WHATEVER HAPPENED TO "government of the people, by the people....etc., etc."?! We seem to be getting farther away from this concept every day.

Time after time the public has spoken their views on such issues as bussing our school children, giving away the Panama Canal, use of the metric system and Daylight Savings Time, just to mention a few. Time after time these unwanted ideas are shoved down our throats by our elected lawmakers.

Does the winning of an election automatically make a man smarter than the people who elected him? Someone in Washington has hypnotized our members of Congress into thinking they are "God" and must hold sway over the entire Universe.

The American people are getting sick and tired of their elected officials ignoring their wishes on issue after issue, and the "silent majority" is getting ready to rise up in revolt. The 13th amendment issue in California is a good indication of this. It would be very unwise for the members of congress to continue to vote as they please on very many more issues, without consulting the pulse of their people.

IT IS OBVIOUS that the people do not want the ERA passed upon them, yet the ERA supporters, in a state of panic, have high pressured congress into considering a seven year time extension for the states that have not yet ratified the amendment.

Americans have a very keen sense of fair play, and most do not look favorably on this request for the "right" to play offense 100 per cent of the time, while forcing the ERA opponents to play defense 100 per cent of the time. A time extension, without giving the states the right to rescind, would violate every principle of fairness. For this reason, many elected officials, both federal and state, who voted "yes" on ERA are saying "no" to the time

President Carter went before the Illinois legislature last month and asked the members there to vote for the ERA even though they might suffer a political backlash from their constituents. That is the same as admitting that the voters do want this amendment but asking the legislators to vote for it anyway because the President wants them

President Carter should be reminded that the Constitution gives him no power to take any part in the amendment process. A constitutional amendment goes straight from Congress to the State Legislatures. Presidents and governors cannot sign or veto an amendment, and they have no right to use their power or prestige to force passage.

SPEAKING OF PRESTIGE, we have seen our TV networks put on the "hard sell" in favor of the ERA these past few weeks. They've been sneaking in plugs on as many shows as possible, and getting their big glamour stars out in front of the camera to push for the amendment and for the time extension.

Of course, there's no question of giving equal time for the other side. It simply won't be done. We hope our Congressmen are intelligent enough to see that these glamour folks do not represent the grass-roots majority of Americans. After all, the TV stars are under contract to their various studios and are being told, in many cases, what they should say.

The little lighted box that sits in each of the living rooms across the country does weild a great deal of power over our thinking. We have seen TV make or break a politician depending on whether or not the

Highway Work Scheduled In City

Representatives from the Texas Highway Department met with council members Thursday to discuss plans for rebuilding sections of Highway 60 within the city limits of Friona.

George C. Wall, Jr., District 15 engineer for the department told the council of plans to tear out the median on the section of the highway running through town. He said the highway would be resurfaced and a continuous two-way left turn lane constructed.

Wall said the project would entail no cost for the city unless utility adjustments were required for water mains running under the

Water superintendent Clyde Fields said he anticipated no utility problems because the department did not plan to tear down past the base material. Fields said the utilities are in the sub-base

The department hopes to begin work in the fall of 1979, Wall said. No traffic would have to rerouted because construction would be limited to one section of one side at a

The present highway was constructed in 1956 and was designed to last 20 years with loads of 54,000 pounds, Wall said, so the road has actually lasted longer than projected. He said the road construction would be designed to carry loads of up to 80,000 pounds.

Wall said construction projects are the best rain makers. Work on the last project of this type was delayed because of rain. Several

council members asked if the department could reschedule the work for the summer.

Aldermen also discussed other problem areas along the construction site. Alderwoman Beth Thompson brought up the intersection of Highway 60 and the Rhea Highway. She said this was a very difficult curve for drivers of large trucks to negotiate.

Mayor B.K. Buske also told the department representative of problems drivers have of getting up the Etta Drive onto the highway, especially in the winter.

Other aldermen asked about plans for widening the highway to a four-lane divided road from Summerfield to Farwell. Wall said those plans were included in the second 10-year plans for the department which begins in 1987

Wall agreed that the work is needed

"It's a gap in the system," he said. Wall said there would probably be a reduction in back-end collisions with the continuous left-turn lane.



Since President Jimmy Carter's action to allow an additional 200 million pounds of beef into the U.S., the American farmers and ranchers have seen the commodity markets two years.

We contacted a typical local meat market to see what effect the President's action has had on the price of a pound of hamburger. Three weeks ago the price was \$1.15 per pound and today it is \$1.18 per

It apparently is having no effect at the meat counter but at the same time, is costing the American producers \$3 billion plus.

In the long run, it will cost may write their congressmen, we Americans, as a whole, more than are presenting their names and the American consumer will ever realize in savings at the meat

The imported beef is costing in lost revenue for the American producer and treasury. The importation of beef is taking jobs away from U.S. citizens and making them tax recipients instead of taxpayers. The U.S. Department of Agricul-

ture has falsely represented the facts. There is no way there can be a surplus of domestic beef. Supply has not kept up with demand for the last

The American Agriculture Movement is pushing for tariffs for foreign beef that would make imported beef the same price as domestic beef and cut the unfair advantage overseas producers hold. The movement is also working for

labeling of imported beef. With the lax bookkeeping methods of the USDA, there is no way the American people can know how much imported beef is coming into the country and how much over the quota this amount is.

There is now approximately 500 million pounds of beef that has been consumed in the U.S. but was not produced in the U.S. and cannot be accounted for.

In the past three weeks, 81,000 less head of cattle per week have been killed in feed lots. This is just since the President's announcement.

In the Senate now, Senator Bentsen has introduced a bill to change the import laws. The bill permits imports to increase when domestic production decreases and would cause imports to decrease at a time of domestic over-production. The current import formula has just the reverse effect.

STRIKE NEWS: Area farmers and cattle producers are headed for Fort Worth to try to meet with President Carter over the beef importation problem. They will on horseback demand a meeting with the President.

All interested persons are encouraged to meet in parking lot No. 4 of the Tarrant County Convention Center at 10 a.m. Friday. Carter will be in Fort Worth to speak at a fund raising luncheon for Rep. Jim Wright.

By the way, Wright's opponent is the only candidate so far endorsed by the American Agriculture Movement.

Don has 11 stitches in his arm and face from a bird dog bite. (Roaming Dogs). He got bitten trying to put the dog out of our back yard. This dog jumped a 5 foot fence to get in.

The initial hospital Dr. bill will be over \$50 plus 2 return visits to remove stitches, antibiotics and tetanus shot.

The police are no help in controlling dogs that go where they please and the owners don't care.

The policeman suggested "that we lure the dog into the back yard and kill it there by shooting it." That would take care of that dog but what about all the others. In the first place I don't want that dog or any other in my back yard for any reason.

The policeman said that "they didn't have anything to do with dog control, that it was Mr. Outland's and Howard Love's responsibility."

We had problems with dogs last summer and did kill a dog. We had the police here 3 times to see damage done by the dogs. He said "If you had 2 dogs, you should have had more than a single shot rifle, you needed at least 2 bullets.'

There is a law against shooting firearms within the city limits (also firecrackers), also an ordinance against dogs running loose. There would be no need for firearms if the dog leash law was enforced. The questions seem to be--by whom? When?

Perhaps the city policemen aren't underpaid after all--or perhaps we need a new city manager (if the dog law is his to enforce).

I've chased dogs out of my front yard every day since I moved back to Friona. The dogs have broken shrubbery, dug in the worm pits, dug up bulbs, broken off flower buds and flowers running through the beds.

I dispise mowing over their huge manure piles. Did you know one can get a type of worm from dog manure dust (thrown up by lawn mowers) that affects the heart?

I sympathize with Madge Crow. I'm glad we were home when the dog came over the fence into our back yard. I'm grateful my small 3 year old granddaughter was not

It's past time that the citizens of Friona insist the dog law be enforced.

Please contact the County Extension Office (481-3619) sometime before June 29 to let us know how many steers you plan to tag, Ralston said.

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

Randy Ellis Is Cast Member

No matter that he had a degree in advertising from Texas Tech. No matter that he had been farm director for a Clovis, N.M. radio station.

When Randy Ellis read an article in "Pickin" Magazine and later saw the show "Texas--Cradle of Giants," his career took a turnaround. The article informed him about the program in country-bluegrass music offered by South Plains College of Levelland, one of the few of its kind in the world.

And the "Giants" show, a production of SPC and the first road show in its 20-year history, gave him a chance to see the results of SPC's country music program in action.

"I saw the show last summer in Bovina the second time it played there (the first time was rained out)," said Ellis, a 1968 graduate of Friona High School who earned a bachelor's degree in advertising from Tech in 1973.

He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene Ellis of Friona. "I won a hat during intermission, and I really liked the show," he said. The history of country music in Texas from the early 1900's to the current progressive country sounds is condensed into a two hour show of songs, historical narrative and skits. Cast members are faculty and students at SPC, carefully selected from the College's country-bluegrass and related departments.

Ellis contacted John Hartin, director of the country music program, auditioned and won a partial guitar scholarship to the program.

A guitar for a birthday present instead of the asked-for go cart started Ellis on a musical career as a sixth grader. He learned on his own for the most part, except for a couple of private lessons as a Friona High School sophomore.

He played lead guitar for rock and roll bands during high school and performed with fraternity rock and roll and blues bands while at Tech.

In the early 70's, his interest in music shifted to folk as a single performer and later to bluegrass as a result of his friendship with Jan Lammers, now a Houston architect who performed with John Denver at Tech. "Jan was a studio musician, too, and he had played with some pretty good people, like Denver," said Ellis. "My interest in bluegrass sprang directly from that."

interest in bluegrass sprang directly from that."
Following graduation from Tech, Ellis returned to his father's farm at Friona and played several engagements with a country band at the Friona Country Club.

By the middle 1970's, Ellis had gotten a job in radio and television work as a farm director for a Clovis radio station and he was playing with "Grass Valley," a bluegrass group featured at the Western Skies in Clovis, the Portales Hotel and at Saturday night dances at Elida, N.M.

Then came the article in "Pickin" Magazine and a year later the "Giants" show at Bovina, and Ellis was hooked.

As bass guitarist and vocalist for the show, he is featured in a dozen numbers, including "California Blues," "Waitin for a Train," "Stay All Night," "Pistol Packin Mamma," "Don't Let the Stars Get In Your Eyes," "White Lightning," "If You've Got the Money, Honey" and "Blue Eyes Cryin in the Rain."

So far a dozen performances remain on the "Giants" schedule for its second season. Among their stops, Ellis and the "9" other cast members will be performing June 27 at Littlefield and July 1 at Bovina before the final show July 4 on the SPC campus.

The cast will host receptions for current and ex-SPC students about an hour before showtime at each stop.

THE ERA HAS BEEN considered in all 50 states. A number of these states have decided "no" to the amendment, some as many as five and six times. To regard a "no" vote by these states as not permissible is to make a mockery of the entire amending process and would surely promote even more voter disillusionment with our Congress.

We don't know of anyone who would not agree that we should have equal job opportunities and equal pay for both men and women. These things can be done without putting another amendment into the hands of our power-mad legislators and the Supreme Court.

The people who oppose this amendment are merely trying to look ahead and forestall such absurdities as women in front-line combat during wartimes, and the sharing of public toilets by both men and women, not to mention all the side issues concerning abortion, gay rights and education of our children. The pro-ERA people, when confronted with these possibilities, usually shrug them off and say, "Oh, those things would never happen." Perhaps they are not aware that the last little phrase of the amendment gives the Congress and the Supreme Court "Carte Blanche" to tack on any kind of absurd laws they can dream up over the future years.

The phrase reads like this ... "Congress shall have the power to enforce, by appropriate legislation, the provisions of this article." So, you see, it is not the amendment itself that is so threatening, but the legislation that will surely follow immediately on the heels of its amending.

If the gay-rights people and the prostitution groups hadn't all come crawling out of the woodwork to lobby for this amendment, we might possibly not have become aware of its implications until it was almost too late to do anything about it.

If we don't try to protect our little daughters and granddaughters from these groups now, they may not be able to protect themselves in the

Sales Tax Payment Received By City

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Thursday that city sales tax allocations for the first half of 1978 are running a healthy 17.5 per cent ahead of last year.

Bullock announced that his office has sent checks totaling \$60.9 million to 900 Texas cities as their June share of the local option one per cent

The latest checks raise the cities' share to date this year to \$196.5 million, compared to \$167.2 million for the first half of last year. That's a 17.5 per cent increase.

Of the state's larger cities, Houston continued to chalk up the biggest percentage increase in city

The city received a check for \$12,356,904, bringing its total for the year to \$40.8 million, a 20 per cent increase over the same period last

City sales tax allocations for the year are up 11 per cent in Dallas, 15 per cent in Fort Worth, 10 per cent in San Antonio and 17 per cent in

The tax is collected by local merchants along with the state sales tax and is rebated to the cities monthly by the Comptroller's Office.

Friona received \$10,271.68 in the current allocation. This is a 9 per cent increase over the same period a year ago. The total received for 1978

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

Central Plains Comprehensive Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center proudly announces the opening of two new facilities to serve clients living in Parmer, Castro, Swisher, Briscoe, Bailey, Lamb, Hale, Floyd and Motley Counties.

These homes and the programs with which they will interface are designed to prepare each client resident for independent community living over a period of several weeks to months. Many of the residents will be returning from state hospitals, where practically all individual needs are taken care of by the institution. Other residents will be persons who would probably need to go to state hospitals if these facilities were not available closer to their

We will be attempting to teach the residents such basic "daily living" skills as how to plan and prepare simple meals, how to do laundry, how to open and maintain a bank account, how to complete applications and interview for jobs, how to get along better with other people, ways to use leisure time, and many other specifics that add up to

increasing each client's personal responsibility and independence.

One facility will house up to twelve (12) adult residents, the other will house up to twelve (12) adolescent residents. Each house will have a full time live-in manager and a relief manager for weekends. Other service units of the MH-MR Center will be involved with residents as planned on an individual basis to provide such other services as individual or group therapy, medication, job placement assistance, music therapy, occupational therapy, and recreational therapy.

This is the first program of its type for this area and required over three years to plan and complete. Funding for the majority of the construction was provided by a federal mental health grant.

The public is invited to attend Open House ceremonies to be held from 2:30 to 4:30 p.m. Sunday, June 25 at the 405 Ennis Street Home in Plainview. The other home is located at 404 Floydada Street. Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, Bill Clayton, will cut the ribbon. State Representative Pete Laney will also be present. The program will begin promptly at 2:30 to be followed by tours and snacks.

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

Newly-elected presidents of Alpha State's (Texas') 256 local chapters participated in a Leadership Development Workshop held on the campus of Hardin-Simmons University at the beginning of the convention. State president Mrs. Laginia Hale of Austin and vice presidents, Mrs. Bettye Mischen of Plano and Mrs. Mary Rowlette of Lubbock directed the workshop. Planning for the twelve area fall workshops took place the second day of the convention with incoming presidents and area coordinators

Miss Phyllis Ellis was honored for her service of over a quarter of a century as state executive secretary. The State Achievement Award was presented this year to Carolyn Larrison, Jo Clark, Ruth Tabert, Mary Rowlette, and Dorothy Stallings.

As a climax to the convention, the 251 outgoing presidents received special recognition during the final banquet in their honor. The Founders and Presidents Banquet annually highlights the lives of the dozen women educators who pooled their dreams during a time when women were treated as second-class citizens. Dr. Annie Webb Blanton, who initiated the idea of such a group, later became the first woman in Texas to hold an elective state office, State Superintendent of Public Instruction.

The Society organized by a group of twelve women educators on May 11, 1929 in Austin has grown to nearly 150,000 women educators in the United States and nine additional countries. The international convention will take place in Chicago in late July with over three thousand members expected to participate.
