Neighbors Watch As Two Stoned

PROVIDENCE, R.I. (AP) - As neighbors watched in silence, a woman and her daughter, 10, were stoned by a band of about 12 Negroes

Mrs. Shirley Aurgemma, 33, said she was driving through her neighborhood when the Negroes stopped her car, kicked it and threw stones and bottles at her.

She was taken to a hospital with bruises on the arms and chest. Her daughter Deborah, who ran for help, escaped injury

Mrs. Aurgemma, described the incident this

The Negroes were standing in the middle of Alma Street, where she lives, and would not let

"I asked them to leave me alone," she said, but "they started kicking the car."

When the assailants began throwing rocks and bottles at her she got out of the car and screamed for help. Deborah started to run, but stopped when a bottle crashed in front of her.

"There were quite a few people looking on" when the rock-throwing began, Mrs. Aurgemma said, but no one called the police.

Officials say they won't know until the end of the year whether 17-year-olds and men 39 to 43 will be needed.

Candidates Swap Fire, Change Stand

Calls Hubert Naive On Crime

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind. (AP) -Richard M. Nixon believes if he built into his Republican presidential campaign "a slam bang attack" on George C. Wallace, it would backfire and provide a political boost to the third-party

White House candidate. "I am not campaigning against Gov. Wallace," Nixon said, but against Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey, the Democratic candidate.

Nixon expressed confidence

that Wallace support would shrink as the Nov. 5 election nears, and that he or Humphrey will emerge the clear victor.

He issued a statement charging that Humphrey is "tragically naive" about the problem of crime in America. "Mr. Humphrey has exaggerated and overemphasized poverty in this country as a cause of crime," Nixon said.

"I say that doubling the conviction rate in this country would do far more to cure crime in America than quadrupling the funds for Mr. Humphrey's war on poverty," Nixon said.

At a downtown Indianapolis rally Thursday, Nixon said mounting crime demonstrates a need for new leadership.

Agnew Regrets Charge

ROCHESTER, N.Y. (AP) -Gov. Spiro T. Agnew has withdrawn his charge that Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey is soft on communism.

"Had I ever realized the effect that this expression would have, I would have shunned it like the plague," the Republican vice presidential nominee said at a news conference Thursday. "I would frankly call the use

of that particular phrase on my

part an error," the Maryland governor said. Agnew said he was not aware when he made the remark in a Washington news conference this week that it would be interpreted against the political background of the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy, whose charges of communism in government led to countercharges of witchhunts

Agnew said that had he known his remark criticizing the Democratic presidential nominee 'would in some way cast me as the Joe McCarthy of 1968, I would have turned five somersaults to avoid saying it."

The soft-on-communism remark led some political observers to believe that Agnew had been designated the hard-line campaigner and that GOP presdential nominee Richard M. Nixon would take a loftier position on issues.

Afraid Of 'Real' Nixon

SEA GIRT, N.J. (AP) — Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey has called Richard M. Nixon "that man who abused Mr. Truman, who heaped scorn on Adlai Stevenson, who fought John Kennedy every step of the way," and who has strongly opposed the efforts of President

"I am not concerned about the 'new Nixon' or the 'old Nixon,' what worries me is the real Nixon," Humphrey said Thurs-

GOD TAKES CARE OF HIS PEOPLE, NO MATTER WHERE

One of the most dramatic stories in the Bible is the basis for the Sunday School lesson, Background passage is Esther, chapters 1 - 8, the focal passage 4:13-16 and 7:1-7.

Around 480 B.C., Ahaseurus (Xerxes) had suffered a costly defeat at the hands of the Greeks and had gone on to Persia to lick his wounds. He took unto himself a lovely young Jewess, Esther, whose lineage was unknown to him. Among the king's princes, Haman rose to a place of great power and decreed that all should bow down to worship nim. This, Mordecai, a prominent Jew and foster father of Esther, would not do.

Enraged, Haman decided to wreak his revenge not only on Mordecai, but upon all the Jews by mass extermination on an appointed day. To gain authority, he promised the king the equivalent of a million dollars, and in return he received the king's ring, which contained the official seal. Using this, orders were sent over the land to prepare for the fateful day. Mordecai got wind of it and brought a copy of the orders to Esther, prevailing upon her to use her influence upon the king.

He adjured her not to consider her own position as safe, then issued one of the most familiar of Biblical passages: "Who knoweth whether thou art come to the kingdom for such a time as this?". She forgot her own welfare, deand if I perish, I perish." The claring "So will I go . . end result was that proud Haman prostrated himself on the queen's couch for mercy and was hanged on the very gallows he had erected for Mordecai. God takes care of His people wherever they are and whatever the odds. The king issued a second order which enabled the Jews to defend themselves, thus escaping total destruction.





HUMPHREY'S PITCH did the nearly unheard-of, for it put over a minority report, drove a substantial issenting Democrats from the hall, set the party on an entirely new civil rights course without marring its victory in November. By any fair judgment, Humphrey's oration that day was a political

masterplece. My first personal meeting with him fell in early 1949 when the new Minnesota Senator had me to a twosome luncheon. He is masculine, outgoing, affectionate and his personality appealed to everything in me except for some fixed prejudice against his radical politics.

NOTHING, HOWEVER, alters my present opinion that Hubert Humphrey is lamentably unfit to be President. I have just refreshed my memory of his activities in Washington by re-reading a pair of biographies. One is pro-Humphrey written by Winthrop Griffith who was the candidate's aide from 1960 to 1964. The other is anti-Humphrey, written by Allan Ryskind, an avowed right winger.

What strikes me as remarkable is that pro-Humphrey Griffith and anti-Humphrey Ryskind both confirm my opnion of the Vice President as White House material.

WIN GRIFFITH told me that, on returning to Washington after his book's publication, he phoned the Vice

What I can't understand is why we must give up the world in order to be a Christian, if God made everything in the world?

Many people misunderstand this idea of "giving up." When you buy something of value you must "give up" something — usually money. This is exchanging, not just giving up something for nothing. The Christian life is like that. Jesus said, "What shall a man give in exchange for

In 1949-64. Humphrey cast 156 votes relating to Federal investment, and every vote pressed even by administration favored the increase of spending.

HUMPHREY FAVORED surrendering Quemov-Matsu to Red China, favored giving Nationalist China's Security Countil seat to neutralist India; favored the resignation of Secretary of State Dulles for threatening "massive retaliation" and bold "brinksmanship;" favored internationalizing the Panama Canal, and favored the Harriman plan "to accept presence of some Communists .

Campaign Talk Hurts Peace Talks

HUBERT HUMPHREY made the surprising statement to an audience in Denver that he would have acceptèd a proposed platform plank calling for an "unconditional" halt to the bombing of North Vietnam. He said that the minority report, defeated by a 3-to-2 vote, was "so mildly different than the majority report that I would have had no difficulty in accepting it." The Hanoi government has been trying for several weeks at Paris to get the United States to accept its demands for an tional" halt of the bombing without pledging any reciprocal action on the

part of the North Vietnamese OPENING HIS campaign h Philadelphia, Mr. Humphrey went further and promised that, "negotiation or no negotiation," the United States could begin to pull out troops either late this year or early in 1969. This was interpreted by his aides afterwards as merely a reaffirmation of statements made by Gen. William C. Westmoreland on July 2 on his return from Vietnam. The Army chief of staff expressed then the hope that the South Vietnamese could take over more of the fighting by the end of 1969 or early in 1970, and that this might permit a "token number" of American troops to be withdrawn. But he cautioned that "the phasedown might be very small, if at all."

ON THE Republican side, Richard Nixon is being careful not to make any specific statements about ending the war, and refers only to the quest for "an honorable peace." He did, however, get into questions of inter-

Presumably seeking the endorsement of Mr. Fulbright, the Maine senator, on his arrival in Hot Springs, Ark., described the Democratic Vietnam war plank as "flexible" enough that any Democrat could support it.

Dispatches from Paris indicate tha the North Vietnam envoys have been noting the speeches in America's political campaign and apparently are being led to believe that the pacifist side of the argument will gain the biggest number of votes and that, as soon as the election is over, the process of America's capitulation will

THE HANOI spokesman in Paris - Nguyen Thanh Le - has already started to emphasize new demands even if an "unconditional" halt to the bombing is promised by the United States. He says it is important simultaneously for "other acts of war," including aerial reconnaissance by United States forces, to be ended. This is an indication of how much encouragement the North Vietnamese are getting from campaign speeches in the United States.

Where Will The McCarthyites Go?

McCarthy country. The suburbanites in this affluent community, with its model schools and its high ratio of progressive-minded civic leaders, had invested Eugene McCarthy with their belief in the politics of idealism.

THEY ARE sitting now in the ruin of their hopes. On the second car, the small car that rushes the breadwinner off to the commuter train to New York in the morning, the McCarthy flower is fading. With the adults the sense of disillusion is the same - greater perhaps - as it was over the sad fate of Adlai Stevenson. The young are numb with a kind of disbelief that the system could be so poisonous as it seemed to be in Chicago.

SINCE IN many white, uppermiddle-class suburbs — Scarsdale doesn't want to be all white, several Negro families live here, yet real estate values exclude all but a privileged few — these same attitudes can be found, they are worth exploring. They have a lot to say about the coming election campaign.

This reporter has taken a wholly unscientific, unweighted poll in a shockingly small sample. At one extreme is the ardent McCarthyite who will vote for Richard Nixon "as a protest."
