Paul D. Meek, president of Cosden Oil and Chemical Company of Big Spring, is one of five persons to be honored Saturday as Distinguished Graduates of The University of Texas College of

Presentation of the highest award that can be given by the college will be made jointly by Dean of Engineering John J. McKetta and John L. Tullis, UT Austin Engineering Foundation Advisory Council chairman and vice president of AMF Beaird, convocation at 2:30 p.m. in Hogg Auditorium on

the Austin campus Meek, a 1953 chemical engineering graduate, worked for Humble Oil & Refining Company in Baytown before joining Cosden in 1955.

He became president of Cosden in 1968 at the age of 37. He is also vice president and director American Petrofina, Inc

His membership in civic and professional organizations includes several national petroleum and chemical associations, the UT Austin Ex-Students' Association, and the executive committee of the Big Spring Chamber of Commerce.

Meek is a past director of the Texas Chemical Council, and is now serving as a member of the Texas Engineering Education Study Committee an organization composed of the deans of 12 engineering colleges and an equal number of representatives from industry.

Sentenced To Die

HOUSTON (AP) - Tracey Virgil Whan, 32, who says he only suffered "singed eyebrows" once when 30,000 volts passed through his body, has been sentenced to die July 8 in the electric chair.

Dist Judge Dan E. Walton formally sentenced Whan Wednesday. He was convicted in September, 1967, of the slaving of a Houston cab driver.

During his trial Whan testified of his encounter with a high voltage wire "I've had more than 30,000 volts pass through my body and all I've got is singed eyebrows,"

Whan and a co-defendant, Max Thomas Yeary 28, pleaded guilty to the slaving of Edward Jordan, 49 Jordan was robbed, stripped and shot twice in the head. His body was found on a road in northeast Harris County Dec. 29, 1966. Yeary received a life sentence.

"Texas Tech University" was endorsed by the House Tuesday as the new name. Rep. Delwin Jones of Lubbock, the sponsor, and

Ambassador Henry Cabot Lodge declared that efforts to exclude the South Vietnamese government from political negotiations "only delays peace and prolongs the war.'

Lodge spoke at the 19th fullscale session of the Paris peace talks after North Vietnam and the Viet Cong's National Liberation Front had repeated their demands for a Saigon peace cabinet to be followed by a provisional coalition government. Both assailed the government of President Nguyen Van Thieu. There was no sign of progress

The North Vietnamese and Viet Cong also returned to their attack on the Nixon administration, accusing it of intensifying the war and of trying to perpe-tuate the division of Vietnam. Shots rang out on a narrow street in Cleveland's racially troubled East Side the evening of July 23, 1968. Within minutes, the report stated, a full-scale gun battle was raging between Cleveland police and black snipers. An hour and a half later seven people lay dead and 15 others were wounded. Fifteen of the casualties were policemen.

Violence continued in Glenville and other East Side neighborhoods for the next five days. Arsonists heaved fire bomps into buildings, teenagers smashed store windows and led mobs in rioting, and, the commission's report said, "the police lashed back, sometimes in blind fury.

In the smouldering aftermath, 63 business establishments were counted destroyed or damaged Property losses exceeded \$2 million.

The commission, headed by Milton Eisenhower, said the Cleveland outbreak was not the most serious in the United States tide of racial violence, in human and dollar costs.

Jetting Along

A test pilot soars over Niagara Falls Airport in a jet flying belt developed for the Defense Department by Textron's Bell Aerosystems Co. The jet belt, unveiled today, can fly for minutes and miles, but the exact time and distance are a secret

Man May Fly For Long Time Minus Wings

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (AP) - A man can strap on a new miles without wings.

Textron's Bell Aerosystems Co., developer of the jet belt un-der contract from the Defense Department, announced today that the belt has carried a man aloft for minutes and miles at an altitude of 25 feet and speeds up to 30 miles an hour in tests at the Niagara Falls Airport.

The time and distance aloft are secret.

The new belt replaces one in-troduced in 1961 by Bell—a hy-drogen-peroxide system capable of flying a man for 21 seconds at up to 60 miles an hour, covering more than 800 feet.

The new belt is powered by a fan-jet engine about two feet long and a foot in diameter. It burns standard kerosene-type jet fuel.

The engine, developed by Williams Research Corp. of Walled Lake, Mich., is mounted vertically with twin ducts just behind and outside of the pilot's shoulders. The ducts, pointed down, provide the upward thrust and can be turned to permit maneuvering in the air. vering in the air.

Robert J. May, Bell's jet belt project manager, said, 'The scope of military and civilian applications is limited only by the imaginaton and ingenuity of its potential users."

He listed such things as riot control, rescue operations and soldiers crossing rivers or mine-

The pilot will have a battery-powered radio to maintain communications with the ground.







Durbin Wins Trial Fight

Big Spring(Texas) Herald Thurs., May 29, 1967 7-A

AUSTIN (AP) — Clyde Dur-bin Jr., accused in the slayings of two University of Texas stu-dents, has won his fight in the Texas Supreme Court to be tried in Austin before he is tried in

In High Court

The court took only 15 minutes after hearing arguments Wednesday to decide 6-3 that Durbin's right to a speedy trial in one of the Jan. 8 slayings means he must be tried in Austin before Aug. 1.

Durbin is accused in the slaying of John Albert White, 21, Corpus Christi, in Austin. He is accused in the slaying of Miss Keitha Morris, 19, White Deer,

White took Miss Morris on a picnic date to Bull Creek near Austin. His body was found in the creek that evening. Her body was found in Inks Lake, near Burnet, the next day.

The prosecution and the deense have been locked in a legal battle to determine whether Durbin would be tried first in rural Burnet or in Austin, where no jury in several years has re-turned a death sentence.

Durbin's lawyer, Frank Maloney, told the Supreme Court that he was forced to ask for a postponement in the Burnet case from April 14 to Sept. 29 ecause the U.S. Supreme Court held in the Dr. Sam Shepperd murder case in Ohio that failure to ask for one meant waiver of the right to appeal a denial of change of venue on publicity

But the state had no right to postponement of the Austin trial granted by Dist. Judge Tom Blackwell from June 2 to Oct. 27, Maloney said.

The right to a speedy trial is "such a basic, fundamental right that it is not subject to judicial discretion," Maloney

There are statutory grounds such as the absence of a witness, that fustify a state motion for postponement, but no such grounds were alleged in this case, Maloney said.

Calvert said Associate Justices Zollie Steakley, Tom Reav-ley and Sears McGee dissented from the ruling.

"There may be another (dis-sent) by the time an opinion is written, but no more than one, because then the vote would be 5-4 against," Calvert joked.

U.S. Must Assess Japanese Trade

United States foreign economic policy has since the 1930s been edicated to promoting freer world trade. That sound policy carries an equally sound corollary, however, of reciprocity. The free-trade principle, which seeks maximum development of 'every nation's resources and productivity, cannot work without

mutuality. While the rash of purely protection-ist import-quota bills in Congress should continue to be resisted by the Nixon administration, the foregoing qualification may be applied to the announcement by Secretary of Commerce Maurice H. Stans that unless foreign nations act in three months to limit textile shipments to this country that the administration "may have to look for other solutions." That would mean higher tariffs or a quota formula, probably

Formerly having an excess of exports over imports in the textile field. the United States' imports last year exceeded exports by \$807 million. including a sharp hike in synthetics. This is a level approaching the peril point for related domestic industries as well as seriously aggravating the chronic, dollar-damaging balance-of-payments deficit in international ex-

textile imports to the United States. Japan as much as invited compulsory congressional quotas restricting its high volume of textile shipments to the United States.

However, a greater factor has been its trade policies. It refuses to limit exports to other countries no matter what the effect on their economies, but it keeps its own domestic markets closed to foreign exporters. It all but excludes foreign investment, while investing heavily abroad.

Such self-serving protectionism perhaps may have been justified during postwar recovery struggle, to employ and sustain a burgeoning population, but no longer. The Japanese appear bent on indefinitely prolonging the postwar trade policies. which are like those which made that nation so unpopular during the freetrade promoting era of the worldwide 1930s depression.

But no matter how much the United States desires Japan as an ally in the troubled Far East, there is a limit to the trade concessions that Washington is saying that the limit has been reached at least in textiles.

WHILE THESE protections don't directly apply to the Otepka case. they clearly express a "sense" of Congress that anybody treated as Otepka has been treated should have a day in the boards of government to face and denounce his accusers. Also, in what will probably be called the Otepka section. S-12 proposes to raise all personnel security investigations to a level where whispering campaigns have the least chance of

THIS BILL would set up a Security Administration for Executive Departments (SAFED) The Admintrater would be appointed by the President and would be confirmed by the Senate. He would have a 10-year tenure so that the next President couldn't remove him except for serious cause.

THE NEW OFFICE of SAFED would not do any work now assigned to the FBI, the CIA or the investigative organs of the Atomic Energy Commission. But SAFED would per form two useful functions. It would recognize the importance of keeping subversives out of government (a job at the State Department which brought Otepka, a civil-servant, under attack) SAFFD would also stress the importance of guarding any Federal appointee or employe fromunfair probing practices and results.

S-12 IS A PACKAGE job of many items, as was the Bill of Rights with its 10 Constitutional amendments. It protects the rights of government and government workers against the subversive and the pernicious

David Lawrence Issue Of Judges' Outside Income

WASHINGTON - All the judges on the bench - not merely on the Supreme Court of the United States will soon have to make up their minds what regular salaries or fees from out side activities are proper for them to receive. Members of Congress will also be confronted with the same prob-

CHIEF JUSTICE Earl Warren has initiated a meeting of the United States Judicial Conference - the 25judge policy-making arm of the federal judiciary - to recommend a possible code of ethics and financial reporting rules for all federal judges. This is not a new undertaking, as the conference's standing committee of eleven members has for years set forth principles of judicial conduct. But in view of the revelations which preceded the resignation of Justice Abe Fortas from the Supreme Court. it is apparent that some of the definitions in the rules hitherto made are not too explicit and may have been too broadly interpreted.

WITHIN THE LAST few days, Justice William O. Douglas of the Supreme Court has resigned as the only paid officer of a foundation from which he had received \$12,000 annually for nine years. There would appear to be no objection to affiliation members of the judiciary with charitable or nonpolitical foundations. Criticisms have been made, however, when judges have identified themselves with educational organizations dealing with public affairs, even though supported by foundation funds. Thus, Justice Douglas is an official of the Center for Democratic Studies in California, and has been participating in its seminars on civil rights and internatonal politics. Some of his critics argue that a Supreme Court justice should not be involved in such activities

SENATE DEMOCRATIC Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana says that he anticipates that before Judge Warren E. Burger becomes chief justice, he will discontinue acceptance of a fee of \$2,000 he has been receiving annually for three years as a trustee of the Mayo Foundation in Rochester, Minn. The Montana senator adds that he sees nothing wrong with the working relationship which Judge Burger has had with the Mayo. Medical Clinic, particularly because of the judge's Minnesota background

and the prestige of the foundation All this raises a question as to whether a person who becomes a judge should be permitted to participate in any matters of a civic nature in his state or community even when such connections have, in fact, nothing to do with any court cases.

IT IS POSSIBLE that a "conflict of interest" may emerge whenever a judge receives a regular salary or fees from an organization involved in controversial issues or "cause" movements. The judicial conference is expected to make its report on June 10, and is likely to favor a complete detachment by anyone on the

Many judges who have served on outside organizations have done so in the spirit of public service and have accepted payments only to cover expenses in traveling to and frommeetings. Others, however, have received salaries for extensive services. This has raised the problem of how much time it is proper for a judge to devote to any outside activity on a continuing basis.

WHEN THE RULES of ethics applicable to judges have been determined, there will be a lot of questions asked also about the income received by members of Congress, too, from sources other than their salaries. If they have funds which have been accumulated before they entered public life, these will naturally have been invested. It may be that rules will be adopted declaring that no member of Congress should vote on any measure which could affect directly or indirectly, stocks or bonds or other investments which he or his family may possess. Lack of disclosure often generates suspicion.

IN A SENSE, the whole controversy is a tragic development. It now would appear that such matters will be left to the conscience of the individual in public life after certain principles of propriety have been promulgated by a disinterested body. (Copyright, 1969, Publishers - Hall Syndicate)






