Pogue noted that most county farm and ranch land falls into the CII and GII classes, and there are also several discount factors used in deriving a final value.

Jimmy Taylor, a board member and former county agent, said the farmers and ranchers would probably not mind a slight increase in values; but this would be too high at one time.

"They will feel they are being singled out, and Howard County's rates are already one per cent higher than the state average," he said. "If we could



Mahon also disputed the application of Findley's criticism to Lynn County.

Findley had said "plainly, the political leadership of these counties finds federal handouts to wealthy farmers something they can live with but federal food programs, Findley asserted handouts to hard-core poor something else."

In the first place, Mahon said, "we don't regard farm subsidies as handouts' but as a federal program to promote the general welfare by withholding some

Mahon also said the size of the counties and the needs of the people determine whether federal food programs will be en acted

Mahon said neither he nor the Lynn County Judge V. F. Jones knew of any cases of extreme poverty nor of cases where persons could not get jobs if they wished.


Mahon said the Lynn County agricultural agent had informed him that a sizable reduction in the area's farm workers since 1960 had lowered the number of the hard-core poor.

"Many farm workers left because of jobs in the cities," Mahon said. "At the same time, the pay for farm workers has gone up quite substantially since 1960 because of the scarcity of workers and inflation and other factors."

Mahon said a farm worker's base bay normally does not reflect side benefits such as free housing, transportation and telephone

Mahon said he was told that Texas' low rate of payments for old-age assistance made if hard «for recipients to live solely on tracks and betting, and it was that income unless supplement ed. Farmers retired on Social Security benefits likewise often find it hard to subsist on those alone, Mahon said.

Everybody's An Expert

In these difficult and uncertain times, philosophers are grateful even for small reassurances. Hence we note with some gratitude that we are not alone in our quest for a rational approach to education.

The British, God bless them, are now engrossed in a savage verbal battle over the merits of elitism versus egalitarianism in education. The question is whether the gifted student should be afforded the best possible education, or the general level of education be raised for the greatest number.

Alfred Friendly, writing in the Washington Post, characterizes the argument as akin to a convention of Kilkenny cats or a difference of among fishwives, long opinion esteemed by Britishers as the most crushingly articulate members of the realm.

The argument began reaching its vituperative best with the publication in March of an 80-page pamphlet. "Fight for Education," subtitled "A Black Paper" to make sure that no one mistook it for a government publication. It contained arguments from eminent scholars and academicians attacking "liberal" methods of education which would abolish the grammer school , and replace it with the comprehensive school in which less privileged children stand a better chance to progress to higher education.

Here in the United States, we have more than one school of thought on the subject of elitism versus egalitarianism, just as in Britain. One, at least, holds that education. particularly higher education, cannot be justified since it does nothing more than create discontent and unhappiness with one's lot. Another contends that you can always make a silk purse out of a sow's ear. Still another argues that an educated citizanry is the backbone of a democratic society - leading others to retort that we're in the fix we're in because of overeducated people.

The best aspect of this argument is that everyone can have his say without fear of being contradicted too successfully. Since the intellectuals can't agree, the non-scholars can speak with just about as much authority and with much more colorful invective.

Squabble Over Sessions

Observation on Austin's Capitol Hill in the month of May in odd-numbered years is the best existing argument for amending the Texas Constitution to provide for annual legislative sessions. This has been attempted before. only to be rejected by the voters, but the need and urgency are becom-

ing increasingly obvious. There is simply not enough time in a four-month biennial regular session to handle thoughtfully and deliberately the hundreds of legislative actions called for by accelerating social and economic changes affecting a \$3-billion-a-year state government. There is not enough time for committee hearings, staff studies, for individual legislators to get more than a smattering of understanding of matters outside some specialized or area interests, for clarifying debate, for feedback from public opinion on pending measures.

It is appalling to watch bills contrary to the general public interest slipped through the confusion

generated by haste. It is painfully frustrating to see good bills, urgently needed for efficient and effective government and the state's wellbeing, shunted aside for at least a two-year delay because it is so easy for minority opposition to keep them off the crowded calendar of legislative work.

Worst of all, we are now seeing once again, as in the previous Connally administration, an upsetting struggle over whether to operate under the constitutionally intended biennial budget or a constitutionally permissible one-year budget. If the one-year budget is again resorted to, as appears probable, with a special session next year to approve the second year's budget and general appropriation bill, that may become customary practice whether annual sessions are formally adopted.

Holmes Alexander School Needs, Regardless Of Race

WARM SPRINGS, Va. - Call him an improver of the breed, human and equine. He is Erwin S. (Shad) Solomon, former principal in the

Virginia public school system, former college athletic coach, proprietor of a horse-raising farm and the threeterm Commonwealth Attorney for Bath County - an Allegheny Eden for the very rich and the very poor.

Shad Solomon is building what may be a landmark equal-opportunity case. growing out of what must be the most gorgeously beautiful rural ghetto in the nation, a land of spectacular scenery and squalid shacks.

MR. SOLOMON'S CASE, however. takes place in Federal courtrooms of the Western District of Virginia, and is prosaically listed as Civil Action No. 68-C-13-H, Burruss et al v Wilkerson. Robert Burruss and his coplaintiffs are parents of school children, and Woodrow Wilkerson is superintendent of public education. The suit contends that "accident of birth" has deprived the children here of equal protection under Section 129 of the Virginia Constitution which reads

General Assembly shall The establish and maintain an efficient system of public free schools throughout the State."

MR. SOLOMON argues with a wealth of supportive statistics that the Bath County system - or any such rural school system - perpetuates the poverty from generation to generation. Of the 139 first-graders to enroll 12 years ago, only 23 graduated - 17 per cent against a State average of 34 per cent. In 1968 only 18 high school graduates went on to college from Bath County - 29 per cent against a State average of 51 per cent. The reason for the dropout rate is easy to trace. The elementary schools here do not have principals or assistant principals. There is only one guidance counselor for 1,020 pupils. The country does not have a public library, nor, a community center, nor a theater, nor public pools, golf courses or tennis courts. Despite the nature of the local industry, the high school student is not offered courses in technical training. food service, power mechanics or building trades.

IN A PRELIMINARY hearing last November, Federal Judge Ted Dalton declined to dismiss the case and passed it along to a three-judge panel which will soon convene. Judge Dalton noted, "It is clear beyond question that discrimination based on poverty is no more permissible than racial discrimination, and that discrimination on the part of State officials need not be intentional to be condemned under the equal protection clause-State policies imposing ... conditions which operate harshly on the poor must clearly be justified to be constitutuonally permissible."

Finch Orders Drug Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) - Welfare Secretary Robert H. Finch. overruled then reversed himself on a decision to withdraw from the market a drug considered

The drug is Panalba, an antibiotic marketed by the Upjohn Co. the Federal Food and Drug Administration says the antibiotic can cause allergic reactions, liver disease and blood disorders, some fatal. Dr. Herbert C. Ley Jr., FDA

commissioner, said he was prepared to decertify the drug when Finch ordered him last Friday morning to hold a hearing instead.

Upjohn opposed withdrawing the drug, wanted a hearing, and Finch had met with company officials four days before his order, a House government operations subcommittee was told uesday.


Finch reversed himself within hours after a subcommittee investigator began probing the case, FDA officials said. A subcommittee member, Ren. Benjamin S. Rosenthal, D-N.Y. added, "I'm offended when I'm made aware that the secretary intervened on a matter principally based on scientific logic. Finch declined comment and also refused an invitation to appear before the subcommittee today.

LOS ANGELES (APT -Methodist ministers and laymen furnished bail to free three Negro militants jailed after interrupting a worship service Sunday at the First United Methodist Church.

Seven juveniles arrested with the three adults remained in custody. All were booked on suspicion of felony conspiracy to disrupt a religious meeting. For 15 minutes, while the others guarded doorways, one of the adults presented a 'black manifesto" - demand for \$500 million in reparations from churches and synagogues for racial injustices.

The Rev. Don Boyd, pastor called it merely an interruption and did not make charges against the group. About \$170 for bail was collected during a "free will offering" Tuesday with about \$30 more collected from other Methodist ministers and laymen during the day.
