# **Suit Filed** To Void **City Voting**

Mary Thomas, who lost her race for a seat on the city council by 24 votes in the April 2 election, and who failed to score in a recount of the ballots, has now filed a suit in 118th District Court, alleging the election is void as it now stands.

In her petition, which was filed at 5:30 p.m. Thursday, she claims numerous irregularities in the election and asks that certain votes she called illegal be discarded and that she be declared elected to the office. In lieu of this, she demands that the entire election be thrown out and a new elec-

#### Ballot Boxes Are Impounded

Meantime, deputy sheriffs acting on orders by Judge Ralph Caton, 118th District Court, this morning took custody of the ballot and stub boxes used in the election. These have been held at the City Hall since the election.

Mrs. Thomas, in her petition, asked that the court order the boxes impounded in the custody of the district court clerk. They were turned over to Fern Cox, district court clerk, who sealed the boxes as instructed by the court and will hold them until he is advised by the court to take other

Mrs. Thomas named Walter Stroup, Jimmy Morehead and Arnold Marshall as the defendants in her election contest suit.

#### Claims She Had Plurality

She states in her preamble that "if only the votes legally cast had been counted the plaintiff would have had a plurality over Morehead and Stroup.

She charges that the 28 absentee votes cast in the election were illegal and void because the absentee voting had not been conducted in accordance with election laws. These votes, she claims, should not have been counted.

Without naming specific individuals, the plaintiff alleges that unqualified voters were permitted to vote and that such votes are not legal. She al leges that the voting was not carried out in th legally designated voting precincts set up by the county commissioners and that the judges and others at the voting precincts did not have copies of the registered voters with their residences listed. She also alleges the officials in some precincts were not appointed with regard to their residence as related to the election precinct.

#### North Side Box Pointed Out

She singles out Voting Precinct No. 1, (North Side Fire Station) for particular attack. At this box, the petition charges that Andrew Tucker, judge, refused certain voters the right to ballot because the voters were not owners of property in the city of Big Spring. She claims this was practiced until poll watchers placed in the box by the plaintiff advised her of the matter late on election day.

Four persons are named in the petition as having been illegally deprived to their right to vote on the grounds that they did not own property in the city. They are identified as Marcelina Huante, Lupe Gonzales, Joe Gonzales and Raul Hernandez.

Texans will decide Saturday how their delegates vote in the presidential nominating, conventions, probably committing them to Gov. John Connally, a Democraf, and Sen. John Tower, a Republican, as favorite sons.

This will be done at precinct conventions in the evening, held at polling places after voting

Democrats are expected to accord Connally favorite son status as leader of the 104-vote delegation, possibly allowing for a quick switch to Vice President Hubert Humphrey. The delegates probably will be pledged





The queen of diamonds was opened, and had declarer fallen into the error of taking this trick, the contract could not have been fulfilled. For, as declarer attempted to establish a long heart, East could not have been prevented from obtaining the lead in time to come thru the

king-jack of spades.

When West's queen of diamonds was permitted to hold, he continued the suit and South was in with the king. He cashed the king of clubs, then dummy was entered with the ace of clubs and a heart discard taken on the ace of diamonds. Now the king, ace, and a heart ruff, established a long heart in dummy upon which declarer discarded a spade. In all he lost one diamond and one spade trick on the deal.

#### Sauce For The Goose

The U.S. Bureau of Commercial Fisheries probably doesn't know it. but it is about to kick a sleeping dog. The bureau has been conducting experiments in the use of electricity to flush out brown and pink shrimp which burrow in bottom mud by day and can only be caught at night with present methods. The electric current brings the shrimp right out of the mud and into the drag seine, researchers discovered.

Well, if they make shrimping with electricity legal, those who love to "telephone" for fish are going to be heard from right away. Devotees of the art of telephoning first used old hand-crank telephones for their work. The crank turned what was in effect a small generator which produced a

jolt such a generator can produce through a spark-coil. In practice, two wires were trailed from a skiff while the crank was turned vigorously. Any fish that came between the two wires was stunned and floated to the top, or became so upset that it jumped out on land where it could be picked up. In more recent years the handcranked generators used in World War II by the Signal Corps were highly esteemed for telephoning fish.

But telephoning, alas, is frowned upon by the game and fish warden. A fine of \$200 may await the culprit. If telephoning, or a more sophisticated equivalent of it, is going to be permitted, though, fish telephoners are going to demand equal treatment. Southeast Asia Worrying About U.S.

WASHINGTON — A new crisis is emerging in Asia. Many of the smaller countries are beginning to worry about the possibility that the United States may give in to North Vietnamese pressure and agree to let the Communist - controlled rebels in the South - known as the National Liberation Front - play a vital part in the coming truce negotiations. What is . mostly feared is that some "facesaving" formula is in prospect which will really mean in the end a takeover of all of Vietnam by the Communists. ...

IT SO HAPPENS that Communist activity has been sharply increased inside several countries in Asia. South Korea is fighting stepped - up infiltration and subversion by North Korean Communists. Indonesia is en countering guerrilla warfare with Chinese minorities in the northern part of the country. Cambodia is being troubled by sporadic guerrilla activities in three provinces. At least one third of Laos is under the controf of Communist forces, and 40,000

What should one say to a child who is crippled and mentally retarded when she asks why God made her different? Please an swer in your column because she has been told that it is because she doesn't obey her parents, and 1 think this is cruel. Poor child

If she were to ask me why God made her different, I would explain to her that all of us are born with some sort of weakness or deformity Few people are really normal. They may have normal, well bodies, but they have mental quirks, psychological traumas, and spiritual deformi ties. I would explain to her that some of the most useful people who ever lived have been physically handicapped, and that the harboring of resentments, binding habits, and crippling sin, are much more damaging than being physically impaired.

I would explain to her that people who live in poor homes are sometimes more happy than those who live in mansions, and that her crippled little body cannot keep her soul from rising to the heights

I would tell her that Jesus loved little children, some of which must have been handicapped like her, and said, "Suffer the little children to come unto me, and forbid them not, for of such is the kingdom of heav-

Then I would tell her that her parsiek people live in well bodies, and North Vietnamese troops are in that country. The northern provinces of Thailand are the scene of Red terrorism and subversion. New trouble has been stirred up in Burma as wells as in Northeast India.

Inside the United States, both Senators Robert F. Kennedy and Eugene J. McCarthy, two of the Democratic aspirants for the presidential nomination, favor a "coalition" in the government of South Vietnam to include the National Liberation Front.

PRESIDENT JOHNSON has said that the NLF representatives could be consulted during the peace conference, but that he does not favor their participation directly in the negotiations or in the government to rule subsequent to the peace agreement. These comments are being interpreted throughout Asia nevertheless as meaning that the United States is trying somehow to wiggle out of Vietnam in order to meet domestic pressures. An American official in Southeast Asia is quoted this week in "U.S. News & World Report" as fol-

"THIEU'S GOVERNMENT would be overthrown by the South Vietnamese army within 24 hours if he puts his signature on a document that let the Liberation Front into the gov-

Another U.S. official in Saigon makes this comment

"No representative of the Liberation Front is going to be welcomé in Saigon. Let them step out of the jungle and they would be assassinated. Or is Washington going to break up the South Vietnamese army and take away its guns?"

THE OFFICIALS of governments in Southeast Asia, of course, read the American newspapers. A number of editorials have appeared in prominent places in this country advocating a compromise which would lead to the withdrawal of American troops.

#### It Says So In A Book

WASHINGTON-One way to keep up with the news is to let it go past you, and later read books about it

You can't believe anything that government officials tell you, says Bruce Ladd in "Crisis in Credibility," and most Washington correspondents, says Stewart Alsop in "The Center" are a "pack of beagles" with stumpy legs and big tails. They give tongue lustily to prove they are on the scent of a rabbit, but often "are simply smelling each other.'

EVEN SO, Alsop's book (by far the best of its kind since Willard Kiplinger's "Washington Is Like That" in 1942) tells more "inside truth" than most of us race-around reporters are likely to assemble. President Kennedy, says Alsop, asked "What second air strike?" when somebody mentioned this crucial part of the Bay of PRESIDENT Johnson said of Pigs invasion Kennedy "had forgotten this part of the plan," or suffered a Freudian lapse of memory. He refused to reconsider, and that's when we lost any chance of success.

> NEED WE HAVE been surprised at the riots or ignorant of their causes? Not so, according to "Ready to Riot" by Nathan Wright Jr., the dust jacket of whose book shows a clenched black fist. The author is an Episcopal clergyman, with four other academic degrees, and his analysis says that violence to the human spirit of the slum dwellers breeds violence in the streets. (Of course it is also the ritualistic oath of modern liberalism to hint that we Americans are Fascists at heart.)

> IN "THE PATH to Dictatorship: 1918-1933," 10 German scholars try to explain the rise of Hitler and to apol

ogize for Germany, but the American reader is bound to ask: Can it happen here? The Germans had lost not just World War I, but also the Treaty of Versailles. Their subsequent governments couldn't keep peace in the streets, couldn't restrain inflation. couldn't subdue internal communism. feared a powerful Russia breathing across the border.

TOTALITARIANISM in Germany came by acquiescence to the demagog whose early followers were those with no stake in society, and thus no loyalty to the republic. But, no, it can't happen to us unless we "lose" a peace, can't stop inflation, can't control our mobs by normal police action. can't put down internal subversion. can't maintain military superiority over Russia-and elect a demagog-President who over-promises the un derprivileged.

THERE'S NO QUESTION but that war kills off too many of the brave young males, but only the simplistic pacifists present it as reverse-Darwinsm-the survival of the unit. In their book "War: The Anthropology of Armed Conflict and Aggression," group of 16 anthropologists try to prove it a destroyer of the human race, and they don't succeed.

In the first chapter, Frank B. Liv ingston has to admit that warfare increases birthrates and does not affect the growth of the human stature in combatant nations

In sum, the scientists are as mystified by the true nature of war as the statesmen are, and I'm going to keep searching for a book which just says to America: "Never lose a war, that's

# All-Out Fight In California

WASHINGTON - Voters in many leap toward the establishment of an states feel far too often that they must choose between carefully computerized tweedledums and tweedledees. In California there is a primary contest that perhaps more than any in the country pits opposing political viewpoints, with the outcome on June highly important for the future of the Republican party.

MAX RAFFERTY is a big, handsome political primitive who, since his election as state Superintendent of Public Instruction in 1962, has been crusading for the three R's and the virtues of the little red schoolhouse For the ultra-right not only in California but around the country he is the man on the white horse who can stop all the nonsense in modern education and go back to McGuffey's Reader, saving the taxpayer hundreds of millions of dollars.

These ultra-right backers are reported to be pouring large sums into Rafferty's campaign to unseat a Republican moderate, Sen. Thomas H. Ku chel, running for a third full term.

CERTAINLY NO dangerous radical, Kuchel, minority whip of the Senate, is under attack for following the moderate line. He voted, Rafferty trumpets, for the nuclear test - ban treaty, favoring Soviet Russia and endangering America's nuclear superiority. In the California tradition of Earl Warren, who won an unprecedented third term as governor before he was named Chief Justice of the United States, Kuchel' showed his independence by staying aloof from Barry Goldwater in 1964 and Ronald Reagan in 1966.

THIS IS WHAT the rightists cannot orgive him for. Yet he has proved the Republican's biggest vote getter. He won in 1962 by 700,000 votes when Richard Nixon was losing the race for governor by 300,000.

A former small-town high school teacher and athletic coach, Rafferty has gone far on hair-curling Raffertyisms that win the plaudits of the far right. AS FOR GOVERNOR Ronald Reagan, he is maintaining a policy of strict neutrality. Yet there is reason to believe that Rafferty's campaign is an embarrassment. The governor of the most populous and fastest growing state is not anxious to be identified with the far right as he starts on a tour of three states looking to a strong bargaining position at the Republican convention. He is stressing human relations as against big government and federal spending.
