**FOR HIS LAST** official public appearance as State Senator for the 31st District, Max Sherman favored Friona with not one but two appearances.

Sherman, who had earlier resigned his senate post to become the new president of West Texas State University, spoke for the installation of the new Student-Faculty Congress officers at Friona High School, and then brought the program for the Friona Noon Lions Club.

Sherman told the Lions Club that serving in the Texas legislature had been the highlight of his career. And Sherman had been recognized for his hard work at Austin. A state magazine, "Texas Monthly," rated the senator in its list of "top ten legislators" on three separate occasions.

He said that he thought the recently-passed education bill and the highway program would greatly benefit the state's residents. Over one-third of the state's \$3 billion surplus went into the education fund. A number of communities in the state were aided by the bill, although Friona did so to a much lesser degree than some.

The highway program which was adopted should give the state the money it needs to finance highway construction for the next 20 years, Sherman believes.

Sherman voted against a corporate income tax for Texas in 1975, and the measure failed in the Senate, 16-15, with Sherman's vote weighing heavily. "We figured that if this had passed, an individual state income tax would have been the next step," said the popular legislator, who is proud of the fact that no new state taxes have been necessary in recent years.

Explaining why he would leave the legislature after such a successful stint, and having three full years remaining on his term of office, Sherman reminded the Lions of the old quotation which closes "The fate of empires depends upon the education of our youth."

He spoke of the many strong influences that his childhood teachers had had upon his life, and also praised the scholarship program, which enabled him to complete his college degree work.

"I know that many of you attended other colleges and universities than West Texas State—just as I did. Let me ask that you 'adopt' WT as your 'second school,'" Sherman asked the Lions.

The new WTSU president pointed out that the wide range of fields which are now open to students attending the Canyon university. He praised several programs and leaders at WT, including the new head coach, Bill Yung, noted choir director Hugh Sanders, and the outstanding WTSU band department.

"There have been some problems, and some wounds in the past. I think we can all work together to solve these problems, and bind up the wounds, and make West Texas State University the resource it can and should be," Sherman concluded.

**PRAIRIE ACRES** is facing a critical need for Licensed Vocational Nurses, according to Merv Noah, administrator.

Noah says that the problem is not to the point of affecting the level of care at Friona's nursing facility, but is to the point of causing some extra work on the part of staff personnel.

The nursing home official said that Prairie Acres desperately needs nurses for P.M. duty. He points out that it is not a requirement to have an LVN on duty at nighttime, but that Prairie Acres is attempting to stay above standard in that regard.

One of the problems, Noah says, is that facilities such as Prairie Acres and the hospital tend to lose prospective nurses to seasonal, better-paying jobs.

## School Holiday

Friona Schools will be closed Monday, Labor Day, for the first official school holiday in the 1977-78 school term.

School will resume at the regular time on Tuesday, September 6, according to Superintendent of Schools Tom B. Jarboe.

# Late Score Tops Chieftains, 14-7

The Friona Chieftains played a stout game against Floydada in their season opener here Friday night, falling 14-7 as Floydada rallied for a final-period touchdown. The Chieftains showed flashes of greatness both on offense and defense against a strong District

4-AA team which will have to be reckoned with in their district title chase.

The Chiefs rallied after an error-prone first quarter to take a 7-6 lead into the dressing room at halftime, and for a time had the momentum going their way.

But the Whirlwinds turned a fumble recovery into the break they needed early in the final quarter, to claim the opening night win.

The teams traded fumbles twice in an opening quarter that truly looked like opening game jitters. After the second Friona fumble, Floydada proceeded to drive 23 yards for a relatively easy score. But the Chieftains blocked the extra point kick, to hold the score at 6-0. The score came with just 42 seconds elapsed in the second quarter.

Friona dominated the second quarter. The Chieftains ran 23 plays to Floydada's five, and it put Friona right back in the game.

The Chiefs drove to the 'Wind 42, but elected to punt. Kevin Kothmann's kick went into the end zone.

Floydada went to the air, but Jeff Whiteside was ready. He intercepted the pass at the Friona 41, giving the ball right back to the Chieftains.

Friona then mounted an impressive 59-yard drive that took 15 plays, and ate up most of the period.

The running of Glen London and Whiteside sparked the drive, although a pass to Terry Wilcox and a six-yard run by the same player each produced first downs to keep the drive going.

On a third down from the Floydada one, sophomore David Fleming crashed over for the touchdown. Jeff Peak's kick was maybe a foot over the crossbar, but it was plenty to give Friona a 7-6 lead in the hard-fought contest.

Friona's TD came with just 1:49 left in the half, and the 7-6 score stood up at halftime.

Friona had a good scoring chance in the third period, driving from their own 32 to the Floydada seven, where a fourth down play missed by a couple of feet and Floydada took over.

The next time the team got the ball, early in the fourth quarter, it looked again like the Chiefs might get a drive going. Wilcox ripped for four yards, and Fleming followed suit.

Then, it appeared Fleming had a first down at the home 45, but he fumbled as he went down and Floydada pounced on it. "I thought the play could have been called dead," said Coach Lonnie Phillips, echoing the way it looked to many of the home side fans.

Floydada took the break, and marched 45 yards in just eight plays. Larry Jones got the touchdown with 6:21 remaining in the game. The 'Winds surprised and went for two,

# Fleming Resigns Mayor's Position

R.L. Fleming, long time mayor and resident of Friona, handed the city council his resignation Wednesday and was honored with a coffee on Friday as he begins his retirement.

Fleming held the mayorship of Friona for nearly seven terms, over 13 years, and has lived in Parmer County for 24 years. He first was elected mayor in 1958 and served until 1964. He held the office again from 1970 until this week. Thursday, September 1 was officially his last day as the mayor of Friona.

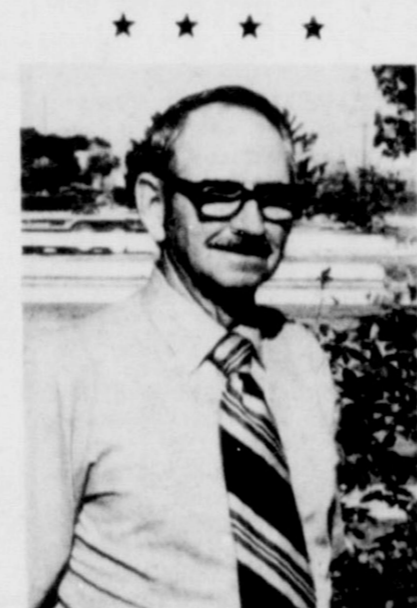
"It is with deep regret that we accept your resignation," mayor pro-tem B.K. Buske told Fleming. "But we realize that your retirement and move from Friona make it necessary."

Fleming came to Friona from the Melrose, N.M., on a speculative venture in the business of building. He and his son, Ray Dean, have erected more than one hundred residences, two apartment complexes, and several business buildings in the city.

"Marie and I hate to leave Friona and the many friends we have here," Fleming said. "We have built a home in Breckenridge and hope to enjoy much of our future lives taking it easy there, and working on the side."

He said there has always been problems confronting the city administration, but there had always been pleasure and satisfaction in seeing them resolved and the city progress.

"I have enjoyed working with the city manager, Jake Outland, all the different councilmen, and all city

employees through the years," he said. "We want to thank everyone for the many kindnesses and considerations extended to us in the past, and we wish only the best for the continued progress, growth, and success to everyone in Friona in the future."

During Fleming's tenure as mayor, the city has grown from less than 2,000 population to an estimated 3,565 as set by the city council just this past month.

## Enrollment Close To '76

Friona schools got off to a good, smooth start this year, with enrollment down by only eight students from a year ago, according to Superintendent Tom Jarboe.

Enrollment throughout the school system stands at a present total of 1324 compared to 1333 last year at this time. Jarboe said there had been no problems in enrolling students or starting classes and Friona was off to "a real good start."

Fifty-six children were enrolled in the kindergarten classes at the end of the week, with 123 first graders

reporting for classes. There were 121 second graders, 93 third, 113 fourth, and seven in special education for a total of 513 in the elementary system.

In the four grades from 5-8 there were 413 students who registered. One hundred fourteen were fifth graders, 104 sixth, 96 seventh, and 99 eighth.

Ninety-three seniors reported in during the week, with 90 juniors, 106 sophomores, and 110 freshmen. By the end of the week, high school enrollment had passed the 400 mark, for an all-time record, according to John R. Cook, principal.

# Maize Days Plans Are Taking Shape

It has been called Friona's most fun days of the year, and this year's Maize Days celebration is lining up to be even greater than last year's 200th birthday edition.

As always, the highlight will be the crowning of the new Maize Days Queen, Thursday, September 15. But added attractions such as the return of past queens, will grace the festivities this year. The annual parade, to be held at 10 a.m. Saturday, September 17, will have such attractions as the Amarillo Antique Car Club, the KGNC Blimp, a 12 foot long Urethane coated blimp, and several area bands.

Numerous clubs and organizations will give away prizes at 4 p.m. on September 17 at the city park. A \$25 money doll will be given away by the Progressive Study Club. It is 10 cents a chance, tickets can be obtained from study club members and you don't have to be present to win.

The Friona Booster Club will give away a shot gun. Tickets are selling for \$1 and can be purchased from a Booster Club member. The Friona Volunteer Firemen are selling chances for three C.B. radios and a Magic Chef microwave oven. The Friends of the Library will have a booth in the park and will be raffling away a Cobra C.B. base set.

Immediately after the parade on Saturday morning, there will be a \$1

plate barbecue at the city park. Bingo games, raffles, talent shows and pet shows will also be held. The Methodist Youth Fellowship will sponsor an "Almost Anything Goes" contest. Texas Speaker of the House Bill Clayton will also be here for the day.

The "Almost Anything Goes" contest will begin at 4 p.m. at the football stadium. There will be an adult division for persons in the ninth grade and older and a junior division for fifth through sixth grades. Contest rules require three males and three females to be on each team. Entry fees are \$30 for the adult division and \$24 for the junior division. Deadline for signing up is September 14, and teams may enter by calling 247-2116 or 247-3045.

The Friona Riding Club will sponsor team roping at the roping arena at 6 p.m. on Saturday, September 17. Buttons and Bows Square Dance Club will meet at 8 p.m. at the old Parmer County Implement Company on Fifth Street to have one of their biggest shin-digs of the year.

The Ray Cammack Carnival will be set up in the city park this year which will help fulfill the delights of area children. And last, but not least, the band will have a car who so everyone can say they helped smash up an automobile.

The Queen and Little Miss contests are scheduled during the annual celebration to be held September 13 through 17 in the city. The Little Miss Contest will be held September 13 and the Maize Queen will be crowned on September 15. Deadline for the contests is September 8.

Tickets for the Queen's Contest are on sale at the Friona Chamber of Commerce office for \$2.50 each, and Chamber officials say good reserved seats are going fast. Entry fee for the Little Miss Contest is \$10, and \$20 for the Maize Queen entries.

Rules for the Maize Queen Contest require the new queen to remain single until her reign is over, otherwise she will give up her crown to the first runner-up. The reigning

The contest has been a big event since Maize Days since 1957 when Aggie Wetzel (now of Midland) crowned the first queen. Since then, new queens have graced the position every year.

# REMEMBERING... Air Shows

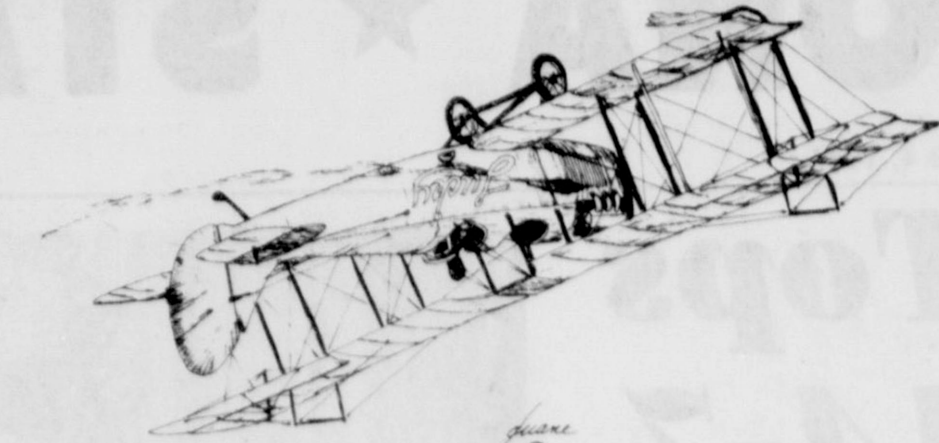

Back when I grew up airplanes were not a common sight in our community. The nearest airport was near a day's drive from our house and it was nothing more than an abandoned cotton patch that had been smoothed out with a drag bar. An old barn served as the only hanger.

But about once a year they would hold an air show and literally hundreds of people would turn out. We didn't miss many since they were our only chance to see airplanes up close. There would be all kinds on display and some were open so people could get inside. Sometimes you could even sit in the pilot's seat and a man would tell you what everything was and let you hold the stick and look outside to see the flaps moving. Some of the planes belonged to the Army Air Corps and they had real guns on them and places for bombs and everything! I saw my first jet at an air show and I remember folks staring at it saying they just couldn't understand how the thing could fly without a propeller.

The air show I remember the most had a stunt flyer. His name was "Lucky" something or other and everybody called him a daredevil. He had an old plane that was called a "Jenny." It had two front wings and looked to me like it was held together with lots of sticks and wires. It was painted bright red with "Lucky" in large yellow letters on its sides.

Another man flew the plane and Lucky walked out to the tip of the bottom wing. He climbed up to the top wing and back to the center



of the plane where he stood firmly while the plane turned upside down two or three times! Then Lucky got in and flew it toward us, barely missing the hanger and then with his wing tip he took a handkerchief from a man standing on top of a model "A" Ford. Next he flew straight up real high and turned upside down and the other man fell out! We all screamed and a bunch of people said, "Oh, No!" But just then a bright red parachute opened and he floated down amid cheers from the crowd of relieved spectators.

We missed one air show because Dad had business in town that day. That afternoon a plane flew real low over the house and we ran out to see what the commotion. It flew back over barely above the tree tops, dipping first one wing then the other. It did several other stunts as we gawked up at it and ran all around the house to get a better look. The man in the plane waved at us and then flew away. We could hardly wait for Dad to come home so we could tell him that even though we didn't get to go to the air show we had one of

our very own. When he came in we were all talking at once with such excitement. Dad said, "I know what you're going to tell me. A plane flew over the house real low and the pilot waved at you." We were astonished, then he laughed and said he was riding inside the plane. Dad had gone to the air show after finishing his business and a man there was taking people up for rides for a small fee. He told us how we looked from the air, running back and forth, pointing, with our mouths open and our heads thrown back. We all laughed and laughed.

**45 YEARS AGO-SEPT. 9, 1932**  
Friona Schools opened Monday with total enrollment of 550. There were 198 in high school on the opening day and 352 in the grade school, making a total of 550, or an increase of 50 over last year's total enrollment.

Coach Bill Stevens of Friona High School reports that he has about a half hundred good husky boys who are aspirants for the 1932-33 football squad.

Mrs. Bertha Harry, Merle and Ruth moved to Lubbock Saturday evening, where they will remain at least during the coming term of school.

**35 YEARS AGO-SEPT. 4, 1942**  
Both the Lakeview grade and high school students will attend the Friona schools this year. The trustees of the Lakeview school district called a mass meeting of the patrons of that school for a discussion of the teacher situation and the state aid set-up of the district, and when it was learned that they could not maintain a two-teacher school, they voted to bring all pupils of the district to the Friona school this year. One additional teacher was required in the grade school in order to take care of the added enrollment.

**30 YEARS AGO-**

**25 YEARS AGO-SEPT. 4, 1952**  
First load of 1952 milo was delivered last Thursday, August 28th at the Santa Fe Grain Company. N.A. Curry brought in the load of over 9,000 pounds, receiving \$3.00 per hundred. Curry farms west of Friona on the former Lonnie Baxter farm.

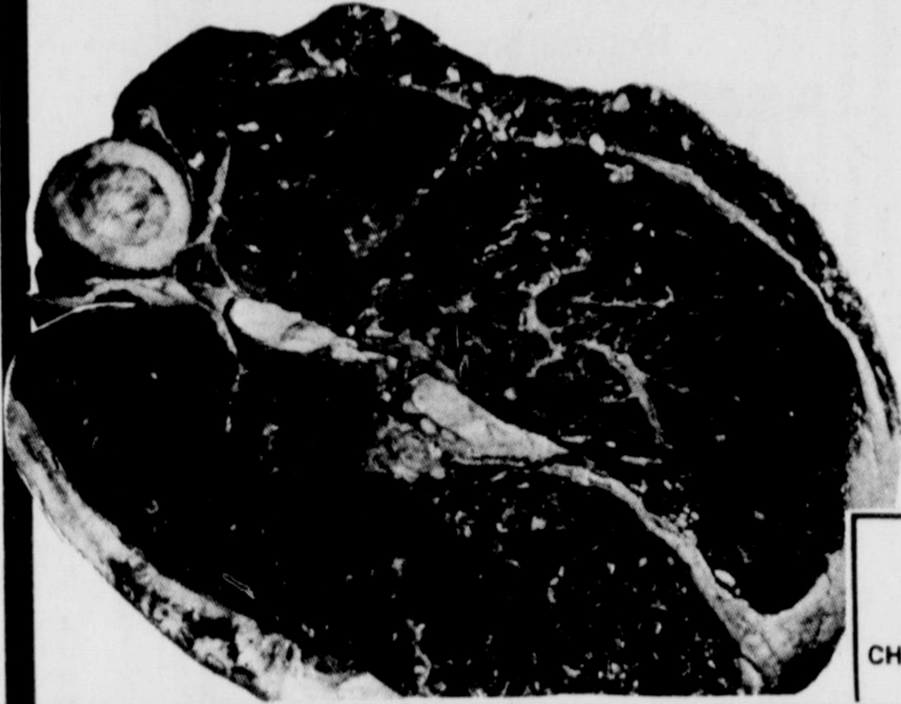

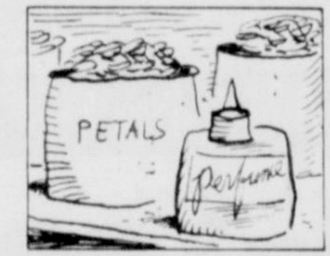

# Cerebral Palsy Is United Fund Agency

Cerebral Palsy is not a single disorder, but a group of ailments having quite a variety of symptoms. All are brain-centered and all affect muscular control. "Cerebral" means brain-centered, and "Palsy" describes lack of muscle control. A popular misbelief is that cerebral palsy is a disease, but it isn't. It is a variety of conditions involving nerve and motor dyfunctions which are caused by damage to the brain. Brain damage usually occurs during birth and people live with it all of their lives. Cerebral palsy cannot be cured but often it can be managed so that people affected with CP can function productively and enjoy life.

Cerebral Palsy is our nation's leading child crippler. Because CP is not an ailment which physicians are required to report to their State health departments, no official figures are available. Estimates by the United Cerebral Palsy Association suggest that about 750,000 persons have CP. About 15,000 babies are born with CP each year, or one newborn in every 200 live

births. There are approximately four CP individuals per 1,000 population. It is estimated that 12 to 16 live in Friona and the surrounding area.

Local donations made to United Cerebral Palsy through your United Fund drive are retained in Friona and immediate area for the needs of those qualifying for aid. These funds are used for the needs of the Cerebral Palsied individual and include medical diagnosis, evaluation and treatment, vocational training, social and recreational programs, parent counseling, special and therapeutic equipment and other needs. The equipment ranges in cost from \$45 for corrective shoes (which must be replaced twice yearly) to \$500 and \$600 wheelchairs or \$900 leg braces and other prescribed equipment.

Due to your donations the past two years to the United Fund you have purchased three wheelchairs and one specially designed school desk for local CP children.

## Drivers Reported Careful During Recent Holidays

Drivers seem to be displaying more cooperation and alertness on Texas highways during major holidays. At least that's the opinion of the director of the Texas

"However," he added, "holiday drivers seem to be exercising more restraint and we hope this trend will continue."

The DPS director urged motorists to refrain from drinking during the Labor Day period, keep their speed under control, and not take unnecessary chances.

As usual, the DPS will place all available Troopers on the state's highways during the holiday and they have been ordered to keep a close watch for reckless drivers. But

Speir noted that "they will be spread thin covering the thousands of highway miles in Texas, and we are hopeful that motorists will join in the effort to make Labor Day safe."

## Friona Industries Nets 32 Cents Per Share

FRIONA—Fourth quarter financial results were the best of the year for Friona Industries, Inc. and enabled the agri-business firm for its entire fiscal year ended June 30, 1977, to achieve net income of \$399,000, or 32 cents per share, on revenues of \$57.6 million. In the prior fiscal year the company had net income of \$1.2

million, or 98 cents per share, on revenues of \$51.6 million.

Net income in the fourth quarter was \$518,000, or 41 cents per share, on revenues of \$14.1 million, compared with net income of \$114,000, or nine cents per share, on revenues of \$11.6 million in the final quarter of fiscal 1976. The Company continued to pay its 5 cents per

## Assessment Tests Offered To High School Students

Students at Friona High School who are considering attending college after graduation will have five opportunities during the 1977-78 school year to use the ACT Assessment Program, a guidance-oriented service that is used each year by students throughout the nation as part of their college and career planning.

The first of five national test dates on which the ACT Assessment tests will be offered is Saturday morning, October 8. Junior or senior students planning to take the exams on that date must have registered by September 12, it was announced by Baker Duggins.

He said the full 1977-78 schedule of national test dates (with registration periods in parentheses) is: Oct. 8, 1977 (Aug. 8-Sept. 12); Nov. 29, 1977 (Sept. 26-Oct. 21); Feb. 11, 1978 (Nov. 14-Jan. 13); April 1, 1978 (Feb. 6-March 3); June 17, 1978 (March 27-May 19).

At area test centers on those dates it takes students about three hours to complete four standardized exams (covering subject areas of English, math, social studies, and natural sciences) that make up the Test Section. The ACT Assessment's other important section is a two-part questionnaire that is completed by students at home as part of the registration process. The test scores provide an

assessment of general educational development and the questionnaire section information focuses on academic and nonacademic accomplishments and interests, anticipated needs, as well as educational and career plans.

The resulting test scores and extensive questionnaire information are used by students and their counselors and families to assist in education and career planning. The information is also used by colleges for academic advisement, admissions, counseling, course sectioning and placement, student services,

and institutional research. The basic student fee is \$7.50 for the ACT Assessment Program, which is recommended or required for use by student applicants at more than 2,600 colleges and scholarship agencies.

The ACT Assessment Program is one of several guidance-oriented educational services provided for students and educational institutions by ACT (The American College Testing Program). With its national headquarters in Iowa City, Iowa, the non-profit organization also maintains 13 regional offices in other parts of the nation.

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**On The Farm  
In Parmer  
County**

COTTON BOLLWORM infestations are heavier than normal in several parts of the county. We can expect bollworm activity to increase in many fields as egg laying activity has been heavy in several of these fields examined. However, even though some acreage has been treated or needs to be treated, most infestations are still at sub-economic levels. How severe the problem will become will be determined by the rate of bollworm egg laying and the action of beneficial insects.

Several fields we have inspected have damaging infestations of large bollworms as a result of the early August egg lay that we predicted. Unfortunately, several of the fields had not been inspected in time and in many cases the worms found were too large to kill. We strongly recommend that growers inspect their fields now and frequently thereafter to avoid such a situation. Remember, chemical applications should be timed to kill worms 1/4 inch or smaller. As bollworms become larger, they are much more difficult to kill.

The current situation is one in which it is impossible to offer a blanket recommendation since the situation varies among fields. The decision of whether to treat or not to treat should be based on several factors other than infestation level and damage. These include: yield potential left in undamaged bolls, number of worms that will be left after chemical treatment and the number of bolls they will take, amount of egg pressure, and how much help beneficials are providing in removing eggs and small bollworms.

A grower also needs to consider the possibility, that in many instances, at least 2-3 applications may be necessary to break the cycle and control new infestations. If heavy bollworm egg laying continues after a spray program is started, several more applications may be necessary.

The Texas Agricultural Experiment Station field day will be at Lubbock on Tuesday afternoon, September 13, 1-5 p.m. This will be at the Agricultural Research Extension Center north of the air terminal.

More than 100 new and improved cotton varieties which are being evaluated by scientists of the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station will be among several featured attractions.

The afternoon event each year attracts over 1200 visitors who tour the Experiment Station's numerous research plots and discuss new developments in agriculture with scientists and specialists.

Joining in the event will be the Texas Agricultural Extension Service; Agricultural Research Service, USDA; and agricultural meteorology office of the National Weather Service.

Drs. Levon Ray, Jack Gipson and Earl Minton are cooperating in the cotton variety studies. Their discussions during field tour stops will include tests on disease resistance, short season and glandless varieties, and performance of records of about 50 unreleased varieties.

In addition, according to Dr. Ray, some aspects of the current breeding efforts to develop more profitable cotton varieties will be discussed. This will include hybrid cotton and recent findings associated with cold-tolerant cotton.

The identification of cotton varieties that are tolerant of low temperature during the fiber maturation period is considered a major breakthrough for High Plains growers in minimizing fiber property problems, especially that of low micronaire.

Other concerns of cotton growers to be discussed during field day activities include tours of research plots, with talks slated on weed control, cotton varieties and disease control, fertility, nematode control and water use efficiency.

Discussions at the weed research tour stop will include herbicide overlay treatments (preplant incorporated herbicides plus pre-emergence herbicide applications for annual weed control), post-emergence directed herbicide applications for difficult-to-control annual weeds, and new herbicides that are currently under development for use in various crops.

Without abundant spring rains and lack of hand labor, farmers on the Southern High Plains faced more weed problems than normal this season. Farmers will be especially interested this year in the latest research information on such weeds as lakeweed, Texas blueweed, whiteweed, cocklebur, lanceleaf sage, prairie sunflower, nutsedge and cottonweed.

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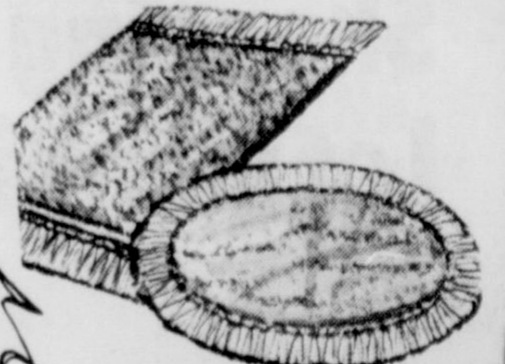
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# Curry County Fair Set September 6-10

The 1977 edition of the Curry County Fair will be staged September 6-10 at the fairgrounds east of Clovis. This year's week-long fair will feature such popular events as a tractor pull, competition in different livestock shows, exhibits and cultural divisions.

Perhaps the largest single attraction at the Curry County Fair will be the New Mexico Championship Tractor Pull to be held September 8-10.

The Class-A pull offers more than \$5,000 in prize money. Of the four Class-A pulls held in New Mexico the Clovis pull is the biggest one.

Entrants in the event accumulate points at each of the pulls and the one with the most points at the end of the season wins the all-around trophy.

The trophy will be offered for the first time this year. The overall winner will be determined at the Clovis pull.

Only one tractor pulls at any time. Each tractor hitched up to a sled which can be adjusted to different weights, and the tractor pulls the sled as far as possible without bogging down.

A "full pull" means that the driver has pulled the sled to the end of the track. If more than one competitor makes a "full pull,"

weights are added to the sled and the run is completed again.

Next Thursday night (September 8) only local pullers from Curry and surrounding counties in New Mexico will be allowed to compete. The class weights that night will include a 12,000, a 15,000 and an 18,000 to 21,000 pound tractor class.

The final class on Thursday will include a 5,000 and 6,000 pound class for four-wheel drive vehicles.

Also on Thursday a special garden tractor pull will be held for youngsters under the age of 15. The three weight classes for this event will include 600 pounds plus 50, 800 pounds plus 50, and 1,000 pounds plus 50.

Both local and out-of-state competitors will be participating in the Friday and Saturday competition. Contestants will weigh-in at 1 p.m. each day with the pulls beginning at 6 p.m.

Clovis farm implement dealers are selling advanced tickets at a cost of \$8 for all three nights. Tickets will cost \$11 at the gate.

The tractor pull is sponsored by the Curry County Fair Board and all proceeds will go back into the fair.

Livestock shows will also be a big part of this year's fair. Sheep, cattle, swine and other animals will be exhibited and shown in daily competition.

The Board of Trustees of Friona Independent School District has awarded a contract to McMorries and Company of Hereford, to appraise all of the properties in the School District.

The Board spent much time in arriving at this decision, however, in view of laws passed by our legislature requiring local fund assignments of school district to be based on market value, as determined by Boards set up in Austin, and in view of the assigned values set by the Governor's Office Education Resources and the additional fact that in the new school finance bill "Senate Bill No. 1," passed by the recent Special Session of the Legislature, which provides in part for the withholding of State funds, if a School District does not maintain equal and uniform values

and values that are reasonably close to market value figures.

The State under Senate Bill No. 1 will make checks of every School District's values within the State to see that School Districts are working toward equalization of their properties and obtaining a reasonable market value total of all properties in a School District.

"During our Board of Equalization hearings, the Board has determined that our values are not equitable," Friona Superintendent Tom Jarboe said. "Our residences are not equal in value, our agricultural lands are not equal, and cost to do this type of work is increasing rapidly."

In considering all facts, the Board of Trustees believed it was now time to do the re-evaluation.

"The Board has the assurance of

the McMorries Company that the values will be reasonable, that equity will be obtained in this re-appraisal program, and that the program will meet all of the requirements of the State," Jarboe said.

The company will determine its schedules on all types and classes of property in the district, based upon sales information obtained within the district, every parcel of property will be inspected, on-the-ground, by a qualified appraiser, all buildings that have any value will be measured and classified, all lands will be inspected.

All agricultural lands will be graded according to its soil type, slope and the amount of irrigation water a well is capable of producing will be a consideration in determining the value, a landing grading system similar to that used by Soil Conservation Service will be used, there will be eight grades of farm land and eight grades of pasture land; grade number one will be the best, etc.

The schedules will provide for an amount of acres that can be irrigated by the size of the irrigation well, say an 8" well can water 160 acres, a 6" well only 90 acres, and a 4" well 40 acres, etc., the irrigated acres will be valued by the grade of the land at irrigated prices, yet to be determined, and the balance of the land at reduced prices per acre according to the land grade.

McMorries stated that because a well had an 8" discharge pipe did not mean that the well was pumping 8" of water.

"We will put forth every effort to determine what each well is capable of pumping," he said. "We hope that every owner will be thinking about what their wells are pumping, and if any owner has any doubts of what his wells are pumping, it would be good to meter the wells, we will welcome all information regarding irrigation water, this will insure that an owner is not being over-valued."

"We will attempt to talk to all owners or operators," a McMorries official said. "We definitely will inspect every parcel of property, however, in our 19 years in the business, we find it impossible to see every owner."

In case the appraiser does not get to talk to the owner or operator, it is suggested that well information be given the districts Assessor. He will give such information to the appraiser. McMorries stated that

equity is what is expected to be achieved, the more facts we have, the closer to equity the end product will be.

A letter will be mailed to each owner, in about June 1978, stating a time and place where an owner can meet with the appraiser. He can review the values put on his property and review the values placed on other owner's property, then if an owner feels his property is not valued equitably and desires he can appear before the local Board of Equalization Board at a later date.

Not all taxes will be increased. Some property will reduce, older homes that have not been given consideration for age and depreciation in years, may reduce in value, farm land that had good irrigation water some years ago, but water has depleted since the value was placed on the property and has not been changed, likely could lower, but the good land with good water likely will increase.

The appraisers will begin work in the City of Friona about September 6, 1977. Each appraiser will have a business card with him, showing the company name and his name, the appraisers will knock on every door, he will ask some questions, (how many baths, etc.) then will measure the outside of each building, and classify each building.

In the event you are not at home, the business card will be left on your door, but, the appraiser will measure the outside of the buildings.

The appraiser does not need to enter the home, unless he thinks there is a need to see the inside construction, to insure equity, then he will ask permission to look at the inside construction.

However, the appraiser will not need to see throughout a home. The living room and kitchen will show him what he needs to see. In the event an owner requests the appraiser to enter the home to show him something he should see, then the appraiser will be happy to make an inside inspection of the home.

The appraiser will not know what value will finally be placed on the property when he is making the inspection, the appraiser is only gathering information, measuring the building and classifying them, for use in calculating the final value of the property.

McMorries stated that he and his employees welcome any and all information from the owner, and our people will be cooperative and open minded at all times.

He will be assisted by other district leaders.

State President-Elect Virginia Stacey of San Antonio (Lackland ISD) will be a featured speaker.

TSTA staff members who will provide information are Earl Cantrell and Tom Llewellyn of the Austin office, and Bill Potts of the Plainview regional office.

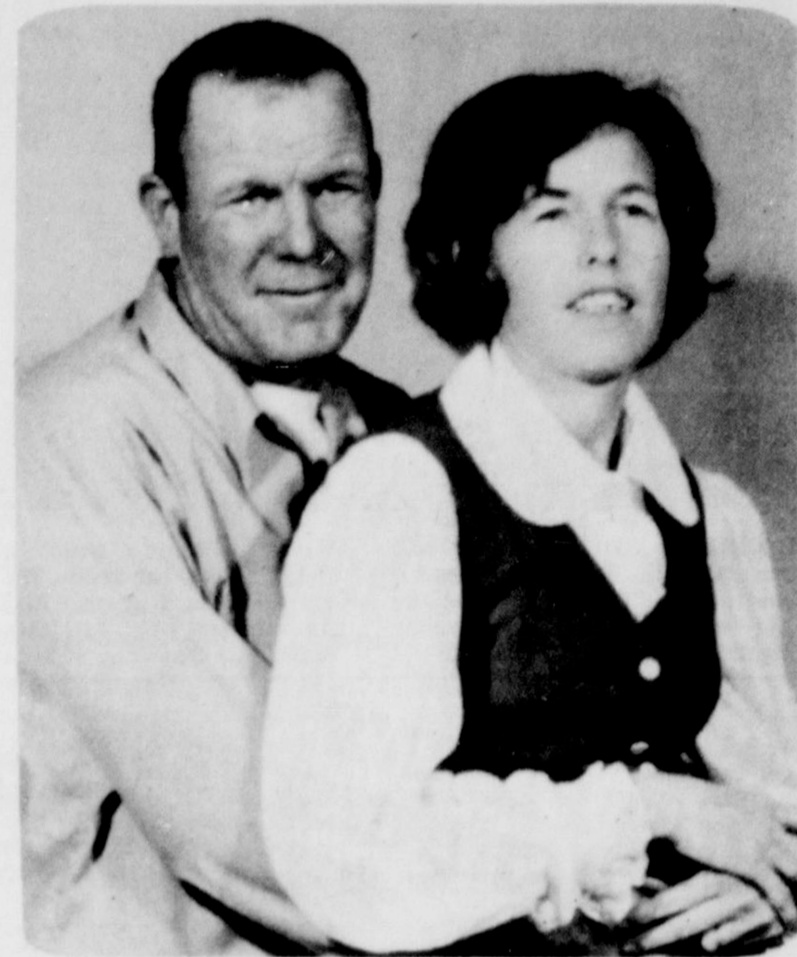

## Libraries Qualify For Membership

Eighteen libraries in the 25-county area served by the Texas Panhandle Library System have qualified for membership in the regional library system for the year that begins September 1. Amarillo Public Library serves as the Major Resource Center for the system.

The system will receive a \$184,734 grant to carry out cooperative activities to improve library service in the region. It is one of ten regional library systems organized under provisions of the Texas Library Systems Act of 1969 administered by the Texas State Library.

System programs are designed to increase the quantity of materials available as well as to make them more easily accessible. Throughout the year members of the system staff will be providing consultant service to member libraries and conducting workshops.

Among the programs to increase the range of materials available in libraries are one that will increase the number of books in individual libraries and another that will make films and cassette tapes available to

member libraries from system headquarters.

Access to materials will be improved through a books-by-mail program for persons in the 25-county area that are not served by a public library. In addition most of the member libraries have signed reciprocal borrowing agreements to enable library users to borrow materials from neighboring libraries.

In addition to Amarillo Public Library, system members are Hutchinson County Library at Borger, Hemphill County Library at Canadian, Canyon Public Library, Rhoads Memorial Library at Dimmitt, Killgore Memorial Library at Dumas, Friona Public Library, Deaf Smith County Library at Hereford, Lovett Memorial Library at McLean, Lovett Memorial Library at Pampa, Carson County Public Library at Panhandle, Perryton Memorial Library, Shamrock Public Library, Hansford County Library at Spearman, Sherman County Public Library at Stratford, Swisher County Library at Tullia, Collingsworth County Library at Wellington and Wheeler Public Library.

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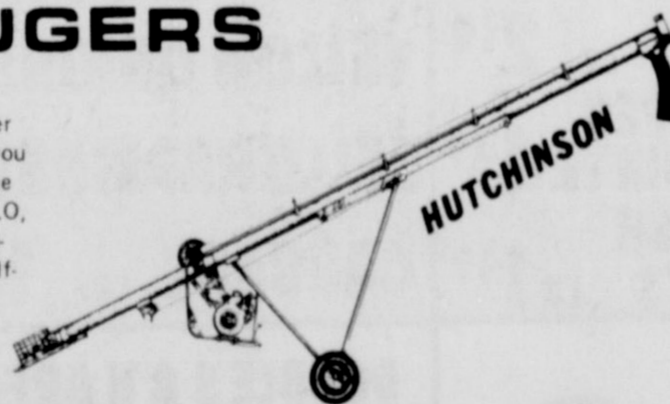
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# An important message to our customers.

The bruising game may have been a costly one for the Chiefs. Leading rusher Glen London hurt a hand when an opponent hit him with his headgear. He was having X-rays made Friday night to determine if the hand might be cracked.

Jeff Whiteside, the little halfback who added 57 yards to ably back up London's 71, suffered from cramps and a pulled muscle, and like London, missed the final quarter.

Fleming sustained a cut on his chin that required stitches, and Bandy may have had a slight concussion.

But the game had its bright spots, and Coach Phillips said "We definitely feel that we can come back and get in the win column, and we intend to start with next Friday's game."

The game was played in near ideal weather except for a steady south breeze. A fine crowd of around 2,000 watched in shirtsleeve conditions.

The Chiefs travel to Lockney next week to battle another Floyd County team. The Longhorns fell to Post, 14-7 in their opening game Friday. Friona has done much better through the years against Lockney, having won nine times against seven losses.

Floydada increased its margin in the all-time series to 8-2 favoring the 'Winds with their win Friday night.

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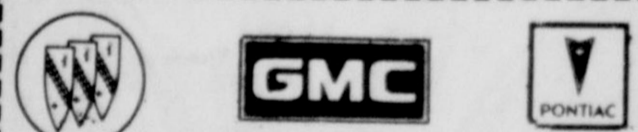


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
