Emergency Livestock Feed Program (EFP).
The purpose of this program is to
assist eligible livestock owners by sharing the cost of purchasing feed
for eligible livestock when such feed must be purchased in quantities above normal. The assistance is for livestock in any area where the County ASC Committee determines The emergency could be created
by drought, hail etc by drought, hail, etc. To be eligible
under this new (A.) Have suffered a substantial loss in livestock feed normally eligible livestock. A substantial loss s defined as being at least 40 per (B.) Not have sufficient feed for
eligible livestock for the feeding period, and:
(C.) Be required to make feed quantities larger than normal. Under this new program, eligible
producers may be reimbursed for up producers may be reimbursed for up
