NIXON, THIEU TO TALK POLICY ON MIDWAY ISLAND JUNE 8

Capture Mountain Fortress

Withdrawal Of Americans Major Topic

dent Nixon and South Vietnamese Chief of State Nguyen Van Thieu will fly to Midway Island in the Pacific June 8 to discuss a common policy toward a peaceful solution to the Vietnam

"The two presidents had desired to hold such a meeting as soon as feasible in order to establish personal contact and discuss together the conduct of the war in Vietnam and the search' for a peaceful solution," said the announcement made here and in Saigon.

The one-day meeting, suggested last Saturday by Thieu, will be the first session between the two chief executives. Thieu met in Honolulu last July with then-President Lyndon B. Johnson.

Although the announcement did not mention U.S. troop withdrawals and South Vietnamese elections, these topics probably will be on the agenda, qualified sources said earlier.

Their target, a sliver of silver light, loomed larger and larger as their home planet, earth, shrank in the distance, nearly 200,000 miles away.

As the astronauts spent a leisurely day coasting deeper into the black void of space, Air Force Col. Thomas P. Stafford reported they were studying the charts and flight plan for the critical lunar orbit portion of the pathfinder mission.

AUSTIN (AP) - A Senate committee has completed its second marathon hearing on a proposal to split the Parks and Wildlife Department into two agericies-but postponed action until Wednesday.

Opponents of the House-passed bill got their turn Monday before the Senate Parks and Wildlife Committee. Supporters of the bill testified May 12.

Two of the three Parks and Wildlife commissioners, Harry Jersig of San Antonio and Paul Gilvin of Amarillo, testified against the bitt.

cluding Will Odom of Austin and A. W. Moursund of Johnson City, and by present members,

W.E. Hopton, director of the Tennessee Bureau of Criminal Identification, said he had heard nothing about the threat. The FBI normally would be called upon to investigate any such incident; especially one involving the Tennessee state prison where Ray is serving a 39-year

Altho a raise to the three level of responder's take-out normally announces extra values-and North's opening bid is in the minimum range-an exception is to be noted when the response has been in a major suit. Since only 26 points are needed for game in hearts and South presumably has a minimum of 10 for his response at the two level, North is warranted in taking slightly more aggressive ac-

tion on the second round. Once the heart fit is established, it was routine for South to check back for controls via Blackwood, and when he was assured that the opposition could not cash two fast tricks, he proceeded to

A spade was led to the ace, felling West's queen and a spade was returned to the king-on which West failed to answer the call. The ten was now returned thru East for a ruffing finesse. South trumped out the jack of spades, entered the North hand with the carefully preserved ace of diamonds and discarded his remaining diamonds on the established

If South plays the ten of diamonds from his hand at the second trick, West can dislodge North's ace by covering the queen and declarer must now find a parking place for the six of diamonds which is a prospective loser. Altho the dummy's side entry has been dislodged prematurely, declarer can still

recover with careful play. He draws two rounds of trumps with the king and queen and then stops temporarily to develop the spades. The ace and king of spades are cashed and when West shows out, fortunately for declarer he is also out of trumps. South now ruffs out East's jack of spades, enters dummy with the ace of hearts-drawing the last trump in the process, and discards the losing diamond on a high spade.

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



Shameful Loss

What is one to think of a nation that kills 50,000 people a year on its streets and highways, yet fails to conduct adequate traffic safety programs? Is it fair to say that such a nation is carrying folly to ridiculous extremes? Is it fair to say that, especially, when to the cost in lives must be added a monetary cost amounting to many billions of dollars

Under present circumstances our response appears to be getting worse rather than improving. This has just been pointed up afresh by Howard Pyle, who as president of the National Safety Council has a better chance than almost anyone else to assess the situation. The springboard for his comment was word that traffic accident deaths during the first two months of 1969 were up four per cent over the same period last year (4,470, or 310 more persons).

Pyle's criticism focuses on the fail-

ure of numerous states to move ahead on traffic safety even though federal law enacted in 1966 offers help. This law, he notes, "opened the door for the greatest progress in history against thir menace. Instead, too many states are delaying badly needed action and even resolutely marching backwards.

An air of irrationality pervades this matter. State governments claim not to have the money for better safety programs, yet as Pyle points out "the loss to society from only two months of this year's crashes is estimated at \$1.5 billion.'

This makes it a matter of simple economics. That is, effective measures to improve traffic safety will, in the long run, save large sums of money. Even if financial loss could not be substantially reduced, there would remain the all-important fact that lives are being sacrificed daily on the altar of inadequate safety pro-

Encouraging Signs

There seems to be an encouraging trend toward sanity in handling of campus disorders. There may be more upheavals before things drop back to a time when reason is the accepted means of threshing out differences or seeking changes.

Dr. S. I. Hayakawa, who took over the administration of the beleagured San Francisco State College six months ago, has set something of an example in how to deal with the situation. His school had been hit by faculty strikes, student strikes, student battles with police, disruption and cessation of classes. He has set formula but he did offer some advice. including being alert and ready and knowing what you are willing to do: don't let a little violence be rewarded - don't delay the use of adequate force if required; listen to students.

There's a lot of common wrapped up in this.

Another hopeful sign comes from SMU where responsible students have presented the university with counterclaims following the recent, shortlived black student takeover of administrative offices. Without rancor or racism, the student leadership accused the administration of settling an issue purely on ethnic grounds, of considering demands which had no basis in logic or conscience, of being intimidated. Apart from whether their claims are sound is the more important fact that responsible student voices are being raised in opposition to the disrupters

I LEAVE my judgeship regretfully. but I have to put the welfare of the pet show above my own personal feelings. It is my opinion that the public controversy relating to my association with the Kennedy Foundation, as well as the awarding of so many first prizes to Kennedys on Saturday, could only harm the pet show, which is held for a noble and charitable cause. Stroud started his career in Harrold where he published the Harrold Gazette which was moved to Electra in 1919 and became the Electra Leader, a forerunner of the Electra Star."
