School District Raises Tax Values On Rural Land

Tax values of farm and ranch land in the Big Spring Independent School District were raised Tuesday night by as much as from 33 to 100 per cent, and personal property including residences, equipment and livestock were added to the tax rolls.

The additional values if property came in a split-decision vote after the trustees heard a report from Davis and Wilson Appraisers and recommendations from the land classing committee which represented the Big Spring, Coahoma and Forsan schools, plus Howard County and Howard County Junior College in a land revaluation program.

Cultivated farm land throughout the county is graded C-I, C-II and C-III, and range land is classed G-I, G-II and G-III. The new values of cultivated land are \$80, \$70 and \$60 per acre,

and \$30, \$20 and \$10 for ranch land.
Old values for cultivated land were \$50, \$40 and \$30 per acre, and \$20, \$15 and \$10 for ranch land. The land classing committee recommended that val-

ues of land not be changed.
The board also voted to value farm residences at 75 per cent of cost, and to place farm equipment on the rolls at \$10 per cultivated acre. Livestock would be valued at \$100 per

animal unit, with an animal unit being either one cow, five sheep or seven goats.
The trustees noted that farmers and ranchers would be taxed on the amount of equipment and livestock the land is

capable of supporting, and that the person taxed should notify the tax collector if he does not own that amount of equipment or livestock for which he is being taxed.
Joe Moss, board president,

recommended the schedule of \$80-\$70-\$60 for cultivated land and \$30-\$20-\$10 for ranch land.
Jay Wilson and Joe Pogue, representing Davis and Wilson Appraisers, showed the board various schedules of valuing

lands according to market value and net return of investment to the land. Wilson recommended a schedule of \$90-\$80-\$70 for farm land and \$40-\$30-\$20 for ranch land, but said Moss' proposal would be a sufficient increase.

Pogue noted that most county farm and ranch land falls into the C-II and C-III classes, and there are also several discount factors used in deriving a final value.

Jimmy Taylor, a board member and former county agent, said the farmers and ranchers would probably not mind a slight increase in values, but this would be too high at one time.

"They will feel they are being singled out, and Howard County's rates are already one per cent higher than the state average," he said. "If we could (See SCHOOL, Page 8-A, C. 4)

LAND CLASSING PANEL RECOMMENDATIONS

Favors No Hike In Value

The land classing committee for a countywide revaluation program Tuesday recommended that rural personal property be added to tax rolls, but did not favor an increase in the value of farm and ranch land.

The committee met Tuesday in the Howard County Courtroom with the commissioners and officials of Howard County Junior College, and Big Spring, Coahoma and Forsan school districts, the taxing agencies which ordered the

valuation.
Joe Pogue and Jay Wilson, both of Wilson and Davis Appraisers, Houston, the company performing the revaluation for \$18,500, told the group how the revaluation program was conducted, and offered suggestions

on how rural property should be valued.
Members of the classing committee and the agencies they represent are Harold Talbot, Big Spring Independent School District; Lawrence Adkins, Howard County; Clay

Reid, Coahoma schools; Bill Estes, HCJC; and R. V. Fryar, Forsan schools.
Talbot, speaking for the committee, said the group recommended that the current value of farm and ranch land (See LAND, Page 8-A, Col. 7)

\$10,000 PAID

Man, Woman Face Ransom Demand Raps

BALTIMORE (AP) — Federal warrants have been issued for the arrest of a man and woman, charging them with interstate demand of \$10,000 ransom for the release of a 22-year-old social worker held in an apartment for three days.

Anne K. Jenkins was freed Tuesday after her father had flown to Baltimore from Waterloo, Iowa, the night before and given the money to a woman in a taxi in a sidewalk rendezvous.

The warrants name Edward L. Dull, 39, also known as John E. Calvert and Marie Calvert, but the name of the woman was being changed to Alvina Marie Sprague. Paul R. Kramer, deputy U.S. Attorney for Maryland, said she was believed to be about 21 years old.

The federal charges are based on telephone calls made to Miss Jenkins' father in Iowa.

Nixon Will Talk Peace Prospects

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon's response to what associates say is a public demand for a summation of the Vietnam situation goes before the nation tonight to give what is expected to be a cautiously optimistic assessment of peace prospects.

PRESIDENT TALKS AT 9

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon's address on Vietnam will be carried by all three major radio-television networks and Mutual Broadcasting System radio tonight starting at 9 p.m. (Big Spring time).

White House press secretary Ronald L. Ziegler said the speech, to be broadcast live at 10 p.m. EDT on national television and radio, will contain some new material but cautioned against expecting an announcement of a peace breakthrough.

Nixon associates also said the President's speech will outline

how matters now stand in light of the Viet Cong's 10-point peace proposal rather than announcing the breaking of new ground.

A high government official said Nixon will stress mutual withdrawal of troops and reduction of the fighting as moves the United States believes must have priority in the Paris peace talks.

This official said there would be no pledge for unilateral U.S. troop reductions.

The President's speech is expected to reflect the administration's feeling that the Hanoi-backed Viet Cong proposals, while generally unacceptable, offer some negotiable points.

One of these contains the first tacit public admission by Hanoi

that it has troops in the South.

No associate expects the President to hint acceptance of the Viet Cong proposal for a provisional coalition government to replace the elected Saigon regime immediately. But Saigon itself has expressed an interest in a proposal for an exchange of prisoners, another point in the proposal.

An indication the President is preparing an early formal answer to the Viet Cong came when Ziegler said Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge will arrive during the afternoon for new instructions before flying back to Paris Thursday. The next Paris meeting is Friday.

Food-Money Situation Denied By Rep. Mahon

WASHINGTON (AP) — Rep. George Mahon, D-Tex., has denied that county officials in his Texas district deliberately exclude hard-core poor from federal food programs while farmers receive nearly \$9 million in crop subsidies.

Mahon said he disagreed with the premise of Rep. Paul Findley, R-Ill., that there is a connection between the amount of crop subsidies to farmers and the availability of federal food programs for the poor.

Mahon said, however, he is investigating the needs of Lynn County (Tahoka) residents in Texas.

Findley told the House Mon-

day Lynn County had no federal food programs — either food stamps or direct distribution of surplus foods — although its farmers received \$8.9 million in crop subsidies in 1967.

Of the 425 counties in the United States which offer no federal food programs, Findley asserted Lynn County farmers got the most in federal farm payments. He put the hard-core poor population at 25 per cent, or 2,282. He defined a hard-core poverty family as one whose income was \$1,200 a year or below.

Mahon, chairman of the House Appropriations Committee, said he considered Findley's juxtaposition of the two criteria "inconsistent."

Mahon also disputed the application of Findley's criticism to Lynn County.

Findley had said "plainly, the political leadership of these counties finds federal handouts to wealthy farmers something they can live with but federal handouts to hard-core poor something else."

In the first place, Mahon said, "we don't regard farm subsidies as handouts" but as a federal program to promote the general welfare by withholding some crops.

Mahon also said the size of the counties and the needs of the people determine whether federal food programs will be enacted.

'Neigh' Boys Bury Horse Betting Bill

AUSTIN (AP) — Horse race betting took another legislative defeat Tuesday, amid more than the usual quota of puns, loud laughter and good-humored taunts from the floor.

The House defeated, 57-84, San Antonio Rep. Glenn Kothmann's proposed constitutional change allowing horse race betting in 10 counties.

One interested onlooker was Sen. V. E. "Red" Berry, San Antonio, who has been trying ever since 1961 to get pari-mutuel betting through the legislature.

Kothmann's original proposal would have allowed voters in Harris, Bexar, Galveston and Webb counties to decide whether to have horse race betting. Amendments were added to include Cameron, Willacy, Val Verde, Kinney, Maverick and Sutton counties. All the counties voted in favor of horse race betting in a non-binding referendum last May. Statewide pari-mutuel betting was rejected by nearly 100,000 votes.

"I don't know about your tax bill, but I've got mine right here," Kothmann said to the cheers of his fellow representatives. He referred to provisions in his bill levying a tax of 3 1/2 per cent on the first \$400,000 and 7 per cent on amounts over \$400,000 received in pari-mutuel pools each day.

"Would you say a vote for your bill is a vote against a personal income tax?" asked Rep. John Traeger, Seguin, to much whooping and hollering.

Rep. Curtis Graves, Houston, said Texas already has race tracks and betting, and it was simply a matter of whether they would be regulated by the state or not.

"If this is the sport of kings and kings can afford it, that's fine, but the working man has shown he can't afford it," said Rep. Dave Allred, whose father, the late Gov. James Allred, fought horse race betting in the 1930s.

"Vote 'neigh,'" Allred punned as the vote was taken.

Flap Over GI Underwear Unveiled By Transcript

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Army's \$1.5 billion supplemental budget request has run afoul of congressmen who contend it wrongfully contains money for GI winter underwear.

The flap over underwear—and over insignia for uniforms—occurred in closed door hearings before a House appropriations subcommittee last month. A censored transcript was released today.

Reps. Glenn R. Davis, R-Wis., and Edward P. Jepscomb, R-Calif., said the request for an

addition to the Army's \$24.9 billion budget for fiscal 1969 is billed as money for Vietnam war costs and pay hikes.

Only these two items are exempt from the spending ceiling imposed by Congress for the current fiscal year, they said.

Rep. George W. Andrews, D-Ala., however, sped a \$1.5 million increase for winter underwear and a \$3.3 million, increase for insignia, both applicable to servicemen outside Vietnam as well as those in the combat zone.

'Algiers Motel' Murder Trial

MASON, Mich. (AP) — The judge has ruled that a challenged statement by the defendant may be used as evidence in the "Algiers Motel" murder trial of a former Detroit policeman.

The ruling was made Tuesday by Circuit Judge William J. Beer some three hours after an all-white jury of 12 women and one man was chosen to hear the case of Ronald J. August, 31.

August, who is white, is accused of first-degree murder in the death of one of three Negro youths killed at the motel during Detroit's 1967 riots.

In the statement, August described to superior officers how 19-year-old Aubrey Pollard was killed by a shotgun blast. August reportedly claimed the shooting was in self-defense.

Defense attorneys argued against allowing the disputed statement to be admitted as evidence, contending that August had not been advised of his constitutional right to remain silent.

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Age Of 'MOD' Girls Arriving In Saigon

SAIGON (AP) — The age of the "mod" girl has arrived in Saigon. She likes brightly colored miniskirts, low-cut blouses and bellbottom slacks.

The mod girl is a teenager who goes to school by day in her traditional flowing white silk ao dai, then switches to her mini-skirt and sets off downtown. Sometimes she rides a Japanese motorbike decorated with psychedelic decals.

In addition to miniskirt and blouse, the mod teenager likes matching leather shoes, orange purse, necklaces, bracelets and rings. Her black hair is worn long with bangs that hang down to her eyes.

The lure for themods — a Western phenomenon that hit Saigon last year — is a 10-square block area of arcades, food stalls, ice cream shops, restaurants, cafes and movie theaters.

In this area the bar girl flourishes.

For one thing, U.S. troops who kept the bars roaring have been withdrawn to the suburbs, and there are strict regulations governing U.S. currency.

Night clubs and cabarets now cater to a largely Vietnamese clientele. Many bars are being converted to more profitable snack shops and cafes. One of Saigon's seetier dives has been transformed into the "Peace Restaurant," a mod hangout.

A dozen new boutiques have opened in the downtown area, offering the latest French miniskirts and dresses, lingerie, and colorful Japanese silks in psychedelic patterns.

The traditional Vietnamese dress, the long, flowing ao dai with pantaloons, hasn't been standing still either. Already imaginative tailors have moved in with a "mini ao dai" which adds lace fringe to the pantaloons, and shortens the flowing robe to just below the knee. This style is disapproved — as are the miniskirts — by the elders.

KUALA LUMPUR (AP) — Fighting between Chinese and Malay mobs continued in parts of Malaysia's capital today despite a round-the-clock curfew ordered during rioting in which at least 100 persons were believed killed.

Smith Won't Scold, Whip

AUSTIN (AP) — Gov. Preston Smith said Tuesday "it would not be proper or possible" to decide now whether he would veto a one-year bill which Senate-House budget writers are preparing.

But the governor told a news conference "I don't want a one-year bill and that's that. We just aren't going to have a one-year bill, I don't think."

Smith's statement was as close as he has come to threatening legislators with a veto of a one-year spending proposal. He reiterated, however, that he has not told anyone he would veto the measure.

Smith said the preparation of a one-year appropriations bill "contravenes the spirit, if not the letter, of the Constitution."

And he said it would not save the state money to write a one-year, instead of the customary two-year bill which Smith supports.

A conference committee of 10 started work on a one-year bill after Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes and Speaker Gus Mutscher endorsed the idea.

Told of Smith's stand, Barnes said "I don't have any comment."

Mutscher said "The only comment on that is that we are making every effort we can to exercise our responsibilities. There is no question we had a problem with his (Smith's) tax bill and the lack of support we're trying to work this out as best we can in the interest of the people of Texas."

Barnes and Mutscher went to the speaker's office shortly after Smith's news conference finished. Smith said he was "not inclined at this date to try to scold, whip or whip the legislature into line."

He said there were several alternatives to the one-year bill.

He said he could use line-item vetoes, cutting single projects or appropriations, let a one-year bill go into law without signing it, request the legislature to recall it and make changes — there are many alternatives.

Split Vote OKs NS Beer Permit

It required a vote by Mayor Arnold Marshall to approve first reading for one on-premises beer consumption permit Tuesday, third reading on another was tabled, and emergency reading on a third was held in abeyance.

City commissioners were divided on the request of Thurman Randle for a permit to sell beer at the Gomez Cafe, 508 NW 4th St., after a discussion on whether beer would also be offered in the ballroom next door. The application had previously been disapproved by Police Chief Jay Banks, who said residents in the area opposed it and that it had been a troublesome place in the past.

Banks pointed out the commission had previously turned down a request for a location across the street from this one.

"You can't put a skunk, a dog, a rabbit and a lion in the same place without having some problems," Randle told the commission, in saying that the Northside residents need "a nice place to go."

He said there is only one place in that section of town for all residents.

In answer to a question by Commissioner Jimmy Morehead, Banks said there are four places open on the Northside area.

Commissioner George Zachariah made the motion to approve Randle's request on first reading, which was seconded by Commissioner Garner McAdams, and both voted in favor of it. Commissioners Walter Stroup and Morehead voted against it, and the mayor's vote in favor gave first reading approval.

Capt. Richard Rossmiller and Capt. William C. Oberlin requested emergency reading approval for their on-premises permit for the Silent Woman Inn, 217 S. Main. They outlined the nature of the restaurant, and said they wanted to open June 5. The normal three readings of the ordinance would not leave them adequate time to get a Liquor Control Board license, they said.

Dixiecrats Push Job Corps Slash

WASHINGTON (AP) — President Nixon for the second time has turned back congressional challenges to his domestic policies. Defections of Southern Democrats to the GOP side was again a key factor.

The latest victory came as the Senate turned back, 52-40, a Democratic-backed resolution calling on the President to delay his decision to shut down 39 Job Corps Centers by July 1.

All 40 Republicans present Tuesday opposed the resolution. They were joined by 12 Democrats, nine of them southerners. This gave the administration a perfect record in two major tests so far in Congress — both

because of setbacks it suffered in the parliamentary election Saturday. This inflamed communal passions and fears that are always close to the surface in multiracial Malaysia, but it was not known just what touched off the first trouble.

Associated Press newsman Brian Gomez saw a mob of 3,000 Malay youths storm a suburban village Tuesday night, "leaving a trail of bodies, smashed shops and burned cars."

Two persons were reported killed by soldiers who fired at persons stoning them from a downtown apartment.

The official casualty toll so far was 25 dead and 58 injured, but police reports indicated at least 100 had been killed.

"There are bodies all over Kuala Lumpur," one police source said.

Heavy smoke billowed up from shops, houses and Malay kampongs set afire throughout the city of 500,000 people. Several thousand refugees poured into police stations, seeking sanctuary from the riots which destroyed or threatened their homes.

RIVAL GANGS Reports from around the city indicated that some of the violence had shifted from communal battles to warfare between rival gangs from the same ethnic community. Chinese were battling Chinese in some places, and sources said they appeared split along political lines.

The violence apparently stemmed from the refusal of the Malaysian Chinese Association (MCA), the Chinese member of the ruling Alliance coalition, to take part in a new government

Government leaders met with Chinese and Malay groups in an effort to end the hostilities. Tan Siew Sin, president of the Malaysian Chinese Assn., told newsmen he was prepared to participate in the new government, but he said nothing about this in a television appeal for calm.

Since the Malaysian Federation was formed in 1963, Prime Minister Tunku Abdul Rahman has led a coalition government made up of the United Malay National Organization, of UMNO, the MCA and the Malaysian Indian Congress. The MCA always a junior partner to UMNO, lost 20 of the 23 races in which it entered candidates.

MCA withdrawal from the government meant an all-Malay cabinet to govern the nation of 4.2 million Malays, three million Chinese and one million Indians and Pakistanis.

Ersatz Ham Lickin' Good

CHICAGO (AP) — It may look like ham, it may taste like ham but it may in fact be soybeans. Nutritionally, it may be better than ham.

The ersatz ham, along with chicken and corn beef made of protein derived primarily from soybeans, was shown today for sampling at the annual meeting of the Institute of Food Technologists.

Pork and bacon substitutes also are made of soybeans, and lamb is being developed.

William J. Downey, a vice president of Fritzsche Brothers, Inc., New York, which discolored them "the food of tomorrow."

Since the products are tailor made, he said, in an interview, they can excel the edibles they simulate in terms of nutrition.

But products cannot be sold to the public on the basis of their nutritional value alone, so it is necessary to make the substitutes look and taste like something else, Downey explained.

Robert J. Eiserle, another vice president of Fritzsche, said the substitute products would be in food stores in five to 10 years.

The price will go down with mass production so the poor can afford them, he said.

Dr. R. F. Robinson, technical director of Worthington Food, Worthington, Ohio, said hamburger meat is only 60 per cent protein, but the soybean substitute is 90 per cent protein.

He said the protein meat substitutes have less fat than the real thing and retain their texture better during cooking.

Commission Buys Backhoe, Pipe

City commissioners Tuesday accepted the low bids on two purchases — a backhoe-loader for the cemetery and parks departments, and cast iron water pipe for normal inventory requirements.

The Yellowhouse Machinery Co., of Lubbock, submitted the low bid for the backhoe — \$5,700. Four other bids were received, ranging up to \$7,028.

Jack Watkins questioned the decision to buy the new backhoe, stating he had the present equipment checked by local equipment dealers who felt it could be repaired for from \$500-800.

"It is worn but not worn out," he said, "and it has limited use at the cemetery." He said graves are dug by hand at Trinity Memorial Park, a privately operated cemetery, where more graves are opened.

"If it were used a lot, it would be different," he said. "It would be more feasible to fix it up."

"I think it ought to be bought locally, even if it is higher, but I recommend a new one not be bought," Watkins was also critical of the use of a large truck and two men being used for spraying weeds downtown.

Ernest Lillard, public works director, replied that the tractor in use at the cemetery is a 1951 model, and the backhoe is a 1957 model.

W. D. Caldwell, local contractor, said if the equipment is that old, it should have been traded off five years ago.

Roy Anderson, assistant city manager, said the backhoe is needed in parks projects, and some work had not been done because of the need for equipment.

Commissioner George Zachariah told Watkins the commission had studied the problem.

Watkins explained he is concerned at the expenses by the city, as well as the school district and the county.

On the recommendation of Anderson, the commission accepted the low bid of Lone Star Steel Co. for cast iron water pipe, and decided to order 1,584 feet of four-inch pipe at \$1.32 per foot, and 666 feet of six-inch pipe at \$1.87 per foot.

Anderson said one job is being held up for need of pipe, and the balance is for normal inventory requirements.

Astronauts Hope To Shatter Jinx

CAPE KENNEDY, Fla. (AP) — Astronauts Tom Stafford and Gene Cernan hope to break a different areas of the moon than right on schedule Sunday.

On previous flights, both have had problems getting off the launch pad, especially Stafford. On both the Gemini 6 and 9 flights, Stafford had to make the trip to the pad three times before his rocket finally was launched.

Cernan was his co-pilot on Gemini 9 and shared the delay on that one. Stafford, Cernan and John Young are to ride into space atop a Saturn 5 rocket at 12:49 p.m. EDT Sunday, heading their Apollo 10 ship into orbit around the moon.

Young, veteran of the Gemini 3 and 10 missions, has never had a launch postponement, and his fellow spacemen hope some of his luck will rub off on them. Stafford, the Apollo 10 commander, said an on-time launch is important to the mission. "We have a whole lunar operation keyed to that liftoff time," he said. "Any delay would upset our timetable and take us over the moon than planned."

A major goal is to test the lunar landing module, or LEM, in the moon's environment. Stafford and Cernan are to detach it from the command ship and descend to within nine miles of the surface to scout an area in the Sea of Tranquility where two Apollo 11 astronauts hope to land in July. Stafford, Young and Cernan planned several hours today in a spacecraft simulator. They also were to be briefed by astronaut Harrison Schmitt, a geologist who is an expert on lunar topography.

Showery weather persisted over much of West and North Texas today after still another night of thunderstorms and threats of tornadoes in the Panhandle Plains country.

Altho it is usually advisable to provide partner with assistance in discarding when the declarer is running a long suit, an exception should be made when the information is more apt to benefit the declarer. Today's hand is a good example—East's blatant signal in diamonds provided South with essential data that led to the fulfillment of the latter's six heart contract.

West opened the queen of spades and the king was played from dummy. Declarer counted 10 top tricks in spades, hearts, and clubs. It was obvious that the other two would have to come from the diamond suit. The usual procedure is to lead a small

diamond to the king and then, on the return, to put in dummy's ten—finessing West for the jack.

South began by drawing trump. East showed out on the second heart and, in an attempt to reassure his partner about the diamond situation, he discarded the nine of diamonds. This message did not fall on deaf ears, for everyone at the table was now aware that East was well-heeled in that suit.

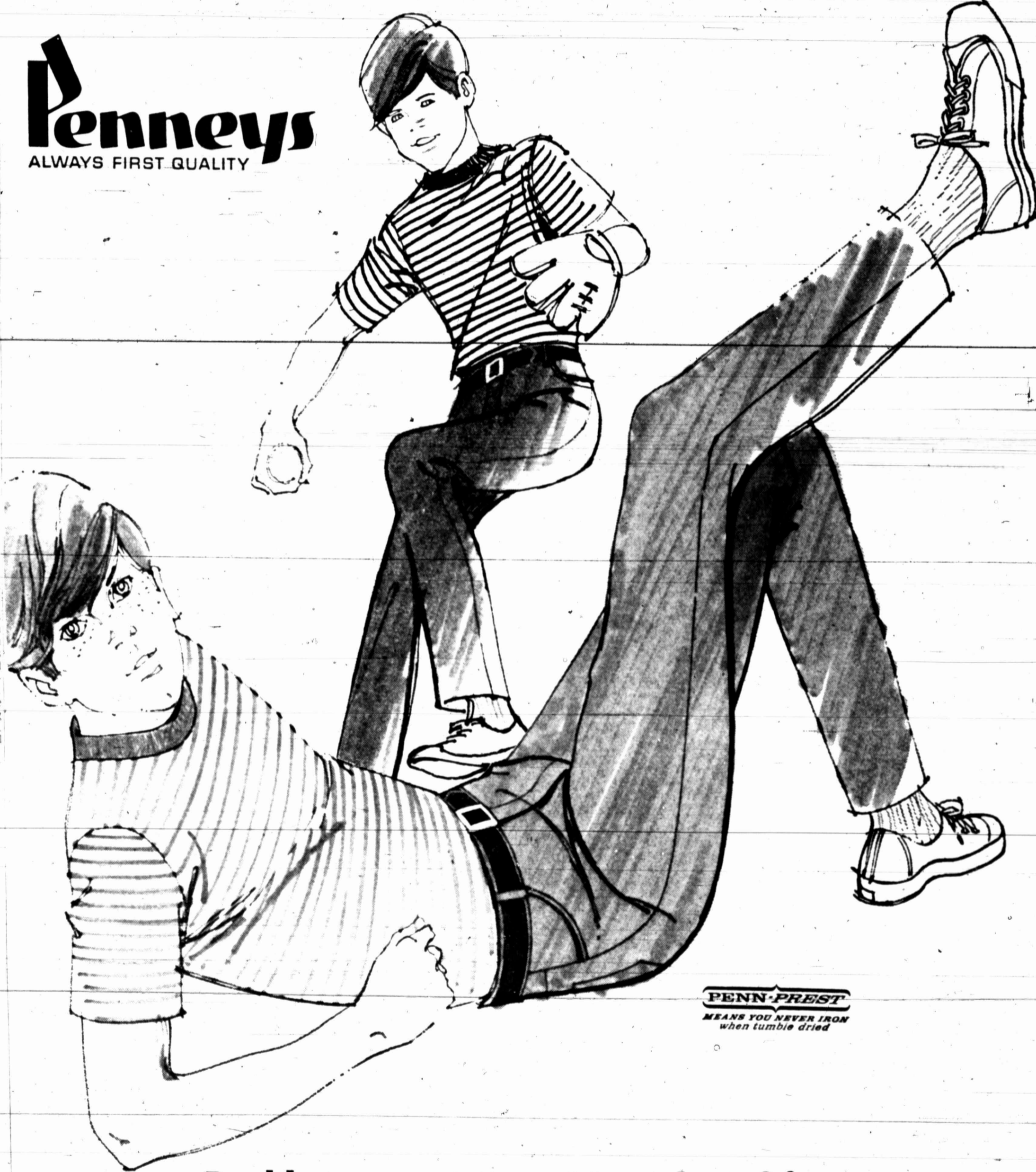
Declarer proceeded to lead out all of his hearts and East completed his echo in diamonds and discarded his remaining spades and one club. South was quite convinced from his opponent's actions that the normal play in diamonds was destined to fail, and that his only hope was to execute an endplay on East. But first, all safe avenues of exit must be removed.

A spade was led to the ace on which East discarded a club. The king of clubs was cashed and a club to declarer's ace completed the stripping operation. East was down to the A-J-8 of diamonds, while North was left with the Q-10-6 and South the K-5-2.

A small diamond was led from the closed hand and, when West showed out, the queen was played from dummy. East was in with the ace, however on the forced return, declarer took the last two tricks with the ten and king.

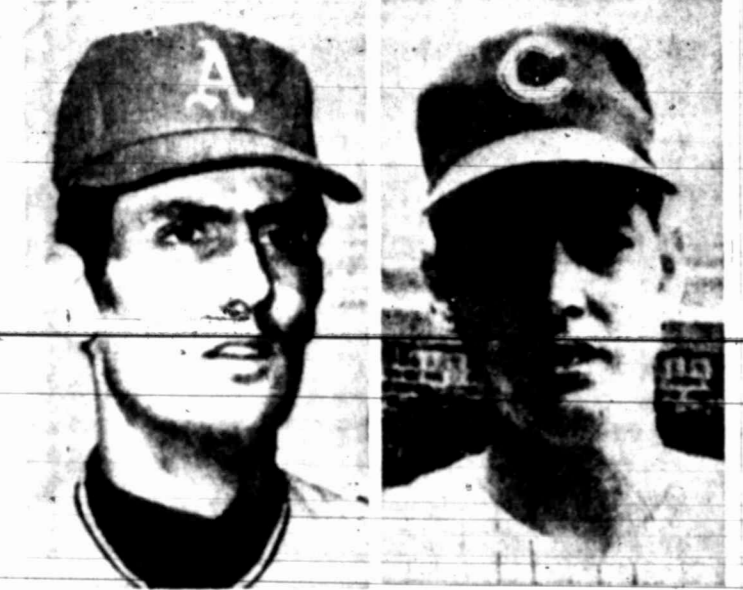
Northrup's two-run homer in the seventh, following a long rain delay, carried the Detroit Tigers from behind to a 3-1 triumph over the Chicago White Sox.

Stan Hollmig, one of three baseball scouts to look in on the Big Spring-Bulene, thriller here last weekend, was part of a happening in 1960.

That was the year the Philadelphia Phillies, under Eddie Sawyer, a team with ordinary skills, put it all together and won the National League pennant, thereby earning the dubious honor of opposing the New York Yankees in the World Series.

The Yankees proceeded to score only 11 runs in the entire set, yet swept four straight games from the Phils.

An exhausting pennant scramble, which saw the Phils lose six games to the Brooklyn Dodgers in the final week and then nail down the flag on the final day, probably had a great deal to do with the Phils' performance in the post-season classic that year.

Hollmig says that (1) Curt Simmons was probably a better hitter than Robin Roberts, (2) That Russ Meyer, one of the Phils' starting pitchers that year had an undesired reputation as a "red-neck," (3) that Del Ennis was probably the most under-rated player in baseball, and (4) Roberts was criticized in some far-flung parts of the baseball domain for not throwing at batters, yet his control was so perfect that he could back them away from the plate without hitting them.

Other players on the 1960 Philadelphia club included catcher Andy Seminick, second baseman Mike Goliat, shortstop Grandville Hamner, left fielder Dick Sisler, first baseman Eddie Waitkus, third baseman Willie Jones and center fielder Richie Ashburn.

The Phils, of course, couldn't have made it to the series without the help of relief pitcher Jim Konstanty, who in that one season was as great a fireman as baseball has ever had.

Hollmig will probably be remembered locally more for his football talents.

In 1945, he accompanied a Hondo Air Base team here to play a Southwestern University team in a post-season game sponsored by the American Business Club. Hondo won and Hollmig was a major factor in the service team's success. When baseball dangled a bonus offer before his eyes, he took it.

Majestic Prince Is Hard To Type Cast

BALTIMORE (AP) — Majestic Prince is a hard horse to type cast. The only thing he does consistently is win.

"He might be any kind of horse," Chick Lang, director of racing at Pimlico, said today. "But so far, it's a freak the way he does things."

"He's won on the lead, coming from behind, from the outside, from the inside, and on fast and muddy tracks—at distances from three-quarters of a mile to a mile and a quarter."

Majestic Prince is unbeaten with eight victories including the Kentucky Derby, and Saturday he goes after No. 9 in the \$150,000-added Preakness at Pimlico.

"There's no telling how great Majestic Prince might be," Lang said. "But his future is all in front of him; his past record speaks for itself. How can you knock a horse that wins eight straight?"

Lang is just as enthusiastic when he rates Bill Hartack, the only jockey ever to ride Majestic Prince.

"Hartack doesn't seem to make mistakes in the big races," said Lang, who is once agent for the controversial jockey.

"It's almost as if he has a blueprint, so he'll know when he's going and what he's doing," Lang also noted that Hartack has been riding at Pimlico since last Saturday, winning five of his first 12 races while getting the feel of the track.

"You might say Hartack is coming up well for the race," Lang said. "Both the horse and jockey are sharp."

Despite such high praise, Lang still predicts a closely contested race in the 1 1/2-mile Preakness.

"First of all," he said, "Arts and Letters lost only by a neck in the Derby. Top Knight, last year's 2-year-old champion who looked impressive in winning the Flamingo and the Florida Derby, had a bad race in the Derby. But that may have been because he had been off for five weeks."

Finch Orders Drug Hearing

WASHINGTON (AP) — Welfare Secretary Robert H. Finch overruled then reversed himself on a decision to withdraw from the market a drug considered by federal experts as unsafe.

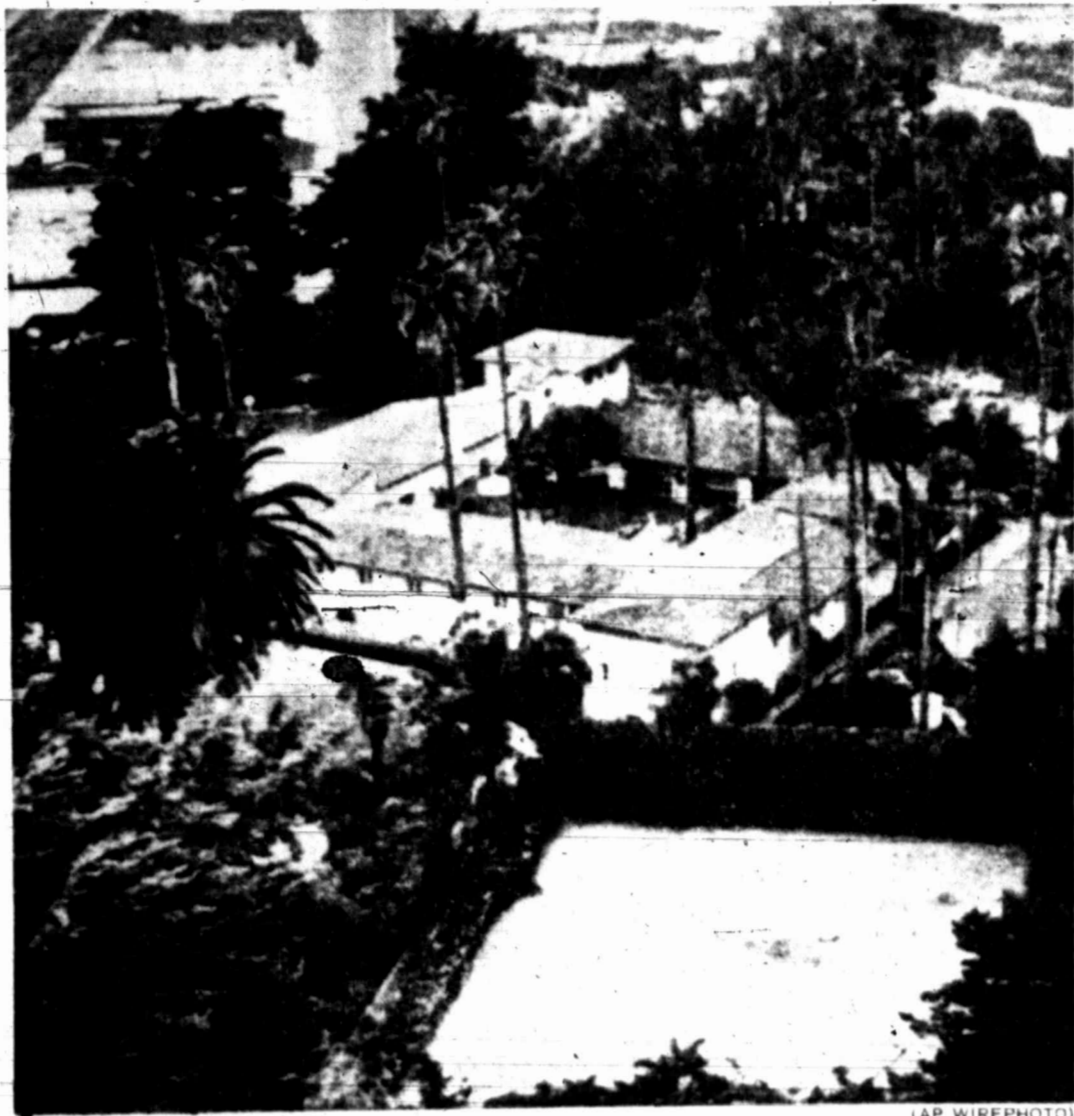
The drug is Panalba, an antibiotic marketed by the Upjohn Co. to the Federal Food and Drug Administration says the antibiotic can cause allergic reactions, liver disease and blood disorders, some fatal.

Dr. Herbert C. Ley Jr., FDA commissioner, said he was prepared to decertify the drug when Finch ordered him last Friday morning to hold a hearing instead.

Upjohn opposed withdrawing the drug, wanted a hearing, and Finch had met with company officials four days before his order, a House government operations subcommittee was told Tuesday.

Finch reversed himself within hours after a subcommittee investigator began probing the case, FDA officials said. A subcommittee member, Rep. Benjamin S. Rosenthal, D-N.Y., added, "I'm offended when I'm made aware that the secretary intervened on a matter principally based on scientific logic."

Finch declined comment and also refused an invitation to appear before the subcommittee today.

Research Bureau Gets New Chief

AUSTIN — Prof. Stanley A. Arbingast, geographer and resources specialist at the University of Texas at Austin, will become director of the UT Bureau of Business Research Sept. 1.

Dr. Arbingast, now associate director of the Bureau, will succeed Dr. John B. Stockton, who has headed the research agency since 1949.

Under retirement rules established by the board of regents, Dr. Stockton will relinquish his administrative duties to return to full-time teaching as a professor of business statistics.

City Insures Paving Young, Accepts Three Assessments

City Commissioners Tuesday voted to accept the assessment program on three lots along Young Street, across 12th to 16th, to insure that the three-block unit is included in the current paving assessment program.

The city's cost will be \$1,111.82, according to Ernest Lillard, public works director.

W. D. Caldwell, contractor for the paving program, told commissioners that six property owners of 16 involved in the project would not sign paving agreements. He said he would take three of them, if the city would take the other three.

Lillard said this is the fourth time the street has been included in a paving project, as it had been dropped out in previous years due to inability to get the property owners to sign up. He urged that the city accept the assessment, in order to get the job done.

Another problem involved the paving of Phillips Road Roy Bennett, with frontage of 536.60 feet, indicated he was willing to pay a certain amount of the paving, but a large portion of the lot is of such narrow width, he cannot use it.

Lillard said the city could accept a deed for the narrow portion of the lot, amounting to 325 feet for a paving cost of \$1,413.75; or leave title to the narrow section and charge Bennett only half the assessment, at a paving cost to the city of \$1,167.15. Accepting deed to the property, Lillard explained, would give the city control of a culvert opening and prevent any future building on Big Spring Creek, insuring that it remains open for good drainage. The commission agreed to accept the deed to the land.

Caldwell also told the commission that there are some other blocks in the paving program that he has been unable to sign up, and he would bring them to the commission for a decision.

Commissioner George Zachariah asked if the program could be extended, and Caldwell assured him it could. City Manager Larry Crow said the

city has some more paving petitions signed and these will be presented to the commissioners of Boykin Road, in the Silver Hills Addition.

In other business, the commission approved an amendment to the traffic code of city ordinance calling for the use of the City Park for the go-cart race Saturday and Sunday.

Reappointed H. W. Wright and John L. Taylor to the board of the Colorado River Municipal Water District.

Authorized the mayor to sign an agreement, giving the city for damages.

Furnish Bail To Free Three

LOS ANGELES (AP) — Methodist ministers and laymen furnished bail to free three Negro militants jailed after interrupting a worship service Sunday at the First United Methodist Church.

Seven juveniles arrested with the three adults remained in custody. All were booked on suspicion of felony conspiracy to disrupt a religious meeting.

For 15 minutes, while the others guarded doorways, one of the adults presented a "black manifesto" demand for \$500 million in reparations from churches and synagogues for racial injustices.

The Rev. Don Boyd, pastor, called it merely an interruption and did not make charges against the group. About \$170 for bail was collected during a "free will offering" Tuesday with about \$30 more collected from other Methodist ministers and laymen during the day.

The three militants who were ordered to appear for arraignment Thursday are Sandra E. Scott, 24, Ronald Wilkins, 22, and Harold J. Welton Jr., 18.

One of the district ministers of their group feel the manifesto has some basic points that merit church examination.

The manifesto was first presented in the Riverside Church in New York City by black militant James Forman.

Israel Pays For Attack

WASHINGTON (AP) — Israel has paid \$3.5 million as compensation for 164 U.S. sailors injured in the Israeli jet and torpedo attack on the American communication ship Liberty during the 1967 Arab-Israeli war.

It was the second payment in the incident and it was made April 2, the State Department said in an announcement Tuesday.

An earlier payment of \$3.7 million was made for the families of the 24 men killed in the attack 15 miles north of the Sinai peninsula. The United States is reportedly asking another \$7 million for damages to the ship.
