MIAMI (AP) - Dr. Ralph David Abernathy says poor people will march on Washington again next month but there will not be another Resurrection City.

Abernathy, who succeeded Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. as head of the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, said the march will begin in Memphis, Tenn., on April 4 - the first anniversary of King's assassination in Memphis - and will

spread across the nation. Abernathy said he will lead the march, which he called the second chapter of the Poor People's campaign. He said the campaign will include a "Black Easter" celebration, but did not elaborate.

"The campaign will take me back to the state of Alabama," Abernathy said. "It will take me to the major cities of this country. And it will carry me once again to our nation's capital in Washington, D.C.

"I do not anticipate the building of a Resurrection City as such, but we do intend to use our First Amendment rights of orderly and peacefully petitioning the President as well as the Congress for a redress of our grievances."

Russian Sailors Lost In Collision

PORTSMOUTH, Va. (AP) -A Panamian tanker and a Soviet fishing trawler collided in pre-dawn darkness off the North Carolina coast today, the Coast Guard said, and the Russian vessel was reported to have

sunk with all hands lost.

Fifteen crewmen were b jeved to have been aboard.

Lt. (j.g.) Howerd E. Copeland 5th Coast Guard District information officer, said the collision occurred about 4 a.m. and was reported by the chief of a Sovirt fishing fleet that has been sight-ed off the East Coast for the past month.

A Coast Guard airplane, heli-copter and a 44-foot surfboat were sent to the scene, some 31 miles off Oregion Inlet and re-ported finding an oll slick, de-bris and an empty life raft. The Coast Guard identified the

tanker as the Esso Honduras, registered out of Panama. The 693-foot vessel was reported to

Copeland said the tanker re-mained at the scene of the col-lision about five hours after the accident and aided Coast Guard search and rescue efforts.

He said no survivors and no bodies were found and that the 100 to 150-foot fishing vessel ap-partly sank immediately after

the impact. The Soviet fishing fleet flag-ship reported the collision to the Coast Guard and indicated all hands were lost aboard the trawler. The Soviets did not request assistance.

Everything But Bed

SAIGON (AP) - A Viet Cong guerrilla girl is expected to share everything with her male counterpart except a bed.

If she does yield to temptation, and is caught, the penalty is harsh for both of them-anything from three to 10 years confinement in the bamboo cages that serve as jail cells in remote base areas.

This severe attitude to romance is being emphasized by the Viet Cong as more and more women and girls are brought into army ranks.

According to one captured top-level document, 4,000 female cadre are working with the Viet Cong. Many had "strikingly and fearlessly replaced the male sex in combat," the document add-

But one headquarters document complained: "The weakest points of women are that they are credulous and cannot resist love.

Another said, "In many cases indoctrination of women of the revolutionary concept towards sex relations was not carefully considered. Guidance of the relationship between male and female was not good. This gave way to several cases of illicit love.

The Communist party hierarchy that runs the Viet Cong is motivated less by puritanism than by discipline.

"When you join the party you in effect marry it, and she is a very jealous mistress," an American analyst of the Viet Cong commented.

The Communists have been preaching the "three postponements" to unmarried cadre. The first is to postpone falling in love. Those who cannot resist are asked to postpone getting married. If they go ahead and marry, anyway, they are asked to postpone having babies.





The Slow-Down Process

Any expectation that the Nixon administration and the 91st Congress can bring an early end to inflation without risky unemployment should now be put aside. The best prospect is that the rate of inflation can be gradually slowed to an acceptable level.

The forces generating inflation, particularly the Vietnam war, are so formidable that the conventional counter forces — budget holddowns, higher taxation, credit restrictions can at best decrease the rate of aggregate price increases. Govern-ment and private economists do see hope for that.

When the Nixon administration took over, the price-increase rate was running an explosive 5 per cent on a yearly basis. The general prediction (or hope) now is that the annual in-flation rate can be brought down to 3 per cent by the end of 1969 and to 2 per cent in 1970. Of course several factors, notably the course of the Vietnam war and world affairs generally, could upset that projection. That the Nixon administration is unlikely to risk recession - or an

unacceptable rate of unemployment — was indicated when Chairman Paul McCracken of the Council of

Economic Advisers recently warned against the "unwanted sledgehammer approach" in combating inflation. That suggests the gradual approach, waiting to see what the full effect of the anti-inflationary actions already taken will be.

The present economic situation is doubly unprecedented. This is the first time the United States has fought a major war while trying to maintain expanding domestic programs without wartime economic controls. Also we are still in the longest economic upsurge in U.S. history.

The average of the durations of all the economic uptrends from 1854 to 1961 was 30 months. That includes the previous record of 80 months related to World War II. The current upswing, which began in 1961, has run for more than eight years, or about 97 months.

Policy decisions are always the most treacherous when they must be made under unprecedented conditions. There is good reason for President Nixon to move cautiously on domestic economic policy. Ruinous inflation must be prevented, but a painful recession inflaming urban unrest must be avoided. Walking that tightrope can only be a breath-taking performance.

What's It Going For?

The United States spends approxinately \$300 million a year on hemical and biological warfare (CBW), but nearly all work in this area is classified as top secret. The public never knows if the \$300 million

is wasted or well spent. There is at least a hint that the Russians have either devoted more Russians have either devoted more work and effort and more top scientific personnel to CBW than we have. The revelation came from Rep. Richard D. McCarthy of New York and Rep. Robert Sikes of Florida, following a briefing given selected House and Senate members. by Brig. Gen. James A. Sikes added that the United States has no defense against their use, and that in the event of an attack with such agents the United States could be wiped out in a matter of hours and the world in a period of weeks.

Next came the drinking fountain, and then they guided me to the carts. Although they all looked alike to me, they had their own ideas. Each had decided on a separate cart, and each had a touching petition of the virtues of the selection. (The 2-year-old manages to mount quite an argument with a variety of grunts, squeaks, shouts, moans, and if all else fails, wails. The 5-year-old has an accomplished

rhetoric, carefully designed to melt the firm resolve of any father.) ONCE THAT problem was solved.

through my masterly surrender, we began the trek. Again and again, we approached some goodie that both assured me "Mother always buys some of these." Of course it was not on the list, but who was I to argue? As a result, the cart began to fill with cookies, soft drinks, apples, bananas, ice cream, until there was little room left for the lye soap, sack of flour, or oatmeal.

Incidentally, have you ever noticed how other shoppers give you the cold glare of "how could you mistreat that child" as you stand helplessly by as the child gives loud remonstrance while pointing to some totally useless tidbit on a high shelf?

AFTER FLOATING a small loan with the cashier, a corps of young men loaded the swag for us. Then we returned home to face the music. As the Lady of the House checked each sack, she kept asking "why did you get this?" and "they won't eat this, they just think it looks good" and "I didn't have this on the list." In every instance, I sought some support from my fellow shoppers. Alas, they had fled to the nether regions of the house, and left me to provide the answers. I have noted since then, however that they are usually in the front line when it comes time to share the spoils.

THE ONLY solution to the problem at our house is for Mother to lay in a larger stock of groceries before being out of it for a few days. As putty in their hands, shopping with the younger set is just "not my thing."

David Lawrence News 'Scoops' And Public Policy

WASHINGTON - Time was when the American press imposed upon itself what was called a "voluntary censorship." During the two world wars the news media felt a respon-sibility not to disclose future troop movements or planned strategy, as this might be utilized to our disadvantage by the enemy

Today the United States is again in the midst of war and more than 535,000 troops in the armed services are actually engaged in fighting a ruthless enemy. Is it proper for any of the newspapers or other media to reveal the details of a decisionmaking process on military matters by a President of the United States within the last 12 months?

THERE HAVE just been published some lengthy articles purporting to give the inside story of how decisions were reached to halt the bombing of North Vietnam. Also the inside pressures for a different policy and the attitudes of the advisers of President Johnson were described in detail. All this must have been read avidly in Hanoi, Moscow and Peking.

Former President Johnson has properly authorized the issuance of statement on his behalf in Washington deploring the publication of what he terms inaccurate stories. Mr. Johnson's view is as follows:

"THERE HAS BEEN a good deal of speculation and public discussion about the considerations that led President Johnson to announce a limited bombing halt on March 31, 1968. These accounts do not conform to President Johnson's records.

"This is not the time for a full analysis of that decision. But it is time to point out that there are major inaccuracies in the various reports lest those inaccuracies become history before the full record is published and lest the American people and our friends and others labroad be misled."

MOST NEWSPAPERS during war periods have leaned toward suppression even when in doubt, and the principle of a "voluntary censorship" has been scrupulously followed. It, of course, would be "news" to divulge

what is going on behind the scenes in the office of the commander-inchief during a war, but, as between the country's interests and the opportunity for a "news scoop," the press has in the past patriotically remained faithful to "voluntary censorship.'

It is, therefore, unfortunate that no concerted effort has been made to organize a "voluntary censorship" procedure, in cooperation with a designated information officer in the government, to deal with the news of the Vietnam War.

JUST NOW the big question is whether the North Vietnamese will continue their offensive and whether President Nixon will authorize the resumption of bombing. The talks at Paris have thus far produced no results, and the debate goes on as to whether there was or was not a previous "understanding" that the North Vietnamese would reduce the intensity of their warfare and try to reach an agreement.

Will President Nixon now find it necessary to follow the historic advice of military men who say the only way to defeat an enemy is to bomb its supply lines, blockade its ports,, and inflict heavy damage on its territory?

THE IMPRESSION conveyed abroad is that public opinion in the United States wants the Nixon administration to guit the war by any means it can find. This is the same thing as accepting "peace at any price." It not only would render futile the sacrifices already made by American and allied forces but would pave the way in the not-far-distant future for another outbreak of war in Southeast Asia which could prove more serious than the present conflict.

President Nixon now is in the process of making a decision, but it may not be immediately disclosed. For it is, of course, better to develop military movements secretly, and gradually put them into full-scale operation without telling an enemy about the plan in advance.
