

## TO \$5,000 Uribe Bond Reduced A Second Time

George Perez Uribe, 25, under indictment for the murder of Paula Sanchez De Tomlinson, has been released from custody on \$5,000 bond.

When Uribe was arrested in connection with the fatal wounding of the Tomlinson woman last Sunday, his bond was pegged at \$10,000 and he was charged with assault with intent to murder.

Wednesday afternoon, when the grand jurors had reported a murder indictment against the man, Judge Ralph Caton, 118th District Court, reduced the bond to \$7,500.

The bond was again reduced, according to the records in the county jail, and Uribe has been released on \$5,000 bail. Judge Caton is out of town today and could not be contacted to find when the bond was diminished from \$7,500 to \$5,000.

Wayne Burns, district attorney, said he had heard nothing of the action until Friday. He said that if the judge desired to reduce the bail from the \$7,500 mark, it was not a matter on which he would have been advised.

Sheriff A. N. Standard said that the \$5,000 bail had been accepted by his office and that the defendant had been released.

The Tomlinson woman, shot in the head with a .22 rifle, died Monday afternoon.

AUSTIN (AP) — The state Health Department said today there have been 14 cases of paralytic polio this year, compared with 10 in all of 1967. One case was reported during the week ending July 8, the latest on which the department has records, in Houston.

## Mao Forces Lose

TOKYO (AP) — Radio Moscow reported today that opponents of Mao Tse-tung have seized control of Wuchow, a city of more than 200,000 people, 120 miles west of Canton, after hard fighting in which several hundred persons were killed.

The Japanese-language broadcast said the anti-Maoists arrested about 3,000 supporters of the chairman of China's ruling Communist party.

Radio Moscow said more than 2,000 buildings were destroyed in the Wuchow fighting.

## Missing Man Found

MALLEN, Tex. (AP) — A Central Texas grain buyer was found fatally shot Thursday in a pump house less than three miles from the parking lot where he vanished last Saturday.

The decomposed body of Sam Degelia Jr., 30, of Hearne was identified by a billfold and a ring, Hidalgo County deputy sheriff Truett Jordan said.

Sheriff E. E. Vickers said a preliminary examination revealed two bullet holes. No immediate ruling in the death was issued, but Hidalgo County Dist. Atty. Oscar McInnis said "it sure looks like murder."

## Gang Heists Bank

NEWARK, N.J. (AP) — A 15-state alarm was out today for a "Bonnie and Clyde" style gang of gun-toting bandits who fled Thursday with \$151,000 in bank money.

The getaway car was driven by a woman, police said.

Three bandits, two wearing goatees, scooped the money into a pillow case and raced from the Haynes Branch of the National Newark & Essex Bank to a green sedan parked outside with the woman waiting behind the wheel.

Police said the gang may have been the same one that held up a Glen Ridge bank of \$21,000 Monday. Those bandits fled after exchanging shots with a patrolman.

## Oppose Giveaways

WASHINGTON (AP) — Executives of two leading oil companies have told a House Small Business subcommittee they would like to see the end of gasoline station giveaway games.

"I look forward to the day when the era of games comes to an end," said Robert Reed III, a vice president of Cities Service Oil Co.

The same view was echoed at a hearing Thursday by William Miller, vice president for marketing of American Oil Co.

"We sincerely believe the game thing will fade out of the picture," he said.

Reed said use of the games by competitors forced Cities Service into use of the games because customers were being lured away.

# Terrorist Shoots American In Saigon

SAIGON (AP) — A terrorist shot and killed a U.S. soldier in downtown Saigon today amid reports that Viet Cong suicide commandos are expected to raid the capital at any time.

The assassination was the first against an American reported in Saigon since the Viet Cong's second offensive against the capital in May.

Extra guards were posted at the U.S. Embassy and other key installations, and police were put on 100 per cent alert. The raids, if they come, likely would open the third Viet Cong offensive of the year against Saigon, an attack that has been expected for weeks.

The terrorist's victim was shot three times less than a

mile from the presidential palace and taken to an Army hospital. His assailant escaped.

U.S. sources said they had no confirmation of the South Vietnamese intelligence reports warning of commando raids. But American troops "are in a complete state of readiness to meet any enemy attacks" and have been for months, a spokesman said.

But Vietnamese police sources said guards were increased at the U.S. Embassy, where a Viet Cong suicide squad struck Jan. 30 at the beginning of the Tet offensive and held out for several hours in the embassy grounds. More government troops also were sent to bridges leading into the city and various checkpoints on Saigon's outskirts.

## REPORTS

High-ranking Vietnamese officers said they had received reports the American Embassy would be attacked again and the national police headquarters would be another target.

An unconfirmed report said the Viet Cong had stolen an official U.S. car, apparently to fill it with explosives and use it to attack an American installation. U.S. Embassy security men armed with machine guns were seen at the Rex, one of the major U.S. officers' billets, checking American cars for explosives.

## Strict Security Plans Prepared For Ray Trial

MEMPHIS, Tenn. (AP) — Officials preparing for what promises to be the biggest Tennessee trial since the famous "monkey trial" of 1925 are making strict security arrangements.

Officials said Thursday that plans are being made to make a voice and picture tape of every person attending the trial of James Earl Ray, charged with assassinating Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. here on April 4.

This would be the first trial anywhere that such a security precaution has been required, Charles Holmes, public relations aide to Sheriff William N. Morris, said.

Newsmen accredited to cover the trial, expected to be held in late fall, will be given identification cards bearing their photo-

graphs. The trial is scheduled to be held in one of the Shelby County Criminal Court courtrooms so Ray can be brought directly into ground corridor without being seen by the outside public.

A secondary security line is expected to be established to keep everyone without pressing business out of the Criminal Courts building.

"This is a serious matter," said Sheriff Morris, who is in charge of arrangements for the trial.

"There will be no carnival air here," Morris said. "The sheriff, the judges and the attorney general have been conferring at intervals for several weeks to assure a fair and orderly trial in a dignified atmosphere."

NEW ORLEANS (AP) — Dist. Atty. Jim Garrison said that his office has exchanged information with the intelligence agency of a foreign country "that successfully penetrated the assassination operation" against President John F. Kennedy, the Times-Picayune reported today.

According to the newspaper report, Garrison said that "the great amount of detailed information" he received from the foreign country verifies his

statements that Kennedy was assassinated "by elements of the Central Intelligence Agency."

Garrison declined to identify the country but he did say that it is in Europe and is "a foreign power that militarily is on friendly terms with the United States," the newspaper reported.

He also said that an "intermediary" from the country contacted his office about three or four months ago. They arranged to make contact and exchange information.

# Police Press Search For Killer Of Three

NEW YORK (AP) — Police today pressed a massive manhunt for a Bronx gunman who killed three persons and wounded a fourth with a hail of fire from an automatic carbine.

Bronx Asst. Dist. Atty. Burton Roberts said a 15-state alarm was issued for one Bobby Rogers, alias Bobby Pugh, 31, who was superintendent of the building in front of which the shootings occurred Thursday evening.

The rapid-fire shooting brought more than 200 policemen armed with rifles, revolvers, shotguns and tear-gas guns and wearing bullet-proof vests

to the dingy orange tenement into which the gunman fled.

As thousands of spectators swarmed to watch, police searched the five-story building but failed to find the man. They concluded he had escaped through a basement connecting three buildings on the block.

The dead were identified as Manuel Angel Figueroa, 19, Efrain Castro, 21, and Jose Rivera, 18. Roberts said preliminary evidence indicated the man being sought knew all three.

Police said Figueroa was dead on arrival at Lincoln Hospital and that Castro and River-

died at the hospital.

Roberts described Rogers as a light-skinned Negro, about 5 feet 11, 160 pounds. He said the man had been honorably discharged from the Army in 1962 and took the superintendent's job on Dec. 1, 1967.

The shooting came just eight days after police killed a Central Park sniper, Angel Angelof, who had shot to death a young woman and wounded three oth-

er persons.

The violence began at about 6:27 p.m. when the gunman appeared on top of the tenement on East 138th Street and started firing a .30-caliber automatic carbine which had been sawed off at both the stock and barrel, police said.

The crowd began gathering as quickly as police. Youths climbed atop cars to get a better view and police roped off the

block to keep spectators back.

As police marksmen made their way to neighboring rooftops, teams of police began a room-by-room search through the tenement and the two adjoining buildings.

In the street the crowd listened to transistor radios carrying accounts of the action as they watched it. Onlookers smiled and waved for television cameras.

# Dirksen Defends LBJ's Actions

WASHINGTON (AP) — Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois declared today Presidents Lincoln, Truman and Kennedy all appointed "cronies" to the Supreme Court. He said it's about time that line of attack on President Johnson's nominations be dropped.

"You don't go out and look for an enemy to put on the court," Dirksen sternly lectured GOP Sen. Robert P. Griffin of Michigan at a Senate Judiciary Committee hearing.

Griffin heads a group of Republican senators intent on blocking nomination of Abe Fortas, now an associate justice, to be chief justice and Homer Thornberry to be an associate justice of the Supreme Court.

The young senator—he is 44—took his fight to the committee today, charging President Johnson with practicing "cronism" by nominating these two old friends.

## 'LAME DUCK'

Griffin also labeled Johnson a "lame duck" president who was trying to keep his successor from filling court posts.

Dirksen, a member of the committee, listened quietly while Griffin read his statement. Then, beginning slowly, he said the phrase "lame duck" was "entirely improper and a very offensive term" that should not be used for a president who voluntarily retires from office.

The GOP leader, 72, reminded his colleagues that nine senators who have announced their retirement still serve and asked: "Are we going to offend them and affront them by referring to them as lame duck senators?"

Dirksen ticked off the names Harold Burton, Tom C. Clark, Sherman Minton and Fred Vinson as "cronies" of Truman ap-

pointed by that president to the Supreme Court.

President Kennedy, he said, appointed Byron R. White, a campaign manager of his, to the court and if a campaign manager "isn't a crony I don't know what is."

Thornberry now is a judge on the federal Court of Appeals in New Orleans.

The Judiciary Committee opened hearings into the nominations Thursday, but put off questioning of Fortas until next week.

Griffin said he wanted to know how big a role Abe Fortas, nominated to succeed Earl Warren as chief justice, played in White House decisions while

serving on the court since 1965. Fortas is a longtime Johnson friend and adviser.

## SERVED EXTRA

And, Griffin said, he also wants to know why Thornberry, another old friend of the President, served an extra five months in Congress in 1963 after being named a federal judge in Texas.

Griffin cited "reports that the arrangement was designed to insure Mr. Thornberry's vote legislative issues during the interim."

The senator added: "This situation again suggests a flagrant disregard of the constitutional doctrine of separation of powers."

# Twister Wrecks Trailer, Hurts 2

Tornadoes and cloudbursts assaulted opposite ends of Texas during the night, injuring two persons inside a wrecked house trailer in the Panhandle and threatening flash floods deep in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Occasionally heavy thundershowers continued this morning in parts of West Texas while shower activity developed anew over the extreme south part of the state and along the coast.

## TWISTER

A twister snaked down from a heavy thunderstorm and smashed a trailer house on a farm between Stratford and Texhoma in the north edge of the Texas Panhandle shortly before

midnight, police said. Two children among the seven persons in the trailer suffered severe cuts.

Flood threats were raised earlier in the evening as a six-inch cloudburst hit a rural area about 10 miles north of Rio Grande City near the southern tip of the state.

The Weather Bureau at Brownsville issued a warning against possible flash flooding along the Los Olmos Arroyo. Sheriff's officers at Rio Grande City said early today, however, there had been no word of flooding or anyone requiring assistance.

Farther north in the same general area of South Texas, Cotulla received 1.92 inches and Alice 1.43.

Weather Bureau radar indicated in early morning that the heavier patches of rain had moved south of the border into Mexico.

Showers and thunderstorms meandered in hit-or-miss fashion through the Panhandle-Plains section, turning loose occasional torrents from the neighborhood of the Texhoma-Stratford tornado southwest past Amarillo. Lighter amounts extended to Linder and Lubbock.

Police said the twister struck a trailer housing Mabor Perez Gama, his wife and five children on a farm about 13 miles northeast of Stratford. The couple's 8-year-old daughter suffered severe lacerations on her right arm and a son, about 15, was cut about the head.

## NO OTHER

Authorities found no other damage in the area. They said the tornado apparently whirled back aloft and dissipated.

# Blonde Dancer Not Afraid Of Commies

SAIGON (AP) — "I get more trouble from amorous club managers than I do from the Viet Cong," said the blonde dancer, one of the hundreds of entertainers criss-crossing the jungles of Vietnam these days.

### 'WILL TRAVEL'

The pop singers, guitarists, semistripers and fire eaters haven't been scared away by the

ambush attack last weekend which killed two teenage members of the Brandt Perry act from Los Angeles.

"We've hung 'Have Act—Will Travel Anywhere' signs back on our baggage," said one agent. "Any GI club that wants us has us, providing the price is

reasonably right."

There are about 500 such clubs in American military bases scattered across South Vietnam from the Mekong Delta to the demilitarized zone. The farther away from Saigon, the better the price, which can run as high as \$425 an hour for a top pop group.

The Army's commercial entertainment coordinator in Saigon keeps a careful watch on the conduct of both the entertainers and the club operators that book them.

Some performers say the worst part of playing Vietnam is the hours of waiting at dusty airports for military planes that never arrive, the dirt and the crude conditions at many clubs, and the "thousand foot sponge" of Vietnamese government bureaucracy they bog down in when they try to extend their stay in the country or go to get exit visas.

### RISK IS REAL

But the risk of Viet Cong attack is real, particularly at night on lonely roads between bases when there is a temptation for an entertainment group to squeeze in just one more performance before a nearby club closes.

Brandt Perry and the Bubble Machine was ambushed after dark on the Saigon-Vung Tau road, a locale notorious for attacks and kidnaping. U.S. military sources also report a Filipino singer was killed in a Viet Cong ambush three weeks ago near Qui Nhon, a coastal resort.

The safety of visiting entertainers is their own responsibility. But because of the recent fatalities, U.S. military authorities called the 50 registered booking agents in Saigon together for a briefing on basic safety procedures.

The Army's Special Services Division ordered that all entertainment groups obtain road and security information from the local provost marshal before using a highway.

Groups were also advised that armed escorts will be provided when they leave clubs after dark.

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# Rep. Powell's Cell Sentence Upheld By Appellate Court

NEW YORK (AP) — The 1966 conviction of former Rep. Adam Clayton Powell on a charge of criminal contempt of court, which led to a 30-day jail sentence and a \$500 fine, has been upheld by a three-to-two vote of the Appellate Division of the State Supreme Court.

The ousted congressman's lawyer, Henry R. Williams, said after the ruling Thursday that no decision had been made yet on whether to take the case to the Court of Appeals, New York State's highest tribunal.

### 'BAG WOMAN'

The 59-year-old Powell, who has been elected as a Democratic congressman from Harlem for more than 20 years, was reported to be on Bimini, his favorite island retreat in the Bahamas.

Thursday's ruling came after eight years of litigation over Powell's failure to pay a defamation judgment won by a 71-year-old Harlem widow who Powell called a "bag woman" — collector of graft for policemen — on a 1960 television program. It apparently made Powell subject to arrest if he came into New York State without making a further appeal and obtaining a parole from a judge of the Court of Appeals.

The amount of the defamation judgment to Esther James went up and down drastically over the years as more than a dozen state judges issued opinions on Powell's conduct in the case. Some time ago, Powell cleared himself of a civil complaint conviction by paying more than \$50,000 to Mrs. James.

### RE-ELECTED

Thursday's court decision did not specify at what point contempt of court in a civil case becomes serious enough to be considered criminal contempt. The criminal contempt cita-

tion was made before the House of Representatives barred Powell from taking his seat at the start of the 90th Congress in 1967. The grounds were misuse of House committee funds and his enrollment with New York courts. Later that year, Powell was re-elected to Congress in a special election but he never claimed his seat. ## To Abandon Katy Track

WICHITA FALLS (AP) — The Missouri-Kansas-Texas Railroad (MKT or Katy) will abandon its railroad track between Wichita Falls and Henrietta, 19 miles southeast, and on to Gainesville.

The track between here and Henrietta was built by J. A. Kemp of Wichita Falls in the mid-1890's when the MKT refused to extend the line to Wichita Falls, then a town of 2,000. In 1914, the MKT took over operation.

The MKT will use the Fort Worth & Denver Railway's track to move equipment.

John Barriger, MKT president, also said the trackage between Henrietta and Gainesville will not be kept in service. The MKT is taking the action in order that funds will be available to rehabilitate the Wichita Falls & Northwestern Railway Co., which is operated by the Katy. The WF&N was built by Kemp and Frank Kell in 1905. It runs from Wichita Falls to Fargos, Okla.

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## Eggers Says He's Not 'Machine' Tied

AUSTIN (AP) — Paul Eggers, GOP candidate for governor, says the big issue in the race for governor is a change in leadership.

### DIFFERENCES

"I'm not tied in to a machine that has been going on for years. We can't afford to go into the next two years with a government that will stand still, and under my opponent's plan, we would stand still," Eggers told a news conference Thursday.

Asked what the differences are between himself and Lt. Gov. Preston Smith, the Democratic nominee, Eggers said, "I haven't heard him speak out on the issues enough to tell where we do differ."

Eggers said he plans to work for support from liberals, union members, Mexican-Americans and other traditionally Democratic groups.

# HINTS FROM HELOISE Minnie Pearl Tells About 'Pig-Taters'

Dear Heloise: I have long been an admirer of yours and have gotten a big kick out of your column.

Now you are kind enough to ask me to give your readers my recipe for "Pig-Taters" which I have cooked on several TV shows.

Well, here goes... 1 medium size potato (Irish or Sweet)

Link or bulk sausage  
Scrub that tater and bore a hole almost to other end with an apple corer. Then stuff your link sausage (or bulk) right in the hole. Grease the tater, wrap it in aluminum foil and bake until good-and-done.

Please let me say "How-dee!" to all of your friends. I am one of your biggest fans, Heloise. Keep the good work going! ... Minnie Pearl

Yes, folks, this is the REAL Minnie Pearl of the "Grand Old Opry" TV show! And thanks oodles for them that kind words, Minnie.

Just as soon as I received her letter, I flitted right into the kitchen to bake some of Minnie's "Pig-Taters." I tried both large Irish bakers and big sweet potatoes, as well as bulk, precooked and regular link sausage. Here's what I did:

First I cut the pointed ends off the sweet potatoes. Then cut some of both kinds (Irish and sweet) in half crosswise. Next I cored them clear through and stuffed the openings—some with link and some with the bulk sausage. (Easier to do this way because it speeds up the baking time and cooks the sausage better, too.) Some of you may

wish to parboil your sausage first, but it isn't necessary.

Then I put the two potato halves back together, greased and wrapped 'em in foil. A few I left unwrapped so the skins would be nice and crispy the way I like 'em. And a few others I left whole, cored 'em clear through and stuffed.

Then I put them all in a baking dish to keep the juices from dripping down on the oven floor. I turned them over ONCE halfway through the baking period.

Ummm, ummm, did those taters melt in my mouth! The sweet potatoes were especially scrumptious. The sausage was done to perfection and had seasoned the potatoes just right. I simply ate them "as is," but you could add salt, pepper and butter—any way you like 'em.

The ones cooked whole I cut in thick slices crosswise and lay them flat on my plate for serving. They looked real pretty with the sausage in the center.

Some day when you're in a potato-baking mood, try it. You will have your meat and potatoes cooked all in one operation and I'll guarantee that your family will really go for this dish.

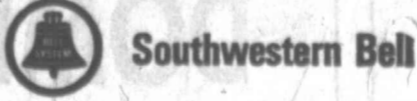

# Language Disabilities Clinic Need Stressed

Representatives from the educational and medical fields took the first step in setting up a language disabilities clinic for Big Spring children at a meeting here Thursday evening. The group, headed by Dr. Harold Smith, agreed that there was a need for a diagnostic clinic for children with learning disabilities in the area. They voted to meet again following further research.

"The group of children which constitutes a need for the clinic are not the mentally retarded, but children with average or above average intelligence who have learning disabilities," he said.

### GO SIGN

Dr. Smith, optometrist, chairman of a four-man committee that initiated the idea of the clinic, appealed to the group, composed of educators, physicians, optometrists, ophthalmologists, and psychologists, to consider the idea of setting up the clinic on a multi-discipline level.

Dr. Smith and the committee, Dr. W. A. Riley, Keith Swain and Ernest Welch, are members of the Dora Roberts Rehabilitation Center board of directors. Following investigations of similar clinics in the area, Smith presented the idea before the board and they gave the committee a green light for further research.

"In order that a diagnostic clinic of this type be effective to the child and to the community, each member of the team must work together," Shelly Smith, director of Abilene Rehabilitation Center, said.

# Noisy Group Boos Wallace At Rally

NORTH DARTMOUTH, Mass. (AP) — George Wallace ends a five-day presidential campaign swing through Massachusetts today after a noisy confrontation with a group of about 80 young people, about half Negroes, Thursday night.

**DEADLINE**  
"It was the worst reception we've had in Ohio and Massachusetts," one Wallace campaign worker said. The group began booing the former Alabama governor from the outset. The youths said they were from an Upward Bound program in New Bedford funded by the Office of Economic Opportunity.

Wallace is collecting 61,000 signatures before a July 23 deadline to put his name on the November ballot in the state. A campaign aide said that "in the neighborhood of half" the needed signatures had been obtained, and said he expected, "If things keep up as they have, we feel very confident we'll make it with plenty of room to spare."

In St. Paul, Minn., a spokesman in the Minnesota secretary of State's office said Wallace's name would appear on that state's presidential ballot in November. He said petitions bearing 4,283 signatures had been filed Thursday seeking the ballot spot. State law requires a minimum of 2,000 signatures.

**WITH DOGS**  
Wallace asked the 2,000 members of his audience at North Dartmouth to sign his Massachusetts petitions then sought to explain his position on race. Wallace said his late wife, Lurleen, received heavy votes in Negro districts.

"Now take Selma," Wallace said, "you've all heard of Selma." "Yeah, with the dogs!" shouted a man in the back of the room. Wallace later criticized "politicians" who lured millions of people from rural areas to overcrowded cities.

# Clifford Sets Stage For More Nuclear Subs

WASHINGTON (AP) — Secretary of Defense Clark M. Clifford has set the stage for a possible expansion of the U.S. nuclear attack submarine force with his approval of a new superfast model.

Clifford told a news conference Thursday he has ordered the top scientific and technical brains to work on the vessel, understood to carry a price tag of around \$185 million.

This is \$100 million more than the latest Sturgeon class atomic sub whose mission is to hunt and kill enemy underwater craft.

**MAY GET AX**  
The authorization was a partial victory for Vice Adm. Hyman G. Rickover, the Navy's nuclear expert, who was pushing the Pentagon for advanced American submarines to meet the growing Soviet undersea force.

But as Clifford announced he had authorized the new sub, Rickover helped design, he left open the possibility another Rickover favorite—a superquiet sub—may get the ax.

This submarine, which could track enemy vessels with great stealth, was approved last year but the Pentagon has been threatening to abandon it to save money.

**DIM VIEW**  
Rickover, a congressional favorite, has been arguing through Capitol Hill committees for the quiet sub, but the outlook has dimmed. Clifford said a decision on its fate will be forthcoming in the next few weeks.

The approved sub—Clifford didn't say how much faster it would be than present 30-knot vessels—is slated for full budgeting in 1970, defense officials said. Long-lead-time parts are sought under the fiscal 1969 budget now before Congress.

The authorized nuclear attack force stands at 69 submarines, about half of which have been built, with the other half either under construction or approved. Work on the last four is scheduled to begin in 1969 and 1970, and defense officials said the high-speed version will be one of the last two models.

# Promises To Make Vatican Pay Taxes

ROME (AP) — Caretaker Premier Giovanni Leone, trying to rebuild a majority center-left coalition by fall, is seeking Socialist support with a promise to make the Vatican pay taxes on the dividends it collects in Italy.

The promise helped his Christian Democratic minority government win a vote of confidence Thursday night in the Chamber of Deputies. The vote was 263-252, with 88 abstentions by Socialists and Republicans who could have turned the government out by voting no.

**MANDATE**  
Leone's government is expected to complete its mandate to govern until fall by winning another vote of confidence in the Senate next week. Taking the Vatican is something no other Italian government ever dared mention. Leone's proposal would require the Vatican to pay the 30 per cent dividend tax every other Italian investor pays. This would include \$8 million to \$11 million in arrears dating back to 1963, when the tax took effect.

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Mayor Sam Yorty has apologized to France's consul general for "bad manners displayed by some members of our City Council" in refusing to appropriate \$316 for a French flag-raising.

The ceremony was set for Sunday—French Independence Day—but Consul General Gerard Peres wrote Yorty to ask that it be canceled to avoid any further dispute.

The City Council refused 6-6 last week to authorize the expenditure. Opponents of the ceremony criticized some policies and statements of French President Charles de Gaulle as anti-American.

## Tax Protests Still Voiced

# Bill To Ax Entrance Fees At Many Lake Areas Okayed

WASHINGTON (AP) — The House Public Works Committee Thursday completed work on a \$1.6 billion authorization bill for future water projects that included several Texas projects.

The measure now goes to the House, where it may be considered next week.

The bill also would eliminate entrance fees at many federal lake areas.

A similar bill recently passed the Senate carrying authorizations totaling \$2.1 billion. The House committee added

some projects to the Senate bill, deleted two and rearranged others. The result was a somewhat lower total.

RED RIVER DEAL Both bills include \$466 million in additional authorization for 12 river basins. This authorization actually adds little or no additional cost to the bill since individual projects within the basins have previously been authorized. However, ceilings usually are placed on the over-all basin authorization so as to give Congress an opportunity to review the basin work periodically.

Biggest project in the bill is the proposed Red River navigation project in Louisiana, Arkansas and Texas. This has a total cost of \$522,910,000, of which the federal share would be \$471,223,000.

The Senate version would authorize the entire amount but the House committee, while authorizing the entire project, would put a ceiling of \$50 million on the authorization at this time.

NEW PROJECTS The committee wrote into the bill a proviso eliminating all entrance fees and many user fees now charged at lakes and reservoirs under Army Engineer jurisdiction. The proviso would be effective in March, 1970. After that date fees would be charged only for use of highly developed facilities at such recreation areas.

Projects added by House committee: Texas Corpus Christi Ship Channel, channel deepening for navigation, total cost \$20,682,000, federal share \$19,042,000.

# 2,000 Prisoners Fight Riot Police

NAPLES, Italy (AP) — Nearly 2,000 prisoners, infuriated by a boiling heat wave, seized control of Naples main Poggioreale Jail today and fought a pitched battle with riot police.

A group of prisoners overpowered their guards, threw open the cells for their jailmates, and ran screaming through the corridors of the stifling building. Prisoners poured out of cells, setting fire to beds and other objects.

'GO BACK' Hundreds of prisoners threw flaming mattresses, blankets and a shower of bricks into the streets around the jail before a detachment of riot police forced its way into the central courtyard.

Hysterical, sobbing relatives flocked to the prison as word of the riot spread through the city. Police reinforcements ringed the prison to prevent a breakthrough.

'Go back, Giovanni' "Go back, Gennaro" women wailed as they waved handkerchiefs at prisoners standing defiantly atop the tall prison walls.

The prisoners began their mutiny in the morning by jeering at their guards and stamping their feet in a mounting chorus to demand more time in the open air and permanent running water in their cells.

One group of prisoners taking a recess in a courtyard attacked their guards and threw open the doors of the prison cells. Soon, the heat-crazed prisoners were burning everything in sight. A thick column of black smoke rose over the area.

MUTINY While a delegation of prisoners met with the prison director to present their demands, other prisoners shouted obscenities at the crowd and the police, troops and firemen ringing the area. The protest delegation called living conditions "impossible" because a limited supply of water made cells dirty and unhealthy.

"We are dying of thirst" the prisoners shouted down at their relatives. Many relatives had brought along bottles of mineral water and food packages for the prisoners.

After five hours of mutiny, calm returned to the prison and most of the prisoners headed toward their cells. But strong detachments of police and firemen still ringed the building.

## Mail Cutback Relief Asked

WASHINGTON (AP) — House Speaker John W. McCormack, D-Mass., said today the Post Office Department should be given relief if necessary from a personnel cutback threatening to halt Saturday mail deliveries.

The cutback, affecting most federal agencies, was included in the new surtax law. A bill to exempt the postal service is pending in the House Ways and Means committee.

The Post Office Department said mail service on Saturdays will continue for the time being despite the reports it is considering the cutback in deliveries to five days a week to save money.

"We have not made any announcement and no instructions have been given to curtail service," a department spokesman said Thursday. "Patrons will get their mail as usual on Saturday."

## Street Sweeper Completes Circle

The city street sweeper was operated for a total of 17 days during June, covering the city and is now halfway through again, according to the monthly report of the Public Works Department.

A total of 462 cubic yards of debris was removed with crews working 135 hours and covering 695 miles. A new pickup broom was installed which increased efficiency 60 per cent.

## THIRD MAN SOUGHT Two Face 'Hot' Check And Forgery Charges

Dee Scaggs Jr., and Jimmy Cueallos, both of Big Spring, have been charged with forgery and passing in connection with the circulation of bogus checks forged on stolen check forms of the Vincent Gin Company, Sheriff A. N. Standard said today.

He stated that Scaggs has been identified as the person who cashed one of the forged checks in Odessa and that he will be taken there as soon as he is arrested here. The sheriff said that Scaggs had been arrested on Thursday for a worthless check charge, not related to the gin case, and released on \$500 bond last night.

He said that it has been established that Cueallos worked for the gin company at one time. A third man is being sought in the case. Meantime, word has been received that \$900 worth of additional forged checks have shown up since Monday to bring the total of such checks to \$2,000. The check forms, an adding machine and a checkwriter were stolen from the Vincent Gin Company office in the last three weeks. Exact time the burglary occurred has not been established.

Charges against the two men are forgery and passing. No trace of the checkwriter, the adding machine or the other check forms has been found. The check forms printed on blue paper begin with the serial number 1300 and go through 1600. Any check on the Vincent gin presented which has a number falling anywhere between these two numbers is a forgery, the sheriff said.

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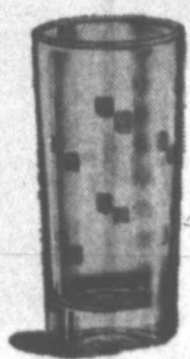

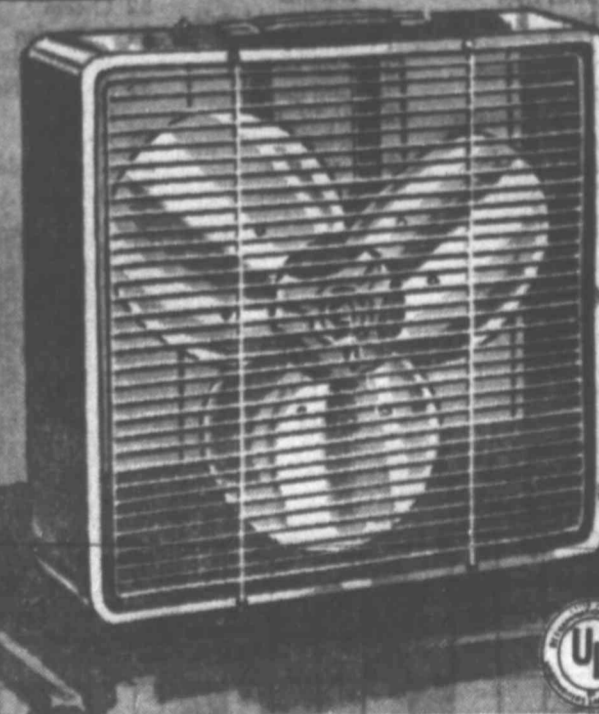

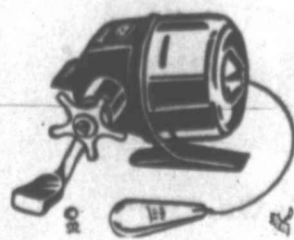

## Home Of Jesse, Frank James Going On The Block

KEARNEY, Mo. (AP) — The James' only son, lives in a favorite hideout of outlaws Jesse and Frank James, their own home, apparently will be sold at a public auction.

A tourist attraction for many years, the house has been boarded up since December when its owner, Mrs. Robert James, was declared incompetent and made a ward of the Clay County Probate Court.

Mrs. James, widow of Frank

Jack Wymore, owner of the Jesse James Bank Museum in Liberty and an authority on James lore, said the west ell of the house—two rooms constructed of siding-covered logs—is believed to have been built in 1822.

He said a Robert Gilmer added two rooms on the front in 1844, then sold the house and 160 acres to the Rev. Robert James, a Baptist minister from Kentucky, and his wife, Zerelda.

Frank James, born in 1843, was two years old when the family arrived at the farm. Jesse was born there in 1847.

"The James boys were a product of their times," Wymore says. The father died in the West during the California gold rush. After a brief marriage to a man twice her age, Mrs. James married Dr. Reuben Samuels.

Dr. Samuels was strung up so long by Northern sympathizers that the blood left his head and he lost his reason.

Shortly after that, Wymore said, Jesse, then 16, joined his brother, Frank, who was already a member of the infamous Quantrill's Bushwhackers.

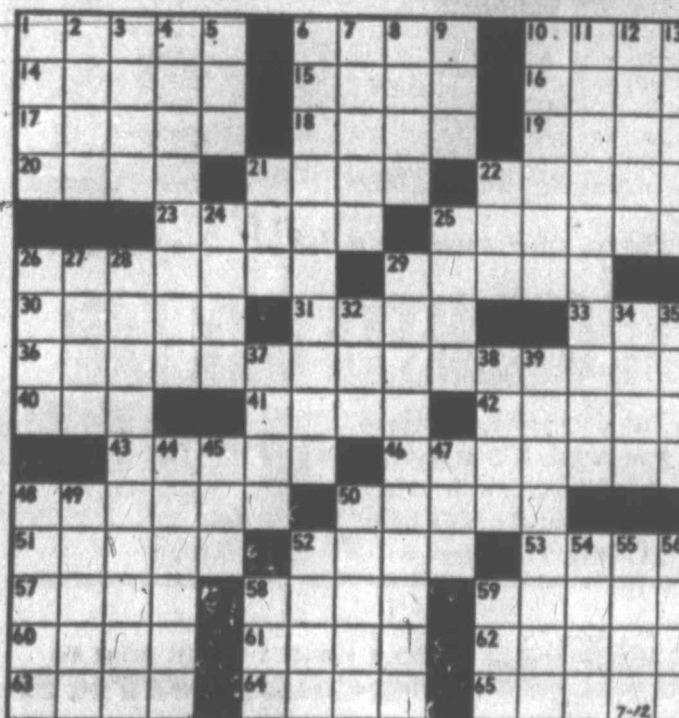
"Many people were secretly pleased when the James gang held up trains and robbed banks," Wymore said.

"It was a time of injustice and bitterness that we simply can't imagine today."

The Jameses' first big robbery was believed to be the Liberty bank in February, 1866. Train holdups and bank robberies followed in all parts of the Midwest.

# Hubert Proposes Red China Contacts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey proposed today wider contacts with Red China and said the United States should "make it clear that we are prepared to replace conflict with cooperation whenever the Chinese are."

Prospects for improved relations in the coming decade "are not good" but the U.S. stance should be to "continue to seek more normalized relations with the mainland," the vice president said.

Humphrey's remarks were made in a speech in San Francisco but instead were released as a foreign policy position paper when he was grounded in Washington on doctor's advice. His physician sent the vice president to bed Thursday to recover from what was described as a light case of grippe.

ture didn't take kindly to McCarthy's comments on the hunger problem.

**EMERGENCY**

Noting that the Minnesota president "declare a national emergency with respect to hunger," a department spokesman said that in the nearly eight years of the Kennedy and Johnson administrations McCarthy had never even made an inquiry to the department about feeding programs.

"His singular lack of interest in feeding the hungry during this eight-year period, a part of which he spent on the Senate Agriculture Committee," said Thomas R. Hughes, executive assistant to Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman, "lends little credence to his sudden zeal."

—Gov. Ronald Reagan of California denied a published report that he will announce his candidacy for the Republican presidential nomination during a nationwide television broadcast July 21. "There's nothing to it," he said.

—A deadlock continued in the strike against the Illinois Bell Telephone Co. by installers of telephones and other communications gadgetry. The walkout threatens the Democratic National Convention, scheduled to open in Chicago Aug. 26.

—George C. Wallace added Minnesota to the list of states in which he will appear on the ballot as the presidential candidate of the American Independent party. The required petitions were filed Thursday.

—John S. Eisenhower, son of former President Dwight D. Eisenhower, was named Pennsylvania chairman of Citizens for Nixon, a booster group supporting Richard M. Nixon for the GOP nomination.

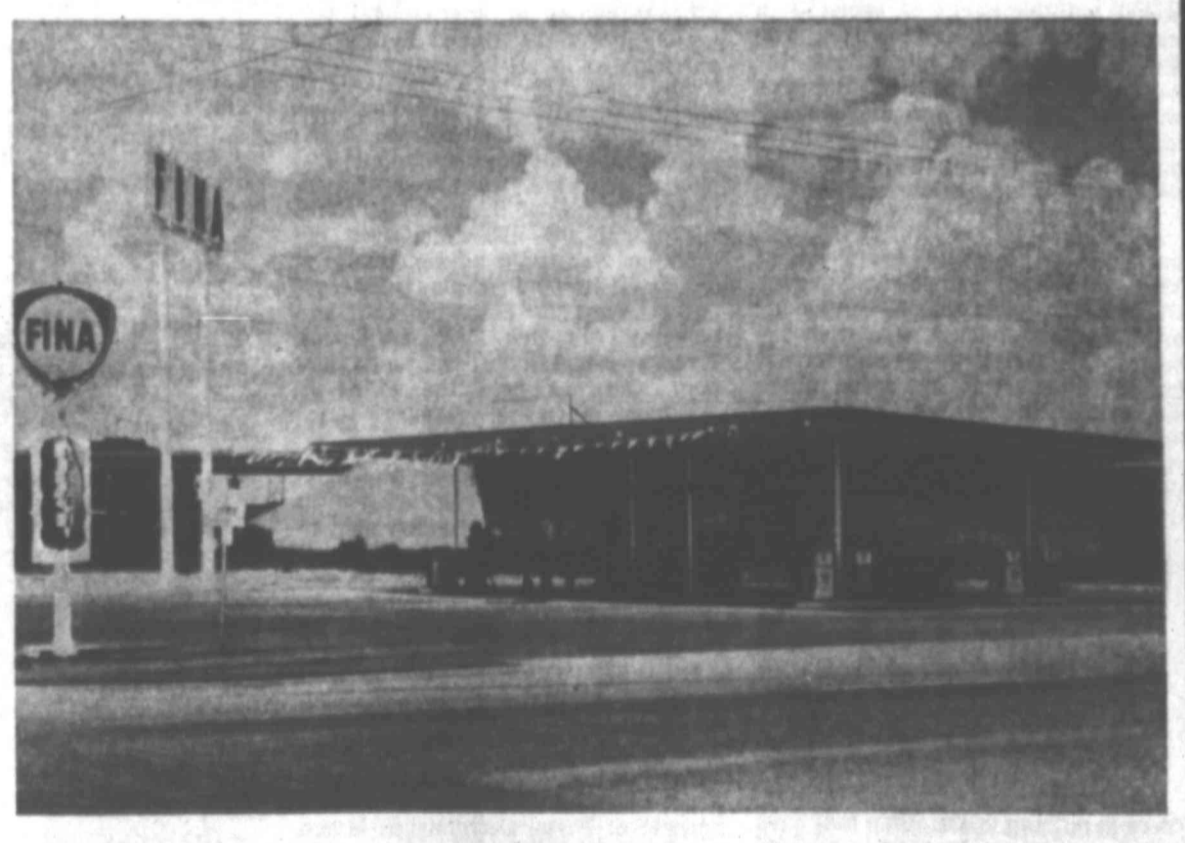

"But I feel I can still play," Colavito, in his 13th major league season, had a record of 23 hits in 113 at-bats this year for the Dodgers. His three homers in 1968 put him into a tie with Ralph Kiner for 18th place on the all-time list of home run hitters.

And, it took a late rescue effort by Lou Brock and Roger Maris to prevent the rampaging front-runners from being victimized twice by Houston's cellar-dwellers Thursday night.

The Astros, who've had a virtual monopoly on last for a month, used a two-run triple by Denis Menke in the 10th inning to snap the Cards' seven-game victory string, 5-4, in the opener of a doubleheader.

RALLY IN 8TH They were on the road to repeating that feat, despite a club record six errors, when Maris' single and Brock's double each accounted for a run in the eighth that let St. Louis escape 8-7 in a bizarre nightcap.

However, the loss didn't do much to dim St. Louis' chances of turning the league race into a farce. The Cards' lead was trimmed only half a game—to .94.

In other senior circuit games, Atlanta nipped Los Angeles 1-0 on Phil Niekro's four-hitter; San Francisco blasted Cincinnati 7-1; Philadelphia extended Pittsburgh's losing streak to six with a doubleheader sweep, 5-0 and 4-1, and New York edged Chicago 1-0, before dropping the nightcap of a doubleheader 2-4.

Niekro baffled Los Angeles with his dazzling knuckleball and a speeded-up delivery.

"I'm putting just a little more pop in my pitches, and it seems to be paying off," said Niekro, who retired the first 13 batters before yielding a fifth-inning single to Jim Lefebvre.

Joe Torre singled home the Braves' lone run in the first.

AARON ROBBED Hank Aaron was deprived of becoming only the eighth man in baseball history to hit 500 or more homers when left fielder Jim Fairey hauled in one of his long drives at the fence. Aaron needs only one more homer to

reach the coveted plateau. The Giants rode a single, double and homer by Dick Dietz and two run-scoring singles by Ron Hunt in their rout of Cincinnati. Gaylord Perry, 8-6, scattered six hits as San Francisco backed him with an 11-hit attack.

Willie Mays' double in the first inning moved him past Ty Cobb into fourth place on the all-time extra base hit list. It was Mays' 1,140th extra base hit of his career.

Pittsburgh has played three

straight doubleheaders — and lost all three. The Phils stopped them in the opener on Larry Jackson's six-hitter, then Cookie Rojas' double in a run and tallied himself on Tony Gonzalez' single to snap a 1-1 deadlock in the eighth.

CARNOUSTIE, Scotland (AP) — Early starters in the third round of the 1968 British Open Golf Championship fell victim to

Don Swaelens of Belgium was beaten by the winds and shot 39-41-80 for 235, which probably means he is out of the final round.

The task of coming from behind to catch Casper appeared harder and harder as the day progressed.

Doug Sanders, Ojai, Calif., who started with 154, shot a fair but uninspired par 36 on the first nine but he picked up a couple of damaging 5s on the return trip and didn't seem to be going anywhere special.

Bert Yancey, Tallahassee, Fla., with 153, 13 shots off the pace, slipped to a one-over-par 37 and then started the back nine with a disastrous 6 on the 10th hole.

Casper, Bob Charles, Gary Player and Jack Nicklaus were teeing off last in the field and had the opportunity meanwhile of noticing that nobody was burning up the course.

Doug Sanders, Ojai, Calif., was the first American to finish and carded a 36-37-73 for a three round total of 227 which should take him into Saturday's final round.

He had three birdies in his round—at the 565-yard sixth hole and the short 13th and 16th holes.

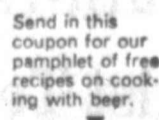

How, in good conscience, could a platoon of newsmen name Willie Mays the most valuable player in the recent all-star baseball game at Houston?

True, Mays scored the only run of the game when, after singling, he moved to second on a bonehead play and from second to third on a wild pitch. Willie perhaps would not even have scored had the American League infielder elected to the plate rather than wheel for the double play on Willie McCovey's followup ground ball.

Tommy Helms of the Cincinnati Reds was far more impressive than Wondrous Willie in the one game, anyway. And the National League pitchers deserved major credit for their contribution to the success.

The late Paddy Driscoll, one of the great players in the early days of professional football and later coach of the Chicago Bears, weighed no more than 150 pounds in his salad days.

He once drop-kicked four goals in one game, the longest of which was for 50 yards. When he was the quarterback on his high school team at Evanston, Ill., he tipped the scales at 120 pounds.

In 1929, he played in the same Bear backfield with Red Grange.

Big Spring's Charley West, who spent a month in professional baseball before he decided to concentrate on football, told the Cincinnati Reds he'd return the bonus they gave him.

In 56 at bats for Tampa of the Florida State league, Charley had 11 hits for a .196 average.

A week before he walked in and asked for his release, Charley vowed he was sticking with baseball.

Ron Allen, former golf coach at the Air Force Academy in Colorado Springs, who visited here recently, says that the greens of the Webb AFB course are among the best he has seen in this part of the country.

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## Two In Tie For Lead

MILWAUKEE, Wis. (AP)—Mac McLendon, who won a PGA tournament the first time he tried, and Rocky Thompson, looking for his first victory after five years of pro golf, shared the lead going into today's second round of the \$200,000 Greater Milwaukee Open.

McLendon and Thompson topped a swarm of subpar rounds Thursday with a pair of record 66s over the 6,155-yard par-72 North Shore Country Club course.

The three-year-old course, normally ravaged by stiff winds off nearby Lake Michigan, was more like a duffer's paradise as 40 players broke par and 29 played in regulation strokes.

"The wind will make it a completely different course," said the 22-year-old McLendon, a rookie from Birmingham, Ala., who won the Magnolia Classic in his PGA debut. "When the wind goes up, the scores go up."

Most everyone else agreed, including Dick Lotz, Fred Marti, and Red Horn, another PGA rookie from Overlook Park, Kan. All three were one stroke back of the leaders with 67s.

"The wind will be the whole thing," added Dave Stockton, who shot a 67 to pick up where he left off two weeks ago when he won the Cleveland Open.

McLendon took the early lead with his blistering morning round, which included seven birdies and one bogey. He had a four-under-par 32 on the rugged back nine.

## Complains Of 'Traps', Questions Speed Chase

To the Editor:

The wife and I just returned from an enjoyable weekend in Ruidoso, N.M. — very enjoyable except for one incident. After talking with several of the local residents it seems as if my experience was fairly common with out-of-state visitors to Ruidoso.

It seems as if the State of New Mexico deliberately used the July 4 weekend to their advantage. After the races Sunday my wife and I immediately began the trip home and we were detained onto a highway from Ruidoso to Capitan because of construction on the highway normally used. After following a slow line of traffic for about 15 miles we reached a stretch of highway that afforded passing (the only one between the two cities at that point). Naturally everyone began passing the slow traffic and in doing so several of us (tourists) exceeded the 55-MPH speed limit. It was at this point the state of New Mexico elected to hide their radar. We were motioned to the side of the road behind a line of a half dozen cars (all bearing Texas plates).

We were given less than two hours to appear before a justice of the peace in Capitan and when we arrived found that there was already a half dozen ahead of us. It was taking the judge an average of 30 minutes to dispose of each victim, and out of desperation to be on his way, one thinking Texan reduced his time to about 20 minutes by waiving his Constitutional rights and pleading guilty. Naturally everyone followed suit and even so it was just under three hours before the wife and I were on our way again. This time we were careful not to exceed the speed limit and in doing so probably saved an additional three hours. About 10 miles west of Roswell (a highway used by virtually every tourist returning to Texas and Oklahoma) the New Mexico

State Highway Patrol had set up their final farewell party, and this time they were reallyyyyy successful.

I am not now, nor did I then deny that I had exceeded the speed limit but I can't help wonder if my crime and that of the other tourists warranted such large scale arrests, especially after considering the fact that most of us, if not all, had just spent most of what we left home with in New Mexico. I do not believe that the leaders of the state of New Mexico are aware of this situation or they would do something about it. I know, after discussing this with several people here in Big Spring that I am not the first caught in this situation, and I am not the only person in Big Spring who feels that this is unjust treatment. But it is for sure that this kind of treatment will continue until enough people write enough protests to the State of New Mexico that they will change their policy, if for nothing else but economic reasons. After all who keeps Ruidoso alive?

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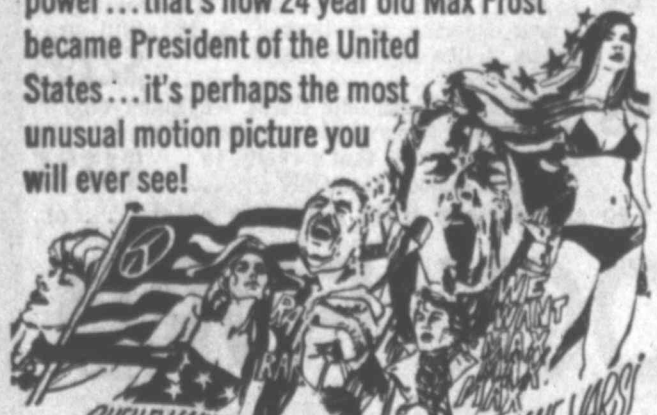
