Thousands Pay Final Respects

NEW YORK (AP) - Tens of thousands of persons from all walks of life filed mournfully past Robert F. Kennedy's body as it lay in state today before the main altar beneath the towering twin Gothic spires of St. Patrick's Cathedral on Fifth Avenue.

Six abreast, in a line stretching about 10 blocks to Grand Central Station, many thousands waited in a 90-degree temperature to pass the casket in the church. Church officials said that be-

cause of the size of the crowd the church would remain open all night if necessary so that all

A crowd of about 1,000 persons, many of them teen-agers, was waiting in the gray dawn light when the massive doors to the old cathedral swung open at 5:41 a.m. Some had been waiting through the night.

Then Robert Kennedy's body will be taken by train to Washington, for burial at Arlington National Cemetery, where his brother, the late President Kennedy, rests beneath an eternal

WASHINGTON (AP) - President Johnson, speaking in the wake of a new Kennedy assassination, has told Congress that "55 long months after the mailorder murder of President John F. Kennedy," it is time in the name of sanity for a tough gun-

SERVED NOTICE

See Teddy As Seeking **Presidency**

LONDON (AP) - British newspaper commentators predicted today that Sen. Edward M. Kennedy will set his sights on the American presidency. carrying on the family tradition established by his two assassinated brothers.

British papers spread the 36-year-old Massachusetts senator's pictures across their pages and speculated on his chances of reaching the White House

That he will now seek to carry on alone the political ambitions of the Kennedy family is regarded as certain," wrote Richard Scott of the Guardian.

No Animosities

"He has evoked none of the personal animosities which Bobby did," said Scott. "Whether he possesses Bobby's political acumen is perhaps not yet proven. His older brother, Jack, believed that

"By now he has made a solid reputation for himself in the Senate as a modest, industrious and extremely well informed and well briefed member. "He is more popular than Jack and Bobby ever were with his colleagues.

"Teddy is the longterm family contender for leadership of the world's most powerful nation," wrote Peter Younghusband in the Daily Mail.

"Teddy's most notable feature is a deep and appealing charm, and from it grows a relaxed attitude to his problems and to politics," the Mail correspondent said.

Favorite Kennedy

"Perhaps because of his operating style and personality Teddy has some contacts that Bobby lacked. He is the favorite Kennedy among powerful Southern senators.'

Both Vincent Ryder of the Daily Telegraph and John Sampson of the Sun reported speculation in Washington that Kennedy might be offered the vice presidential nomination this year as a tribute to

"But I think Teddy will be too shrewd to accept." wrote Sampson. "He is out for bigger things."

Rocky To Pick Successor

ALBANY, N.Y. (AP) - The names of former Sen. Kenneth B. Keating and Rep. Ogden R. Reid have been raised in speculation over whom Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller will name as a successor to the late Robert F. Kennedy in the Senate.

While Rockefeller and other political leaders declined to discuss the impending appointment publicly, there was substantial private reflection on the subject Thursday at the Capitol. Rockefeller's press secretary, Leslie Sloate, said

the Republican governor had "given no thought" to a successor to the slain Democratic senator. Keating's name was among the first mentioned. The suggestion was that Rockefeller might wish to return him to the seat that Kennedy won from him in the 1964 election. Keating was elected to the Court of Appeals, the state's highest court, but has only two years to serve before reaching the

mandatory retirement age of 70 Reid, who represents a Westchester County district, has been personally close to Rockefeller for years and has occasionally advised him on political

The person chosen by Rockefeller will serve the remainder of Kennedy's term, which ends Dec. 31, 1970. A senator would be elected for a new, six-year term in November, 1970, to take office in Jan-

Favors Tax Change

EL PASO, Tex. (AP) - Texas cities stand to gain under the sales tax legislation proposed by Gov. John Connally, the president of the Texas Municipal League said Thursday.

El Paso Mayor Justin Williams, TML prexy, said the governor's bill will bring more revenue to the cities through broadening the state sales tax to include cigarettes, intrastate telephone calls, laundry, dry cleaning, vehicle parking fees and repairs on autos and home appliances.

The directors of the TML went on record as favoring Connally's proposal to repeal the present sales tax, up the state tax to three cents on the dollar, and rebate one cent to cities according to

Williams said under the plan El Paso would get a boost in sales tax revenue from \$1.5 million in 1969 to \$4 million. Dallas' expected revenue would go up from \$8 million to \$11.8 million; Houston from \$12.5 million to \$16.4 million; San Antonio from \$5 million to \$0.3 million; and Austin from \$1.7 million to \$3.26 million.

Grand Jury Asked To Indict Sirhan

FIRST DEGREE MURDER

LOS ANGELES (AP) - The Los Angeles County Grand Jury met today to hear 23 witnesses and consider a first degree murder indictment against a young Jordanian in the assassination of Sen. Robert F. Kennedy.

Sirhan Bishara Sirhan 24 was not present as the 22 grand jurors met on the fifth floor of the Hall of Justice. He is jailed under constant surveillance in a maximum security cell.

Jury foremen L. E. McKee, a retired garage man from nearby Long Beach, said before the hearing began: "The jury is made up of persons from all walks of life, creeds and colors and I feel that after we have heard all the evidence and deliberated a fair decision will be rendered.

The jury also was asked to return indictments for assault with intent to commit murder in the wounding of five others in the burst of gunfire that killed Kennedy early last Wednesday just after he proclaimed his triumph in the California Democratic presidential primary election

The grand jury was composed of 13 women and nine men. One jury member was absent due to illness. The foreman said a vote of 14 is required for an indict-

Heading the presentation to jurors was Dist. Atty. Evelle J. Younger, who requested the in-

Younger said Sirhan would then be arraigned in person within 48 hours in Court, make a plea at that time or shortly after, with trial expected to begin within 60 days from that time. Should the defense seek a change of venue, Younger said he would not op-

The public defender's office is providing Sirhan legal advice. BOND REVOKED

The prisoner originally was held under \$250,000 bond, but that was revoked by Superior Court Judge Joan Dempsey Klein after Kennedy's death. California law permits no bond in a murder case.

As the shock of Kennedy's death spread through the country and the world, the intense young man accused of the shooting sat in a bleak cubicle of three square yards in the county's main jail on Bouchet Street First details of Sirhan's imprisonment were disclosed

Heavy Barrage Slams Saigon

SAIGON (AP) - Saigon took its worst enemy bombardment of the last five weeks early today. The Viet Cong slammed in 16 rockets which killed 25 Vietnamese civilians and wounded another 43, military officers re-

Gen. William C. Westmoreland predicted the Viet Cong would continue its bombardment of the South Vietnamese capital "to grab headlines throughout the world by portraying a facade or aura of strength

South Vietnamese headquarters announced that the nightly barrage of 100-pound Russian rockets set fire to 27 houses today, destroying or damaging them. In terms of casualties and damage, it was the worst enemy shelling of Saigon since the Viet Cong began frequent bombardment of the capital 34 days ago in an apparent attempt to ter-

rorize the population. The barrage poured in a few hours before Westmoreland returned and some of the rockets landed close to his residence, to that of the top U.S. Navy commander and to the residence of the commander of South Korea's 48,000-man force in Viet-

Most of the rockets hit in the central part of the capital. Sporadic street fighting coninued in Cholon, Saigon's Chinese section, and in the northeastern suburb of Gia Dinh.

A South Vietnamese spokesman said government troops had killed 146 of the enemy and taken 23 prisoners during the past three days in Cholon. Government casualties were report-

The government also announced that since May 5, when the street fighting broke out in Saigon, government forces have killed 2,778 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese soldiers and captured 313, while government losses have been 245 men killed, 933 wounded and 26 missing.

KILLED U.S. infantrymen from the 25th Division killed 32 of the enemy nine miles north of Saigon. Four Americans were killed and 16 wounded in the battle that raged until this morning.

On the northern front, fighting flared anew along the demilitarized zone.

An estimated 150 North Vietnamese troops, supported by heavy artillery, attacked U.S. Marines four miles southeast of the Khe Sanh combat base. The Marines reported 49 enemy and 13 Marines killed and 37 Americans wounded

Strikers Are Gassed, De Gaulle To Speak

PARIS (AP) - Battling with tear gas against a shower of stones, riot police broke up a demonstration by thousands of striking autoworkers and sympathetic University of Paris students today at the Renault auto plant at Flins

A sharp, 20-minute battle ended with the students and strikers split into two groups and pushed right out of the village, 15 miles northwest of the capital. One group sought refuge from the hail of gas grenades in a woods near Flins. The other retreated into fields across a

INTERVIEW Elsewhere the French strike wave was subsiding rapidly and Frenchmen turned their attention to politics and a televised interview with President Charles de Gaulle tonight.

The Paris stock exchange, closed for 16 days, reopened. French shares rallied after early hesitancy. Foreign stocks drew most attention, however, and some recorded gains up to 10 per cent early in the trading. The flow of buying orders for the foreign stocks was attributed to a desire for a hedge against inflation.

The Renault plant at Flins was occupied by police early Thursday, and the sit-in strikers who had held it for weeks were expelled.

Has God appeared to be silent and to have left them to suffer alone?

A few questions like this might start people thinking-"Do I really have it so bad after all?

And perhaps God is trying to teach them a very important lesson, or has allowed the hard time "that the trial . . might be found unto praise and honour of your faith . and glory at the appearing of Jesus Christ" (1 Peter 1:7). Though God has not promised freedom through hard times for the believer. He has promised His presence, come what may. "All things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are called according to his purpose'



rejected the so-called "Nuremberg Defense" advanced by Dr. Benjamin Spock and four co-defendants. The men are charged with conspiring to "counsel, aid and abet" young men to evade or resist the draft.

One of the issues raised by counsel for the alleged conspirators rests on Article 6 of the charter adopted by the International Military Tribunal. That tribunal was established near the end of World War II by the United States, Great Britain, France and Russia. The four powers adopted the charter setting forth the procedure to be followed at the military war crimes trial, and stated the principles of international law which were binding on the court.

The relevant portion of Article 6 raised at the Spock trial provides that there shall be individual responsibility for "crimes against peace." or waging a war of aggression. The defense contends that the U.S. is a legal question.

A federal court judge in Boston has 1 waging a war of aggression in Vietanm. This contention, of course, forms only a part of the defense strategy in the case. In its appeal from any conviction which may come, the defendants will include the Nuremberg theory as part of their brief.

> The Supreme Court of the United States will probably be ablt to dodge this explosive confrontation with the executive. It may not even dwell on the issue, but if it does it probably will take refuge in the impracticality of delaying action in a war while the character of the conflict is debated.

> The ultimate decision will most likely turn on questions of limitations to dissent. The Supreme Court can hardly come to grips with one of the defense claims that an individual has a moral right to resist what he considers an immoral law - this is, the draft, at least as it applied to the war in Vietnam. The court can rightly claim that this is not, after all,

They precipitously abandoned business for the day, flung themselves on horseback and spurred across the bridge to Mount Vernon.

The General also set up a trust fund to help the Negroes train for jobs, and he made special bequests to his favorite servants.

BUT NORTHERN abolitionists, quite in the manner of our modern liberals, incited the Negroes at Mount Vernon to "overcome" in a hurry. The slaves, who would have been freed at her death which took place on May 22, 1802, set fire to the mansion with the purpose of advancing her demise and their liberation. Edward Everett Hale, writing half a century later, said he'd heard the story, and also heard that James Madison had contemplated a similar will but changed it "on account of the rumor with regard to the Washington slaves."

Bushrod Washington, upon inheriting Mount Vernon, found a situation not unlike the one at Resurrection City, D.C. Some of the freed Negroes made a camp-in on the estate. They were too confused to seek paying jobs that existed in the nearby district. They stayed on at Mount Vernon. but they would not work.

FOR 18 OF THE 20 years that Justice Washington stayed on the estate. he had to buy grain to feed the pathetic squatters. As much in desperation as conscience, he became cofounder and president of the Colonization Society. He worked with Henry Clay, Secretary of State, to purchase an African homeland from Britain and

to arrange repatriation. In February, 1821, with Justice Washington and his wife ill in bed, the remaining slaves staged a sit-down strike, apparently believing that their master's death would set them free. The two invalids were carried on litters by their neighbors into Alexandria, and by now the Justice's patience was at an end. As soon as he recovered, he made a list of the 54 ringleaders and sold them down the

river to New Orleans. THUS ENDED, more than a century ago, the first racial camp-in on the banks of the Potomac. Bushrod Washington wrote a long account of it. He was a man of prominence, a man of good will, and very sorry about it all. His use of force and expulsion was a last resort.

When Authorities Do Nothing

WASHINGTON — There is a lesson for every city in the country in the comment made by Judge Alfred Burka of the Court of General Sessions in Washington when he sentenced several persons who had engaged in rioting or looting here in April. The judge pointed the finger of blame at city officials for their failure to order the police to arrest rioters and to announce in unequivocal words that looters and arsonists would be severely

"I HAVE questioned several police officers." Judge Burka said, "and there is no doubt in my mind they operated with implicit or implied orders not to make arrests.'

The judge insisted that there appeared to be no efforts to publicize beforehand the fact that looters would be arrested and prosecuted. He declared that the prisoners he had quesioned admitted that they had no fear of arrest when they engaged in unlawful acts.

ALL OF THE group of seven defendants had records of steady employment and salaries of \$100 or more a week, with one exception. Three earned more than \$160 weekly. Most of them had no previous involvement

Judge Burka said that "people we were depending upon to uphold law in the District were involved in the disorder and very few of them were caught." He asked Nathaniel Dodds. 51, one of the defendants:

"Would you have gone (with the looters) if you had been warned that . looters would be arrested or shot?"

"NO, SIR," Dodds replied. "People told me the police weren't arresting anybody, and I thought it was all right, since everybody else was doing it." He added that he saw "lots of police around, but nobody was being arrested."

For some time there have been rumors that the Washington police were told not to make arrests or to shoot at anybody seen looting.

Many of the disorders can be anticipated. "Demonstrations" are previously announced, and incitement to violence has been a frequent occurrence. Yet authorities in very few of the cities have issued warnings that persons engaged in rioting or looting or vandatism will be arrested and punished. Apparently a wave of propaganda has swept the country that the police are engaging in "brutality" if they attempt to use force to stop rioters, arsonists and looters.

SOME OF the difficulty arises because the Supreme Court of the United States, in a number of decisions, has upheld the right of "demonstrations" as coming under "free speech. and only recently has made it plain that this does not permit all violations of law. Clearly there is need for publicity, particularly in the areas threatened by disturbances, so that the population generally will be fully aware that the police will not hesitate to arrest persons who participate in disorders and incite others to break

Judge Burka, in criticizing Washington officials, said:

"IT IS AN indictment of the constituted authority of the District of Columbia that apparently no effort was made to instruct the public that looting would be punished by arrest and prosecution. I only hope the public will be notified that swift and appropriate action will be taken in the event of any future recurrence of this (riot) activity.'

WASHINGTON — At the rate of a half-million a year the migration of poor, has educated, almost-illiterate Negroes from the South to the North is continuing. TO TALK ABOUT rebuilding the slums, whether by private enterprise or by government or by a combination of the two, is like proposing to bail out a boat with a cup when water is pouring in through great fissures in the hull. As fast as the slums are rehabilitated new slums will be

THE WAY in which the Department of Agriculture is subsidizing this system was made clear in the recent report, Hunger U.S.A., prepared under the direction of a commission of distinguished citizens. While that report showing 256 counties where malnutrition and severe hunger are chronic drew an initial reaction of shock and a few kind words from Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman, its real significance was overlooked. A series of tables reveals the huge federal payments to the big agricultural producers who get payments of \$5,000 or more a year. They are paid to keep land out of production in states where up to an estimated 50 per cent of the population lives in poverty.

THE BIG OPERATORS in the South and Southwest have mechanized their operations. Agricultural labor-except for migrants, and the need for them is diminished—is about gone.

The South is, in short, exporting to the North hunger, misery, illiteracy The result, as Hunger U.S.A. suggests, can be catastrophic.

THE OVERRIDING fact is that, so long as the migration of the dispossessed from the South to the North goes on the raw material will be there in abundance. From the description of conditions in the hunger counties of the South, however, it is going to take a lot more than that to check the migration. A complete reversal of agricultural policy, which keeps 35,000,000 acres out of production by subsidies would be a beginning.

IN THE VIEW of those who have looked at the magnitude of the problem this would be no more than a beginning. Only a radical system of land tenure and land use, written into a broad federal statute, could bring a sufficient change. A kind of interlocking directorate be-

tween the officials of the vast bureaucracy of the Agriculture Department and the Congressional committees controlling policy and appropriations for agriculture exercises tight control. For the big operators it is a highly profitable arrangement.
