Hearing Thursday On Water Problem

A Public meeting will be held Thursday, June 1 at 8 p.m. at the Community Center to discuss the lack of water pressure in the western portion of Friona, according to City Manager Jake Outland.

A straw vote will be taken of those at the meeting for a count for or against holding a vote on a \$400,000 bond issue, he said.

Residents of the Western and Lakeview Additions have circulated petitions and gone before the city council requesting a solution to the poor water pressure. Other citizens report water problems at homes only two blocks from the Sixth Street pump station. They tell stories of water shutting off for several seconds and showers slowing to a drip.

"We moved into our house in July, 1966 and have had problems ever since," said Mrs. Thelma Watkins. She said the water pressure has gradually gotten worse.

Mrs. Nelda Ellis, also of the Western addition, said they have had water problems since they moved into their house ten years ago.

"The water pressure just comes and goes," she said.

Outland says the pressure problems are caused by differentia-

tion in pressure along the line.

It's just not that serious, I don't think," he said. He said the problems are only temporary.

Mrs. John Blackburn, who lives only two blocks from the Sixth Street pump station, said they also have low water pressure. The problems started many years ago.

"When the bond issue for the fire station was up for a vote, we talked to the mayor and city manager about improvements," Mrs. Blackburn said. "They promised us that if we got people out to vote for the bond issue, improvements would be made in the water system."

The south side of 6th Street from Grand to Arrah Streets is supplied by a two and one-quarter inch water main, she said. This water pipe connects to an eight inch main at Grand and a six inch pipe at Arrah. Six blocks are affected by low water pressure on 6th.

Residents say the pressure doesn't only drop during peak hours, but can happen any time.

Mrs. Watkins said problems with her dishwasher is what caused her to finally try to seek a solution. She had five dishwashers in the 12 years she has lived in the Western Addition. None cleaned satisfactorily because of the water pressure, she says, which she only recently discovered as the main problem.

City officials say the only solution to the problem is construction of another above-ground storage tank. Outland says the tower would cost \$200,000 and the water mains the same amount.

Mrs. Watkins said Outland told Western Addition residents the bonds would be paid for by water revenues rather than by property taxes. Some addition residents don't want to say they have problems, she said, because they don't want to have to pay for improvements.

It is not fair, Mrs. Watkins says, that they pay the same amount for water and don't get good water pressure.

She believes there could be problems with the Sixth Street Pump. She said the city is not even talking in terms of solving the problem with ground level storage or bigger mains.

"Maybe we can do something for less, but we shouldn't do a temporary job," Mrs. Watkins said. She does believe all possible alternatives should be investigated.

A. L. Black, chairman of the Texas Water Development Board, said the lack of pressure seems to be a problem of equipment and development. He thinks restrictions on the line sizes more than anything else seems to be causing the problems, but could not be sure of that, or any possible solution, without more statistics.

Besides the inconvenience to residents, many have experienced sewer problems. Mrs. Ellis said they had sewer problems, but didn't know the cause.

Others seem to think the lack of pressure has caused the sluggish sewerage drainage.

Reese Hits Carter, Inflation, Welfare

Jim Reese, candidate for congress in the Republican runoff election on June 3, said here Tuesday he felt he could do a better job as a Republican in congress from this district than could a Democrat.

Reese pointed out to a nice crowd at Friona State Bank that he had carried 16 of the 17 counties of the 19th Congressional District in the first primary May 6. His opponent, George Bush, carried only one county, his home town of Midland.

"And if we don't win the primary, Bush will win just the one county again in November, because Kent Hance will take the rest, if Bush is the Republican candidate," Reese said.

Reese hit at the inflationary programs instigated by Democrats, who he pointed out have been the "majority party" for 42 of the past 46 years.

He attacked the entrenched bureaucracies, saying that if elected, he would fight for the "sunset" legislation, which calls for an end date for every existing federal agency. He would also call for zero-based budgeting, where every agency starts over each year, saying this concept worked in Odessa, where he served as mayor for six years.

Reese also spoke in favor of limiting terms of congressmen to eight years, senators to 12 years and one six-year term for the president.

"That would make a congressman more responsive to the needs of his people, and he would worry less about how he was going to get elected," he said.

The candidate attacked the recent give-away of the Panama Canal, saying that the president and the senate clearly were not acting within the wishes of the people on this issue.

On agriculture, Reese said we need to "expand the markets and negotiate the prices higher."

"I am not a specialist in the field of agriculture, but I'm more than willing to listen to your problems, and suggestions as to how to correct them," Reese said.

The candidate reminded his audience that two years ago he advocated a mobile type office, which would visit towns within the district on a regular basis.

"I would like to de-federalize the welfare program and let the state and local governments take care of the welfare problem," Reese said.

He decried the "God complex" which prevails in Washington, where elected officials tend to feel that they know more how to deal with local problems than do the local people.

He urged the people to vote on June 3, stressing that if they had not voted at all on May 6, they could still cast a ballot in the second primary.

Voting Slated For Second Primaries

Absentee voting ends on Tuesday for the Democratic and Republican runoff elections, which are scheduled for Saturday, June 3.

For the first time possibly in the history of Parmer County, there may be more voters in a Republican primary than the Democratic primary.

The Republican runoff pits Jim Reese, who overwhelmingly carried Parmer County on May 6, against George Bush, Jr. who led the voting in the first primary.

Reese admitted this week that his campaign during the first primary did a poor job of getting his supporters to the polls. He is expecting to get most of the same people who voted for him on May 6th

out to vote this time, along with a number who did not vote in either primary the first time around.

Those who did not vote at all on May 6 may vote in the second primary, and in either party's election.

Polling places for the second primary will be as follows: Republican: Friona, Grade School Library; Bovina, High School; Lazbuddie, School Cafeteria.

In the Democratic runoff, voters in the Black and Lakeview precincts will join those in the Friona precinct and vote at Friona High School. Oklahoma Lane Democrats will go to the Court House in Farwell for their runoff. Lazbuddie, Bovina and Rhea precincts will hold their election at the regular place.

Only in Bovina and Rhea will there be a local contest on the Democratic ballot. Jack Patterson and Glendon Sudderth are meeting for the nominee for county commissioner.

Murphy will read the roll call of deceased veterans. The Memorial Day prayer will be offered by Rev. Jim Boswell of Friona United Methodist Church.

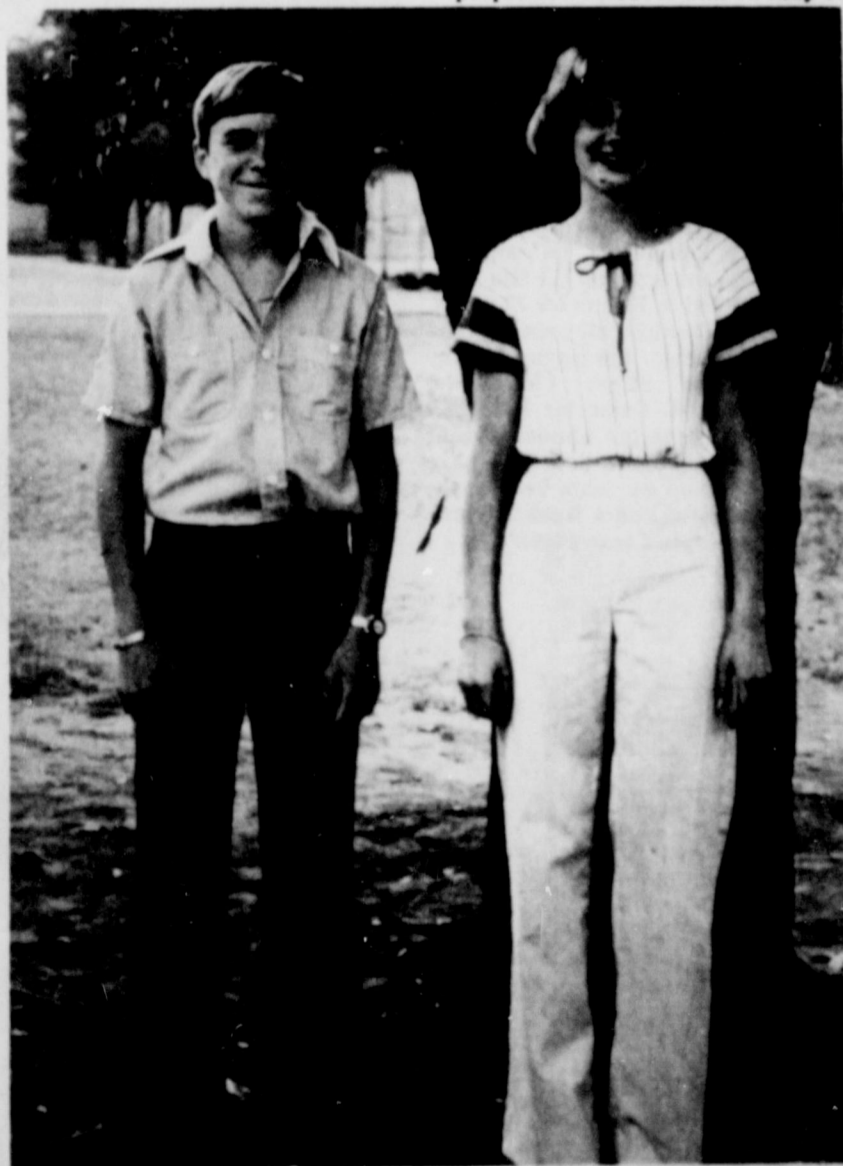
Taps, played by Floyd Reeve, will conclude the ceremonies.

Bond Sales

April sales of Series E and H United States Savings Bonds in Parmer County were reported today by County bond Chairman Charles E. Allen. Sales for the fourth-month period totaled \$32,146 for 32 per cent of the 1978 sales goal of \$100,000.

Texas sales during the month amounted to \$27,433,931, while sales for the first four months of 1978 totaled \$105,008,559 with 34 per cent of the yearly sales goal of 306.6 million achieved.

Dear Bill,

Since we have read of the water problems of the Western and Lakeside Additions, I would like to add our poor water service to the list.

There are 24 residences on the south side of West Sixth St. that are being serviced by a 2 1/2" water main connected near Grand Ave. to an 8" water main and at Arrah Ave. to a 6" water main. At peak hours, our water pressure slows to a drip, we have to shut off water outside to take a bath or wash dishes! We have been promised better service in other bond elections, but when the voting is over and the bonds passed, our street between Grand and Arrah on the south side is forgotten.

I believe that as fine a city as Friona is, should be able to solve the water problems for all residents. All of those interested in improving the situation should attend the open meeting June 1.

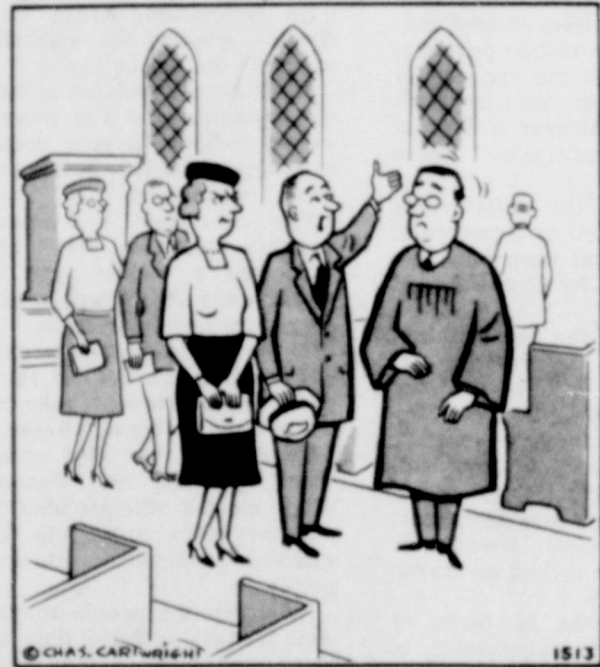

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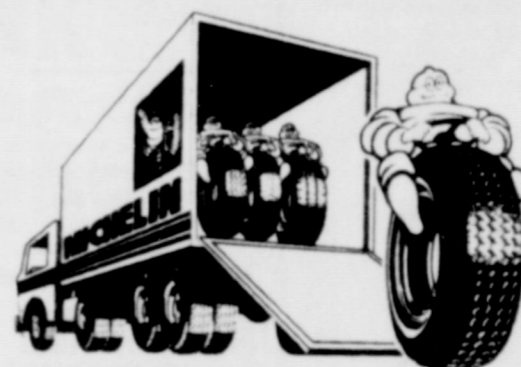

Exam Dates Set By Post Office

Postmaster Richard Wilson, Friona, Texas, has announced that the Clerk-Carrier examination will be opened to the public May 30, 1978 at 8 a.m. and will close to the public June 5, 1978 at 5 p.m., and urged that all those interested apply to take the job-related test that can lead to Postal Service employment.

"We have not opened our register in quite some time and an examination of it has led us to believe that it is out of date, and that many of the names on the register are people who have moved or for some reason are no longer available to take postal jobs," Postmaster Richard Wilson said.

"I do not want to give the impression we will be hiring great numbers of people in the coming months," the Postmaster said. We need qualified people who will be willing to accept employment, and we want to offer people in the local community the chance to compete for these openings by signing up for and taking the exams."

The Postmaster said the Postal Service established the policy two years ago of extending eligibility

indefinitely for those on the job register because little hiring was being done. "On October 8, 1978 those who have been on the job register for more than two years will lose their eligibility. They will have to re-apply to compete for a standing on the new register," he said.

Postmaster Wilson explained those wishing to take the exam could be contacting the Postmaster, in person, at the Post Office in Friona, during the period May 30, 1978, 8 a.m. through June 5, 1978, 5 p.m.

Starting salaries for Clerk-Carrier, Part-time Flexible, PS-5, is \$6.90 per hour with steps taking rate up to \$8.19 per hour over an eight year period. Twelve steps with maximum time between steps of 52 weeks, minimum of 26 weeks. Beginning salary for Full-Time Clerk-Carrier employees is \$13,916 per annum with steps to \$16,501 per annum over an eight year period. New hires are employed as part-time who are paid at these hourly rates. The hourly rates are just about equivalent to the annual salaries but do not include pay for nine holidays that full-time employees get.

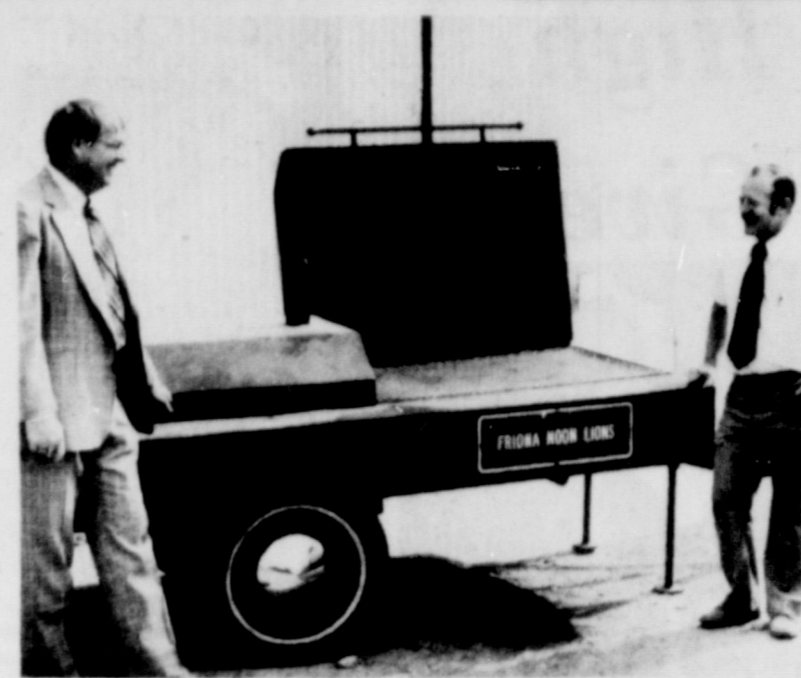

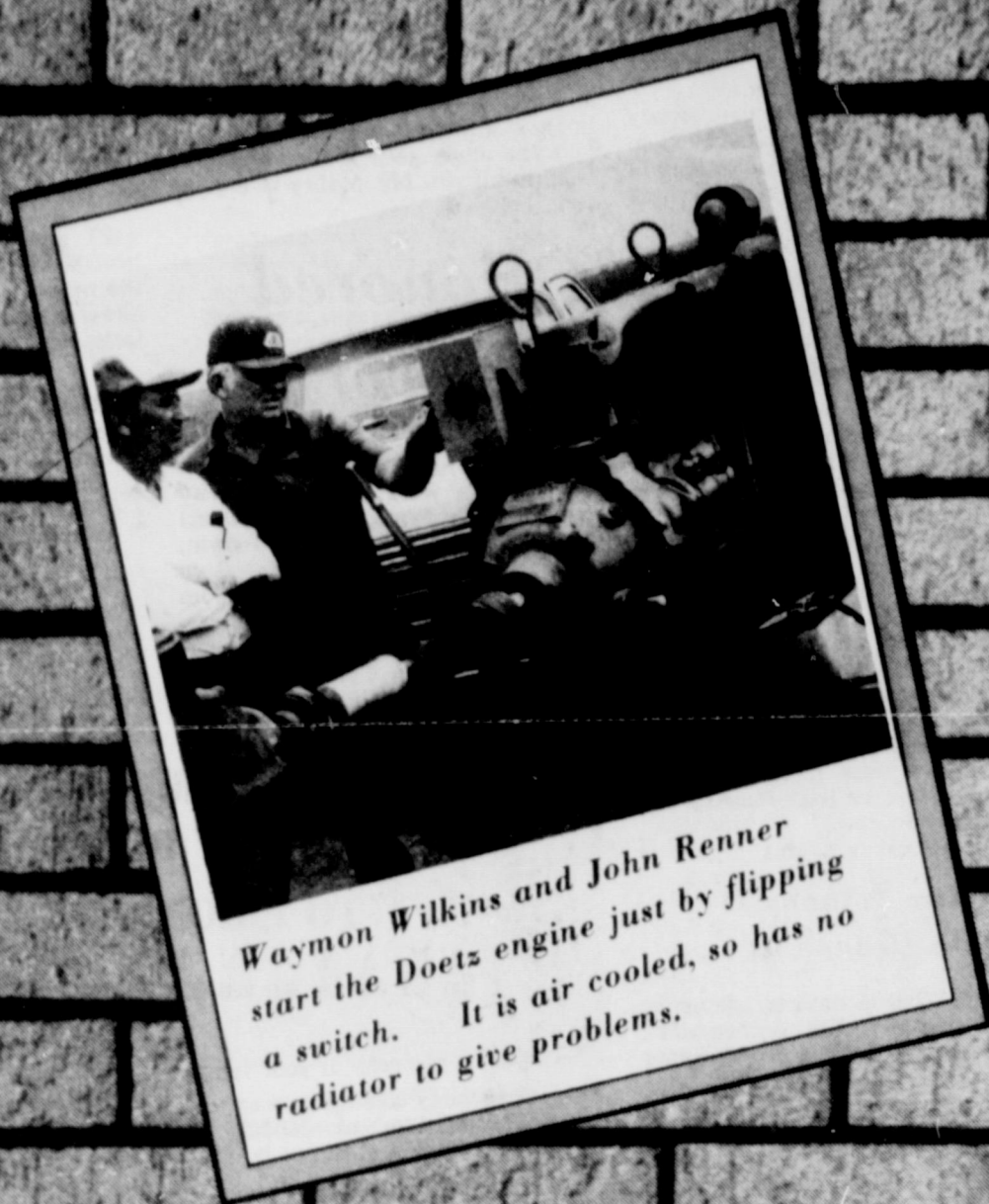

Fire extinguishers are classified in very visible letters A, BC, or ABC, which means it is capable of fighting the particular class of fire mentioned here. A fire extinguisher marked with an Underwriters Laboratories (UL) classification: A (only). Means it should be used only on combustible material. Water is highly recommended for Class A fires. BC (only). Means it is effective on both electrical and flammable liquid fires. It will not do the extinguishing of a Class A fire. Don't use water however to extinguish a BC type of fire. ABC (only). Means it is capable of extinguishing all of the three types of fire. (Numbers precede all letters and this indicates the size of the fire it can handle.
