Convention called to order by Republican National Committee Chairman Ray C. Bliss at 10 a.m. EDT. Miami Beach Mayor Jay Dermer and Gov. Claude R. Kirk welcomed delegates and guests. The call for convention was issued by Mrs. Consuelo N. Bailey, secretary of the Republican National Convention.

Remarks by Nebraska Gov. Norbert T. Tiemann and Sen. Jacob K. Javits of New York on the revitalization of urban America. Recessed at 12:01 p.m. until 8 p.m.

Second Session Convention reconvenes at 8 p.m., and is called to order by Chairman Bliss with a short address. Former President Dwight D. Eisenhower delivers a personal message via television.

Addresses by Sen Edward W. Brooke of Massachusetts and former Sen. Barry Goldwater. Mayor John V. Lindsay of New York introduces the keynote speaker. Keynote address by Gov. Daniel J. Evans of

Convention adjourns until 8 p.m. Tuesday.

### Trains Hit Head-On

WINTER HAVEN, Fla. (AP) - Two Seaboard Coast Line passenger trains smashed into each other head-on near here Monday and the sheriff's office said many riders were injured. "They're having to pry them out with crowbars and acetylene torches," said Deputy Ed Lockwood

of the sheriff's office at Bartow, Fla. There was no immediate report of fatalities. Several coaches were reported knocked off the

track and one of the diesel engines caught fire. Five ambulances were rushed to the scene and emergency calls went out for more. Firefighting equipment also was dispatched.

Four passenger cars on one train were reported to contain 40 to 50 injured.

A witness said four diesel engines, two on each train, and nine passenger cars left the rails after the collision on a curve two miles south of Winter

Ambulances were leaving the wreck site in a steady stream with injured.

### Weed Clean-Up Slow

Although some residents have responded immediately to requests to clean up weed-grown lots, others have not

"While thanking those who have cooperated, we urge those who have not to help us eliminate the menace of weeds in our city," A. D. Meador, fire marshal, said this morning.

He pointed out that weed-grown lots are fire hazards, as well as health hazards. He said some 276 lots in the city have been checked and the owners notified of the city ordinance requiring such hazards be eliminated. Residents owning 65 of these responded and cleaned them up. The rest remain hazards.

Meador said some residents have asked for the names of persons doing lot clean-up work and a list of these is available at the fire station and

The city ordinance stipulates that the city will move its crews in to clean up lots, charging the owner for the costs, where the resident refuses

to do the work himself.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) -Republican plank-writers will hand to the national convention Tuesday a platform pledging peace negotiations without surrender in Vietnam and drives against crime and social ills at

### Challengers Hope For A New Surge MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) - He told newsmen cheerfully that

The Republican party opened its 29th National Convention today with Richard M. Nixon the odds-on favorite to get the presidential nomination.

By an Associated Press count the former vice president was less than 100 votes away from slamming home a first ballot victory on Wednesday night.

TOP MEN

The two top challengers, Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York and Ronald Reagan of California, had to hope that several favorite son candidates would stand fast - and that when they finally yielded the surge would be away from Nix-

The powerful Ohio delegation kept these strategic hopes high when a breakfast caucus produced the decision to keep 56 of the state's 58 votes behind the favorite son governor, James A.

But another key favorite son, Maryland's Gov. Spiro T. Agnew said he was leaning toward Nixon and spoke of keeping the 26 delegates in line only until to-

A third favorite son, Sen. Hiram Fong of Hawaii, withdrew his candidacy. Seven of the state's 14 delegates immediately opted for Nixon.

The former vice president, who lost his first bid for the presidency in a close shave race with John F. Kennedy in 1960, was flying to this opulent convention scene to take open charge of his campaign for the nomination,

OPTIMISM

The best way to display optimism is to look beyond the presidential race to the struggle among 15 or so candidates for second spot. And this is what Herbert G. Klein, Nixon's press chief, did in an early morning talk with reporters.

Nixon, said Klein, would not leave the choice of a running mate to the convention but will ask that "his choice" be endorsed.

Rockefeller's strategy is to try to keep the several favorite son candidacies among the states alive long enough to give the impression that Nixon does not have the strength to go over

Reagan, meanwhile, striving to pick off individual delegates-an effort which Rockefeller said at a news conference was meeting with

some success. "I think the movement is to Reagan in many of the delega-Rockefeller said. tions.

And Reagan predicted he would score "around the 200 mark" on the first ballot. He starts with California's 86 as a favorite son

BRUSHED ASIDE Both Rockefeller and Reagan brushed aside the possibility of second place on the GOP ticket. "I was not built for standby equipment," Rockefeller said.

Said Reagan: "I ruled myself out of that spot some time ago." Regan, quoted 3rd graf 133 Rockefeller beamed, winked and joked as he fielded newsmen's questions. But he was un-

able to report any massive shift of strength to his side and said he wasn't planning any major announcement between now and Wednesday night, when the balloting begins. The Ohioans, meanwhile, decided at a breakfast meeting to

John S. Andrews, said Reagan was trying to meet with the group and "we are attempting to work that out." At the same time, Herbert G.

Klein, Nixon's chief press spokesman, was telling reporters the former vice president did not intend to leave the choice of a running mate to the dalegates.

Rather, Klein said, Nixon will ask the convention to nominate his choice" and will disclose his choice after the presidential nominee is picked. Nixon was due to fly in from

New York later today to direct his drive from up close. There has been no doubt, though, that he has been calling all the shots. The third in the field, Reagan, predicted the fight for the top spot would go beyond one ballot.



## Nixon Strength Gets Boost For 1st Ballot

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) -Richard M. Nixon's solid firstround delegate total in the Associated Press survey dropped briefly today, then began to rise again after Sen. Hiram L. Fong of Hawaii said he would withdraw his "favorite son" candi-

At mid-morning, Nixon's total, based on delegates bound by primary elections, those pledged and those expressing preferences at caucuses and in AP polls, stood at 574-93 short of the needed 667 for the presidential nomination when balloting starts Wednesday night.

Nixon lost seven in Mississippi, where a sharp split and a decision to have a unit rule has put the entire 20-vote delegation into the uncommitted column. There is strong support for both Nixon and California Gov. Ron-

But Nixon gained at least seven of Hawaii's 14 votes, and also gained single delegates in Kentucky and Texas.

Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's Fla. total remained at 232, Reagan's dropped to 159 because of the Mississippi situation, the uncommitted total stood at 150 and other favorite sons have 218. Earlier today, Nixon had 572-up 28 from Saturday.

Nixon's gains included eight from Idaho, four from Wyoming, three from Illinois and Connecticut, and lesser numbers from Delaware, Florida, Texas, Colorado, Utah, Minnesota and Maine.

### Ford Says Extra Day Of Balloting Possible

MIAMI BEACH, Fla. (AP) -Rep. Gerald R. Ford, who will be permanent chairman of the Republican National Convention, held out the possibility today of an extra day of balloting if delegates fail to nominate a presidential candidate by the end of three ballots.

"If after three ballots there is no decision," he said, "I think it would be wiser to stop and start the next day when everyone is fresh."

Balloting is scheduled Wednesday night after nominating and seconding speeches for all of the active and favorite son presidential candidates.

Ford said "the possibility it will go beyond the first ballot is more than 50-50" and added "I hope it does. It would stimulate interest.

If the balloting gets past the second ballot, Ford went on, "I think the ball game is wide open and could go six, eight or 10 ballots. If you get beyond the second ballot, you could forsee any contingency happening."

However, he said he doubted some unknown will sweep in and pick up the nomination. Ford, Republican leader of the House, was interviewed on NBC-television's "Today" pro-

## Cong Wounds Gen. Davis, Helicopter Is Shot Down

gram.

SAIGON (AP) - The Viet Cong wounded an American general whose son was killed in action in 1967 and shot down a helicopter in two fights south of Saigon today. U.S. infantrymen reported killing 41 of the enemy and capturing 19 weapons.

U.S. casualties were two killed and 13 wounded, including Brig, Gen. Franklin M. Davis Jr., 50, commander of the U.S. 199th Light Infantry Brigade.

Davis was cut about the face by shrapnel and gashed over his right eye when a band of Viet Cong guerrillas showered rocket grenades on an allied river patrol from mangrove swamps along a river bank 13 miles southeast of Saigon.

The general returned to the

scene after being treated at the brigade aid station, commenting: "It was just an occupational hazard."

Davis, who is from Waltham, Mass., is one of half a dozen American generals wounded in Vietnam, while another three have been killed. Davis' youngest son, 2nd Lt. Stephen Davis. was killed in action in Vietnam

The heaviest of the two fights raged in a stand of paddies, canals and huts 24 miles southwest of Saigon. The fight was triggered in midafternoon Sunday by Viet Cong gunners who shot down a helicopter that was landing troops for a reconnaissance mission.

The Viet Cong then opened up with small arms and automatic

weapons on the company of 150 infantrymen from the U.S. 9th Division. More than 500 more Americans were landed in the area in darkness and heavy rain. and set up a cordon around the enemy area of paddies, canals and huts. A prisoner told U.S. interrogators that about 100 Viet Cong were in the area at the start of the fight.

### CORDON

helicopter gunships firing machine guns and rockets raked the enemy positions through the night and artillery pounded them. The infantrymen swept through the area after daybreak Monday and reported finding 41 enemy bodies and 19 weapons. Two Americans were killed and seven were wounded.

With the cordon established,

Capt. Ted Baum, 43, Skokie, II., brought the twin-engine plane in with one engine dead and his copilot badly injured in the cockpit

"I thought that something was wrong, but not a collision," said Mrs. Nancy Steffens, 44, of Two Rivers. "I was more nervous after I got on the ground and realized it had been a collision." 'We didn't know what hit us.

I think only the stewardess knew," said Wilma Ross, 17, of Saginaw, Mich., "and she just told us to stay seated with our seat belts on. The pilot came down with what seemed like a normal landing."

'FANTASTIC JOB' Officials said the single-engine Cessna 150 rammed North Central Airlines Flight 261, a Convair 580, over southern Wisconsin. The light plane hit just behind the copilot's seat, also damaging the propeller on the plane's right engine

The copilot, first officer John Mazur, 30, of Wheaton, Ill., suffered multiple fractures of his right leg and head injuries. He was reported in serious condition in a Milwaukee hospital. He was the only person on the airliner injured.

The victim's bodies were removed after the plane landed. They were identified as Rick L Stenberg, 19, of Elk Grove Village, Ill., the pilot; Virginia Johnson, 18, Mt. Prospect, Ill., and her brother, Richard, 12.

"That pilot did a fantastic landing job," a federal official said. Otherwise there was no comment as a team of about 35 National Transportation Safety Board investigators led by board examiner Thomas Saunders arrived from Washington to probe the cause of the crash. TAKE IT EASY

### Everyone Will Feel The Ripple

The package on which big steel and big labor agreed upon last week brings into focus the forces which are exerting nearly explosive pressures on the nation's economy.

About the best that can be said for this agreement is that it avoided a steel strike, and that was perhaps not much worse than other contracts when considered from the point of percentage. The latter, however, is because steel workers already were the highest paid of all industrial la-

In accepting the package which will cost one billion dollars over three vears, steel companies promptly bucked the charge along to consum-ers. Increases amounted to as much as \$7 a ton. President Johnson assailed this, but, having yielded so much at the bargaining table, industry leaders were in a poor position to hold the price line.

The public has a stake in all this because steel is so basic. There is hardly anything that does not, in some way, involve the use of steel. Certainly, in construction, machinery and automobiles this hike will be felt sharply. In our own area, the thousands of tons of steel which will go into the Moss Creek-Robert Lee pipeline of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, will add significantly to a project already hit by inflation.

### **Economic Problems A-Plenty**

WASHINGTON - While the politicians occupy the public limelight, people generally are unfamiliar with the kind of economic conditions a new President probably will face.

What is really happening is that the nation at last is beginning to feel the effects of an uncontrolled economy. For, despite the maladjustments due to a war that has reached a very high annual cost, the restraints which were necessary were not applied soon enough.

PROMINENT IN the news is the signing of a contract between the unions and the steel companies involving an increased expense to the industry of more than one billion dollars over the next three years. Some of the leading producers promptly announced a rise in the prices of steel ranging up to 9.7 per cent on certain tin mill products. The higher prices were applied across-theboard by some companies, but others maintained the selective system and augmented the prices of certain major items. President Johnson has criticized the across-the-board increases, but hasn't commented on labor's bountiful contract.

IF A wage-and-price-control law were in effect, there would be a limitation on labor's demands and on strikes. Wage increases would be granted only after an examination of the capacity of the companies to meet such demands and of whether any price rises could be sanctioned. Excess profits would be taxed to help pay war costs.

Many buyers had anticipated possible strike and higher prices in steel, and had increased their inventories. This gave the steel companies what appeared on the surface to be a boom, but a cutback in operations of about 33 per cent now is expected as the demand will drop off.

ON THE BUSINESS and financial side, there is a great deal of uncertainty as to how long the economy can stand some of the strains that have been imposed by rising costs. Nobody really can be sure what policies a new administration whether it be Democratic or Republican - will adopt.

Whenever there is a change in administration, the period of transition breeds uncertainty. 

One thing and another:
They say that the nickel glass of beer and the five-cent cigar have gone the way of the buffalo, that nothing comes as cheap anymore.

True, in these inflationary times, the price of everything has sky-rocketed. One thing, however, which is still offered without charge is the road map — available in most any service station around the country.

THE OIL companies would have every right to charge for such an item — the maps cost an average of four to six cents each and cost the oil industry upwards to \$18 million

Service station customers will accept an estimated 300 million such atlases this year, often after driving into a station to get some free water and air for their tires, then throw them away after learning the best route from Kokomo to Kankakee.

Europeans must pay for their road maps but oilmen have developed a marked reluctance to ask Americans to ante up for such a service.

He is set up in Miami Beach with 80 paid staff workers, 45 on-leave business professionals from a dozen different States who have donated their services, a putative arrangement with Alabama to yield to California on the crucial roll calls, a national celebrity who is expected to be the surprise-orator when it comes time for Reagan's Man Who speech and, of course, Cliff White, who knows how to pull delegates out of his pockets and has more pockets than a circus clown.

REAGAN, the most personable of the GOP candidates, is the least among them when it comes to believing in the cult of personality. Nixon's campaign slogan since the New Hampshire primary has been "Nixon's the Man," and Rockefeller's publicity blitz has exalted the upright pronoun. Reagan says, "Service as governor has made me realize that the strength is not in one man, it's in the nation. We forget that this country has gone through the tragedy of assassination, changes of leadership and even the ill health of a President when he was virtually helpless and not on duty . . . things went right on, and grass did not grow

THE CALIFORNIA Governor is the most polite man among the candidategroup, and yet has called upon the facts to speak almost as rudely as Rocky does about Nixon's reputed inability to win a national election. The articulate facts, as Reagan interprets them, are that the people make three demands of their next President. He must be attractive, inspiring and electable, with emphasis on the latter two qualities.

IN 44 DAYS of out-of-California

campaigning in 1967, and 26 days to date in 1968, Reagan has found the people, and especially the delegates, declining to attach these adjectives to the front-running Nixon, but at-taching them to himself. Reagan is much too courteous to say such things, but he is not in Miami Beach to shush-up what he believes the facts are proclaiming . . . that, as the best governor of the most ungovernable State in the union, he is the best man to govern the nation.

REAGAN, the most eloquent GOP candidate, is the least garrulous. Nixon can't utter a succinct sentence. Rockefeller can't become formal without becoming long-winded. Stassen has been repeating himself through three decades. In recent airport speeches, Reagan has astrounded reporters by milking the audiences for maxim applause and causing them to shout "More! More!" Reagan, the most mild-mannered.

has the most forceful gubernatorial record in the country for defusing campus rebellions, reducing racial strife, disposing of cop-killers in the deathhouse. Reagan, the most guileless, has been so foxy that he strove with none, held off his announcement till he could almost see the whites of the delegates' eyes.

REAGAN ISN'T very undecided either. He hasn't begun composing an acceptance speech, as Nixon is said to have done, but he has picked a vice presidential running mate,

Governor Rhodes of Ohio. "That's because Ronald feels the presidency might take him out of the country quite a bit," says a spokesman. "And Rhodes knows how to mind the store."

### Communist Party Rule Absolute

By HENRY S. BRADSHER

MOSCOW (AP) - Intellectual dissent inside the Soviet Union and the liberal trend in Czechoslovakia have forced Soviet communism into an awkward defense of its policy of abso-

The bland insistence by former Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev of the popularity of the Communist party system has given way to blunt reminders that the party's control cannot be challenged.

"ANY ATTEMPT to question the leading role of a Communist party, irrespective of the peculiarity of the situation on which this is based, nevitably creates a threat to the Socialist Communist system . . ." That statement from an editorial

in Pravda, the Soviet Communist party newspaper, means that any opposition is dangerous.

THE STATEMENT appeared in a tough attack on Czechoslovak liberalization. The Kremlin has been worried about freedom of the press in Prague and the new tendency of opposition groups to pressure the Czechoslovak Communist party. One reason for this worry, which

led to the massive Soviet pressure on Prague and threatening military moves, was the possibility that Czechoslovakia might cease to be a cooperating member of the Soviet

BUT PROBABLY more important in the Kremlin's view, many diplomatic observers here think, was the possibility that the new freedoms given to Czechoslovaks might be hard to deny to Soviet citizens. Liberalization could be an infectious disease, potentially fatal to the Soviet system. Thus the situation is presented to the Soviet people in stark terms:

**EITHER THEY** submit themselves to what they are told is the exploitation of the bourgeois upper classes, of lies.

or they govern themselves with 'working class democracy."

"Socialist democracy" means that the Communist party, the leading element of the working class, holds power and the party, operating under "Leninist centralism," is run by a handful of men in the Kremlin who control the choice of their subordinates and successors.

Anyone who questions this is threatening the Communist system reason enough to silence him.

### What Others Say

The issue of inflation does not lend itself to impassioned campaign oratory, blockbuster billboards or arresting TV spots.

About the only visual aid to a lecture in inflation is a shrinking dollar, which is precisely what Gov. Nelson Rockefeller's ad agency has used in a television commercial. At first the screen is filled with a huge dollar bill, but, accompanied

by creaks and groams, it starts shriveling. It continues to do so while the governor speaks his piece. If the viewer retains one single phrase, the effort will have been worthwhile. Rockefeller calls inflation "the cruelest tax of all." This phrase

is not original, nor is it especially clever. But it is true. Inflation is a universal, not a graduated tax. It gnaws at every dollar bill without favor. When it chews a nickel off the corner, it bites hardest on the day laborer's meager paycheck and the widow's dwindling

savings account. Suffering most will be the poor and the pensioner - the very citizens the deficit spenders purport to be helping.

By preaching that a little inflation is a good thing, the New Economists have done more than levy the cruelest tax. They have told the most vicious


