WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate refused Tuesday to cut off a filibuster against President Johnson's nomination of Abe Fortas to be chief justice of the United States.

A two-thirds majority of senators voting was required to put the Senate's debate-limiting cloture rule into effect.

Mrs. Fortas was in the visitors gallery for the vote. The vote came on the fifth day of a filibuster against a motion by Majority Leader Mike Mansfield, D-Mont., to take the Fortas nomination up for consideration.

45-43

The vote was 45 for cutting off the filibuster to 43 against. The 45 total was 14 votes short of what was needed by the Fortas backers.

On the eve of today's crucial vote whether to limit debate, Philip A. Hart, D-Mich., floor leader of the nomination. typified his forced sentiment when he commended Sen. Albert Gore, D-Tenn., for supporting Fortas.

"It may well be that this present/debate is the only opportunity we will have for such speeches," Hart said Monday in an obvious reference to the dim chances that exist for stopping the filibuster.

Hart joined another Fortas backer, Sen. Joseph Tydings, D-Md., in the melancholy assessment. Tydings Sunday pre-



dicted flatly that the filibuster could not be beaten. MARGIN

Senate Democratic Majority Leader Mike Mansfield said the margin of any defeat would determine whether he'd drop the nomination or make another attempt later in the week to limit

debate. Mansfield said when Minority Leader Everett Dirksen announced his opposition last week that Dirksen's switch made it tough to get the two-third vote necessary to limit debate.

Fortas' leading opponent, Sen. Robert P. Griffin, on the other hand, was elated about the situ-

ation "After today," said the Michigan Republican, "the Senate will stand taller in the scheme of government. We make it clear that we not only claim but we intend once again to exercise with care and diligence the constitutional power to advise and consent.'

His remarks were in a speech prepared for delivery prior to the vote

Today's vote was on a motion to bring the nomination to the Senate floor.

Several Fortas opponents argued in Monday's debate that no vacancy exists, and the Senate should not even consider the nomination.

The argument was based on the circumstances under which President Johnson nominated Fortas to succeed Chief Justice Earl Warren last June 26.

Warren wrote the President that, because of his age, he intended to retire "at your pleasure". Johnson replied he would accept upon Senate confirmaCRAWWARD.

Your taxes are going up again. That extra cent on the state sales tax is due at 12:01 a.m. Wednesdav

State Comptroller Robert S. Calvert confirmed the Oct. 2 effective date despite the fact that the bill passed by the special legislative session said the increase would be effective Oct. 1.

The 1969 spending bill cannot become effective until 90 days after the end of the session which adjourned July 3. Calvert said.

The increase from two to three per cent in the state sales tax will be effective throughout the state but in the 301 cities that have approved a city sales tax the tax hike actually will be from three to four per cent.

City Manager Larry Crow, who talked with the State Comptroller's office this morning, said he was told that merchants will include Oct. 1 on sales tax reports for the third quarter. Normally, the quarter ends on Sept. 30.

Also taking effect Wednesday will be an increase from the present two per cent to three per cent in the auto sales tax. This adds about \$30 to the price of a \$3,000 car.

With the increase in effect, the state sales tax will start at a penny on purchases of 17 cents. In cities with local sales taxes, the breaking point will be 13 cents. Vending machine sales of 16 cents or less will be exemp

In cities without a local sales tax, the rate will be one cent on sales of 17-49 cents, two cents on sales of 50-83 cents and three cents on transactions of from 84 cents to \$1.16.

Where local taxes are in force, the rates will be one cent on sales of 13-37 cents, two cents on purchases of 38-62 cents, three cents on sales of 63-87 cents, and four cents on purchases of 88 cents - \$1.12.

A call for support from students abroad to help in a fight against "30 years of political demogoguery and corruption of the Mexican government" raised anew the possibility that Mexico's student strife could in terfere with the 1968 Olympics which open here Oct. 12. FEAR

It was a fear that students would upset the Olympics that brought about the army's occupation of the university Sept. 18. Opening ceremonies for the Olympics are scheduled for Olympic Stadium across the way from the university campus. Eight hours after the 1 300 army troops started their withdrawal from the campus, the students' Strike Council met and drew up a statement saving they would stick to their original demands for settlement of their strike.

"Here in Mexico we plan to keep opposing army violence and police clubs," one council member said.

DEMANDS

The students' demands include firing of top police officials, disbanding of the riot police force called Granaderos, repeal of subversion laws and indemnity payments for those injured or killed in the rioting that began July 26.

HHH Would Swap Bombing For Restoration Of DMZ

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) -Vice President Hubert H. Humphrey says if elected president he would stop the bombing of North Vietnam as an "acceptable risk" for peace if Hanoi shows willingness to restore the demilitarized zone.

In his first paid nationwide television broadcast Monday night, and speaking from Salt Lake City before flying here, the Democratic presidential candidate said:

'RISK'

"As president, I would stop the bombing of the North as an acceptable risk for peace because I believe it could lead to success in the negotiations and a shorter war. This would be the best protection for our troops."

The vice president placed a qualification on his proposed bombing halt, saying that before taking action he would "place key importance on evidence-direct or indirect, by deed or word-of Communist willingness to restore the demilitarized zone between North and South Vietnam."

Humphrey added that "If the government of North Vietnam were to show bad faith, I would reserve the right to resume the bombing.

There was no immediate response to Humphrey's speech from Sen. Eugene J. McCarthy, a fellow Minnesota Democrat who was the vice president's principal rival at the Democratic convention in Chicago.

The Crawford Hotel, built in 1927 and 1928 by A. J. Crawford of Carlsbad, N.M., with local financial support, came as the first major hotel development on the heels of the discovery of oil in this county.

It was opened in 1928 and became the focal point for many activities in town and in the district. It was described as "the finest hotel in the area" - superior in appointments and facilities to other hostelries in the Permian Basin. Oil men

made it their headquarters, and it was a beehive of activity.

It operated as a hotel until 1963 when it was shut down. In the meantime the larger and more impressive Settles Hotel had come into being and had eclipsed the early day grandeur of the Crawford, However, it continued as a popular establishment for a long time and it was only when the expansion of highways and the upsurge of motels made hotels of diminishing importance that it began to lose ground.

For a time after the sevenstory structure ceased to function as a hotel part of the street level floor was used by the Big Spring Elks as their quarters. A barber shop also operated for a time in another front area.

ONLY ONE Today only the Hardesty Drug store, established in the late 1930's, continues to function. Frank Hardesty, postmaster, who acquired the store in 1945. said that he and Mrs. Hardesty are ready to close down when the new project gets started.

Downtown Big Spring has also been in contact with a contractor on a deal to raze the structure. No figures were announced, but it was indicated that the demolition of the build ing will be costly.

Swartz said that, other than for the formal agreement by the city to go along with the county government and the merchants' organization, nothing further stands in the way of the plan. Swartz said he will discuss the proposition with the city officials in the near future

It is gratifying that the nation's 11 circuit courts of appeal, pursuant to the Federal Jury Selection and Service Act of 1968, have now announced plans that will substantially cure this defect so far as the federal courts are concerned. The plans will become operative when the law goes into effect Dec. 22.

DETROIT — If there is one big-city state Hubert Humphrey has a chance to carry it is Michigan. The hatest Detroit News statewide poll showed. Humphrey and Richard Nixon running even, with 33 per cent each, 14 per cent for George Wallace and 19 per cent undecided.

BUT SUCH are the deep divisions within industrial Michigan and the forces normally behind the Democratic ticket have mobilized so belatedly that the odds today are probably against the Humphrey-Muskie ticket. With the election only six weeks away it is astonishing to find no real Humphrey organization at work. Mayor Jerome Cavanagh eed to be cocl airman of

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

Child-Abuse Toll High

CHICAGO (AP) - The nationwide toll of child abuse adds up to 2,000 to 3.000 children injured each month and one or two killed each day in the United States.

This is the studied conclusion of two associates with the University of Colorado School of Medicine. They coauthored "The Bayered Child." published recently by the University of Chicago Press.

Dr. C. Henry Kemp and Dr Rav E. Helfer say the toll of children under five killed by parents each year is more than die of disease. They list as causes of childhood deaths tuberculosis, whooping cough, polio, measles, diabetes, rheumatic fever, and appendicitis.

Who Could Best Deal With Russia

WASHINGTON - In rating the three presidential runners, we must ask how well candidates Humphrey, Nixon and Wallace are likely to sail the Ship of State in its stern-chase to overtake the Russian juggernaught. "None of us would sleep nights," an informed congressional administrator told me in discussion of this matter "if we knew how far ahead of us Russia has actually pulled.

WELL, WE DO know that in Space, in the combination of defensive-offensive nuclear weapons, in merchant marine, in many phases of advanced industrialization the Soviet Union has made the United States a second-class power. At the risk of boring readers who aren't serious-minded, I have done columns on all these subjects. I have felt and written that the cause of the American industrial decline is, in general, twofold. One, our scientific community, unhappy for various reasons, is not delivering the goods. Second, our vaunted labor force is giving us sloppy workmanship.

FOR EXAMPLE, Dr. George B. Kistiakowsky, the noted Harvard scientist, last spring resigned his important advisory post in the defense department. The one-word reason for his resignation was "Vietnam." There are others who have guit defense work for that reason. There are many men and several universities that refuse to do military research. Some say it violates their humane conscience. Some say that its secrecy infringes "academic freedom." Some say that the McNamara system of cost-effectiveness has been a hinderance to freedom-of-progress. Pentagon officials whom I interview deny there's any such thing as a sitdown strike. But they protest too much.

WHICH PRESIDENTIAL candidate can make the scientists get cracking? think we can eliminate Hubert Humphrey. He would merely be a carryover from the disastrous Kennedy Johnson administration. We can tickoff George Wallace. He seems not

to know that the problem exists. Without any doubt Dick Nixon has the awareness of this American plight. He has access to other Republicans like Rockefeller, Scranton and Romney who understand it. He has the acumen and earnestness which could appeal to the temperamental academic mind. Nixon, by all odds, is the most qualified candidate for this grueling and nation-saving task.

Sloppy workmanship by labor is best illustrated by the Apollo fire that killed three astronauts, and by the mechanical failures of the F-111 aircraft, better known as the TFX project. Thomas R. Baron, an industrial engineer, filed a 55-page report prior to the Apollo fire, and it is replete with incidents of carelessness, dirtiness, slipshod performance at Cape Kennedy where the accident took place. The crash of one F-111-A in or near Vietnam was described for me as botched-up workmanship equivalent to "a surgeon's leaving sponge in his patient's incision."

WHICH CANDIDATE can do something about it? The keyphrase here is "labor discipline." Humphrey has spent his political life fawning after the labor bosses and union members. Wallace has established an amazing rapport with the palefaces of the labor force, though he has few admirers among Negro workers. But if we're looking for somebody who might inspire or command "discipline," George would be a better bet than either Hubert or Dick.

On the other hand, the responsibility for "quality control" falls directly upon the big companies like North American, Boeing, Aerojet and the rest which do contract work for the government. Nixon, by reason of his business connections, and of the access he has to good political adminis-trators like Rockefeller and Scranton, is by far the best man to demand improved workmanship. Of the three, he's the one. (Distributed by McNaught Syndicate, Inc.)
