and Mrs. R. B. Snell, Lamesa, was killed in action on June 14, in Vietnam, the family has been advised.

Capt. Snell, a graduate of West Point in 1966, was artillery officer with the 101 Airborne Division at the time of his death. He was in command of a fire support base when the action developed , which took his life. He was reported missing in action on June 14, his death was officially confirmed Wednesday.

The body of Capt. Snell is being flown back to Lamesa and is being escorted by his brother-inlaw, Lt. Ronald Bloom, Services are pending at Branon-Philips Funeral Home, but no date for the arrival of the body has been determined.

Capt. Snell was a graduate of Lamesa High School in the class of 1962. He received an appointment to West Point Military Academy and received his commission as second lieutenant in 1966. No information was immediately available on how long he had served in Vietnam.

His father is a Dawson County attorney.

The charges were made at the 22nd full-scale session of the talks.

Ambassador Lawrence E. Walsh, speaking in the absence of the chief U.S. negotiator, Henry Cabot Lodge, described as inflexible and rigid the attitude of North Vietnam and the Viet Cong-backed provisional revolutionary government. He said it was "blocking the progress here in Paris."

South Vietnam's representative, Pham Dang Lam, said:

"Your attitude clearly lacks the good faith which in all serious negotiations. Per-haps, you wish to arrive at an agreement in which the winner dictates to the loser." Walsh repeated U.S. demands for mutual withdrawal of all outside troops from South Vietnam, declaring if was not enough for North Vietnam to state that the question of the Vietnamese forces was a matter to be settled by the Vienamese parties "We will not accept a one-sided withdrawal from South Vietnam," Walsh said. ferring to the other side's insistence that progress cannot be made in Paris until a provisional coalition government is set up in South Vietnam, Walsh said: "This amounts to saying that you will not enter into meaningful negotiations with our side unless we accept in advance the outcome which you seek. That is a position which seems designed to block progress at these negotiations." It was the first session since the new provisional revolutionary government took over the National Liberation Front's seat at the conference table last Thursday. Because the new government has adopted the NLF's 10-point peace plan, no new initiative was expected from its foreign minister, Mrs. Nguyen Thi Binh, who now heads the delegation.

Kill Eight Arabs

TEL AVIV (AP) - Israeli patrols killed eight Arab infiltrators on the occupied Golan Heights of Syria and near the Israeli-held Gaza Strip, the army announced today.

Four members of a Syrian reconnaissance unit were killed Wednesday night rear Khoushniveh on the Syria-Israel cease-fire line, a spokesman said. It was the second reconnaissance unit the Israelis have intercepted there this week. Four infiltrators were killed near the settlement

of Mifalsim, bordering on the Gaza Strip, the army said.

The incidents came a few hours after an Israeli air raid against Jordanian and Iraqi artillery units in Jordan.

Gun Battle In Saigon

Assassination Sparks

SAIGON (AP) - Sharp fighting swirled on three sides of Tay Ninh City today but miliern approaches. tary spokesmen said allied forces smashed an energy attempt to overrun the key provincial capital 50 miles northwest of Saigon.

Elsewhere, North Vietnamese commandos blasted their way into a U.S. artillery base in the north: 63 rocket attacks hit allied towns and bases overnight -the highest number of shellings since June 6-and two Viet Cong terrorists assassinated a Saigon city councilman. The assassination of City Councilman Van Dien Quang touched off a wild gun battle in the heart of Cholon, Saigon's Chinese quarter. A woman bystander and one of the terrorists were killed, and three women and one man were wounded. The second gunman escaped on a motor scooter, but was be-

lieved wounded by police gunfire Tay Ninh City, the capital of Tay Ninh Province which borders Cambodia, was reported threatened by elements of two North Vietnamese divisions. Field reports said about a dozen enemy troops infiltrated the southeastern corner of the city while the enemy battled U.S.

Enemy gunners also shelled parts of the city and a dozen allied camps and outposts defending it. One rocket slammed into the city jail, killing one prisoner and wounding 60. forces.

Some of the fiercest fighting was reported at Fire Base Washington, about five miles northwest of Tay Ninh, manned by the U.S. 25th Infantry Division. Enemy soldiers believed to be from the Viet Cong's 9th Division got to within 50 yards of the camp perimeter but American artillery blunted the attack. Field reports said 35 enemy were killed and six prisoners were taken while 14 Americans were wounded.

"Then they launched a ground probe. It was not too heavy. We engaged them before they got up close. A battery of howitzers was firing direct fire and there was artillery support from five other nearby bases.'

The attackers set up antiaircraft machine guns in five positions and hit one of the American helicopter gunships that came with Air Force bombers to help the encircled base camp. But the chopper pilot guided his. craft to a safe landing at a nearby base.

The base was hit by about 150 rockets, mortar shells and rocket-propelled grenades during the two-hour battle.

'AND I FEEL GREAT' **Tot Found Alive** In Mountains

SAN BERNARDINO, Calif. (AP) — Six-year-old Matthew Zimmerman, found barely alive after four days lost in rugged mountain country, is already fretting over confinement in a hospital.

The boy's mother, Harriet Zimmerman, said, "He's a real fighter."

"He asked 'Where am I?"" Mrs. Zimmerman said. "I told him he was in the hospital and he told me, 'Get me out of here!""

Matthew was found unconscious Wednesday in a snowbank two miles from where he wandered away from a family outing Saturday. His heart stopped once en route to a hospital but was massaged back into action. "I can't believe it, the doctors can't believe it, but its realand it's so great!" said Mrs.

Zimmerman. "The two boys who found him did a wonderful job-we're just very lucky people."

A hospital medical report said the boy was suffering from dehydration but had no broken bones or serious injuries.

Matthew was the object of an intensive four-day search by as many as 250 sheriff's deputies forest rangers and volunteers. Just hours before the search was to be called off, Matthew was discovered nearly frozen, lying in a snowbank, by two young volunteers, Bill Bremman, 18, and Walter Ferguson, 17, both of San Bernardino,

The boy was rushed to Norton Air Force Base in a Marine helicopter.

During the flight, Matthew's heart stopped, but Deputy Sher-iff Oliver Gray and a helicopter crewman used chest massage to get it started again.

Col. Russell C. Payne, commander of the air base hospital, said, "It was extremely fortunate they found him when they did. He probably had only a few more hours to live."



Garrison Cities Next?

The National Commission on the Causes and Prevention of Violence is preparing a report which contends that the United States is moving toward an armed society which could result in "garrison cities where order is enforced without due process of

To see such a charge in print by a national commission is somewhat alarming.

But a little reflection can easily bring understanding for the basis of such a view. There has been a progressive breakdown in law and order in this nation. And it has been far from limited to the average citizen. We have seen government officials, men who are looked upon as national leaders, express open defiance to laws with which they do not agree.

Courts have released acknowledged criminals on slight technical points. Violence and dissension h a v e engulfed the land, symptoms of a deeper distrubance. And accompanying the deterioration ot law and order has been the erosion

ot morality. That such conditions could devolve into anarchy of a sort and this in turn lead to the establishment of garrison cities, to the death of freedom, to the establishment of a strict authoritarianism is well within the realm of the possible.

The liberties that we possess, the freedoms that we enjoy, if abused or not watched over with vigilance, can all too easily become empty words of no significance.

The spector of garrison cities, the actuality of George Orwell's "1984." are too close for comfort.

Soviets Move Into South Vietnam

IT MAY WELL be wondered why

new Viet Cong regime on a parity with the Saigon government, and the Communists will be making new demands through spokesmen of the so-called "provisional government."

THE UNITED STATES entered the Vietnam war at the request of the South Vietnam government and as a consequence of pledges made in the Southeast Asia collective defense treaty to come to the assistance of countries which were threatened by or were the victims of aggression. Now the aggressors have established their own "government" in South Vietnam, and it has been accorded formal recognition by most of the Communist-bloc governments. So at last the United States is faced, with open acts of unfriendliness toward this country by several nations/which lately have been given the impression from speeches in Congress that American trade barriers are about to be removed.

WASHINGTON - At last the slowly developing conspiracy of the Communists to take over both North and South Vietnam has come into the open. The Soviet Union in recent weeks encouraged other Communist-bloc countries to recognize the new "provisional government" of the Viet Cong in South Vietnam, and then itself extended formal recognition. Within the last few days, at least 16 nations have announced their

security clearances. This means the FBI is sent around to interview the applicant's relatives, friends, profes-sors and anyone who might have a nodding acquaintance with the jobseeker.
