# **Uribe Bond** Reduced A **Second Time**

George Perez Uribe, 25, under indictment for the murder of Paula Sanchez De Tomlinson, has been released from custody on \$5,000 bond.

When Uribe was arrested in connection with the fatal wounding of the Tomlinson woman last Sunday, his bond was pegged at \$10,000 and he was charged with assault with intent to murder.

Wednesday afternoon, when the grand jurors had reported a murder indictment against the man, Judge Ralph Caton, 118th District Court, reduced the bond to \$7,500.

The bond was again reduced, according to the records in the county jail, and Uribe has been released on \$5,000 bail. Judge Caton is out of town today and could not be contacted to find when the bond was diminished from \$7,500 to \$5,000.

Wayne Burns, district attorney, said he had heard nothing of the action until Friday. He said that if the judge desired to reduce the bail from the \$7,500 mark, it was not a matter on which he would have been advised.

Sheriff A. N. Standard said that the \$5,000 bail had been accepted by his office and that the defendant had been released.

The Tomlinson woman, shot in the head with a .22 rifle, died Monday afternoon.

#### Mao Forces Lose

TOKYO (AP) - Radio Moscow reported today that opponents of Mao Tse-tung have seized control of Wuchow, a city of more than 200,000 people, 120 miles west of Canton, after hard fighting in which several hundred persons were killed.

The Japanese-language broadcast said the anti-Maoists arrested about 3,000 supporters of the chairman of China's ruling Communist party.

Radio Moscow said more than 2,000 buildings were destroyed in the Wuchow fighting.

# Dirksen Defends LBJ's Actions

WASHINGTON (AP) - Senate Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois declared today Presidents Lincoln, Truman and Kennedy all appointed 'cronies' to the Supreme Court. He said it's about time that line of attack on President Johnson's nominations be dropped.

"You don't go out and look for an enemy to put on the court," Dirksen sternly lectured GOP Sen. Robert P. Griffin of Michigan at a Senate Judiciary Committee hearing.

Griffin heads a group of Republican senators intent on blocking nomination of Abe Fortas, now an associate justice, to be chief justice and Homer Thornberry to be an associate justice of the Supreme Court.

Griffin also labeled Johnson a "lame duck" president who was trying to keep his successor from filling court posts.

North opened the bidding with one diamond and East overcalled with one heart. South contented himself with a simple forcing response of two clubs and North rebid

two no trump. East now showed his second suit by bidding three diamonds. East's call convinced South that North did not have the bulk of his values in the diamond suit

and, in an effort to obtain more information, South showed a feature by cue bidding the ace of spades.

When North revealed his club support by returning to four clubs, the latter decided to dally no further and proceeded directly to six clubs. This bid was passed around to East who doubled. If his partner led a spade, he could ruff with his small trump and the ace of clubs would then score the setting

trick. The double of a slam bid is conventionally employed to secure an unusual lead. Inasmuch as East had bid both diamonds and hearts, he was hoping to tout his partner off the normal lead of one of his suits. By a process of elimination, West might, therefore, be induced to make the desired spade opening.

Unfortunately for East, the situation was complicated somewhat by the fact that North had also bid diamonds. Inasmuch as the slam double convention provides, as a first preference, the lead of dummy's first bid suit, West decided that East's three diamond call had been a strategic maneuver to secure a diamond lead. He, therefore, opened a diamond and the defense quickly succumbed. Declarer discarded a spade on the ace of diamonds, drew trump after driving out the ace and

#### Haunting Sound Of Unseen Wheels

It is not the biblical "sound of the turtle" that is heard in the land these days, but the sound of the turning of political wheels within wheels. On the face of it, things seem to be going along predictably: Richard M. Nixon has a fat and seemingly unbeatable lead for the Republican presidential nomination; Vice President Humphrey appears to be doing almost as well, in delegate count, on the Democratic

Nixon's delegate strength as tabulated by one of the news services has risen to 691, which is 24 more than he needs for nomination. Humphrey's delegate total, stands at 1,023, only 289 short of the magic nomination figure. Meanwhile, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller was reported to have a mere 278 GOP delegates, and Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy only 385 7-10.

So there's surely not much doubt, is there, that it will be Nixon vs. Humphrey in the finals? Maybe not. But the Nixon camp doubtless worries some about a curious fact - that whereas their man has the lion's share of pledged and "leaning" delegates

and clearly stands ace-high with both the pros and the rank and file in the Republican party, the polls show him trailing both Humphrey and McCarthy among a national cross-section of voters. Rockefeller may yet be able to capitalize on this as an indication that if Nixon were nominated the GOP would lose out in November.

There are some rifts in the Humph rey lute, too. He was booed at the rey lute, too. He was booed at the Poor People's Solidarity March in Washington; McCarthy won a big popular victory in New York; Negroes have been asking, "What have you done for me lately?" McCarthy hints that he might swing his support to Rockefeller if Humphrey does not change his views on Vietnam. Some leaders of the "dump Johnson" movement in the Democratic party now talk ment in the Democratic party now talk of backing a GOP ticket headed by Rockefeller if the Democrats choose

No one can state with complete confidence the outcome at the conventions. The outcome seems obvious, but there are enough sounds of wheels behind to cause that lingering doubt.

#### Novel Approach

One of the problems involved in the removal of substandard housing 'to make room for new dwellings is the relocation of the tenants. Often they are left without any new facilities or

the replacement housing is too costly.

A California congressional candidate has proposed an intriguing possible solution. He advocates using mobile homes to house tenants while new construction is under way. Such "spot urban renewal" would be possible, he asserts, with government financial aid and application of technological advances in the housing industry. A fourbedroom house adequate for the purpose could be built for less than \$10,000 in a few days, it is claimed. solving this problem

Dr. Robert Nolan, advocate of the plan, notes that there are around six million substandard housing units in the United States today and argues that "the housing industry just can't meet such a demand under present conditions." He believes that full use of technological advances could not only remedy the situation but would eventually be beneficial to rural and middle-income families "the way Henry Ford's techniques were finally used to make Cadillacs."

The idea is worthy of attention. A more radical approach by the housing industry, coupled with federal help as necessary, might go far toward

#### The Johnson Retirement

WASHINGTON-What has for several weeks been suspected as one of the real reasons for President Johnson's decision not to seek re-election has been authoritatively described as a deep-seated fear that his health would not stand up under another

WHEN MR. JOHNSON first disclosed that he would not run again, most people were surprised, because they had known of the President's fondness for political life and particularly his interest in the opportunities for public service which the office of chief executive provides. At the time, however, the only explanation of the President's withdrawal was the statement that he thought it would aid the cause of peace - a move which appeared to be constructive in that it might take the war issue out of politics. But this was not generally accepted as the only reason. In political circles there have been frequent discussions of the other factors involved.

NOW, IN AN article in "Look" magazine, written by Drew Pearson, Vice President Humphrey is quoted as having been told in confidence by President Johnson a few hours before the March 30 announcement that he intended to leave the presidency on Jan. 20 next, and gave health as one of the reasons. Mr. Johnson is quoted as having said to Vice President Humphrey:
"I'm tired. I'm getting old. All the

men in my family have a record of not living much over the age of 60. I'll be 60 this summer. I've had aheart attack. My health is pretty good. I think my chart is as good as yours. But I'm not sure I could live out another term. And that's not the way I want to end my life."

LYNDON JOHNSON likes politics so much that only reasons of health could really have persuaded him to make the decision to withdraw. He had enjoyed his years in the Senate, and especially his activities as Senate majority leader. As President, he has been able during the last four and one-half years to tackle dozens of domestic projects and to become absorbed in some of the most significant phases of international policy in which the United States has participated in all its history.

THERE CAN BE no doubt, of course, that Mr. Johnson, as an experienced politician, recognized that public sentiment was becoming intensely critical of his administration. Along with the dissension over the Vietnam war, such developments as an unprecedented crime wave and the outburst of domestic disorders added up to the most perplexing handicaps that have confronted any man who has held the office of President in recent years.

It was a very astute move for Mr. Johnson to declare that he was making his sacrifice in the interest of peace, for he would then be able to deal with the Vietnam war without being charged with seeking to win re-election merely by means of a deescalation of military operations.

UNQUESTIONABLY the subordination of political factors in the handling of the Vietnam problem has been widely accepted as basic in the administration's approach toward peace parleys with the North Vietnamese at Paris. Certainly if, before the election in November, it appears that progress is being made at the conference table to end the Vietnam war, the administration would bene-

Considering all the circumstances, Lyndon Johnson made a wise decision in giving up any idea of seek-ing another term. If by January he is able to resolve the Vietnam problem, he can retire from office with the feeling that he has performed a great service for his country.

## The War's Bitter Frustration

WASHINGTON - Although the preiminary talks in Paris are going into the third month, the war in Vietnam continues to weigh like a dark cloud on almost every aspect of American life. Nothing said so far from the American side gives any clue as to how the United States can get out of a conflict that appears endless and unwinable. THE BITTER FRUSTRATION SO

widely felt may prove to be the key to the outcome of the presidential election in November. The impassioned McCarthyites, independents, Democrats and even a minority of Republicans, will have none other than the man who promises to end the war with a coalition government in Saigon if that is the only way out. One consequence of the prolonged

and agonizing conflict is a volume of literature such as no other American war has generated while the guns were still firing. The latest addition to this remarkable library — virtually all a literature of protest and criticism - is "The Betrayal" by Lt. Col. (USMC, Ret.) William R. Corson,

AN ANGRY BOOK by an angry man, "The Betrayal" is noteworthy not for the supercharged emotion barely controlled but because the author maps a reasonable way out of the war. He proposes two courses of action: (1) To stay in Vietnam using tough measures to compel the South Vietnamese army to do the fighting and end the corruption that pervades the entire structure from top to bottom; (2) a phased withdrawal that would put the responsibility for a peace settlement on a coalition government in Saigon, including the National Liberation Front, the Buddhists and all other political ele-

qualifications. He is far from the flyin-and-fly-out observers shepherded by top military-diplomatic brass. A vet-eran of World War II and Korea he commanded the Marines' Combined Action Platoons that was one of the few successful experiments in integration of Vietnamese and American forces for the goal of pacification, winning the hearts and minds of the

In an extraordinary career starting from the bottom he has mastered a half dozen Oriental languages, become an advanced physicist and an authority on the financial system of

HE SUGGESTS that if progress is not made in the Paris talks the pressures will quickly grow to increase the commitment of American troops far above the present 550,000. With a new Communist offensive reported building up around Saigon this would seem to be an ominous possibility. In Corson's view - the view of one who for many months slugged it out in Vietnam not only with the Communists but with the vast military bureaucracy-a million men could come no closer to a "victory," and such a buildup would be the final doom for South Vietnam.

ONE THING in this latest contribution to the swelling volume of Viet-nam literature is abundantly plain. The United States will have to make far greater concessions than those thus far contemplated if the war is to be ended short of catastrophe. That means the obstructionism of the clique of Vietnamese generals hold-ing top authority in Saigon must be broken. Having given them control over a vast flow of arms and money and heaped praise on them, this is a formidable challenge.


