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## Pueblo Crew Punishment Is Ruled Out

## \$208 MILLION House Settles On Tax Bill



Hijacked Victim's Stare

WASHINGTON (AP) — Navy Secretary John H. Chafee said today the court of inquiry into the Pueblo incident recommended general court martial for the ship's captain, Cmdr. Lloyd Bucher, and one of his chief assistants but "I have decided that no disciplinary action will be taken against any of the personnel involved."

Chafee's disclosure came in a six- and a half-page report on the exhaustive court of inquiry probe into the ship's takeover by North Korea on Jan. 23, 1968.

**SUFFERED ENOUGH**

In overruling the court's recommendation for court martial of Bucher and Lt. Stephen R. Harris, Chafee said: "They have suffered enough and further punishment would not be justified."

Harris was the officer in charge of the research detachment aboard the Pueblo, which was conducting an electronic eavesdropping mission off North Korea when she was seized.

Chafee reported these recommendations had been made by the court of inquiry.

AUSTIN (AP) — House tax writers have settled on a combination of cigarette, sales and corporation taxes totaling about \$208 million for use if a tax bill is needed this year, legislative sources said today.

"If that's the way they want to do it, that's all right with me," said Gov. Preston Smith about a proposed five per cent "surcharge" on corporation's federal income taxes.

Smith said Speaker Gus Mutscher showed him the tax proposals last week.

Mutscher confirmed that the corporate tax, which he calls a "corporation gains tax" is "one of the items under serious consideration," but other sources said a tax bill has already been prepared containing the \$90 million item.

House Tax Committee Chairman Ben Atwell of Dallas said other elements in the Mutscher tax package are a four cents per pack cigarette tax increase and inclusion of such services as repairs, laundry and dry cleaning under the three per cent state sales tax. The cigarette tax increase would bring in \$70 million over the next two years, the services tax about \$48 million, Atwell estimated.

Mutscher and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes held another meeting today with Gov. Smith, whom they are trying to convince of the wisdom of a one-year appropriations bill that would postpone new taxes until 1970.

Barnes said there is "just one factor" involved in the one-year budget issue: "That is whether we are going to have a tax bill in 1969."

The speaker said if he decides to go along with Smith's wishes for the traditional two-year budget, a tax bill probably would be reported out of Atwell's committee Thursday. The House would stay in session Friday — and Saturday, if need be — to work on it, he added.

"If we lay out a tax bill, it won't be a small one. It would cover our appropriations bill, the teacher pay raise and the difference between the House and Senate bills. And that's a \$100 million difference," Mutscher said.

## Solons Won't Impeach Abe For Fee Deal

## Sky Pirates Stay Behind In Havana

WASHINGTON (AP) — Congress appears unlikely to take any action against Justice Abe Fortas—and certainly won't impeach him—for receiving a fee from the family of financier Louis E. Wolfson after becoming a member of the Supreme Court.

A flurry of proposals for a Senate Judiciary Committee inquiry into Fortas' receipt of the fee brought the reply from Chairman James O. Eastland, D-Miss., that there are no plans for an investigation at this time.

"I am not sure we have jurisdiction. The Constitution it seems to me that jurisdiction lies with the House."

This reference to the House's power to bring impeachment proceedings requiring trial before the Senate, found Rep. Emanuel Celler, D-N.Y., chairman of the House Judiciary Committee in no mood to institute such action.

"I have no intention of starting any impeachment proceedings," he said in a separate interview.

Life magazine reported in its current issue that Fortas accepted \$20,000 from Wolfson's family foundation in January, 1968, just three months after the justice was seated on the court.

The life account said Fortas did not return the money until 11 months had passed and three months after Wolfson and an associate, had been indicted for violating federal securities laws.

The article also said "whatever services he may or may not have rendered to the foundation, Justice Fortas' name was being dropped in strategic places by Wolfson and his business associate, Elkin Gerbert, in their effort to stay out of prison."

MIAMI (AP)—A gunman and a companion with a shiny knife have carried out the year's 25th airliner hijacking to Cuba.

The sky pirates stayed behind in Havana, but the other 66 passengers and the crew of seven returned to Miami early today after a four-hour stay on the Communist island.

A National Airlines spokesman said the two passengers who did not return identified themselves as "Mr. N. Marion" and "Mr. J. Gagnon."

The plane was about 20 minutes from a Miami landing Monday night when the hijackers took charge. The gunman grabbed stewardess Nancee E. Nowicki.

"He just told me he wanted to go to Cuba and open the door to the cockpit or he'd kill me," Miss Nowicki said.

The gunman directed pilot Edward Hodgson to head for Havana. The crew was warned not to use the radio or plane intercom system.

The gunman stayed in the pilot's compartment and kept Miss Nowicki with him. The man with the knife stood outside facing the passengers.

Dr. Ilya Spigland of Mount Vernon, N.Y., a passenger with his wife and two children, said two Cuban soldiers in olive-green uniforms greeted the hijackers in Havana.

"They took the gun and knife and led them away," Spigland said.

## Rains Herald Good Farm, Ranch Year

## Dirksen Retreats

The rains continue to fall and Howard County, already transformed into a green carpet, has now assumed a gold-brown hue. The rains, which have been steady since Monday night, have brought a much-needed moisture to the soil.

Wilkinson ranch, west of town, where nine inches had already fallen this year, added an inch to bring its current measurement to 4.50.

To the east, Coahoma had 1.3 last night and now has 3.44 for the three nights.

The Leland Wallace ranch near Wild Horse Creek north-east of town on the Snyder highway has had four inches of moisture since Friday of which 1.5 fell early today. Fairview community has three inches for the period with one inch last night.

Knott had two inches last night to bring its total to 3.10. Vealmoor reported an inch today. It has had 3.00 since the rains began. Luther's total is now 4.60 of which 1.2 fell last night. Vincent, with only 4 inch last night has only 1.25 for the least total of any of the communities.

Cotton and feed will have to be replanted in many parts of the county because of the rains. A considerable number of farmers had planted cotton. Some was reported up in the Knott community, the cotton which had come up was not believed harmed by the rains since the fall in that area was lighter than in others.

In the Lomax area, and also at Elbow, fields are temporarily transformed into lakes and what seed had been planted is buried.

"It will be some time before we can do any planting," said farmers. "Even if the rains stop, it will take a lot of sunshine to dry out those lobliholes."

"Tanks were beginning to fill on ranches — very welcome news to the ranchers. Many of the tanks have been dry for months. The earlier rains of the spring have had no run-off value. As a result, even though these were fine for pastures, stockwater problems were not eased. Now that grass and weeds are solid over the pasture some of the rain is slipping into the tanks."

WASHINGTON (AP) — Sen. Everett M. Dirksen voiced at the White House today "a suspicion on my part" that behind-the-scenes jockeying may be in progress at the Vietnam peace conference.

The Senate Republican leader was asked, after a weekly conference with President Nixon, to comment on calls by two fellow Senate Republicans, George D. Aiken of Vermont and Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, for a withdrawal of some American troops from Vietnam.

Dirksen began by saying that as of now, "there is no retreat," and the administration has no troop withdrawals in the works.

Then, ruminating about the Paris talks, he said: "There may be some work going on behind the scenes. This is a suspicion on my part."

## Area Lakes Picking Up Some Runoff From Storms

## Draft Call In Texas

Area lakes were beginning to feel some effects from a series of thunderstorms which have left most of the area saturated.

Although Lake J. B. Thomas, the reservoir of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, had gained only 0.6 of a foot at noon today, there was a prospect that it could pick up a few feet. Lake Colorado City had gained 2.4 feet and water was still running in. There was no report from Champion Creek, but Texas Electric Service Company was hopeful it would show some gain.

Lake E. V. Spence, the new reservoir of the CRMWD, had picked up six and a half feet, and some of the crossings above the lake were reported impassible.

Although the Colorado River was little better than a trickle at the upper end of Lake Thomas, it was running about four feet deep in the river at the Big Spring-Gail road crossing some 15 or more miles upstream. Still further up the channel, the flow was reported deeper. Tobacco Creek was flowing rather briskly where it crosses US-180 on the way to join the Colorado. Bull Creek and Six-Mile Creek, east of Gail, were flowing less than bank full, and Gravitt Creek had only a trickle. However, there was a possibility that hard showers on the upper reaches could send down a belated flow.

R. A. Schooling, administrative assistant, made a survey of the situation Tuesday morning and ventured that two or three feet might come down on the basis of what had been seen. The elevation at Lake Thomas this morning was 2228.18, or almost 30 feet below spillway level.

Texas Electric Service Company reported that Lake Colorado City had gained 2.35 feet to 8 a.m. Tuesday. This represented an increase of 2.725 acre-feet of water and put the lake to elevation 2960.65, or little more than nine feet below spillway. Yesterday Champion Creek Lake had only a slight rise, but officials hoped for more today.

This morning Lake E. V. Spence was at elevation of 2018.77 an increase of 7.36 feet, and the river was flowing four feet deep at the Humble crossing. It was still raining there at noon. Even as far upstream as the diversion works above Colorado City, the water had gone over the diversion works low-water dam although the flush-flow was being pumped out at the rate of about 9,000,000 gallons per day.

Schooling and Bill Laxson, who surveyed part of the Lake Thomas shed, said that bar ditches and fields are all brimming and that should a shower come again this afternoon, the degree of runoff should be much greater.

Moss Creek, where three inches have fallen since Friday, has gained only about 10 inches, and the main creek had just started running. Ike Ruppert recalled that it was on May 6 last year that Moss Creek picked up 7 1/2 feet.

## Tornadoes Pop Up Across West Texas

One tornado after another popped up as fierce thunderstorms boiled across a wide expanse of West Texas during the night and early morning.

State police and the Weather Bureau reported at least a dozen funnel clouds appeared in open country. There was no word of any causing property damage, although hail as big as baseballs bombarded some areas.

Even more twisters were sighted just across the state line in Eastern New Mexico.

**WARNINGS**

The turbulence kept official observers issuing repeated warnings. One of the latest, a severe thunderstorm watch, in force until 7:30 p.m. today, covered 40 counties in a 140-mile wide sector centering on a line from Lubbock to 60 miles southwest of Del Rio.

An earlier alert against possible tornadoes affected 55 counties from Dalhart to Midland.

Storms started developing in West Texas near the end of a day which also saw heavy rains, hail and possible tornadoes scattered through South Central and Southeast Texas. Some of the downpours measured more than six inches.

**GIANT CLOUD**

State police told of watching six tornado funnels writhe toward the earth as they watched a giant thundercloud over lightly populated Martin County, between Midland and Lamesa.

Southwest of Andrews, in the next county west from Martin, observers saw a big tornado dip down and bound along the ground in three giant leaps and a smaller twister hit a few miles distant. Within 30 minutes three inches of rain descended as hail up to the size of baseballs battered the countryside.

Still other twisters were spotted three miles southwest of Friona, 15 miles southwest of Hereford and 12 miles southwest of Morton between the small towns of Bledsoe and Lehman.

Unruly weather earlier Monday prompted a tornado watch for 39 counties in South Central and Southeast Texas. It expired at 2:30 p.m. with no damage reported. Torrential rains Monday were heaviest in Central Texas, where measurements ran as high as 6.27 inches at Richtland, 60 miles south of Dallas.

Thunderstorms and brisk showers persisted this morning across much of West Texas and clouds hung low throughout the state with drizzle again dampening central sections.

# Road Indicated When Funded

Improvement of 11.1 miles of State Highway 176 from Big Spring to the Martin County line will be undertaken as soon as funds are available, Dewitt C. Greer, chairman of the Texas Highway Commission indicated Monday at Austin.

Greer interrupted the presentation of Lloyd B. Stoenner, Andrews, to say the commission was familiar with the need, but since the project would cost an estimated \$1,750,000, it will have to await funds. Commissioners Herb Petry and Garrett Morris concurred in the view. There was no indication, however, when the project can be funded.

Stoenner, speaking for the delegations from Howard and Andrews counties, pointed out that this is the last section of the road from Big Spring to Andrews which has not been upgraded from its original Farm-to-Market status.

Currently it is 20 feet wide and with relatively light base. Stoenner and the delegation asked that it be brought to 26-foot-wide standard with nine-foot shoulders as is the case in Martin and Andrews counties. Currently the road has no paved shoulders.

He pointed to the increasing amount of traffic taking off IS 20 at Big Spring and moving west to Andrews and some on to New Mexico.

When Stoenner said the project would require no additional right of way, "How do you know?", asked Greer. Later, speaking for the Howard County group, Joe Pickle, chairman of the Big Spring Chamber of Commerce highway committee, said that the three members present from the Howard County Commissioners Court wanted to assure the commission that if additional right of way is required, the county will obtain it promptly.

The slam contract in diamonds reached by North and South was distinctly aggressive inasmuch as South is off the ace of clubs at the outset and must find a parking place for his three losing spades.

While the first two rounds of bidding are reasonable, in the opinion of this department, North should sign off at three no trump after South bids three diamonds. When North proceeded voluntarily beyond the nine trick level by bidding four diamonds, it was reasonable to assume that he was looking for slam.

South's decision to bid six diamonds is understandable, since he has a sound holding with a wealth of controls. Observe that if North put down the king of spades instead of the queen, the slam would be an outstanding favorite.

West opened the nine of

diamonds and North's ten held the first trick. A small club was led and East rose with the ace, fearful that South might be attempting to sneak thru the lone king. Declarer followed with the three, however, and East exited with a spade. South put up the ace from his hand and then drew the remaining trump with the king of diamonds and cashed the king of clubs.

East's club play established two discards in dummy for the declarer, however, he had three spades to get rid of from his hand, and it was still necessary to take a heart finesse in order to develop a third discard. A small heart was led, West followed with the four and the queen was played from dummy. When it held, declarer cashed the ace, followed by the two high clubs in which he disposed of his remaining spades, and claimed his contract.

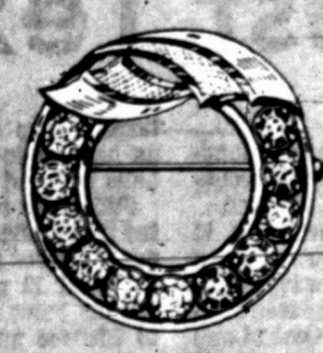
East can apparently defeat the slam by ducking the club when it is led from the North hand, for declarer is restricted to one club sluff instead of two. South can still win the hand, however, if he plays West for the king of hearts.

After the king of clubs holds, declarer plays the deuce of hearts and finesses North's queen. The king of clubs is then discarded on the ace of hearts.

The closed hand is re-entered by leading the queen of clubs thru East and ruffing away East's ace. After trumps are drawn, declarer concedes a spade trick and claims the rest by either ruffing one spade in dummy or else discarding it on the established jack of clubs.

# '69 Pulitzer Prizes Go To Favorite, Long Shot

NEW YORK (AP)—A favorite and a long shot have emerged with the 1969 Pulitzer prizes for drama and fiction.

Playwright Howard Sackler, 39, was announced Monday as the drama prize winner for his Broadway hit "The Great White Hope," based on the life of one-time heavyweight boxing champion Jack Johnson.

Surprise winner of the fiction prize was N. Scott Momaday, 35-year-old Kiowa Indian, for "House Made of Dawn," a novel about the tribulations of an Indian veteran of World War II.

As far as is known, Momaday, now an English professor at the University of California, is the first member of his race to win a Pulitzer. He said he was unaware that the novel, his first, had even been nominated for the award.

**AWARD FOR EXPOSE**

In the field of journalism, the Los Angeles Times won the prize for public service for the third time in 27 years.

This time the award was for an expose of corruption which led to a shakeup of the Los Angeles city government and three convictions for bribery.

William Tuohy, 43, a Times correspondent, won the prize in international reporting for combat coverage in Vietnam—bringing the newspaper's total of Pulitzers through the years to seven, including three since 1966.

The prize for news photography went to Edward T. Adams, 35, of The Associated Press for his picture of Brig. Gen. Nguyen Ngoc Loan, the South Vietnamese national police chief, shooting a Viet Cong captive in the head with a pistol. It was the 23rd Pulitzer Prize for Associated Press staffers.

**LOCAL REPORTING**

Norman Mailer, previously best known for his novel "The Naked and the Dead," shared honors in the general fiction category with Dr. Rene Jules Dubos, Rockefeller University microbiologist. Mailer was honored for "The Armies of the Night" and Dubos for "So Human an Animal."

All individual winners, including coinwinners, receive \$1,000 apiece. The Los Angeles Times award is a gold medal.

Pulitzer winners are selected by the trustees of Columbia University with the help of an advisory board. The annual prizes, first awarded in 1917, were established in the will of Joseph Pulitzer, founder of the St. Louis Post-Dispatch and later publisher of the New York World.

Journalism winners for 1969 included:

Local reporting—John Fetterman, 49, of the Louisville (Ky.) Times and Courier-Journal, for the story of the return of a Vietnam veteran's body to Hindman, Ky.

Local reporting, special—Albert I. DeLugach, 43, and Denny Walsh, 33, for investigative reporting in the St. Louis Globe-Democrat of fraud in a steamfitters union.

National reporting—Robert Cahn, 52, Washington reporter of Boston's Christian Science Monitor, for a series on national parks.

Editorial writing (over a period of time)—Paul Greenberg, 32, Pine Bluff (Ark.) Commercial.

## Inside Auto Safe Place In An Electrical Storm

AUSTIN (AP)—Inside an automobile is a safe place to be in an electrical storm, the state Health Department said Wednesday.

"The steel shell will lead the charge of electricity to the wheels, from where it will jump to the ground," the department said.

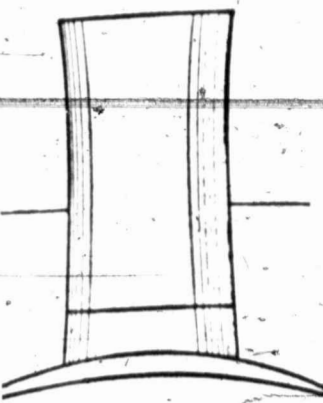
This does not apply to convertibles, it said.

Thunderstorms are common in the spring, and the department gave several tips on what to do if you are caught in one. Campers, golfers, swimmers and farm workers are especially vulnerable since lightning will usually strike the highest object in an open area.

Just recently two fishermen were killed in North Texas when caught on a lake by a sudden storm and struck by lightning," the department said.

Many people will run under a tree when caught in a storm, exposing themselves to a great danger, since lightning often strikes lone trees. The bolt travels down the moist interior of the tree, building up extra heat and pressure which causes the tree to "literally explode."

If a thunderstorm develops while you are out in the open head for a building and stay inside until the storm is over. If you are boating or swimming, leave the water and get to a building. If there is no building available head for a grove of trees but avoid the tallest tree or lone trees. In an open area, lie down until the storm passes.

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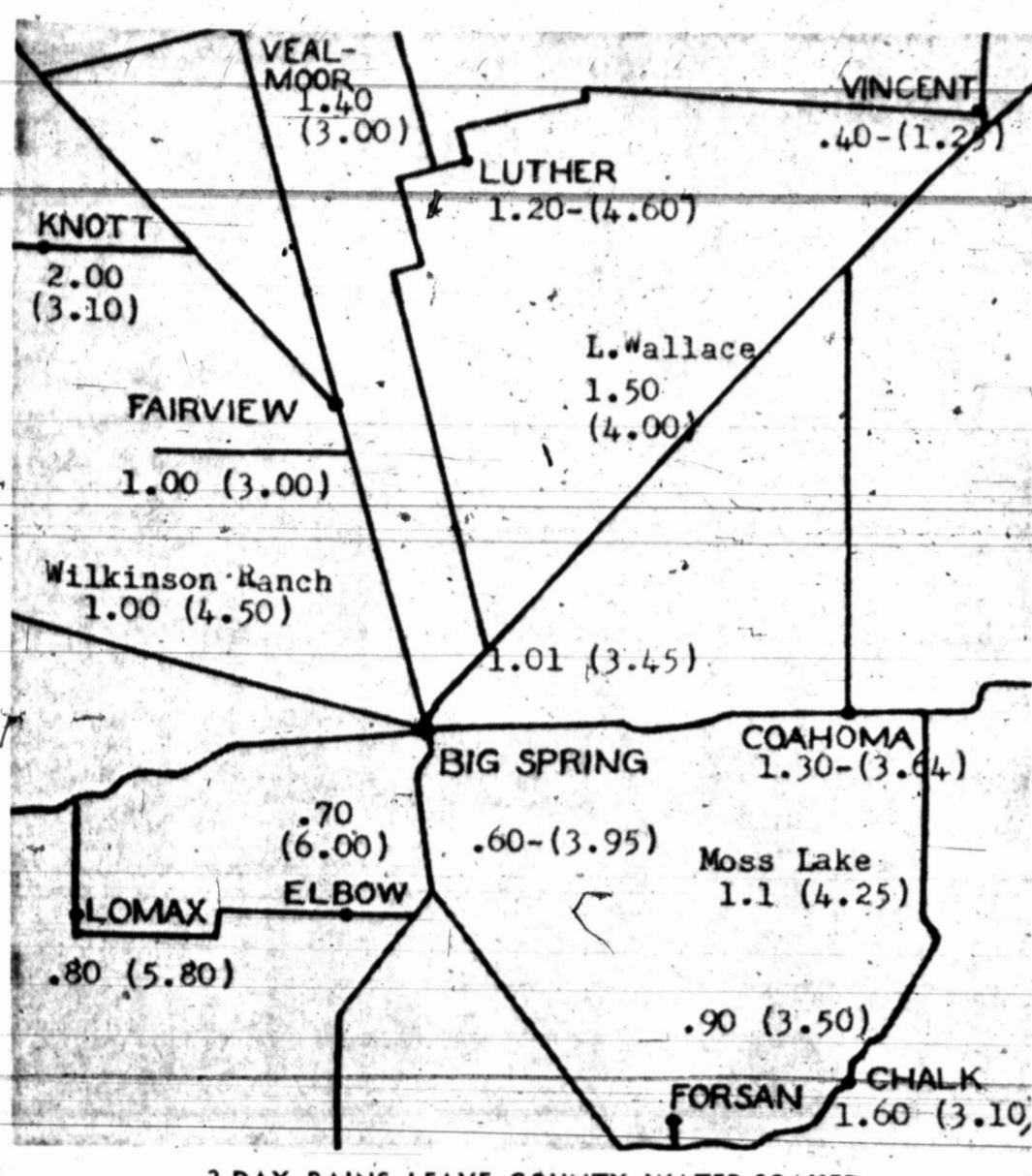
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3-DAY RAINS LEAVE COUNTY WATER-SOAKED

### Will Check A&M Hazing

COLLEGE STATION, Tex. (AP)—Texas A&M's commandant, Col. Jim McCoy, says certain forms of hazing will receive a "good look with the viewpoint of recognizing inherent dangers to the Corps of Cadets."

McCoy spoke out after a charge that Mexican-American students were harassed on San Jacinto Day.

The Cadet Corps commander, Hector Gutierrez Jr. of Laredo, questioned the charge Monday.

"If Mexican-Americans were harassed at A&M, I would have been subject to it from the first day I arrived and I would never have made corps commander," the top-ranked cadet said.

Members of the League of United Latin American Citizens (LULAC) adopted a resolution last week in Waco calling on A&M to end what they called the "annual harassment of Mexican-Americans on San Jacinto Day," which commemorates Texas' victory over Mexico.

The resolution said Mexican-Americans are taken from their dormitories on San Jacinto Day and water thrown on them.

"It happens and I don't defend it, but I've never seen any one take it for anything less than the horse play in which it is intended," Gutierrez said.

"For it to be harassment, the situation has to be taken that way."

Matt Carroll of Annandale, Va., the 1969-70 commander, said he also has been "drowned out" on St. Patrick's Day, because he is Irish.

### Unexpected Jump In Meat Prices

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Agriculture Department says the rising cost of meat, a major factor in the unexpected jump in this year's food prices, comes at a time when there are abundant supplies of livestock.

"The strength in livestock and meat prices in the face of larger supplies is due to rising consumer incomes, unusually low unemployment rates and increases in population," the department said Monday.

Officials indicated in effect that higher prices on both the wholesale and retail level are the result of more people willing to pay more money to eat more beef.

Department officials indicated last week that previous estimates of a 2 to 2.5 per cent rise in food costs this year were too low and the figure more likely will be about 3 per cent.

A report on the food outlook is scheduled for release by the department Thursday.

Cattle prices have set the pace for the increasing cost of livestock, already at a 17-year-high. Agriculture economists said, and are expected to continue running "well above" a year ago.

The Bureau of Labor Statistics said the retail price of sirloin steak in March averaged \$1.23 a pound nationally, the highest since sirloin records were started in 1960. A year ago sirloin cost \$1.18 a pound.

Chuck roast in March cost 66 cents a pound, compared with 63 cents a year earlier. The high was 76 cents a pound in December 1951, a period of record cattle prices.

Hamburger averaged 58 cents a pound in March, compared with 55 cents a year earlier and the top of 67 cents in April 1951.

The rising cost of food is only part of the reason for the inflation that is worrying the government.

### Agnew Kicks Off Speaking Tour

SACRAMENTO, Calif. (AP)—Vice President Spiro T. Agnew flew Monday night from Honolulu, where he spent a three-day holiday, and begins today a week-long speaking tour of the mainland.

HOUSTON, Tex. (AP)—A bandit killed during a Houston holdup has been identified as a man sought in the Mississippi slaying of a millionaire divorcee, police disclosed today.

Houston detectives said Mississippi officers identified the slain man from fingerprints as Edward Osborn, 29, alias Harold E. Johnson.

City patrolman D. V. Williams happened to pass while a Western Union branch office was being robbed here Saturday night and said he shot and killed Osborn, firing through a front plate glass window.

Osborn was slain after the telephone office manager, Vincent Mooney, 53, had been shot in the thigh and forced to hand over a small amount of money, police reported.

Detectives said Osborn, a Negro from New Orleans, had been sought since March 18 in the killing of Nelda Harrison Brenza, 54. She was strangled March 12 in her 18-room beachfront home at Pass Christian, Miss.

Mississippi authorities said Mrs. Brenza, also stabbed repeatedly, was throttled by a man who invaded her home and tied up her adopted son Michael, 9, a maid and a handyman. A lawyer estimated Mrs.

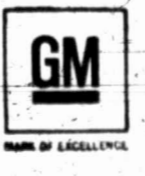

### Montgomery Police Jail 365 Students

By The Associated Press  
Police in Montgomery, Ala. arrested 365 black students from Alabama State College as they demonstrated outside the State Capitol. Meanwhile, black and Puerto Rican students at City College of New York ended a two-week occupation of half the campus, and the school opens today.

The Alabama students were charged with disobeying a police order to end their demonstration, which had marched to the Capitol to await Gov. Albert Brewer's reply to their demand to fire college President Levi Watkins.

The 2,200-student college has been under fire from students for six weeks, since Watkins fired Alvin Holmes from a job in the school's financial office. Holmes was among those arrested.

The protesters also seek establishment of a black studies program and upgrading of the faculty.

At City College, about 200 black and Puerto Rican students took down their barricades and marched through Harlem, chanting "Power to the People." They left after a court order banning disruptive demonstrations had been read.

College officials said classes would be held for all 20,000 students.

The protesters were demanding a separate school of black and Puerto Rican studies and a change in enrollment to match the ethnic makeup of city high schools, which are 40 per cent black and Puerto Rican.

Neither demand was met, but the Board of Higher Education governing unit of the 165,000-student City University said it would negotiate with the students once they ended the occupation.

Queens College, another city university branch, remained closed today. The board ordered President Joseph McMurray to open the 25,000-student school, and he said he would meet with police to work out plans. The school was closed Friday after a group of black students vandalized the campus. More than 400 police restored order.

At other campuses:  
New Orleans, La.—About 200 students at predominantly Negro Southern University seized the administration building, but left when National Guardsmen were alerted to move in.  
Classes at the school of 1,700 were suspended.

Kalamazoo, Mich.—Arsonists set two fires in a Reserve Officer Training Corps office on the Western Michigan University campus.

# Lebanese Will Crack Down On Palestinian Guerrillas

By The Associated Press  
 Angered by three attacks on its men, the Lebanese army says it will crack down on the Palestinian guerrillas in southern Lebanon. But its announcement did not specify whether the "retaliatory" measures would include preventing commando raids across the border into Israel.

One soldier was killed and three army trucks were destroyed in the clashes during the weekend, the army said.

The armed forces "had used patience in dealing with the deteriorating situation in the south," the communique continued, "but they are reacting with bitterness to the incidents which are being committed daily with the aim of diverting military efforts concentrated on the front lines facing the enemy . . ."

It said the incidents, "provoked by irresponsible elements," require "the imposition of military deterrent measures for the safety of the army and the maintenance of its morale."

The army blamed Al Saika, a guerrilla group affiliated with Syria's ruling Baath party, for the recent incidents.

It was the first official admission of a widening split between the army and the guerrillas, who want to use Lebanon as a base for raids against Israel.

## David Finds Job

WASHINGTON (AP) — David Eisenhower, President Nixon's son-in-law, has accepted an unpaid summer job as a pre-law intern with the Senate Judiciary Committee.

Lebanon is half Christian and half Moslem, and the government has opposed giving the guerrillas free rein, fearing Israel would retaliate with strikes against Lebanon.

Bloody fighting last month between government troops and Palestinian refugees resulted in the resignation of Premier Rashid Karami April 25. Efforts by political leaders to form a new government "so far have failed, and Karami has refused to step in to solve the government crisis less all parties agree on a policy toward the guerrillas.

Sporadic fighting was reported Monday between Israeli and Arab forces along the Suez Canal and near the Allenby Bridge across the Jordan River. One Israeli civilian was reported wounded.

## Sugar Substitute Health Hazard?

WASHINGTON (AP) — The sugar substitute cyclamate is a potentially serious health hazard and products that use it should not be sold—except on prescription, says Sen. Gaylord Nelson, D-Wis.

In a statement Monday, Nelson said there is scientific evidence that cyclamate can cause a variety of ailments, including high blood pressure, liver disease and skin irritation.

Tens of millions of children and adults across the nation are unwittingly being exposed to potentially serious health hazards by the unnecessary consumption of cyclamate-sweetened soft drinks, cereals, desserts and sugar-coated pills, Nelson said.

The Food and Drug Administration, he said, is considering guidelines that would limit daily cyclamate consumption to 4,150 milligrams for a 50-pound child. But, said Nelson, the content of some soft drinks is so high that a child would exceed that limit by drinking a single bottle.

# Enemy Troops Strike Back Along Cambodian Frontier

SAIGON (AP) — North Vietnamese troops struck back today at the massive American air and ground campaign along the Cambodian frontier but failed to overrun an American patrol base in the heaviest attack since the border war flared anew more than two months ago.

Troops of the North Vietnamese 1st Division also made rocket and mortar attacks on two other American bases within a 20-mile radius. The U.S. Command said at least 119 of the enemy were killed and 29 others surrendered.

The American defenders from the 1st Air Cavalry Division reported 13 of their men killed and at least 87 wounded.

In the heaviest attack, about 900 enemy troops stormed out of the bamboo jungles about 2 miles behind a mortar barrage and assaulted a patrol base named Carolyn from three sides.

The base in War Zone C, 65 miles northwest of Saigon, was defended by 300 Air Cavalrymen with 12 artillery guns. The North Vietnamese finally fled to the north just before dawn, driven off by the Air Cavalrymen, artillery guns firing at point-blank range, helicopter gunships firing rockets and fighter-bombers.

U.S. spokesmen said 101 North Vietnamese and nine Americans were killed and 62 Americans were wounded. One of the wounded Americans was found in a bunker, lying beneath the bodies of five North Vietnamese.

Twenty-nine other North Vietnamese surrendered. Most were wounded, and they included two officers. Ten more were killed at daylight by Air Force bombers that caught them as they retreated toward Cambodia, a spokesman said.

At the same time, other North Vietnamese troops slammed about 200 rounds of rockets and mortars into two other patrol bases of Air Cavalrymen, one 5 miles south of Carolyn and the other 20 miles southeast. A light ground probe followed one of the shelling.

Four Air Cavalrymen and eight North Vietnamese troops were reported killed and more than 25 Air Cavalrymen wounded.

The entire 17,000-man air cavalry division has moved into the enemy staging area in the War Zone C, leaping through the jungles from a string of patrol bases. More than 300 B52 bombers have rained 10,000 tons of explosives on enemy bunkers and supply depots in the zone during the past two weeks.

## Chairmen Back \$2 Minimum Pay

WASHINGTON (AP) — Two congressional labor committee chairmen say they support a hike in the minimum wage to \$2 an hour and extending coverage to all but 500,000 of the nation's workers.

Under a proposed bill the biggest new group to be covered would be firm workers. Also included for the first time would be hospital employees, taxi drivers, retail and service workers.

Making the pledge of support to a conference of AFL-CIO labor leaders Monday were Sen. Harrison A. Williams Jr., D-N.J., chairman of the Senate labor subcommittee, and Rep. John Dent, D-Pa., chairman of the House general subcommittee on labor.

Workers covered under pre-1966 legislation would have their minimum wage raised from \$1.60 to \$2 an hour immediately. For workers included since 1966 the minimum would reach \$2 in February, 1971.

Dent said he hopes for passage of the minimum wage bill in the present session of Congress.



## A LOVELIER YOU Use Waving Lotion For Spot Curling

BY MARY SUE MILLER  
Many a "little girl" now wants a little curl right in the middle of her forehead. And many another one!

Curls may be in, but some like them just here and there. You may want tendrils at your ears or the nape of your neck, while another lovely wishes for a smooth fall with the lift and lift of end curls.

A new method of applying milk waves lets you spot curl to your heart's content without treating the rest of your head. It's sort of like siphoning the cream off the milk. Here's how it's done:

Roll the hair in which you desire curl, using sponge end papers and permanent wave curlers. In the case of long hair in which curls are wanted only on the ends, roll the hair one inch higher than the amount of curl desired.

Then saturate each curl with waving lotion twice, but do not saturate the remainder of the hair. Wait for the lotion to work about 15 minutes for coarse hair and up to 40 minutes for fine hair. Thereafter, saturate each curl with neutralizing lotion. Again, do not lotion the uncurled hair.

From thereon you proceed as usual with a rinse and set. Besides curling to order, this kind of milk waving produces looser, softer, shinier curls. The fresh milk you add to the lotion and the updated method are the secret.

## Allen Hearing Delayed Today

A habeas corpus hearing for Carlee Allen, serving a five-year prison sentence for robbery by assault, was delayed this morning in 118th District Court at the defendant's request.

Allen, 25, was brought to Howard County Monday from the Texas Department of Corrections in Huntsville, and will be returned until another date for his hearing is set. He was sentenced to his prison term Aug. 30, 1966, by a jury which found him guilty of robbing a service station and grocery owned by Floyd Ashby on June 14, 1966.

The case was appealed, but was affirmed on Oct. 25, 1967, by the Court of Criminal Appeals.

Among the allegations in Allen's writ of habeas corpus are that he was identified from an improper lineup, that he was not given the right to counsel before questioning, and that he was not adequately represented by his appointed attorney.

### Nixon Begins Smut Attacks

FORT WORTH (AP) — The Nixon administration has begun an attack against the use of the mails for distribution of obscene and pornographic literature and is exploring new methods of cutting the postal service's deficit, said Postmaster General Winton M. Blount Monday.

Blount, here to address the Postal Employees Recognition Day Dinner, spoke to newsmen at a news conference.

Speaking about what the Nixon administration would do about "smut" in the mails, Blount said, "We're going to give judges an arsenal of means to fight this."

He said a master list of persons who have requested that they not receive the literature and materials would be drawn up and harsh monetary and penal measures would be levied against mailers who violated the lists.

"The President and I are both determined to do something about this barrage of material that is flowing through the mails," Blount said.

Blount said gigantic steps would be taken in the field of automation in the postal services and cited an instance of a machine that cost in excess of \$100,000 paying for itself in two years with usable life of 15 years.

"Any businessman would be tickled to death to use that kind of accounting to automate his business," Blount said.

Blount said the service was also planning on setting up a marketing department.

### Teachers' Strike Adds To Troubles

MINOT, N.D. (AP) — The not newspaper that carried editorials of praise for the all-for-one spirit of Minot residents during the fight against the flooding of the Souris River is being broken down by a school teachers' strike that continues to plague this city of 35,000.

A junior high school building, used as a Red Cross shelter for flood victims, was picketed by teachers when it reopened for classes.

The strike by 150 public school teachers, about one-third of the teaching force, was pushed into the background when the water that flooded the city last month left 12,000 homeless, including many of the striking teachers.

School board members and teachers alike manned dikes and assisted in other flood control and relief projects.

But after the waters receded and began to recede April 21, townsmen began "thinking more of the school strike."

It began just a few days before the flooding when the teachers objected to the school board's offer of a contract that would raise starting pay from \$5,500 yearly to \$6,000 and cut the number of increments for experience and further education from 10 steps to six.

The strikers, members of a local of the American Federation of Teachers, opposed the change in increments.

Almost everyone has taken sides in the dispute, and its effects probably will be felt for years.

Some students have expressed support for teachers by conducting protests or skipping school. Others have complained about damage being done to them by the walkout.

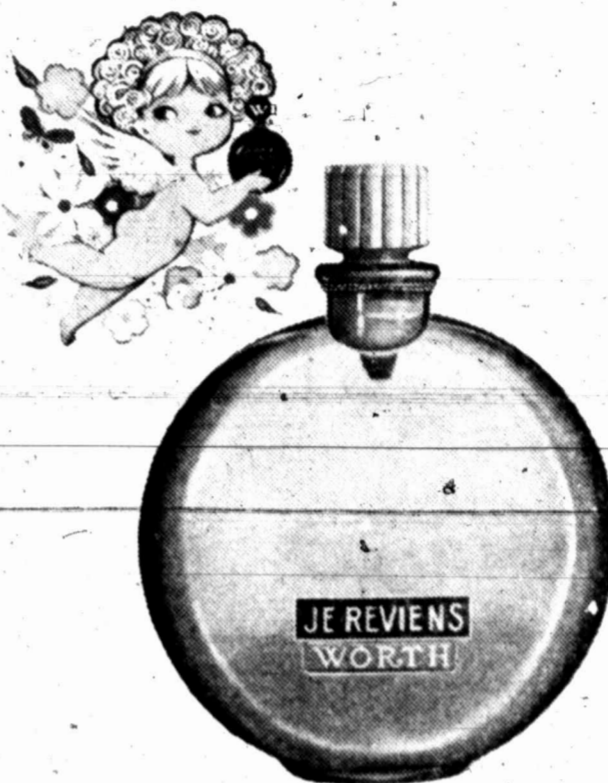
