Superintendent Tom Jarboe is in the process of hiring teachers for the upcoming school year. One kindergarten teacher and an assistant band director are still to be hired while all other positions have been filled.

Sue Beene has been hired as the educational diagnostician for the county special education cooperative. She has three years teaching experience and received her degree from West Texas State University.

Mrs. Beene is married to Jay Beene, a local insurance agent. She is replacing Nancy Cross who moved to Canadian.

Johnny Gunter will be a junior high coach and history teacher. He is moving here from Amarillo where he has taught and coached for four years. He received his degree from WTSU.

Gunter will replace Ted Giddens, who moved to Valley. His wife's name is Alice.

A recent graduate of WTSU, Jim Hand has been hired to teach junior high science and as a coach. He is single and a native of Happy. Hand will replace Wes Bradshaw.

Hired as high school assistant coach and to teach health, Robert Mears is coming to Friona from Hart where he has five years

experience. His wife's name is Martha and they have one son.

Mears will replace Gary Jones who will assume the position of head coach at Sundown.

The school district is adding a certified librarian, Jarboe said. Cheryl Weatherly has six years teaching experience and holds her degree from Eastern New Mexico University.

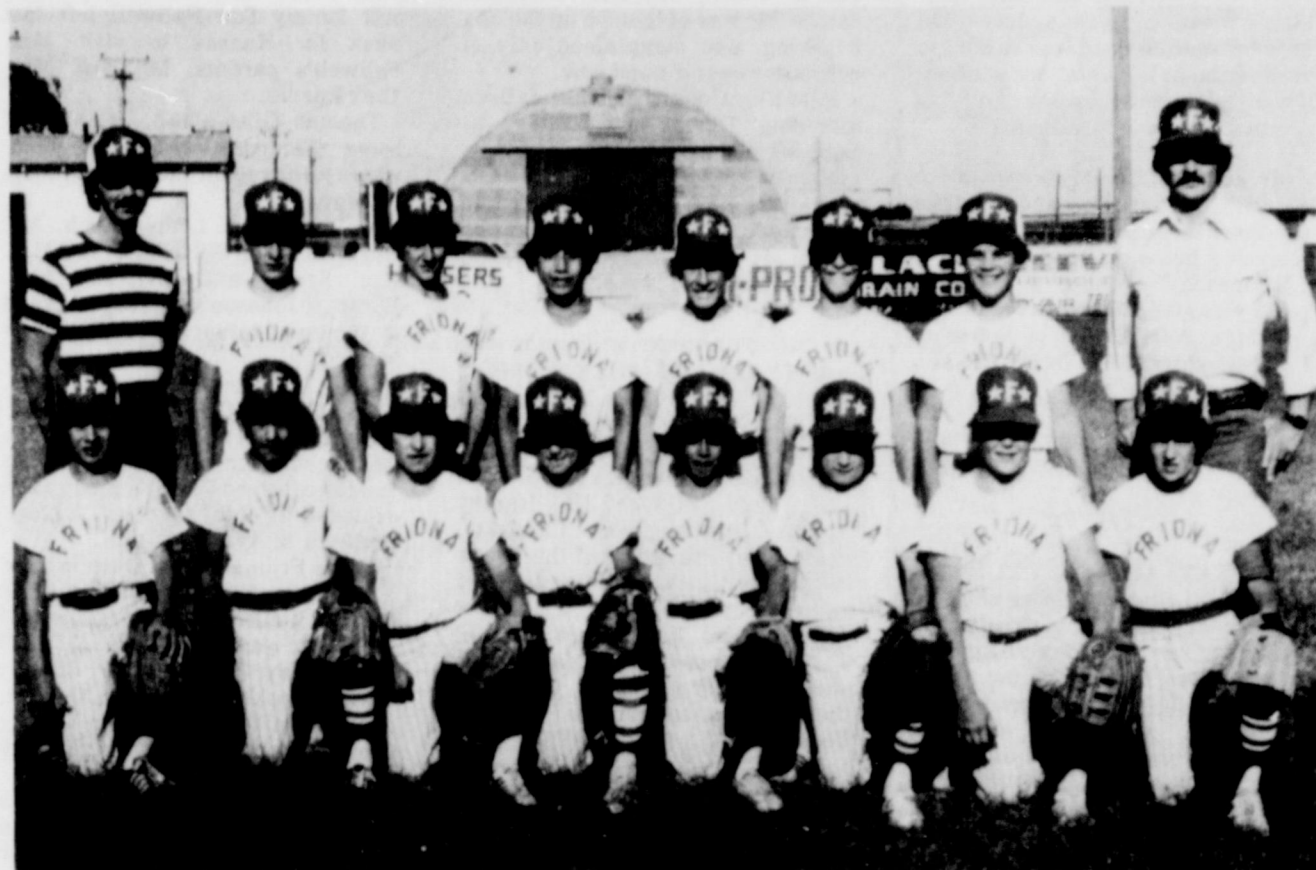
She and her husband, Gene, are natives of Friona and have two daughters.

## Little Leaguers Eye State Meet

Friona's major league all-stars won the District championship with a pair of sparkling wins at Borger early this week, and had their sights set on the sectional title in a game to be played this Friday evening (July 28) at Plainview.

Stretching their playoff winning streak to four games, the Friona team downed Phillips, 7-1 on Monday night, and then came back to beat Dumas, 5-1 in the district finals on Tuesday.

The team combined super pitching, clutch hitting and great fielding for the wins which earned them a ticket to Friday night's sectional finals.

Winner of the Friday game, in which Friona faces Plainview's National League stars, earns the right to enter the state Little League tournament the following week in Waco. Friona is one of the final 32 teams left in the playoffs. The list will be down to 16 teams after Friday night.

In the Phillips game, Friona took a 1-0 lead in their half of the first inning. Pitcher Scott Straw led off with a double. Charlie Veazey singled, and Rudy Bermea singled for the run.

Friona made it 4-1 in the second. Jeff Lundy singled, Michael Granada walked, and Reese Fleming singled for a run. After Straw struck out, Loftis and Veazey both singled home runs and Friona had a 4-0 lead. Loftis was thrown out trying to go to third on Veazey's hit, to end the inning.

Morgan led off Friona's fourth inning with a home run, for a 5-0 lead.

Phillips' biggest threat came in the fifth inning. They got runners on second and third with none out. The third hitter hit a ball to Loftis at shortstop. He threw home, but his throw was in the dirt, hitting Bermea in the knee and bouncing out toward the pitcher. The runner scored, but Straw threw out the runner trying to score from second.

## Rainfall Helps End Dry Spell

Fairly general rain showers last weekend helped to dent the heat and dry spell in the Friona area. A total of 1.06 inches were measured in Friona, with .50 inch measured on Saturday and another .56 inch on Sunday.

The amounts received in the area varied considerably. At Hub, the report was two inches, according to Ted Renner. At Lazbuddie, Bobby Broyles said he received a whopping three-inch rain.

In the other direction, Rhea received only one-tenth of a half inch. Bovina's measurement was an inch, even, while at Oklahoma Lane, the rainfall amounted to 1.5 inches.

## County Approves Jail Completion

The Parmer County Commissioner's court, after discussing the fact that separation of prisoners in the county jail cannot be accomplished according to the Jail Standards law, have taken steps to complete an unfinished cell block in the existing jail, built in 1974.

Sheriff Charles Lovelace and deputies have told the court in previous meetings that they cannot adequately separate prisoners as required by the jail standards.

The commissioners passed a resolution calling for the completion of the unfinished cell block on the east side of the jail, with advertisements to be made and bids to be accepted on October 23, 1978. Contractors shall be given the option of using steel from the old jail if they choose.

A certificate of deposit in the

amount of \$42,522.67 was renewed for a 90-day period for Precinct 2.

An order was issued to W.G. Harding, state treasurer, requesting that \$31,466.71 be returned to Parmer County as the county's share of the lateral road fund.

Since an annual inspection is required of the floodwater retardation dam at Bovina, a resolution was passed setting the annual inspection for September 11, 1978.

A delinquent tax roll in the amount of \$5,144.44 was approved. Also, a list of errors in assessing, in the amount of \$4,113.88, as presented by the assessor-collector, was approved.

County Agent Seth Ralston reported to the court and discussed several facets of his job.

The commissioners also discussed problems relative to the precincts.

## SCS Offers New Service

Metering irrigation wells provides farmers with useful information, according to the Soil Conservation Service.

The information obtained from metering irrigation wells can be used to determine:

- (1) How many acres can be irrigated, with the amount of water one has. (Usually figures at least 3 gpm per acre.)
- (2) Determine if efficiency of pumping is in line with cost of pumping.
- (3) Determine size of pipeline, when installing new pipeline.
- (4) Determine gpm's for tax purposes has also become important reason.

"If you would like the wells metered on your farm, let us know in advance so we can schedule you," says Mack Mauldin, who urges farmers to contact the Soil Conservation Service in Friona.

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## News And Views From American Agriculture

The American Agriculture Movement held a national meeting in St. Louis, Mo., July 21-22. Representatives from 29 states met to discuss the future direction of the movement.

Enthusiastic support was evidenced for plans to take decisive action against beef importations. The movement adopted a multi-phased plan calling for equal sanitation inspection for imported beef and the labeling of that beef.

Delegates took word home to their states to work to oust politicians who are working against the American Agriculture Movement and work diligently in support of those candidates supporting the movement.

The American Agriculture Movement reaffirms its support of the Dolen Bill as the long-term legislative goal.

Due to the tremendous financial burden facing farmers at this time, AAM will press for immediate adoption by the joint houses of Congress increased loan levels on

farm to 90 per cent of parity level. The loans will be reclaimed through the treasury and are not subsidies.

No legislation is required for the temporary relief.

The AAM gasohol committee is studying the feasibility of erecting gasohol plants.

The next national AAM meeting is planned for Sept. 3 at Cheyboygan, Michigan.

The AAM met with a renewed sense of unity—the crisis is real and the outcome irrevocable.

The delegates passed a resolution calling for parity in the marketplace, without inflationary subsidies, as the goal of AAM.

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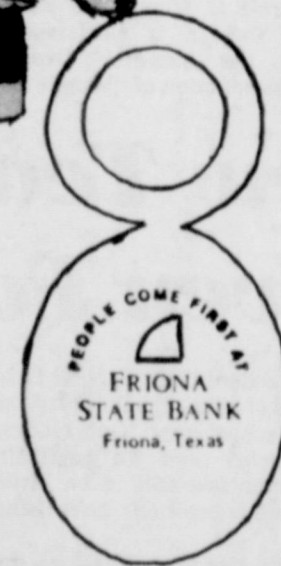

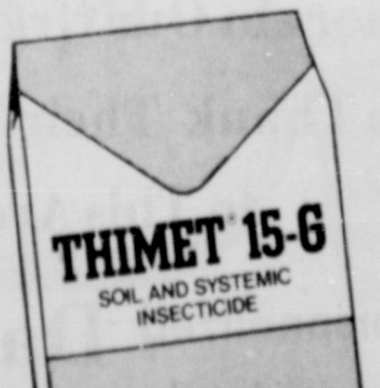

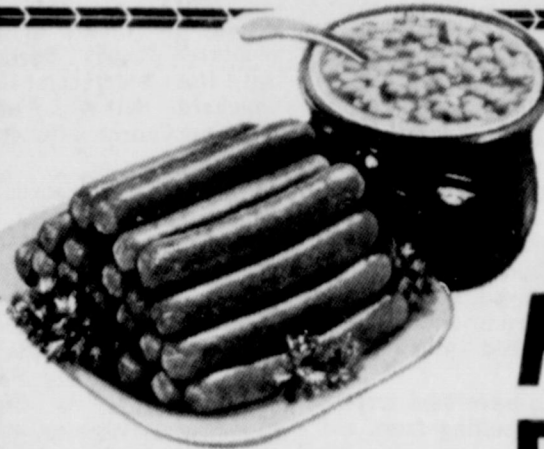

## City Receives July Sales Tax Share

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Friday notified the 42,000 holders of alcoholic beverage permits and licenses that after August 29 they will not need to file a certificate of good standing from his office with their annual renewal application.

However, he added, all new applicants must continue to file the certificate of good standing in order to have their alcoholic beverage permit or license issued.

In 1977, the Legislature provided for the Comptroller's Office to issue the certificates of good standing to provide some muscle in the collections of sales tax from the retail sale of alcoholic beverages.

"After enforcing this new law for a year, we have found that the overwhelming majority of businesses involved in the retail sale of alcoholic beverages are good taxpayers," Bullock said.

The Comptroller said his office will continue to certify any delinquents to the Alcoholic Beverage Commission for revocation or suspension of their liquor permits.

Meanwhile, Bullock announced that his office has mailed checks totaling \$19.8 million to 900 Texas cities as their July share of the local-option one percent city sales tax.

The July allocation raises to \$216.3 million the total received by the cities this year to date. This is a 13.4

percent increase over the same period last year.

Friona's share of the tax rebate amounted to \$3,147, making payments to date in 1978 a total of \$34,965, up five percent from the previous year.

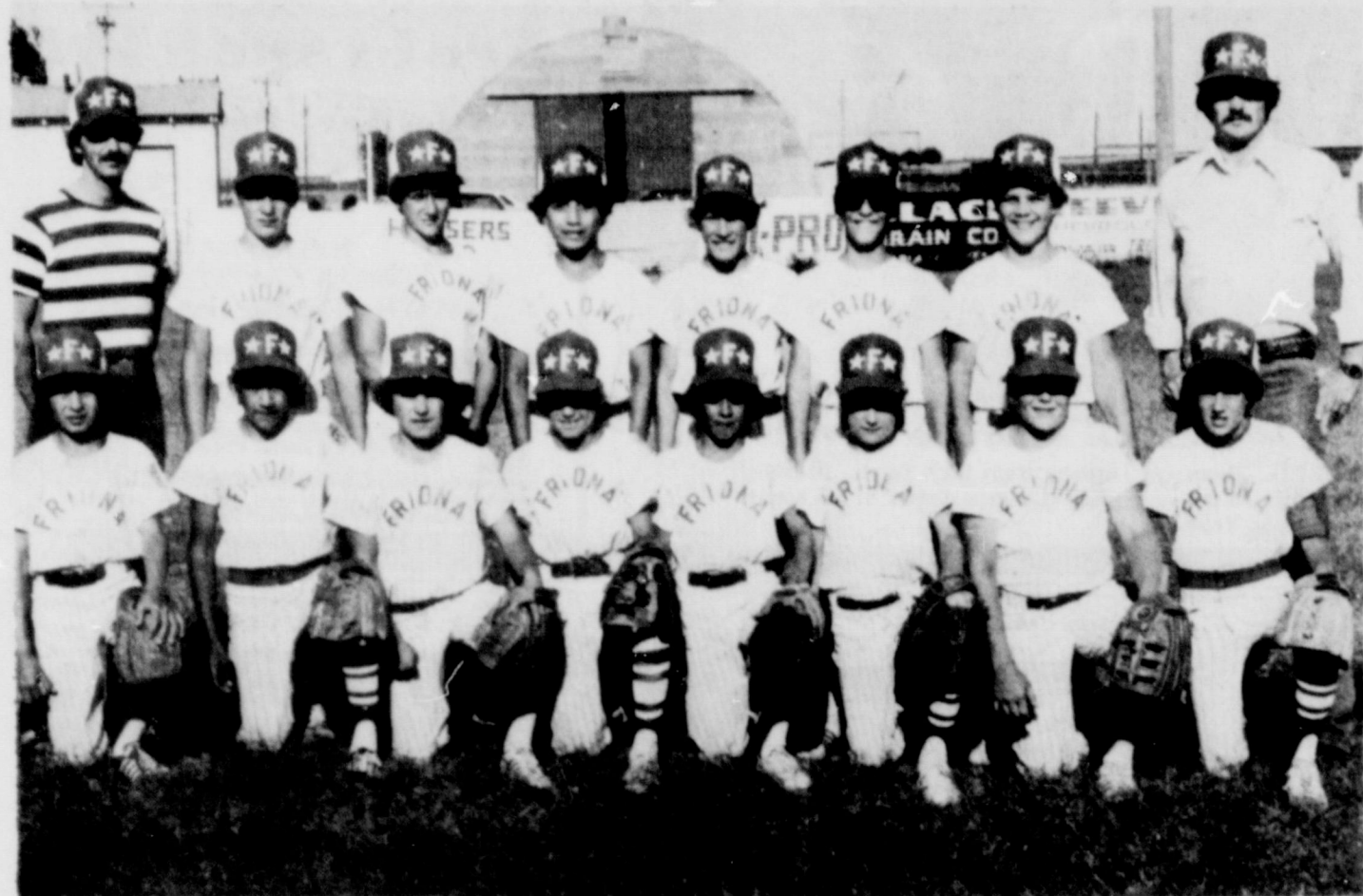

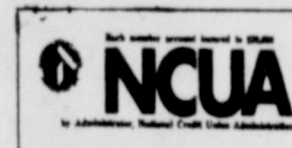

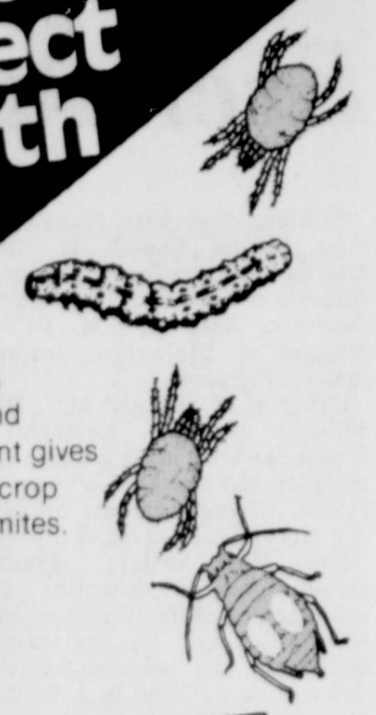
The stained glass windows are made by two girls in Hereford. The dolls are via Silverton, the birdhouses from Lockney and the dough baskets from Dumas.

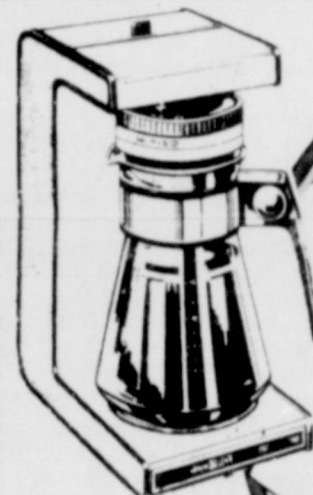

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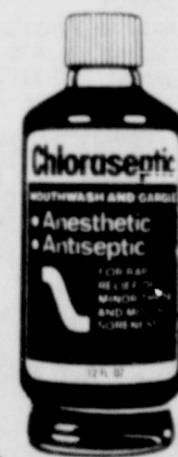

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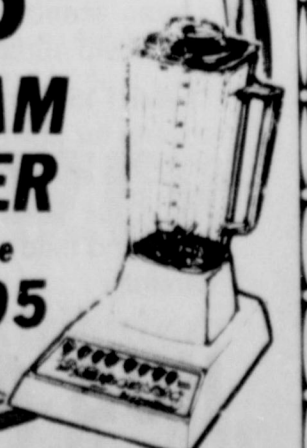

Darkness drove us back to the car, but not before coyotes in the area had begun to sing their regular evening serenade.

D.L. Carmichael, who was born in the same vicinity can probably remember when persons living on "The Delhi Flats" and those living in "The Breaks," seemed to be far far away, but now they would be almost in sight of one another.

He'd probably also tell you "Those breaks are rattlesnake country." That is right it really is and has been for years and years.
