FROM ALL INDICATIONS, the Washington rally, which has seen above-average participation by farmers from the Friona area, is making some headway in their drive to inform leaders in Washington as to the serious problems faced by farmers.

Twenty-seven farmers from the area took part in the first week's rally, and have been telling their story all around the capital.

On Tuesday, the first group returned from Washington, and another group replaced them.

Meanwhile, governmental officials are beginning to recognize that the farmers are serious, that they are determined to "stand by their guns," and they are making some concessions.

Even President Carter, in his State of the Union message last Thursday, recognized the problems faced by the farmers. He mentioned them in his speech, as television cameras showed the dedicated group in the snowstorm outside the capitol.

Congressman Jack Hightower, a supporter of the farmers' cause from the first, told farmers over the weekend that President Carter has "finally recognized the plight of the farmers," and that continued pressure on the part of the farmers should result in a bill favorable to their cause.

Hightower, who formerly was this county's senator in Austin, was quoted as saying "The seeds are planted. Now we must cultivate and irrigate until the harvest is ready."

Those attending the rally also indicated that John Tower, the state's senior senator, who had been more or less paying lip service to the farmers' cause without wholeheartedly supporting their drive, had finally turned "whole hog" for the farm drive.

It was thought that perhaps a steady stream of almost 2,500 Texas farmers into the senator's office last week may have been the turning point.

ISN'T IT FUNNY how a little bit of snow will make people do silly things? Friona's snowfall of the past week was a beautiful and welcome sight.

American Ag Report Set Here

As "phase two" of the American Agriculture Movement's Washington Rally continued this week, the local organization called a meeting for Monday, January 30 at the Friona Community Center, to report on the progress of the rally. The meeting will begin at 7:30 p.m.

Several of the farmers who have participated in the Washington Rally will report on how the movement's program has been received. Businessmen as well as farmers are urged to attend the meeting.

It is felt that the "lobbying" which has been carried out by the farmers for the past two weeks is beginning to pay dividends. American Agriculture has told its story to a number of congressmen, from both the farm and non-farm belt.

"We are beginning to open a number of doors. And we plan to continue until everyone has heard our message," said a spokesman for the local group this week.

Fifteen farmers from the Friona area made the trip to the nation's capital during the first week's "big push." Nine more were in Washington this week, and at least five are planning to leave this weekend, as farmers keep their efforts up.

Some farm-belt congressmen, including Jack Hightower, have urged the farmers to keep the pressure on. George Mahon, when he appeared locally, told the farmers a prolonged drive would be necessary.

Those who have been in Washington this week include Clyde Woodard, O.W. Turner, Rick Rector, Lennie Petree, Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Fancher, Mr. and Mrs. Conrad Renner and Ralph Robinson.

Planning to leave for the third phase are Eddie Hall, Mike Hall, Leland Gustin, Rex Blackburn and Bearl Broyles.

Officials at the local office say they have a new IBM "message

sender" which allows quick correspondence to Washington. They also need some volunteer typists to help with the work during the week.

Briggs' candidacy will be subject to the action of the Republican party primary on May 6.

Trial Date Slated For Charged Pair

Rodolfo Corella, 24, and Fred Constancio, 48, were arraigned before District Judge Pat Boone, Jr. in 154th District Court on Thursday of this week.

The two are charged in the armed robbery of Joe Tongate, Friona Piggly Wiggly manager, on January 6, 1978. Tongate was robbed of approximately \$20,000 in cash and checks as he closed the store late on Friday.

Trial date for both Corella and Constancio was set for February 20 by Judge Boone. They remain in jail at Farwell, in lieu of \$50,000 bond each.

Corella was arrested in Loving, New Mexico the day after the robbery in Friona. At the time of his arrest he had on his person \$6400 in cash, which represented around half of the estimated cash Tongate was preparing to deposit in the bank.

The Piggly Wiggly manager received ten stab wounds plus a gash over his left eye caused by a club and knife-wielding assailant who was hiding in Tongate's vehicle.

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Trial dates were also set for a number of people indicted at the same time as Corella and Constancio. Several are charged in marijuana violations; there are also some burglary and assault charges.

The other cases are also scheduled for the February 20 session of 154th District Court.

One of those arraigned on Thursday, Paul Gene Davis of Muleshoe, pleaded guilty to a charge of burglarizing a dwelling and two counts of burglarizing a motor vehicle. He was given a five-year

probated sentence by Judge Boone, ordered to pay all damages incurred plus court costs.

In other activities, Sheriff Charles Lovelace said deputy Bill Morgan investigated a second complaint from Harley Merritt, regarding vandalism at his hog pen adjacent to the city. The previous week, someone had slashed and stabbed

show hogs belonging to Merritt and his son. This time, damage was noted to the pens.

The sheriff's office also is investigating the theft of two bales of cotton from the Clay's Corner Gin yard, and the driving across lawns at the Lazbuddie Baptist Church and parsonage.

Buske Given Office By S&L Association

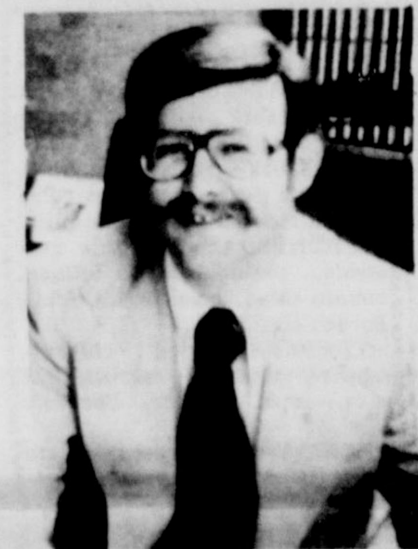

DEAR EDITOR:

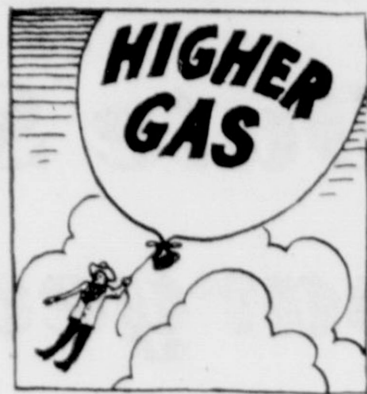
A recent TV news show reported the cost of natural gas to Texans. One segment showed a restaurant owner by a big gas range. It was revealed when the owner started in business the gas bill was \$38 a month. At present, he's paying \$3,000 a month. It sounded unbelievable!

There were similar charges to other consumers, but not as great. Nevertheless, the prices demanded seemed much too high.

I telephoned the TV station on the \$38-3,000 jump and the program director said the show was well-researched and the facts and the figures were honest and true.

I then called a lawyer friend and he related about the state lines, congressional heel-dragging and the rest of the excuses used to overcharge Texans. How alleged political power of the oil industry was another factor in maintaining usurious prices for natural gas.

The lawyer did suggest a possible way to fight this thing. The federal law against discrimination is pretty



broad. It could be used to help the hard-pressed Texas family.

A lawsuit could be instituted demanding a show cause order be issued as to why Texans should be bled white by high prices as compared to the rest of the people of the United States.

When a Texan pays \$82.16 for natural gas and I pay \$14.93 for about the same amount consumed, to me that's discrimination—state lines, legal, religious or on any grounds the legal eagles choose to call it.

Texans must make their representatives fight for them. They must raise hell like certain minorities do when they want something.

I'll write my three guys in Congress to correct this infamous mess foisted on you folks in Texas.

I wish good luck, good health and God's blessings to all Texans for many, many years to come.



Center Opening Sunday

The Friona Youth Center is to hold a Grand Opening for the public on Sunday, January 29, from 1-5 p.m.

Residents of the community are invited to come by for cookies and refreshments during the afternoon Sunday. Door prizes will be awarded every hour on the hour.

"We invite all of the parents and youngsters in the area to see this exciting new addition to our community," said Dave Johnson, president of the adult council.

The center will be open on Saturdays and Sundays. As soon as basketball season is over, it is planned to select an additional night to open during the week.

"We plan to make the center a summer activity, as well as during school holidays, to give the local youngsters supervised activities," said Geary Brogden, another of the adult sponsors.

Included among the free activities at the center are ping pong, air hockey, and table games, such as monopoly, cards, etc. Coin-operated games are also available, including pinball, pool, foosball and an audio-visual car race game. These games are to be expanded and changed from time to time.

Soft drinks and candy are available on a snack bar basis at the center.

"In general, we plan to make the center a place to visit with a student's friends, with adult supervision," said a spokesman. So far, there have been at least two adults on duty at all times.

The Friona Youth Center is located at 116 East Ninth, next door to E & M Super Market.

SCS Report

Trees for windbreak planting need to be ordered by February 1.

Windbreak trees are available through the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District from the Colorado State Forest Service.

Most of the trees can be ordered either as bare rooted or as potted. The cost for the potted trees are 12 dollars for 30 trees. The cost on the bare root trees are 16 dollars for 100.

The top height on the conifers are: Bare root-5'12" top height; Potted-4'10" top height.

To participate in the program one must have at least two acres of rural land. Persons may make their orders known through the Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

We have received orders for over 1100 trees now. We plan to take orders for these trees up to February. If you are interested in these trees come by the Soil Conservation Service or call the office number which is 247-2220 to make your order.

We expect delivery of trees to Friona in the mid of March through April.

Under the new farm bill, the County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation (ASC) Committee now has authority to implement the Emergency Livestock Feed Program (ELFP).

The purpose of this program is to assist eligible livestock owners by sharing the cost of purchasing feed for eligible livestock when such feed must be purchased in quantities above normal. The assistance is for the preservation and maintenance of livestock in any area where the County ASC Committee determines that an emergency exists.

The emergency could be created by drought, hail, etc. To be eligible under this new program, the livestock producer must:

(A.) Have suffered a substantial loss in livestock feed normally produced on the owner's farm(s) for eligible livestock. A substantial loss is defined as being at least 40 per cent below normal.

(B.) Not have sufficient feed for eligible livestock for the feeding period, and:

(C.) Be required to make feed purchases for eligible livestock in quantities larger than normal.

Under this new program, eligible producers may be reimbursed for up to 50 per cent of the cost of the feed purchased for eligible livestock. The County ASC Committee determines eligibility on a case-by-case basis. If a livestock farmer suffers a disaster, he should contact the County ASCS Office and file an application for emergency feed assistance. Applications must be filed by January 31, 1978.

Applicants under all programs administered by ASCS are given equal consideration without regard to race, color, sex, creed, or national origin.

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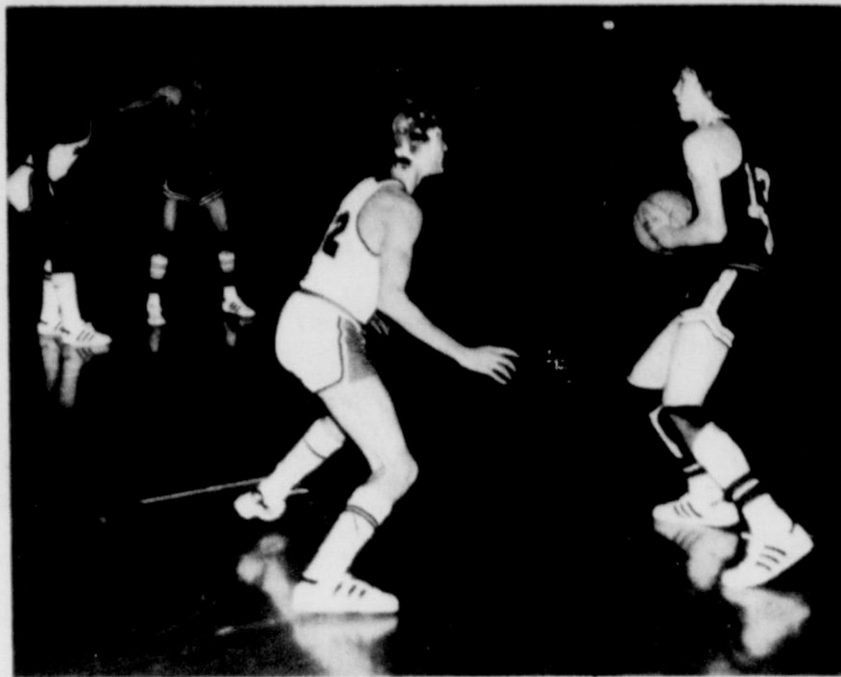

Late Rally Fails; Morton Wins, 68-61

The explosive Morton Indians took advantage of a nightmarish first quarter by the Friona Chieftains here Tuesday, and rallied late when they had to, and handed the Chiefs their first district loss of the season, 68-61.

Fans who braved the cold and snow to watch the battle of the two state-ranked teams were treated to a great exhibition of basketball.

Actually, they saw virtually two different games. One was the first half, in which Morton raced to a 46-28 lead, and seemed to have the game in their hip pocket.

But the Chiefs came back to dominate the second half, 33-22, and actually tied the game at one point, after being as much as 21 points behind at one stage in the second quarter.

It was a great exhibition of character by the Chieftains, who never quit trying, even though few things went right for them in the early stages of the game.

A cold-shooting first quarter for the Chieftains, and some good shooting by the visiting Indians led to a 26-11 Morton lead at the end of the first quarter, and this in the long run was Friona's undoing.

The shooting of Kevin Kothmann kept Friona in the game in the early going. Kothmann canned four straight baskets as Morton had an 11-8 lead midway of the quarter. Friona missed two or three chances to score baskets, that would have trimmed the lead to 11-10. Finally, Morton hit a hot streak, and ran the score to 16-8, 22-10, and then to 26-11 as the quarter ended.

Kothmann was the only Chieftain to score a basket in the opening quarter. Morton was clicking on all cylinders.

The Indians continued their assault in the second quarter, until with 3:43 left before halftime, the visitors had a 21-point lead at 40-19.

Two baskets by Koty Kothmann, one by Kevin and another by Jon Jarecki trimmed the lead to 14 at the 1:40 mark, but Morton blunted the rally by scoring a pair of baskets in the last 1:26 for a 46-28 halftime lead.

Only the most optimistic Chieftain fan could have thought that the team could come back and make it tough on the defending state champions, but that is exactly what they did.

Friona reeled off five straight buckets, including two by Todd Bandy. His second one came after he stole the ball and drove the length of the court for a lay-in, to trim the lead to ten points, 46-36, with 5:33 left in the quarter.

Morton, which went into a ball-control type of offense in the third quarter, did not score a basket until the 3:27 mark when big Rusty Lamar tipped in a shot for a 48-38 score.

But Friona continued its rally. Lawrence Fithen and Leslie White each canned a pair of free throws following Morton fouls, and Koty Kothmann made a timely lay-in just ahead of the buzzer, and Friona trailed by only four at 50-46.

Jeff Whiteside, having his worst night of the season from a scoring standpoint, missed a 1-1 free shot attempt after time ran out, or Friona would have trimmed the margin to two points.

Lawrence Fithen's jump shot did that a minute into the final quarter, and when Bandy canned both ends of a 1-1 free shot with 5:55 left, the Chieftains had completed an amazing comeback, to tie the score at 50-all. Friona had outscored Morton, 22-4 since halftime.

But the Indians finally broke the tough Chieftain defense, and Lamar scored a pair of baskets, and Morton added four more points, as the Indians streaked to a 58-50 lead in a minute and one-half of clock time.

The best Friona could do the rest of the way was to swap baskets, and Morton held on for a seven-point win.

Koty Kothmann came up with his best scoring game of the season, with 21 points, and his brother Kevin added 16. Whiteside managed only six—which was 12 below his average. Morton all-stater Bobby Patton, although below par himself with just nine points, did a tremendous defensive job on Whiteside, and that turned out to be more important than his own lack of points.

The bruising game saw 36 fouls being called. Morton lost both its top scorers, Patton and Lamar, on fouls. Friona didn't lose a player on fouls, but four starters had four fouls each when the buzzer sounded.

In their game at Olton last Friday, the Chieftains rolled to their 20th win of the season, whacking Olton, 81-43.

The Chiefs streaked to a 49-19 halftime lead, and coasted to the win. With Friona holding a 12-6 lead late in the opening quarter, the team exploded for 14 points in the last 2:10 of clock time to open up a 26-6 lead.

Friona continued its fast pace in the second quarter, outscoring their hosts, 18-3 in the first half of the quarter, to take a commanding 44-9 lead. Todd Bandy sparked the rally, both with timely baskets and his ball-hawking.

Having a 30-point halftime lead, Coach Jimmy Pope was able to substitute liberally.

Kevin Kothmann had one of his most productive nights of the season, and best in district play with 22 points. Whiteside added 16 and Bandy 14.

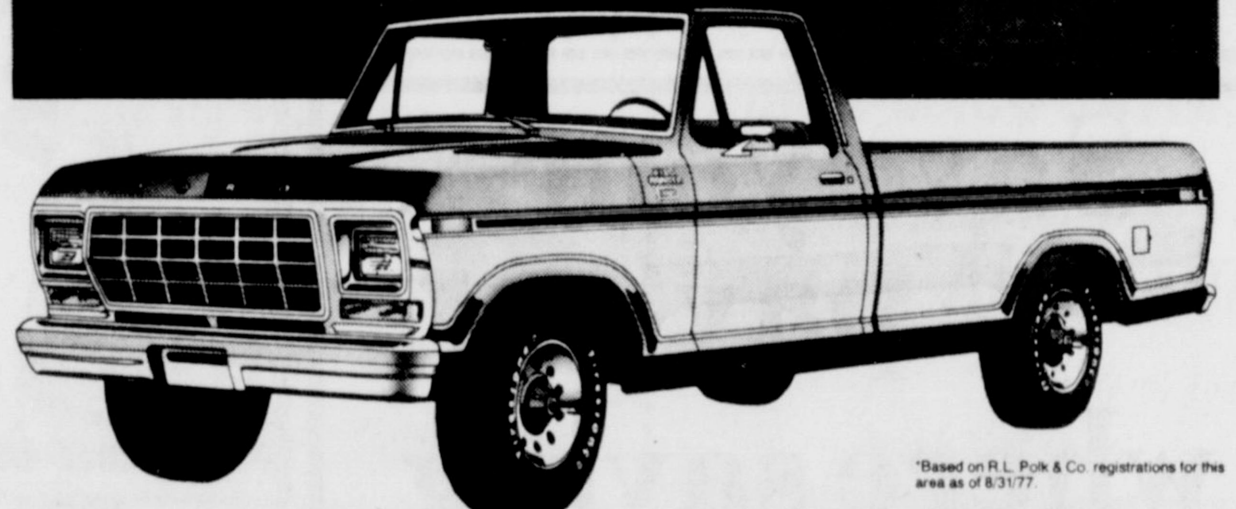

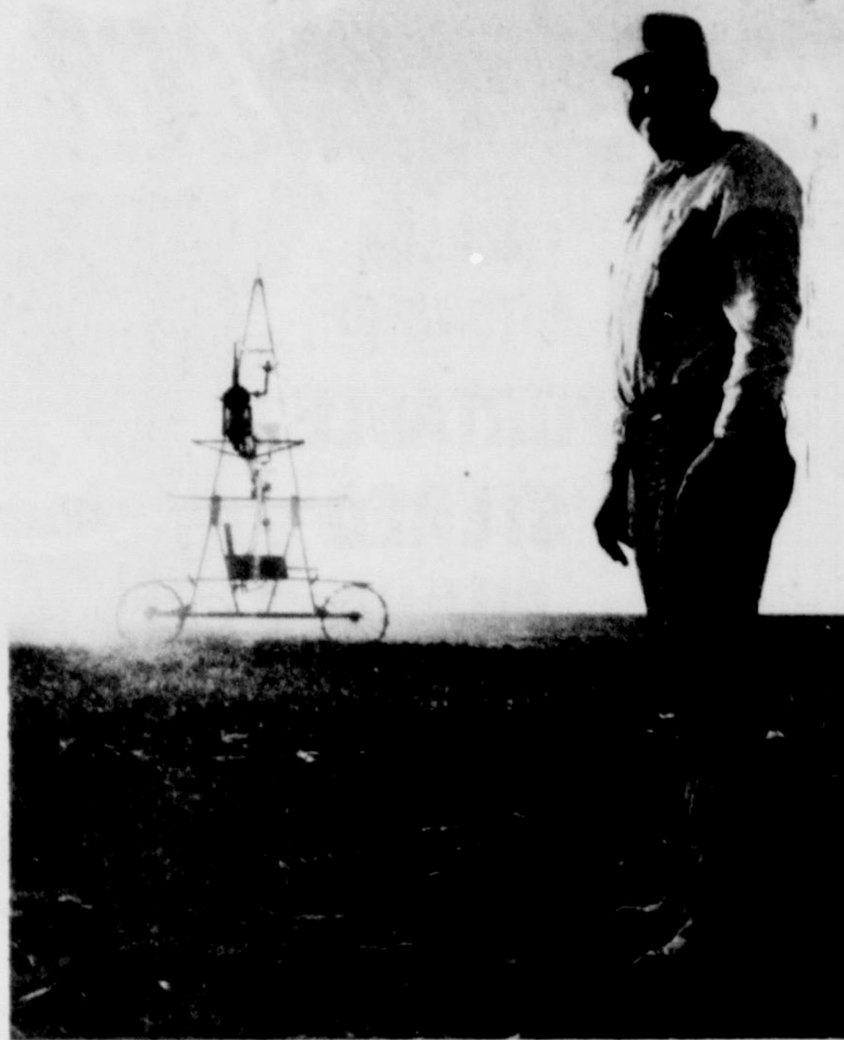

County Is Among Leaders

Parmer County was among the top ten wheat producing counties in Texas in 1977. Agriculture Commissioner Reagan V. Brown said last week.

With a total harvest of 3,092,900 bushels, Parmer County produced 2.6 per cent of the wheat grown in the state, Brown said.

Of the 89,100 acres planted in wheat, Parmer County farmers harvested 82,800 acres, and realized a 37.4-bushel per acre average yield, he noted.

New Technique Saves Money For Area Farmer

Applying herbicides through a sprinkler irrigation system is a new technology that works for certain herbicides in corn. Dr. Allen Wiese, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station Researcher, pointed this out at the Southern Weed Science Society in New Orleans on January 18. Eradicane, Sutan+, and Lasso are labeled for this purpose.

Mixtures of Sutan+ and Atrazine along with Lasso and Atrazine are also labeled. The Texas A&M University scientist also told Society members about 1977 research he conducted with Bill Turner, a CIAB-Geigy researcher from Lubbock, Texas. Getting more herbicides labeled for application through center pivots was the object of the study.

The two scientists applied twelve preemergent treatments to corn through a center pivot irrigation system on the Charles Hough farm south of Friona, Texas. An untreated plot was included for comparison and each plot was about 10 acres.

Herbicides and pounds per acre active ingredients

applied with 0.8 inch of water were Dual + AAtrex, 2 + 1.6 and 2.5 + 2.5; a prepackage mixture of the two herbicides at the same two rates; AAtrex, 3; Dual, 3; Lasso, 3; Lasso + AAtrex, 2.25 + 1.2; Eradicane and Dual were applied in 1.3 inches of sprinkler irrigation. The 0.8 inch of water wet the soil 2 to 3 inches and largely evaporated. The 1.3 inch water application wet the soil deeper and met residual moisture.

The quarter section field had been no-till planted to corn in 1976 and treated with AAtrex. Stalks had been shredded and the field was tandem disked prior to planting corn on April 27, 1977. There were several tons of crop residue on the soil surface when herbicides were applied from May 3 to May 6. The fine textured soil was one-third sand, silt and clay with 1.5 percent organic matter. Volunteer corn and a few weeds were cultivated about May 15.

About two weeks after application, the scientists took soil samples at 1 to 2 and 2 to 4 inches deep and planted them to millet and wheat to measure how deep herbicides leached. AAtrex, Eradicane and Dual applied with 0.8 inch of water along with Dual and Eradicane applied in 1.3 inches of water were sampled.

AAtrex injured wheat at both depths, but had little effect on millet. Dual did not leach below 2 inches when applied in 0.8 inches of water, but leached below 2 inches when 1.3 inches of water. "More of the Eradicane must have persisted when applied in the high rate of water," the scientists said.

The researchers checked weed control on June 30 when corn was 5 feet tall. Neither untreated nor treated areas had many weeds and by harvest the entire field was weed free. Herbicides did not injure the corn and all plots produced about 10,000 pounds per acre of grain.

Wiese concluded his presentation by stating that the information gained from the experiment will help obtain labels for AAtrex and Dual. He also pointed out that occasional poor weed control with Eradicane, when applied with sprinkler irrigation to fine textured soil, may be the result of insufficient water application.

Squaw Jayvees Gain Revenge

The Junior Varsity Squaws have won three games since our last report. The wins brought the team's season record to 18 wins against a single loss. One of the wins, a 52-47 victory over Canyon JV, avenged Friona's only loss of the year.

The loss by the Canyon girls spoiled their otherwise perfect record. The team had a 14-game winning streak going into the game.

Otherwise, the Squaw Jayvees socked Happy JV, 55-23 in a game here January 17, and coasted to a 32-10 win over Olton on January 20.

All-Stars Set Game

The KVII-TV Pro-News All-Stars are coming back to Friona for a "command performance" on February 11, when they meet the Friona Ag-Chem "Wild Bunch" in a benefit basketball game.

Proceeds from the game will go to the Friona Athletic Department, to help pay for game films.

Advance tickets went on sale this week. Tickets are \$1.00 for adults and 50 cents for students.

Playing on the local team will be Lenny Petree, Dave Hutson, Dee King, Roy "Cool Breeze" Smith, Kenneth Patterson, Gary Jones, and 7-3, 285-pound John Burkhalter.

The Pro-News team will include a number of the nation's newscasters, including Phil Woodall, John McKissick, Bill Tell Zortman and others.

The Canyon game here had an unusual start. When officials discovered that the Canyon manager had given the wrong uniform numbers for the official scorebook, they awarded Friona ten technical foul shots (one for each wrong number). Friona already had a 2-0 lead on Dana Miller's early shot.

Vickie Smiley shot the series of ten shots, a coach's dream, and made seven of them. This got Friona off and running to a 9-0 lead, and this proved costly to Canyon before the game was over.

Miss Miller scored three more baskets, and Miss Smiley one, as the Squaws posted a 19-7 first quarter lead.

After the teams swapped baskets for much of the second and third quarter, Canyon threw a scare into the Squaws early in the final quarter by rallying from behind to tie the game, 41-all with 4:48 left to play.

But Alesia Tucker, M'Lynda London and Vickie Smiley all scored, for a 47-41 lead, and the Squaws held on for the five-point win.

Miss Smiley with 20 and Miss Miller with 12 led Friona's scoring.

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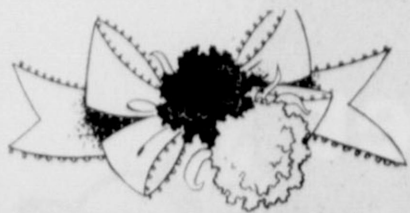
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DeAnn Dickson, Carson Williams Exchange Vows In Church Ceremony

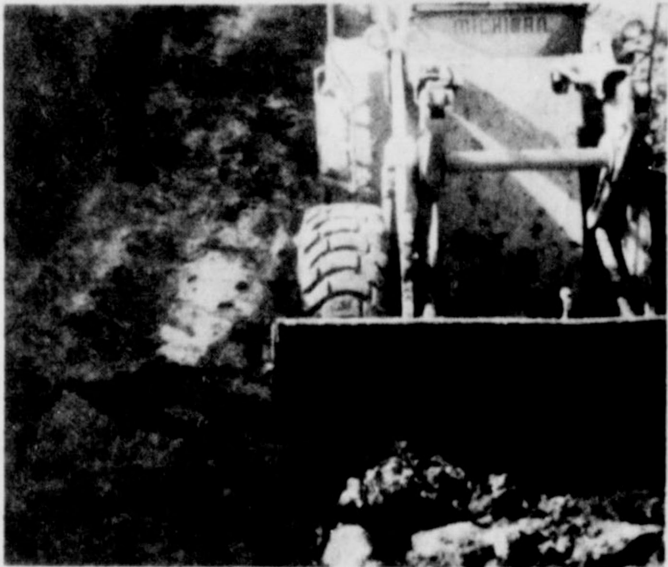
