RIGHTS VIOLATED?

Deck Officer Of Destroyer Won't Testify

SUBIC BAY, Philippines (AP)-Lt. (j.g.) Ronald C. Ramsey, deck officer of the U.S. destroyer Frank E. Evans on the night she was sliced in half by the Australian aircraft carrier Melbuorne, declined to testify today before the investigating board and asked to be permanently excused from the hear-

Ramsey, 24, who has been advised he is "suspected of negligence" in the collision, claimed his constitutional rights had been violated. His attorney, Navy Lt. Frederick Tilton, 27, said Ramsey decided not to testify because he had been denied access to testimony from previous witnesses, refused the right to cross-examine witnesses and refused the right to recall witnesses.

The lawyer said Ramsey's request to be permanently excused was "based not on what we know, but what we don't know and must know." The joint U.S. - Australian board recessed to con-

NIXON'S ANTI-INFLATION PACKAGE PASSAGE PREDICTED

Demos Balking At Surtax Extension

WASHINGTON (AP) - House Republican Leader Gerald R. Ford of Michigan said today President Nixon has received firm assurances of both Democratic and Republican chiefs in the House-and he believes in the Senate-that they will go all out to get an extension of the income surtax.

Ford, with Senate Republican Leady Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois, tacking him up, said at the White Louse that it would be catastrophic at home and abroad if the tax bill were not approved. And he said that Nixon feels there should be no compromise on a three-prong meas-

ure to extend the 10 per cent surtax for six months to January 1 and 5 per cent for the next six months, phase out a 7 per cent investment credit, and remove millions of poor people

But there are indications that some Democrats in the House Ways and Means Committee are balking at a surtax extension beyond six months.



A False Tax 'Reform'

Among ideas listed for study under that which would remove exemption on revenues from the bonds of various local, district and state governmental

Congressman Omar Burleson, a member of the House Ways and Means Committee studying various new tax changes, sounded a warning while in Big Spring over the weekend that the removal of such exemptions could play havoc not only with the financing of projects needed on the local level, such as city or county public construction and school buildings, but ultimately would mean that the federal government takes over such financing and thus enters into more local control.

We think Mr. Burleson's warning is well taken, and suggest that citizens let their congressmen and senators know that this is not a real tax "reform" at all.

Because of the exempt category, cities have been able to float bonds to build water and sewer plants, schools have been able to float bonds for new plants, and obtain a lower

rate of interest. This lower rate, of course, comes back to benefit the local taxpayer.

If the exemption were removed, the tax rate on such bonds would more than double, and actually price local governmental units out of the market. The local taxpayer simply could not shoulder the load.

The next step, if local projects are necessity? This would be that the federal government would have to subsidize the bond issues, or the improvement projects, or both. And this means, as has been proven historically, that Washington would have even more say-so on how local governments run their business. And it is also historically proven that government money costs the taxpayer more in the long run.

The life-blood of local government agencies could be at stake here. It is also a matter of economics. We recognize that the federal tax structure can stand overhauling, but we are opposed to this scheme of getting more revenue by abolishing the "tax exempts." It surely means more cost at the local level.

Answers may be forthcoming before long. The White House has announced the creation of a President's Committee on the Vietnam Veteran. The veterans' failure to use their educational rights in anticipated numbers will be of primary interest to the committee. That is as it should be. No other aspect of the VA's work has greater long-range significance, so far as the quality of life for service veterans is concerned, than the educational program.

THE SMALL withdrawal is an experiment and nothing else. It can have one or more of several results. The most desirable result would be for North Vietnam to reciprocate by pull-back of forces. The next most desirable result would be a favorable break in the Paris talks, possibly managed by Soviet diplomacy.

If nothing of the sort takes place. if the Communists again raise the level of violence, Mr. Nixon may well expect an alternative result that never was the good fortune of Kennedy or Johnson. The President, having commenced de-escalation and been snubbed by the Communists for his peace-move, would hope to hear full-throated instructions from a voice" to which he is keenly attuned - the voice of public opinion.

Legislation Won't Repress Students WASHINGTON - The conspiracy

theory to explain away the turbulence on the campuses is like a feather bed. You fall back into its comfortable embrace with no need for the painful process of thought. That is what certain congressional committees are about to do in spite of warnings in sober commission reports that this will serve the cause of the extremists by alienating the moderates

From sources with the surest reason to know, it can be stated that the theory of a Communist conspiracy supported from abroad is simply untrue. If any money has come from Peking or Moscow to finance the extremist wing of Students for a Democratic Society the total is so small as to be negligible. THE PHENOMENON of campus-

unrest is so prevasive and so deepseated that the conspiracy theory is wholly irrelevant. Recognition of this fact in many universities and colleges is bringing acknowledgment of the need for authority to meet the student challenge and share in the decisionmaking process particularly where discipline and punishment are involved. Opposition to the Vietnam war on almost every campus in the country cannot be ignored.

AT YALE an overwhelming majority of the senior class signed a petition asking that the commencement be dedicated to expression of opposition to Vietnam. Kingman Brewster, one of the most-far-seeing university heads, agreed to break with precedent and invite a speaker selected by the seniors. Class Secretary William McIlwaine Thompson delivered a short but stirring address.

TODAY AS WE leave Yale." he said, "a sense of frustration and despair overwhelms us. On some campuses this frustration has erupted

into a violence which has shocked the American public. And yet the same public condones violence abroad in senseless military action killing thousands of Americans and Vietnamese.

At the University of Iowa, where commencement went off peacefully, the honors graduate chosen as the student speaker was Mrs. Laurel Harbour Corn. Condemning the war and the failure at home to halt the pollution of the environment, she drew warm applause. President Howard Bowen is one of a growing number of administrators aware of the flaws in the traditional academic structure and the long-term reasons for student

ONE HANDICAP in the series of student explosions across the country has been the lack of any substantial advance intelligence that could have defused the time bomb. To what extent have the extremists coordinated their attacks? How nearly are they motivated by the same ideology, whether Maoist, anarchist or whatever? So many pieces of the student puzzle are missing that simply to push them together into a conspiracy pattern is a wishful delusion.

MILTON EISENHOWER at a press conference releasing a report on campus unrest by the National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence had some wise things to say. He advised against hasty legislative measures to repress disruption. He urged university authorities to solve the problem of keeping order by drawing up guidelines for reasonable protest in cooperation with moderate students. Those words of wisdom coming from one who for 11 years presided over a great university should be written up large in the halls of every legislative body.
