Three-Way Split For Top Grid Prize

THE GENERAL ELECTION is getting closer all the time, and so far there has not been a great deal of activity, although some shots are beginning to be heard on the state level.

Gubernatorial candidates John Hill and Bill Clements have agreed to stage a debate on television just prior to the election, and from what we understand, Channel 7 in Amarillo will carry the debate for this area's benefit.

Then, Monday's news carried the details of a charge levelled by Krueger, John Tower's opponent. The charge was serious enough to cause Tower to break his previous agreement to appear with Krueger in a debate.

And in the 18th Congressional District, the Kent Hance camp charged George Bush with attempting to "buy" the election, and pointed out that a big part of his campaign contributions have come from outside the area.

State representative and House Speaker Bill Clayton made a campaign speech on Hance's behalf Monday in Lubbock. A little earlier, former congressman and present state representative Bob Price made a campaign swing with Bush, including a stop in Parmer County.

Those are the main races to be considered by voters on November 7, and of course voters in the Bovina and Rhea precinct will be electing a commissioner for a four-year term.

In addition to the races, voters will also be asked to vote on a slate of nine proposed constitutional amendments, including a "watered down" version of proposition 13 which has to do with state taxes.

It would behoove voters to make an effort to familiarize themselves with these amendments between now and election time, and we will make an attempt to study them and interpret them to the best of our ability.

Amendments to the state constitution are always submitted in so large a package that many times some of the proposals do not get much of a hearing—even those which should otherwise be given a lot of consideration. Usually one or two of the amendments gains enough support on a statewide level that they get the attention of at least a majority of the voters.

But on the others—the fate of the proposed constitutional amendments depends most times on the whims of voters who do not even know the nature of the proposals. And in most instances, voters will vote against a change if they do not understand it—and this is probably a good rule of thumb, rather than to vote blindly for a change.

CONGRESS ADJOURNED last weekend, with its usual barrage of last-minute legislation. There has not been sufficient time as yet to examine the last-minute bills which were passed, so that judgment can be made, one way or the other.

Texans were concerned over the energy legislation, as one proposal would have enabled residents of the north and east to buy our gas and oil at a price ceiling, while our own state residents would have no price guarantee.

We don't know how this portion of the bill fared, but like most Texans, we were hoping they would leave our oil and gas alone.

The bad part about last-minute legislation is the fact that often-times, some bad bills are passed when congress doesn't take the time to properly consider the legislation, but votes something through so they can adjourn and go home.

For the second straight week, an oddity happened concerning the weekly prize winners in the Friona Star's football contest. The three top contestants could not be separated, even on the tie-breaker system, and so the total cash prizes were split three ways.

The winners were Jimmy Pope, Linda Drake and C.H. Murphy, all with scores of 17, and each one by coincidence was 11 points off on the Dallas-St. Louis game score.

None of the winning contestants listed the same score for Dallas-St. Louis, but the point differential added up to a tie.

Just missing out on one of the cash prizes were two other contestants with scores of 17, Paul J. Smith and

Marlene Drake. And both of these contestants were 17 points away from the tie-breaker score.

The previous week, for the first time in the contest's history, three members of one family, Jackie, Dianne and Charlie Morgan, took first, second and third place in the contest. It is believed that the current week's three-way tie also is a "first," and certainly is since the number of contest games was expanded.

It's interesting to compare the games that the top contestants missed. All of the top three contestants missed three common games: Michigan-Michigan State; Texas A&M-Houston, and Washington-Philadelphia.

Pope's additional misses were Palo Duro-Canyon and Notre Dame-Pittsburgh. Linda Drake also missed Notre Dame-Pittsburgh and Rice-TCU. Murphy's other misses were Muleshoe-Idalou, and Minnesota-Los Angeles.

This made a total of ten of the contest games involved in the contestants who missed only five apiece, but a different combination of games.

Her score of 17 moved Marlene Drake into sole possession of the contest standings lead. The longtime contestant has a score of 97 after the sixth week.

Pope's 17 moved him into second place with a score of 96. Both Pope and Mrs. Drake passed the former leader, B.R. Mears, who dropped to third place with a score of 95 after a score of 14 for the week.

The top three contestants have a lead over the field, as the fourth-place group, composed of Myrna Cain, Linda Drake and Jerry Hinkle have scores of 92.

A total of 20 contestants have excellent scores of 90 or above, and 41 more are between 85 and 90, as the contest approaches the halfway mark, and with the potential of 154 total points still to be earned, there is still a lot of ground to be covered.

Coach Cortez, a strong worker in the Fellowship of Christian Athletes, has brought back the fighting pride to the Panhandle State Aggie football program. Cortez took the coaching job at PSU late in May when most recruiting was over but still found some athletes that has helped his program.

Leslie White Paces Chieftain "Stats"

Senior Leslie White led the Friona Chieftains in two categories, pass receiving and scoring, in the team's five non-conference games, according to a tally of the team statistics at mid-season.

White and Kevin Kothmann actually have the same number of pass receptions, but White has gained 285 yards on his completions, to 166 for Kothmann. White's average yards-per-play on his receptions is a glittering 40.7.

The slender blond, who plays end for the Chieftains on offense, is also the team's leading scorer at the mid-point of the 1978 season, with four touchdowns and a like number of PATs, good for 28 points.

Rod Owen is the runnerup in the scoring department with 18 points, garnered on three touchdown runs.

White has gained almost as many yards in pass catches as the team's leading rusher has gained on the ground. Chuck Nichols has gained 317 steps in 53 attempts, for a 6.0 average. Rod Owen is second in the rushing department with 189 yards in 62 tries, or 3.0.

In the team statistics department, the Chieftains hold leads in all of the offensive departments. They lead their five opponents in first downs, 88-42, in yards rushing, 881-590, passing, 579-231 in net yardage, 1460-821.

Another department in which the team would just as soon not be leading, is in fumbles lost, where the Chieftains have lost 11, and recovered only six stray bobbles from the opponents.

The Chieftains also have been well penalized, with 340 yards in five

games. A total of 243 of the penalty yardage came in two games--at Tulia and River Road.

Chris Barnett has completed 20 of

52 passing attempts, and two other passers have completed five out of seven tries to hike the passing average.

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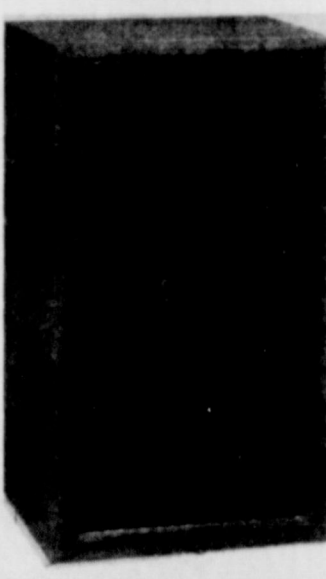
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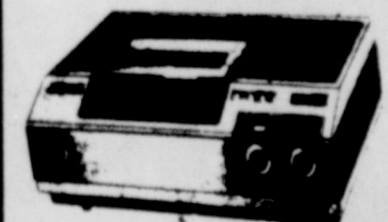
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WASHINGTON TO BE PRIMARY TARGET

AAM Plans Return With New Philosophy

The American Agriculture Movement will be back this winter, but with a new look and a new philosophy, according to a local spokesman.

Jerome Friemel, an AAM supporter, reported that the tractorcades, blockades and other tactics that ushered in the farm protest movement only a year ago in the local area will be replaced for the most part this year by an intensified lobbying effort aimed at policy makers in Washington.

Movement supporters will evidently be attempting to assuage some of the hard feelings created by blockades and protests in the local area

last winter as well, according to Friemel.

Gone too will be the production cutback threats that highlighted the first months of the movement's activities, when the farmer effort earned the name "farm strike," a title many supporters now feel is a misnomer.

"We're coming out with a whole new concept this year when we resume activity," said Friemel.

"Everybody's a year older now, and about 10 years smarter. We've taken a long hard look at the successes the movement met with last year, and the failures as well, and we've decided to center our efforts around those things

which met with the greatest success during the past year," he added.

This year's AAM efforts, which should begin gathering strength after the completion of fall harvest, will be geared primarily toward a massive lobbying drive directed at Washington.

The AAM Washington push is expected to begin shortly before legislators return to Washington in January, and will be launched with a nation-wide tractorcade.

"The tractorcades will be leaving staging points in various states on or about the date that Congress convenes, and will proceed in large groups along major thoroughfares throughout

the nation. We figure it will take 15 or 20 days to reach Washington, and once we arrive there, we have plans to use camping facilities in Virginia to give us better use of our funds and allow us to stay in Washington a lot longer this time around," Friemel explained.

"There may not be as many farmers showing up in Washington as there were in January of this year, but those that make the trip will be planning on staying a lot longer. We have been told by many Congressmen that we need to stay in Washington until the political machine moves, and that's just what we intend to do this time,"

The Hereford AAM supporter reported that individual AAM offices over the state might conduct some "minor activities" during this year's protest, but the Washington effort will remain the focal point for supporters throughout the winter.

"We had to start somewhere last year, and some protests were staged in the rural areas. But we know the rural folks already understand the situation. That is one reason the tractorcade to Washington should help. We will be going

through a lot of urban cities on the way to D.C., bringing this movement to the attention of a lot of folks who have never really learned about it. We've got to get away from the rural towns to accomplish anything. The tractorcade idea has been received with a lot of enthusiasm wherever we've mentioned it, and the national tractorcade should be one of the highlights of the year for the movement," Friemel continued.

According to Friemel, the AAM's new protest season may be launched with one focal activity within the state, to get supporters geared up for this winter's efforts.

"We will probably have some type of Texas event. Possibly a tractorcade to the Austin area, but it's still in the planning stage right now. We have to see how this year's harvest comes out and when folks will be able to participate. We don't want to tie any plans down too tightly right now," Friemel stated.

The spectre of a 100 percent cutback in crop production by supporters of the AAM movement last winter remained a focal point of criticism which was heaped on the farmer effort by numerous factions.

Although the 100 percent cutback pledge was later

dropped to a 50 percent layout plan, the movement goal proved unrealistic, virtually from the effort's first day, and planners of this year's activities apparently realized the crop production cutback plan was a real stumbling block to success.

"We are not going to use any crop cutback goals or recommendations this year because the real problem is in Washington's cheap food and fiber policy. Legislators insist on keeping food prices cheap, as evidenced by grain export embargoes and the importation of foreign beef. The market is still controlled by government action. So long as these cheap food attitudes remain in Washington, we can't solve this problem in our country with what we do production-wise. The only way we could achieve commodity price increases would be to cut the food supply to a shortage level, and this is not in the best interests of anyone in our country. We have to address Washington on the cheap food and fiber policy, and this is going to be our basic aim," said Friemel.

"This is going to be more in the direction of a farm lobby than a strike. We know now that the problem lies in the national cheap food policy. The last 12 months have probably been the most educational period for farmers and legislators in the nation's history, and we are going to concentrate our efforts on continuing to educate legislators on agriculture," he added.

Friemel cited increased rural Texas political influence as a benefit of last year's AAM effort.

"Last year in the Democratic convention in Texas, there was one delegate selected for the national convention from a city of less than 35,000 in population. This year, and we

feel it's due to the awareness of agriculture and rural areas, there are 19 delegates to the mid-term national convention from cities under 35,000," Friemel claimed.

He pointed out that AAM will continue to encourage participation in the political process.

"The whole agriculture protest movement began with one small idea. When you look at

where the AAM has gone in only a year's time, it is phenomenal, the things that have happened. It's almost a miracle in our time. We hope to take the basic AAM concept and its successes and build on them through a revision of our goals, and a change in the people we concentrate our efforts on this winter," Friemel concluded.

toward educating the urban areas of the nation, and sets its sights on a massive nation-wide tractorcade to Washington in January. AAM supporters and planners are predicting little activity in rural areas this winter as they prepare for a concentrated lobbying effort in Washington.

According to Friemel, the familiar tractorcades of last year's AAM protests won't be so common in rural areas as they were during the past winter either. But the colorful rolling protest placards will still be very much in evidence during the movement on Washington.

"We feel like going to Washington on tractors will attract more attention. People seeing a man from the area walking down the street won't pay much attention to him, but when they see the tractor, there is something there very much symbolic of the farmer, and we think our tractors will help bring our message home," Friemel commented.
