MOISTURE LOGGED

Rain, Hail, Wind Hits Area

The Friona area was visited by thunderstorms again during the past week, which dumped from one to three inches of rain on parts of the area.

An unfortunate footnote to the rains of Monday night was the hail damage sustained to some crops north and west of Friona.

Curtis Murphree, who farms in conjunction with sons Joe and Danny Murphree, suffered extensive damage to cotton and sugar beet crops seven miles north of Friona. A major part of Murphree's cotton had the stalks completely stripped, giving it the appearance of a field following harvest.

Cotton which had been knee high and fairly well loaded ("I had counted 14 or 15 squares on one plant the afternoon before the storm")

were just twigs sticking up after the hail.

Ernest and A.W. (Dub) Anthony, whose farmland adjoins the Murphrees, also suffered damage to their crops, and Owen Drake, who farms just south of the Murphree place, also sustained crop damage.

There was another strip of hail around the "Ten Mile Corner" west of Friona, which caused severe damage to crops. Among those affected in that area were Dick and Bob Sparks, who reported 80 per cent loss of their cotton crop.

The Murphrees farm 320 acres north of Friona, which is mostly in cotton this year, and the majority of this was lost. "We have about 250 acres of crops which we will just have to plow up in order to keep the land from blowing," Murphree said.

The sugar beet crop on the Murphree farm also had all of the foliage beaten off, but by Thursday of this week was making signs of putting on new leaves. "The beets will recover to some extent, but there will be a loss of tonnage and sugar content," Murphree said.

The hail north of Friona apparently cut a swath about a mile wide, but got progressively wider as it went east. It sort of hopped around, skipping some fields, and hitting others.

The hail was so severe that rabbits and pheasants were killed. Murphree said he saw four or five dead rabbits the day following the hailstorm, and he was afraid that his pheasant crop also had been wiped out. "We had a number of young pheasants, but I haven't seen a one since the hail," he said.

The hail was still stacked up three feet deep in the barrow ditch on the Murphree farm on Tuesday morning after the storm.

One factor which added to the destructiveness where it hailed was the wind, which served to buffet the area with the hailstones.

Murphree said the only time he could recall getting a hail as bad as this one was about 1953, when it hailed out his cotton crop in that same area. "But that one came a lot earlier in the year, and we were able

to still make enough maize to partly make amends," the longtime area farmer said.

The rain measurement on Monday varied from place to place. The official reading in Friona was just .39 inch. Friona received another .36 inch

Thursday night. Murphree said the rainfall measured on their places varied from an inch to three inches.

Farm Road 2397 southeast of Friona was under water in places, as over three inches of rain fell in a short time Monday evening.

Clayton Is Tabbed To Speak At Event

Speaker of the Texas House, Representative Bill Clayton of Springlake, will be one of the featured speakers at the program scheduled on Sunday, August 12 at which Prairie Acres will be spotlighted.

Clayton, serving his third term as speaker of the House of Representatives, is one of the most influential men in Texas Politics, and is one of the few legislators who continues to get "good grades" from political observers.

Clayton will be one of two speakers who will take part in the program August 12 at the Friona Community Center, beginning at 3 p.m. Rev. C.H. Murphy, pastor of Friona's First Baptist Church, will also speak. Clayton and Rev. Murphy will each address the subject "Committed Christians and Good Government Build Good Nursing Homes."

Included on the program of music will be Geary Broden of First Baptist Church, the Summerfield Quartet, and the Sixth Street Church of Christ ladies.

The theme for the day's activities will be "To God Be The Glory," states Merv Noah, administrator of the nursing facility.

The observance will serve as a third anniversary function for Prairie Acres, which opened in August of 1976. At the present time, Noah said that the resident population at the home is 58, with all beds full.

Operated as an adjunct of the City of Friona, Prairie Acres is unusual in the field of nursing. In a short time, it has developed a reputation of really caring for its residents, and has maintained a qualified, dedicated staff.

Chamber To Sponsor Poster Competition

The Friona Chamber of Commerce announced this week that it was sponsoring a poster contest for the youngsters of Friona in connection with Maize Days.

Children will be asked to make a poster using the Chamber's theme for Maize Days, "The Great American Cowboy."

Ribbons will be awarded in three categories: elementary, kindergarten and pre-school. Contestants may pick up their poster board at the Chamber office on Main Street.

So far, action has been slow in entering contestants for Maize Queen. Kipi Fleming has the honor of being the first contestant entered in the Maize Queen race. Kipi is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Dean Fleming, and is sponsored by Parmer County Pump Company.

Sharla Duggins is the only other contestant entered as of this week. She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. B.E. Duggins, and is sponsored by the Friona Star.

No entries have been received in the Little Miss contest. Deadlines are August 24 for Maize Queen and August 28 for Little Miss. Entry fees are \$25 and \$10.

New Ownership After 72 Years

The oldest business under continuous ownership in Friona, and perhaps Parmer County, has made a change in its ownership structure after 72 years with the same owners.

Rockwell Bros. & Company, Friona's lumber and building supply headquarters since 1907, and owned by the Rockwell family of Houston for all of that time, has sold its local outlet to Billy Gene Zachary.

The Rockwell company, which has been in the lumber business for over 80 years in the state of Texas, has been in the process of selling its holdings since the death of the last of the original Rockwell family, Henry Rockwell, in July of 1978.

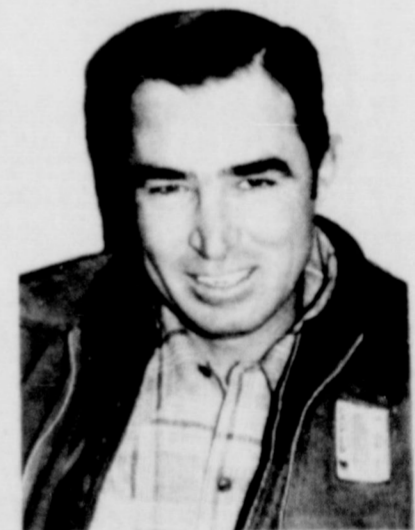
"The sale of our yards is not due to a lack of faith in any of our communities, but continued operation under the Rockwell ownership was not feasible," said W.A. Russell, executive vice president of the Rockwell Lumber Company, Houston.

"It has been our great privilege to serve the good people of the Friona area since 1907. We earnestly solicit your support for Gene Zachary in his new business," Russell continued.

Zachary became manager of the Friona lumber company in December of 1975, following the death of longtime manager O.F. (Os) Lange, who held the position for 56 years. According to company records, the 72-year-old Friona business has had only three managers.

T.J. Crawford was the first manager, serving from 1907 to 1919. Lange then took over and served from 1919 to 1975, followed by Zachary.

"I feel this speaks well for the Rockwell organization. They have been excellent people to work for, and it shows throughout their lumber chain," Zachary said. He pointed out that Robert Horn of Plainview died in September of 1978, after serving as

manager of Rockwell's Plainview outlet for 58 years.

In the past few years, five managers for Rockwell Brothers had either died or retired, and their combined experience with the company was almost 250 years.

The local business will henceforth be known as Rockwell Bros. of Friona. The change was effective as of July 1, but was not announced until this week due to completion of legal technicalities.

"I plan to continue to operate the company in the same manner as I have since becoming manager of Rockwell Bros. We will retain the same employees, and will endeavor to serve the area's needs to the best of our abilities," said Zachary, who has been associated with the company since 1965.

Carolyn Dement is bookkeeper for the company, and Thomas Villalobos is the third employee.

The beginning of the local lumber company coincides with the date generally associated with the age of Friona. Both trace their origin to the year 1907.

TGSPB Board Sets Election

Grain sorghum producers in a 29-county area of the Texas High Plains will elect four members to the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board on September 15.

Terms of four current board members expire at that time. They are E.C. Witten of Edmonson; A.W. Anthony, Jr., of Friona; John Gilbreath, Hart; and Don Nelson of Tulia. All incumbents are eligible for re-election to the six-year, non-salaried position as long as they are bona fide grain sorghum producers.

Any person in the 29-county

TGSPB area who produces grain sorghum and is subject to the board assessment is eligible to vote, including owners of farms and their tenants and sharecroppers. Any person eligible to vote is also eligible to make nominations for director.

Qualified persons wishing to have their name placed in nomination for membership on the board may do so by application to the organization, signed by himself and ten others who are also eligible to vote.

All nominations must be filed by August 15, at the TGSPB office, 1708-A 15th, Lubbock, Texas 79401 to allow time for adding their name to the ballot. Forms are available at that office.

Ballots will be mailed to voters and must be returned to the TGSPB office by September 15. Any person qualified to vote who does not receive a ballot by September 2, may obtain one at his local County Agent's office.

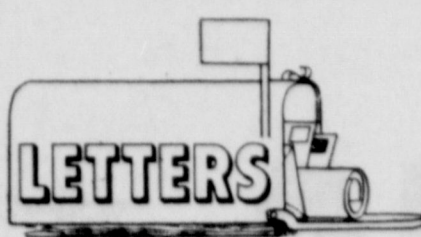

FRIONA FLASHBACKS

....from the files of The Friona Star

50 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 2, 1929

The largest wheat harvest the Friona country has ever experienced is now practically over with the exception of perhaps a few scattered fields. An inquiry revealed that 470 cars of wheat had been shipped from Friona on Tuesday, with an average load of 1550 bushels.

Within the next few weeks Friona can boast of one of the largest and most up to date picture show houses in this part of the state and our local produce merchant, H.P. Eberling, will have sole control of the business.

45 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 10, 1934

It appears that no one knows for a certainty whether or not Federal Highway 60, which is also State Highway 33, will be hard surfaced across Parmer County or even any part of, and should this be definitely known, no one knows when it will be done. One of the hopeful facts is that the portion of State No. 7 that crosses Bailey County is receiving considerable attention and State Highway engineer Guy R. Johnston of Lubbock, has written to Mayor Reeve, sending him a copy of a resolution and asking that it be adopted by the city and incorporated in its records.

40 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 11, 1939

On Thursday night of last week as Miss Rachel Terry, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Rosa Terry, and her brother, John, were enroute to visit friends in East Texas they met with a serious mishap on the highway between Paducah and Childress. A careless driver ran into her car and it turned over, landing in the bar pit at the side of the highway. None of the passengers were seriously injured but the mother received a few cuts and bruises about her face.

35 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 4, 1944

Citizens of the Lakeview School District, southeast of town, have made consolidation with the Friona Independent School District, and

a petition has been filed calling for an election in both districts to establish the fact as to whether or not the consolidation may be made.

New restrictions on farm building, announced this week, reflected the continued seriousness of the lumber supply situation and promised considerable tightening of building regulations for farmers. The County AAA Committee, must act on all applications for farm building materials and certificates approved by the committee can then be submitted to dealers.

25 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 5, 1954

Superintendent Dalton Caffey announced this week that the Friona schools will reopen September 1, which leaves less than four weeks for vacation time.

The Friona School building under construction is considerably ahead of schedule, according to Dalton Caffey, superintendent. The contract was originally let for 180 days completion period, but if no material or labor shortages occur, it should be completed in 150-160 days. Brick-laying will be finished sometime next week.

20 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 6, 1959

Richard T. Collard, formerly of San Antonio, has recently joined the Bill Sheehan law office in Friona. Collard who is 30 years of age and is married, attended high school and college in San Antonio. He received his BBA from St. Mary's University and his LLB degree from St. Mary's School of Law.

Students will enroll Thursday, August 27, for the new school year it was announced by members of the board of trustees of the Friona Independent School District at their regular meeting Monday night. Classes will officially begin Monday, August 6, 1964.

10 YEARS AGO--JULY 31, 1969

return to his alma mater as assistant football coach this fall, it was announced this week.

Curry Co. Fair Set

A long time Eastern New Mexico tradition will continue this year when the Curry County Fair opens at Clovis, N.M. September 4-8.

An important part of the Curry County Fair is the livestock division with Mike Spearman as over-all superintendent. Steve Fury will be superintendent of Department A-Beef Cattle, assisted by Lyle Hutchins.

Breeders from across the nation are encouraged to enter animals in this class stated Spearman.

All animals must be entered in the name of the owner and must have been owned by him not less than 30 days prior to the opening day of the fair, said Fury. No breeding animal can be entered or exhibited unless the same has been recorded in the recognized book of records for their respective breed and exhibitors must produce certificate of registry at the request of the superintendent.

Fury stated, first, second and third place cash premiums will be awarded to bulls in the following classes: junior calf, winter calf, senior calf, summer yearling, spring yearling, junior yearling, senior yearling and two-year old. Heifers will be classed in the same categories.

Champion and reserve champion bulls and females will receive ribbons.

There will be a class for pen of three bulls, two bulls bred and owned by exhibitors; pair of yearlings, one bull and one female; pair of calves, one bull and one female; get of sire-four animals the progeny of one sire, all owned by the exhibitor. An entry, according to Fury may include all bulls, but only two females.

Entry fees will be \$2.00 in the open class and \$4.00 in the Jr. class. Out of state beef and dairy cattle must be tested for Bangs Disease before exhibiting.

A special Char-Swiss Breeders Association Fall Show will be held during the Fair. All animals to be eligible for this breeding class must be purebred and registered with the Char-Swiss Breeders Association according to Spearman.

Exhibitors wishing further information should contact the Extension Officer in the Curry County Court House, Clovis, N.M. 88101.

Holly Sugar Reports Gain

Holly Sugar Corporation today reported net earnings of \$1,050,000, or 66 cents a common share, on revenues of \$41,849,000 for the first quarter ended June 30.

This compares with a loss of \$410,000, or 26 cents a common share, on sales of \$40,912,000 for the same period last year.

Provision for federal and state income taxes is \$398,000 compared with a credit of \$753,000 last year.

In a letter to stockholders, chairman John B. Bunker said the sale of surplus property at two California locations was the primary contributor to first quarter earnings.

He reported that sugar prices in Holly's marketing area improved slightly during the first quarter.

"This trend, together with increased processing efficiencies achieved at the corporation's California beet sugar factories, has raised operating margins over prior quarters," Bunker said.

He pointed out that while these changes are encouraging, future operating profit depends on an increase in refined sugar selling prices, something that hasn't yet occurred.

Bunker termed sugar legislation now under consideration by the congress as "poorly-structured and potentially damaging to the industry and to Holly," and "we do not support it."

He added that the duty and fee support mechanism in the present bill has proven ineffective since its inception nearly two years ago.

Investigating Farm Bureau

In the past, you have carried several articles critical of Farm Bureau. I've been in Farm Bureau for over 30 years, been a director, even been a county president. I've heard the talk on both sides.

I was not truly active in American Agriculture because of Farm Bureau. Because of my involvement, I now realize a lot of your stories are true.

Well, I've decided that someone should do something about Farm Bureau, so for the last year, I've been quietly gathering information on Farm Bureau. I would like to ask your readers to help me. We need help in all areas.

If your readers can send me any information at all, please ask them to do so.

One of my main peevies is "their" 3,000,000 farm members. They have 3,000,000 members all right, which gives them lots of money to fight anything they want, but how many are farmers. Several counties have run surveys. So far, the high has been 41 per cent farmers, to a low of 2 per cent. These are not official surveys, as their membership rolls are well-guarded, but I believe them to be accurate. Of that percentage of membership that is farmers, it would be interesting to see how many are service members (insurance, co-op, fuel, tires, batteries, hog marketing, poultry marketing, etc.) and how many are actually participating, active members of the Farm organization end of the Bureau.

I'm also interested in certain

apparent illegalities of Farm Bureau. If anyone has information on apparent tax-exempt violations or others, please send information to us. Let us know what you have. Let us know whether you wish your information to remain secret or available to an open investigation.

We will keep your readers posted on developments.

Well, farmers, my feet are a little wet. How about you?

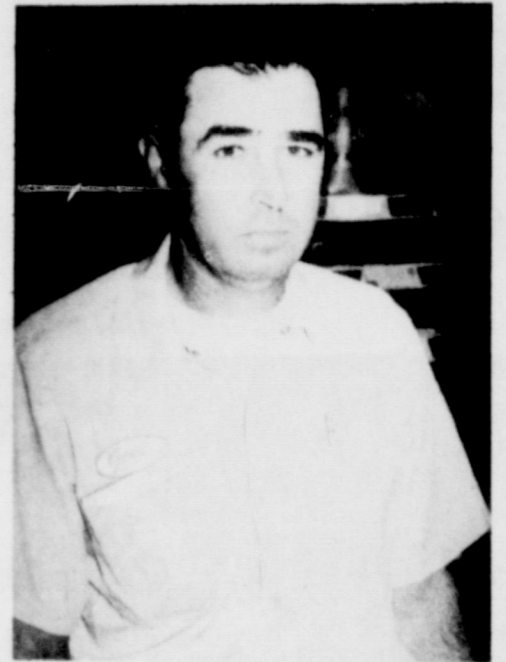
