

SENATORS WANT TO TEST SENTIMENT AT HOME Demos To Delay ABM Debate

WASHINGTON (AP) — Democratic leaders have decided to postpone Senate action on the controversial Safeguard missile defense system until members can reassess home-state sentiment during a July 4 recess.

Sen. John Stennis, D-Miss., chairman of the Senate Armed Services Committee, a Safeguard supporter, suggested the postponement. He told colleagues privately that when he brings a military procurement bill before the Senate containing Safeguard authorization he wants to keep it there without a break until there is a show-down vote.

Concurring in this, Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield of Montana, a Safeguard critic, said in an interview he thinks it would be a mistake to bring the bill up and then to have to lay it aside for the holiday, which starts July 3.

What effect the delay in Senate action on the ABM might have on the trend of public opinion remains to be seen.

Mansfield conceded that a week of appearances in Montana left him confused about public reaction. Montana has been designated as one of the two sites for the ABM installations.

"There is more interest among the people of my state in farm prices, with wheat selling below corn, and they are jittery about what the new 8 1/2 per cent interest rate is going to do to them," Mansfield said. "ABM comes in about third in their interests."

"I have had about 500 letters on ABM, 450 of them opposing it. But on the other hand a recognized polling agency reports that the people of Montana are two to one in favor of ABM."

Sen. Milton R. Young, R-N.D., said he came away from a recent visit to North Dakota, which would house the other missile site, with the impression that 75 per cent of the people favor ABM. He is an ABM backer.

Stennis's committee had before it today a special subcommittee report unanimously urging a cutback of nearly \$1 billion in military research and development but divided on a proposal for a moratorium on the testing of multiple headed missiles.

Sens. Thomas J. McIntyre, D-N.H., Edward W. Brooke, R-Mass., and Stephen M. Young, D-Ohio, all ABM critics, are sponsoring the latter move. Sen. Harry F. Byrd, D-Va., an ABM supporter, opposes it.

A. J. Belo Corp. Adds TV Station

DALLAS (AP) — Purchase of the Beaumont Television Corp. was announced Monday by the A. J. Belo Corp., which also owns the Dallas News and radio and television stations WFAA.

Joe M. Dealey, Belo president, said the stock of the Beaumont firm, which operates TV station KFDM, was bought for about \$5 million. KFDM is a CBS affiliate.

Principal owners of the selling firm are Darrold A. Cannon Sr., president, and C.B. Lock Sr., executive vice president.

Mike Shapiro, general manager of FAA properties, was named president of Beaumont Television. Shapiro also is one of the new directors along with Dealey, H. Ben Decherd, James M. Moroney Jr., Joe A. Lubben and William C. Smellage, also Belo directors, and Locke.

Final papers signed Monday made the transfer effective June 1. It has been approved by the Federal Communication Commission.

Few Brazilians Turn Out To Greet Gov. Rockefeller

BRASILIA, Brazil (AP) — Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller meets with Brazil's armed forces commanders and leaders of the suspended congress today before flying to Rio de Janeiro, the next stop on his fact-finding mission for President Nixon.

Few residents of this backwoods capital turned out Monday to greet Rockefeller and few of them cheered, but there were no violent anti-U.S. demonstrations like those that marked his previous Latin-American visits.

The only incident occurred Monday night as the New York governor conferred with President Arthur da Costa e Silva. Witnesses said four young men drove past the hotel housing the Rockefeller mission and shouted: "We'll kill the son of a bitch." Police caught one of the men.

There were unverified reports authorities had jailed about 300 potential troublemakers, mostly students, before Rockefeller arrived.

Da Costa e Silva and Rockefeller were reported to have talked about Brazil's needs and problems and the objectives of the military-backed regime "in a frank and warm discussion" in Spanish, Portuguese and English.

The Brazilian president was said to have stressed the same points other Latin-American leaders made to Rockefeller — the need for increased aid and liberalized U.S. trade policies so Latin America can sell more in the U.S. market.

Da Costa e Silva also reportedly asked for a more sympathetic view of the repressive measures he says have been necessary to insure his country's political stability. The measures included an indefinite suspension of the congress.

After leaving Rio de Janeiro, the governor will fly to Sao Paulo for a one-day visit, then go to Paraguay. No demonstrations are expected in Paraguay.

He will wind up this third leg of his Latin-American tour in Uruguay, where students and workers protesting the visit have threatened to stage strikes and demonstrations.

Right To Stage Antiwar Rally

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP) — Delegates to Wolverine Boys' State, an American Legion exercise in citizenship, won the right to stage an anti-Vietnam war rally today.

"This is supposed to be an exercise in democracy," said Walter McKelvey of Detroit, secretary of the Boys' State Commission, in announcing the rally would be permitted.

"After all, we can't impose our own ideas on these young people."

American Legion policy generally has been in support of the Vietnam war.

There are more than 1,200 delegates to the week-long meeting at Michigan State University.

When plans for the antiwar rally became known, McKelvey said "We won't permit it. We will break it up."

McKelvey said later, however, the rally would be permitted since the Boys' State commissioners were informed it would be a peaceful demonstration.

"Those who want to attend will be allowed to," he said. "Those who don't want to attend, won't. A peaceful rally is quite different from a demonstration."



He Socks It To 20,000 People

NEW YORK (AP) — Evangelist Billy Graham socked it to 20,000 people—half of them under 25—in a "Youth Night" crusade at Madison Square Garden Monday.

"The real hang-up in your life is what to do about God," Graham told the crowd. "Young people are lost, confused, frustrated and are seeking a way back to God."

Graham, 50, drew about 1,000 people forward at the end of the service to make a "commitment for Christ." Later they went into adjacent rooms to receive Bible literature and advice from counselors of the Billy Graham Evangelistic Association.

A spokesman for the crusade said 2,817 people had come forward "for Christ" during the first three-days of the 10-day campaign.

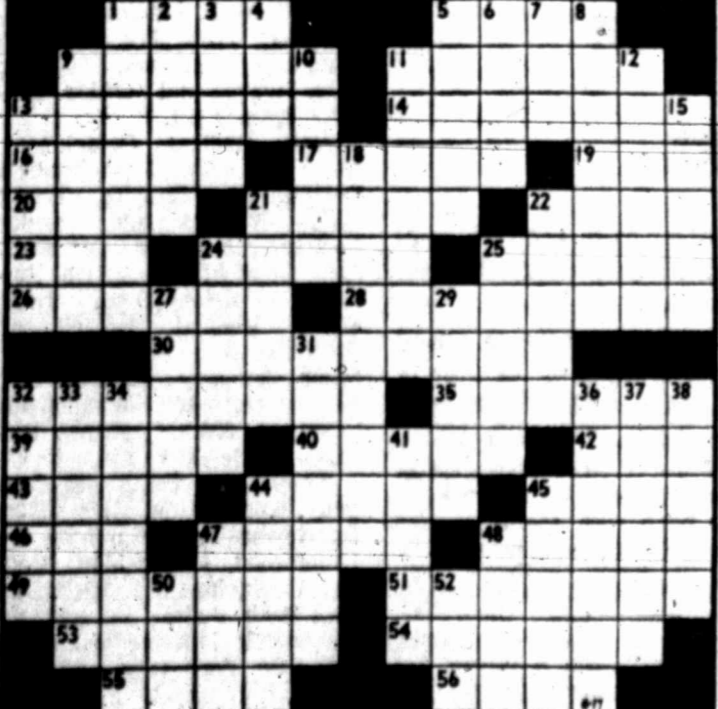

What Happens If Senate Won't Take Back Bills?

AUSTIN (AP) — Atty. Gen. Crawford Martin has been asked what happens if the Senate refuses to take back 41 bills Gov. Preston Smith is trying to return and, in effect, kill.

Sen. A. R. Schwartz of Galveston, asked Martin for the answer Monday, broadening his June 12 request for an opinion on whether the governor can refuse to accept the bills for his consideration.

The 41 bills, including a measure setting up 27 new district courts and a package of new beach control laws, were delivered to Smith's office by the Senate seven days after the legislature adjourned June 2. He complained this infringing on his constitutional right to consider bills up to 20 days after the end of the session if they pass in the final days.

Smith also said the bills were not physically signed by the speaker and lieutenant governor in the presence of the two houses as required by the constitution.

DeMolays Win '70 Conclave

Members of the Leon P. Moffett chapter of the Order of DeMolay will be hosts next year to a West Texas area conclave, due to be attended by some 400 youths, adult leaders and parents who join in the activities.

The local chapter won the next year's gathering at the 1969 conclave held this past weekend in Lubbock. The meeting next year will likely be held in June, with dates yet to be set.

The conclave entails several business meetings as well as various recreational activities for the young men in DeMolay.

Parents On Welfare Rolls Ask Commencement Fees

CHICAGO (AP) — Parents on welfare rolls demanded public aid today to meet school graduation expenses of seniors in predominantly Negro slum areas.

A spokesman for the National Welfare Rights Organization said a federal court suit was planned as a result of complaints by the poor that commencement fees were beyond their means.

Cornelia Williams, one of the parents who complained, said her son, Jessie, received a bill for more than \$33 as the price for full participation in graduation exercises at DuSable High School on the South Side.

Mrs. Williams' itemized bill graduation exercises, 50 cents; cap and gown, \$3.75; class gifts, 75 cents; announcements, \$1.40; year book, \$7.50; dinner-dance, \$18; ribbon, 75 cents; contingency fund, 50 cents.

Michael Lefkowitz of the Community Legal Council said the problem also existed at grade school level. He said seniors at one elementary school received this letter:

"Congratulations! Your name is on the list of tentative graduates in June, 1969. Please remember that you must meet all of the requirements before you can graduate. All fees must be paid." The bill totaled \$6.

Lefkowitz said commencement plans and charges were left to individual principals in the Chicago school system. He said the federal court action would be directed against the state and county public aid departments.

At a news conference Monday, Virginia Mack, a spokesman of the welfare rights organization, said the Public Aid Department should pay graduation fees for children whose parents are on welfare rolls.

Mrs. Mack cited a section in a public aid manual stating that funds may be spent for items "essential for a child's participation in an educational experience important to his development."

School officials were not available for comment.

The symposium is timed to bring the world's textile industry leaders to Texas Tech for the open house at the recently expanded Textile Research Center, itself a rarity in textile research.

The center will be the "only university related research laboratory in the nation capable of performing textile operations on a commercial scale from fiber processing to dyed and finished materials," according to Director John R. Bradford, dean of the Tech School of Engineering.





Second Large Cairo Fire

CAIRO, Ill. (AP) — The second large fire in two days has destroyed a wood products firm which had given jobs to hard-core unemployed Negroes.

The fire in the Cairo Wood Products Inc. was one of three fires in the city Monday night, all of which fire officials attributed to arson.

Phillip Marsden, Wood Products owner, estimated his loss at from \$70,000 to \$80,000 in the destruction of two large buildings, machinery, lumber and finished products.

Two vacant frame houses in another section of Cairo were hit by small fires which were quickly extinguished.

A large warehouse was destroyed by flames Sunday night in a recurrence of the racial violence that has troubled Cairo sporadically for two years. Police and firemen were driven from the scene of that fire by gunfire.

No shooting was reported at any of the fires Monday night although the wood products firm was located near Pyramid Courts, an all-Negro housing project that has been the focal point of most of the shooting and firebombing in the extreme Southern Illinois river community.

The wood products firm manufactured pallets used by the U.S. government to ship ammunition. Marsden said the last shipment of the pallets was destroyed in the fire. Marsden employed up to 52 young Negroes, many of whom were unskilled and considered racial militants.

C-C Board, Labor Leaders Plan Further Cooperation

Further consultations between representatives of the Chamber of Commerce directorate and the Central Labor Council have been held, looking toward cooperative activity in various civic programs and economic development projects.

Representatives of the council met with C-C directors some weeks ago to suggest a more cooperative link in community programs. This led to further conferences, and Dr. Milton T. Abbott, representing the Chamber in the program, said that he felt that more effective work might be accomplished by having labor representatives serve on various C-C committees.

He gave his report at a Chamber board meeting Monday.

July 28 Durbin Trial Date Set

AUSTIN (AP) — Dist. Atty. Bob Smith says he will request a July 28 trial date for Clyde Durbin Jr. in the murder of John Albert White, a University of Texas student killed Jan. 6 at a popular picnic site.

Durbin's attorney, Frank Maloney, said he could be ready for trial by July 28.

Smith also said he would ask Dist. Judge Tom Blackwell to set the pre-trial hearing for July 14. Durbin also is charged with the slaying of White's picnic date, Keitha Morris, 19, of White Deer, also a University of Texas student. His trial in Miss Morris' death is scheduled in Burnet for Sept. 29.

Commander To Storm Peak Again If Need Be

SAIGON (AP) — Up to 1,000 North Vietnamese have returned to Ap Bia Mountain scene of a bloody battle, intelligence sources said today, and a U.S. commander declared he is prepared to storm the peak again if need be.

U.S. planes have drawn enemy ground fire in recent days when they flew near the 3,000-foot mountain whose capture touched off a bitter debate in Congress.

Maj. Gen. John M. Wright Jr., commander of the U.S. 101st Airborne Division, told an interviewer that if a new attack is deemed necessary, "I am prepared to commit everything that it takes, up to the entire division to do the job."

More than 50 Americans were killed last month in a 10-day drive to take the peak in the A Shau Valley.

Sen. Edward M. Kennedy, D-Mass., charged that it was "senseless and irresponsible" for Americans to spend so many dollars capturing "hills and positions that have no relation to ending the conflict."

Wright's predecessor as commander of the 101st, Maj. Gen. Melvin L. Zais, defended his decision to take Ap Bia, saying his mission was to attack and destroy the enemy wherever they are.

The Ap Bia battle was fought by troops participating in Operation Apache Snow in the A Shau Valley, which ended June 7.

The U.S. Command today took the security wraps off a new allied drive in the valley.

launched June 8 by 2,000 paratroopers. The new sweep, called Montgomery Rendezvous, is located on the opposite side of the valley from Ap Bia Mountain. Spokesmen said it was simply a continuation of Apache Snow in a different area of operation.

In the 10 days since Montgomery Rendezvous was launched, paratroopers from the 3rd Brigade of the 101st Airborne Division have killed 106 North Vietnamese troops, the U.S. Command said. American casualties were reported at 21 killed and 130 wounded.

The wounded included Col. Joseph B. Conny Jr. of Washington, D.C., the 3rd Brigade commander who directed the assault on Ap Bia Mountain and until Saturday was directing Montgomery Rendezvous.

A communique from the U.S. headquarters of Gen. Creighton W. Abrams said the aim of the new drive is to "capture or destroy enemy forces, materiel and installations in the operational area."

Near Da Nang, meanwhile, 300 North Vietnamese troops firing rifles, machine guns and rocket-propelled grenades, attacked a U.S. Marine base for the third time in a week and for the third time they were hurled back.

Field reports said the North Vietnamese hit the night camp of a 5th Marine Regiment unit 2 1/2 miles southwest of Da Nang despite a 7,000-man allied sweep in the area. Thirty-one North Vietnamese were reported killed while Marine casualties were one dead and 49 wounded.

CALL FOR HELP

The Marines called for artillery help and an Air Force twin-engine plane armed with three machine guns spewed out 18,000 rounds a minute on the attackers.

"No enemy were reported to have penetrated the perimeter," a spokesman for the U.S. Command said. Two North Vietnamese soldiers were captured, he added.

The camp came under similar attack last Tuesday and again last Thursday, costing the North Vietnamese 38 men killed. Marine casualties were three killed and 31 wounded in those two attacks.

The camp is near An Hoa, one corner of a 200-square mile triangle where 7,000 U.S. and South Korean Marines and South Vietnamese rangers and infantrymen have been conducting a sweep called Operation Pipestone Canyon for the past three weeks. The other corners of the triangle are Da Nang, South Vietnam's second largest city, and Hoi An.

DOWN COPTERS

The task force claims to have killed more than 300 of the estimated 2,000 North Vietnamese troops in the triangle. The area has been used as a staging point for attacks on Da Nang and the big Marine combat base at An Hoa.

In another operation called Frederick Hill 20 miles east of An Hoa, U.S. 198th Light Infantry Brigade soldiers reported killing 17 North Vietnamese in a three-hour battle. One American was wounded.

North and South can make a small slam in either one of the major suits with but a slight edge in the total high card strength, thanks to the excellent distributional fit. However, most of the pairs that encountered the deal in a recent tournament failed to get beyond the level of game.

At most tables, after South's opening bid of one heart was raised to two, South proceeded without further ado to four hearts. Inasmuch as North is limited to a maximum of 10 points for his response and South has but 15 in high cards himself, it does not appear likely that the partnership has the assets required for a slam undertaking. One South saw no harm in

making one try on the way up, and over two hearts, he rebid two spades—which is a one round force inasmuch as hearts is the agreed suit. North reacted enthusiastically by jumping to four spades, and South realized that he had struck a vein of gold in his partner's hand. There was still a possibility however that the opposition might be able to cash two aces. Suppose for example, that North has:
▲ Q J 10 2 10 8 5 3 ♣ Q x x ♠ A x x
South decided to probe further by bidding five diamonds to designate first round control of that suit. If North had the ace of diamonds as part of his values, he might be expected to recognize the duplication of values that existed and merely sign off at five hearts.

North was tempted to go directly to slam himself since his holding in spades obviously solidified South's second suit. Without a control in clubs, however, North contented himself with a bid of five spades. South carried on to six. He felt the slam, at worst, would hinge on the favorable location of the ace of clubs.

There was nothing to the play for the defense could cash only one club trick. In fact, if West does not lead the ace of clubs, South will take all 13 tricks, for after drawing trump he can discard both of North's clubs on the long hearts and then ruff out his losers.

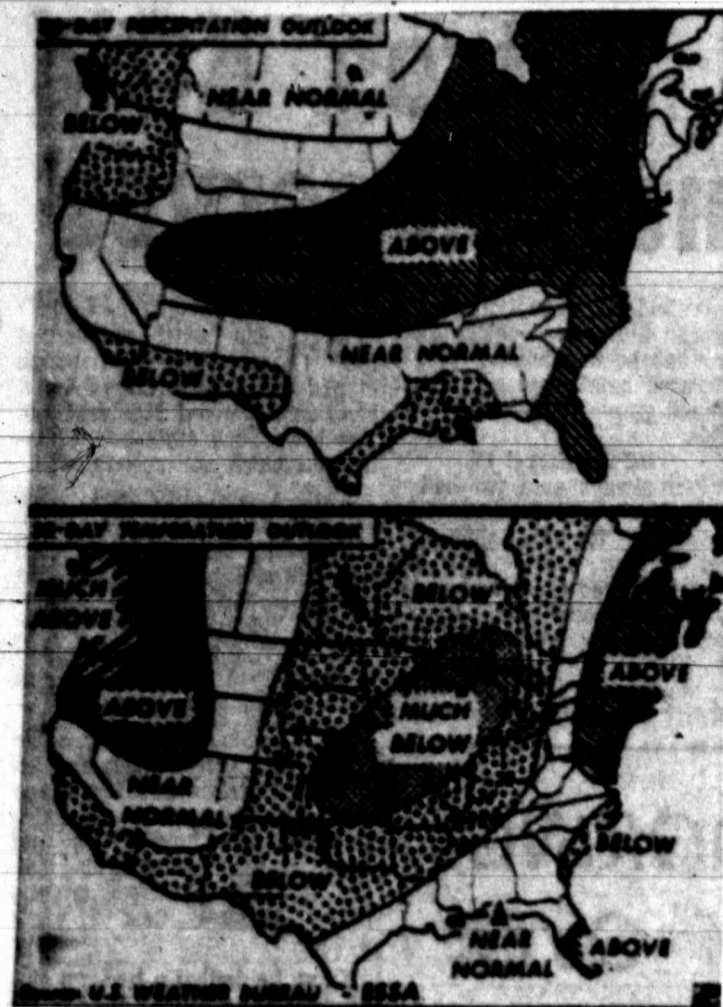

To the Editor: The advertisement favoring the proposed anti-ballistic missile system you carried, unsigned, in your paper on June 15, was typical of grassroots politics. It did not deal with the issue in any rational way, preferring to rely on unfounded charges and an approach that labelled all opponents of the system as either communists or "deluded" fellow travelers.

His Old Boss Puts Squeeze On Pompidou

PARIS (AP) — President-elect Georges Pompidou is reported under pressure from his old boss to select a faithful Gaullist as his foreign minister — one who would keep intact France's basic foreign policy of the last 11 years.

The morning newspaper L'Aurore, which opposed the election of Pompidou, reported: "De Gaulle reportedly made known his very firm desire to see his foreign minister (Debre) kept at his post, guaranteeing in his eyes the continuity of his foreign policy."

Debre was De Gaulle's main spokesman in enunciating policies that kept Britain out of the Common Market, banned arms shipments to Israel and kept France out of playing a major role in uniting Europe.

Parker Murder Trial Under Way

FORT WORTH (AP) — A seven-man jury today began hearing testimony in the trial of J. Loyd Parker Jr., accused of the 1963 shooting of his wealthy father.

The defense is expected to argue that Parker, a prosperous Fort Worth businessman and socialite, was temporarily insane when he shot his father.

Before the jury questioning started, Parker tried to fire his lawyers, William Alexander, a former Dallas prosecutor, and Fred Pick of Fort Worth.

Violence We Can Look For—Like It Or Not

BALTIMORE, Md. (AP) — A historian who codirected a federal study of violence in America believes that "continued violence is something we can look for—like it or not."

"We are a pluralistic society with group frictions. We are also an affluent and liberal society with a helluva lot of turmoil for a long time," said Dr. Hugh Davis Graham, a Johns Hopkins University history professor.

Graham was codirector with Dr. Fred Robert Gurr of Princeton University of the report issued in early June by the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence.
