the tax proposals last week. Mutscher confirmed that the corporate tax, which be calls a "corporation gains tax" is "one of the items under serious consideration," but other sources said a tax bill has already been prepared

containing the \$90 million item. House Tax Committee Chairman Ben Atwell of Dallas said other elements in the Mutscher tax package are a four cents per pack cigarette tax increase and inclusion of such services as repairs, laundry and dry cleaning under the three per cent state sales tax. The cigarette tax increase would bring in \$70 million over the next two years, the services tax about \$48 million, Atwell estimated.

Mutscher and Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes held another meeting today with Gov. Smith, whom they are trying to convince of the wisdom of a one-year appropriations bill that would postpone new taxes until 1970

Barnes said there is "just one factor" involved in the one-year budget issue: "That is whether we are going to have a tax bill in 1969."

The speaker said if he decides to go along with Smith's wishes for the traditional two-year budget, a tax bill probably would be reported out of Atwell's committee Thursday. The House would stay in session Friday - and Saturday, if need be - to work on it, he added.

"If we lay out a tax bill, it won't be a small one. It would cover our appropriations bill, the teacher pay raise and the difference between the House and Senate bills. And that's a \$100 million difference," Mutscher said.

Dirksen Retreats

WASHINGTON (AP) - Sen. Everett M. Dirksen voiced at the White House today "a suspicion on my part" that behind-the-scenes jockeving may be in progress at the Vietnam peace conference, The Senate Republican leader was asked, after a weekly conference with President Nixon, to comment on calls by two fellow Senate Republicans, George D. Aiken of Vermont and Hugh Scott of Pennsylvania, for a withdrawal of some American troops from Vietnam.

Dirksen began by saying that as of now, "there is no retreat," and the administration has no troop withdrawals in the works.

Then, ruminating about the Paris talks, he said: "There may be some work going on behind the scenes. This is a suspicion on my part."

### Draft Call In Texas

AUSTIN (AP) - The June draft call in Texas is 1.366, down from May's 1,453, the state Selective Service Office said today.

A total of 8,202 Texans will take pre-induction exams in June. This compares with 8,234 in May.

That would be the possible consolidating of all tax assessing and collection offices, in the interest of economy and efficiency.

## Art Buchwald When National Security Is At Stake

WASHINGTON - One of the reasons the Military-Industrial Complex is catching it from everybody is that there seems to be a certain amount of skepticism regarding the price tags they put on our military hardware. Just the other day it was revealed that Lockheed promised to build 120 big air transports for a total cost of \$2.9 billion. But now it turns out that the planes are going to cost \$5.2 billion. And even for an apathetic taxpayer like myself, that seems like a lot of money.

I WAS shocked when I read the news, but that was because I have no idea how the military purchasing system works. Fortunately, I have a friend who deals with the government, d he explained it to me

You shouldn't come to conclusions just because the C-5A transport cost almost twice as much as everyone thought it would. Anyone can make a \$2 billion mistaké. Nobody's perfect.

## Holmes Alexander **Bombs On The Foundations**

WASHINGTON - Congressman John Ashbrook (R. Ohio) is a tall blond bomber of the altars of Baal. Whenever he gets the idols of the false gods in his sites, he hits the toggle switch and salvoes a load of verbal blockbusters on the foes of his credo, which is ardent conservatism.

ASHBROOK, AS chairman of the American Conservative Union (ACU), let go a few weeks ago at President Nixon whom he believed to be bending the knee to the liberal godheads and consorting with infidels of collectivism. Some of us thought him a little trigger-happy on that one, but the latest publication by the ACU is a package of high explosives which lands right in the pulpit of the unsanctified. This publication, "The Financiers

of Revolution," is self-described in the subtitle as a study of how dishonestly exempt foundations and organizations are bilking the taxpayer and using their special status "to promote political and social upheaval in America." Its author, Allan C. Brownfield, has known case-histories of tax-dodging with the connivance of the Federal government.


tax exemption for such work? The permission is a matter of judgment by the Internal Revenue Service. If . a foundation or organization devotes any "substantial part" of its activities. to propaganda or politics, the tax exemption is supposed to be revoked. In recent years, IRS by government policy has cracked down on right-wing groups but spared the rod at the other end of the spectrum.


THE SIERRA GLUB, a conservationist outfit, took out \$10,000 worth of newspaper advertising to oppose two Federal dams in Grand Canyon. Its exemption was revoked. But the National Electric Cooperative Association in that same year, 1966, had an advertising budget of \$300,000 to promote co-ops. It was allowed to keep its exemption while supporting a position opposite to that of the Sierra Club.

The National Student Association enjoys a tax exemption, although it is a lobbyist group. It propagandizes for black "liberation," "student power" on the campuses of Columbia and at Berkeley, as well as for admission of Red China to the United Nations. But tax exemption w a s snatched away from the Christian Crusade (headed by the Rey Billy James Hargis) and from Life Line (sponsored by H. L. Hunt).

FORD' FOUNDATION seems to have an interlocking directorate with the Kennedy family Foundation president is McGeorge Bundy, President Kennedy's foreign affairs adviser. Foundation vice president is David Bell, JFK's head of the Budget Bureau. In February the Foundation gave \$131,000 in grants to eight former aides of the late Sen. Bob Kennedy. This money would have been taxable except for the Foundation's favored position. In that sense themoney came out of the public's pocket

AS PRESIDENT Nixon recently noted, taxation is never popular, but it ought to be fair. In a foreword to this study, Ashbrook suggests that at least it ought to be legal. Quickly thrown-together barricades made of cans of blazing trash remained the favored tactic of hippies and their University of Wisconsin student neighbors from the Mifflin Street area, where many Bohemian types have their homes.

But firefighters said firebombs were used for the first time, and students also snarled traffic on State Street in the central business district.

About a half dozen additional arrests were made, bringing to 110 the total arrested since police broke up a hipple block party last Saturday. Hospitals treated five more persons for injuries or the effect of irritant gas, including a 6-month-old baby exposed to tear gas, making a total of nearly 70. Of these, 18 were policemen.

Rain helped to curb the disorder by 2:30 a.m. today.

"I didn't come to make any promises. I can't do that." Mayor Dyke told the hippies. "There have been mistakes on both sides

After the mayor left Mifflin Street, youths swarmed through the downtown area. One shouted at pursuing police:

"You wouldn't let us have a party in our own community. Now the whole city will be our playground."
