 20th anniversary of their independence killed 12 Arab saboteurs in a clash Thursday night, the army announced.

This raised the total number of Arab infiltrators reported killed this week to 30 and made it the most successful week in the army's antiguerrilla campaign since the Arab-Israeli war last June.

SLAPS WRIST

Israel had defied the U.N. Security Council and its Arab neighbors Thursday by parading its military might and trophies of last year's war through an Arab sector of Jerusalem in the highlight of the independence celebration.

The Security Council had called on the Israelis to cancel the parade, contending it would harm chances of a peace agreement with the Arabs. Thursday night the council slapped Israel's wrist with a unanimous resolution "deeply deploring" the holding of the parade.

JERICHO BATTLE

The army said about 125 guerrillas have been killed since last September, when Arab commando activities accelerated.

Two Israelis were wounded, one seriously, in the fight Thursday night near the settlement of Neot Hakikar, on the border with Jordan. An army spokesman said mines, Soviet machine guns, hand grenades and explosives were found near the bodies of the saboteurs.

Earlier this week, the army said a patrol killed 13 infiltrators Sunday night near Jericho, in the West Bank territory seized from Jordan in the war last June.

Military sources said they believe the sudden growth in size of guerrilla bands—previously they rarely exceeded five men—is due to the saboteurs' belief that they can break through Is-

MARCH AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — The progress being made by former President Dwight D. Eisenhower since suffering a mild heart attack Monday continues to satisfy his doctors.

A late bulletin said "there has been no recurrence of any difficulties. Gen. Eisenhower remains at complete bed rest in the cardiac care unit."

The general spent another comfortable day, the announcement said.

Eisenhower, 77, was flown by helicopter to the air base hospital from his winter home at Palm Desert, near Palm Springs. He is expected to remain hospitalized at March for several weeks.

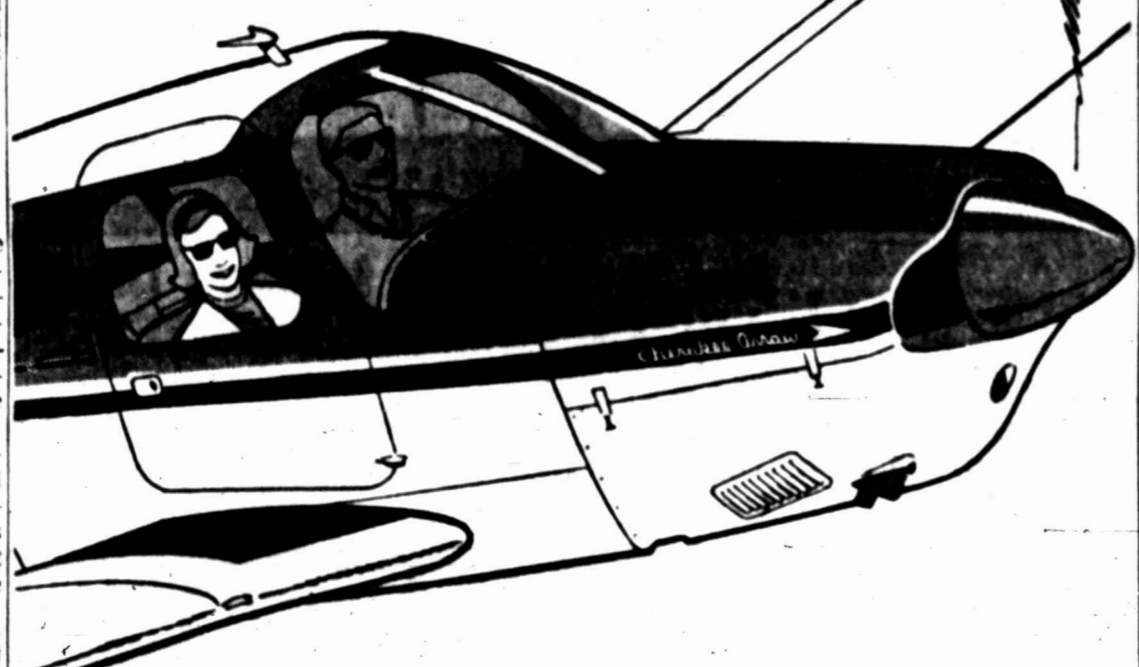

Brother Of Suspected King Assassin Has Disappeared

CHICAGO (AP) — Jerry Ray, brother of the man sought on a charge of murdering Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., has quit his job at a north suburban golf club and disappeared, the Chicago Tribune said today.

Ray's disappearance was reported a few hours after he appealed through an interview with another Chicago morning newspaper, the Sun-Times, for his brother, James Earl Ray, to surrender.

The Tribune quoted an official at the Sportsman Country Club near Northbrook as saying that Jerry Ray quit his job at the club a day after his photograph appeared in a national magazine. Ray had used a Wheeling post office address but lived in a room at the club, the paper said.

"We don't know where he went," the club official was quoted. "He didn't leave a forwarding address. I guess he got tired of being interviewed."

In the Sun-Times interview, Ray, 32, expressed fears that his brother was dead and said other members of the family also doubted that he was alive. "If he is still alive," Ray said, "I urge him to surrender himself to the FBI or to contact someone in the family and ask them to make surrender arrangements."

Ray, who worked as a maintenance man at the golf club, was reported as saying his brother could have been used in a conspiracy to kill the civil rights leader.

JACKSBORO, Tex. (AP) — Jerry Craft, Jacksboro rancher and civic leader, has been named to the State Democratic Executive Committee, replacing David E. Clemens of Mineral Wells, who resigned. At 30, Craft is one of the youngest state committeemen in several years.

Opening lead: Queen of ♠ North's lack of restraint during the auction prevented the partnership from reaching the more desirable contract of three no trump. The jump bid of four clubs was not well chosen. North considered that he held an opening bid facing a partner who had opened the bidding. He, therefore, felt that game should be reached.

He seems to have overlooked the fact that this refers to 9 or 10 trick games. Where a minor suit game is in contemplation, the partnership will require a little more.

In support of clubs, the North hand is worth 13 points [12 in high cards and one for distribution]. Now, if opener has a minimum hand counting only 13 or 14 points, there will be no game in clubs, for such a game requires 28 or 29 points, but there may be game in no trump which requires about 26 high card points. In this case, a more restrained raise to only three clubs would have been sounder strategy, permitting opener to try for a no trump game if his hand is suitable.

In the play of the hand, South redeemed his partner. The queen of diamonds was opened, and had declarer fallen into the error of taking this trick, the contract could not have been fulfilled. For, as declarer attempted to establish a long heart, East could not have been prevented from obtaining the lead in time to come thru the king-jack of spades.

When West's queen of diamonds was permitted to hold, he continued the suit and South was in with the king. He cashed the king of clubs, then dummy was entered with the ace of clubs and a heart discard taken on the ace of diamonds. Now the king, ace, and a heart ruff, established a long heart in dummy upon which declarer discarded a spade. In all he lost one diamond and one spade trick on the deal.

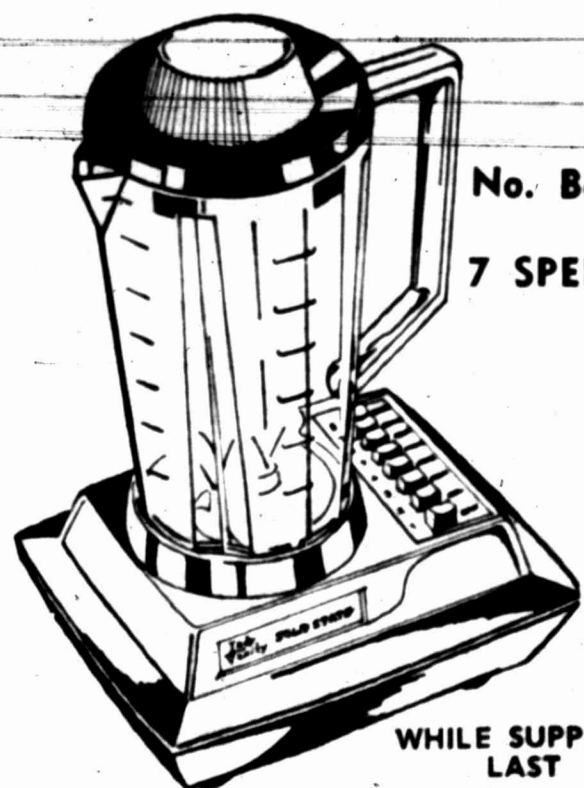

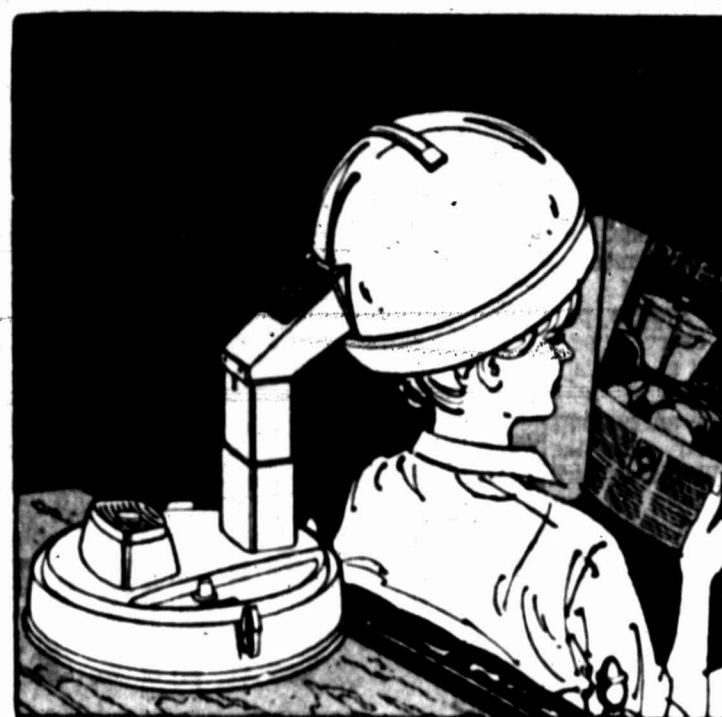

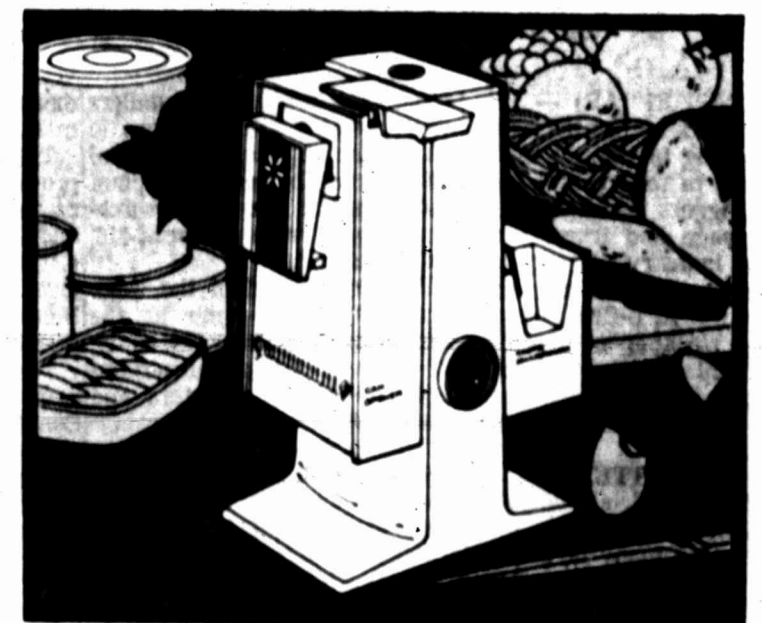

Middle-Aged Men Live Longer In Rural Areas

WASHINGTON (AP) — The place a man calls home can often mean the difference between life and death after he has reached middle age, a new federal study reports.

For the white man 45 to 64, it says, the death risk is twice as great if he lives in an Eastern city instead of a rural area of the central or western United States.

TEXAS LOW

The highest-risk states it listed as Hawaii, North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Nevada, northern Arizona, parts of Louisiana, southern Mississippi and east-central Pennsylvania.

States with the lowest risk: North Dakota, Nebraska, Minnesota, Kansas, New Mexico, Oregon, Colorado, Texas, Iowa and Missouri.

The findings were in a report released Thursday by the U.S. Public Health Service.

It said that in general, urban and other heavily populated areas have higher risk rates for middle-aged men than rural areas.

The reasons for these differences are not known, said Herbert I. Sour, a statistician for the National Center for Chronic Disease Control.

He said health experts are considering as possible causes such "risk factors" associated with heart disease as cigarette smoking, overweight, diet and the stresses and strains of life in various regions.

The heavily populated area between Boston and Washington, D.C., has a death-rate risk generally in middle to upper levels. The West Coast, other than Oregon, is mostly in the

middle-risk rate range, the study said. Sour said middle-aged white men develop cardiovascular disease three times faster than women of the same age and coronary heart disease five times faster.

"This is of increasing concern because only 50 years ago there was little difference between male and female rates," he said.

Phone Strikers Ready To Vote On Big Package

WASHINGTON (AP) — Telephone strikers across the nation are preparing to vote on whether to trade in their picket signs for the biggest package of increased wage and fringe benefits in the industry's history.

The proposed contract negotiated by the AFL-CIO Communications Workers of America and the Bell Telephone System would provide three-year increases totaling nearly 20 percent.

PAY PATTERN
 A company official indicated it would lead to higher telephone bills for many of the nation's 50 million customers, but didn't specify what rate hikes might be forthcoming.

Results of the voting by some 200,000 strikers from coast to coast are expected by Sunday.

The contract will set the pattern for most of another 400,000 telephone workers whose contracts expire later. The tentative contract agreement came Thursday after some 24 hours of marathon bargaining. The strike, first nationwide telephone walkout in 21 years, is in its 16th day.

Teachers' Pay Increase Voted

LEWISVILLE, Tex. (AP) — The Lewisville School Board has voted to increase teachers' salaries by \$100 annually, making the salary standard \$500 above the state schedule.

Minimum salary for a teacher with a bachelor's degree is now \$5,234 in the Lewisville schools, with a maximum of \$6,400 to be attained in 10 years.

The master's degree salary minimum is \$5,540, with a maximum of \$7,412 in 16 years.

Rockefeller Backs Lottery Plan To Select Draftees

By The Associated Press
Pacing the aisle of a campaign bus in a sweat-soaked shirt, hitting it off well with the crowds—Nelson A. Rockefeller in his first full day of campaigning for the presidency seemed a man glad to be in the race at last.

After his announcement Tuesday that he was going after the Republican nomination, the New York governor hopped to Iowa Thursday for a day of campaigning.

It was, he said, "one of the most exhilarating days of my life."

IDEAS SWAPPED

Rockefeller was interrupted 16 times by applause in a speech before some 8,000 persons at the University of Iowa as he called for voting at age 18 and a lottery plan to pick draftees.

Later, on his way to a fund-

raising dinner in Cedar Rapids—another friendly audience—he couldn't sit still in his campaign bus.

Shucking his coat, he kept prowling the length of the bus, his shirt clammy with perspiration, as he spun off ideas and swapped thoughts with a group of students in the back.

Rockefeller planned to return to New York today but didn't disclose where he would appear next in pursuit of the voter.

Richard M. Nixon, who has a head start of months on Rockefeller in the quest for the GOP nomination, touched again Thursday on the "black capitalism" concept he recently introduced.

TAX HELP

In a nationwide radio address from Indianapolis, Ind., the former vice president said tax incentives and loan guarantees could help many Negroes to be-

come owners of their businesses and "remove the ceiling from black aspiration."

Nixon is the only Republican on the ballot in Indiana's primary next Tuesday. But the Democratic contest that day continues to grow in import.

Aides of Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, D-Minn., say that if he wins 30 per cent of the vote in the three-man competition he will interpret this as a signal to press on in his fight for the presidential nomination.

During a wide-ranging day of campaigning Thursday in Indiana, McCarthy seemed to be saying—or at least suggesting—that he expects to trail Sen. Robert F. Kennedy in the primary.

PUFFED LIP

The third Democrat in the race is Gov. Roger D. Branigan, a favorite son trying to keep Kennedy or McCarthy from getting their hands on the votes the Indiana delegation will take to the Democratic National Convention.

John Connally's proposal to legalize the sale of booze across the bar and betting on the bang-tails," the senator said Thursday in a statement released by the Anti-Crime Council of Texas.

"Since I am old enough to remember open saloons and legalized horse race gambling in Texas, I have a responsibility to state my position because I know some of the evils that would be wrought to the fabric of our social structure if these two proposals become law in Texas."

Neither proposal has any binding or legal effect on the legislature.

State Abortion Vote Scheduled

HOUSTON (AP) — The 200-member policy making House of Delegates of the Texas Medical Association votes tonight on a proposed resolution calling for amendments to the state abortion law.

The members deadlocked on the controversial issue last year. A special committee was appointed to study the subject and make recommendations to the 1968 TMA annual session now under way here.

'ARCHAIC'

The committee called for amendments to what it termed the "archaic" state law which now allows abortions only to save the mothers' life and when they are performed under medical advice.

The resolution proposed changes in the state law to include allowing for therapeutic abortions in licensed hospitals by duly licensed physicians for patients who seek them under these:

—When there is a substantial risk that continuance of pregnancy would gravely impair the physical or mental health of the mother.

—When there is substantial risk that the child would be born

with grave physical or mental defect.

—When the pregnancy resulted from rape or incest.

The committee said amendments to the state abortion law written in 1925, would allow Texas physicians the freedom to do their professional duty in line with modern knowledge and hopefully, contribute to the reduction of criminal abortions.

Church Vs. State Controversy Begins

A far-reaching legal battle is shaping up today over whether an arm of government can decide what a Christian church is supposed to teach.

The issue stems from Georgia court rulings that a major Protestant denomination has not properly adhered to its doctrine and therefore two congregations could pull out and take church property with them.

Directly involved is the Lutheran Church in the U.S.

But there were wide implications for other denominations, with immense property holdings at stake, and more basically the historic church position that the state can't specify what constitutes doctrinal fidelity.

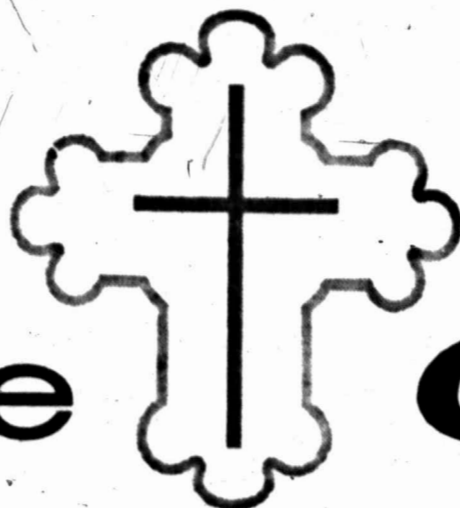

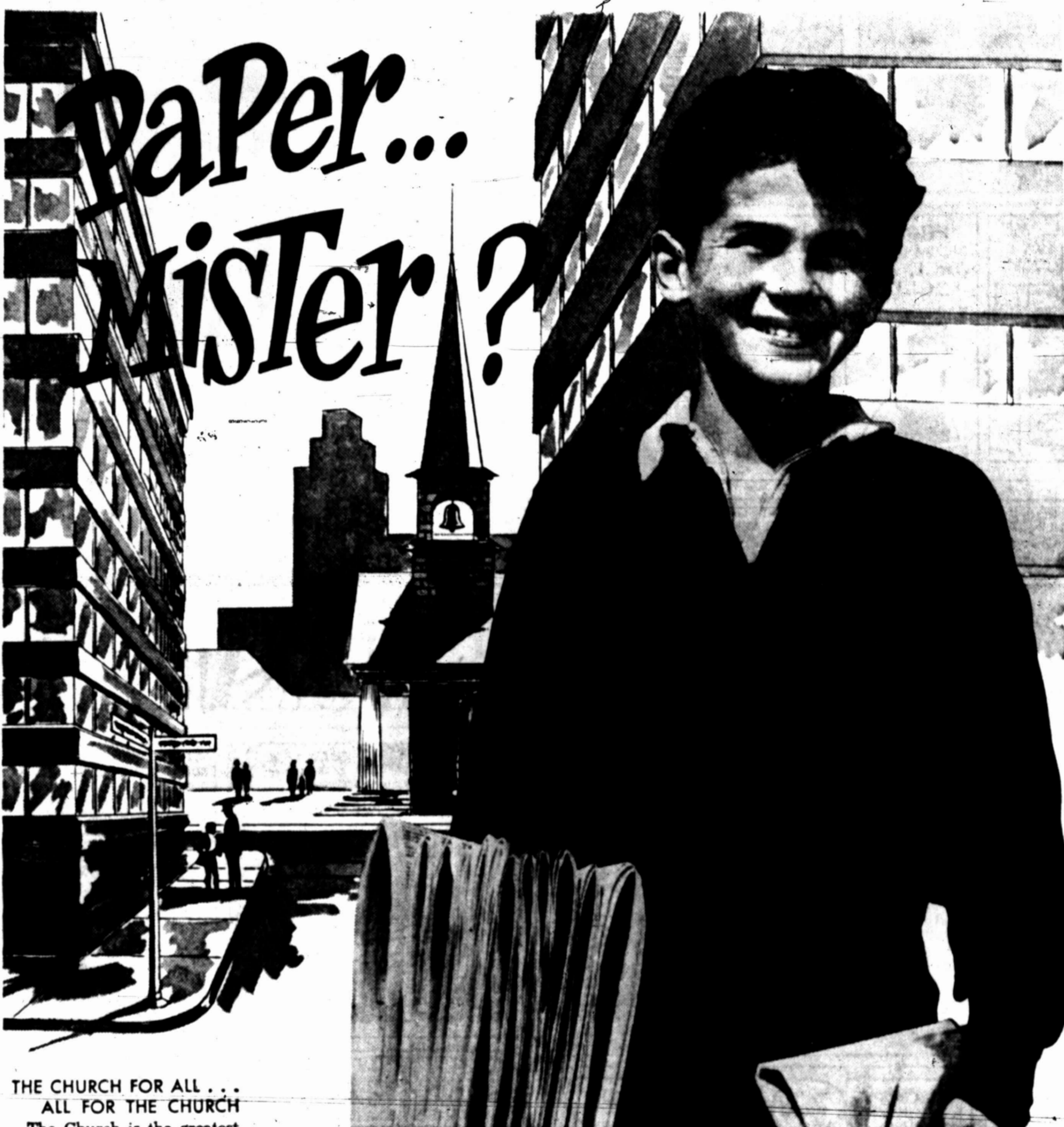

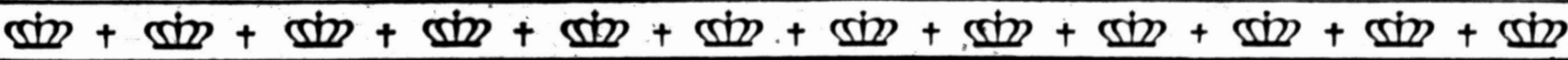

'I'M NOT PROMISCUOUS' She Is Forced To Quit Army Job

WASHINGTON (AP) — A 22-year-old woman charged Thursday that her security clearance was revoked and that she was forced to resign from an Army job on the basis of reports that she was "immoral—reports which, she said, she was not permitted to see. Carolyn Lea Tatnall, a photographic information technician with the Army Map Service, said she was told by a government security officer the reports had come from neighbors in her apartment building. She said in an interview that she could find no one in the building who would admit to having talked to government investigators.

Miss Tatnall was never called back for the test, she said, but on April 2 a security officer and a representative from the personnel section of the Army Map Service told her that her security clearance had been revoked. Miss Tatnall quoted the security officer as saying, "Based on the security reports that you are immoral and not of character to handle classified material, we are not only refusing you a top secret clearance, but we are also revoking any previous clearances that you have had. From now on you are not authorized to work with classified material of any sort."
