

Flu Vaccine To Be Late

ATLANTA, Ga. (AP)-A vaccine being developed to combat Hong Kong influenza will not be ready soon enough to avert an international epidemic, says the chief of the U.S. Public Health Service's Commuicable Disease Center.

Dr. David J. Sencer said Wednesday the world may be on the threshold of an epidemic of the new type of Asian influenza, discovered this summer in Hong Kong.

"The doctors say it is mild." he added, "but those who have had it tend to argue.

The first case identified outside of Asia was a traveler who came down with the disease in Atlanta a few weeks ago, three days after a visit to Hong Kong,

Sencer said. He made his remarks in a speech to the 17th annual meeting of the American Society of Tropical Medicine and Hygiene The new strain of Asian influenza broke out in Hong Kong in July and has killed 25 people. It also has been found in Singa-

pore and Formosa. CHANGE The health service advisory committee reported in September that the Hong Kong strain showed marked change from previous strains, and "increases the probability that Asian flu

will occur extensively in the United States in the 1968-69 sea-No specific vaccine will be available for three to six months, the committee said.

However, the current vaccine for Asian flu may still be partially effective.

LAGOS, Nigeria (AP) — Ten a day from relief supplies, Nils Gussing of Sweden said. .

"In some of these camps the condition of the people is very poor," he said in an interim report. "Many... showed serious signs of malnutrition.

"At one place the death rate was estimated to be between 30 and 40 persons out of every thousand per day, mainly young children and the elderly.

He reported that 800 tons of food are being delivered daily to the camps in the Uyo area, and to furnish the refugees there a second meal would require another 600 tons a day.

Meanwhile, informed sources reported that the Egyptian pilots flying for the Nigerian air force have started night flights against the Uli airstrip, Biafra's chief link with the outside world.

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Navy announced totday that portions of the lost nuclear submarine Scorpion have been located, more than 10,000 feet deep in the Atlantic.

Adm. Thomas H. Moorer, chief of naval operations, announced that "objects identified as portions of the hull of the sumbarine USS Scorpion have been located about 400 miles southwest of the Azores in more than 10,000 feet of water."

FIVE MONTHS The discovery, reported by a Navy oceanographic research ship Wednesday night, culminates a search of more than five months since the atomic powered submarine disappeared with a crew of 99 officers and men en route from the Mediterranean Sea to Norfolk, Va. 

When the ten appeared from West's hand on the second round, South feared that the suit would not split, so he continued with the jack to eliminate a subsequent roadblock.

The heart continuation is taken in dummy, South's diamond honors are cashed next and then a club is led. South now becomes assured of running nine tricks against even the most inspired defense.







freedom of information in governmental affairs when election time is near. However, it is well to have on the record that all three presidential candidates - Hubert Humphrey, Richard Nixon, and George Wallace - are committed if elected to a freer flow of information from the executive agencies to the press, Congress and the public.

The 1967 federal Freedom of Information Act, obtained after many years of effort by news-media organizations, was a helpful policy declaration. However, its effectiveness, and that of any other such law, will depend largely on the influence on administration attitudes exerted by the chief executive.

Without firm presidential leadership for "open government," a multitude of bureaucratic obstructions can always be put in the way of a freer flow of information to the public on activities of the executive branch. Furthermore, much will always depend on any president's in-

All politicians are for greater terpretation of "executive privilege" inherent in the Constitution's separation-of-powers principle; this restricts what information Congress can compel the executive branch to disclose.

Both Humphrey and Nixon specifically pledged to put a limited interpretation on the meaning of "executive privilege." And they, as did Wallace, promised to withhold only such information as required to be kept confidential by law or that would, if disclosed, adversely affect national security.

Their statements to the American Society of Newspaper Editors and the Associated Press Managing Editors Association represent the ideal. We are hardly so naive as to think that once in office any president would be likely to measure up to the ideal in freedom of information but it is reassuring to find that at least there is an unusual, consensus of intent on this issue. Hopefully, that at least indicates that a clearer concept of proper government-press relations is taking hold in public affairs.

The Communist Conspiracy

WASHINGTON - Why would 50,000 people participate in a march in London denouncing thd Vietnam war? The British have long since pulled out of Asia militarily, and they haven't given the slightest indication of an intention to become involved in Vietnam.

WHAT, THEN, is the reason? The answer is that the demonstration was unquestionably planned by representatives of the Communist party who have trained leaders in England ready to espouse any cause that the Moscow government may desire to have publicized. Most of the participants in the marches are themselves unaware of the Communist connection, but are persuaded by one means or another that they ought to demonstrate against the United States. The instigators, however, are for the most part financed by the Soviet government and there are trained agitators in various countries throughout the world, especially in the United States and in Latin America.

IN THE ANNUAL report of the House Committee on Un-American Activities issued this month, Chairman Edwin E. Willis describes the Communist origin and manipulation demonstrations in this country against the Vietnam war. He says that an assortment of Communists of both the Peking and Moscow varieties, fellow travelers, Marxists, radicals, pacifists and professional 'peace' agitators have launched demonstrations. The purpose, of course, is to sabotage American efforts to support the South Vietnamese resistance to a Communist takeover in their country.

FBI DIRECTOR J. Edgar Hoover testified before the committee, moreover, that "students for a Democratic Society" — which claims to be the largest of the "new left" student organizations, with more than 140 chapters - is one of the most militant of the student-youth groups engaged in activities protesting U.S. foreign policies. Communists, he said, are "actively promoting and participating in" the programs of the Students for a Democratic Society. There are indications that some of the groups are even working at a high-school

THE TECHNIQUES of the communists in stimulating student demonstrations throughout the world are well known to officials in the American government and to members of Congress. The Department of Justice is aware of the record of some of the leaders active in this country. Many of them openly acknowledge that they are Communists. Others conceal any connection with the party, but meet often with Communist

Anybody can organize a political party in America and preach a cause that is unpopular and even contrary to the policies of the United States. But if the leaders of any such group participate in conferences with repre sentatives of foreign governments or receive compensation or other rewards for themselves or for the expense of "demonstrations," this could be defined as a conspiracy against the United States.

THE LATE Judge Michael A. Musmanno, for 16 years a member of the Supreme Court of the State of Pennsylvania, testified before the House committee that, under some court decisions, the Communists have been able to turn the Fifth Amendment into a "fifth column marching against the security of the nation." Certainly there is need for legisla-

tion, as recommended by the committee, to strengthen the laws against conspiracy and particularly to prohibit any relationship between demonstrators in this country and a foreign power. There have been virtually no prosecutions against Communists who are citizens of the United States but who take orders from a foreign government. Yet their activities are designed to impair or break down the foreign policy of the United States.

WITH THREE major presidential tickets in the field, the one to denounce soft peace-making might not win as soon as Nov. 5, but it would win eventually. Since 1945, with the exception of President Johnson's superb intervention in the Dominican Republic, we have been postponing the obligatory day when we firmly impose our national policy upon a beaten enemy. Those last 10 words are the definition of a successful American war. No man who doesn't con that simple definition ought to be President of the United States.

THE FOE THIS time is Russo-Sino-Viet communism. We have frustrated its every lunge, have decimated its ranks and have the enemy at our mercy. The let-'em-up easy doctrine will serve, but not until it's well understood by the terms of peace that. we are not losers and not quitters

Our purpose in South Vietnam has always been, however sugar-coated, to set up as impregnable-as-possible a bastion against militant communism. Like West Germany. Like South Korea. Like Formosa. Like SAC, Like the U.S. Navy. It's a case of theyshall-not-pass and any settlement for less is an invitation to the next waltz.

The survey also turned up at least 85 candidates with a good chance of winning who say if the presidential election goes to the House, they would support a popular vote for winner for president even if he isn't their party's candidate.

The new House would inherit the job of picking the next president if no candidate receives 270 or more votes in the electoral college, whose votes are cast Dec. 16 and counted Jan. 6. If the election goes to the House each state, regardless of size, would cast one vote.

Translating survey results into control of state delegations leaves each of the three presidential candidates well short of the 26 state votes he would need to win in the House.

If House candidates who now lead are elected, Republican Richard M. Nixon apparently would get the votes of 17 states. Democrat Hubert H. Humphrey 12 and third-party candidate George C. Wallace 1-Alabama Votes of Hawaii, Kansas and

Nevada would go to whoever wins the popular vote in that state. Montana would be unable to vote because of a deadlock delegation

TOSSUP RACES

Sixteen other states are question marks as of now. Tossup races leave party control of some states in doubt and in many there are candidates who say they might vote for other than their party's nominee.

Some House candidates say they would back the presidential candidate who won the national popular vote. A petition advocating this position was signed by 29 Democratic congressmen and 25 Republicans. But now there is some question whether it remains in effect since it did not get heavier support.

Some candidates say they would vote for the man who carried their state and others say they'd follow the popular vote of their congressional district.

Many candidates said they'd stick with their party in any event, but numerous others refused to say what they would

The pressure of party discipline-with its possible threats that choice committee assignments or seniority might be taken away-could also persuade some dissidents to return to party line voting.


