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# 430 COUNTED Stepped-Up **Tempo Gets Toll Blame**

SAIGON (AP) - A lot of Americans, including congressmen, are asking, in view of the Paris peace talks, why U.S. combat deaths soared to 430 in the week ended May 17. This was the second highest level of the year.

The U.S. Command-blamed the increase in casualties on stepped up attacks by the Viet Cong and North Vietnamese. This was thrown into some doubt by a South Vietnamese headquarters anneuncement that allied action also had been increased.

The U.S. Command and the Pentagon deny that American forces have increased their tempo of battle, but say the South Vietnamese Army has.

Pentagon authorities say the general level of U.S. military action has been "relatively constant, with practically no change since April, 1968. Actually, the level now is about 5 per cent under the April, 1968, level."

The South Vietnamese army, on the other hand, increased its action gradually through 1968 by about 45 per cent, the Pentagon reports, adding: The level increased about 10 per cent during the January-March period and then maintained a relatively constant level until the week ending May 17

"While the one-week increase will probably not have a significant increase on the monthly average unless the higher level is maintained, the increase over the previous week was approximately 30 to 35 per cent."

All this does not mean that U.S. forces have been idle. The U.S. Command says official policy is to keep maximum pressure on the enemy

Taking a page from the thousands of Viet Cong documents which urge their troops to "fight while negotiating," the U.S. Command feels it is doing the same thing.

The U.S. Command sends out literally thousands of small reconnaissance patrols, squad-sized ambushes and platoon, company and battalion sweeps every 24 hours. If the enemy is found, the policy is to hit him with firepower, not manpower.



Krist Identified

The victim, who spent four days in the buried box, was rescued after her father, millionaire land developer Robert F. Mackle of Coral Gables, Fla., paid a \$500,000 ransom.

She stood calmly and pointed out the bearded Krist, who said earlier he expected a conviction and the death penalty, and sug-gested his body might be buried in the kidnap box.

Miss Mackle then identified the second kidnaper as Buth Eisemann-Schier, 26, a Honduranborn former graduate student in biology at the University of Miami. Miss Eisemann-Schier was brought to the door of the courtroom.

Miss Mackle said she was sick with influenza on the day of the abduction last Dec. 17 and was being attended by her mother at a Decatur motel. The kidnapers got into the room, she said, on the pretext of having information about her boy friend being in an accident.

She was taken from the room and got into the back seat of a Volvo with the woman, she testified.

Krist, Miss Mackle said leaned across the front seat and said, "I suppose you know why you're here. We are kidnaping

Earlier, Krist suggested that, "maybe after they electrocute me, they can bury me in that box," indicating the plywood structure in which Miss Mackle was buried alive. Krist, 24, convicted car thief

and prison escapee, said he understood a coffin cost the state \$97 "and the material isn't that good.'

Krist said he didn't care one way or another about testifying in his own defense.

"I don't expect to get justice," he told reporters at a recess.

FBI experts testified that Krist's fingerprints were found in a car abandoned in Miami, Fla., after a first ransom attempt was accidently foiled by police. The experts also said Krist's prints were found:

-In a telephone directory taken from the economics building at nearby Emory University where the victim is a student and was enrolled last Dec. 17 when she was abducted from a motel room.

-On an Atlanta hotel registration card for "George S. Price," identified as Krist earlier. The card was dated Dec. 14, 1968.

-On a cardboard box from a workshop at the University of Miami Institute of Marine Sciences.



The United States has at last stated that it will not tolerate the continuance of heavy attacks on American and allied forces, and that drastic steps in reprisal have not been ruled out. This could mean the resumption at any moment of the bombing of North Vietnam and even a blockade of Haiphong harbor.

SO FAR the utterances have not been explicit, but there is no doubt about their implicit meaning.

Thus, Secretary of Defense Laird was asked, in an interview on ABC's "Issues and Answers," whether the time has come to say "cut bait or fish," and the United States would, "for example, resume the bombing of the north." Mr. Laird replied:

"I wouldn't want to rule out any military activity. I think that would be a mistake for us to announce on this program or at any time the various options that are available to us will never be used, and I have not made that a practice and would certainly stay away from it."

**PRESIDENT NIXON**, in his televised news conference on March 14 when asked whether his patience was wearing thin with the continued offensives by North Vietnam, referred to an earlier statement that an "appropriate response will be made to these attacks if they continue." He

SECRETARY OF STATE Rogers has been traveling in Southeast Asia. including a visit to Saigon. He declared significantly that "we have commitments here and we are going to live up to them," and said that "it's up to Hanio to decide whether there's conflict in Vietnam." At Bangkok, speaking at a meeting of the ministerial council of the Southeast Asia Treaty Organization, he pledged again that the United States will carry out its obligations under the treaty.

Mr. Rogers' assurance means that the United States is not going to pull out of Vietnam and let the Communists take control.

THE HANOI government and its ally, the Viet Cong, demand that the United States get out of Vietnam unconditionally. This, of course, is rejected by President Nixon, who has made it clear that, while some things can be negotiated, there has to be an assurance that the aggressions will not be repeated and that the people of South Vietnam will not be left to the mercy of the North Vietnamese.

INDEED, if the negotiations get nowhere and the fighting is not abated. there is a likelihood that America and its allies will exercise their option to resume the bombing and intensify military activity. The United States is earnestly seeking a settlement, but it will not stand off indefinitely while the other side shows no real intention of ending the war. That's the word from the President of the United States, the Secretary of State, the Secretary of Defense and the spokesmen of the United States at the Paris peace conference.

The Johnson budget had knocked out the \$104,000,000 previously appropriated for this purpose.

"He said that he was looking into the matter of lower postage for the students, but he wasn't too sure how the government would react to the suggestion

"What did Struldberg have to say to that?"

"He started writing four-letter words on the margins of all the correspondence course papers he had to mail in. The administration ignored this, and Struldberg was stymied over how to make the school give in.

"THEN HE GOT a brainstorm. He started sending his materials and tests back to the school, first-class mail, without a return address and with insufficient postage on them.

"The school was obligated to make up the difference every time a Struldberg paper arrived. This really shook up the administration. They wrote Struldberg that unless he put the right amount of postage on his mail, he would be expelled from the school.

"Boy," I said, "these radicals will stop at nothing. What did the school decide to do about that?"
