## Accused In Coed's Slaying

ANN ARBOR, Mich. (AP) - A 28-year-old repairman has been accused of the shooting death of a University of Michigan coed - the seventh young woman slain in the area in less than two

Sources close to the investigation said the man was released from the Southern Michigan Prison six months ago after serving a sentence for rape. Police Chief Walter Krasny said the shooting

victim, Margaret Phillips, 25, had been counseling the man, Ernest R. Bishop Jr., on how to improve his life. She was doing it "on her own," Krasny commented.

He said Miss Phillips also had "more than a casual interest" in the six previous slayings and had interviewed several persons on the subject. Two of the killings occurred while Bishop was

Miss Phillips was shot in her apartment early Saturday. She died Sunday without regaining Four heavily armed policemen arrested Bishop

as he left his apartment building on the city's north side Sunday night-The man, who is small and thin, had been work-

ing as a refrigeration repairman police said. Washtenaw County Prosecutor William Delhey said Bishop, booked by police on an informal charge of premeditated murder, would be charged formally in District Court today.



## **Texas Education Board Adopts New Standards**

AUSTIN (AP) - The state Board of Education adopted new standards for accrediting public schools today despite one member's objection that state invstigations of schools should be unannounced.

"The visits should come as a surprise," said Carl Morgan, of

A staff member of the Texas Education Agency had told the board that investigators who recommend accreditation generally disclose their visits about three weeks in advance.

H. E. Phillips, director of the Division of School Accreditation said "As long as the schools are acting in good faith and making plans to improve we can go along with them" even if some standards are not met. Asked if all Texas school districts were complying with ac-

creditation standards, state Education Commissioner J. W. Edgar replied: "Substantially."
"In general," added Morgan.

Phillips said no major changes were made in the new standards. He said, however, one old regulation that needs more attention is one requiring 12 grade school systems to have a minimum of four fulltime teachers in the first eight grades and four full-time teachers, exclusive of vocational nits, in the upper four grades. ## Lawsuit Against Lax Hike Appears Likely

A lawsuit to try the validity of the county-school program to increase tax valuations on rural property in this county appeared inevitable at noon today.

Howard County Rural Taxpayers Association, a group organized to combat the efforts of the county and school districts to increase tax values on rural holdings, was on hand Monday to discuss the matter with the Howard County Commissioners and with the special equalization boad appearing for the city and Big Spring Independent School Dis-

A sheaf of 30 affidavits from farmers and ranchers claiming the revaluation was invalid and not made in accordance with Art. 8, Sec. 1-D, of the Texas Constitution, was laid on the desk of the equalization boards.

The Howard County commissioners refused the affidavits, and Dee Jon Davis, one of two attorneys hired by the association, said that the next step would be filing a law suit in the 118th District Court.

The school board committee did not act on the affidavits, pending presentation to the school board. The Forsan School District was not represented officially and promised to let the association know its verdict by Wednesday.

A conference was called in the county courtroom. About 50 farmers attended. On hand were the county commissioners, the special committee from the city and Big Spring school and representatives of Wilson and Davis, the tax engineering firm, hired by the agencies to make

the new valuation appraisal. Principal spokesmen for the farmers were Johnny Walker and Ralph Proctor. They both told the officials the farmers and ranchers were willing to accept an increase of from 25 to 33 per cent in tax valuations. but that the rates submitted and approved by the schools and county were more than 100 per

Walker showed the officials a list which he said was of 300 rural property owners who have made cash contributions to the war chest to take the case to court, in the event the appeal of the land owners failed to work. He also told them that the fund on hand for the prosecution of the lawsuit is now near \$5,000 and more money is coming in.

Proctor told the officials that the taxes on rural property were hiked 25 per cent in 1968, and that no protest was made by the farmers and ranchers. Now, he said, the new rates will bring on a much higher increase on top of the one a

Proctor, "the increase has been 100 per cent."

He contended that \$40, \$50 and \$60 would be acceptable but that the rate adopted (\$60-\$70-\$80) is prohibitive.

Walker also mentioned on several occasions during the discussion, that his group had been approached by another organization in Big Spring, which is angry at the high tax rate in the city, with the proposal that if the farmers and ranchers would go along, a tax rebellion would be launched.

Such a rebellion, he warned, would mean that no taxes would be paid by any of the property owners until the expiration of the limit of time when payment had to be made to avoid public sale of the land

He told the officials that his group is not ready for this type of action and believed that it should not be pursued until all other methods of adjudicating the disagreement had been exhausted.

## NORTH VIETNAMESE EXPECTED BACK AT DAK TO

## 'Test Battle' Drowns In Monsoon Rains

DAK TO, Vietnam (AP) -The "test battle" between South and North Vietnamese troops around Dak To and Ben Het has drowned in monsoon rains, U.S. observers anxious to see how the South Vietnamese army can perform on its own say the results were frustratingly indeci-

American infantrymen fought in the two-month battle that began in the Dak To valley early in May, swirled south across the hills, and then clamped hard around the Ben Het Special Forces camp late in June. Division-sized forces were pitted against each other. The South Vietnamese had U.S. air and artillery support.

Both sides have been making victory claims and, under the rules in Vietnam, both have

some validity. But the only sure winners are the elements.

Great sheets of water shifting in from Laos blacken the afternoon skies and sluice through the triple-canopied jungle. Hip. deep mud bogs tanks, trucks and slows even the most nimble footed North Vietnamese porter. By the end of June, the South Vietnamese were just waiting in the rain for the North Viet-

namese to go home. They did. The North Vietnamese initiated the battle by slipping two in-fantry regiments, backed by a regiment of mixed artillery, into the Dak To Valley early in May. They had been in Dak To be-fore, but this time they discov-ered their old American antago-

Dist had gone.
The U.S. 4th Infantry Division had moved south to Kontum and left the South Vietnamese 42nd Regiment in charge of the valwere told to go it alone.

The enemy move into Dak To was a seasonal phenomenon. The decision to make it a test was made in Saigon.
While no U.S. infantrymen

came to help, other American forces did. U.S. engineers kept the roads around Dak To open until they were blasted off them: U.S. transportation units ran trucks through to Ben Het; American helicopters carried food and ammunition to Vietnamese troops and carried out the wounded; U.S. artillerymen provided enormous firepower, and U.S. Air Force B52 bombers dropped an estimated 15,000 tons of explosives during the battle while fighter-bombers flew numerous close support

An estimated 60 Am ricans died in this Vietnamese test,

and nearly 300 were wounded. But the spotlight was on the South Vietnamese performance. Americans interviewed during and after the action gave this assessment of how they mea-

The Vietnamese got seriously mauled, but no worse than the U.S. 173rd Airborne Brigade at Dak To in 1967. Knowledgeable Americans say the dozen Vietnamese and Montagnard battalions involved in the fight took 50 per cent casualties, about 2,090 men. One source said at least

350 were killed. As the developing battle sucked in government reinforce-ments from Pleiku and Ban Me Thuot, the gaps were partly filled by the U.S. 4th Division. The Vietnamese entered the fray willingly enough in the earment troops avoided contact and never lifted the siege. One day the North Vietnamese just stopped firing their big guns, and enemy snipers who had been harassing the camp for weeks disappeared.



AUSTIN (AP) -In a spaceship age, Texans will have to spend time and money closer to home to prevent what the experts say will be a water shortage by the year 2000.

"In just 31 years, Texas will pass from water sufficiency to water deficiency unless we take positive and affirmative action now," says Gov. Preston Smith.

Smith recently told 500 influential Texans supporting a \$3.5 billion water bond issue, "Our concern is not limited to this generation alone. It extends to generations yet unborn." Three former Texas governors

-Allan Shivers, Price Daniel and John Connally-are among those appealing for voters to approve the bond issue, amendment No. 2 on the Aug. 5 ballot. It would be the first major step by the citizens to provide the 32 million acre-feet of surface and ground water that water planners say the state will

need for just one year by 2020.

An acre-foot is 325,851 gallons. A larger share of the money -about \$2.4 billion-would be spent on 67 new dams and reservoirs, to be built as the need arises, and two salt barriers to go along with Texas' 157 major reservoirs-those with a conservation storage capacity of at least 5,000 acre-feet.





### **Quality Competitiveness**

Before World War II, Japanese merchandise was generally thought to be shoddy, but no longer. The Japanese Transport Ministry's prompt reaction to reports of defects in automobiles produced by two manufacturers is an instructive example.

The Japanese learned for the first time, from a New York Times article which was reprinted in Japan, that Toyota and Nissan has been conducting unannounced recall campaigns in the United States to remedy defects in automobiles they had produced. The Japanese Ministry of Transport immediately called upon the two major manufacturers to report on their defective cars, followed by an order to carry out their recall and repair programs as rapidly as possible, else drastic measures would be taken to cope with defective motor

The ministry as well as a transport committee of the Diet summoned the presidents of both companies to explain the situation. Committee members and the ministry were especially critical of the manufacturer's statement that "since 60 to 70 per cent of the production work is done by subcontractors, we can't possibly carry out complete quality control." Both presidents were told that they would have to institute more rigid inspections in production control and that government regulations relating to the designing of car models would be revised so that stricter inspection of new models might be conducted.

The procedure used is even more drastic than that attempted in the United States. This should say something to the matter of competitive quality to be faced in the future.

### Don't Constrict Too Much

Congress currently is in the process of approving procedures, particularly the questionnaires, for the 1970 decennial census. And the issue appears. to be becoming as controversial as at any other time in the 180 years this essential, and constitutionally provided, governmental service has been performed.

In a mass society where individual liberty is being painfully squeezed from all directions, it is understandable - even highly gratifying that there should be increasing popular concern for the right of privacy. It is this pervasive concern, undoubtedly, that has generated some 65 bills in the U.S. House of Representatives, backed by about a third of that chamber, to limit the mandatory-answer questions to a few that are strictly population-related, the rest to be voluntary.

That, however, would be disastrous. The data collected by the census are absolutely essential to the functioning of our government, economy, and social institutions. Without the information the census provides, government at all levels, private enterprise, research institutions, and all other apparatuses of national life operate the result would be chaos. And nothing but a mandatory census can provide the information indispensable to the functioning of a modern society.

Actually, the 1970 census will have about the same number of questions as that in 1960 and less than those in 1940 and 1950. Four-fifths of the some 200 million people in 60 million dwelling units will be asked two dozen questions, the other fifth more on a sampling basis for less vital informa-

The independent Population Reference Bureau, Inc., countering the current attacks on the census, asserts that "the Census Bureau has by far the best record of any government agency for maintaining the confidentiality of the information furnished it by the citizens.'

In fact, the law requires that individual census information be kept in strict confidence, not be released to any agencies or persons outside the Census Bureau, not be used for any taxation, regulation, or investigation purposes. > BUT THE weather started kicking up in mid-May when the President made the puzzling speech on Vietnam. Conservatives feared it was a bug-out. Liberals said his subsequent Midway meeting with Vietnam President Thieu was a subdued version of the LBJ dashes into Asia for mini-summit meetings. Then in a June press conference Mr. Nixon got everybody mixed up. He took a crack at former Defense Secretary Clark Clifford for presiding over the highest annual casualty lists of the Vietnam War, but then he said he hoped to beat Clifford's proposed "timetable" for withdrawal of troops.

THE CRITICISMS of these Nixon doings were mere rumbles compared with the uproar leading into the Independence Day break. There were indications that he intended to end the second period of Reconstruction in the Southern states. The oppressive guidelines on race-mixing in the Southern schools would not be enforced, it was said. The humiliating Voters Registration Act, operative mainly against Southern counties, would be allowed to lapse. For conservatives it all seemed too good to be true. But the hate-Nixon hurricane reached its crescendo over the nonappointment of Dr. John Knowles to be assistant secretary at the HEW Department. Everybody was playing who-struck-John. celebrated July 4, and in Congress tion of Independence. But when a small nation like Rhodesia today separates itself from the British crown, the United States and other governments continue the sanctions and embargoes that have been imposed on that African country by the United Nations.

OUR OWN Declaration of Independence says that "all men are created equal" and that they are endowed by their creator with certain unalienable rights, that among these are life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness."

It so happens that slavery existed in America in 1776. Some of the representatives of the different states the Continental Congress in Philadelphia raised the question of whether the slave trade should be abolished, but the issue was put aside as being likely to prevent the unity of the 13 colonies.

SLAVERY CONTINUED in the United States for nearly 90 years, but no other government sought to interfere with the right of the American people to find a solution to their domestic problems in their own way.

America declared independence from Great Britain to free itself from the "absolute despotism" of a British monarch. France, which was then engaged in hostilities with England, recognized the independence of the United States and gave the new nation military and other help. But, generally speaking, the rest of the world kept out of the conflict.

MANY OF THE LEADERS of Rhodesia realize that eventually its Negro population will have to be given a better status than it now has. But, though the whites are in the minority, they restrict the voting by

> One of the reasons why so many members of the United Nations have joined in the mandatory sanctions on trade with Rhodesia is that the other African governments have exerted pressure to apply that punishment. There are 42 countries in Africa today, nearly all of which have gained independence under native rulers.

RHODESIA has valuable resources, and has been able to withstand the economic restraints against its trade with many parts of the world. Some of the products which are exported from or imported to Rhodesia go by way of the Republic of South Africa. which also has a stake in maintaining another government in Africa dominated by whites. Actual interference with trade, therefore, has not been substantial, and Rhodesian products do come through other countries to the United States.

There has been considerable agitation for America to take even stronger action against Rhodesia. Internal politics is, of course, the reason for This administration and its predecessors have been pressured by some members of congress as well as by outside organizations primarily to satisfy Negro voters in this country, who are sympathetic with the Africans.

> IN THE END she was without the support of her own subcommittee and transferred the fight to the full committee, where a coalition of Republicans and senior Democrats produced a shaky majority for a bill that would require colleges to establish rules of conducts for students and faculty and file them with the government. Failure to do so would result in a loss of federal education funds.

> It was the meeting at which this bill was expected to be approved that the opponents boycotted, leaving the committee one short of a quorum and thus unable to act. During the time gained, college presidents increased their lobbying against the bill and so did the administration. The majority crumbled.

ALSO HELPING shift the balance was the experience of 22 Republicans who made an unpublicized trip to colleges throughout the country. They came back to tell President Nixon they were convinced student unrest was far more widespread than generally believed and the kind of action the committee was contemplating would make it worse.

Mrs. Green then agreed to a bill that would require colleges only to draw up rules but not to file them and again it appeared it might squeak through. But two Republican members who had participated in the GOP campus visits - joined the opposition and killed it, and by an 18-17 vote the whole matter was sent back to Mrs. Green's subcommittee for burial

While the Education and Labor committee wrestled with legislation on the subject, the House Internal Security committee launched an investigation of the riots themselves and the Senate permanent investigating subcommittee started looking into both militant campus organizations and the colleges.






