AMC Strike Settlement **Chances Good**

RACINE, Wis. (AP) - Contract negotiators announced tentative agreement on a new wage and pension package for 11,000 American Motor Corp. workers. then turned to local issues today in hope of resolving a strike at three plants.

The United Auto Workers said its 1,100 members at AMC's Brampton, Ont., division began joining the walkout at midnight Thursday, 24 hours after nearly 10.000 workers halted production in Kenosha and Milwaukee.

Spokesmen said the tentative settlement announced by AMC Vice President Frank G. Armstrong and UAW Vice President Duane Greathouse meets most of the union's demands for bringing terms in line with contracts approved in 1967 with Ford, Chrysler and General Mo-

No date was set immediately for a vote by union members.

The union sale the walkout would continue until local plant issues are settled. But both sides expressed optimism the talks continuing today would lead to a resumption of produc-

Detroit sources said Thursday the strike against the United States' fourth largest car maker could reduce AMC total output this week to 3,600 cars compared with a scheduled 6,163

The agreement proposes a three per cent wage increase under a contract expiring Oct. 16, 1970. The union originally asked for an 11-month pact, which would have expired about the same time as the Big Three

Officials said the average AMC production worker's hourly wage under the contract that expired this week was \$3.79.

The agreement includes a supplemental wage increase to catch up to Big Three pay, which AMC said financial troubles prevented it from matching last year.

AT WICHITA FALLS

Lynching Sentence **Scheduled**

WICHITA FALLS (AP) - Sentence was to be pronounced today for three Negro youths convicted Thursday of second degree lynching against a Hirschi High School teacher.

Dist. Judge Stanley Kirk was to pronounce sentence following a hearing. Convicted of the seldom-evoked statute were Donnie Ray Higgins, Charles Young and Robert

Mack, all 17. Victim of the beating was C. H. Dowdy Jr.

a 37-year-old biology teacher at the school. A jury found the three guilty of the second count of an indictment, which said the defendants, along with three minor youths, assembled unlawfully and formed the intent to commit assault, then made an assault on Dowdy.

Second-degree lynching is defined as "a collection of two or more persons assembled together with the intention to commit assault, or after assembling deciding to commit assault or battery.' The offense is a felony and is punishable by

one to ten years imprisonment. The three other youths arrested were being

handled by juvenile authorities. The defendants testified Thursday that they did kick Dowdy, but claimed he had swung menacingly

Dowdy testified he was knocked down and kicked after he told a group of Negro youths to button their shirts and take off their hats in the school building. He said he could not tell who struck

Surtax Action

WASHINGTON (AP) - The Senate Finance Committee supports the Nixon administration's plan for an extension of the income tax surcharge at a reduced rate through the first half of 1970.

Chairman Russell B. Long, D-La., said the committee's vote Thursday was by a margin of about 2 to 1 in favor of a 5 per cent income tax surtax. The levy, approved by the House, would be a January through June extension at half the current 10 per cent rate.

Congress already has extended the 10 per cent surcharge for the rest of this year.

Zodiac Killer Wants To Pick

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) -The killer who calls himself "Zodiac" and boasts of five victims now writes that he wants to add to his death list by halting a school bus so he can "pick off the kiddies as they come bouncing out."

Off 'Kiddies'

After his latest letter was sent to the San Francisco Chronicle, police issued special instructions Thursday to school bus drivers to keep buses moving "at all costs" in event of an attack, to instruct passengers to lie on the floor, and to attract attention with their horns and

"School children make nice targets," he wrote the newspaper. "I think I shall wipe out a school bus some morning Just shoot out the front tire and then pick off the kiddies as they come bouncing out.'

"I am admittedly apprehensive about another murder occurring in the near future," said Capt. Martin Lee, chief of the the Zodiac killer "an extremely dangerous psychopath."

Letters to newspapers, marked with a cross-hair symbol of a rifle sight, have boasted of killing a city taxi driver, Paul Stine, 29, here last Saturday and of four earlier weekend slayings, all in San Francisco Bay area lovers lanes.

A deciphered cryptogram sent to three newspapers in this area said: "I like killing people because it is so much fun it is more fun than killing wild game in the forest because man is the most dangerous animal of

Other victims were Darlene E. Ferrin, 22, killed last July 4 near Vallejo: Betty Lou Jensen, 16, and David Fraday, 17, both of Vallejo, Dec. 20: and Cecelia Ann Shepard, 22, Sept. 27, near Napa. The male escorts of Miss Ferrin and Miss Shepard were

Police revised a description of the cab driver's killer. They now quote witnesses as saying the man is a white male, about 40 years old, with a heavy build and short brown hair, possibly with a red tint.

The letter boasting of the taxi driver's death contained a piece of bloodstained cloth from the victim's shirt. Handwriting in all the notes is identical, Lee

MOSCOW (AP) - The second spaceship in the Soviet Union's troika mission landed safely today, returning three more cosmonauts to earth and leaving only two aloft in Soyuz 8.

Moscow Radio said Soyuz 7, new automatic welding equipcarrying Anatoly Filipchenko, Vladislav Volkov and Viktor Gorbatko, landed in the Soviet Union. It was in orbit nearly five days.

Still flying in space aboard Soyuz 8 were veteran cosmonauts Vladimir Shatalov and Alexei Yeliseyev. The other ship in this biggest-

ever mission, Soyuz 6, was brought to earth Thursday with Georgy Shonin and Valery Kubasov aboard.

Soyuz 8 is expected to land Saturday.

Sovuz 7 landed 96 miles northwest of Karaganda, in Kazakhstan, only 15 miles from the site where Soyuz 6 came down. The broadcast said search parties reached the spacecraft quickly and the three cosmonauts "feel

Soviet Ship Hit By Shells

SAIGON (AP) - A South Vietnamese navy vessel fired on and hit a Soviet trawler off the coast of South Vietnam on Thursday but the trawler escaped with smoke pouring from her forward section, official sources reported.

The informants said today the trawler was intercepted by a South Vietnamese naval patrol boat inside South Vietnam's 12mile territorial waters limit south of Da Nang. The patrol boat asked the trawler to identify herself and when she refused the Vietnamese fired a warning shot, the sources added.

When the trawler continued on her course, the Vietnamese craft fired another shot but this time aimed to hit and did, the sources said. Nevertheless, the trawler headed into open sea.

Earlier reports said that U.S. ships were involved, but a spokesman for the U.S. Command denied this.

The pattern of rising South Vietnamese losses and lower numbers of American combat dead began the week of May 11-17, three weeks before President Nixon announced the first withdrawal of 25,000 U.S. troops. Official weekly casualty figures show 8,301 South Vietnamese government troops killed in the 22 weeks after May 10; U.S. losses were 4.134 killed.

In the first 19 weeks of the year, until May 10. South Vietnamese battlefield deaths totaled 4.930 while 4.292 Americans were killed in action. The trend is the result of at

Setback To Reform

In an evenly split vote, the House Post Office and Civil Service Committee has given a serious setback, if not a fatal blow, to President Nixon's plan to convert the Post Office corporation. The committee has decided in this

action to work instead on a weak substitute devised by its chairman, Thaddeus J. Dulski, D-N.Y. The Dulski "compromise" would leave rate-fixing and wage-setting in Congress' hands and keep the department in its present form while allowing a little more administrative discretion plus bond-issuing authority for facilities improvement. That almost surely would not solve the chronic problems of unsatisfactory service and huge operating deficits.

Most experts who have studied the problem objectively, including the present and recent postmastergenerals who have suffered the painful experience of trying to make the existing system work agree that the United States cannot have an efficient, economical postal service until it is removed from partisan politics. employment.

And the main obstacle to achieving the Nixon plan, which is heavily favored in public opinion polls and should put the U.S. postal system on Department into a public service a par with the better ones in other Western nations, is employe opposition. The objection of postal union workers accounts almost entirely for the adverse House committee vote.

> The postal workers figure that, with their voting strength, they can get better wages and other benefits from Congress than from a public postal corporation, against which they would not under law be allowed to strike. However, provision would or could be made for collective bargaining negotiations, mediation, and impartial binding arbitration that should adequately protect their employment rights and provide acceptable employment conditions.



The Left Knoweth Not What The Right . . . WASHINGTON — It must be hard

for the average person to understand the news these days, as the actions of government appear to be contradictory at times. There is no explanation, for example, as to why the federal government withholds funds from public schools if they do not integrate, and then in almost similar circumstances says it will not demand desegregation in other federally financed programs.

THE LATEST paradox arises from a statement by Floyd Hyde, assistant secretary of Housing and Urban Development. His department has 300 million dollars to spend this year on a model-cities program, and he has just announced that the administration is so determined to guarantee "local control" there will be no veto over any slum-renewal plan designed to perpetuate segregation. A total of 150 cities have been awarded grants to rebuild their slum areas.

Mr. Hyde declared that if the residents of a neighborhood which is to be rebuilt want to retain a racial make-up that is all-black or all-white, the government will not stop them. He himself prefers projects which foster integration, but explains that he will not try to force his views on any city or neighborhood. He stated in an interview with the United Press International:

"WE FEEL these are local decisions. We just want to make sure that these are free decisions, that they were not forced upon the neighborhood. As long as we are satisfied that the people have had a freedom of choice and want to go that route. then we don't plan to interfere."

With respect to public schools, however, just the opposite policy is being pursued by the Department of Health Education, and Welfare. "Freedom of choice" is denied parents, and federal funds are being used to force local authorities to integrate schools and classrooms even if it requires the busing of students from one district to another. Congress, in the Civil Rights Act of 1964, specifically prohibited official action for the purpose of correcting "racial imablance." But this has been widely disregarded, and federal funds have been withheld as a means of bringing about "compulsory integration.

RECENTLY a controversy arose over postponement of court action against 30 school districts in Mississippi. A federal court granted a request by the Justice department for a delay because the local government was not able to deal with the desegregation problem by this autumn and needed more time. Immediately Negro groups in the north pointed to this as evidence thta the Nixon administration was not carrying out desegregation. Officials here answered by saving that circumstances differ in each case and that immediate implementation of the desegregation plans in the instance would "produce chaos, confusion and a catastrophic educational setback' for the pupils involved. But all such explanations are scorned by the critics as "excuses" and "alibis." and the Supreme Court is being asked to block the delay.

FOR A LONG time it was assumed that each school district or each town could draw its own lines for schools and that this would be a proper exercise of its authority. But in recent years the courts have enlarged upon the original interpretation of the Supreme Court in its famous school decision in 1954, and have taken upon themselves to rule when desegregation is or is not adequately attained (Copyright, 1969, Publishers - Hall Syndicate)

Holmes Alexander President Pushes For Haynsworth

WASHINGTON, - How to tell the sions of renewed support from the Haynsworth story? It is a mix of White House, Capitol Hill, the national might-have-beens

Judge Haynsworth might well have been seated for the opening session of the Supreme Court if it hadn't been for haste-makes-waste bungling by the attorney general, and for policy-subversion by Democratic holdovers within the administration.

OF THE HAYNSWORTH nomination might even have succumbed to the objections of Labor and Civil Rights bosses had not the over-kill McCarthyism by Sen. Birch Bayh (D., Ind.) galvanized an indignant President into counteraction. It is an unfunny comedy of errors.

Attorney General Mitchell sold Mr. Nixon on naming a learned and fundamentalist jurist, Clement Furman Haynsworth Jr., but neglected to provide a packaged record of the judge's public rulings and private investments. The Justice Department information staff, not all Nixonite Republicans, several times allowed the Administration to be beaten to the punch by hostile senators and newspapers. Half-truths and distortions, which otherwise would not have been published, had to be clumsily corrected.

THE ANTI-HAYNSWORTH Senators and press might have made a fair presentation of their case against Haynsworth's right-of-center philosophy, but chose to attack his probity with the slimy ammunition of innuendo. HAYNSWORTH'S chances for nomination hit bottom with the defection of several Republican Senators, but rebounded when President Nixon's temper reached a flash-point over the introduction of Bobby Baker's name into the dialogue.

As an old hand around Washington, Mr. Nixon was not amused when the newcomer from Illinois, Sen. Ralph Smith, Dirksen's replacement, made it the first order of business to come out against Haynsworth. The President thought he had the word of Sen. Bob Griffin (R., Mich.), the new Republican Whip, to vote the Havnsworth nomination out of the Judiciary committee, but reserve final judgment for the Senate debate. It irritated the President when Griffin jumped the gun and voted against Haynsworth in committee.

BUT WHAT REALLY pulled the trigger and ended Mr. Nixon's watchful waiting was the far-fetched link-up of Baker and Haynsworth. In retrospect, the turning point of the nomination battle may be the White House memo released Oct. 4. It showed that Haynsworth had casually met Bobby Baker, then a Senate employe, only three times, never discussed any business transaction and last saw Baker more than 10 years ago, on Sept. 12, 1958.

The President is now meeting on the Haynsworth matter with Senate groups and individuals.
