15 PER CENT **Demo Leaders Favor Upping SS Benefits**

WASHINGTON (AP) - Democratic leaders of House and Senate have endorsed an increase in Social Security benefits that exceeds the 10 per cent hike suggested by President Nixon.

Senate leader Mike Mansfield of Montana and House leader Carl Albert of Oklahoma said Monday they favor upping benefits by 15 per cent.

Nixon said last week he wanted Social Security increased by 10 per cent by next April 1, but Albert said House Democrats "want a bill effective earlier than that and one higher than 10 per cent." Mansfield said he agreed with Albert.

Albert said the cost of living has come up more than 10 per cent since the last boost in Social Security. He added that he could not predict that such a bill would pass Congress this year.

School Bus Kills Boy

HOUSTON (AP) - A school bus killed James Ray Hall, 7, today.

State police said the boy apparently was running alongside the bus, trying to catch up with it when he fell beneath a rear wheel.

The accident occurred a short way from the boy's home in northwest Harris County.

Is There Any Other Kind?

FORT WORTH (AP)-Police sought a teenager today in the death of a college student whom investigators said was the victim of "a senseless killing.

Joe Michael Ervin, 17, was charged Monday with the Aug. 8 shooting death of Rodney Gene Bonham.

Bonham, 21, a student at Tarrant County Junior College, was shot as he and a friend sat in a parked car outside a bowling alley. He died four days later

Bonham's companion told police two youths came up to the car and one of them shot Bonham. Police said there was "no reason for it whatsoever." Bonham's father told police someone called the family home the day after his son died and said, "I'm sorry he's dead, but we all have to go sometime. I'm sorry I shot him."

But he indicated that as far as he is concerned for the present the committee has chosen his bill over the administration's proposal to turn the nation's mail system over to a government-owned corporation.

Postmaster General Winton M. Blount pressed the effort for the administration plan.

Blount reportedly personally visited wavering House Post Office Committee members on the eve of today's vote to secure their support for the plan while union officials applied pressure to vote it down.

The challenge to the corporation concept came from an alternate postal reform bill, favored by the unions, introduced by committee Chairman Thaddeus J. Dulski, D-N.Y.

The corporation would put the nation's mails under a board of directors who would be responsible for all business operations, including setting of postal rates subject to congressional veto.

Dulski's plan would keep the Post Office Department intact and leave postal employes in civil service with wages set by Congress but would give the department more businesslike control over its operations.

The outcome of the vote was in doubt up to the start of today's session with the major issue the administration plan's labor-management provisions. The unions had insisted on the right to strike, otherwise, they say they would be at the selfsupporting, government-owned postal corporation's mercy. Blount stood by the proposed corporation machinery for compulsory arbitration, in lieu of the right to strike, when major contract disputes had reached an empasse.

By The Associated Press Israeli jets attacked Egyptian artillery and fortifications along the Suez Canal today after five Israeli soldiers were wounded on that front, the military command in Tel Aviv reported.

It said the raid was in response to what it called "continued cease-fire violations" by the Egyptians.

A spokesman added that all Israeli planes returned safely to base. He declined to say exactly where along the canal they had struck.

A communique distributed in Cairo by the Middle East News Agency said Egypt's "Sinai Commando" organization inflicted heavy losses Monday on several Israeli positions. The Sinai Peninsula is Egyptian soil

Redistricting Moratorium In Order

There is speculation in Austin that there may have to be a third special session of the Legislature before February to redistrict the state House of Representatives. Whether or not that will happen is within the discretion of the federal courts, where faulty representation has been charged.

It can hardly be argued persuasively that the Texas House's representation - or that of its congressional districts or state Senate, for that matter - measures wholly up to U.S. Supreme Court standards of equality on a populatiou basis. On the other hand, it can be persuasively argued that those standards cannot, as a practical matter, be accurately approached until fresh population data are available.

The U.S. Census Bureau has recently estimated that Texas' population has increased 16.8 per cent between April, 1960, the latest official decennial census figure, and July 1, 1969. That means that Texas' population has increased 1.6 million in the past nine years, from more than 91/2 million to well over 11 million, and it could increase by nearly 200,000 more by the time the 1970 decennial

census is taken. Any court-ordered redistricting legally would have to be based on 1960 decennial census data. And yet no one knows exactly where the nineyear increase in state population is located, or how much and to where the total population has shifted in location during that time. Thus it would be statistically impossible for the current Legislature to redistrict accurately for equality-of-population representation no matter how closely it might follow any court order or how thoughtfully that court order might be drafted. And even if it did have to redistrict before February, 1970, it would have to do the whole complex task over again in the 1971 regular session in order to bring representation in line with the new

decennial census. The federal courts would be welladvised to place a moratorium on court-ordered redistricting of legislative branches for a responsible period before the taking of a new census. Needless work and confusion would be avoided, and the actual intent of the U.S. Supreme Court's representation rulings would be just as well served.

Public Bond Rates Need No Tampering

Virtually every state and local up to unmarketable levels. In normal government official, as well as financially informed citizens, will back Gov. Preston Smith's blast at the federal tax-reform bill's provision to remove the tax exemption on interest income from state and local bonds.

That House-passed bill, now under Senate Finance Committee study, views that exemption as a "loophole. Actually it is a fair recognition of the constitutional principle that one level of government should not tax another.

It is true that investors (mostly institutional rather than wealthy individuals) can lower their federal income-tax liability by buying state and local bonds, the interest income from which is not now considered taxable earned income. But the real beneficiaries of this exemption are state and local governmental units' taxpayers, because their tax-financed public-improvement bonds are marketable at a lower interest rate.

Remove the exemption, and those interest rates (already about doubled during current inflation) will shoot

times, it would mean that state and local taxpayers would have to pay more to issue bonds, with the "more" then going to the federal Treasury. As it now is, the state reaps a direct benefit.

It has been argued that the federal government could subsidize state and local bond issues to offset the interest rate increase caused by the exemption removal. But as Gov. Smith angrily pointed out, any such scheme would only give the federal government bureaucratic control over state and local bond programs. Anything the federal government subsidizes it also regulates.

States and their local governments are having enough trouble financing essential public works without Congress upsetting their already shaky bond market in the mistaken notion that it is closing a tax "loophole." If Congress is so sure that this is a "loophole," why does it not remove the federal income-tax exemption on interest income from the federal governments' own bonds?

Marquis Childs **Our Time Of Continuing Crisis**

WASHINGTON - In the vocabulary of the commentator the word crisis recurs as a leitmotif with depressing predictability. Crises - political, military, environmental — pop up almost daily and are the grist of the commentator's mill

Unitl recent years the locale of the crisis was conveniently distant. Restless natives in Aden or Bombay or Timbuktu were bent on overthrowing whatever established order had survived the previous uprising. As trolley cars were burned and hapless bystanders came under the attack of the forces of law and order we could. from a great distance, take a condescending view of these aberrations.

NEEDLESS TO SAY, that has all been changed. The crisis today is in the next street, in the college across the park, in the housing development around the corner. And the reasons why this is so bear a strong family resemblance to the circumstances that set off the disorders, the recurring crises, in the so-called under-

The problem in the overdeveloped

The tax reform bill passed by the House corrects some of the more glaring inequities in our own structure. But the modifications proposed by the Nixon Administration give little evidence of any recognition of the need to distribute income more

equitably in relation to need.

A GLARING INSTANCE illustrates how outmoded the structure is. The income tax deduction allowed for each dependent in a family is \$600. Theoretically, this is to help defray the upbringing and education of each child. In light of present-day prices it is absurdly small.

More important than particular correctives is the way in which the national income is shared out. It is here that the pattern in the West is strikingly similar. At the top the very rich have political power to resist any significant change - a leverage that will be exercised in the struggle in the Senate to modify the House bill

JUST BELOW this small body at or the pyram unions representing about one-fourth of all wage earners. The union leaders, too, have great leverage and they mean to use it in Britain, France, Italy and this country. The continuing threat to stability comes from the outsiders - from the blacks, the poor, the dispossessed -who are determined to fight their way into the system by any and all means. They will not be fobbed off with promises of Fair Deals, Great Societies, promises never matching the glow of rising expectations. Holmes Alexander The Pentagon Goes To The People

WASHINGTON - At the Pentagon to get the nation's attention. they are calling him "Mr. Clean." He is Dr. John S. Foster, director of the Defense Department's research and engineering - the most important shop in Washington for our military defenses in the 1970's.

SOME MONTHS ago I suggested in this place that Dr. Foster ought to come out of the builrushes and speak his piece, not just to Congressional committees, but to the American people at large. The other day Dr. Foster did so, as best he could. He addressed the Armed Forces Management Association, which is a segment of the industrio-military complex, but Dr. Foster stood on tiptoe and shouted above the heads of his immediate audience - trying

I believe that "Christian Education" is the answer to today's problems. Do you agree? J.V.

It depends, of course, on your definition of "Christian Education" If it means the education of the mind without a change of heart, then I do not believe it is the answer to our problems. The meaningfulness of knowledge depends upon the use one can make of it. We know that one can be an educated criminal, or an educated useful citizen, depending upon what use we make of our knowledge. While I am a firm believer in education, I also believe that it can be used wrongly unless the heart is right

They used their knowledge to build a strong faith, So, Christian education, in the Scriptural sense, implies the education of the whole man, heart, soul and mind. If the mind is developed to the exclusion of the heart, we may become educated fools.

His message was a very candid confession that the Pentagon's methods of purchasing weapons was lousy, and that the Pentagon's communications with the American

people was worse.

MR. CLEAN, that is, was coming clean. He said that past and present methods of buying weapons "have cost us the confidence of the public and are threatening our country's future security." He said it was no longer a question of finding good explanations for back-firing military contracts, for "the country's patience has run out." The question was whether by "major surgery" on Defense Department management, the Pentagon could win back public trust or whether we must surrender technological superiority to the oncharging juggernaut of Soviet militarism

DR. FOSTER comes to his office at 7:30 a.m., stays there 12 hours or more, works Saturdays, works Sundays. He has outside offers for three times his present salary. The only decent assumption must be that he loves his country and trembles for her military future. He's in a position to know. He hears the fast-closing Russian footfalls. He sees that the SSR has unwitting fifth-columnists in the U.S. Senate. He senses that the American people are being conned into a loss of faith in its Armed Services, much as they were being seduced a year or so ago into the claptrap about "police brutality."

WE SHOULD ALL wish that Dr. Foster had a taller soapbox to speak What he's saying needs to be from. heard far and wide. "We must have broad technological superiority over (Russia); not parity, superiority. The Soviet Union has already pulled "roughly even . . . in . . . defenserelated research and development.

BUT THE THRUST of his address was not against the unilateral disarmament buffs in the Senate and elsewhere. Dr. Foster gave them only oblique and unfavorable mention. The aim of the Defense Department must be to regain the people's confidence, and this can only be done, he said, by Pentagon purchasing contracts which are manifestly beyond suspicion and immune from reasonable criticism.

Oil Depletion Stand Stated By President

MIDLAND, Tex. (AP) deputy counsel to President Nixon said in a letter Monday that the President "continues to stand by his campaign commitment" supporting retention of the 271/2 per cent oil depletion allowance.

Midland County Judge Barbara G. Culver said she received the letter from Harry S Dent in response to one she wrote the President. In her original letter she enclosed a resolution adopted recently by the Midland County Commissioners Court, urging the retention of the present oil depletion tax allowance

"Your letter to the President has been received, and he has asked me to respond on his behalf," said Dent's letter.

"The recent testimony given before the Senate Finance Committee is to be corrected very soon by the Secretary of the Treasury. The President continues to stand by his campaign commitment.

"As you may know, the House did vote to lower the oil depletion allowance (from 271/2 per cent to 20 per cent), but this was an action of the House of Representatives and not of the President."

Early this month the Secretary of the Treasury told the Senate Finance Committee that the Nixon administration would reluctantly "accept" the allowance reduction voted by the House
