SPACE CENTER, Houston (AP) — Low-level sequence camera views of the prime moon landing site were lost on Apollo 10 when the camera was suddenly jarred off its proper aiming point, officials said today.

Wednesday showed the prime landing site on the moon is pocked with small craters and borders a ravine but still has room enough to park a spacecraft.

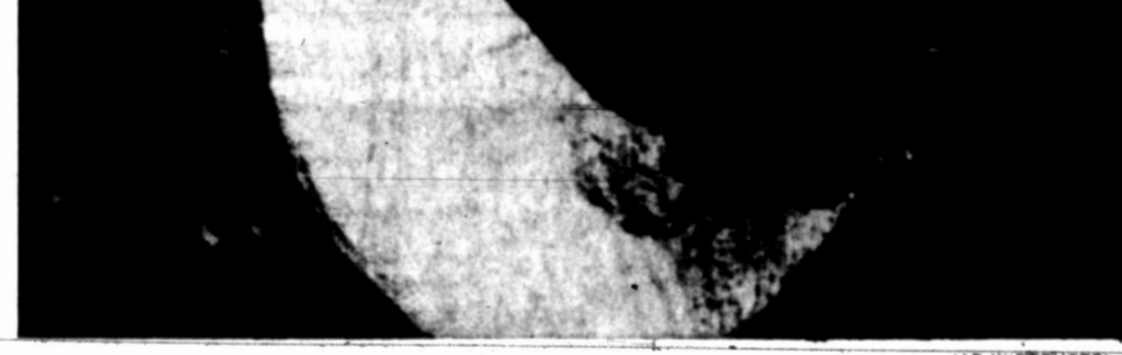

WASHINGTON (AP) — A small and well-equipped army of black extremists was responsible for the bloodshed during the Cleveland riots last July, the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence reported today.

Entitled "Shoot-out in Cleveland," the report was released with comment.

The commission's report said the violence in Cleveland may have marked the beginning of a new pattern in civil disorders.

Nixon signed an executive order establishing the panel after conferring at his waterfront home off Miami with Dr. Lee A. DuBridge, his science adviser and the former head of the prestigious California Institute of Technology.

DuBridge later told newsmen initial concerns of the council will be to deal with such matters as possible harmful effects from DDT insecticide.

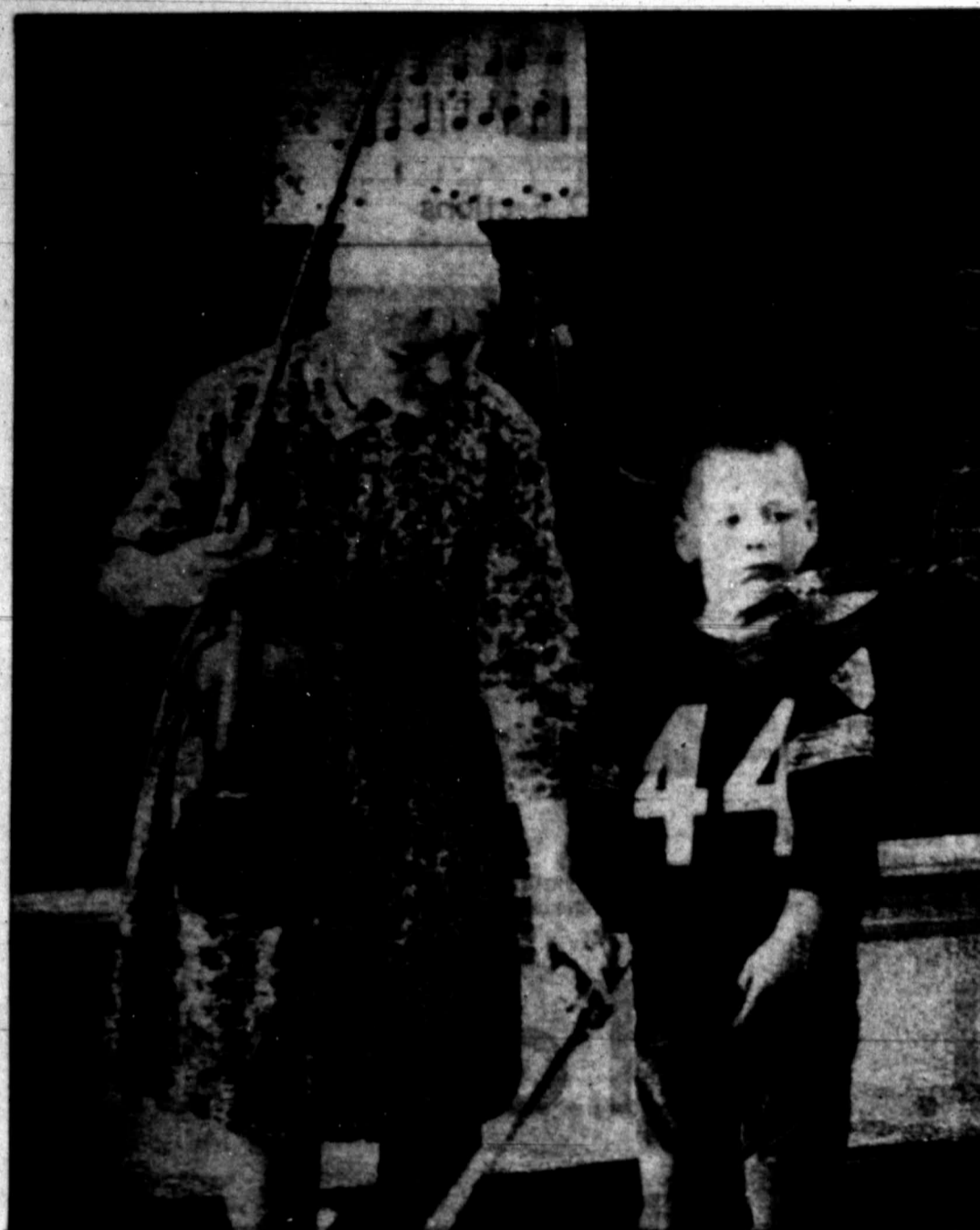

## 'GREEN LETTUCE' CAMPAIGN Bush-Yarborough Race For Senate Expected

WASHINGTON (AP) — Campaign oratory already is heard among Texans as Democratic Sen. Ralph Yarborough warms up for his 1970 re-election and a well-heeled Republican edges into the political spotlight.

Rep. George Bush, a millionaire from Houston, is not expected to startle anyone soon with an announcement he's entering the race against Yarborough. But his close associates say they think he'll definitely run.

Yarborough supporters say they think he is stronger than ever and could beat Bush or another Democrat or challenger, such as Lt. Gov. Ben Barnes.

Bush's friends insist the 44-year-old Republican is in a good position to oust the 66-year-old Yarborough.

**NO DOUBTS**

Yarborough isn't saying definitely he'll seek re-election but his speech Monday before the Texas Legislature was considered by many a political warm-up.

Neither Bush nor his political confidant, James Allison of Midland, have any doubts Yarborough will run, especially now that he has moved up to be chairman of the Labor and Public Welfare Committee.

In an interview, Bush said he feels "more favorably inclined toward running than before. I'm confident of getting the funding no matter who I'd run against and this is vital in a campaign as big as this would be. But there are so many unknowns."

Allison, now assistant director of the Republican National Committee, estimates that Texas Senate candidates who reach the general election will be spending \$2 million each.

An aide to Yarborough says he doesn't believe it.

**MONEY, MONEY**

"I've never seen that kind of money in a campaign and don't expect to," he said. "The

Republicans will have all the newspapers' endorsements and all the money—but money is a diminishing return unless you've got the power with the people.

"I think they could pave the west side of San Antonio with all that green lettuce and would lose—but they will try," he said.

Bush's Texas force includes volunteers, paid workers including two men who did advance work for President Nixon last fall and poll-takers.

Barnes, 31, won't tell anyone whether his ambitions lie with the governorship or the Senate. He did say in a telephone interview from Austin Tuesday that he and Bush had not talked about the Senate race and have no pact that only one would challenge Yarborough while the other waited to take on Republican Sen. John Tower in 1972.

Allison says he thinks only two persons could beat Yarborough in the primary—former Gov. John Connally and Barnes. He doesn't think either will make the race.

**'BLOWS HIS COOL'**

In the interview, Bush said he thought age and differences on

how to effect change would be probable campaign issues in a Bush-Yarborough race.

"He blows his cool a lot. He evokes strong passions. It would be a great competitive race," Bush said.

Of his own record, Bush says he doesn't consider himself a conservative in the sense of wanting to preserve the status quo.

"I feel very strongly about people who have not had a fair shake. But I disagree with a liberal who might take a lousy program and, if it doesn't work, spend more money on it," Bush said.

The Yarborough aide says he thinks Bush's record shows he "talks a good game but he votes with the right wing of the Republican Party."

He said he thinks Bush's ambitions to be a senator—as his father was—won't let him plead from Texans who want to retain his influence on the tax-writing Ways and Means Committee.

"Logic dictates that he stay where he is. But I don't think he will. I think he'll run," the Yarborough aide said.

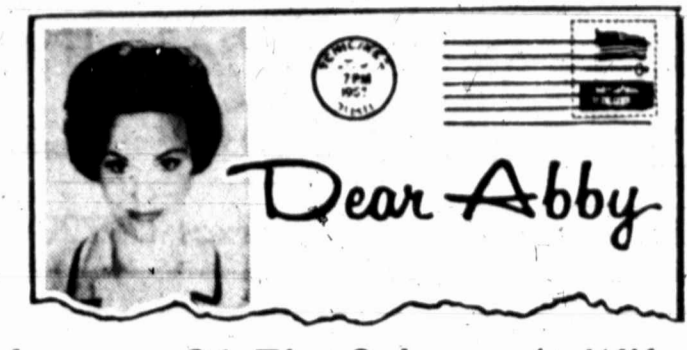
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## Lament Of The Salesman's Wife

"Researchers need to speak the same scientific language," he said.

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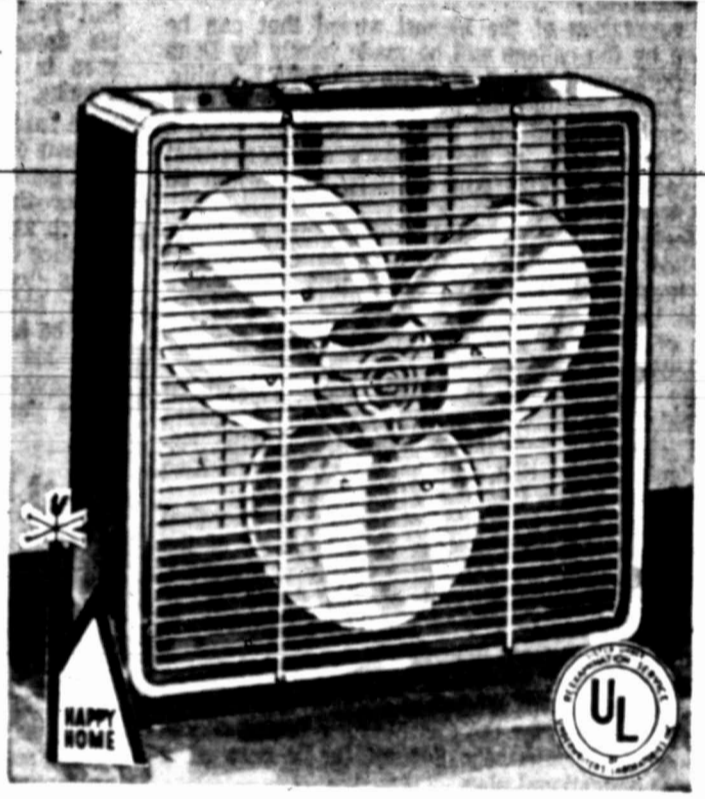

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# Military Cracking Down On Reservists, Guardsmen

WASHINGTON (AP) — The armed services are putting into effect a Defense Department policy providing that reservists or National Guardsmen who goldbrick can be called to active duty for up to two years.

Affected by the get-tough policy are young men who were deferred from the draft by joining the National Guard or reserves.

In the past, the penalty for failing to meet drill and training obligations was a 45-day "involuntary" active duty tour.

This apparently wasn't stiff enough to wipe out malingering, so the Defense Department decreed a tougher policy earlier this year.

Now any man found "unsatisfactory" in carrying out his reserve obligations may be called to active duty for up to two years.

Each of the services is putting the policy into effect, with the Air Force the latest to move.

Under the law, young men may enlist in the guard or re-

serves, receive from four to 10 months of training, and then return home.

However, they are obligated to drill regularly with their units. The overall obligation lasts six years, counting the initial training time.

In this way, a young man can escape being drafted for two years of fulltime service unless there is an emergency callup, as happened to some 38,000 guardsmen and reservists last year after the North Korean seizure of the intelligence ship Pueblo and the enemy winter offensive in Vietnam.

The emphasis used to be on faithful attendance at drills, which normally are held on weekends.

## 'Boy, This Baby Really Climbs'

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — Dropped from the wings of a B5 bomber, an HL10 lifting body vehicle soared at 825 miles an hour on its own to a record altitude—64,500 feet.

"Boy, this baby really climbs now," space agency pilot John A. Manke radioed as he opened all four barrels of the HL10's

rocket engine Wednesday. On May 9, the HL10 set a record speed of 725 m.p.h. at 54,000 feet.

The wedge-shaped craft, a prototype of future space ferries, is expected to reach 1,100 m.p.h. in later flights. Space agency planners hope vehicles like it will be able to ferry men and equipment between spacecraft and ground bases.

The HL10 is called a lifting body because it gets its boosting power from the shape of its fuselage instead of the wings.

## Goldberg Raps Death Sentence

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) — Arthur J. Goldberg, a former associate justice of the Supreme Court, says he has urged Gov. Ronald Reagan of California to commute the death sentence of Sirhan Bishara Sirhan, assassin of Robert F. Kennedy.

"The taking of his life by the state would not accomplish anything," Goldberg said Wednesday.

players passed, East carried on to five spades. South reasoned that defensive prospects were not very favorable, for, in light of the distribution, he could not expect to cash many tricks in either diamonds or hearts.

He, therefore, bid six hearts with the expectation that he could probably restrict his losses to two tricks. East doubled.

West opened the six of diamonds, North played the deuce and East put up the ace. Without the slightest loss of motion, South smoothly followed with the king of diamonds. East was duly impressed and, fearful that a trick might slip away from him, he promptly switched to the ace of spades.

South ruffed, drew trump in two rounds and proceeded to cash five rounds of diamonds—stuffed all four clubs from dummy. A club was ruffed with North's seven of hearts and declarer claimed his doubled slam—losing only to the ace of diamonds.

Had East paused to reflect for even a moment, he would have realized that South could not possibly have the singleton king of diamonds, for that would give his partner West a six card suit—and with that many diamonds, he would surely have supported East at some stage of the auction.

West must have some reason for leading a diamond in preference to spades, and South's play of the king should be interpreted by East as a desperate attempt to steer him away from that suit. If East continues with diamonds at trick two, West ruffs and a club return puts South down by two tricks.

Opening lead: Six of ♦

East's holding proved to be an embarrassment of riches, for not only was he outbid on the deal by South, but he allowed the latter to hoodwink him with a blatant false card and scamper home with a contraband slam.

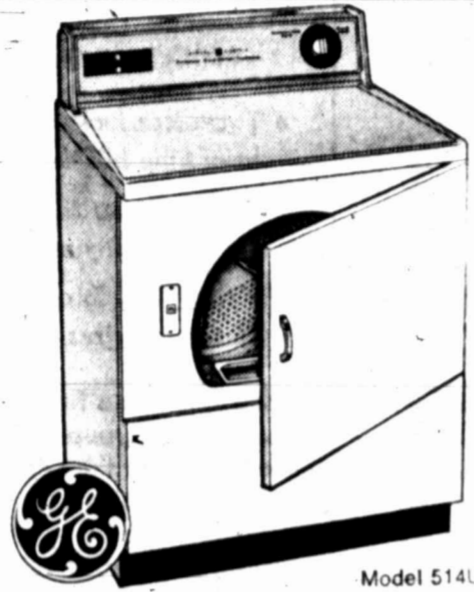
East opened the bidding with one diamond and South overcalled mildly with one heart. Altho his holding possessed considerable playing strength, he decided to bide his time—for there was very slight risk that the auction would die prematurely, and South did not wish to commit himself until he learned more about the distribution.

West's free bid of one spade cannot be indorsed on such skimpy high card values. North competed by raising his partner to two hearts, and East showed his impressive fit with West by jumping to four spades.

South persisted to five hearts and after the next two

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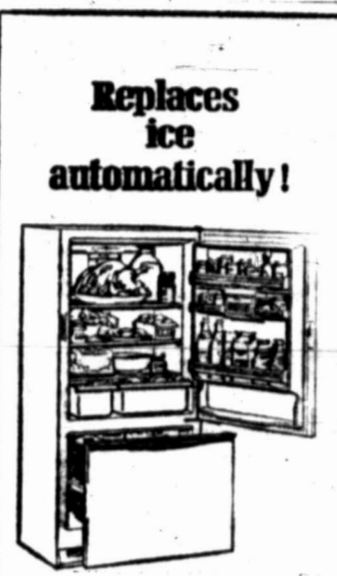

# Military Cracking Down On Reservists, Guardsmen

WASHINGTON (AP) — The armed services are putting into effect a Defense Department policy providing that reservists or National Guardsmen who goldbrick can be called to active duty for up to two years.

Affected by the get-tough policy are young men who were deferred from the draft by joining the National Guard or reserves.

In the past, the penalty for failing to meet drill and training obligations was a 45-day "involuntary" active duty tour.

This apparently wasn't stiff enough to wipe out malingering, so the Defense Department decreed a tougher policy earlier this year.

Now any man found "unsatisfactory" in carrying out his reserve obligations may be called to active duty for up to two years.

Each of the services is putting the policy into effect, with the Air Force the latest to move.

Under the law, young men may enlist in the guard or re-

serves, receive from four to 10 months of training, and then return home.

However, they are obligated to drill regularly with their units. The overall obligation lasts six years, counting the initial training time.

In this way, a young man can escape being drafted for two years of fulltime service unless there is an emergency callup, as happened to some 38,000 guardsmen and reservists last year after the North Korean seizure of the intelligence ship Pueblo and the enemy winter offensive in Vietnam.

The emphasis used to be on faithful attendance at drills, which normally are held on weekends.

**'Boy, This Baby Really Climbs'**

EDWARDS AIR FORCE BASE, Calif. (AP) — Dropped from the wings of a B5 bomber, an HL10 lifting body vehicle soared at 825 miles an hour on its own to a record altitude—64,300 feet.

"Boy, this baby really climbs now," space agency pilot John A. Manke radioed as he opened all four barrels of the HL10's

rocket engine Wednesday. On May 9, the HL10 set a record speed of 725 m.p.h. at 54,000 feet.

The wedge-shaped craft, a prototype of future space ferries, is expected to reach 1,100 m.p.h. in later flights. Space agency planners hope vehicles like it will be able to ferry men and equipment between space craft and ground bases.

The HL10 is called a lifting body because it gets its boosting power from the shape of its fuselage instead of the wings.

**Goldberg Raps Death Sentence**

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) — Arthur J. Goldberg, a former associate justice of the Supreme Court, says he has urged Gov. Ronald Reagan of California to commute the death sentence of Sirhan Bishara Sirhan, assassin of Robert F. Kennedy.

"The taking of his life by the state would not accomplish anything," Goldberg said Wednesday.

 East's holding proved to be an embarrassment of riches, for not only was he outbid on the deal by South, but he allowed the latter to hoodwink him with a blatant false card and scamper home with a contraband slam.

East opened the bidding with one diamond and South overcalled muddily with one heart. Altho his holding possessed considerable playing strength, he decided to hide his time—for there was very slight risk that the auction would die prematurely, and South did not wish to commit himself until he learned more about the distribution.

West's free bid of one spade cannot be indorsed on such skimpy high card values. North competed by raising his partner to two hearts, and East showed his impressive fit with West by jumping to four spades.

South persisted to five hearts and after the next two

players passed, East carried on to five spades. South reasoned that defensive prospects were not very favorable, for, in light of the distribution, he could not expect to cash many tricks in either diamonds or hearts. He, therefore, bid six hearts with the expectation that he could probably restrict his losses to two tricks. East doubled.

West opened the six of diamonds, North played the deuce and East put up the ace. Without the slightest loss of motion, South smoothly followed with the king of diamonds. East was duly impressed and, fearful that a trick might slip away from him, he promptly switched to the ace of spades.

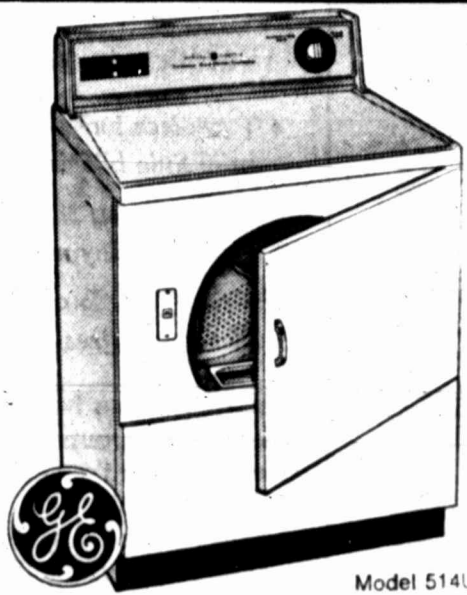
South ruffed, drew trump in two rounds and proceeded to cash five rounds of diamonds—sluffing all four clubs from dummy. A club was ruffed with North's seven of hearts and declarer claimed his doubled slam—losing only to the ace of diamonds.

Had East paused to reflect for even a moment, he would have realized that South could not possibly have the singleton king of diamonds, for that would give his partner West a six card suit—and with that many diamonds, he would surely have supported East at some stage of the auction.

West must have some reason for leading a diamond in preference to spades, and South's play of the king should be interpreted by East as a desperate attempt to steer him away from that suit. If East continues with diamonds at trick two, West ruffs and a club return puts South down by two tricks.

**Jetting Along**

A test pilot soars over Niagara Falls Airport in a jet flying belt developed for the Defense Department by Textron's Bell-Aerosystems Co. The jet belt, unveiled today, can fly for minutes and miles, but the exact time and distance are a secret.

**Man May Fly For Long Time Minus Wings**

NIAGARA FALLS, N.Y. (AP) — A man can strap on a new rocket belt and go sailing off for miles without wings. Textron's Bell Aerosystems Co., developer of the jet belt under contract from the Defense Department, announced today that the belt has carried a man aloft for minutes and miles at an altitude of 25 feet and speeds up to 30 miles an hour in tests at the Niagara Falls Airport.

The time and distance aloft are secret.

The new belt replaces one introduced in 1961 by Bell—a hydrogen-peroxide system capable of flying a man for 21 seconds at up to 60 miles an hour, covering more than 800 feet.

The new belt is powered by a fan-jet engine about two feet long and a foot in diameter. It burns standard kerosene-type jet fuel.

The engine, developed by Williams Research Corp. of Walled Lake, Mich., is mounted vertically with twin ducts just behind and outside of the pilot's shoulders. The ducts, pointed down, provide the upward thrust and can be turned to permit maneuvering in the air.

Robert J. May, Bell's jet belt project manager, said, "The scope of military and civilian applications is limited only by the imagination and ingenuity of its potential users."

He listed such things as riot control, rescue operations and soldiers crossing rivers or minefields.

The pilot will have a battery-powered radio to maintain communications with the ground.

Preparations are being made for some 300 visitors to the city on that weekend, said Winston Wrinkle, vice president who presided at the Wednesday meeting of the Downtown Club. The evening club also is participating in plans for the event.



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**Durbin Wins Trial Fight In High Court**

AUSTIN (AP) — Clyde Durbin Jr., accused in the slayings of two University of Texas students, has won his fight in the Texas Supreme Court to be tried in Austin before he is tried in Burnet.  
The court took only 15 minutes after hearing arguments Wednesday to decide 6-3 that Durbin's right to a speedy trial in one of the Jan. 8 slayings means he must be tried in Austin before Aug. 1.  
Durbin is accused in the slaying of John Albert White, 21, Corpus Christi, in Austin. He is accused in the slaying of Miss Keitha Morris, 19, White Deer, in Burnet.  
White took Miss Morris on a picnic date to Bull Creek near Austin. His body was found in the creek that evening. Her body was found in Inks Lake, near Burnet, the next day.  
The prosecution and the defense have been locked in a legal battle to determine whether Durbin would be tried first in rural Burnet or in Austin, where no jury in several years has returned a death sentence.  
Durbin's lawyer, Frank Maloney, told the Supreme Court that he was forced to ask for a postponement in the Burnet case from April 14 to Sept. 29 because the U.S. Supreme Court held in the Dr. Sam Sheppard murder case in Ohio that failure to ask for one meant waiver of the right to appeal a denial of change-of-venue-on-publicity grounds.  
But the state had no right to a postponement of the Austin trial granted by Dist. Judge Tom Blackwell from June 2 to Oct. 27, Maloney said.  
The right to a speedy trial is "such a basic, fundamental right that it is not subject to judicial discretion," Maloney said.  
There are statutory grounds, such as the absence of a witness, that justify a state motion for postponement, but no such grounds were alleged in this case, Maloney said.  
Blackwell was assigned the case on May 5 when he knew he would be on military duty at the time the Austin trial was scheduled to begin, Maloney said, implying Blackwell knew the state would ask for a postponement and that he would grant it. Blackwell is a brigadier general in the National Guard.  
Asst. Atty. Gen. Monroe Clayton, arguing for the state, said Maloney in his motion for a change of venue in the Burnet case asked specifically for Travis (Austin) County.

Travis County is to be complimented if it is the only county in Texas where he thinks he can get a fair trial," Clayton said.  
Maloney wanted to choose "not only the county he will be tried in first, but the offense for which he will be tried first, at the time he wants to be tried first," Clayton said.  
Chief Justice Robert W. Calvert interrupted Clayton, asking if the state wasn't trying to do the same thing through its motion for continuance of the Austin trial.  
"That's possible," Clayton said.  
"The defendant may think he will get a more lenient jury in Travis County, and that's a pretty good reason for wanting to be tried here first," Calvert said.  
Calvert said the case was unusual because most defendants will ask for postponements as long as they can "and never bring it to trial."  
Where the defendant insists on a speedy trial, "it looks like you would try to accommodate him," Calvert said.  
Calvert said Associate Justices Zollie Steakley, Tom Reavley and Sears McGee dissented from the ruling.  
"There may be another dissent by the time an opinion is written, but no more than one, because then the vote would be 5-4 against," Calvert joked.

SAIGON (AP) — U.S. forces crashed an enemy strategy meeting 28 miles northwest of Saigon today during a 48-hour cease-fire the Viet Cong had proclaimed in honor of Buddha's birthday.

The enemy cease-fire began at 7 a.m. Allied forces were to start a 24-hour truce period at 8 a.m. Friday (6 p.m. EST Thursday). Meanwhile, more than 50 allied operations of battalion size or larger continued without letup.

At least 50 Viet Cong were reported killed in the action northwest of Saigon. Initial reports said one American was killed and seven wounded.

"They were congregating in here for their stand down period," said a U.S. military spokesman. "We had intelligence information they were going to be in there for a meeting to plan actions for their summer campaign next month. We weren't standing down."

It was a sparsely settled farm area of scattered houses, rice paddies and bamboo hedgerows. Military spokesmen said an American plane with a loud-

speaker flew over, urging the Viet Cong to surrender and calling on the rest of the people to move out.

The spokesmen said about 200 women and children moved out, but the Viet Cong started shooting with machine guns and rocket grenades. The enemy troops were entrenched in fighting holes.

### Goldman At Top

PINEHURST, N.C. (AP) — Mickey Bellande of Biloxi, Miss., and David Goldman of Dallas tied Wednesday for the 36-hole lead in the Western Seniors Golf Championship. Bellande shot a second-round 70 and Goldman 73 to deadlock at 141.

More than 700 infantrymen from the U.S. 25th Division, some riding tanks and armored personnel carriers, maneuvered to seal off the enemy force. Two personnel carriers were reported damaged.

Air Force fighter-bombers, helicopter gunships and artillery pummeled the dug-in Viet Cong until dusk, when the fighting tapered off. used the Viet Cong of 17 violations in which 12 Americans were killed and 57 wounded. There was no cease-fire in 1968 because the Communist Command was waging an offensive.

The allied command also announced that casualties last week receded from the high level of the week before, with 265 Americans, 413 South Vietnamese government troops and 3,968 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese reported killed in action. The totals the week before were 430 Americans, 327 South Vietnamese and 5,715 enemy.

A total of 1,863 Americans were reported wounded last week, compared with 2,185 the week before. The U.S. Command reported 11 enemy rocket and mortar attacks that caused casualties or

damage during the night prior to the start of the Viet Cong cease-fire. The command said casualties and damage were light over-all.

B52 bombers flew eight missions during the night, dropping about 1,800 tons of bombs on enemy positions 63 to 65 miles northeast and northwest of Saigon and in the Central Highlands 12 to 15 miles south-west of Dak To, where South Vietnamese rangers have been in heavy contact with North Vietnamese forces for several days. The rangers have suffered serious casualties.

Along the A Shau Valley, paratroopers of the U.S. 101st Airborne Division continued to withdraw from Ap Bia mountain; scene of recent bloody fighting which set off sharp crit-

icism in the U.S. Congress because of the U.S. casualties.

A spokesman for the division said all American forces were off the crest of the 3,000-foot mountain mass, but AP correspondent Robert Ohman reported from the division's headquarters that one battalion of about 400 men was still on the northern slope of the chain of five prominent knolls.

Ohman said another American battalion and a South Vietnamese infantry battalion had moved off the mountain mass.

An operations officer said both American battalions and the South Vietnamese were continuing the movement away from the mountain and conducting reconnaissance-in-force missions.

### Vietnam War Deaths Drop

SAIGON (AP) — Battle casualties in the Vietnam war dropped last week from the grim highs of the previous seven-day period but still ran ahead of average weekly losses since the heavy fighting of last year.

The U.S. Command reported today that 265 Americans were killed in action last week and 1,863 were wounded. The week before 430 Americans were killed and 2,185 wounded.

South Vietnamese headquarters said 413 government soldiers were killed last week and 1,604 were wounded. The tolls for the previous week had been 527 killed and 1,643 wounded.

The two commands reported 3,968 Viet Cong and North Vietnamese killed last week and said additional casualty reports since last Thursday had increased the enemy toll for the week before from 5,686 to 5,715.

The report raised to 25,330 the total number of Americans killed in action in Vietnam and the number of wounded to 227,571. Another 1,334 Americans are listed as missing or captured.

The number of enemy killed in action since Jan. 1, 1961, now totals 504,506, according to allied reports.

Of the American dead, 12,579 have been killed in action since the preliminary peace talks began in Paris May 13, 1968. Since last Dec. 7, when South Vietnam agreed to join the talks, 3,472 have died in action.

South Vietnamese headquarters said enemy activity last week "decreased compared to the previous week and primarily consisted of shelling," although there were a number of limited ground attacks.

A small part of the American toll—about 25 dead and 130 wounded—was attributable to the fighting around the A Shau Valley, where Ap Bia Mountain was captured by American paratroopers May 20 after 10 days of hard fighting.

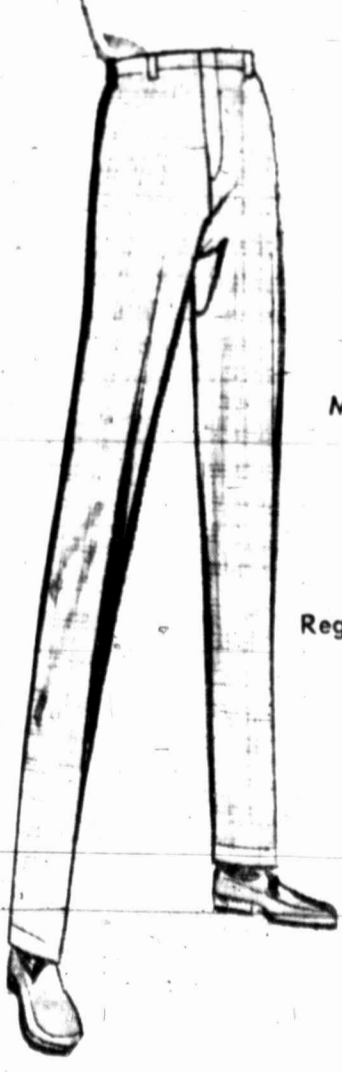

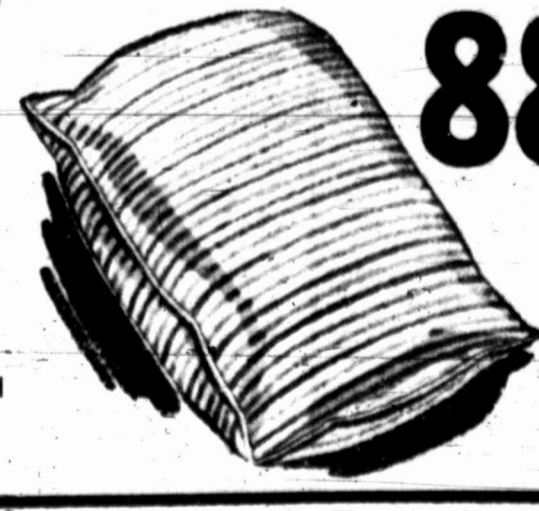

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# Talks Proceed On Nuclear Policies

LONDON (AP) — U.S. Defense Secretary Melvin R. Laird and six NATO colleagues opened talks today on guidelines for the use of nuclear weapons in Europe to protect the North Atlantic allies.

The defense ministers of the United States, Britain, West Germany, Italy, Belgium, Turkey and Denmark had before them a top secret study by Britain and West Germany on how the NATO nuclear might stationed in Europe can be used best to deter a Soviet attack.

Earlier British research showed that use of NATO's tactical nuclear weapons on a European battlefield and the Soviet retaliation that would probably follow would devastate the area. The possibility that West Germany would be the battlefield spurred the search for alternative tactics that might deter the Russians from an attack.

One suggestion was explosion of a "demonstration bomb" in an area where it could do little harm. The idea would be to warn the Soviets the West was prepared to use nuclear weapons if necessary.

Other proposals included the use of maritime nuclear explosions and atomic land mines on possible Soviet invasion routes.

British Defense Minister Denis Healey, who co-authored the British-German study, has said that in the event of a major Soviet attack, NATO would have

## Rockefeller Harassed By Student Mobs

BOGOTA, Colombia (AP) — Violent student protests continued today to dog Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller's mission to Latin America as he prepared to move on to Ecuador today.

Police used clubs and tear gas Wednesday to quell disorders here and in four provincial cities. At least 95 persons were injured during the second day of anti-U.S. demonstrations triggered by the visit of President Nixon's special envoy.

Bogota police drove student demonstrators from one university campus after officials of the school called them in. At the National University, about 100 students threw rocks and blocked streets, but university authorities did not call the police in.

Large groups of students also clashed with police in Medellin, Colombia's second largest city, and in Barranquilla, Cali and Pereira. The students blocked downtown streets, stoned cars and broke store windows.

While 10,000 helmeted police patrolled the streets of the Colombian capital, Rockefeller met with President Carlos Lleras Restrepo, Foreign Minister Alfonso Lopez Michelsen and with business and labor leaders.

Asked by newsmen about the disturbances in the streets, Rockefeller said: "This is something that has been happening everywhere in the world, including the United States."

The governor told a news conference that cuts in U.S. aid to Latin America are necessary "because the budget has a very large deficit and there is an inflationary trend which is very dangerous."

Informants said Lleras told Rockefeller that Colombia needs more U.S. aid "with longer terms and less difficult conditions." Lleras has complained in the past about the requirement that the bulk of U.S. aid money be spent in the United States.

Rockefeller is on the second of four survey tours in Latin America. From Ecuador he goes to Bolivia, Venezuela and Trinidad-Tobago.

SWEET HOME, Ore. (AP) — High school Principal Keith Marshall and math teacher Ron Pullen were talking about the Vietnam War in the teachers' lunch room.

Pullen claimed the principal hit him in the chest and shoved him into a corner.

Marshall said: "It was a difference of opinion over military responsibilities and obligations of individual citizens."

Said the judge: "\$50 bail."

WICHITA, Kan. (AP) — An Air Force sergeant returning home from a year's tour of duty in Thailand today may find the face in the crowd at the airport familiar—but not the body.

When S. Sgt. Cleamon Faulkner left, his wife, Betty, weighed 330 pounds, had measurements of 55-48-68 and wore a 32½ dress.

Today when he steps off the plane he will be looking for a 38-30-39 figure on a woman who weighs 160 pounds.

"I'll be wearing the best looking pants outfit I can find, and I'm going to wear big sunglasses and stand next to a couple who will be waiting for someone else," Mrs. Faulkner said. "I want to see if he can find me."

She said her husband of 10 years has never seen her when she weighed less than 240 pounds "and he has never seen me in slacks—never."

# Disclaims Any Danger In Germ-War Test Area

SALT LAKE CITY (AP) — The Deseret test center commander says it is true a plot of ground in Utah was sown with deadly anthrax germs in a 1954 biochemical warfare test, but denies the site is hazardous to animals or men.

A statement that the area is a continuing peril by a New York congressman was described by the commander, Brig. Gen. John G. Appel, as "a case of making a big thing out of nothing."

"The only way a person could possibly contract pulmonary anthrax at the site would be to dig into the dirt and eat it," said Appel.

Anthrax, most commonly found in cattle or sheep, is caused by a persistent bacterium which reproduces through the development of spores. The human beings who handle parts of infected animals or breathe in spores from the animals' hair, and can attack the lungs with fatal effect.

Appel said anthrax germs cause the fatal lung disease only when a massive dose is inhaled and "this is very rare."

He said the test site at the Dugway Proving Ground in Western Utah was deliberately contaminated 15 years ago by spreading about a teacup full of bacteria over an area 100 yards square.

## Damages Asked Following Fall

A Dallas man has filed a \$25,000 damage suit in 118th District Court against K. H. McGibbon in connection with an accident at Big Spring Truck Stop April 4.

The suit, styled Albert McIntyre vs. K. H. McGibbon, individually and doing business as Big Spring Truck Stop, alleges that the plaintiff slipped and fell on the concrete driveway of the truck stop.

Rep. Richard D. McCarthy, D-N.Y., asserted Wednesday "this anthrax-ridden area in Utah poses hazards to wildlife and to humans moving in and out of the area."

McCarthy said British biochemical experts planted anthrax germs on the Scottish island of Gruinard early in World War II and in 1966 reported the island was still contaminated "and probably will remain contaminated for 100 years."

Appel said tests show the organisms penetrate deeper into the ground each year and while the soil remains contaminated the danger of contracting anthrax from it decreases.

As for the Dugway site, he said, "Today you could walk over the area in safety, although nobody does because we want to be ultrasafe."

He said the Dugway site was selected for the test because there was no animal life on it and only a few small rodents in the surrounding area.

said, "the only kinds of animals in the area are transient animals like coyotes" and a fence around the site keeps coyotes out.

Coyotes, he added, "are not very susceptible to the disease. Man also is not very susceptible."

Appel said researchers have found evidence of anthrax in Utah in isolated cases, but added that research has turned up no evidence of pulmonary anthrax.

"I daresay you can find anthrax germs in soil any place in this country, but that doesn't mean they're going to go anywhere but there," he said.

## A LOVELIER YOU Use Makeup Wisely To Slenderize Face

A lovely asks: What can I do about a round face? Mine looks like the full moon. Yet I have a slim figure.



The Answer: When there is no weight problem, the slimming tactic for a round face is cosmetic camouflage. The kind to use is based on the artist's principle of shadowing to minimize size. These are the steps:

First off, you need a primer. A film of your favorite powder base will serve. For shadowing, a brownish contour cream or cake-powder brush-on is required. If you use a powder brush-on, apply face powder over your powder base before shadowing. Otherwise, powder after shadowing.

To apply your contour cosmetic, start under the highest point of the cheekbone and work downward to form a wide triangle that overlaps the jawbone; blend well, feathering edges. There must be no line of demarcation.

Now, shadow the eye lids from the center of the lashline upward to the eyebrow and outward to the temple. Then, with brown or black eye pencil, draw a soft line close to the lashes, beginning a quarter-inch from inner corners of the lids and ending in an up-sweep just beyond outer corners. Finish by brushing the eyebrows in the straightest possible line.

To aid effects, be sure to give the lips a slow curve — elongate their shape. Also, brush the hair up from the forehead and back at the temples. With practice, you'll look like a "moon baby."

# 'POETRY IN ACTION' AT SUNDAY SERVICES Silent Signs Of Religion

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) — With fingers flying, the congregation sings a fervent hymn. But not a sound is heard, except the light murmuring of a few children.

When the minister rises to lead a prayer, no one bows his head. These worshippers can't look down because they must see to understand.

All but the minister and children are deaf and most of the deaf also are mute. "I am not sure when I get up to preach on Sunday mornings that everyone understands me," says the Rev. Joe Buckner, who preaches with his hands every Sunday to about 30 deaf persons and their hearing children at the Fourth Avenue Baptist church.

The congregation is one of three in Louisville whose members are deaf.

"One problem is the difficulty of working with abstract ideas," the Rev. Mr. Buckner explains. "Take the doctrine of the Trinity, for example. It is very hard at first for a deaf person to understand the concept of 'Father, Son and Holy Ghost' in sign language."

At the Rev. Buckner's services, a member of the congregation usually leads the singing of hymns. "Sign language, which is the main way of communicating for the deaf, can be as beautiful and poetic as ballet," the minister noted.

"Poetry in action" is the way Father Gerald Timmel describes sign language. He uses it at least once each month to minister to a congregation of about 50 deaf persons at the Roman Catholic Sacred Heart church.

Father Timmel, who speaks simultaneously with signing his service for the benefit of hearing persons, said all of his congregation can read sign and some can read lips.

He further described the sign language as very "graphic and earthy."

As an example, Father Timmel gave the word "milk." It is made by pumping your fist up and down as if milking a cow. Coffee is a grinding motion, tea is shown by dipping an imagi-

nary bag, and bread is represented by one's left hand held as a loaf while the right moves as a knife slicing.

Some of the signs display a cryptic drama. The one for Christ is a rhythmic but gentle touch of the middle finger to each palm to recall the stigma-

ta. Hollis Maynard, pastor to 35 at the Church of Christ for the Deaf, estimates there are about 1,500 signs in the standard American vocabulary, while only about 500 of them are used in normal conversation.

Maynard said many gestures and facial expressions are essential to the sign vocabulary to amplify and vary signs. "And anything we want to say that has no sign can be spelled out in the manual alphabet," he said.

In his sermon each Sunday, Maynard says he follows "basic English grammar."

"But there still is a lot of acting out and miming. If I was to preach on the crucifixion, for instance, I might illustrate Jesus on the cross with my arms outstretched, along with a painful expression on my face," the pastor said.

"Facial expressions are a very important part of communicating with the deaf," he added. "because when you give the sign for 'happy' you really have to look happy and for 'sad,' you have to look sad."

Grammar, however, is mostly lacking from sign language and the deaf person has to fill in the blanks where articles and other words are left out.

"One advantage to this aspect of the language, however, is that sermons usually run shorter," the Rev. Buckner noted.

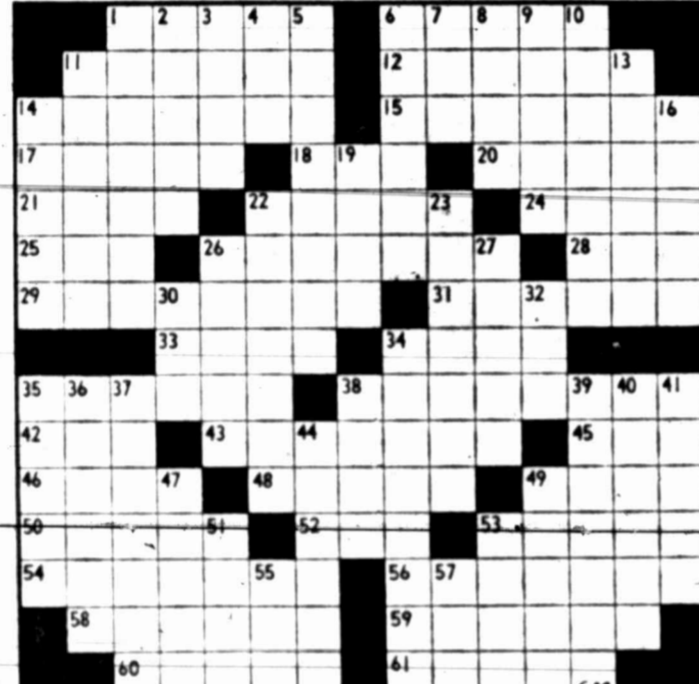

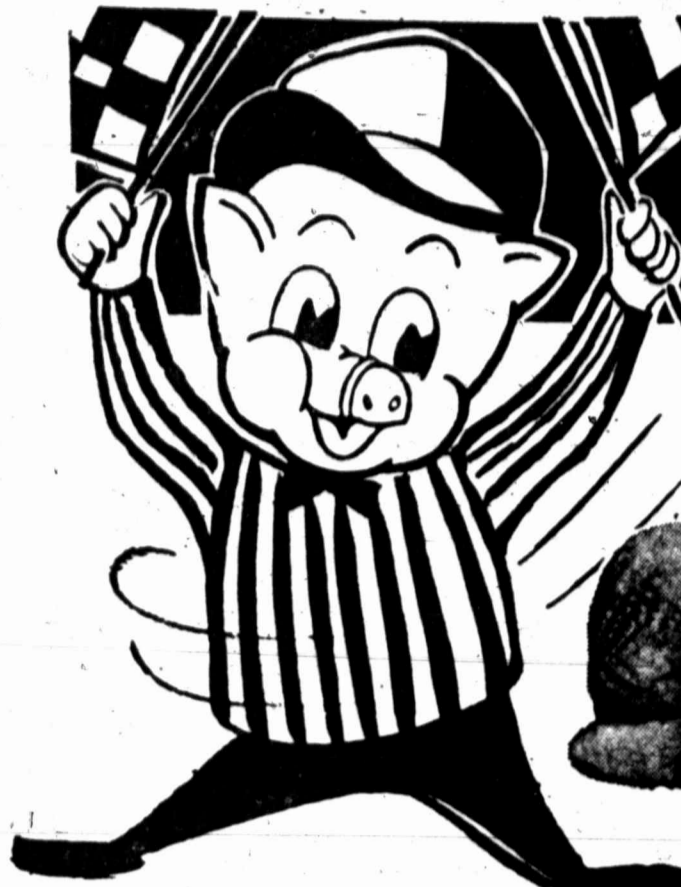

I do see all sorts of purpose in keeping watch, however, and in doing whatever is necessary to avoid the irritator, that causes them.

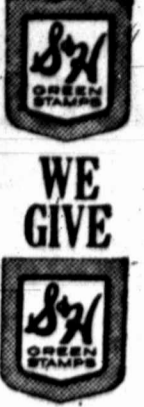
Malaria doesn't 'ruin the blood.' However, the nasty thing about malaria is that the germ can lie dormant for considerable periods, then become active again.

## 'Body Box' Aids 'Asthmanauts'

DENVER, Colo. (AP)—The youngest with the mod haircut climbed into the bright orange capsule and grinned through the sealed window as the heavy door swung shut—air tight—behind him.

Like other youngsters under treatment for asthma at an unusual facility here, Peter Ewing, 6, calls himself an "asthmanaut."

**SPACE LINGO**

The chamber he entered is known technically as a "plethysmograph." But the young asthma patients, carrying out their play on space program lingo, call it "Asthma 13." Doctors and technicians call it "the body box."

The chamber is used to measure the amount of lung damage caused by asthma.

Peter Ewing is the son of Dr. and Mrs. Wayne A. Ewing of Springfield, Ohio. His father is a doctor of theology, and a teaching missionary for the Lutheran Church in America.

Peter's worsening asthma caused the family to return to the United States from Singapore in 1968. Dr. Ewing now is a visiting professor at the Hamma School of Theology in Springfield.

Peter's near fatal attacks of asthma resulted in his coming to Denver early this month as a patient in a new section of Children's Asthma Research Institute and Hospital (CARIH), the largest such facility in the Western Hemisphere.

**QUICK CHECK**

The airtight plethysmograph helps determine just how severely lung function has been impaired, said Dr. Hyman Chai, director of hospital services.

Confined in the chamber with its fixed volume of air, the youngsters breathe through a device that feeds measurements of pressure and volume outside to a console, where readings permit quick calculation of lung function.

The device also is used by physicians to measure the effectiveness of therapy. "I can see whether what I'm doing is really working," said Dr. Chai. "We can't rely on the subjective reporting by the child."

**THEY FEEL FINE**

"If they're planning to go bowling, they may be wheezing and still say they feel fine," he said.

CARIH, with 165 beds, provides free treatment and care for children from throughout the United States who suffer from chronic and unmanageable asthma. Researchers here also are looking for the causes of asthma and other allergic diseases.

While nine of 10 children improve under medical supervision, it is estimated there are 300,000 children with severe restrictions of airways. CARIH estimates 80 per cent of the severely afflicted patients it treats either improve so that little medication is required or become asthma free. Virtually all the others improve enough to attend school regularly and participate in most normal childhood activities.

## Student Financial Aid Outlined For Lions Club

Financial aid to students, especially on a college level, was outlined to the Downtown Lions Club by Dr. Dawson DeViney, at the Wednesday meeting in the Settles.

"It's not a grab bag," Dr. DeViney, administrative dean at Howard County Junior College, told the club. "Help is based almost entirely upon need."

Programs, he said, "fit into three basic categories of employment, loans and grants."

Dr. DeViney urged prompt action by interested students and suggested they apply for aid in general, because often a combination of programs is necessary to meet needs. His office counsels with applicants about hours of work, loans, etc.

The college has a work program of its own, which is supplemented by the federally supported work-study program. So far as possible, students are urged to earn their way as they go. Often, however, loans are necessary. Chief source is the National Defense Education Agency with its emphasis upon education, mathematics, English and science. The three per cent interest does not start until the student leaves (or graduates from) school, and those who go into teaching may have half the loan forgiven at the rate of 10 per cent per five years. Grants come mostly in the form of scholarships, he said.

The Texas Opportunity Plan has been added to supplement the NDEA loans and offers loans up to \$1,000 for a nine-month period. The six per cent interest starts at the time the loan is made, but assistance may be had for half of this.

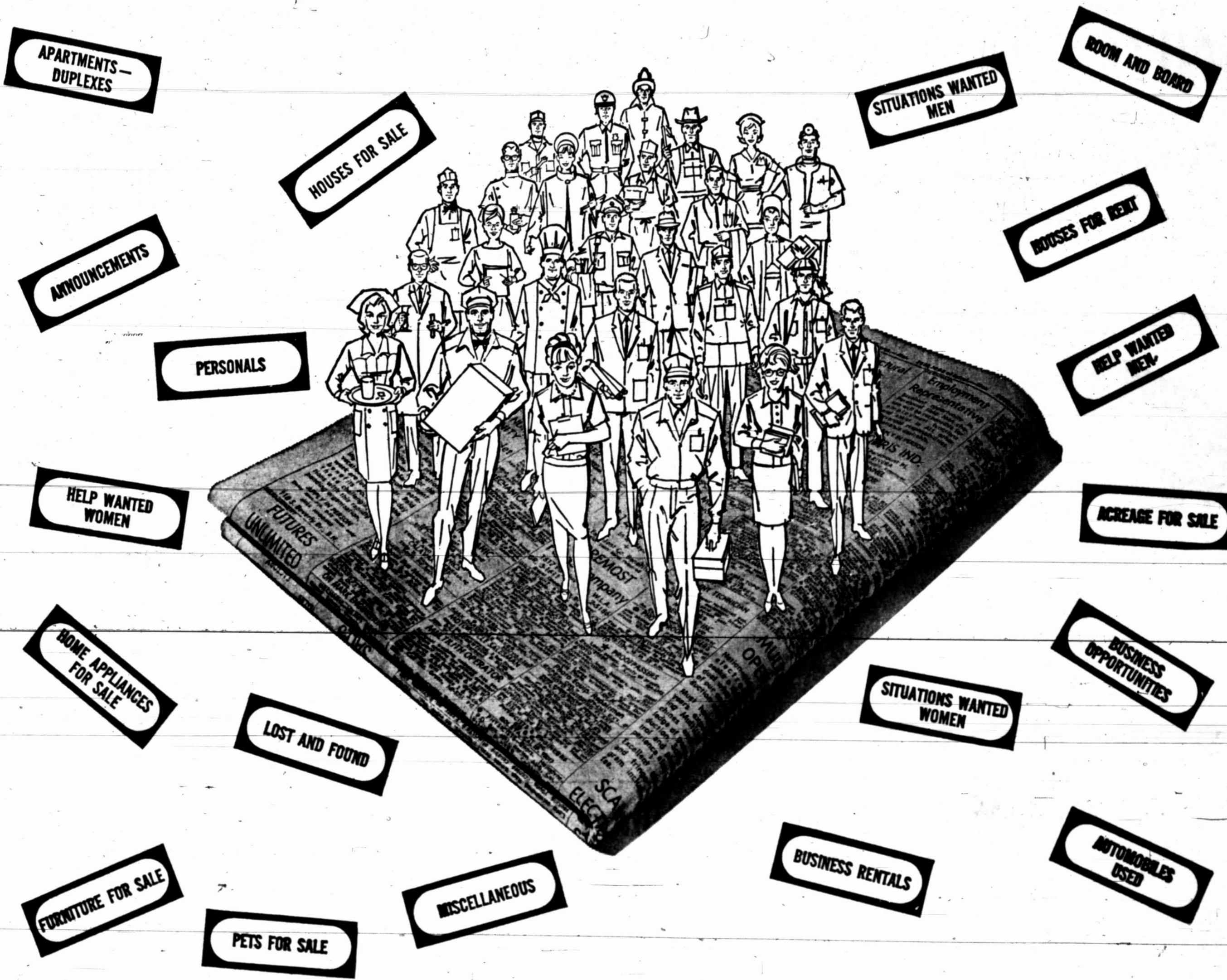

### Looking For Job After Victory

EMINENCE, Ky. (AP) — Deputy Sheriff Leland Payton is looking for a job.

Sheriff Vernon Rucker fired him Wednesday after Payton won the Democratic nomination for sheriff in Tuesday's primary. Rucker, who supported Payton's opponent, Billy Hawkins, said he got tired of paying Payton "to electioneer." He said Payton had not done any work since March.

### Gas Chamber In Storage

SALEM, Ore. (AP) — Oregon's gas chamber is going into storage.

John J. Galvin, state corrections director, said Wednesday that the state prison building housing the gas chamber will be torn down to make space for an exercise yard and the chamber will be put in storage.

The gas chamber was installed in 1937 after the legislature changed the method of execution from hanging. Oregon voters abolished the death penalty in 1964.

### \$50 Million Sub Sinking 'Inexcusable Carelessness'

WALLEJO, Calif. (AP) — A breakdown in communications between work crews filling and emptying water tanks on opposite ends of the ship, unaware of each other's work, caused the \$50 million nuclear submarine Guitaro to sink at its outfitting lock May 15, a Congressional subcommittee says.

The report, issued Wednesday by three congressmen, said the circumstances which sent the submarine to the bottom of the Napa River in 35 feet of water was "wholly avoidable" and occurred because of "inexcusable carelessness."

No one was injured and the vessel was refloated May 18. Crews began repairing damage running into millions of dollars, and sought to have it ready for commissioning scheduled later this year.

The congressmen, Samuel Stratton, D-N.Y., John E. Hunt, R-N.J., and William J. Randall, D-Mo., said their interim report would be followed by a fuller one to the parent House Armed Services Committee.

Their report told the following story of events:

A nonnuclear crew was moving and adding water in forward tanks to trim the ship so it would be suitable for tests to be

conducted by a nuclear crew in the aft portion of the sub.

Meantime, the nuclear crew, thinking the vessel already in trim and unaware of the other workers' activity, began its own tank calibration tests using water.

After the nonnuclear crew had added 3,000 gallons of water to ballast tanks to lower the bow, it went to lunch.

At 7:50 p.m. the nuclear group began emptying five tons of water from the aft section, completing the job at 8:30 p.m.

A member of the nuclear group noted a sudden marked dip in the ship forward and went to investigate. At the same time the other workers returned and noticed the submarine down sharply at the bow "with massive flooding taking place through several large open hatches."

The report said efforts to prevent the sinking by closing water tight openings in bulkheads within the ship were thwarted because numerous construction lines and power cables passing through them could not be detached quickly.

At 8:35 p.m. the Guitaro was on the river bottom.

The congressmen said the sinking was the outgrowth of "inadequate coordination of ship construction activities... failure to assign specific responsibilities... inexcusable carelessness."

Workers at the Mare Island Naval Shipyard have contributed the equivalent of \$50,000 in vacation time to aid in repairing the Guitaro.

A Naval Board of Inquiry investigating the sinking has called more than 20 witnesses since it was convened last week.
