THE WEATHER in this part of the country never ceases to amaze even longtime residents, who by now should be more than accustomed to its fickle tendencies.

Even the 'natives' found it hard to believe this week that they were sweating out possible freeze damage to young fruit, field and garden crops, when less than a week earlier the temperature had hit the 90 degree mark in the area, and it seemed that summer was here for sure.

It hasn't been too many years since the famous "Easter Blizzard" stranded motorists all over the Panhandle, and caused some memorable events. But at least that came in April, a month we had just closed the books on this past Sunday.

Tuesday and Wednesday's snow flurries in the local area reminded some of stories about snow falling in this area as late as June. And some have said that a certain July 4th, many years ago, snow flurries were seen.

We can't vouch personally for these two claims, but we can recall a certain fifth Thursday ice cream social as a guest of the Friona Fire Department in the City Park on a July evening, when we were fearful of freezing to death before the ice cream could be disposed of.

So, just to be on the safe side, don't make rash promises to your tomato plants when you put them outside prior to May 1.

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AGRICULTURAL OBSERVERS are nothing short of ecstatic about the bountiful rain that brought the cool front to our area this week.

After missing several opportunities for rain during the month of April, it was beginning to look like one of those long, dry summers might be in store for the area. But to have such a nice rain come just as crops are planted and coming up is really a God-send, and its value cannot be fully determined in dollars and cents.

In addition, to get such a rain during the spring of the year without experiencing the violent weather, with its possible hail and tornadoes, is another bonus that can't be overlooked.

We've never seen the time that a two-inch rain was not welcome in this part of the world, and this should be doubly true for farmers and their ever-increasing cost of irrigating, and ever-declining water table. It was a good way to start the farming season.

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SATURDAY'S PRIMARY elections have generated a good deal of interest in some quarters, with a contested race for the U.S. Congressional seat in both primaries expected to boost the turnout across our area.

It will be interesting to see if there is a "backlash" against President Carter because of his opposition to the farm program and his pushing of the Panama Canal treaty. Some people are predicting more voters for the Republican primary for this reason.

The state GOP vote in 1976, with the Reagan-Ford battle as headliner, was around 100,000. A total of 323 persons voted in Parmer County's Republican primary that year, 164 of which were in Friona.

The story is told about one of the farm leaders who made a trip to Washington recently, to lobby for the farm legislation. A reporter asked him as he was leaving, "What did you learn about politics?" After a short pause, the farmer replied, "Well, it has taken me 40 years, but I've finally learned that I'm not a Democrat."

It will be interesting to see if this theory is actually put to action in Saturday's primaries.

Another angle which has drawn considerable interest during the latter stages is the proposition to enable the legislature to pass a law favoring pari-mutuel wagering in the state.

Those favoring legalized gambling have made a hard pitch as election day nears. It's almost as if they have tried to catch the opponents of gambling off guard. Opponents warn that it would cost the state much more than it would ever make in tax dollars to have legalized gambling.

If you have an opinion on the subject, then you'd better vote on Saturday. The proposition is on both primary ballots.

Star Gives Choices In Primary Races

After careful consideration of the candidates, the Friona Star endorses the following, who are running in primary races Saturday:

KENT HANCE for congress. (Democratic primary) This Dimmitt native has the edge in experience. He's the only candidate raised on a farm (still owns a farm), and is about as close as a "hometown congressman" as we could get.

Hance has shown his interest in the Friona area by frequent campaign visits.

JIM REESE for congress (Republican primary). Reese embodies the Ronald Reagan type conservatism most Republicans endorse. Reese vs. Hance would be a good race for the general election, and a tough choice for voters.

JOHN HILL for governor. We differ with Governor Briscoe's "No new taxes" approach. The reason we've avoided new state taxes is because he has caused local taxes to multiply. John Hill has proven his mettle as Attorney-General. He has proven to be a friend of the farmer and rancher.

Mainly, we are not convinced that Texas would benefit from a ten-year gubernatorial reign, regardless of who is governor.

AGAINST the pari-mutuel wagering proposition. In spite of what the advocates say to the contrary, studies have shown over and over the legalized gambling proves more costly to a state than it ever generates in revenue.

Congressional Race Keys Primary

The race for nomination for the U.S. Congressional seat will highlight the Democratic and Republican primaries on Saturday as far as Friona voters are concerned.

Kent Hance and Morris Sheats are the aspirants for the Democratic nomination, while Jim Reese, George Bush III and Joe Hickox have their names on the Republican ballot.

The candidates are making the first step to eventually name a successor to longtime Congressman George Mahon, who will retire at the end of the present term, after more than 40 years in the U.S. House of Representatives.

No local or county races are on the ballot for the Friona precinct, although contested races will help swell the voting turnout in the

Bovina-Rhea and Lazbuddie precincts.

A total of seven men are seeking the county commissioner's position for the Bovina and Rhea precinct, five in the Democratic primary and two on the Republican slate.

The eventual winner will replace longtime commissioner Charlie Jefferson, who passed away in January of this year while in office. Jefferson's son-in-law, William Gromowsky, has been appointed to serve through 1979, filling out the unexpired term.

Three candidates are seeking the commissioner's post in the Lazbuddie precinct. Two are opposing each other in Saturday's Democratic primary, Pete Jesko and Raymond McGehee. The incumbent, Jimmy

Briggs, is unopposed on the Republican ballot.

Democrats running for the Precinct 2 position (Bovina-Rhea) are Richard Carson, Glendon Sudderth, Archie McCutchan, Jack Patterson and C.E. Trimbble. Republicans seeking the nomination are Vernon Estes and Jim Dixon.

Both Hance and Sheats have brought their campaign to Friona, as have Reese and Bush in the Republican party.

Hance has been particularly interested in the Friona vote, appearing locally at least four times during the campaign, while all other candidates were in only once.

Speaking locally this week, Hance stressed the experience factor, saying he was the only candidate with legislative experience. Also, he

pointed out, he is the only candidate who was raised on a farm, and who still owns a farm.

Reese, whose wife is a native of Muleshoe (the former Jayne Damron), says he thinks it is a question of who can best represent the area. "One reason people need to vote in the Republican party is to keep from adding to Carter's 2-1

majority in congress. A number of our farmers recently went to Washington, with a concern for agriculture. They came back more concerned with the future of our country," Reese said here this week.

At the top of the Democratic ballot, Joe Christie and Bob Krueger are vying for the nomination for the

Band To Colorado For Fete

The Friona High School band left at 3 a.m. Friday for Colorado Springs and Canon City, Colorado, where the band will participate in a festival marching competition, as well as enjoy some sight-seeing trips.

General Rain Boosts Crops

A cold front which invaded the area brought the best rains in more than six months to the local area this week, with 1.75 inches measured officially in the city of Friona.

The rain began falling before daybreak Tuesday morning, and continued throughout most of the day. The official measurement for Tuesday was 1.59 inches.

Giving local residents a reminder that anything can happen (and usually does) where weather is concerned, before the day was over Tuesday, some sleet and snow flurries were received, as the temperature hovered in the mid-30s throughout the day.

Then on Wednesday morning, large snowflakes fell for about 20 minutes, before the moisture quit for

a while. That was the morning the northern Panhandle awoke to a ground covering of snow.

Before the week was out, the city had received a smattering of hail late Thursday afternoon, although it was not thought to have inflicted any appreciable damage. Also during the week, there was sun, wind, fog, drizzle—a little something for everyone.

The rainfall was the most general of any received in the area in quite some time. The Hub vicinity received over two inches of rain on Tuesday, with 2.5 inches reported at the Hub Grain Company. Two inches was the report at Lazbuddie and Oklahoma Lane.

The measurement for Tuesday was 1.6 inches at Bovina, and that was the approximate amount received in the Rhea Community, where the sudden weather change caused the loss of the majority of a large herd of sheep.

"This is just what the doctor ordered. It could not have come at a more opportune time for the farming standpoint. The low temperature should have not affected the crops, due to the moisture it brought," said a local farmer this week.

Chief concern of the low temperatures was the wheat crop, which sometimes can be affected by a late freeze.

But the benefits of the rain were thought to far outweigh the drawbacks.

The biggest majority of the corn has been planted in the area and most of it is up, so the moisture will be a big boost to the young corn.

Maize planting, which was still a week or so away for most farmers, will benefit, by having more moisture at planting time, as will other crops to be planted in May, such as cotton.

Sheep Perish In Freakish Weather

While most ranchers and farmers in the area were enjoying the moisture early this week, Carl Schlenker of the Rhea community experienced a tragic loss.

A total of 344 mother sheep, which had just been sheared during the previous weekend, died early Tuesday when the freezing wind and rain chilled the herd before they could be moved into a barn.

Schlenker, aided by friends and neighbors in the community, was able to save around 240 of his flock, along with more than 300 young lambs, but the majority of the grown sheep could not be saved.

He explained that as soon as he heard the weather forecast early Tuesday, calling for a rain storm, he began efforts to bring the sheep into the barn. The sheep had been sheared Saturday and Sunday, and were put out to pasture on Monday.

Schlenker said the sheep were within 200 yards of the barn when the rain began.

"About 150 of them went on through the gate, and were fine. But when the big drops of rain hit, the sheep panicked. They stopped in their tracks, or ran back. Most just stood and shivered, unable to move," he related.

When they discovered the sheep could not be driven, Schlenker and others, using pickups, picked up the lambs bodily, and loaded them into the pickups, and drove them to the barn. In this manner they were able to save virtually all of the lambs, but the mother sheep, weighing approximately 130 pounds each, were harder to handle.

They managed to save around 90 of the grown sheep, bringing them to the barn where Dr. Dale Schuelel, aided by Mrs. Schlenker and a number of the neighbor women, dried the sheep the best they could, covered them and set up heaters.

"We sure appreciate the friends and neighbors who came to help. Everyone who heard about it came to our rescue," said Schlenker. He said the whole gang of employees at the elevator at Rhea, on their coffee break when they heard about his plight, came down and pitched in. "Most of them didn't even have a coat," he said.

Ed Watkins, spokesman for Friona Bi-Products, said Thursday that his company had picked up some 250 head of cattle from feedlots in the area this week, a considerable increase from the average. The unusual late cold snap was held as the possible blame.

Schlenker said that many of the young lambs are old enough to eat. The smaller orphaned lambs will have to be bottle fed, if they will take the bottle.

The dead sheep have been sold to a by-products company, and will be used to make soap products, dog food, etc.

The value of the sheep lost was estimated at \$20,000.

"We had weathered the blizzard of 1956 without losing a single sheep. I thought I knew all about the sheep business, but I wasn't expecting so severe a weather change—at least not that quick," the longtime resident said.

Schlenker said he had no insurance to cover the type of loss that occurred Tuesday.

Poll Sites, Caucuses Are Given

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Polling places will open at 7 a.m. on Saturday, May 6 for the Democratic and Republican party primaries.

The Democratic primary will be held at Friona High School, while the Republican primary will be held at the Grade School, south entrance on Ninth Street.

Voters are asked to bring the voter registration cards they received recently in the mail. Their cards will need to be stamped when they vote.

Party precinct conventions will also be held on election day. Friona Democrats will meet at the polling place at 2 p.m. and the Republicans meet at 2 p.m. at their poll.

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

1. Bookies depend on organized crime for their banking and insurance system.

2. Illegal gambling depends on organized crime for a communication network.

3. The "collectors" of gambling debts are always the criminal element. Legalized gambling's main product is illegal gambling. Illegal gambling cannot exist without organized crime.

II. It inevitably corrupts government.

1. Government first attempts to regulate, then to promote, then to attempt to contain gambling once it is legal.

2. The state that legalizes gambling cannot do so without government corruption. Is there one state that has legalized gambling without bribes, payoffs and scandals? With vast sums of money some politician is always for sale. I can name two governors that offer this sad evidence.

III. It has a negative economic impact.

1. Gambling produces no new goods or services. The direction of the money shift does not promote social justice. Those who are poor get poorer.

2. As a tax measure it is regressive. The poorer people are, the higher the percentage of their income that is lost to gambling. If all the wildest promises from gamblers themselves came true, that would be less than 1/4 of 1 per cent of our state budget. That money would not be clear. The state would pay for regulation, law enforcement and welfare costs.

3. A dollar bet is a dollar not spent. Why should anyone in retail business want one more competitor? Texas' tourism is already healthy. Families do not vacation to go to the horse races.

4. Suppose that local option race track betting were legal in Texas. How many metropolitan areas in the state would vote for it and be big enough to support it? Where would the dollars come from to be bet at those tracks? That money would come from other communities in this state, out of the pockets of legitimate business.

Someone always loses with gambling. Vote no to gambling on May 6. If Texas doesn't say no, all of us are losers. Informed persons can see that legal gambling is bad social policy.

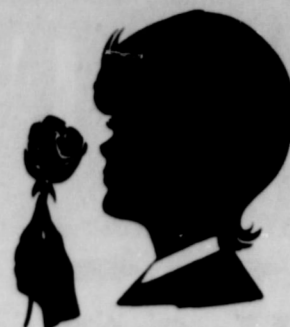

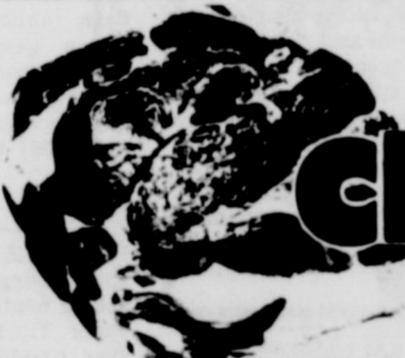

Friona Industries In Profit Report

Steadily increasing cattle prices and higher feedyard occupancy enabled Friona Industries, Inc. to achieve net income of \$594,000, or 47 cents per share, on revenues of \$15.7 million for the third quarter ended March 31, 1978.

This compared with net income of \$190,000, or 15 cents per share, on revenues of \$14.5 million in the same quarter of the prior fiscal year. All lines of the Company's agribusiness enterprises produced higher income than in the same period of last year.

Custom feeding accounted for the largest share of income as occupancy at the Company's three feedyards averaged almost 73 per cent for the quarter, 18 percentage points above the 1977 third quarter average of 55 per cent.

Even though fewer Company-owned cattle were sold—8,200 versus 11,100—pre-tax income was \$401,000, compared with a loss of \$64,000 in last year's third quarter.

"Fewer Company-owned cattle were ready for market than in the same three months of last year or in the first and second quarters of this fiscal year," said Ron Davenport, president. "However, this was more than offset by continued gains in grain-fed cattle prices and improved profit margins."
Income from commercial feed operations was the best for any

quarter of the year, and was slightly ahead of the prior year's third quarter. Increased feedyard occupancy in the Company's marketing area was primarily responsible for the income gain from manufactured feeds. This factor, plus an optimistic outlook for the cattle industry, also contributed to higher pre-tax income from the sale of animal health supplies, when compared to last year.

Grain and other sales, which includes transportation and steel fabrication, also produced positive pre-tax income.

During the first nine months, the Company had net income of \$1.5

million, or \$1.19 per share, on revenues of \$48.3 million, compared with a loss of \$119,000, or 10 cents per share, on revenues of \$43.5 million in the first three quarters of fiscal 1977.

"This nine-month net income exceeds that of any similar period in the Company's history and is greater than for any entire fiscal year except 1973," said Davenport.

"We would expect that the same beneficial environment—prices remaining at a level at which it is profitable to sell grain-fed cattle which, in turn, generates high feedyard occupancy—would continue in the fourth quarter of our fiscal year," he explained.

Tammy Smith, who captured the gold medal in the 880-yard dash at the state meet in 1978, is back this weekend to defend her title in that event.

Tammy scored wins at her district meet, and at regional, where she edged rival Debbie Bolk of Texline. Miss Bolk won the regional title a year ago, but Miss Smith came back to edge her at the state meet winning the event in the time of 2:22.2.

Tammy ran her event in 2:25 last week at the state qualifier's meet at Bovina. This was five seconds ahead of her pace of a year ago, as her best time prior to the state meet had been 2:30.

Charleson Steinbock won the regional title for the Longhorns in the pole vault. Steinbock cleared 13 feet at the regional meet. It will likewise be his second trip to the state meet. He tied for second place in the event at the 1977 meet.

Miss Smith and Steinbock are cousins.

The youthful Friona Chieftain track squad, with ten entries in the regional track meet, failed to qualify anyone for the state meet, although turning in their best marks for the season in virtually every event.

Senior Koty Kothmann came the closest to qualifying, with a throw of 146-2 in the discus.

The mile relay foursome (Chitto Caballero, Rod Owen, Robert Alexander and David Fleming) made it to the finals, and ran a 3:29, their best of the season, although failing to place.

The 440-yard relay team (Kenny Walter, Alexander, Owen and Eddie Brailiff), ran a 44.5, almost a full

second off their district meet time, but likewise failed to place.

Fleming turned in a 51.3 timing in the 440-yard dash, and Alexander a 52.2, both seasonal bests.

Todd Bandy set a new school record in the 330-yard intermediate hurdles, 41.1, although failing to score points. Leslie White, at 2:05 and Kevin Kothmann at 2:06.2, bettered their times in the 880-yard dash.

Eddie Brailiff ran a 10.3 in the 100-yard dash and Chitto Caballero a 16.2 in the 120-yard high hurdles to round out the Chieftains' participation in the regional meet, their

largest contingent in a number of years.

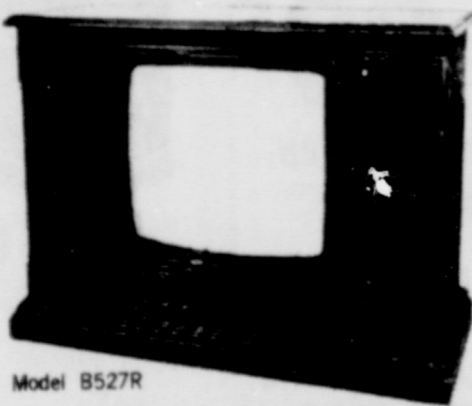
With all of these regional qualifiers back for next year except three, next year's track program at FHS could be one of the strong points in the school's sports program.

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Bovina Girls Eye Title At State Track Meet

The Bovina Fillies' track team makes their third straight appearance in Austin this week, in the class A UIL Girls' State Track and Field Championships.

Their fans and backers, many of whom have been on hand for both of the previous state finals, hope that, just like the old adage, the "third time will be charmed."

In the 1976 state meet, the Fillies were runnersup, being edged by Paducah for the team title, 53 points to 50. Then last spring, the team's hopes ran high, as they were back again, but so was Paducah.

The Dragonettes repeated as state champs with 48 points, as Bovina, bothered somewhat by a spike wound to Diane Gilbreath, had to settle for fourth place with 38 points.

This year, the team seems to be primed for "all the marbles." They are qualified for more events, with three relay teams and four field events as their state meet tickets. They have won eight consecutive meet titles, and 23 out of 25 relay races, facing some top-notch competition.

But once again, adversity threatens to ruin the scene for the Fillies, as it was found the past week that Sandi Sides, relay anchor girl and regional champ in the triple jump, has mononucleosis.

Just what effect the "mono" will have on Sandi's and the team's performance isn't certain. It is thought that she may have had the disease for the past three weeks, during which time she competed in district and regional events, and a limited schedule in the state

qualifiers' meet here last Saturday, showing little or no adverse effects in the two events she entered.

"We've faced adversity throughout the season, first with Diane's leg, and then with Sandi's sprained back. I feel that the girls want this (the state title) worse than anything in the world, and I think that they will come through when the chips are down," said Coach Joel Nelson this week.

Comparative marks that are known for other class A teams make it look good for the Bovina contingent, all other things being equal.

The Fillies' 880-yard relay time of 1:44.0 is the best of the eight teams entered in the state finals. Their 440-yard relay time of 49.1 is second best. Bovina stands third in the qualifying times for the mile relay at 4:05.2.

If the team could just place first, second and third in their three relay events, that would be 48 points—the number it took to win state a year ago. Besides, the team is counting on at least 20 points in the field events.

Pat Shepherd, Fillies' senior in her fourth trip to the state meet, will be entered in two events, and her strong right arm could produce from 12 to 20 points.

Pat's marks rank her high among those competing at the state meet.

"Pat is throwing better than ever. She is topping 130 feet in the discus in practice. We owe a lot of thanks to coach Monte Barnes for this, as Coach Barnes has worked with Pat in developing her form," Nelson says.

"In addition, she is determined to do better than she did last year, when she finished only fifth in the discus," he continues.

Miss Shepherd will be the first competitor for the Fillies in the meet, as the class A discus gets underway at 1 p.m. Friday.

High jumper Denise Read, who raised some eyebrows by beating Canyon's Merry Johnson, Borger's Barbara Hale and Nazareth's Cheryl Hartman in the state qualifier's meet, could give the team a boost in her event, where she should be on of the favorites.

And Miss Sides could contribute some points in the triple jump, where she was just hitting her peak when her bout with the mono came into being.

If the Fillies should reach their full potential in the field events, they could score near 30 points, and if this happens, Bovina will be odds-on favorites in the team race.

Spring Hill of Longview might be the team for the Fillies to watch. Runners-up in last year's state meet, the East Texas team has two relay squads (880 and mile) plus three individual events qualified.

Southlake Carroll, third a year ago with 42 points, will be represented by three relay teams, and no individual events.

Iraan, from Bovina's own Region I, will enter the 880-yard mile relays, plus the 440-yard dash and high jump. Their mile relay time appears to be the best among class A state meet teams.

(Coach Nelson pointed out that there was one region that he had no

information on, but it was a region which has not produced teams in the past which challenged for state honors.)

In the 440-yard relay event, North Texas regional champ Karnack, which also is the defending state champion in the event, has a qualifying time of 49.0, to Bovina's 49.1. None of the other six teams have broken 50.0 in the event.

In the 880-yard relays, Bovina's 1:44 is tops. None of the other teams have bettered 1:45.

Members of the 440 and 880-yard relay teams are Belinda Shelby, Denise Read, Diane Gilbreath and Sandi Sides. The mile relay team is composed of Laura Widner, Misses Read, Gilbreath and Sides.

Last year, the lane assignments in the relay races bothered the Fillies somewhat, as they received lane number eight in all three races.

Nelson said something of this nature shouldn't bother the Fillies this time. "We'd run in lane 10 if they had one. We just want to go down there and win. I'm not saying we're not nervous, because we are to some extent. But we're not scared," the Bovina coach said.

Nelson pointed out that with the exception of mile relay team member Laura Widner and alternate Fonda Griffin, the rest of the girls entered have state meet experience. As mentioned, it's Miss Shepherd's fourth meet, third each for Misses Sides and Gilbreath, and second for sophomores Denise Read and Belinda Shelby.

U.S. Senate, to oppose senior Senator John Tower in November. Their campaign has generated little interest in this part of the state.

In the governor's race, seven men are trying for Governor Dolph Briscoe's seat, as the governor goes for an unprecedented ten years in office.

On the Democratic ballot besides Briscoe are former Governor Preston Smith, present attorney-general John Hill, Donald R. Beagle and Ray Allen Mayo.

Of the five Democratic candidates, only former governor Smith brought his campaign to Friona, stressing that this region had more favorable legislation during his tenure in office.

Seeking the Republican nomination are Bill Clements, Ray Hutchison and Clarence Thompson.

Some spirited races have also developed for the state treasurer's job, to replace the former longtime treasurer Jesse James, who died in office. The Democratic opponents

include another aspirant for state treasurer with the same name of a famous person, Warren G. Harding, opposed by Harry Ledbetter and Charles Sanderson. On the Republican ballot is James Lacy.

Commissioner of Agriculture Reagan Brown, appointed by Governor Briscoe to replace John C. White after White received a Washington appointment, Brown's Democratic opponents are Joe Hubenak and Don Sewell.

Races are also found for the railroad commission and associate justice of the state supreme court.

Also gaining interest on the ballots are the proposition that the state legislature enact a law to permit pari-mutuel wagering on horse racing by local or county option.

Legalized gambling has been outlawed in Texas since 1934, but proponents have waged a fight this time, to attempt to gain passage of the proposition.

Opponents point out that legalized gambling would cost the state more than it would pay in the long run, due to all of the problems associated with gambling.

Local and county officials are also to be elected, although none are opposed. Friona precinct chairman up for election in the Democratic primary is Jay Beene. No names are on the ballot for precinct or county chairman for the Republicans.

County Democratic chairman Hollis Horton is unopposed for re-election.

val of the delinquent tax list, and a letter to Bill Clayton relative to responsibility of indigents' hospital and doctor bills.

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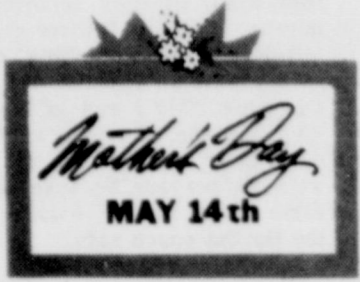
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Area Residents Get Probated Sentences

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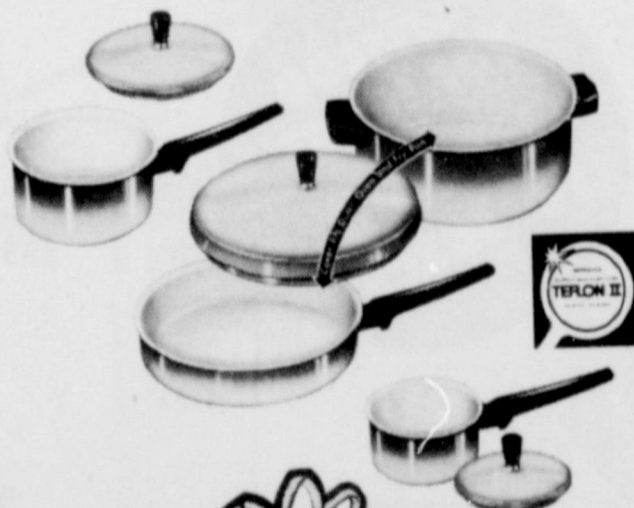

Experience Is Key, Hance Says

"Your 'home town' folks know you," advised Senator Hance. "So watch Lubbock on election night." The Senator feels he will definitely receive the majority of the Lubbock votes.

Lubbock is the main battleground for the 19th district U.S. Congressional race because it is "home town" to both Senator Hance and Morris Sheats, the other Democratic contender for the Congressional seat George Mahon vacated. Hance feels he will unequivocally carry Lubbock on May 6.

His confidence, he says, rests in the fact that the Lubbock voters know both he and Sheats well enough to know "which is more qualified for the government position."

Senator Hance has called Lubbock "home" since his college days at Texas Tech where his accomplishments were many and varied. He was, among other things, vice president of the student body and president of his social fraternity. He went on to the University of Texas School of Law where he was president of his class, and president of the Student Bar Association and where he received the coveted Council Award for Outstanding Students.

Hance has been a practicing attorney in Lubbock since 1968 and taught Business Law at Texas Tech five years. He resigned the teaching position to run for the Texas State Senate where he won a seat in 1974, becoming one of Texas' youngest senators.

Senator Hance's first term in the Senate saw him sponsoring or co-sponsoring 177 legislative measures and passing 93 of them. These measures ranged from tax relief, anti-bureaucratic laws and health care to legislation affecting water, education and agriculture. He has also served on committees concerning finances, state affairs, natural resources, and one of utmost concern in our area, water.

Before his election to the state senate, he served on the Board of

Regents of West Texas State University, the Texas Citizens Advisory Council, a study group for solving water problems of the state. He was one of the original incorporators of the Texas Boys' Ranch at Lubbock. He is a member of the following organizations:

Southwest Rotary Club, Lubbock Lions, Water, Inc., Texas Tech Country Club, and the Lubbock, Texas and American Bar Associations. He is also a member of First Baptist Church of Lubbock and has taught in the College Department there.

Hance, speaking at a rally here in Friona Tuesday, stated, "This is a chance for this area to have their own Congressman. I grew up on a farm (near Dimmitt) and now own one," he said, emphasizing he does understand and sympathize with the farmers' plight. "As a Senator, I have stayed in touch with the people in my district," he said, and indicated he will do the same as a United States Congressman.

Hance feels there is one vital issue in the Democratic primary—the issue is EXPERIENCE. "I am experienced—no one else in this race is," he states. He remarked about his opponent, Rev. Sheats, "He has done a good job as a clergyman, but running a church and running for Congress are very different things."

Hance states he is making no "rash promises" in this campaign; he is simply informing the voters that he is the best qualified man for the job because of his work in the Texas State Senate.

The Senator, and his lovely wife Carol, the former Carol Hays of Dimmitt, made eleven stops campaigning Tuesday as they traveled through the area. Hance, barely speaking above a whisper due to laryngitis, spoke briefly to

crowd of supporters here before leaving for their next stop in Dimmitt. He spoke confidently of winning and urged everyone to vote. "The more people that vote, the better of we are," were his parting words.

Gale Warren, area manager for the Hance campaign, told of his reasons for supporting the Senator. He stated, "He's experienced; that is most important; he is from this area and being a farm boy, is acquainted with the agriculture

problems here; and I am impressed with his record as a State Senator; he never missed a vote and not many of the other Senators can say that."

Hance has stated, "When people go to the polls Saturday, I hope they think very seriously about qualifications, experience and their hopes for the future of West Texas. By working together in friendship, determination and stability, with intelligence and logic as our guides, we can all do much for West Texas. I want to help...as your next U.S. Congressman."

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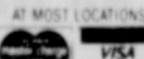
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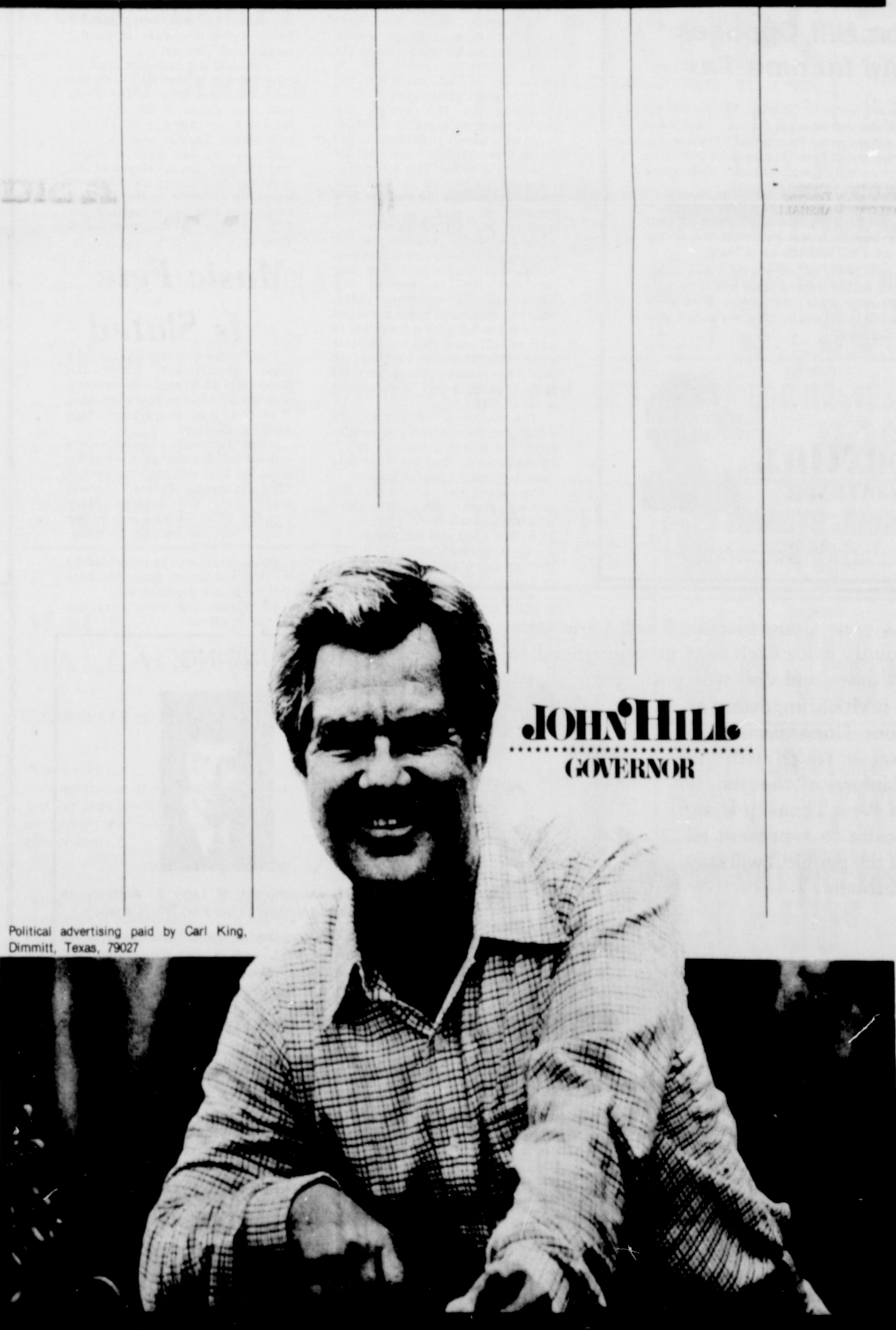

Survey Shows Market Growth

According to Sam Thomas, manager of agriculture development for Southwestern Public Service Company, 4,373,850 fat cattle were produced in the SPS service area for 1977. This production, revealed in a recent survey conducted by SPS, is the third highest in the history of the industry.

The survey which has been conducted since 1963 is quoted throughout the United States as the most authoritative source as to production of fat cattle in the southern great plains area.

"During the 1977 period, the feedlot capacity came to 2,734,740 head and is barely 10,000 head under the peak year of 1974 when 2,742,250 capacity was in use. This dropped to a low of 2.6 million in 1976 and present indications are that the 1978 year will see a new peak in feedlot capacity use," stated Thomas.

The survey also revealed that the 1978 feedyards doing custom feeding was one less than the preceding year but that this represented the consolidation of reporting yards. The total number of yards surveyed continued to fall with a reduction of six from last year. This too, reflects a consolidation but is the eleventh year it has occurred. There were 274 yards counted in 1967 as compared to 153 in 1978.

"The total impact of the feedyard industry on the business community reached 8 billion dollars in 1977," Thomas stated, "and the farm sale value exceeded 2 billion dollars.

The survey also showed that the packing plant annual slaughter capacity jumped from 4,990,680 to 5.4 million head and the number of plants increased from 17 to 20. Thomas also stated that 589,000 of

this capacity is not in use but that this industry has made another estimated 8 billion dollar contribution to area business.

"The future of the feedlot industry appears to be the brightest of any period in its history, and this may not be good. Too many people believe this and with great majority acting together adverse reactions can occur. The price being paid for feeder cattle is a case in point," emphasized Thomas.

Eventually the customer must be considered as to what he will do and we could have poor profits along with good prices if the customer refuses to go along with all this enthusiasm, Thomas said.

This survey has made a major contribution to the development and growth of the industry and has been especially valuable in the vertical integration that has occurred in the SPS service area, concluded Thomas.

All friends and loved ones are invited to attend.

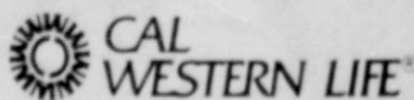

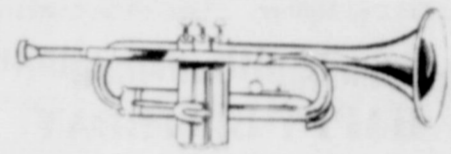
