Wrestling Returns; Slated Here Monday

After a year and half absence, professional wrestling will return to the city under sponsorship of the Progressive Study Club. The matches will take place here on Monday, February 20, 1978. The Community Center will be the site of the matches which will get under way at 8 p.m.

There will be no advance ticket sales for the matches. Tickets will go on sale promptly at the door at 6

p.m. Monday evening. All ringside seats: reserved, \$4; general admission: bleachers, \$3 and children under 12 years of age general admission will be \$2.

A huge double main event of the four match lineup has been signed for the 20th, under sanction of the National Wrestling Alliance and State of Texas Athletic Board. Amarillo Promoter Jerry Kozak has confirmed some of the top wrestlers of U.S. and international acclaim for the Friona matches.

One part of the main event will pit former World and International Heavyweight Champion Dory Funk, Jr. against Florida's ranked Ervin Smith. Both wrestlers are known winners and the younger Smith will be out to try and use his vast technique to govern a win over the

world recognized Funk, Jr., of Amarillo.

Funk just recently teamed with another former International champion Larry Lane to grab the top regional Western States tag championship. Smith is a former co-holder of these belts with Ted DiBiase.

Smith first hit the Texas competition mid 1977 and rose to the main event spotlight in short order. The 6 foot 240 pounder attained numerous athletic achievements before hitting the professional level of wrestling. He is a graduate of East Bay High School and the University of Tampa. He is a four-year letterman in football, captain of his team: All South, All American: four years State Wrest-

Services Held For O'Brien

The Rev. Dermot O'Brien, 36, director of Social Services at the Catholic Family Service in Amarillo and pastor of St. Ann's Catholic Church, Bovina, and St. Teresa's, Friona, was dead on arrival at Northwest Texas Hospital, Amarillo, at about 1:15 p.m. Saturday.

He was born Oct. 8, 1941, in Limerick, Ireland, and ordained a priest June 13, 1965, in Ireland.

Father O'Brien became pastor of St. Ann's on Feb. 2, 1976.

Mass was read in St. Ann's on Sunday at 7:30 p.m., with Father James Comiskey and Father Peter DiBenedetta officiating.

The Fourth Degree Knights of Columbus served as honor guards. Mass was read at St. Teresa's, Friona, at 7:30 p.m. Monday night.

A funeral mass was held in St. Lawrence Cathedral, Amarillo, on Tuesday at 3 p.m.

Bishop Lawrence DeFalco of the Amarillo Diocese and all of the priests of the Amarillo Diocese officiated.

Burial is to be in Ireland.

He was a former associate pastor at St. Mary's and St. Lawrence Catholic Churches of Amarillo, and had served as pastor of churches in Paducah and Childress.

Survivors include his mother, Mrs. Kathleen O'Brien of Limerick, Ireland, four sisters and one brother.

Fans attending the game had built up an "unruly" atmosphere, which led eventually to a flagrant foul by a Friona player, Edward Castillo, who hit Dimmitt's Karl Langford as he was making a driving layup, and sent him crashing into the wall.

Following the game, two Dimmitt men jumped out of the home stands and "roughed up" one of the Friona players before school officials could intervene.

School Sets Long Weekend

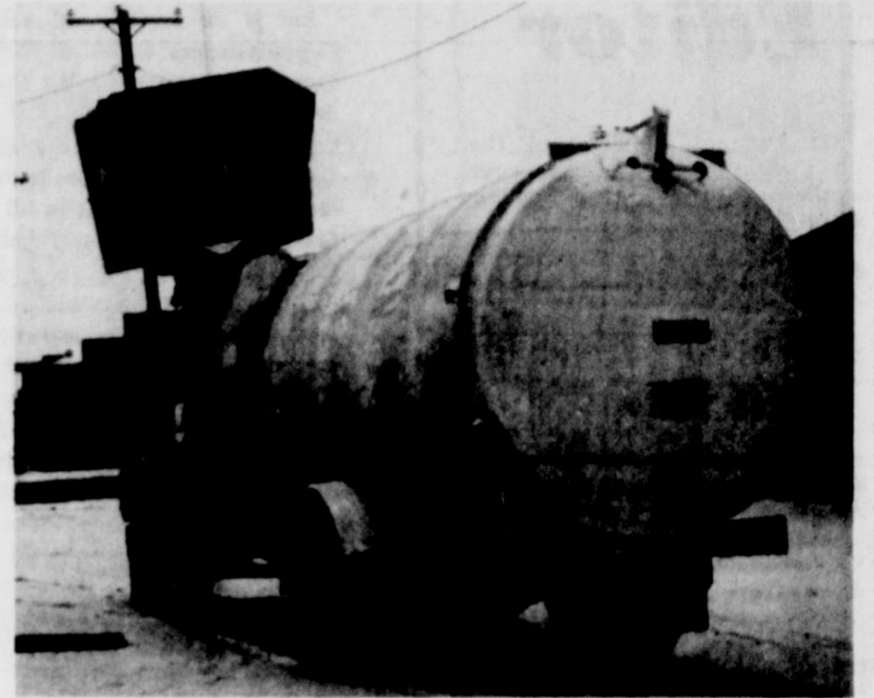

Filing deadline passed February 6, with 14 candidates filing for precinct or county office in the Democratic primary, and another three filing to run in the Republican primary.

Only in commissioner's precincts 2 and 4 are there contested races. In Precinct 2, (Bovina and Rhea) where longtime officeholder Charlie Jefferson passed away, there are five Democratic candidates and two on the GOP list.

Precinct 4 (Lazbuddie) has two candidates on the Democratic ballot, plus the incumbent, Jimmy Briggs, on the Republican banner.

Democrats running in the Precinct 2 race are Glenden Sudderth, C.E. Trimble, Archie McCutchan, Jack Patterson and Richard Carson. Republicans running for that spot are Jim Dixon and Vernon Estes.

In Precinct 4, Democratic candidates are Pete Jesko and Raymond McGehee. Jimmy Briggs, incumbent, is running on the Republican ticket.

County officers running unopposed for re-election on the Democratic ticket are Judge Paul Fortenberry, County Clerk Bonnie Warren, District Clerk Dorothy Quickel and Treasurer Benna Felts.

Running for re-election on the Democratic ticket are justices of the

peace Ray Mears, Frances Euler and Wayne Spears for their respective precincts of Farwell, Friona and Bovina.

Hollis Horton has filed for re-election as Democratic party chairman. Precinct chairmen who have filed for a spot on the ballot are: 1. Martha Hamilton, Black; 2. Jay E. Beene, Friona; 3. Ken Horn, Bovina; 4. Albert Smith, Farwell; 5. Mrs. Max Steinbock, Lazbuddie; 6. Wendol Christian, Oklahoma Lane; 7. Raymond Schueler, Rhea; and 8. Otho Whitefield, Lakeview.

Names were not available for Republican precinct and county chairmanships.

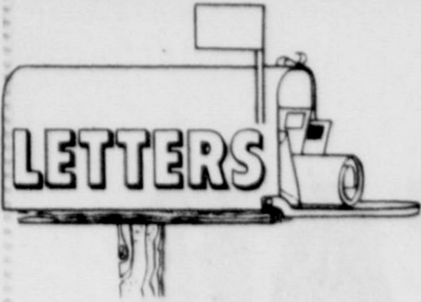
The meeting is sponsored by Friona Farmers Co-op Gin. All farmers who are in the pool are urged to attend.

Dear Editor,
I feel that the people of Texas should be informed about a group of people who are doing and have done a superb job of representing Texas. These people are the farmers and ranchers of Texas who have converged on Washington, D.C., along with those from other states, to force a change in National Agricultural Policy.

Never in my life-time have I been more privileged to work with a more dedicated group of individuals. They have plowed the halls of Congress just as efficiently and just as vigorously as they plow their farms back home. Never has Washington seen such a lobbying effort which has been displayed the last three weeks by these amateurs. But just as they are able to repair broken plows and combines with baling wire and perseverance, they have been able to win the hearts and confidence of those law-makers on Capitol Hill by their honesty and intelligence.

There is no way that I can convey to the people of our state the hours upon hours of behind the scenes work which has caused our efforts to be as successful as they have been.

A Texas headquarters was established immediately upon arrival in Washington. Telephones were installed, Xerox machines leased, filing systems set up and jobs delegated. Farmers and farmers' wives, who had never before worked inside an office, cooperated together and set up a very well coordinated office which usually operated 12 to 16 hours per day. Many people who came to Washington never visited a congressman or saw inside the Lincoln Memorial, but remained inside that office and kept things running smoothly. There is no way we can ever repay them for their determination and dedication.

I hesitate to list names, because I know that some would be omitted. I can only say that Washington, D.C. will never be the same because of these fine individuals who have come, lobbied, worked and conducted themselves in such a dedicated Christian attitude. They have written history, whether we win or lose in our battle for fairness, and for this I am proud to have been a small part in their efforts.

CARAMEL PEANUT ROLLS

1 Tbsp. butter
2 Tbsp. firmly packed dark brown sugar
1 tsp. light corn syrup
1/3 c. shelled peanuts, chopped
1 pkg. (8 oz.) refrigerated crescent dinner rolls
2 Tbsp. softened butter
1/2 c. dark brown sugar
1 tsp. cinnamon

In a small saucepan melt butter; stir in sugar and corn syrup until dissolved. Divide mixture into 8 lightly buttered muffin cups. Sprinkle 1 tablespoon chopped peanuts into each cup. Set aside pan. Unroll crescent rolls, but do not separate. Brush with butter and sprinkle with 1/2 cup brown sugar mixed with 1 teaspoon cinnamon. Separate rolls at perforations (will be in triangle shapes). Fold over top point of triangle and roll up. Arrange roll in spiral effect atop caramel mixture in muffin pans; flatten slightly. Bake in a preheated 375-degree oven for 15 minutes or until browned and done through. Let stand several minutes and then invert. Makes 8 rolls.

Farm Expenses Slated For National Survey

Production expenditures nationwide averaged just over \$32,000 per farm in 1976, according to a survey conducted by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service. The total outlay to raise crops, livestock, and poultry ran up a bill of \$89 billion.

The major expenditure was for feed, which accounted for over \$14 billion. Next came rent cost of \$8 billion; interest and taxes of \$7.9 billion; wages at \$7.4 billion; and purchases of fertilizer, lime, and soil conditioners at a cost of \$7.2 billion.

The Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service, with help from producers, participated in developing this information.

Production expenditure information is a major ingredient in determining net farm income and is used as a guide in computing the parity index and other factors about the farmer's position in the national economy.

In order to update these expenditure figures, Wilda Millican of the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service will be contacting several farmers in Parmer County

during February and March in an effort to establish expenditure levels for 1977. Some producers will be asked a series of questions about their marketing practices for livestock, field crops, fruits, and

vegetables. All answers secured during the interviews will be confidential and used only in state and national summaries.

What is your favorite color? Does it reflect anything about your personality? The answer is yes to both questions. You will learn alot about a person if you know their favorite color.

Color expresses moods and personality traits.

Researchers say colors can signal feelings—not just the stop-and-go routine of traffic.

According to research, color preferences and personalities team up like this:

Red portrays excitement, danger, defiance, rage, beauty and courage. Those who choose red as a favorite color usually display a vitality for living, winning, and achieving results. They are usually athletic and vigorous, yet fickle and impulsive.

Yellow depicts light, glory, wisdom, wealth and cheer. Yellow lovers usually are intelligent, open-minded, creative, theoretical, and usually optimistic.

Blue denotes quiet, somber moods, divinity, honor, purity, innocence, peace and hope. Those

who favor blue tend to be conservative, sensitive, preceptive, rational and cautious.

Green is usually restful to the eye and nerves and expresses youth, prosperity, and a fresh, natural personality with broad interest. While usually tolerant, those who like green may be stubborn and opinionated and are usually ambitious.

Purple or violet expresses regality, sorrow, affliction, sadness, and solemnity. Those who favor purple usually have a flair for the mysterious, idealistic, aristocratic and artistic. Many are creative and innovative, but are often conceited.

Oranges express liveliness, joy, warmth, strength, endurance, and caution. Orange lovers usually show vitality and warmth. Many are jovial, friendly, and easy to get along with.

In general, extroverts—who are outward and gregarious—like many colors.

Introverts—who are shy or less sociable—like few colors.

Health Knowledge Can Save Lives

Children are put through endless fire drills at school so they will instinctively know what to do in case of fire.

In life, we are conditioned to respond to certain sights and sounds—a red flashing light, traffic signals and sounds, the wail of a siren, the clang of a fire bell.

Our bodies too, give off warnings. When we have a headache, we reach almost without thinking for the aspirin bottle. A toothache congers up thoughts of the dentist. Pain and discomfort send messages and trigger responses. Without this signal that something is wrong, our lives would often be in danger.

The body often gives off what are aptly called "early warning signs." These symptoms usually precede a heart attack, sometimes by a week or a month, often by mere minutes. Knowing the warning signs and acting quickly when they occur can mean the difference between life and death.

We read the statistics—more than 29 million Americans suffer from some form of cardiovascular disease. Some 660,000 will die from heart attack alone this year. And we wonder how many would be healthy and alive today if they had taken the trouble to know and act on the early warning signs.

These are the warning signs of heart attack: 1) Prolonged, oppressive pain or unusual discomfort in the center of the chest. 2) Pain may radiate to shoulder, arm, neck or jaw. 3) Sweating may accompany pain or discomfort. 4) Nausea, vomiting and shortness of breath may also occur.

The American Heart Association cautions, however, that these are

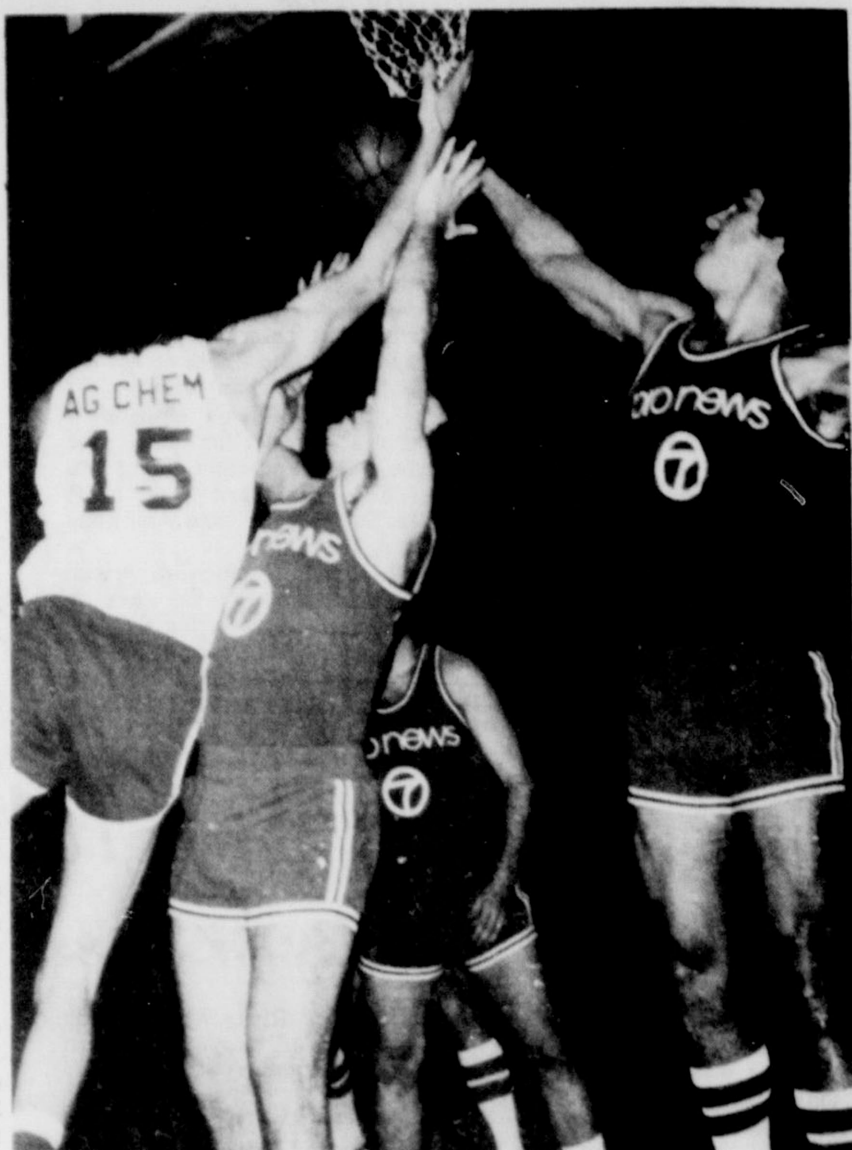

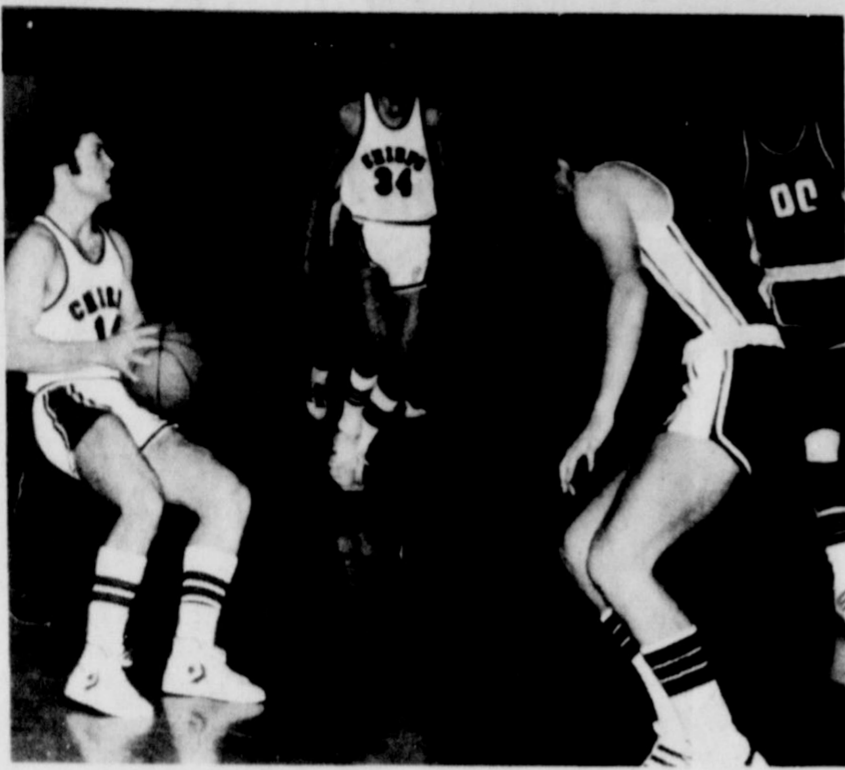

SEASON OVER

Chiefs Down Morton; But Fall To Bobcats

The Friona Chieftains closed out their 1977-78 basketball season by splitting games with the two teams which have been rated first and second in the state for class AA.

The Chiefs downed Morton, 62-58 at Morton last Friday. It was the first time they had defeated the Indians on their home court since 1975.

But the hot-shooting Dimmitt Bobcats clinched the District 3-AA championship on Tuesday with a

66-41 triumph in a game at Dimmitt.

Friona was the last obstacle for the Bobcats. Had the Chieftains upset the 'Cats, it would have given Friona the second half crown, and forced a special playoff game to determine the district representative.

Friona's game at Morton proved that the Chiefs could respond under fire. The game was tied 13 times, and the lead changed hands five times. Morton threatened to pull away early in the final quarter, but Friona played determined basketball, and rallied from an eight-point deficit early in the period to tie the score and then put the Indians behind to stay.

Morton had four-point leads early in the game, but Friona tied it at 10-all on a pair of free throws by Koty Kothmann with 2:33 left in the first quarter.

Kothmann then gave the Chiefs their first lead at 12-10 on a basket from close range, and Jeff Whitesides' basket made it 14-10. Kevin Kothmann made both ends of a one-and-one foul shot for a 16-12 score, but Morton made it 16-14 at the end of the period.

After Morton tied the score, Whiteside gave Friona an 18-16 lead with a basket on a fast break. Both teams made mistakes that cut down on the scoring. Friona had a 24-20 lead after Kevin Kothmann scored with 49 seconds left in the half, but Morton countered to trim the halftime margin to 24-22.

Morton tied the score and went ahead early in the third quarter. The lead changed hands three times and the score was tied seven times during the quarter.

Todd Bandy connected from outside for a 32-30 Friona lead with 4:29 left in the quarter, Morton tied

it, and Bandy hit again for a 34-32 lead.

Morton took leads of 36-34 and 38-36 only to have Whiteside tie the score each time. However, a pair of unanswered baskets in the last minute of play by Morton gave the Indians a 46-40 lead entering the final quarter.

The home team then hit a three-point play and Morton had an eight-point lead—its longest of the game, at 49-41 as the vital fourth quarter opened.

But Lawrence Fithen hit a hot streak for the Chieftains, canning a pair of baskets and two free shots and Koty Kothmann added a bucket, as Friona caught the Indians, 49-41.

The Chieftain defense was tenacious. Friona went on ahead, 56-51, having outscored the Indians, 15-2 in a five-minute period of clock time. Kevin Kothmann provided the points that put the Chieftains back in front to stay.

Morton challenged one last time, tying the score at 58-all with 44 seconds left. But Whiteside canned both ends of a 1-1 shot at the 35-second mark, and Fithen did likewise with 12 ticks left, for the 62-58 win, which gave Friona a 4-0 record in second-half play at that point, and kept the team's district hopes alive.

If Dimmitt could have drawn up a first quarter on the chalk board, it could not have come out more favorable for the Bobcats at Dimmitt Tuesday.

After Kothmann gave Friona an early 2-0 lead, it was all Bobcats. Dimmitt outscored Friona 16-2 in a five-minute period to stake themselves to a 16-4 lead. It was 20-8 at the quarter.

The 'Cats continued their hot-

shooting in the second quarter, stretching to a 26-10 lead after 1:31 of play. Kevin Kothmann hit a pair of buckets and Lawrence Fithen scored, to trim the margin to 26-16, but Dimmitt responded with a flurry of baskets to take a 36-20 lead at halftime.

The third quarter was another nightmare for the Chiefs. Friona swapped baskets for the first two minutes, but then Dimmitt hit another streak of stealing, rebounding and scoring, running up 15 unanswered points and taking a back-breaking 55-25 lead. Friona got the last five points of the quarter for a 55-30 score.

The only thing that distinguished the fourth quarter was the loss of tempers. Edward Castillo was ejected for a flagrant foul with 19 seconds remaining, and some fans tried to get involved after the game.
