LONDON (AP) — Aristotle Onassis and Maria Callas today won a multimillion-dollar law suit. Acting as Britain's highest court, the House of Lords by a 3-to-2 majority upheld a High Court decision against a former friend, Panaghis Vergottis. It gave the opera singer 25 shares of stock in a Liberian company that owns an 18,000-ton freighter now valued at \$2.88 million. 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Editors 'Read' Nixon Victory

NEW YORK (AP) — Richard M. Nixon should win the presidency without difficulty, according to reports from 482 editors around the nation, the Bulletin of the American Society of Newspaper Editors said today.

"There is a possibility of a landslide," said the Bulletin, "but not the probability."

In electoral votes, the editors monthly sees 233 votes "presumably safe" for Nixon, with another 187 votes "close, but leaning to Nixon."

Forty-five electoral votes were seen going to third party candidate George C. Wallace and 24 were believed going to Hubert H. Humphrey. An additional six states were estimated as "too close to call for anyone."

The results were based on a tabulation as of Oct. 18.

"We think to call this a poll would be misleading," the Bulletin said. "Let it sit as a 'reading' by the country's editors three weeks before the election."

"With 270 electoral college votes needed," the Bulletin story continued, "Nixon's 233 'safe' votes give him a commanding edge. If New York falls his way,

he is in. If he got all of the close-but-leading states, he'd have 420.

"If the editors are reasonably accurate reporters of their states' leanings (and they have been in past readings), it seems likely Nixon will wind up with something well over 300 Electoral College votes and the country will most likely forget the excited talk about the election being thrown into the House of Representatives."

The Bulletin story described Humphrey's chances as slim. "Even if you might be willing to put New York, Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and Texas in his list, he would have only 135 votes. That's only half the distance," the story said.

The Bulletin noted the following "strong strains" running through editors' comments:

1. Wallace's campaign seems to have cut far more into Humphrey's strength than Nixon's.
2. Wallace's candidacy "has clearly pained many editors," even when they predict he may win in their areas.
3. The Democratic party organization is a shambles in many sections.

Mexican Student Skyjacks Airliner

BROWNSVILLE, Tex. (AP) — A Mexican college student surrendered meekly to U.S. Customs officers Wednesday after he forced a Mexican airliner with 32 passengers to fly at gunpoint from Tampico, Mexico, to Brownsville.

The man, identified as Juan Francisco Garcia Zurita, 29, of Veracruz, Mexico, pulled a pistol on an airline stewardess after ordering the pilot to fly the Saesa airliner to Brownsville.

The C-46 was en route to Reynosa from Tampico.

FBI agent Clay Zachary of Brownsville, a representative of the Mexican consul's office and others interrogated Garcia Zurita, but indicated later they believed his motive for the hijacking was "vague."

Zachary said Garcia Zurita handed over the pistol to a crew member and walked from the airliner to U.S. customs officers. He offered no resistance.

Officers said they found a knife, about \$213 and a letter addressed to the West German Embassy in Mexico when they searched Garcia Zurita.

Zachary quoted the stewardess as saying the man told her he wanted to fly to Brownsville for "humanitarian reasons."

Garcia Zurita reportedly asked officers for political asylum, but Zachary said he did not believe that the man had made a formal application.

The airline stewardess told Zachary the man went to the restroom just after the plane left Tampico. When he returned, he handed her a note and then pulled the .22 caliber pistol when the stewardess

asked who was sending the note to the pilot.

The note reportedly said "Fly to Brownsville, there you will land and refuel and I will give you further instructions."

"Are we going to Cuba?" the stewardess said she asked the man. She said Garcia Zurita replied "No."

Invasion Nips Soviet Union

WASHINGTON (AP) — It cost the Soviet Union half a billion dollars to invade Czechoslovakia, U.S. officials believe, and the expense of occupation is going to drive the price of intervention even higher.

Officials said the \$500 million figure is an educated guess that represents only the cost of the preparation and the actual invasion itself last Aug. 21.

Until it is clear how many Soviet troops are going to stay in Czechoslovakia and how long, officials say it will be impossible to put a price tag on the over-all venture.

Experts also think Soviet agricultural production was hurt when the Russians and their Warsaw Pact allies rolled across Czech frontiers to put an end to the political liberalism of the Prague government.

Large numbers of reservists had been mobilized for pact maneuvers before the invasion and were kept in uniform until well after, causing many soldiers to miss harvest time.

Failure by South to properly manage his resources resulted in his ultimately being shut out of his ninth trick, and his three no trump contract suffered a setback.

West opened the four of hearts and declarer played low from dummy. East's queen forced out the ace. South observed that he could count nine tricks as soon as the ace of clubs was dislodged — two hearts, four diamonds, and three clubs. He decided to test the diamond suit first by cashing the ace and queen. When the ten appeared from West's hand on the second round, South feared that the suit would not split, so he continued with the jack to eliminate a subsequent roadblock.

Declarer was now ready to

work on the clubs. A small club was led to the nine which held the trick. The jack of clubs was continued and West ducked again. He took the next round, however, and shifted to the eight of spades. East topped dummy's jack with the queen and shifted back to hearts.

South shortly thereafter found himself securely locked up in the dummy with no way to reach his hand to cash the high club. After taking the king of hearts and the king of diamonds, he was forced to capitulate — and the outcome was a one trick setback.

Declarer's carelessness was the result of faulty timing. He was correct in assuming that it might prove necessary to unblock the diamond suit. However, a ready entry to North's high diamond was always available in the club suit — where one of dummy's honors must develop into a winner by force. South should, therefore, retain the ace of hearts as access to the long club in his hand.

It was alright to duck the first heart lead in dummy on the chance that West might have led from the queen-jack but, once East puts up an honor, he should be permitted to win the trick. The heart continuation is taken in dummy, South's diamond honors are cashed next and then a club is led. South now becomes assured of running nine tricks against even the most inspired defense.

American Combat Casualties Climb

SAIGON (AP) — American combat casualties in the Vietnam War edged upward last week to 109 men killed and 717 wounded. The week before 100 U.S. battle deaths and 589 wounded were reported, the lowest toll in more than 14 months.

The U.S. Command's weekly casualty report today listed 1,289 enemy killed, compared with a revised total of 1,440 in the week that ended Oct. 19. Last week's total also will probably increase as more reports come in.

South Vietnamese headquarters reported 103 government troops were killed, 578 wounded and two were missing last week, a drop from the 132 killed and 624 wounded the previous week. The number of South Vietnamese combat fatalities was the lowest since the week of Oct. 21, 1967, when 82 deaths were reported.

Of the 717 Americans wounded in action last week, 253 were hospitalized, the U.S. Command said.

The report raised to 29,034 the number of Americans reported killed in the Vietnam war since Jan. 1, 1961. The total number of wounded rose to 182,135, and another 1,212 Americans are listed as missing or captured.

U.S. Headquarters said that at least 409,299 enemy have been killed since Jan. 1, 1961.

On Winning A Complete Victory

WASHINGTON — "Let 'em up easy," was Lincoln's vernacular formula for peace terms. It was the one followed after every victorious war in our century of glory that ran between the American conquest of northern Mexico in the 1840's to our unexampled sweep from the Elbe River to Tokyo in World War II. But that formula does not, should not, apply to the anti-Communist war in Vietnam, which is still unfinished business.

Our purpose in South Vietnam has always been, however sugar-coated, to set up as impregnable-as-possible a bastion against militant communism. Like West Germany, like South Korea, like Formosa, like SAC, like the U.S. Navy. It's a case of they-shall-not-pass and any settlement for less is an invitation to the next waltz.

WITH THREE major presidential tickets in the field, the one to denounce soft peace-making might not win as soon as Nov. 5, but it would win eventually. Since 1945, with the exception of President Johnson's superb intervention in the Dominican Republic, we have been postponing the obligatory day when we firmly impose our national policy upon a beaten enemy. Those last 10 words are the definition of a successful American war. No man who doesn't con that simple definition ought to be President of the United States.

I WRITE while stop-the-bombing yammerings fill the air, and doves of peace are chirping their falsetto notes, and do not know what the candidates said last night or will say next morning. But it takes no extra-sensory perception to read the color of men's cheeks, men so long in public life.

THE Foe THIS time is Russo-Sino-Viet communism. We have frustrated its every lunge, have decimated its ranks, have the enemy at our mercy. The let-'em-up easy doctrine will serve, but not until it's well understood by the terms of peace that we are not losers and not quitters

TWO OF THE three candidates, then, are not incapable of the right response. Better they take chances on their November hopes than on delivering a quietus to their country.

WASHINGTON (AP) — In spite of many similarities between the presidential campaigns of 1948 and 1948, changed voting patterns are likely to make it difficult for Hubert H. Humphrey to duplicate Harry S. Truman's stunning upset victory.

The eight states Truman carried in the South 20 years ago gave him 99 electoral votes, providing the margin of his 303-189 win over Dewey. The then Democratic Gov. Strom Thurmond of South Carolina collected 39 as a Dixiecrat candidate.

However, Henry A. Wallace, running on the Progressive ticket, cost Truman New York's 47 electoral votes 20 years ago. Dewey topped Truman by only about 61,000 in the popular count while Wallace was polling 509,000, of which a substantial number probably would have gone to the Democratic nominee.

where Nixon counts himself strongest, and facing a stiff challenge in Texas, Humphrey can hardly afford to duplicate Truman's losses in New York, Pennsylvania, Michigan and New Jersey.

phrey's way. Cranston is leading by a wide margin in most polls, but Humphrey is trailing Nixon.

Without having had much influence on how that record was made.

The national opinion polls show Republican Richard M. Nixon running substantially ahead now as Gov. Thomas E. Dewey was believed to be in 1948.

There are clear signs that third-party candidate George C. Wallace won't stop where Thurmond did 20 years ago. Thurmond won only Alabama, Louisiana, Mississippi and South Carolina.

With Dewey's experience in mind, however, Republican strategists have been concerned recently with reports that Democrats are likely to be elected in sufficient numbers to retain control of the House and Senate.

If the Democratic candidates of 20 years ago were not all happy about being on the ticket with Truman, there was not such a broad and deep-seated party division over major policies as now plagues Humphrey.

Truman carried California with its 40 electoral votes, with only local candidate help. The 1948 nominee had no difficulty in carrying Texas and its 23 electoral votes against Dewey and Thurmond. Humphrey remains in deep trouble with Nixon and Wallace running strongly in that state.

Democrats hope that candidates for governor and Congress will pull Vice President Humphrey to a plurality in closely contested states as some of them aided Truman in critical areas in 1948.

Wallace is strongly in the running with Nixon for the Southern states that Truman carried, including Arkansas, Florida, Georgia, Kentucky, North Carolina, Tennessee, Texas and Virginia.

Twenty years ago the Democrats took nine Senate seats away from the Republicans without losing any of their own, gaining operating control of that body. They took over the House with a startling gain of 74 seats, giving them 263 at the start of the 81st Congress.

These include Sen. Joseph S. Clark of Pennsylvania, former Rep. John J. Gilligan of Ohio, Sen. Birch Bayh of Indiana, Sen. Frank Church of Idaho, Sen. George S. McGovern of South Dakota, Sen. J.W. Fulbright of Arkansas and Sen. Wayne Morse of Oregon.

Missouri was Truman's home state and he captured its 13 votes going away. But Wallace and Nixon have complicated matters there for Humphrey.

One factor is the possibility some development might give Humphrey a last-minute surge, perhaps a Vietnam bombing halt that could promise some real progress toward peace.

The Wallace vote could also make the difference in other key states. The Republican assumption is that he will take blue-collar votes that otherwise might have gone to Humphrey.

Without this, Humphrey counts heavily on some local Democratic candidates to provide him with the kind of coattail help that Adlai E. Stevenson, running for governor, and Paul Douglas, running for the Senate, gave Truman in Illinois in 1948.

Outside the South, Wallace's vote could cut into Humphrey's strength, as Thurmond's support did not do in Truman's case.

For a person whose conscience forbids him to follow a particular law, its enforcement "forces him to make the choice between jail and what he regards as moral treason, because we leave him no middle course," Dworkin said.

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Humphrey's task is further complicated by the absence of some built-in Truman assets. Truman had been president nearly four years and the country knew a great deal about him.

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Says Negroes See U.S. As A Lawless Society

WASHINGTON (AP) — Negroes see the United States as a lawless society which uses its police powers to oppress the black man, a prominent civil rights lawyer said today.

Not until the nation makes real its promises of equal opportunity and civil rights will respect for the law be restored, Carter said.

Robert L. Carter, recently resigned as general counsel of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, said, "There is a widespread lack of faith in the integrity of the administration of justice at all levels as it impinges on Negroes."

The NAACP lawyer added, "The all-but universal view of the Negro community is that it is the basic function of the police to keep blacks in line and to protect the white community against them."

In testimony prepared for the President's commission on violence, Carter said the South has widely flouted school desegregation requirements, and educational apartheid is increasing in the North despite court decisions.

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Negroes feel the laws for equal housing and equal employment are the ones least likely to be carried out, he added.

Cross right leg over left, so that thighs brush; similarly cross left leg over right. Repeat 20 times keeping movements short and brisk. 2. On back, lie with knees bent, soles of feet on floor and arms stretched out at shoulder level. Briskly swing legs from side to side, so that outer sides of thighs slap floor and, with each change of direction, inner sides slap together. Be sure to keep legs relaxed and twist sharply in waist. Otherwise you can't work up sufficient momentum for a slap with slimming snap. Start with ten repeats, gradually increase to twenty.

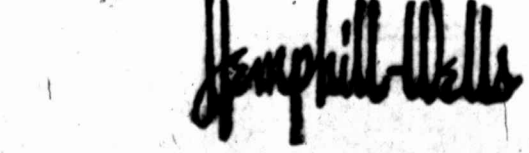

Slices In' Subs Project Hurts

WASHINGTON (AP) — Hard-pressed Pentagon economizers have been forced to make small but potentially crippling cuts in the program to develop a vessel capable of rescuing submarines trapped at great depths.

Specialists say the \$5-million cut that leaves \$74 million in the Navy's "deep submergence" project for this year takes away money earmarked for unexpected problems that usually crop up during a development process.

"It makes it much more difficult to solve current problems," one official said. "It eliminates the 'elbow room' in the development program."

The new cut was made as Pentagon authorities sought to meet a congressional order to trim spending by \$6 billion this year.

About a year ago, while preparing the fiscal 1969 budget, Defense Department officials denied the Navy some \$90 million to complete the final four boats of a planned force of six special rescue subs designed to

operate to a depth of nearly a mile.

Current rescue equipment, dating back more than a generation, is unable to assure rescue of submarine crews beyond 300 feet.

The original plan, announced more than two years ago, was to have a worldwide rescue system of six special subs by 1970.

The budget squeeze has knocked that schedule off the track.

The first of the new class of rescue subs is now expected to be ready in 1970, the second boat in 1971 and prospects for the final four boats were cloudy.

The loss of the atomic submarine Thresher in April, 1963, triggered major interest in modernizing the Navy's antiquated rescue equipment.

Interests in that program took another upward turn after a second nuclear powered submarine, the Scorpion, vanished with a crew of 99 officers and men last May en route from the Mediterranean to Norfolk, Va.

The fate of the Scorpion—if it is known—has not been made public.

MEN, COEDS DEBATE

Should Women Be Kept Barefoot, Pregnant?

CLINTON, N.Y. (AP) — "Should women be kept barefoot, pregnant and in the kitchen?"

That was the question debated Wednesday night by two students at all-male Hamilton College and two coeds from Hamilton's new sister school, Kirkland College.

FRUSTRATION

The middle aisle of Hamilton's Science Auditorium served as the dividing line for about 250 students serving as judges, with Hamilton's men outnumbering Kirkland's women by about 7-5.

The hour-long debate progressed amidst boos, cheers, hisses and applause.

Robert Linder, arguing the affirmative, said women were created second and should stay

second. "When a woman doesn't stay home to care for her children and the house, it creates a cycle of frustration for her depressed husband," Linder argued.

Coed Gannet Horsman countered, "Wives should be companions and not cooks and baby machines. Conversation is necessary in marriage."

Her partner, Betty Hagerty, backed her up: "Why does a man leave home? Is it because his wife is too shallow?"

COMPROMISE

Miss Hagerty ended the negative case with a call for a "double standard"—wives both "on a pedestal" and independent.

Robert Rouch, Linder's partner, rebutted, "Women destroy the institution when they engage in outside activities. Whether jobs or club work, the children and husband are deprived." Rouch contended that if women weren't working, their jobs could be filled by the hard-core unemployed.

The compromise conclusion on the worth of women, by voice vote:

"Women should be pregnant when they want, barefoot when they desire and in the bedroom when they choose, rather than in the kitchen."

Let's Hear It For Our Hair

NEW YORK (AP) — It's only hair after all. Not a man's soul, not a woman's tears. Not a child's psyche. Not really. It's really only hair. Just plain ordinary hair.

A barber in Phoenix, Ariz., wipes his brow of the difficulties of the day and begins cutting a father's hair. On the floor lay the shorn locks of the man's son. The son has stalked away in anger. The barber says, "Yes, it's a pleasure to see someone lay the law down." But both of them look pained.

What is it about hair that awakens passions? A father born with a crew cut and a sense of responsibility breaks into a cold sweat when his teenage son lets his hair grow long. A daughter sobs when her mother insists she cut her hair because summer's coming on. A bunch of young people strip their bodies and ruffle their plumes and step onstage in a wild show called "Hair."

Scientifically, hair stems from a thickening of the middle layer of skin cells, in which a plug forms, and a follicle, blood vessels congregate, and hair grows.

Hair, the ultimate adornment, has always been every man's crown and every woman's glory. It also, by human desire and prejudice, worked its way into law, religion, culture.

Greek children in the early days wore long hair until they reached the age of 18, the status of an ephebe. Then they cut their hair short and curled it in small ringlets. The short tress were sacrificed to Apollo or another of their gods. The Spartans, who tried to be different

from the Greeks in many ways, wore short hair in youth, and let it grow long in adulthood.

The Romans wore long hair until about three centuries before Christ when the first barber was brought to Rome from Sicily. As it was, the Romans became hair conscious. The men wore their perfumed hair in piles of curls during Cicero's time, and the women did likewise, adding extra lengths of false hair. The hair they liked best next to their own was blonde hair taken from the conquered Germanic tribes to the north. It was this kind of exploitation that gave imperialism a bad name.

Since the Germanic tribes and the Celts and Franks felt that long hair was a sign of honor, and short hair a sign of submission, the Roman shearing had two effects. It kept Roman wives happy at home, braiding their new hair, and it reminded the conquered tribes who was boss. Ultimately, the peoples of northern Europe recovered the stolen hair and brought down the Roman Empire as a result.

Hair has always had a sexual meaning that has never been carefully examined, and perhaps for good reason. Japanese women used to remove their eyebrows and blacken their teeth to discourage male attentions. American women blacken their eyebrows and whiten their teeth, presumably with the opposite intent.

Hair is history. But it is difficult to find any pattern to it. About all that seems certain is that an abrupt change in hair usually means an abrupt change in something else — status, age or government.

Big Solar Flare Should Net Arctic Light Show

BOULDER, Colo. (AP) — A day's flare had a magnitude of 3 bright. A super flare, the largest, is considered a "3 bright," he said. The area covered by the flare was 2,230 millionths of the visible portion of the sun, or 20 times the surface of the earth. It is the third stage of the flare eruption which causes the Northern Lights, Buckman ex-

plained. The third stage is a magnetic storm composed of electrons which reaches the earth 24-48 hours after the flare and disrupts the magnetosphere—earth's surrounding magnetic field. This pelting of the magnetosphere by electrons causes ionization—or breaking up—of gases in the upper atmosphere which produces the Northern Lights effect. Buckman and other forecasters at the center believe the magnetic storm will reach the earth this afternoon. The best times for viewing the aurora borealis are between 8 p.m. and midnight.

Joe Vinson, program chairman for the day, showed a film which gave glimpses of the tremendous mechanization and automation that goes into food production and sale. freight cars rushing this to the nation's counters.

Press Pro Says HHH Paid \$200 For Lakeside Lots

NEW YORK (AP) — A press secretary, said Minneapolis dairyman Ray Ewald "sold six lots of unimproved pasture-land at Lake Waverly" to the vice president in 1955. The controversy arose after the Tribune published a story saying court house records in Wright County, Minn., showed Humphrey had "accepted six

"Mr. Ewald, a Republican, was and is a personal and family friend of the vice president's, who was then a senator.

"The vice president was not involved in any way at any time in any antitrust act involving Mr. Ewald."
