



The Friona High School Squaws. with a strong fourth quarter against Vega, captured their first tournament trophy of the season, and won the consolation championship of their own tourney here last weekend.

But it took a strong finish to turn the trick, because the team entered the final period of the Saturday game trailing Vega 27-26, a team that had already claimed two wins over the Squaws this season.

But the hot shooting of Dana Miller, who sank 12 of her game-leading 18 points in the final quarter, put the team in the lead to stay, and sent the visiting Longhornetes reeling to a 14-point loss.

The Squaws outscored Vega, 21-6 in the final quarter to wrap up the consolation title.

Friona had the misfortune of pitting themselves against District 1-A power Gruver in the opening round of the tournament, and that team, coached by former Squaw coach F.G. Crofford, took a 64-48 win and went on to win the tournament title with a double-overtime victory over Stratford.

This game probably set the tone for the district race in the northern Panhandle, as both Gruver and Stratford are in the same district.





1978 News Events Presented In Review

The year 1978 was a news-making year in Friona, as evidenced by a check of the weekly files of the Friona Star.

Following is a week by week capsule summary of the top news items of the year, as recorded by the Star:

JANUARY

Congressman George Mahon took advantage of congress' holiday break to hear from his constituents, addressing a large group at Friona State Bank on January 5. Mahon's wife accompanied him.

Over 70 farmers from throughout Parmer County, representing the American Agriculture Movement, drove their tractors to Clovis January 3, giving the residents of the New Mexico city a show of strength on the farm strike.

Piggly Wiggly manager Joe Tongate was the victim January 8 of a robbery and stabbing as he left the store at closing time. The assailant, who hid in Tongate's vehicle, took \$12,000 in cash and \$8,000 in checks. Tongate was hospitalized with multiple stab wounds. Rodolfo Corella and Fred Constancio were arrested and charged with robbery and assault with a deadly weapon. Paul Fortenberry and Beth Thompson were named as Man of the Year and Woman of the Year,

while Paul J. Smith, Dorothy Jackson, Bryan Johnston and Rhonda Parsons also were honored at the annual Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture banquet.

Annoucing for re-election were county judge Paul Fortenberry, County Clerk Bonnie Warren, Dist. Clerk Dorothy Quickel and Commissioner Jimmy Briggs. Pete Jesko

FEBRUARY

Approximately 250 farmers attended a meeting January 30 at the Friona Community Center, hearing reports from those who have participated in the American Agriculture Movement's Washington Rally.

A.L. Black was named chairman of the six-state High Plains Study council, an organization studying a solution to the area's water problems.

Friona's Koty Kothmann signed a letter of intent to attend the University of Texas on a football scholarship on the first day of signing February 8. Texas coach John Mize was in Friona to sign the former Chieftain star.

The Friona area continued to be snowed-in, with two snowfalls adding up to six inches for the week. Joe Reeve, 13-year-old Friona 4-H Club member, became the first

Friona youngster in 18 years to claim the Grand Champion title in the barrow division of the Parmer County Jr. Livestock Show last weekend. It was also the first major championship in the show for a Friona youngster in 12 years.

MARCH

A number of farmers from the Friona area were on hand at the International Bridge incident involving striking farmers in the American Agriculture Movement at Hidalgo on March 1. Several of the farmers were placed in jail, and the police at Hidalgo were charged with brutality by members of the AAM. Brad Shearer, former star lineman for the University of Texas, and winner of the Outland Trophy, was the speaker at Friona's all-sports banquet on March 21.

Mack Heald, County Extension Agent for Parmer County since 1970, resigned his position effective April 1, to enter private business.

John Carson, Friona High School senior, became the 12th Friona youngster in 14 years to be named a winner in the "Government in Action" youth tour sponsored by Deaf Smith REC, and earned a trip to Washington, D.C. next summer. The Friona High School Chieftain Band garnered a "Sweepstakes award at the University Interscholastic League's Region 16 contest at Dimmitt March 17.

Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Baxter, who have owned Parmer County's Ford dealership for the past 26 years, this week announced the sale of the dealership to a partnership consist. tional-Harvester dealer for the county, was announced April 16 by Andy Hurst. New owners are Travis Graves, Bob Hurst and Dwayne Greathouse.

Rodolfo Corella was sentenced to 40 years in the state penitentiary after pleading guilty to a charge of aggravated robbery April 21. The charge stemmed from the January 6th assault and robbery of Friona Piggly Wiggly manager Joe Tongate.

Friona High School debaters Bryan Johnston and Mark Edelmon argued their way to the Region I championship April 22, and qualified for the state tournament in Austin.

MAY

A total of 344 mother sheep, which had just been sheared during the previous weekend, died early on May 2 when the freezing wind and rain chilled the herd before they could be moved into a barn. The sheep belonged to Carl Schlenker of the Rhea community. Aided by friends and neighbors, Schlenker was able to save around 240 of his flock, plus 300 young lambs which were with the mother sheep.

The Friona Chieftain Marching Band was a prize winner at the 40th annual Music and Blossom Festival at Canon City, Colorado on May 6. Friona's band won third place in the field show division. A total of 31 bands took part in the festival, 15 in Friona's division.

Friona voters, turning out in better than average numbers for an "off year" primary with no local races on the ballot, gave the majority of their votes to Bob Krueger, Kent Hance and John Hill in the top three races on May 6. Jim Reese led the Friona precinct in the Republican primary in the race for U.S. Congress, getting 81 per cent of the votes cast. Bill Clements led the three-man ticket in the governor's primary.

Ninety-two seniors, the largest graduating class in the history of Friona High School, received their degrees on May 26. Exercises were held at the high school gymnasium, a change from previous custom, in order to accommodate the crowd. Approximately 100 people at-

tended the public hearing on the


city's water problems May 30. The city council and citizens discussed aspects of the problem before a non-binding straw vote was taken. It was decided to bring an independent hydro-engineer in to study the problem and make a recommendation.

Funnel clouds were spotted in the area during a week of turbulent weather. An apparent funnel cloud destroyed barns on the farms of Walter Schueler and Norman Taylor in the Rhea community.

JUNE

Parmer County authorities were working to identify the body of a "mystery man" who was found drowned in a tailwater pit two miles west of Bovina on June 5. He was eventually identified as an Indian man from Oklahoma.

The June rainfall has saved some farmers approximately \$50,000 in irrigation costs, according to spokesmen. The area has received

The Friona High School band continued its outstanding year by being named "Honor Band" of Region 1-AA, according to director Scott Houston.



JULY

Robert L. Jackson, 46, died in an industrial accident on July 1 at Friona Feed Yards.

OCTOBER

The shocking mass murders which occurred near Farwell late in 1926 were serialized early in October by the Amarillo Daily News. The articles brought back memories for a number of Friona residents, including Clyde Goodwine, the only surviving member of the jury which convicted George J. Hassell of murder almost 52 years ago.

Three members of one family made it a "family affair" in the Friona Star's football contest for the week of October 15, when Jackie Morgan took first place, wife Diane placed second, and son Charlie took third.

Indian summer prevailed during October, with temperatures reaching the 80s on nine dates, including a high of 88 on Thursday, October 12. Corn farmers were able to get their crops harvested with a minimum of interruptions.

Friona FFA students were victims of a robbery on October 22, when thieves took 11 project pigs and one steer from the FFA pens northwest of the city. Total value of the animals was estimated at \$925 by FFA instructor Benny Pryor.

NOVEMBER

Friona voters matched the trend across the area and state in the General Election November 7. Voters in the Friona box gave Senator John Tower a 516-331 margin over challenger Bob Krueger; gave Bill Clements, first Republican to gain the governor's office in over 100 years, a margin of 501-355 over John Hill, and gave Dimmitt neighbor Kent Hance a rousing sendoff in his bid to become U.S. Congressman, giving him 603 votes to just 239 for George Bush. Friona residents woke up to a

three-inch snowfall, the first of the season, on November 16. Friona High School FFA leader-

ship contest teams dominated the competition held for the FFA district, winning four of the six events, placing second in a fifth and third in another. A total of 12 schools entered the competition.

Bill Scott at Friona Farmers Co-op Gin received a letter recently which indicates that cotton grown in the Friona area is used halfway around the world in the manufacture of garments. A Friona gin bale tag was returned that had been found in a warehouse in Shanghai, Peoples Republic of China.

Funeral services for Philip Schueler, 20, were held November 27 at Rhea. Schueler died on Saturday, November 25 in a Clovis hospital following a near head-on collision of his vehicle with another car near Farwell in dense fog.

DECEMBER

The Friona Chamber of Commerce announced that it was sponsoring a number of activities in connection with the Christmas season this year, including a special "Santa Arrival" program on December 18.

The Chamber is sponsoring a Christmas lighting contest, as well as lighting of Friona's Community Christmas Tree. Friona Noon Lions are sponsoring the appearance of Santa Claus this year in City Park. Marlene Drake, who had held the lead since the sixth week of the

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
contest, was crowned as champion in the 20th annual Friona Star football contest. Mrs. Drake picked 19 out of 22 games the final week to stretch her winning margin to six points. She received a check for \$100, plus a plaque to commemorate her win. Marlene has been a longtime entrant in the contest. Her son Bobby won in 1975. A record low temperature mark for the month of December was set the morning of December 9, when the mercury dropped to nine degrees below zero.

Friona's Chieftains, who had won five games in a row and eight out of their last nine contests, had their winning streak shattered during the week by some tough competition.






Chief JVs Lose

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



beaten egg yolks; 3 T. pineapple juice, 2 T. lemon juice and 1/4 t. salt. One-third cup water. Boil one minute over direct heat stirring constantly. Add 3 T. pineapple juice, 2 T. lemon juice and salt.

Mix well. Cool and it is ready to serve.

When Glen and Marca Lynn were first married, Glen remarked to his bride that if she could make Chocolate Pie like Edith Johnson, she'd be eligible for his "Good Cook" rating.

Being the ingenuitive gal that she was, Marca Lynn reasoned that if she wanted to make Chocolate Pie like Edith Johnson did, she needed to use the same recipe.

Right away, she got the recipe and has been using it and receiving compliments from her husband and others for a number of years. She says, "I followed the recipe exactly and had such good results that I've never changed it one jota."

Edith Johnson's Chocolate Pie reads like this: Bake your favorite pie shell. Then fill with the following filling. Combine 2 cups milk with $\frac{1}{2}$ square unsweetened chocolate and bring to a boil. Blend three egg yolks into one cup of sugar, to which $\frac{1}{2}$ cup flour and $\frac{1}{2}$ t. salt has been added.

Slowly combine the chocolate and milk mixture with the eggs, flour, sugar mixture and boil one minute. Add 1 t. vanilla and 1 T. butter. Mix well, then pour into baked shell.

Beat 3 egg whites, to which $\frac{1}{4}$ t. cream of tartar and $\frac{1}{2}$ t. vanilla have been added to the soft peak stage. Then slowly add one-third cup sugar.

Carefully seal meringue to edges of pie shell then bake in 350 degree oven 10 minutes or until meringue is golden brown.

A cake recipe, which Marca Lynn uses often and gets a lot of favorable comment about, is Rum Cake. This recipe was given to her by Hack Corbell, a former Friona resident who now lives in Clovis.

Rum Cake: Grease thoroughly and flour aBundt cake pan. Set oven at 325 degrees.

Mix together 1 package Duncan Hines yellow Golden Batter cake mix; 1 package instant French or plain vanilla pudding mix; ½ cup water, ½ cup cooking oil; ¼ cup light rum; ½ cup chopped pecans and 4 eggs. Mix well and pour into pan. Bake 50-60 minutes being sure not to underbake.

Remove from oven and cool 20 minutes before removing from pan. Glaze with 1 stick butter, 1/2 cup granulated sugar and 1/4 cup light rum which have been combined in a saucepan and boiled 20 minutes. Pour over cake while it is still warm.

When the Herrings get together or any time family members or friends make plans to get together for a meal someone always asks Carolyn to prepare sweet potatoes.

She said, "Preparing sweet potatoes sounds like a very simple job and I really didn't know that I didn't know how to do the job properly until David Lee and I were married."

"After my first few attempts to prepare sweet potatoes, he used the age old phrase "These aren't like the ones my mother fixes." So, at the first opportunity I took it upon myself to learn to "fix" sweet potatoes like Frankie did."

She continued, "Probably the most important step is to use fresh sweet potatoes. Next to that, one needs to be extra careful to keep the syrup from scorching as the potatoes are being cooked."

Peel eight or nine medium sized potatoes and cut into chunks-somewhere between slices and quarters--and put in saucepan on top of the stove. Add 2 or 3 sticks of butter; 2-3 cups of white sugar and 1/2-1 cup water.

Bring to rolling boil and cook 30 to 40 minutes.

Another frequently requested recipe Carolyn uses is for Taco Dip and it reads like this: Brown 1 pound pork sausage in heavy skillet. Add 1 small can chopped green chilies; 1 small can taco sauce; 1 can bean and bacon soup and 1 package dry taco seasoning mix.

Simmer 5-10 minutes on top of the stove or cook 2 minutes in a microwave oven. Then stir in l eight ounce carton sour cream and cheddar cheese to suit you taste. For a real fun family Christmas,





Still a greater number crowd the area in front of Nativity Square to enjoy midnight mass in the Basilica of the Nativity, one of the holiest churches in the Holy Land, said to be built over the grotto where Mary gave birth to Jesus. Constructed by Constantine the Great, many changes have taken place over the centuries. Its structure now embraces Roman Catholic, Greek Orthodox and Armenian Churches.

The Basilica and other buildings convey the impression of a massive, unadorned medieval stronghold. Their strength and simplicity suggest the humbleness of Jesus' birth. Bethlehem enjoys three

Christmases. Western churches celebrate Christmas Eve, December 24th. Coptic, Syrian, and Greek Orthodox Churches observe January 6th, whereas the Armenian Church solemnizes January 18th, corresponding to the Julian calendar.

Two-thirds of the area lies west of the Jordan River and descends from 9000-foot Mount Hermon through the gorge and into the Dead Sea. Palestine takes up the remaining 70 miles.

GRACE WHITEFIELD

Longtime Teacher Tells About Her Early Career

"Christmas, like all other holidays and in fact all customs and procedures, is entirely different than it was when I first started teaching." stated Mrs. Otho Whitefield, when she was asked for a comment about the differences she had noted during the years she had been teaching.

In the spring of 1926 Grace Eastep graduated from Lancaster High School in Lancaster, Texas, which is a small community near the southeast corner of the city limits of Dallas.

Grace was the ninth of the ten children born to the late Mr. and Mrs. C.L. Eastep, who owned a farm in the Houston Road School district. Incidentally, this same plot of ground, which was called "a long quarter," still belongs to the Eastep family and seven of the nine children still living, maintain homes on the original family farm.


As was the custom in those days, Grace began her preparation for a teaching career by attending Trinity University in Waxahachie one year. She was awarded a two year teaching certificate and returned to the Houston Road School to teach the lower grades in the three teacher school. The Houston Road School was the one Grace had attended from first grade through her freshman year in high school.

The Houston Baptist Church was on property adjoining the school, and at that time all Christmas programs were presented at the church on Christmas Eve. Miss Eastep and the other teachers made a lot of decorations and costumes for students participating in the program and generally served as program directors.

Mrs. Whitefield remembers the trees at the church from the time she was in the first grade.

"Besides the many home made decorations, there were dolls, wagons, balls and all kinds of toys on the tree. However, the Eastep children learned early in life that even though Santa put in his appearance following the program and handed out toys to a lot of boys and girls, none of them would be for them

"Our mother was a staunch believer in holding to the tradition that Santa brought gifts to boys and

returned to Trinity University, which later moved to San Antonio. She received her bachelor of arts degree with a major in history and a minor in math in the spring of 1931 and graduated cum laude. She was also a member of Hornbeak Scholarship Society, the forerunner of the present national scholarship Alpha Chi Sorority.

In the fall of 1931 she returned to Lancaster, where she taught the third and fourth grades until the fall of 1944. One of her most treasured mementoes is a well worn Western Unior telegram, which was dispatched from Amarillo and reads: "Offer you fourth grade. Salary

\$1,780. Need you now. Wire reply." Charles M. Rogers Superintendent of Schools

This offer came as a result of a trip Miss Eastep had made to Amarillo looking for a position with more pay.

She says, "I know it is hard for anyone to believe today, but my her master's degree at West Texas State in Canyon.

Near the end of the 1947 school year, she and Otho Whitefield, a young farmer in the Lakeview Community of Parmer County began making wedding plans. The end of school, graduation from college and taking a wedding trip all came about the same time. It took some juggling of schedules for the bride to be, but she managed to get everything worked out and on May 16, 1947, she and Otho were married and moved to a Parmer County farm.

For the next twelve years, Grace was a full time homemaker and assisted Otho with his sheep farming and other farm chores.

Mr. and Mrs. Whitefield were active in Columbia sheep breeding and attended a lot of conventions, shows, etc., including a national one or two, and did some other travelling.

Just before school opened in Friona in 1959, Virginia Jennings, who was Mr. Alton Farr's secretary, approached Grace with the idea of returning to the teaching profession. After some consideration and a Dear Santa, conference with Otho, she accepted the position of a second grade cycle. teacher.

She served in this capacity for twelve years, then substituted when she was needed before she finally Dear Santa, went into retirement.

Mrs. Whitefield said, "It is highly unlikely that teachers of any period will ever see any more changes in every facet of the educational process than have those of my age." Otho and Grace still live on the farm and can't seem to get away from raising sheep. They have some sheep skins tanned, died and made into rugs, which they sell, and will probably always be sheep raisers at with my birthstone in it.

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MOVING DAY, 1920

Difficulties Of Moving By Wagon Are Recalled

By JUNE McCOWN FLOYD

When I was nine years old, there were eight persons in our family. I had one older sister, two younger brothers and two younger sisters. My parents were farmers and we lived on the north side of the north fork of Red River, which ran through Western Oklahoma.

After all field crops had been harvested, we began to make preparations to move to a new home across the river and across Turkey Creek. The older children were very excited about getting moved because we would be starting to school the first Monday after the move.

Moving Day finally came, but it was late fall, the temperature was below freezing and a brisk norther was blowing.

Several neighbor men came over early in the morning bringing teams and wagons. By noon most of the household goods, plows, tools, chickens, hogs and other small things had been loaded.

Our cookstove was a large old fashioned coal burning range and



the heater, which was also cast iron, was very heavy. Of necessity the stoves had to be left burning, so were the last things to be loaded.

Soon after noon everything was loaded into the wagons and we were ready to begin our journey of four or five miles.

We six children, whose ages ranged from one to eleven, rode in the wagon which Mother drove. We were seated facing south with blankets, quilts and cotton sacks providing warmth for us. Two men on horseback drove the

cattle ahead of the caravan of wagons.

Crossing Red River, where there was no bridge was a hazard, but going to the bridge would have caused us to drive three times the distance to our new home.

A neighbor man drove the lead wagon and ours was second in the



procession. When a driver started across the river, he looked straight ahead and urged his horses forward. The cows and horseback riders made it across safely as did the wagon we were riding in.

Before we got to Turkey Creek, we knew some of the wagons behind were having difficulty.

Soon after we got to the new house, the men on horseback had penned the cattle and were ready to go back to the river to assist the other men. Right away a wagon or two arrived and the furniture was set up, beds were made and we were getting anxious for Daddy to get there.

Both stoves had been loaded in his wagon and his team couldn't make it across the river. With the help of the neighbors, the wagon was finally freed from the quicksand, but by the time the wagon could roll it was after dark.

About sun down Mother began making preparations to cook supper on a camp fire. Picking up sticks for the fire had a warming effect on each of us.

When the fire was burning good, we placed the kitchen chairs close together in a semi circle on the north side of the fire so the smoke wouldn't blow in our faces. The cotton sacks made good windbreaks and the quilts and blankets kept us warm. Mother Soon after supper

suggested that we children go to bed. Ve were hesitant to do so before Daddy got there and remembered every horror story we had ever heard about the dangers of guicksand.

However, it wasn't long before we rationalized that getting in bed would be a better way of keeping warm than huddling around a campfire.

Our plans were to keep awake until Daddy arrived, but soon we were all asleep and when we awoke the next morning, both stoves were in place and the fires were burning.

The first family move I remember originated at the farm home of my maternal grandparents, the late Mr. and Mrs. L.L. Smith, who moved to what is now Beckham County, Oklahoma, when it was a part of Old Greer County in the Oklahoma Territory

Everything the family owned except what could be put in and on top of a Model T touring car had been sent to Wagon Mound, New



Mexico ahead of time. Of course, suitcases and other things, including a heavy cast iron skillet, were hauled on the running board and tied across the hood.

This moving day began March 1, 1920. We started our journey early in the morning. There were four children between the ages of one and six and three of us were riding in the back seat with blankets for cover. Daddy's last chore, before cranking the car, was to check all the curtains and snap them in the proper places. That night was the first one I had

ever spent in a hotel. We stayed at an old two story hotel between Third and Fourth Streets on Pierce in Amarillo. There was a board sidewalk running just the length of the hotel and it was not demolished until the late thirties or early forties. The second day of our journey as

we were going down a dirt road towards Dumas, the rear axle broke and Daddy caught a ride into Dumas and got someone to come out with a truck and tow us in. While he was gone, Mother cooked

lunch for us over a campfire. This was the first time I had ever known that cow chips could be used as fuel. On the third day, after the car had been repaired, we made it all the way to Clayton, New Mexico.

Finally, on the fourth day, we arrived at our destination. Now, if a person wanted to, he could drive from a farm west of Erick to Wagon Mound and back without doing too much night driving. Before weleft Western Oklahoma,

relatives and friends had told us a lot of things about Mexicans and none of us had ever seen one. Naturally, we were curious about them, but Sherman, who was three, made a statement none of us have ever forgotten.

When Mother pointed out some Mexicans to us, there was a family walking down the street together. She said, "See, there's a Mexican family.

Sherman replied, "Well, I didn't know Mexicans would be boys.





Texas DPS Predicts

79 Traffic Deaths

The director of the Texas Department of Public Safety today warned that the upcoming Christmas and New year holiday periods could be the deadliest in recent years.

Colonel Wilson E. Speir said that while traffic deaths statewide have been running about eight per cent over last year, death counts for the 1978 July 4th and Labor Day holiday weekends ran 40 to 45 per cent over 1977

Based on these trends, Speir estimated that 44 persons will die in Texas traffic during the Christmas weekend from 6 p.m. Friday, December 22, through midnight Monday, December 25. He said another 35 deaths are likely in the New Year period from 6 p.m. Friday, December 29, through midnight Monday, January 1. At the end of preliminary holiday

counts last year, 34 deaths were

reported in the Christmas period and 30 during the New Year holidays.

Speir said all available DPS troopers will be on duty, and they and local officers will be working to keep traffic moving safely.

"I have asked our personnel to place special emphasis on removing drunks and reckless drivers from the streets and highways," the DPS director added.

"We will continue to work with the news media to keep motorists posted on unusual traffic conditions, and to advise them on where and why serious holiday accidents are occuring," Speir said.

He noted that if present trends continue through the end of December, the state's traffic death toll will reach or exceed 4,000 for the first time in history. A record, 3,698 persons died in Texas traffic during 1977

CHRISTMAS CUSTOMS **Mistletoe Plant's Traditions Traced**

To most people, mistletoe means an excuse to steal a kiss at Christmas time. But that's just one of many traditions that have been associated with this curious, parasitic plant, according to the current issue of National Wildlife magazine

"For centuries, people all over the world have considered mistletoe to be a charm against disease, witchcraft, and infertility," says the bi-monthly publication of the National Wildlife Federation. Mistletoe superstitions probably came about because of the unusual and rather eerie way in which the plant grows.

Mistletoe flourishes in clumps on the trunks and branches of various hardwood trees, where it robs its host tree of water and nutrients. Often, the host tree is so weakened that it dies. But since mistletoe can produce its own food when necessary, the parasite remains green and moist.

Because they were unable to explain how mistletoe grew, ancient civilizations believed the plant had supernatural powers, says National Wildlife. Peasants in both England and Japan believed that barren women would be able to conceive after eating mistletoe. The Walos of Africa attached mistletoe leaves to their bodies, confident that they would then be protected from injury. The Swedes carved sword handles from mistletoe branches to ward off witches, while other Europeans wore mistletoe corsages to guarantee a successful hunt.

Mistletoe is not a very tasty plant. In fact, although there are more than a thousand varieties throughout the world, only one animal--the tiny Australian mistletoe bird--relies solely on mistletoe for food. But medical history reveals that despite its taste, mistletoe was often fed to

ailing patients by physicians who thought it had curative powers. French physicians used mistletoe as an antidote for poisons. And one

17th century British physician observed that the plant is "good for the grief of itch, sores, toothache, and the biting of mad dogs and venemous beasts."

Even as late as the mid-1700's, National Wildlife reports, many European medical authorities thought mistletoe would cure epilepsy. Since mistletoe attaches itself so firmly to a tree that it cannot be blown down, they reasoned, an epileptic could not fall down if he consumed the plant regularly.

As it was thought that mistletoe possessed magical powers, it's not surprising that the plant was long forbidden in Christian churches. It was thought to be tainted with heathenism. But the Druids--the woodsy priests of the ancient Celts-considered mistletoe to be a warm refuge for the woodland spirits during the cold weather. They gathered and hung the plant throughout their dwellings. This primeval practice may be the origin of the western tradition of decorating homes with greenery at Christmas time.

Centuries ago, on the sixth day of a new moon, a white-robed priest armed with a golden sickle could be seen harvesting mistletoe. The Druids believed the plant was too sacred to be collected by just anyone. Traditions change, of course, and today anyone willing to venture out into the woods can gather mistletoe with a pair of pruning shears.

But some traditions change very little. A kiss under the mistletoe dates all the way back to Norse mythology, which dedicated mistletoe to the Goddess of Love.

Tidenberg Tells About Love Of Mission Work

James and Parilee Tidenberg and their children are an outstanding example of family ministry, privately and in the church-family sense.

Native Texans, James grew up in Bovina, and is the son of Hilary and Gladys Tidenberg. Parilee went to school in Brownfield. The couple met and married during their college days at Hardin-Simmons University. Their first child, Pal, was born in 1957, and twin sons, Jim and Tim were born during Tidenberg's seminary days at Southwestern in Fort Worth in 1960. He received his bachelor of divinity in 1962

Rev. Tidenberg had been preaching since high school days. He pastored the Y.L. Baptist Church near Muleshoe while attending high school and while in Hardin-Simmons pastored Guthrie and Dumont Baptist churches in King County. While attending seminary in Fort Worth, he pastored Bethesda Baptist Church in Burleson.

In 1962 the family was sent by the Southern Baptist Convention to Tanzania to serve as general evangelists. During this time, Tidenberg taught in the language school at Dar es Salaam and also served as church development advisor. In this position he strengthened his administrative skills as director of the community center and Asian evangelism, director of the language school, chairman of the personnel committee and chairman of the Baptist Mission in East Africa.

In 1970, the Tidenbergs were appointed to Kenya to work with the Kenya Baptist Convention and James continued his mission in church development.

At a recent meeting of the Amarillo Southern Baptist Association in Amarillo, Tidenberg's report was entitled, "My Mission is Missions." He has been increasingly involved through the years in this aspect of mission work, the founding of churches with the goal of their eventual independence.

A year or so after the birth of their youngest daughter Trisha the family came back to the states on leave. During that time, Tidenberg was missionary in residence at Hardin-Simmons, but they returned to Kenya in 1975 and the missionary resumed his duties as director of evangelism, stewardship and of the Baptist Convention of Kenya. He is also treasurer of KBC

The church development thrust in Kenya dose not invision replicas of American churches, Tidenberg said.

"We come to build and organize churches as the foundations of all mission work - evangelizing, teaching, healing - but we expect the people of Kenya to put their own brand on their churches.

Tidenberg admits that the business aspects of mission work may be lacking in the one-to-one intimacy of classroom encounters, or the "heroics" of medical ministry, but, he said, "I'm satisfied to plant trees under which I may never rest.

"No one," he declared, "can deny the strategic importance of a mission of missions.

All mission work, Tidenberg said, "is one begger telling another begger where he can find bread." And the beggers need a place to discuss the matter, he concluded. The basic objective of all Southern

Baptist mission endeavor, in Kenya and elsewhere, he pointed out, is to make local church units strong and independent.

"We try to plant the New Testament conviction - and hope that it will grow in the native idiom, in personal understanding and expression.


And, Tidenberg added, "We will build and expand to the best of our ability, but we will be constantly on guard not to force expression of belief before understanding.


The Tidenberg family will share Christmas in Texas for the first time since their furlough in 1974 at Hardin-Simmons.

Pal is a senior at West Texas State, but she has spent only one Christmas away from Kenya. This year, however, her parents are missionaries in residence until February at First Baptist Church in Amarillo. Her twin brothers are freshmen at Hardin-Simmons, and Trisha is a first grader at Woflin Elementary.

Pal Tidenberg is a true 'missionary kid.' She was two when the family moved to Africa. She speaks fluent Swahili. She calls Kenva home.

When she graduates this June she is considering going back for a two-year journeyman stint as a nurse. She hasn't decided for sure but the Tidenberg missionary line just may be extended into another of the many varied and useful options open to all seeking to serve in their own unique way.

Corby Ridgway just turned five years old on December 8 and, like any healthy, normal American boy, he is anxiously awaiting a visit from Santa Claus this Christmas.

Corby's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Randy Ridgway, his big sister Shennelle, and his grandparents, Mr. and Mrs. Mike Brown of Friona, feel that they have a lot to be thankful for each year at the Christmas season. Two weeks before Corby was one year old he suffered third degree burns on his legs, arms and back when his playpen caught on fire at a babysitters house.

the hospital four months later on April 17.

Corby was in leg braces when he was burned in the fire. He wore the leg braces and heavy shoes to correct a walking problem and earlier had had casts on both his feet. Just a few weeks before the fire, Corby had fallen and broken his collar bone. He still suffers from bronchial asthma as a result of his illness from the burns. His family and friends feel that this little fellow has suffered more in his few short years than most people do in their entire lifetime. His grandparents, Mr. and Mrs.

Brown have lived in Friona for the past 13 years. His mom, the forme Mae Brown, was a graduate of Texico High School. She is now a soccer coach and Blue Bird leader at Decatur, Texas and Corby's dad, Randy, is a mail carrier in Irving, a short distance away. The family resides on a farm six miles out of Decatur, where they have a few head of cattle and Corby has plenty of room to romp and play football which is "just about his favorite thing in the whole world" according to his grandma, Bea Brown.



The Search For Peace --An Inner Struggle

Over nineteen hundred years ago a Jewish baby was born in the town of Bethlehem. He was born as a man, but He was the Son of the Living God. And when He was born, the angels from Heaven appeared to some shepherds near Bethelem and sang of the "Glory of God in the highest, and of Peace on earth and good will toward men.

This Peace of which they sang wasn't just peace between men, the the Peace with God in the inner man. Jesus, the Son of God, had come to Earth to bring that Peace.

Here is a story about a young man, a Jew like Jesus, and his search for that Peace.



Geary Meyer was born and raised in Chicago, to a middle-class Jewish family. His family were the traditional Jewish, not as strict in their religious observances as the Orthodox Jews, but not as liberal in their religious beliefs as the Reform Jews.

He attended Hebrew school for four years, preparing for his Bar Mitzvah. This is a traditional Jewish ceremony symbolizing a Jewish boys advancement from childhood into manhood and is held on the Saturday nearest his 13th birthday. During these four years of schooling, Meyer felt himself being drawn toward God. He would rise at-

five in the morning to pray

searching in his child's heart for peace with God. After his Bar Mitzvah, his formal religious training was over, he drifted away from God and became an Agnostic (one who believes that if there is a God, he is not knowable by man). When Meyer was 18 years old, the

Democratic Convention came to Chicago, and he became involved in the riots that plagued that convention, he became a radical. In college, his radical views led him to be involved in all the wrong things in which many college students in the late sixties and early seventies managed to become involved.

The lowest point in his life came in the midst of these college years and he continued desperately his search for peace. He began to study the Eastern religions, but realized that though they held some truth, they didn't contain all truth. Peace could not be found there.

In college Meyer majored in the Natural Sciences, an unusual major for a boy raised on the concrete and asphalt of the Chicago streets. It was these studies of nature that convinced him that there had to be a Supreme Being. The universe did not happen by accident, he reasoned; the laws of nature had been planned and were controlled by Someone. But just knowing there was a God with his mind did not bring the inner peace he sought. Meyer finished college, married


and went into business; and his search continued.

One day his sister-in-law came to visit. She had suffered an incurable back ailment, and no doctor had given her any hope of a cure, but she had been healed by the Lord. And



what's more, she had what Geary wanted, peace of mind and heart. She encountered him one day with a question. With eyes shining with joy and love she asked, "Geary, did you know that Jesus loves you?" He looked at her with eyes filled with

fear and shock and replied, "Yeah",



Some time later while reflecting on that conversation, he realized that this Jesus was not an ordinary man, there was defintely something special about him. He picked up a New Testament and began to read in the book of Matthew.

After reading three or four chapters, Meyer slowly closed the book and put it down. He now knew why Jesus was different; He was the Son of God, The Messiah. And just as though a light had been thrown upon him, revealing everything, he realized how rotten his life had been. He knew that peace could only be found in Jesus, so he accepted Jesus as the Messiah, his Saviour. His long search was over, he had found his peace with God through Jesus, God's

So the Son of God, born as a Jewish babe over nineteen hundred years ago, touched the life of a young Jewish man in the twentieth century.

The real Christmas story is not just that Jesus was born in Bethelem on a cold December morn nearly 2,000 years ago, but that He came to Earth to bring the greatest Christmas gift of all, the gift of God's peace.

Christmas Customs, 1920 Are Recalled By Writer

To persons who travel the highway between Raton and Las Vegas in Northeastern New Mexico, the letters "LEVY" on a marker a few miles north of Wagon Mound, which is located in Mora County, probably raise the question.

What is Levy?

To me, Levy brings back a lot of fond memories including my first school Christmas there in 1920.

At that time, my parents, who were farmers, and their five children lived one mile east and two south of the marker. My dad raised corn, beans and cattle

All there ever was to Levy was a country store named Behr's Mercantile Store. Mrs. J.J. Behr, a widow, operated the store, which literally sold everything from soup to nuts and bolts. Of course, at that time canned soup was unheard of, but a person could buy all the makings.

Mrs. Behr was also the postmistress and kept a neatly stacked bunch of letters just inside the window of the post office, which



um

was a small cubicle partially walled off with ornamental iron panels.

The stacked letters were all addressed to General Delivery, and that's where most of the mail for newcomers was held until delivery. "General Delivery" was the best source of information for the arrival of new residents.

Of course, after the families arrived, they rented boxes in which the mail was placed after every passenger train passed. Mrs. Behr,



who was well advanced in years, hired a neighbor boy to take the mail sacks to the whistle stop and to pick up incoming sacks after the trains had passed.

The school, which was a one room adobe building, was located across the track and north of the store. Then some metal buildings, much like grain elevators in the Texas Panhandle, were located up the road several hundred yards. They were called "beaneries" by farmers in the area and it was there that they marketed their pintos. That was Levy in 1920.

Most of the farmers were transplants from Oklahoma, like the McCowns, or Arkansas. One area several miles southeast of the store was called, "Arkansas Valley."

Miss Madeline Sully was my first teacher. She probably had 40 students, from beginners - like me -

through the eighth grade. Most of them were anglos, but there were a few Mexicans. The anglos must have been a nuisance to the Mexicans, as the rest of us wanted to learn to speak their language and began most of our conversations with "How do you say?

Incidentally, I learned to count, to say the days of the week and months of the year, and a few phrases of greeting.

Miss Sully was also the fire builder, custodian, counsellor and supplier of all the needs of her pupils. When students arrived with cold, cold hands, she supplied a wash pan filled with snow for us. When other students - mostly older boys - made a game of "spooking" horses being driven to carts or ridden, she punished them.

Soon after school started, Miss Sully rewarded students for being quiet in the room by supplying them with paper and crayolas, which we were allowed to use for making Christmas tree decorations.

We colored strips of paper red and green and placed them carefully in boxes, which were stored on the cloakroom shelf.

The entry ways to all one room schools at that time were cloakrooms. Standard equipment included a water bucket with a tin cup tied onto the handle, pegs for hanging caps and coats and shelves for storage.

Occasionally during the fall Miss Sully mentioned plans for "a Christmas program to which we will invite all our parents and friends." She also mentioned that everyone in school would have a part in the program.

Pretty soon after Thanksgiving



assignments were made for parts in plays for older students, readings for the younger ones and songs for everyone. This is my earliest recollection of "Silent Night! Holy Night"

She encouraged us to learn our parts by telling us anyone who didn't know what to say or sing at the rehearsal, which was scheduled for a few days before the program, would have to sit in his seat.

The stage was in the front of the building and the big old fashioned cast iron heater was on one side, near the recitation bench. Seats used for classroom work were used for programs, too. The only additional seating was folding chairs of wood, which were kept in the cloakroom

The afternoon of rehearsal we didn't have any classes. Instead we glued the colored slips we had been making into chains to put on the tree, which had been cut by some of the older boys with Miss Sully directing.

All our decorations were home made. Besides the garlands of colored paper, we had strings of popcorn, strings of cranberries and cookies cut in various shapes. The only lights on the tree were candles. As I remember it now, I realize it must not have been very attractive, but at the time I thought it was the heighth of glamour.

My sister, who was two years older, gave a reading and I learned every word of it as she memorized it as we were riding a horse to and from school.

My lines were very few and I really don't know what my part was. All I remember was that when an older girl gave me a signal I stuck my head through some brown paper which covered the wash tub in which I was riding on a sleigh.





parents, Mr. and Mrs. Joe Parson, moved from here to Kress, where his mother taught until her death.

Gabe says, "Looks like I'm in the category generally referred to as high school drop-outs. That is what I did soon after Mother's death. Later he returned to Friona and was employed by Joe and Pearl Johnson, when they operated the Corner Grocery at the corner of Sixth and Main.

JoAnn was employed by Plains Publishers, Inc., which was located just one block west of Corner Grocery, when the couple was married.

Soon after the Parsons moved to Amarillo, where Gabe was employed by Safeway Stores Inc., as a meat cutter. Then in January 1964 Gabe and JoAnn moved to Clovis, where he and Bill Adams owned and operated Poor Boys Butcher Shop. Gabe had a dream of owning and

operating a steakhouse, where he could serve the very best steak, potatoes and salad in a down-home ranch style dining room.

The first K-Bob's was located at the corner of Prince and Highway 60 in Clovis and was opened in 1966 with a seating capacity of only 32, but within six months an annex was needed to accommodate the overflow crowds which the establishment attracted.

In 1975 Gabe and JoAnn built a new building for their restaurant on the north side of Highway 60 near their first location and moved over there.

More recently they sold this business and then erected a new building a block or so east and opened Gabriel's Prime Rib, where people are served good food in pleasant surroundings. The Parsons have been operating this restaurant, which is open only in the evenings.

Parson began franchising the steakhouses in 1971 and all elements of the first K-Bob's have been incorporated into subsequent member restaurants.

For example, light fixtures fashioned from wagon wheels and Old West artifacts are used in each K-Bob's location to create the same atmosphere as the original steakhouse.

The reputation of K-Bob's Steakhouse soon became well known throughout Eastern New Mexico and West Texas. A second steakhouse was opened in Hereford under a franchise from K-Bob's, Inc., a company formed for this purpose by Gabe Parson. It was sold to Gabe's brother, Alan, and his wife, the former Stella Scales of Friona, who had been living in Canyon several years. This couple still owns and operates the steakhouse.

Since that time more than fifty K-Bob's Steakhouses have been franchised in different locations in New Mexico, Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Missouri. Additional locations are being developed in Arizona, Colorado, Arkansas and Montana.

Other former Frionans who now operate K-Bob's Steakhouses are Bill and Carolyn Rainey, who own the Dalhart restaurant, and Russell and Arleta Scales, who are located at Arkansas City, Kansas.

Bill and Carolyn operated restaurants in two different locations in Friona a number of years ago. More recently, Russell Scales and his brother, Tommy, operate the Aztec Drive-In.

Arleta is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. D.G. McClellan and grew up here.

Patrons of K-Bob's can always be assured of being served high quality food in an inviting comfortable atmosphere. The appetizing aroma which greets all customers comes from an open broiler where juicy steaks are cooked to perfection by chefs over charcoal flames.

T-Bone, club, large rib eye, filet, New York cut or sirlion steaks may be hand picked by diners, who then make their way to the chuck wagon salad bar. There they may choose from a changing selection of salads including tossed greens, cole slaw, carrot and raisin salad, potato salad, macaroni salad, melon when it is in season and fresh fruit salad. Other things available at the salad bar include crusty French bread, cheddar cheese wedges and crackers from an old time cracker barrel.

Other entrees at K-Bob's Steakhouses are golden fried jumbo shrimp, a special charburger, steak sandwich and the K-Bob, which is made up of chunks of top sirlion, bell pepper, tomato and onion charboiled on a skewer. Special dishes for junior appetites are also available.

Gabe and JoAnn and their two sons, Kirk, 17, and Justin, 12, live on an acreage north of Clovis, where they raise quarterhorses and generally have some running on the tracks.

When asked about his hobby, Gabe said, "Hunting is my only hobby and I don't do very much of it if you ask me, but if you ask JoAnn, well, that's a different story."

Kirk will graduate from Clovis High School at the end of the current semester. He plans to enroll at West Texas State University, Canyon, to major in animal science. Kirk, like his mother, is artistic and paintings, done by these two, adorn the walls of the K-Bob's, Inc. effice at 400 Pile. At the present time the firm has six full time employees including
